ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

As your Diocesan President I want to thank each and every member of the Woman's Auxiliary for their co-operation during the past year. It was a good year for the Auxiliary, and the credit for that belongs to you and not to me.

I want to report that I have visited twenty-five Parishes, I represent you on the Board of the Church Training and Deaconess School, the Board of the Interdenominational Union, the Field Department of the Diocesan Executive Council, the Department of Religious Education, and the Diocesan Council of the Girls' Friendly Society.

In co-operation with the Interdenominational Union and with your help we arranged for the meetings held at Holy Trinity, St. Paul's, Overbrook, and St. Luke's, Germantown, at which Bishop Roots and Dr. Wu spoke. Despite the worst weather of the Winter, the meetings were well attended.

At the request of the Field Department, the women of the Diocese had a luncheon on October 11 at the Penn Athletic Club, where 387 met to hear the message of the National Council brought to us by Bishop Edward M. Cross, of Spokane, and the Rev. Charles Collett, of the National Council.

A year ago I told you of some appointments, Mrs. Lewis G. Morris as Devotional Chairman, Mrs. William Jefferys as Chairman for Volunteer Service, whose reports are given elsewhere in this book. I also spoke of the Field Department; it is not yet functioning as I hope it will. The Committee can do little unless you invite them to your Parish and go to them for help. Where the Convocation is using this help it is bearing fruit, as in Chester Convocation, where four new Auxiliaries have been formed.

I feel it is my duty to turn your thoughts from achievement to opportunities lest we be tempted to feel content, for I feel you and I have unparalleled opportunities. The time is past to be content with one branch of the Auxiliary in a parish. We should survey our parishes and plan for new groups. No longer should the women of leisure belong to the Woman's Auxiliary and the less fortunate to the Mothers' Meeting or some allied organization. Women of our parishes of all ages and all stations should have an opportunity to share in the whole work of the whole Church, and only the Woman's Auxiliary gives them that opportunity.

I believe also that we should assume with our rector's consent the responsibility of the missionary program for the whole Parish. Men, of course, cannot and will not come to our meetings or share in our ordinary activities, but we should look beyond the monthly or weekly meeting, see the needs of the Parish and plan to meet them.

It has been suggested that this report tell about the Missions helped by our Auxiliary. South Dakota, being Bishop Hare's missionary district, has always been of great interest to Philadelphians. Bishop Burleson continued his work, and Bishop Roberts has succeeded Bishop Burleson. Under him are 9 white clergy, 27 native clergy and about 60 native catechists and helpers. Our church has 4 Church Schools; there are also 3 reservation and 3 non-reservation Government schools. There are over 90 chapels and missions on the reservations, most of which are in charge of active deacons or helpers.

The Oneida Mission has 1000 baptized members, with large congregations every Sunday. The Mission is in splendid spiritual condition, but the Oneidas are desperately poor these days.

The Good Shepherd Mission to the Navajos includes evangelistic work, district nursing and orphanage.

Last year's "specials" explain themselves.

This year the scholarship in Alaska is continued and the maintenance of car for nurse at Ethete. The Government pays this nurse's salary; a proof of approval. She lives at the school and we send \$300 to help her motor over terrible "gumbo" roads as she travels through the reservation doing untold good.

Our meetings have been well attended. We had speakers at each meeting, and to them we express our thanks. The speakers from the field were Bishop Rowe, Bishop Jenkins, Bishop Roberts and Dr. B. T. Tyler. Mr. Charles J. Rhoads, our recent Indian Commissioner; Mr. Sniffen, and Mr. Lindley, of the Indian Rights Association, gave us very clear and wide information regarding our Government's present policy to the Indians. Dr. Leicester C. Lewis, Rev. W. T. Lander and Rev. Malcolm Peabody kindly gave us devotional and inspirational addresses.

My own gratitude is to Mrs. Cheston for planning and conducting the meetings during my prolonged absence.

