MRS. C. HOWARD CLARK, JR.

It is with deep regret that the Woman's Auxiliary notes the death of Mrs. C. Howard Clark, Jr., on August 28, 1930, at North East Harbor, Maine.

All her married life Mrs. Clark was very active in the Woman's Auxiliary and for twenty years was the able president of the Branch at St. James' Church. Her enthusiasm and zeal made it one of the leading Branches of the Diocese. Her loyalty inspired loyalty.

In the Northern Convocation she worked untiringly for the Annual Fair at Wyck with the result that whatever table she had in charge raised half the proceeds of the Fair.

She was a faithful member of the Diocesan Committee and was serving on the Municipal Court Committee up to the time of her death.

It was her great interest in the United Thank Offering that inspired her daughter, Amie Hollingsworth, to begin her faithful work at an early age.

Mrs. Clark's engaging personality, unfailing sense of humor, and her marked executive ability made her a leader in all her activities and with her whole-hearted generosity and keen interest in those lives which touched hers, she won a host of friends. Her remarkable bravery in the face of sorrow and adversity commanded the admiration of all who knew her. Many will feel the world less bright for her leaving it.

She was of the best type that New England has sent us and the Diocese is grateful for her leadership and her life.

MRS. FITZ EUGENE D. NEWBOLD

The Woman's Auxiliary has lost a beloved leader in the death, on June 6, 1930, of Mrs. Eugene D. Newbold. She was for six years the Chairman of the Domestic Committee—only resigning when her increasing illness made it obligatory. Her sweet, winning personality made her a leader in the younger set of married women and her example of unfailing loyalty to her Church duties and opportunities had a far-reaching influence.

She is greatly missed here while she is growing continually in Christ's love and service in Paradise.

**ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH
OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
NATIONAL COUNCIL**

To prepare an annual report arouses earnest thoughts. What has really been accomplished? Has our Auxiliary grown steadily with deepening roots and extending branches; is it, in fact, growing as our Lord would have it grow?

The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Pennsylvania always has extended as far as our church has led the way, but not in the fullness of its possible strength. Many members of the Auxiliary, especially in feeble, struggling parishes, call forth our great admiration, they are really the saints of the earth. When every member of the whole church shall have learned the "more excellent way" of these devoted women, "the earth shall be filled with the Glory of God as the waters cover the sea."

The outstanding difference between the Woman's Auxiliary of our Diocese and all other dioceses is in our having the separate Five Standing Committees. In these there have been some changes. In the Autumn of 1929 the beloved Mrs. Fritz Eugene Newbold, because of illness, resigned the chairmanship of the Domestic Committee. During 1930 Mrs. Francis R. Packard has splendidly carried on the spirit which has always pervaded that committee, and we look forward with confidence to its future under her leadership.

For six years Mrs Henry Dillard has been the chairman of the Colored Committee. To the regret of all who have seen her preside in this rather difficult office her two terms are completed. She is now the chairman of the younger groups of the Woman's Auxiliary, and we are confident that her energy and enthusiasm will so stimulate the younger women that our next annual report will record many parishes having a Junior Woman's Auxiliary.

The Colored Committee is well taken care of, for it has elected Mrs. John E. Hill as its chairman. The committee is to be congratulated that it secured such a leader, just as she was ending her six years as Educational Secretary.

It is not necessary to speak of the work of each of the

five Standing Committees. Read this year's annual report; it will tell you what has been accomplished far more forcefully than I can. We are always proud and very thankful that the committees have such leaders as Mrs. Markoe, Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Haines.

The new committees go steadily forward. Mrs. Biddle will tell you of her beautiful work for the Isolated, and Mrs. Dillard is training up the younger branches.

In December a new sub-committee was added to the Diocesan Committee—the W. A.'s Special Committee on Unemployment; Mrs. Henry H. Bonnell, chairman. Miss Anne Dickson is daily in charge, supervising the cutting and assembling of the garments, giving out the sewing to the women and receiving the finished work. The women are paid a fair price for the sewing and have been very grateful for this opportunity of earning money. The clothes thus made are given to Diocesan and other relief agencies. The cost of material and overhead has been contributed, but money to pay the women for the sewing will be gladly received and should be sent to the special treasurer, Miss Henrietta M. Washburn, 202 South Nineteenth Street.

The relief work has been made possible by the generous co-operation of Mrs. Theodore Paul and others of the Supply Department. Without their help this emergency relief could not have been given. They have our grateful thanks.

In 1930 our three Auxiliary Days were unusually fine. Educational Day, last January, began with excellent conferences, led by Mrs. Marcellin C. Adams and Miss Sally C. Deane; each gave helpful suggestions for the growth of our Auxiliary. That morning closed the year 1929.

