**ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
PENNSYLVANIA BRANCH  
OF THE  
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE  
NATIONAL COUNCIL**

This Fifty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary began with memorials of officers of our Auxiliary whom we shall sorely miss, but for whom we give God thanks. To these memorials should be added the remembrance of two others who have so often taken part in our services.

Bishop Garland attended our last annual meeting, January, 1931, and after listening with keen interest to our reports, he gave high praise to the work accomplished and then included us all in a very special blessing for the future. We have a sense of gratitude for this happy remembrance of the last time Bishop Garland was with us.

We cannot meet in this Parish Building of Holy Trinity Church without grateful memories of the innumerable occasions when we, as the Woman's Auxiliary, have been welcomed here by the rector of this parish—Dr. Floyd W. Tomkins. We recall the many times he has presided at our Missionary Meetings in Holy Trinity Church, and the gracious and appreciative introductions he always gave to the special speakers we had invited. At our last Missionary Day, January 20, 1932, Dr. Tomkins led us in our Noonday Intercessions, and we joined our prayers with his, knowing how fervently his heart went out to missions and to all in "any ways afflicted or distressed." When we consider how we have grown in courtesy and in understanding of other Christian Communions, we realize how great has been his leadership.

Our last annual meeting, on January 2, 1931, seems a long time ago. Since then it was decided that as the year's work of the Auxiliary is really from autumn through spring, the annual meeting should be the end of April, at which time reports should be presented, elections take place, and new officers installed. Hence, the reports presented today at this annual meeting cover a period of sixteen months, from January, 1931, to April 27, 1932.

As we look back over the past months, we see first our five Standing Committees. With such meetings, it is natural that Pennsylvania's missionary spirit is recognized throughout the Church. It has been a happy privilege to us all to have been associated through these committees with their chairmen—Mrs. Markoe, Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Haines, Mrs. Hill, and Mrs. Packard. This month our whole city has been saddened by the death of its leading woman citizen, Mrs. Martin. The Diocesan Committee knows how strong was her spiritual side. Miss Lowrie, who has worked with Mrs. Martin on many committees, said that she was at her finest and best when presiding over the Diocesan Committee. Truly, Mrs. Martin lived up to Lincoln's standard, "with malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gave her to see the right, and to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow and his orphan."

We all deeply regret that after forty years Mrs. Markoe has resigned as Chairman of the Indian Hope Committee. She is now its Honorary Chairman, and we all pray that she may long be with us to be, as she has ever been, our inspiration and our joy.

Last summer Miss Charlotte Cheston, our Treasurer, was married and now lives in Labrador. Her sister, Miss Lily Cheston, kindly agreed to fill her sister's unexpired term and has been our excellent Treasurer this winter.

The special Woman's Auxiliary services have been well attended, except the Missionary Service, February 9, 1931, when the one violent storm of the winter prevented many from coming to hear Bishop Creighton and Dr. Blanton. Those who were able to come were thankful they braved the storm, the addresses were so memorable.

Dr. Mockridge again welcomed us to St. James' Church in October for our Devotional Day Service. It was beautifully conducted and Dr. Fort Newton's meditations on the Holy Communion made a deep impression.

Our largest attendance for some years was at our Missionary Day in Holy Trinity Church, on January 20, 1932. I have already spoken of Dr. Tomkins' noonday meditations on that day. Bishop Taitt was celebrant and gave us his greetings. Bishop Rowe, Rev. A. W. Eastburn, Rev. E. H. Foster, Dr. and Mrs. Grafton Burke, Rev. A. Abbott Hastings, and Rev. J. Alvin Russell each spoke impressively of his part of the Field.

In co-operation with The Girls' Friendly and other organizations in the Diocese, a Joint Lenten Mass Meeting was held in Holy Trinity Church on the evening of March 8. This service was arranged especially for those who cannot attend our daytime missionary meetings. Bishop Taitt broke an important engagement in order to be with us. Miss Littell told of the district of Hawaii and especially of our Advance Work Project—The Iolani School. Dr. William C. Sturgis then gave us a stirring "Call to Service," making us see the "fields white to the harvest" and the need of us all as laborers in it.

This Iolani School is the last piece left of our Advance Work. Six others, all smaller, have been completed. Our Advance Work Treasurer, Mrs. Pancoast, will gladly receive any contribution for this much-needed school building, which will combine foreign and domestic missions, international relations, and race contacts.

In September your Diocesan Auxiliary was represented at the Triennial in Denver by Mrs. Haines, Mrs. Pancoast, Mrs. Hill, Mrs. Franklin Pepper, and your President. Mrs. Paul and Mrs. Baker were present as alternates; also your U. T. O. treasurer, Mrs. Ingersoll, who came to attend the great Presentation Service of the Thank Offering. You have been told many times this autumn and winter of the splendid services, of the earnest business sessions, of the classes we attended, of the fellowship of Christian women, but only those who were present can know what it really meant. Let us all hope to have some share in the Convention in Atlantic City in 1934.