The encouraging features of the year were:

First—The increased interest of the delegates, which was shown by the fact that in many Parishes where it was impossible to raise as much money as before, they tried in various ways to raise it themselves.

Second—Very well attended meetings.

Third—Most interesting speakers.

Fourth—Ten new Parishes were represented.

Fifth—Six new Parishes contributed.

The total amounts contributed were less, but the domestic work being now confined to white work within the United States, the field is so enormously reduced that perhaps we should not expect so much; however, the increased needs and the distressing conditions existing among our people and clergy make us feel that we must make every effort to reach our previous goal.

We had an extra meeting in June to try to add a little to our total for this year; each delegate was asked to borrow .50 from herself or from the Committee, try to increase it in any way she could and return it at this meeting. It was very encouraging, as many did this and brought in about \$80.00, and all offered to continue to try during the Summer. We are thus acting the Parable of the Talents.

Our speakers were all from the Missionary Districts within the United States and we concentrated the latter part of the year on the Southern mountains.

We had election of officers in May. Mrs. J. Emmot Caldwell and Mrs. H. P. Erdman were elected as vice-chairmen to fill Mrs. Ingersoll's and Mrs. Morris' places, whose terms had expired. We shall miss them sadly. Miss Marjorie Robertson was elected as Registrar.

Bishop Beecher says Domestic Missions are, "To save the Flower of our Manhood and Womanhood."

The message we bring you today is "*Never* be discouraged about your ability to meet your quota pledges to the National Council." When we met in September we still needed to collect \$1,991 before the books closed in January and we took as our text for the year "Lead us, Thine is the power," and God honored that prayer far beyond our merits, so that He enabled us to fulfil our obligations of \$5,000.00 for quota objects.

Our Committee pays the entire salary of Dr. Margaret C. Richey at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, and half of the salary of Rev. Martin Firth, who went to Southern Brazil, July, 1933.

Both of these children of our Committee have spoken at our meetings within the year and, knowing them personally, adds greatly to our interest in their work and makes us even more willing and anxious to support them financially and with our intercessions.

The spirit of our delegates through this hard year has been a great joy to the Chairman.

Swarthmore, Pa.

Through a very bad season for all social, service and church work, the Committee on Colored Missions has managed to carry through the program planned for it. Starting with the October meeting, 1933, eight regular sessions have been held and speakers obtained. Among these latter were: Mr. Hunt, of the Fort Valley School, who has since been called by President Roosevelt to head the Negro Farm Loan Board; Mr. Turner, the business manager of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., who renewed enthusiasm for that ever-interesting school; Rev. Cyril Bentley, of the American Church Institute for Negroes, brought, as always, fresh inspiration for the main part of the work of this committee; Archdeacon Baskerville, the following month, rounded out the picture with views of the work being done in the most remote backwoods parishes; the Rev. Mr. Harris, of St. Luke and Epiphany, gave a devotional address in Lent; Mrs. Hunt, the wife of the President, of Fort Valley School, was the speaker in April; Miss Elsie Douglas and the Rev. Percy Stockman, in May, gave graphic accounts, respectively, of the G udet School in New Orleans, which she had visited, and a mission at Twenty-third and Cumberland Streets, Philadelphia, in which Mr. Stockman is very much interested.

Our deficit for 1933, which amounted to \$251.00, at the close of December, was being steadily reduced, and at an extra meeting and tea in June, held at the house of the Chairman, it was completely wiped out. Rev. Mr. Miller, of the Bishop Payne Divinity School, was there to see it accomplished, and gave a thoroughly refreshing talk about his work there.

The optimism with which this past year was started has been amply justified, and the other officers join with me in giving thanks for the co-operation and enthusiasm of the delegates.

Under Mrs. Scott, the Diocesan Committee has held its eight regular meetings, and enjoyed also a beautiful day at the Church Farm School, where it maintains a scholarship.