The afternoon session opened the new year of 1930. It began impressively with Mrs. Harper Sibley's inspiring account of the Jerusalem Conference. I am sure since hearing her we have widened our spiritual horizon and have extended our Christian brotherhood.

At the Annual Missionary Day, at St. James' Church, February 19th, each of the five Standing Committees had a special speaker:

Rev. Hiram Bennett, for the Indian's Hope.

Rev. Robin Chen, of China, for the Foreign.

Rev. George P. Mayo, D.D., for the Domestic.

Mrs. J. Henry Brown, for the Colored, and the

Rt. Rev. Francis M. Taitt, for the Diocese.

It was a splendid day.

On November 18th the Auxiliary had the privilege of having Rev. Thomas A. Conover lead the Annual Devotional Day in Holy Trinity Chapel. It was a day long to be remembered, and the message of the "Need of Christ in Our Daily Lives" should not only have been "heard with our ears, but practiced in our lives."

In the name of the Diocesan Committee we wish to thank the rectors of Holy Trinity Church, St. James' Church, and Holy Trinity Memorial Chapel for the use of their churches and parish buildings for these three Diocesan Days. Holy Trinity Parish House is also generously given each month for the Diocesan Committee. We also wish to thank the Church Woman's Club for its hospitality to us during the Synod and at other times. These courtesies simplify the work of the Executive Committee and are much appreciated.

The Synod of our Province, the Province of Washington, met in Philadelphia October 21st to 23rd. Through your generosity not only were the forty Woman's Auxiliary delegates the guests of our Diocese, but also the twenty younger women who were invited for the first time to represent the junior groups or the "B" Branches. To Mrs. J. Alison Scott and her Hospitality Committee is due the praise that every guest gave for the hospitality so wisely arranged.

The Provincial President, Mrs. Marcellin C. Adams, made the conference a most helpful one. Mrs. Wade, Supply Bureau Secretary, represented the National Executive Office. She reported to the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary the invitation to the younger women as an outstanding event.

This resolution was passed by the visiting delegates:

Whereas, It is earnestly desired to stimulate and encourage the work among the younger women,

Be It Resolved, That the warm appreciation and thanks of the Woman's Auxiliary be extended to the generous hostesses in Philadelphia who made possible the presence of two "B" Branch delegates from each Diocese.

Whereas, The spirit of hospitality and service in the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania is everywhere apparent, especially in the plans for the entertainment of the delegates of the Synod, and in demonstrations of administration,

Be It Resolved, That our thanks be extended to the Chairman of Committees and their associates, and,

Further Be It Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes.

Mrs. Adams has been the president of the Provincial Auxiliary ever since that office was created, and under her wise administration the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province has developed into a strong body. She would not accept re-election, and Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast was unanimously elected to the office of Provincial President. The other officers elected were:

Vice-President, Mrs. Murdoch Norris, Diocese of Maryland.

Secretary, Mrs. Spencer S. Wood, Diocese of Washington.

Treasurer, Miss Laura Ruddle, Diocese of Bethlehem.

The three directors elected are:

Mrs. Adams, Diocese of Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Frank Holladay, Diocese of Southern Virginia, and

Mrs. Roger L. Kingsland, Diocese of Virginia.

Miss Louisa T. Davis, of Virginia, having served two terms as our Provincial Delegate on the National Executive Board, to our great regret was not eligible for re-election. She has been our guide in spiritual wisdom and understanding, and not to be represented by her is a great loss. Mrs. Adams has so fully demonstrated her executive ability in our Province that our thoughts naturally turned to her, but she has already served two terms on the National Executive Board, and it is considered a wise policy not to return to the Board one who has previously served for two terms. The growing desire throughout the Auxiliary is to interest young women, and our Province is most fortunate in having an outstanding leader, Miss Sally C. Deane, who is able to show the younger women what the Auxiliary can mean. Miss Deane was unanimously elected as our Provincial Representative on the Executive Board, and we are sure she will be of great service to the Auxiliary.

You remember that the Auxiliary has promised to support the Church's Budget. There is a financial stress throughout the world, but our section of this country is far better off than many others. With us no terrible drought burned up every young plant as it came up from the seed, there has been water

for our livestock, and though there have been some financial failures, the whole banking system of our region has not been wrecked.

So with thankful hearts we must continue to help the Church and its workings through our allotted Budget, and in our Advance Work. To neglect the Budget would be to close Church schools, orphanages and hospitals, and to fail to support our faithful missionaries. To neglect the Advance Work would be to fail to properly equip those whom we have promised to help. You all know the splendid part we, as a diocese, have undertaken in this Advance Work Program.