At our last annual meeting we inaugurated the system of 100% standard for our parochial branches. To have a 100% parish auxiliary there must be some younger women taking part in an auxiliary. There has been fine growth in this diocese of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. There are now twenty-two parish branches. It is not a separate organization from ours—only another group in the parish, working with the same ideals but with different plans. I tried for six years, without success, to arrange classes for religious instruction for young women. Now, in their first winter, these young women themselves, with Mrs. Dillard, have arranged classes with Dr. Fort Newton on Church History and with Dr. Leicester C. Lewis on "The Teachings of Jesus."

I recommend to you the excellent account of our Juniors written by Mrs. Hewson, their President, who is, ex-officio, one of our vice-presidents; you will find it in the March number

of the "Church News" in the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Bishop Cross spoke in Denver of Thanksgiving in Intercessions. Let us remember the Junior Woman's Auxiliary in such intercessions.

In Mrs. Biddle's Committee of Intercessors, who are mostly the isolated and shut-ins, our Auxiliary perhaps reaches its highest point spiritually. There are on her list many to whom remembrances are sent at the Church's seasons, and from whom "prayers as incense rise" at all seasons. Mrs. Biddle asks us to pray with and for them.

Our Educational Secretary, Mrs. Hill, will tell of the Mission Study Classes. She has given seven years of devoted service to our educational work. By her intimate knowledge of the development of parish auxiliaries, by her readiness to serve even beyond her strength, and by her judgment, Mrs. Hill has been of constant help to me throughout my term of office. No one knows the strength and weakness of our Auxiliary more intimately than she does, and no one has higher ideals and aspirations for it.

In these difficult times there has been extra need for the supply work. Mrs. Paul has not only fulfilled the duties as our Secretary of the Supply Bureau, but she has also been most generous in arranging her work with Miss Dickson to fit in with the enormous demands of our Special Committee for Unemployment Relief, which have taxed the Supply Bureau building to capacity.

There are two good sides to this relief work. First, 190 women have received \$12,000 for making 25,000 garments. Second, these garments have been sent to our missions and schools, to Indians, to the colored, to the mountaineers, and to relieve stricken Belice in Honduras, but by far the largest amount has been given to clothe the needy in our own city, through our church missions and through the branches of the Bureau of Unemployment Relief in many sections of Philadelphia. Our Church has been splendidly represented through Miss Dickson and her fellow-workers. She has learned to know the women who come for the sewing, and in her they feel they have a friend. To Miss Dickson and Mrs. Campbell, for the supervision of the preparation of the thousands of garments, and to the many, many faithful volunteers who have come so regularly to assemble and distribute these garments, and to all who have contributed money to pay the women, no praise is adequate. Through them the answer has been given to the question, "And who is my neighbor"?

I have not spoken of the financial distress—except as to how we have tried to relieve it in our city. We all know that every missionary's salary paid by the National Council has been cut 10%; that unless \$400,000 more is received, drastic cuts in the mission field will be made. On Whitsunday there will be a great in-gathering throughout the Church to prevent such a sacrifice. You need no urging to do your best—you will give gladly.

We know the only solution of the world's ills is the acceptance of Christ and His teaching. At the Triennial, Dr. McGregor showed it thus to us so truly, "We are creating the new family of humanity in Christ Jesus, which alone can stand through the storms of time. Every dollar offered in a Blue Box, every prayer sent up to the throne of God, every word spoken for the cause of the Church in building up its great work in distant lands,—every one of these is a work of weaving the web of the new family of God, the new humanity which shall stand when all other institutions and organizations shall have passed away. Silently, quietly, the work goes on. On the surface we see the turmoil—but in the background and the shadow, where humble souls are witnessing for Jesus Christ, they are bringing into His fellowship men and women of every land, and some day this new fellowship shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea, and will bring in the longed-for day, the day of human brotherhood in the kingdom of God."

And now, how can I tell you what a privilege it has been to me to have been your President for six years. I came into a wonderful inheritance—Mrs. Markoe had instilled into us the two-fold side of missions—the spiritual and material. Mrs. Alison Scott, my immediate predecessor, had so systematized the office work that it is still an outstanding example for all large dioceses.

I wish I could thank each one of you individually. There is Mrs. Thomas, so helpful, so willing, so self-forgetful,—but I really must refrain from personal mention, for, like the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews, I can say, "Time will fail me if I tell of all," but I thank you one and all for your loyal support and your patience with my shortcomings. My life has been filled with many blessings. Among the happiest has been working with you, the women of the Auxiliary, as we have striven together to make His way known upon earth, His saving health among all nations.

In this our first Annual Report we feel confident of two things: 1. The intense interest in the Church of the girl of today; 2. Her desire to know and serve her Church.

There have been four Diocesan meetings during the year and two conferences of the Presidents of the branches. With about forty at our organization meeting in February, 1931, we are encouraged at the attendance of 109 at the first Annual Supper Meeting on April 26th, 1932. From our conferences have come these thoughts: To strive to develop along three lines, spiritual, educational and service. We agreed: 1. To keep in close touch with the Seniors of the Woman's Auxiliary; 2. To work out an educational program; 3. To urge neighboring branches to meet and work together; 4. To plan in each branch some course, group discussion or Mission Study during Lent; 5. To urge summer Volunteer work and attendance at Summer Conferences.