The two Hospital Committees, one at the Philadelphia General Hospital under Mrs. Frederick Fox, the other at the Episcopal Hospital under Mrs. John E. Hill, have done splendid work. Both function under the name of the Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service.

Work among the foreign-born was presented by Miss Deane with the dramatic story of the needs of the Italians; by Miss Ormsby with her difficult work with the Jews; by Deaconess Young with the Rumanians; and by the Rev. Edward Bacjewski with the Poles.

Social Service work at the Seaman's Church Institute, and at the educational centres: Drexel, Temple and the University of Pennsylvania was described; and the colored church, St. Barnabas, Germantown, was helped.

No meeting was complete without a word or two from Miss Dickson about the unemployed women, and from Mrs. Paul about second-hand clothing and the Supply Department. Encouragement and help were given as far as possible.

Through Mrs. Frederick Fox, our Committee gave great help in the luncheon on Monday of the Educational Week for the Blind.

Mrs. George has been a splendid treasurer. Our income did not come up to that of previous years. The books were audited and found correct, and she was bonded as requested by the Diocese. The resignation of Mrs. Reed as secretary after nine years of faithful service, and also that of Mrs. Scott, is a great loss.

If it were not for the delegates there would be nothing to report. They constitute the Committee, and, by means of their splendid attendance, present the appeals to their parish auxiliaries, thereby enabling the work of our Diocesan Committee to continue.

Layettes—Distributed 30 complete layettes; many partial ones; 150 garments to head nurse. Every baby followed up and visited. Most of the babies have been baptized through solicitation of Committee; two adults confirmed; other children placed in Church Schools.

Helped three families with rent, gas, electric bills; gave clothing, coal, food to many families; also cribs, baby coaches, furniture. Paid carfare of mother and three children to California.

T. B. Cottage—Entertainment by young people of Covenant; provided money for two parties; gave 14 plants at Easter in memory of Father Allen; donated jig-saw puzzles, magazines, clothing.

Picnic—Annual, July 12, 1933; 600 patients taken to Botanical Gardens (U. of P.), and served with a bountiful supper.

Parties—Hundreds of patients treated in various wards. Tobacco furnished weekly in men's nervous, also fruit and jig-saw puzzles.

Christmas Work—Distributed well-filled utility bags, baby gifts, tubes of shaving cream, many personal gifts, Christmas baskets. The Emerson Club entertained bountifully 25 children.

Miscellaneous—Established two crippled men patients in business (3351½ Market Street). Furnished all clothing for adopted foundling; rent paid for patients leaving hospital.

EPISCOPAL HOSPITAL UNIT

The Elizabeth Price Martin League for service, Episcopal Hospital Unit, is now organized and helping in the many departments of the hospital.

The Library of over a thousand volumes is proving of great value to the patients.

More than fifteen volunteers help in the Occupational Therapy Department and others teach in the Children's and Orthopaedic Wards.

The Motor Corps provides the patients with transportation to the Clinics, Out-Patient Department and Convalescent Homes.

Our Social Service Committee visits in the hospital and distributes layettes and clothes to those in need.

This Unit has paid the salary of a part-time worker in the Occupational Therapy and has installed a case to display the finished products of this department.

The Junior Woman's Auxilaries of St. Asaph's, Bala, and the Chapel of the Mediator have provided supper meetings and entertainments which have delighted the patients in Harrison Home.

Our first annual May Fete was given May 23, 1934. Many members of the Diocese visited the hospital for the first time and were taken through the buildings. Much enthusiasm and interest were displayed and we are confident that the hospital will benefit from the contact.

VOLUNTEER BUREAU

The Volunteer Bureau of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in 1932, to enlist and train volunteers for our church institutions.

Institutions served were: The Sheltering Arms, St. Martha's House, Church Training School, City Mission, Episcopal Hospital and Harrison Home.

Types of service rendered included: Musical director, teachers, librarians, friendly visitors, clerical workers, occupational therapy assistants and Motor Corps.