At our meeting this morning we discussed what a 100% parish should do. It is difficult to make a proper standard, one neither too high nor too low. Perhaps we shall have to call some parishes after the greatest of all the stars, Sirius. The stars are classified as of first, second, third, etc., magnitude. There are many in the group of first magnitude stars, but one star, Sirius, is so brilliant that it far exceeds its classification. I think that will have to be the way with the Auxiliaries of some of our great parishes; they must exceed the requirements of the 100% standard. Almost every Auxiliary can reach the 100% standard if it earnestly tries to do so.

This year you will have to elect a new president, and a new educational secretary, as this is the last year of the second term for each of these officers.

✗ The position of educational secretary demands great expenditure of strength, both mental and physical. Your present secretary has given of herself beyond what is right. Some rearrangement of work should be made to lighten the heavy burden of that office. During the coming months will you not earnestly pray that selection of these two new officers may be guided by the Holy Spirit?

As we go forward let us keep ever before us our real objective. This has been best expressed for us by Bishop Lloyd, "What does it mean to be a member of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council? It ought to mean a world-wide view of what the Church of God is sent to do, and a deep and real sense of personal responsibility for sharing in that mission. We need to realize the Christ working in us. We need to commit ourselves to infinite things, and then to put such a spirit into the Church as shall cause the things done to be done in the spirit of Christ. Are

we, as members of the Auxiliary, vitally conscious that we are sharing in the work of bringing souls out of darkness into His marvelous light. All the religions earth ever had were trying to find out God. No one is wicked because he is a Buddhist or a Hindu. He is only waiting for his answer, and Christianity is his answer. This is our priceless possession, and the world is pleading that we give it to all men."

To help us reach this ideal let us this year make the new collect for Whitsunday our special Auxiliary prayer, using it daily:

"Almighty and most merciful God, grant, we beseech Thee, that by the indwelling of Thy Holy Spirit, we may be enlightened and strengthened for Thy service; through Jesus Christ our Lord." Amen.

Another year has passed, and once more we place before you a review of our work in the Indian field for the last twelve months. While we did not have many speakers, the attendance at our meetings has been good. May we not go forward trusting in greater interest in the year to come, and larger results in carrying the light of the Gospel to those Indians who still "sit in darkness and the shadow of death."

We had our Annual Meeting, as usual, in January, at which was held also the annual election.

Our speakers during the year were: The Rev. Abbott Hastings, Ethete, Wyoming, who gave us an interesting account, supplemented by Mrs. Hastings, and illustrated by motion pictures, of the life and work at St. Michael's Mission; the Rev. Edward C. Kah-O-Sed, an Indian priest, who gave an account of his thirty-six years of work among the Ojibway Indians; and the Rev. Dr. John W. Chapman, who is retiring from his work at Anvik, Alaska, after forty-two years of service, and who gave us an interesting and concise story of the founding of the Mission and the work that preceded his own labors, as well as an account of the Mission to date.

We decided on our "specials" early in the year: First—Help in rebuilding the dormitory at Nenana, Alaska, towards which we sent \$100. Second—An automobile for the use of the nurse at St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming, towards which we sent \$305.50. Third—Help for the work among the Karoks at Orleans, California, to which we sent \$125. The work at Orleans, so ably done for some years past by Deaconess Todd, is now in charge of the Rev. Claud W. Silk, M. D., and Mrs. Silk. Fourth—The Shoshone Indian School at Wind

River, Wyoming, to which we sent \$1200, being part of the Advance Work of the Church for this year.

Our September meeting was preceded by a Corporate Communion in the Chapel of the Church House. The Rev. Ernest C. Earp, of the Church of the Redeemer, Bryn Mawr, was the celebrant and later addressed the business meeting, taking as his text "Thy will be done," not in the sense of submission to an inscrutable Power, but co-operation with God, an offering of our lives to the eternal purpose of God.

Among the regular pledges of the Indians' Hope are the important ones of "Salaries in the Indian Field," "Fund for Education," "Repairs on Buildings," all of which are a great help in aiding Bishop Burleson's work in South Dakota. Our Mission of the Good Shepherd at Fort Defiance, Arizona, also received the usual pledge from us. Since the Government has taken over the hospital work the Mission is now carried on as an orphanage, the only one among 35,000 Indians, and is doing a fine work with limited funds, under the care of Miss Cady. Five times as many children as we can accommodate are seeking admission. We also sent the usual pledge to the Rev. Lawrence H. Grant, of the Oneida Mission, and we were distressed to hear early in the year that his house had been destroyed by fire and that he was located temporarily at a great distance from his work. We have completed all our scholarships, and also have sent a large sum to Archdeacon Goodman at Point Hope, Alaska. We contributed to the Hare School, and also sent forty-two dollars for the Christmas candy at Rosebud. Our total expenditures for the year amounted to \$6,848.56.