At Christmas all groups took an active interest in some specific mission, besides work in their own Parishes. There have been two Diocesan Courses at St. James Chapel, one in Epiphany on Church History by Dr. Leicester C. Lewis and one in Lent on "The Teachings of Jesus" by Dr. Joseph Fort Newton. Individually the branches have entered into various activities and studies through the Parish and Diocese. This interest has been expressed through courses on the Prayer Book, Mission Study and other general Church topics.

Activities of the branches have been social service, surgical dressings, sewing, knitting, dramatics, cooking classes, sending delegates to the Monthly Auxiliary meetings—and Altar Guild work.

At the close of the year it is a great satisfaction to feel the organized support of seventeen active Junior groups working together as part of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Another year has closed, and we pass in review its happenings, rejoicing in what has been accomplished, and inspired, we hope, to greater effort in the future for spreading Christ's Kingdom among His "First Americans."

From many sources in The Field we have heard encouraging reports and expressions of appreciation of the re-organization of the Indian Office at Washington, under Commissioner Rhoads and his assistant, Mr. Scattergood. May the standards of honesty and fairness set up continue in spite of changes in political administration.

In January the annual election of officers was held, Mrs. Markoe being re-elected Chairman, Mrs. Biddle becoming 2nd Vice-Chairman, and Mrs. George Woodward 1st Vice-Chairman. To our great regret, Mrs. Taylor resigned her office which she has filled for many years with ever ready cooperation and devotion.

Mrs. Van Pelt was elected Assistant to Miss Watts, Mrs. Goodfellow acting as Registrar.

A very great blow has come to us in the death of Mrs. Dougherty, our Secretary, and we incorporate in this Annual Report the Memorial presented to this Association in November,

“IN MEMORIAM

GERTRUDE BANKS DOUGHERTY

It was with a sense of very great shock and very real sorrow that the members of the Indians' Hope Association of the diocese of Pennsylvania at the meeting on October 28th heard of the death of Mrs. Charles Dougherty, and the following resolution of sympathy and appreciation was sent to her family and incorporated in the minutes.

‘In the death on October 26, 1931, of Mrs. Charles Dougherty, our devoted secretary for nineteen years—since October 26, 1912—we have suffered an irreparable loss.

‘Her accuracy, her unfailing punctuality, her keen sympathy for every branch of the work, and her natural gifts, all combined to make her an ideal secretary.

‘Every member of the association feels this; to the officers her loss is a very real and personal one.’

The Church's Prayers of Thanksgiving for her life and for Those in Affliction were offered at the celebration in the chapel of the Church House and at the meeting afterwards.’

During the year also occurred the death of the Rev. Edward Ashley who went to South Dakota before Bishop Hare and devoted 57 years of his life to the Indians; and of the Rev. Philip Deloria, the first Indian priest ordained by Bishop Hare. Bishop Blair Roberts has succeeded Bishop Burleson as head of the District of South Dakota. From Ft. Thompson the Rev. David Clark came to speak to us, and laid great stress on the importance of building up the State and County Day Schools where our older Indian Children, in the Missions are being sent to be fitted for association with white people. The Bishop Hare Industrial School at Mission is in excellent running order under Mr. Mengel's management.

Miss Haines and Miss Temple from Philadelphia, who spent last summer on the Rosebud and Crow Creek Reservations attending their Niobrara Convocation, were especially impressed by their great generosity, and by the fine example and leadership of one of the young Indian women, Evelyn Lambert.

In North Dakota, as in South Dakota the poverty has been very great and man and beast has suffered from failure of crops. Bishop Bartlett, recently consecrated to North Dakota, hopes to build upon the work already done.

Archdeacon Jenkins of Arizona echoed Miss Cady in urging that help be given Blind Howard, the Indian boy at Ft. Defiance, to enable him to finish his education, and realize his dream of ministering to his people. Miss Cady's visits to the camps with an interpreter carry with them physical and spiritual healing.

From Dr. Silk, priest and physician, came a History of the Mission to the Karok Indians at Orleans, California, which was founded by the Indian Hope. His work as surgeon is much hampered by lack of electricity, necessitating operations by flash light, lamps being impossible with inflammable anaesthetics.

The Rev. Abbott Hastings in February showed us pictures of St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming and told of remarkable improvement in Indian homes and in the death rate of infants, and in trachoma, which has dropped from 75% to 25%. The medical work is not supported by the Church.

Bishop Moulton spoke to us of his work among the Utes, the "People of the Heights" in Utah, saying that his aim was to raise them to spiritual heights. We have the field to ourselves. The parish house at Randlett, given by New York Auxiliary helps as a substitute to the gambling and lazy habits of the families of the young people returning from school. He would like to bring some of his Indian boys to the East to show how our service should be read.

At the last General Convention, the Rev. John Boyd Bentley was consecrated Bishop Suffragan of Alaska, to assist Bishop Rowe in the great work that he has carried on so heroically for 31 years.

At our meeting in October, the Rev. Frank Bonyngé celebrated the Holy Communion, and in his address assured us that God must be placed at the center of our work and service, and that He will bring good out of all the confusion and upheaval that the world has brought upon itself because it has forgotten Him; we cannot live only for ourselves, and in the work of the Indians' Hope we have a definite, ever growing sphere of usefulness.