The Occupational Therapy Department of our Episcopal Hospital conducts a work shop for the patients of Harrison Home, and supervises work done in the hospital wards.

Miss Brown, the Director, has the art of providing interesting work for the volunteer and making her feel her services are worthwhile. The library has increased from 80 to 1,440 volumes and 5,000 magazines. Its remarkable success is due to the librarian, who is the ideal volunteer, having dependableness, humor, consecration and the ability to work with people.

The Motor Corps volunteers deserve praise, because such service is apt to seem monotonous, uninteresting and not of much account. On the contrary, it is indispensable to efficient Social Service work.

One volunteer remarked, "This work has broadened my own social point of view and human understanding."

That in itself would seem sufficient reason for continuing the Bureau.

The Executive Board of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania has held eight meetings during the Winter of 1933-1934 at the Church House. Social service work, and work of the Standing Committees and parish branches were reported and discussed at each meeting. Guest speakers were: Mrs. Hill, Mrs. Charles Biddle, Miss Sallie Deane, Mrs. Francis Packard and Miss Hester Seeley. From eighteen parish branches, in October, we have grown to twenty-eight in May, and hope for still more corporate members next year. Miss Sallie Deane (Chairman of Junior Work in the Third Province), spent two weeks here in February as the guest of the Diocese; she spoke at twelve mass meetings in the different Convocations, and we feel that it is due to her eloquence and inspiration that our membership has grown so satisfactorily. During the past year our parish branches have done Social Service work at the Episcopal Hospital, St. Martha's House, St. Francis of Assisi Mission, St. John's House, St. Michael and All Angels' Home and the Home for the Indigent, and have sent Christmas gifts to thirty-three children in the care of the Juvenile Court, one hundred and seven Christmas gifts to the inmates of the Home for the Indigent, twenty-five dollars to Bishop Abbott to furnish a library in one of his mountain schools in Kentucky, as well as countless gifts of money and articles in each parish and community. Garments made by parish branches were sent in to the Supply Bureau, magazines and books were collected for the Church Periodical Club and the Episcopal Hospital Library. Our Motor Corps gave splendid service during the Catholic Congress, Christmas week, the Educational Week for the Blind, and the May Fete at the Episcopal Hospital, as well as their generous assistance whenever required. Our Dramatics Committee, under Miss Miriam Cairns, presented two beautifully acted plays, a comedy which was given at the Churchwomen's Club and at many diocesan institutions, and a melodrama which was performed in all six Convocations for the benefit of the Unemployment Committee. We feel that the Junior Woman's Auxiliary has grown tremendously in background and strength as well as in mere numbers in this past year. The presentation of a Youth Award ("for outstanding work among young people"), by the Young People's Fellowship to our Chairman, Mrs. Hewson, seems a fitting tribute to one who helped to start our Junior Auxiliary and to make it "an intelligent, working force for the establishment of the Kingdom of God."

Forty-four volunteers, representing twelve Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the Winter of 1932-1933.

To the Mission Fields:

26,877 articles of new clothing, household supplies, dispensary articles;
1,073 knitted articles;
8,486 surgical dressings;

At a value of..... \$13,289.00

To Diocesan Institutions:

2,044 articles of new clothing and household supplies;
440 knitted articles;

This work required:

105 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern;
12,609 yards of material were used;
7,043 cut garments were assembled;
8,200 directions for making garments were typed;
12,032 notions were enclosed in the assembled garments;
2,317 yards of ribbon, lingerie tape, tape, bobbin, elastic;
498 yards of bias were purchased and 1,144 yards were cut by hand.

The Supply Department has had a splendid winter in many ways. In spite of the fact that ten Auxiliaries who usually sew, refused to take sewing for various reasons, many members took garments individually, and many auxiliaries did extra work.

For a time we were afraid that we should not be able to purchase all the readymade articles we had promised, but so many auxiliaries raised extra money, and in addition Miss Dickson's women made 646 garments, which enabled our Diocese to complete its allotment.