We are already looking forward to next year's work and hope to make a substantial contribution, among other things, to the new heating apparatus for the Archdeacon Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska.

The Treasurer's report shows that we have paid up all our pledges and that the Parishes have given more to Specials this year, although the total amount given is not so large as last year due to one of the large donations being cut down. Thirty-eight Parishes have increased their contributions and fourteen have given the same as last year.

It is with the greatest enthusiasm and interest that we greet our speakers each month, who have so much to tell us of the various kinds of work which covers the vast field of the Domestic Committee. The knowledge of the unfailing support of the delegates who carry the message back to their Auxiliaries means much to the inspiration of our workers in the Field. This year we sent contributions to Oklahoma, Nevada, the Philippines, Honolulu, Alaska, and have heard with much interest of the work of the National Council and of the Department of Rural Work. Our speakers were: Dr. Wood, of the National Council; the Rev. Edmund Sauder, of the Philippines; Bishop Rowe, of Alaska; Mr. Forman, the National Council Secretary for Rural Work; Miss Littell, who told us of Iolani School, Honolulu; Mr. Bennett, who spoke to us of the work in Oklahoma; Bishop Jenkins, of Nevada, and Deaconess Shaw, of Bontoc, Philippine Islands.

It is hoped that in spite of, or rather because of, the serious financial crisis we are passing through, we shall be able to help even more in 1931, and bring to our aid more Parishes in the Diocese. The need is so much greater than ever before, and where the need is great help is really sent. If we ourselves cannot give more, or cannot go to work in the Field, we can all give our prayers.

It is always with a feeling of apprehension that one approaches the end of the year. Looking backwards over the twelve months, what will the record show, will the results of one's labors compare favorably with the opportunities encountered?

The budget assumed for 1930 was the same as for the preceding year, \$5,000.00 for quota objects, and \$400.00 for two specials, which is made up largely by individuals. We support one woman worker in China, and one in Japan, these are our largest pledges, they represent the sum of one thousand dollars each. The Foreign Committee gives more for quota pledges than any other Committee. I wonder if it is generally known that the work of the Church in foreign fields receives more money from the National Council by \$100,000.00 than all of the other fields put together? For this reason the parishes should give more money to this Committee than to the other Committees. In addition to the usual budget we assumed a special pledge of \$1,400.00 to help rebuild the Mission Church at Joquicingo in Mexico. The women of the Diocese having no separate pledge in the Advance Work Program, this money will go towards helping the Diocese pay its pledge for that object. The money, however, need not be paid till May, 1931.

It is hardly fair to the speakers that have come to our meetings to attempt in a few words to tell their stories, but neither does it seem right to omit all mention of them.

Miss Christine Nuno, a graduate of our own Training School, spoke to us in January, and told us what a wonderful

contribution St. Luke's Hospital in Tokyo was making to Japan, not alone along medical lines, but along educational and evangelical as well. Among other things she told us of organizing a Public Health Service with visiting nurses visiting over three thousand families.

In February the Rev. Jose Gomez, a very attractive young Mexican, told us of the good work being done by our Church in his country and of the need of more missionaries as the people are eager for the Gospel. He spoke particularly of the Hooker School with its waiting list, and said too, that St. Andrew's Seminary had been closed because of lack of funds.

Dr. Harold Morris was the speaker in March. He gave us a very interesting account of the work being done at St. Luke's Hospital in Shanghai. The fact that the Chinese christians helped the refugees, often at the risk of their own lives, and assumed the work and carried on in the face of the very disturbed conditions demonstrated, Dr. Morris felt, that they were really not anti-foreign. The April meeting occurred in Holy Week, and we were fortunate in having the Rev. Albert F. Lutley, himself a missionary in China, and a son-in-law of Mrs. James F. Bullitt. He made a very helpful devotional address, and concluded with the statement that "Christianity had not been tried and found wanting, but rather had been tried and found hard."

Mrs. Woodward very graciously invited us to hold the May meeting at her lovely home. A sale of cakes and candies was held at the same time, and a very delectable tea served by our hostess. Miss Hannah Ban, very pretty, and in Japanese dress, spoke of the work her father, a priest of the Church, is doing. Miss Ban graduated from Bryn Mawr College in June, and has returned to Japan to work among her people.

In September we had the pleasure of hearing Miss Littell, the sister of the new Bishop of Honolulu, tell of the foreign aspects of the work in that district, Japanese, Korean, Filipino. She said Honolulu was the most fertile field in the Church today.