We close the year with every pledge redeemed, and our "Special" of \$2000. for heating plant, Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska, overpaid by more than \$1500. \$3703.58 was given to the quota, \$4373.25 in Specials; a total of \$8076.83. We finished the sum needed for the car for the nurse at Ethete, and sent \$35. each to Rosebud and Ft. Thompson for Christmas toys and candy.

Of Mrs. Markoe's resignation as our President, we can with difficulty trust ourselves to speak. She has been working for the Indians 62 years. Since 1891 she has been serving this Association as Vice-President and President. No one will ever know how far reaching in all these years her influence has been in Church and State for the spiritual and material growth of the Indian and we thank God for her devoted leadership and example. Her place will never be filled; but we must show our love and loyalty in carrying on and holding high the torch that she hands to us. May she be long spared to us as Guide, Counsellor and Friend.

During the past year the Domestic Committee said a regretful farewell to Miss Charlotte Cheston who had been its Assistant Treasurer for several years; but we rejoice in the reason and wish her much happiness in her married life in her new home in Labrador.

The Domestic Committee is glad and thankful to report that the attendance at the meetings has been very good, and the speakers have found the delegates intensely interested and eager. The consciousness of a struggle to rise above the difficulties of the times, has made everyone feel the thrill, in fulfilling the pledges.

It was not to be expected that the contributions could reach the same high level as last year, and we gratefully acknowledge the splendid effort and great generosity of Parishes, that has enabled us to come within \$163. of the pledges we had undertaken. Our pledge for advance work of \$1,000.00 for Iolani needs only \$72. to complete it.

The sum total for 1931 looks smaller because we were fortunate in receiving last year splendidly large gifts, \$500. Easter School, \$400. Bishop Rowe for rural work, which of course made a wonderful difference.

It is indeed difficult to find ways to continue our contributions when we are appealed to on every side and have so much less to spare, but a cheerful, courageous and determined spirit must succeed, together with a realization that we *cannot* fail

those who are depending on us, in the far corners of the country. We appeal to *all* the Parishes in the Diocese for their cooperation, in sending delegates to the meetings, even if they cannot contribute; what they will hear cannot fail to inspire them to inspire others; but even \$1.00 or less each month is greatly appreciated.

It is a great pleasure to recall the speakers whom we were fortunate in having during the year.

Our old friend Mr. Mayo came in *January* with his report of the work in the Blue Ridge Industrial School, Va. The drought had made the situation very serious last year, resulting in heavy loss to the school and making many families penniless, but a happy outcome was the finding of many new and devoted friends in their need.

In *February* The Reverend Ernest Pugh of St. John's Church, Somerville, N. J., gave such a vividly interesting and colorful picture of the Virgin Islands where he was situated formerly, that the whole meeting was electrified.

*March* brought us J. Lundy Sykes, Archdeacon for the Canal Zone. His talk was so convincing, as to the need of the work there, especially for the completion of the Advance Work Program.

Miss Littell came in *April* to tell us of the work of the Iolani School, Honolulu, for which the Domestic Committee had undertaken to raise \$1,000. for the new building; this was our one pledge outside the Quota.

Deaconess Williams came too to ask for help in sending volunteers to work in the mountains of S. Western Virginia for the summer. Four girls from this Diocese were ready but the money already raised for their expenses had been lost in a bank failure.

In *May* we were delighted to hear Mr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary for the Department of Foreign Missions in the National Council. He is always intensely interesting, as he has such a comprehensive view of the whole situation. This time he made a very strong appeal for our help, for the foreign born in our country.

At our first meeting after the summer, *October*, we were deeply interested in hearing from Mrs. Haines of the Convention at Denver, she spoke of the impression received of the "bigness" of the Church, the wisdom and charity of its leaders and the glorious unity of this Christian Assembly.

Then Miss Elizabeth Thompson gave a most amusing and worthwhile report of the summer work in S. Western Virginia, she was one of the volunteers who went last summer for Deaconess Williams, the money having been raised by our Committee.

*November* was a particularly exciting meeting as not only did we have Miss Morgan from Penland, N. C., who had on exhibition some of the work done at the school, and gave a most vivid picture of the people and their needs, but we also had the great privilege of having Bishop Schmuck from Wyoming. His work is amazing and absorbingly interesting; one of his greatest problems now is to provide means for himself and his clergy to enable them to cover the great distances in the diocese; and finally Mrs. Abbott, wife of Bishop Abbott, stirred us to the soul by her descriptions of the conditions in her husband's Diocese of Lexington, among the mountain people.

In *December*, Deaconess Kate Sibley Shaw, All Saints School, Bontoc, P. I., told of the work of this school which was the first Mission started by Bishop Brent in the mountain district. The need is greater than ever and we hope for your continued interest and help.

This past year the Foreign Committee undertook its regular quota budget of \$5,000. and its two specials amounting to \$400., and in addition it assumed \$1,400 of the Advance Work Program pledge of the Diocese. This money was to help rebuild the Mission Church for the Indian congregation at Joquicingo in Mexico. The strain caused by the economic crisis in this country had begun to be felt and it was not without difficulty that all our obligations were finally met. And I must say to our shame that it was not without the help of those who have gone before, the interest from whose legacies had to be used for this purpose rather than for something special as is our custom.