Bishop Creighton spoke to us in October, and reminded us that we are the only Church doing work in Mexico at the invitation of the Mexicans, a people of great potentialities.

In November, Mrs. Wyllie—words cannot describe the spirit and courage of that wonderful little woman, who, with her husband, Archdeacon Wyllie, and daughter escaped with

their lives, though they lost everything else, in the recent hurricane that brought death and destruction to Santo Domingo. She begged us and the Church at home to come to their rescue, and help them in the task of beginning all over again, their work of thirteen years having been completely wiped out.

In December, Dr. Mary Janes, from Wu Chang, addressed the Committee. She spoke of the wonderful stolidity and courage of the Chinese, who have, too, a vast amount of goodness and kindness. She said the unemployment situation here is but a mild example of what conditions are in the best of times in China. The Chinese are tired of Communism because of the complete tyranny it imposes, and the people are suffering terribly. They need help, and they feel that in Christianity at least there is hope.

To the delegates and the parishes are due our grateful thanks for the accomplishments of the past year, and may we hope for and attain to, even greater things in the year that is ahead.

One of the greatest changes in the Committee on Colored Missions during 1930 was the resignation of Mrs. Dillard, who had completed six years as its chairman. The loss to this Committee was very great as her enthusiasm and energy never failed and her untiring efforts in its behalf were rewarded by the continually mounting interest of the delegates and the really live organization she turned over to her successor.

The Nominating Committee were most fortunate in securing Mrs. John E. Hill for this position. With her experience in diocesan work she will be an invaluable Chairman and has already demonstrated the fine quality of her leadership.

The only other change of officers was the election of Mrs. E. Wheeler Jenkins to fill the place of Assistant Secretary left vacant by Mrs. Birney.

Some of the outstanding points in this Committee's work include the full payment of the 1930 budget of \$4,200.00, which includes \$200.00 special for the hospital at New Bern, North Carolina, the addition of a new Parish Auxiliary to the Committee's ranks, and increased attendance. The speakers all through the year were most inspiring and from the results the delegates seem to have taken very full reports back to their parishes.

The Committee held its regular eight meetings in the year. At the January one, the speaker was Miss Richards, from St.

Augustine's, Dean of the Bishop Tuttle Training School for colored workers at Raleigh, N. C. She emphasized her belief that we are all children of the same Father and that the young Negro man or woman has the greatest chance for advancement now than anyone in our time.

In February, Mrs. Henry Brown, the wife of Archdeacon Brown, of Savannah, Ga., was the speaker. She gave a vivid picture of the high points of Church work among the Negroes since the Civil War, and left us the message from Georgia that they are not divided and are continually desiring to be lifted up and allowed to see the beauty of holiness.

March was made memorable by the presence of Dr. Patton, who was introduced as the most distinguished man in the Church. After modestly disclaiming all such eulogies, he launched into a marvelous dissertation on his work with the American Church Institute for Negroes, telling of the many remarkable things this organization has accomplished and of the ever high aims to which it is always striving.

In April Mrs. Dillard refreshed the memories of those present concerning St. Paul's School at Lawrenceville. She had attended a Farmer's Conference there and had many amusing and enlightening bits of information to recount in the talk she gave.

Mrs. Dillard was able to secure Mr. J. E. Blanton from Voorhees School, Denmark, S. C., as the speaker in May. He outlined the high aims and ideals of this school, something of its history from its tiny beginnings in a barn to its present enrollment of 636 students, and finally its needs to keep it expanding.

The October meeting was addressed by Mr. Grice from the Bishop Payne Divinity School, who sketched the evolution of this school from its beginning as a Congregational Theological School in 1861, through its successive terms as a Baptist, Presbyterian, and finally an Episcopal Seminary. At this meeting also it was voted to raise \$300.00 to send a young colored girl to the Bishop Tuttle Training School at Raleigh, North Carolina.

November brought Mr. Wallace A. Battle, who is well known to this Committee. He always manages to stir his audience by his fresh presentation of topics dear to his heart, and which strike responsive chords in the hearts of his hearers.

The December meeting, as the last one at which Mrs. Dil-

lard could preside, was fittingly given over to the winding up of business for 1930, and then made memorable to the delegates by the enthusiastic recital by Mrs. Dillard of her latest trip to the schools of the American Church Institute for Negroes, scattered throughout the South.

With this splendid year behind us, the delegates and officers are hoping for even greater things in the year just ahead, and are inspired to go forward by the appreciation shown by those people it has been their privilege to help.