Our pledges embraced thirty-two different objects distributed among evangelical, educational and medical missions in Shanghai, Hankow, Wuchang, Anking, Tokyo, Kyoto, Fukui, Osaka, Sendai, Liberia, Mexico, Cuba, Hayti, Brazil, Kosatsu, and as last year we supported two women workers, Miss Etta McGrath in Japan, and Dr. Margaret Richey in China.

Except in China where the unsettled conditions have in some places caused a temporary curtailment of the work, the work of the Church goes steadily forward, impeded only by the not too generous hand of the Church at home.

Each month a missionary from the field has brought us the story of his or her special field of endeavor, and if only we of the church at home were really informed and knew the needs and opportunities, the money for the adequate support and advance of the church in the field would be assured.

Our speakers were the Rev. Thornton from Cuba in January, Mrs. Standring in charge of the Training School for Bible Women in Soochow in February, Bishop Fiske in March conducted a lenten devotional meeting, Miss Mary McKenzie of the House of Bethany in Liberia in April, Mrs. Ancell from Yangchow in May, Bishop Thomas of Brazil in October, Bishop Binstead of Tohoku in November, and Miss Mary McGill in December. To all these we listened eagerly, but especially to Miss McGill who is engaged with Miss Cornwall-Leigh in a very remarkable work among the lepers at Kosatsu in Northern Japan. There are 50,000 lepers in Japan, only 5,000 of whom are in institutions, the rest of these poor souls are outcasts, and hide in the mountains and in hovels like animals.

Kosatsu known formerly as Hell's Mountain, was bought by Miss Cornwall-Leigh, and is now known as the Mount of Prayer, while the homes that they have built there bear such names as the House of Contentment, The House of Hope, Peace, Joy and the like. Work is carried on among the tainted and the untainted, and the disease may be cured by injections of oil if it has not advanced too far. It was for money to buy oil that Miss McGill especially appealed. Her radiant face gave evidence of her devotion to these poor unfortunates to whose welfare, physical and spiritual, she is giving her life.

For the interest of the delegates who make up the Committee, and for the contributions of the parishes who make it possible for us to have a share in carrying the Message to many lands afar off, we express our appreciation and thanks, for without their help how should we "sing the song of the Lord in a strange land?"

The year 1931 had many things to mark its passing. Notable among them and responsible for the rest was Mrs. Hill's inspiring leadership as the chairman of the Committee on Colored Missions.

All during 1931 and for the first five meetings of 1932 her tireless energy and enthusiasm were devoted and unstinted. Under her guidance attendance increased, new parishes were represented, new work was undertaken and completed.

The good fortune of this committee in having a leader of such sympathy, insight and talent was really our misfortune, for in May the diocese bestowed on her the honor of electing her the President of the Auxiliary and taking her from us. Our loss is irreparable and we can only hope that with the splendid plans she started we can be carried through the remainder of her term of office.

At the January meeting it was gratifying to learn that all pledges for 1930 were completed including the \$200.00 special for the hospital at New Bern. The Rev. Robert I. Johnson was the speaker at this meeting and gave us in a clear and convincing manner the need for this hospital. Improvements in the conditions for negro health have not kept pace with their educational advancement and the New Bern Institute will provide not only much needed beds but training for many young internes.

There was a special meeting in the evening in February besides the regular one. Mrs. Henry Hunt of the Fort Valley School, Georgia, spoke at both of them and gave a biographical sketch of her life at this school with her husband and three children, from the time they arrived from Biddle University, Charlotte, in 1904, up to the present. Progress was noted in her description of new buildings, girls' dormitories, Carnegie library, gifts of scholarships and loans to students from local banks. Through the efforts of Dr. George Peabody, Fort Valley became part of the American Church Institute for Negroes and was put on the Church's Advance Work Program, being given \$100,000.00 and raising the same amount.

At the March meeting the Rev. George M. Plaskett of Orange, New Jersey, told of the Rural Conference at St. Augustine's Raleigh, to which he was going. He stressed the importance of these conferences which teach the negroes the latest methods of farming, canning, schooling, home-making and hospitalization. At present 83% of all negro work is done in cities so there is a great need for help in these country settlements.

Dr. Patton, head of the American Church Institute for Negroes visited this committee in April. His enthusiasm for this work among the negroes and his vast knowledge of all its schools is always an inspiration to those who have the privilege of hearing him. He gave reports of Dean Payne, of Columbia University and other investigators of the high quality of the Institute's work. With 9,000 pupils in these schools from September to June and one-third of the cost of maintenance given by the students, one-third by the Woman's Auxiliary and one-third from the Church and the South giving twice as much per capita as the rest of the country, Dr. Patton feels sure this great work will go on to greater heights than in the past 25 years of his affiliation with negro education and religion.

The May budget being \$400.00 for St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., Mrs. Hill secured as the speaker the Rev. Alvin Russel, principal of the school since 1929 when his father retired. He told of Archdeacon Russel founding the school 42 years ago with no money and no land, of the progress it has made during its development. Every building has been erected by the students themselves and the Julia C. Emery Hall just completed is the first gift from the United Thank Offering voted at General Convention in Portland in 1922. Great emphasis is laid on industrial training for both boys and girls. Mr. Russel ended with some very hopeful statistics showing

that 3,000 pounds of beef and lamb and 11,000 pounds of pork were raised last year, that there are 42 school buildings on 1,600 acres of land and the faculty numbers 56.

The October meeting was presided over by Mrs. Hill as chairman and speaker. Thinking there would be a large number of speakers at General Convention in Denver for her to choose for October, she was amazed to find she could get none. As an intensely interested delegate herself she finally decided the committee might like to hear some first hand reports of the various activities. It was a very fortunate inspiration as a most vivid picture of the Discussion Groups, the financial scope and the social and religious sides of the convention was given.

A field secretary, Miss Esther Brown, of the Field Department of the Woman's Auxiliary was the speaker for November. In a most persuasive and appealing manner she told of the Bishop Tuttle Training School and St. Agnes' Hospital. She made it extremely clear to what a large degree these two units are bound up in each other. Her experience as a student at the Tuttle School gave her words added weight. She also took practical nursing and religious education at St. Agnes' Hospital. There are 100 beds in that hospital and a new clinic for outpatients was opened in the nurse's building last May. It is accredited by the American Medical Association and considered the best in operation in the state by Dr. Rankin, secretary of the Julius Rosenwald Foundation. At the Tuttle School 10 graduated last May and are ready for positions with churches as social workers. Money for running expenses for these two institutions is greatly needed and Miss Brown made a special plea for a student loan fund.


Mr. G. Warfield Hobbs, editor of the *Spirit of Missions*, came to this committee in December. His job, he said was to make clear to church people where the church stood in these depressing times. He hoped fervently that some day the Bishop could devote all his time and energies to religion and not have the finances of the church to worry about. He mentioned the great value of the Triennial Report, the General Church Program and the Problems and Findings of the Discussion Groups particularly Rev. Mr. Johnson's "Interracial Contacts," and urged all to get copies of these books.

In closing this report the officers wish to mention the enthusiastic cooperation they have had from all the delegates and with their continued help expect even greater things for next year.

We were interested by Mr. Groton in the Harrison Ward of the Episcopal Hospital and its splendid work. Thrilled by Mrs. Hewson's report of the Junior Auxiliaries.

This fall we got behind the United Campaign and then made a serious survey of ourselves, our souls and bodies as it were, to endeavor to find out if we as Church people were meet-

ing this emergency. Was our Church Social Service meeting the situation, and as one by one the delegates told of their Church's work to help, we realized the slow but sure work to make Christ triumphant in these critical days.

Our gallant leader started our year with a survey of what had been accomplished, and with her great vision plotted our work for the coming year, and spoke feelingly of Mrs. Jump in her splendid work.

We took up our work among the colored in February and in March we had a very interesting and unusual meeting. Mrs. Martin divided us into four groups under Miss Cheston's and Mrs. Sims' leadership, to discuss religious education—which proved our vital interest and need.

And then, April Fellow Members, how can I report on the work for the Deaf and Blind—when we ourselves were blinded by tears—our beloved leader, Mrs. Martin has gone on. She led so valiantly. Let us march on with flags flying in the work of Christ.

ANNUAL REPORT—1931

Forty-two volunteers, representing fifteen Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the winter of 1930-1931.

*To the Mission Fields:*

24,767 articles of new clothing, household supplies, dispensary articles;

1,161 knitted articles;

11,239 surgical dressings;

4,019 yards of ribbon, stickerie, lingerie tape, tape, bobbin, elastic;  
958 yards of bias were purchased and many yards were cut by hand.

There have been 138 parishes and four Junior Woman's Auxiliaries helping the Supply Department this year. This is an increase of four Parishes, in spite of the fact that several Auxiliaries and Guilds have had to drop out,—we hope temporarily. The Junior Woman's Auxiliaries are struggling nobly to overcome the dislike for sewing, which seems so prevalent among the young, and we are trying to encourage them by giving them the least difficult garments, and by asking them to help us in other ways.

The greatest change which has taken place is the inauguration of the work for the unemployed. Of course, the making and distributing of these garments has nothing to do with the Supply Department, but the cutting and assembling is all done together with ours.

There were forty-two volunteers who helped us with the work. No one who has not worked on one of our committees can possibly realize how much hard and tiring manual labor, in addition to the difficult and accurate calculations, is necessary in preparing the garments for sewing. It is impossible to estimate exactly, but it has meant from three to four times as much work for all our helpers. We cannot thank them enough,—not only for the amount of work they have done, but for the marvelous good nature with which they have met the many extra demands which have been made upon them.

Before closing this report of last year's work, I want to say a word about the future, and to ask all the Auxiliaries to co-operate with us in learning more about the missions and schools who are allotted to our diocese, so that we may all take a more active and intelligent interest in our work.

## WOMAN'S AUXILIARY COMMITTEE FOR RELIEF OF UNEMPLOYMENT

By loving, generous gifts we have been enabled to continue from last year the work for unemployed women. The actual cost of this work the financial statement clearly shows. The money spent for materials purchased 53,575 yards of goods.