The year 1931 brought sorrow to the Diocesan Committee through the death of our much-loved member, Mrs. Howard Clark, Jr. The splendid work of the Diocesan Committee in the Juvenile Court, that she headed, has been so well started and its good so demonstrated that the City Mission will continue this work.

Mrs. Martin's leadership from the first sign of distress from unemployment has been masterly—first, in starting last March feeding the children and families under Mrs. Norris Barratt, at St. Barnabas; secondly, through awakening our people to be prepared to help, as this was really a great opportunity for the Church to serve, and thirdly, the splendid plan for each Parish to be responsible for twenty-five garments a month for the City Mission. Each effort has met immediate and thrilling response.

Our minutes show speakers on housing, All Soul's Guild, Church League for the Isolated, Juvenile Court Work, Prison Work, and many of our Diocesan institutions, and the gratifying part is that be it an organ for an outlying Parish, tuition for our boy at the Church Farm School, a worker for St. John's, Christmas gifts for the Philadelphia General and similar appeals, the members by our auction system raise the money or assistance before the meetings close.

In closing I wish to offer the Committee's thanks to Sarah Lowrie for her inspiring News Letter which takes the word of work accomplished and inspiration for renewed effort in Christ's work to the women of the Auxiliary who are not fortunate enough to attend our meetings.

ANNUAL REPORT—1929-1930

Sixty-eight volunteers, representing twenty-four Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the winter of 1929-1930.

To the Mission Fields:

17,255 articles of new clothing, household supplies, dispensary articles;
1,108 knitted articles;
16,691 surgical dressings;
At a value of.....\$18,425.27

To Diocesan Institutions:

2,519 articles of new clothing and household supplies ;	
29 knitted articles ;	
5,879 surgical dressings ;

This work required :

75 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern ;	
15,688 yards of material were used ;	
6,932 cut garments were assembled ;	
7,500 directions for making garments were typed ;	
14,628 notions enclosed in the assembled garments ;	
2,838 yards of ribbon, stickerie, lingerie tape, tape, bobbin, elastic ;	
342 yards of bias were cut by hand ;	
2,514 yards of bias were purchased.	

All the sewing and knitting for this large contribution to Missions was done by the women of 134 Parishes.

The Department has undergone a number of changes this year. Early in the winter we suffered the sad loss of Mrs. McCouch, who had been in charge of the Knitting Department since the earliest days in the Inasmuch Mission. She had always done her work so completely herself, that the Knitting Department did not recover for the remainder of the season. That we were not more completely adrift, is due to our very efficient secretary, Mrs. Kent.

The Shop had a successful year under the direction of Mrs. Scott. Unfortunately for us, Mrs. Scott was unable to continue with this responsibility. The Shop has never before been open more than three days a week, but with the loss of these two department heads, we decided to run the Wool aid Shop under one person, who should devote her full time to the work and have the Shop open every day. It is a big job for one person, but Mrs. Stewart has managed so well, and our customers are so pleased to have the Shop open daily, that we have high hopes for the success of the Shop this season.

In the Sewing Department the garments came back to us so nicely sewed and in many cases so beautifully pressed and folded, that our Exhibition last spring of the winter's work was certainly worth seeing.

We have carried out our efforts to make the selling price of cut garments include the average postage to the Mission Fields.

Thanks to the money received from the Shop, we did not have to take our full quota from the Auxiliary budget.

At the beginning of this report you have read the statistics of what we have done, but we want you to have a little picture of one of the Missions we supplied yest year. We selected the Fort Valley High and Industrial School to tell you about, because it is typical of our work, and because the school is familiar to almost every woman in the Diocese. You already know that it is situated in the heart of the "Black Belt," and that it has an enrollment of 1000 students annually, with a staff of 40 officers and teachers, but do you know that the Auxiliaries in this Diocese, through their Supply Department, sent them last year

One of Miss Hunt's letters can tell you far better than any words of mine how much they appreciate our efforts :

"I am writing you again to try to have you understand how truly grateful we are for the splendid boxes which you have sent for distribution to our poor people. If you could hear their words of praise and see their happy faces, because of the things which you have sent, I am sure you would feel well paid for all your trouble and that you would have great satisfaction in knowing that you have brought peace of mind to many women and young people in their anxiety for clothing. Again and again as the women came they said, 'May the Lord bless those good people. The truth is, we are almost naked.'

"We recall very vividly the boxes that came from you some years ago. I am sorry to say that because of bank losses and failures of crops, that the need is keener this summer than at that time. May the dear Lord bless the Pennsylvania Supply Department and all the good, kind, and Christian-hearted people who make up the organization."