We have aided by actual financial help 195 women. In addition we have referred elsewhere, helped with advice, helped by sale of their own work and including those on the waiting list have been in touch with 272 women. For some months the visits have averaged thirty to thirty-five daily. In addition to these figures, which show in bare fact a splendid record, I should like to call attention to more intangible results. The keynote of the impress we have tried to place upon these women has been not pity, but to give them courage to face squarely what they had to face. A very definite sense of friendship has developed in many cases, and this has been possible only by the constant, faithful presence of a group of volunteers. We have been fighting nervousness just as truly as we have been fighting poverty.

Another group of volunteers, who have had no holiday all winter, have carefully (and you do not know how much that one word means just there) and painstakingly, prepared 28,404 garments for distribution to our women. Some 2,000 are ready for summer work, approximately 1,000 are completed and on the shelves, and the magnificent total of 25,125 garments have been distributed: To Church institutions in Philadelphia, 11,211; to Civic distributing centres, 10,140, and to Missions outside our own Diocese, 3,774.

Should the need for this work continue another season won't you give to it again your support, realizing thoroughly that the cost of this type of relief work is fully compensated by the high standard of help given? It incurs no loss of self-respect to the recipient and proves itself an ideal manner of helping those in our midst who are in need.

Surely the Church must lead here as elsewhere.

## REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY—1931

The writing of an Annual Report is a very searching thing for one is expected to sum up the work of the year. I always come to it with mixed feelings—satisfaction that the year's work has been so well done by the leaders and regret that I have not made better use of my opportunities. Both of these feelings are intensified at present as this report marks not only the end of this year's work, but also the end of my term of office as your Educational Secretary.

First I want to thank you for the wonderful privilege of being your Educational Secretary, it is a great job and has done far more for me than I have been able to do for it. Life for me is very different today because of these seven years of service and I shall always be profoundly grateful.

I wish I might thank personally all those who have so generously helped—the Leaders, who have never failed either me or you—the Parish Educational Secretaries and Presidents who have planned for Classes and Institutes—the Class Members who so beautifully cooperated—those who have been members of the Normal Classes and contributed so much to their interest and success, the committee responsible year after year for our comfort and pleasure on Educational Day and all others who have so generously given of their time. The list would be too long, but I want to say that the accomplishments of these seven years are yours, not mine, and thank you for it all.

What are the accomplishments of these seven years—it is hard to say—Education is a slow process and results are not easily tabulated, but Mission Study is on a very fine basis in Pennsylvania and each year I am impressed with the enthusiastic response made to it. There are some tangible results, however, those shown by our offerings—I refuse to believe that money is material—it is a sacrament, the outward and visible sign of our devotion to the Kingdom of our Lord, and in 1926 we gave \$1653.00 and as a result there stands in Haiti the Church of St. Thomas, Archahie. In 1927 we responded to Dean Lathrop's appeal for \$500.00 scholarships for the Divinity Students to be used for summer work in the Rural Districts by sending him \$1090.00, \$1000.00 to provide two full Scholarships and \$90.00 to go toward another one; we also gave \$252.00 to Archdeacon Bullitt to be used to send two of our own clergy to a Rural Conference and their wives to the Church Conference at Princeton; \$95.00 to a Japanese Student for a Welle-sley Scholarship. In 1928 we gave \$1154.13 to General Mis-

sions. In 1929, \$1625.00 went to Bishop Campbell for St. Mark's Hospital, Liberia. In 1931, \$1316.00 which was used to bring Fujimoto San to this country for a year's study at Temple University. In a recent letter Dr. John W. Wood says: "I hear wonderfully good things of the work that Fujimoto San is doing, and what her year in this country meant to her and to the kindergarten work at St. Agnes." In 1931, for projects of our Diocesan Pledge of Advance Work, \$1429.45 and \$142.25 for Miss Cornwall-Leigh's work in Japan. In 1932 we took as our objective \$1500.00 to be used for the support of the thirty children in the care of Mrs. Grafton Burke at Fort Yukon and that amount has been sent to Dr. Wood. I quote from Dr. Wood's letter; "That \$1500.00 comes just in the nick of time, for only a few days ago I had to write to Bishop Rowe's representative in Seattle not to place any more orders for supplies for Fort Yukon without conferring with us. One order that came in had used up, within a few dollars, the entire amount available. Now I can tell her that we can meet bills for food supplies for Indian children." All together, during these seven years our offerings have amounted to \$10256.83. We have studied together LATIN AMERICA, RURAL AMERICA, THE CHURCH AND HER MISSION, THE NEW AFRICA, THE JERUSALEM CONFERENCE, THE CHURCH AWAKE, and this year BUILDING A CHRISTIAN NATION, and what a good time we have had. It is such a vital subject and so close to our hearts that each and every class was responsive and enthusiastic. During the year there have been classes and institutes in 88 parishes on this subject and many more adult groups in other parishes studying varying subjects.

I have spoken of the past and the present—what of the future? Who your leader will be I cannot say, but I bespeak for her the same generous cooperation you have given me.

If I had been asked at any time these past seven years what subject I should like most to teach I should have chosen China and it is to be your study for 1933; that and the American Indian.

Now as your Educational Secretary I bid you farewell in the words of St. Paul to the Phillipians: "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, for your fellowship in the Gospel from the first day until now."

1928 - 1931

This is the year of the General Convention when the United Thank Offering is gathered up from every diocese and missionary district at home and abroad and presented at the great Triennial Presentation Service. This was held on Sept. 16, 1931, in the Municipal Auditorium in Denver, Colorado, when three thousand women or more took part in the service.

In spite of financial loss to many, our diocese presented \$95,070.05 the largest offering we have ever made, representing the gifts and prayers of many hundreds of women from about two hundred parishes, missions and church organizations.

The election of officers this spring brings to an end my term of office as Diocesan Treasurer which has been such a great pleasure and privilege to me, but I feel sure, with the same eagerness to help your new treasurer, Mrs. John Van Pelt, the Thank Offering will continue to be more and more the expression of loving, grateful hearts.

## ANNUAL REPORT

### THE LEAGUE FOR THE ISOLATED

We feel that this work has progressed during the past year, and that the Church in our Diocese is beginning to appreciate more and more its value. It has not by any means realized the ideal that we aim to reach. That will depend upon the co-operation—spiritual, mental and material, of the Bishop, Clergy, and Laity, men and women. Through the faithful efforts of its chairmen in the Convocations it is bringing cheer and a new sense of church fellowship to many in various walks of life, and in varying degrees of isolation.

Bishop Taitt brought joy by his Christmas letter, to which there were many appreciative replies; one woman framed it.

I wish there was space to tell of many incidents in connection with the work, due to the intimate contact of personal visits: a young girl who was helped to get an artificial leg, and so enabled to get to church; books in Braille for a blind man to read to his 100-year-old grandmother; children in Correspondence Church Schools; mothers with big families helped in church training for their children, and above all, the appreciative response to the call for service in prayer for the work and workers of the church, and many facts too intimate to tell. These, with the various personal contacts in home and hospital, go towards the making of scattered persons in town and country, one family, united in One Lord, One Faith, One Baptism, One God and Father of us all.

We have been greatly helped by many individual visitors in some of the parishes, and we hope for increased interest and co-operation from the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Guild of St. Barnabas for Nurses, The Girls' Friendly Society, and the Church Mission of Help.

We have a small lending library in the Department of Religious Education at the Church House, 202 South Nineteenth Street, on the third floor, and the one at the Church Missions House, New York, will send a list of books on request, with materials in Braille, and church correspondence teaching—all free, postage included.

The Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary has granted us \$100.00 a year for expenses, which, with the help of a few associate members, enables us to meet our expenses in postage and the printing of special prayers and the purchase

of yearly Bible Readings, which are greatly valued. There have been many names added to our list, but many who have been taken from it by death. These we shall remember at the Corporate Communion before our next meeting in October.

The work for 1931 has been well done and, in some respects, shows a big increase over the previous year, especially in the report of the number of bound volumes, which are always much needed. We have been enabled, therefor, to fill out and start up many libraries for the use of the clergy and the people in quite a number of small, isolated towns.

Places from which requests have come to us are as follows:

The Armagh Township School District Library at Milroy, Mifflin County, Pennsylvania, situated in quite an isolated place at the foot of the Allegheny Mountains. Over seven hundred books were sent there.

The Church Periodical Memorial Library at East Birmingham, Alabama.

The Church Periodical Club Library at Chester, West Virginia.

These three will be added to from time to time.

Books in small lots were sent off to the Brighton Mission in Tennessee, to the Seamen's Church Institute both in Philadelphia and Marcus Hook, Pennsylvania and to many of the clergymen in the Mission Fields for their own use.

St. Mark's Branch, Philadelphia has done a great work in sending out such quantities of religious leaflets and papers for

educational purposes to those in isolated places. The clergy have been much encouraged.

The regular magazines still hold their own, three hundred fifty of them being in the form of new subscriptions to our clergy and missionaries. Numerous ones were also sent in bulk to institutions of which the number has greatly increased.

Many Christmas greeting cards were also sent to the shut-ins and isolated.

We are still educating the children attending the Mission School of St. Andrew's-on-the-Mountain, Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. There are about seventy-three children so far, but we could take others if we had more funds. I wish more people could assist us in the purchasing of the books required for their work. When you think of the conditions down there, of the ignorance and squalor, it seems the only humane thing to do to try and bring up the children to a better outlook. If every branch could take one little child for at least five years and pay in a pledge for the books to us yearly, we really could make a good thing of it. The results, so far, from those who are interested, have been most encouraging. The children are showing interest in their school and some have already been promoted.

At the meeting of the Church Periodical Club in Denver during the General Convention, a resolution was passed that for the next three years everyone should pay the pledges for the Libraries in the East. St. Paul's University, Tokyo, was chosen for one, as several years ago a large library was donated there in which the Diocese of Pennsylvania took a large part. We have now started our pledge for another three years and it was voted that we make it \$3.00 per parish, the amount received to be all used for the purchase of books. We are hoping to make this pledge something to remember at the next General Convention in Atlantic City in 1934.

After the way in which my co-workers have kept up this work, notwithstanding the great depression, one cannot help but feel a real encouragement for the coming year.