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY—1930

Not long ago a yearly report of the Woman's Auxiliary of a nearby Diocese came to me and, as is my custom, I turned to the report of the Educational Secretary. She began by saying that the writing of the Annual Report was one of her greatest pleasures and one she approached with joy and enthusiasm. I have been envious of her ever since, for the hardest task of the year for me is to write this report. It is so hard to translate into words the splendid work of the leaders, the loyal co-operation of the Parishes, and the inspiration and help you all are to your Educational Secretary.

We were given a difficult task last year when we were asked to arouse interest in a Missionary Conference that had already taken place without our being very aware of it, and it was made a bit more difficult when "Roads to the City of God" was given to us as our text-book. I was dismayed at the prospect of teaching it but I remembered that Bishop Brooks once said, "Do not pray for tasks equal to your power, but for power equal to your tasks," and it was in that spirit that the year's work was done. I am sure you will agree with me that it has been worth while. We were taken out of ourselves and made one with that group of splendid Christian men and women who stood on the Mount of Olives and saw in a peculiar sense the World and its needs. We had a fresh vision of what the Missionary enterprise really is, and a fresh realization of what is included in the command of Our Lord,—"Go ye into all the World."

During the year there have been 51 Parish Classes, 8 one-day Institutes, 5 Reading Circles, and 10 addresses on the Mission Study subject. This was done by 21 leaders, and in addition two of our Clergy used the Jerusalem Conference for the subject of their week day instruction during Lent. One of our leaders had a class in Atlantic City, another addressed the Monmouth County Woman's Association in New Jersey, and many of them have been too modest in telling of the work they have done.

Your Educational Secretary fell by the way last year and did not realize how ambitious a programme she had made for herself until it was necessary to secure substitutes. Some one has said that emergencies develop new leaders but that is not true in this case, for those who so generously carried on for me were leaders of long standing and in whose footsteps I have

humbly followed. It did however, prove to me that they were not only co-workers but, in a real sense, friends. -I thank them one and all—You who profited by the exchange deserve no thanks, for you know how lucky you were. I did, however, conduct 2 Normal Classes of six sessions, and one of ten sessions, led one Program Class at the Church Training and Deaconess School, held nine Institutes on the Jerusalem Conference and one on Missionary Education for Adults, in connection with the Sunday School Institute, and made 19 addresses either on the Mission Study subject or on the general work of the Auxiliary. I represented you at the Synod at Harrisburg, and at the meetings of the Department of Religious Education. I also helped to plan four Parish Auxiliary Programs on general Auxiliary Educational lines, and am hoping to be called upon to do more of this sort of Educational work next year. In all, we touched about 85 Parishes and brought our subject before more than 2,000 people in the Diocese.

Has it all been worth while? Well, I believe firmly that the Educational Work of the Woman's Auxiliary is not only worth while but absolutely necessary. In these days of Parochialism we are so apt to forget that the Field is the World and become satisfied with lesser things, and so fail to realize that the measure of our opportunity is the measure of our responsibility. It is hard to measure results, but after all, results belong to God, and of you and me there is asked willing service and to us is given the privilege of being co-workers in winning the world for Christ.

The offering from all the Mission Study Classes last year amounted to \$1,316.00, and was used to bring Miss Fujimoto, one of our head kindergarten workers in Japan, here for a year's study of American methods, so that she may return to her native country better fitted for her work. Miss Fujimoto is making a splendid record at Temple University, where she is carrying on her studies, and before her return to Japan will visit other Universities in this country.

Ordinarily my report would end here, but there is something more to be said. What I have told you is accomplishments, now I want to tell you the failures. We have in the Diocese 135 Parishes and Missions which have never been represented in any Normal Class since I was elected in 1925; worse still, there are 110 Parishes and Missions which have had no Mission Study Class or Institute in these six years. The leaders who do such splendid work represent only 18 Parishes. This is serious,

and calls for concerted action on your part for only a thoroughly informed Auxiliary is awake to all the opportunities for service.

You may be wondering how I have managed to appear so busy, and thinking "Mercy, she must go round in circles!" Perhaps I do, but it is really up to you to demand better things of your Educational Secretary and see that greater demands are made. Will you help in the coming year by planning for a Mission Study Class, an Institute or a Program Meeting where the Educational Work of the Woman's Auxiliary may be presented?

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY COMMITTEE FOR WORK AMONG THE ISOLATED

The work among the isolated in the Diocese of Pennsylvania has been going on its silent way, not speaking much to the public, but we feel, in many cases, twice blessed,—to those who give and those who take. Our numbers have been considerably depleted by death, so that though new names are added to our lists, the total varies little.

We sent out at Christmas time a little more than 300 "Bible Readings" from the National Council, with a personal letter and Christmas card, and a special letter from Bishop Garland and Bishop Taitt. The appreciation of this thought on the part of their Chief Shepherds has brought many grateful letters and we feel sure has done more than anything else to make our isolated friends feel themselves members of the Church's family. The "Bible Readings" seem to meet a great need and are gladly used.

Working in co-operation with the Church Periodical Club we have been the means of adding more than 800 volumes to the Library of St. James's Parish, Perkiomen, at Evansburg, which Deaconess Morris and Deaconess Kaign are making such an acceptable centre for that neighbourhood. Their need for children's books is very urgent, and they ask for this work your thoughts and prayers that their hands may be upheld.

One of our members has asked for Mission Study material, and we feel sure that this is where we may be able to help the Clergy in their need for material for parishioners who are unable to attend Church or whose children cannot go to Sunday School. We supply, free of charge, from the Department of Religious Education, excellent suggestions and outlines that have proved most useful in hundreds of homes all over our country, and which make an added link with the rector and parish, as well as with the Church at large. Lists of books also will be sent, which are lent free of charge, with postage prepaid.

What we need and ask for is the co-operation of our Bishops and Clergy and laymen, and of every organization in the Church. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew, the Girls' Friendly Society, the Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, the Daughters of the King, the Church Mission of Help, the Church Periodical Club, and all departments of the Woman's Auxiliary;—indeed of every man, woman, and child who will help us with suggestions or in any other way, or whom we can help to make others know the joy and inspiration of Fellowship in the Family

of God. We are especially anxious to be of use to workers among the blind, and in hospitals and prisons. Any information about the work will be gladly given by the Chairman, Mrs. Charles Biddle, Andalusia, Pa.

Will you who read this try to realize the loneliness and sense of desolation that might be yours and is a very real fact in the lives of many of our people? We ask your thought, and prayers, and help, for them and us.

WOMAN'S COMMITTEE FOR THE ADVANCE WORK PROGRAM

In reporting the progress made by the Woman's Committee during the past year, I should like to make very clear certain points which seem to be causing confusion in some Parishes.

The Woman's Committee and the Woman's Auxiliary are working in full co-operation with the Field Department and the Special Layman's Committee—there is no conflict in our work or appeal.

All monies given by women as individuals or by Auxiliaries will be credited the Parish from which they are given, unless otherwise specified, and will count on the Parish Quota for Advance Work. Evidently this has not been made clear as over \$3,400.00 has already been given by women which has not been sent through the Woman's Committee.

On January 1, 1931, the Woman's Committee had received \$11,193.09 from Parishes and individuals, and of this amount \$6,000.00 has been forwarded to the Field; \$4,500.00 to Bishop Schmuck for work among the whites in Wyoming, and \$1,500.00 for Bishop Creighton for Mexico.

The Indians' Hope Association has completed its pledge for \$1,200.00 for the School on the Shoshone Reservation in Wyoming. The Domestic Committee is working for \$1,000.00 for Iolani School, Honolulu. The Coloured Committee has a pledge for the Coloured Hospital at New Bern, North Carolina, and the Foreign Committee a pledge of \$1,400.00 for a much-needed Mission Chapel in Mexico.

While the Woman's Committee has no definite pledge it is most anxious to have the loyal support of all women in the Diocese in its effort to help meet the \$113,200.00 which Pennsylvania has promised towards the Advance Work. Books bought during the year and donated as follows:

At a meeting of the Provincial Synod in October it was decided to raise money for the purchase of a new edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica for Iolani School, Honolulu. The Diocese of Pennsylvania pledged \$50.00 for this project.

To Rev. F. C. Roberts, Chester, W. Va., 700 books were sent for his Mission Library; and 832 books were sent to Deaconess Morris, of Collegeville, Pa., for the library there.

The Church of the Holy Trinity purchased 10 Prayer Books and Hymnals for Rev. W. John Brown, Manchester, Vt. They are contributing toward the education of a young man at Oxford, England; and they send reading matter to the Naval Expeditionary Forces in China and Nicaragua.

St. Mark's Church is helping materially in replenishing the library at St. Andrew's, Tenn., which burned last year.

Christmas articles were given to Miss Hennie Watkins, of Brighton Mission, Tennessee, and also to St. Andrew's Mission-on-the-Mountain, Harpers Ferry, W. Va.

At St. Andrew's Mission we have adopted the children to give them a good public school education, each branch of the C. P. C. in this Diocese donating a sum for the purpose of buying their books. About sixty children are receiving these required books besides clothing.

In Social Service Work 72,145 magazines have been distributed to 189 institutions; also several Victrolas and records have been sent to missions.

About 400 of the regular magazines being sent out through Parish Branches are in the form of new subscriptions.