The knitting is better than ever, and you have turned in about 1500 garments. The personal boxes were all taken in good season.

The second hand clothing did not come in so well, for obvious reasons. Auxiliaries feel the clothes are needed at home, and they do not want to pay postage to send them away. But please remember, almost all our missions rely on their clothing bureaus, not only for clothing their people, but as a very helpful contact, and as a source of income.

I hope that everyone who has helped make this season a success will accept the very grateful thanks of the Supply Department.

I cannot close without repeating some of the statements which I have made for the past two years. It is of vital necessity to the Supply Department that our auxiliaries should make a real effort to learn about the missions for whom they work, and it is equally necessary for many women to have just such tangible work as that which our Department supplies.

Therefore, I hope that each parish will resolve to do the work next year with their minds, as well as with their fingers.

UNITED THANK OFFERING

The year 1933 is the middle year of this Triennium. The middle year of each Triennium is always the weakest for the United Thank Offering. The first year is good because every one is remembering the thrill of the last great Presentation Service, and the third year is better still because every one is really getting to work for the next Presentation Service. The second year, therefore, is always the lean year, and at the end of this one we find ourselves almost \$20,000 behind Mrs. Ingersoll's figures of this time three years ago.

The Spring Offering amounted \$10,639.98, and the Fall Offering to \$8,171.87, a total for the year of \$18,811.85. This gives us a total for the Triennium so far of \$40,171.87.

Twenty thousand dollars is a large amount to make up, but I *know* that the women of Pennsylvania are not going to relinquish the high place that they have always maintained among all the Dioceses of the Church in the United Thank Offering.

We each of us have so much to be thankful for that *every* woman in *every* Parish must want a way of expressing her gratitude to God for His many blessings, and the way is to take a Blue Box and use it, and find for yourself the joy that comes from the use of it. The work that we women are doing out in the Mission Field through the use of our Blue Boxes and our daily giving of thanks, has become such a tremendously vital factor in the life of the Church that it must go on. We cannot let it go back. It is up to us.

This Committee has given employment to 122 women, to whom the certainty of a regular income, even though small, has relieved mental strain. During the season some have found work; these have been dropped and immediately replaced by others from the waiting list, which because of new applicants has remained steadily at 100. We have not been able to adequately care for all the Churchwomen who have applied to us.

The Winter has brought an increase in the number of positions offered to the Committee to fill. This has noticeably increased the detail work in the office. Many good workers are acceptably filling positions which were offered, those unfilled being invariably housework. In this whole proposition of employment service something of permanent value to the Diocese might be evolved.

To provide work we have used 28,690 yards of material. We have cut 13,649 regular and 867 special garments. (These figures do not include Red Cross garments reported elsewhere). This is made possible by loving and generous gifts, and the service of faithful, willing volunteer committees. They have all given their best in time and thought and have achieved a perfection of detail only loving care could produce.

Details such as these do not emphasize the very important phase of the mental and spiritual benefit to the women employed. Many and various ways of aiding or encouraging have come to hand and many small services have strengthened our bond with our sewers. Two gatherings have been held for our women workers, one at Christmas and one in Lent.

We have again filled to capacity the Supply Department and enjoyed the courtesy of the use of all its equipment.

We are grateful to all our faithful contributors and regret space does not permit us to acknowledge their gifts here. We are especially grateful to Mrs. Breed for her effort in our behalf and to the Dramatic Committee of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary for the expenditure of their strength and leisure for many weeks.

CHURCH LEAGUE FOR THE ISOLATED

The League for Work Among the Isolated was organized in 1929 by Mrs. Woodward. Mrs. Biddle was made Chairman and has been the leader and moving spirit ever since then. It was planned as a League of Intercessors, to help the many members of the Church who are unable to attend church services; not always because of illness or other disability, as it includes as well mothers with small children or household cares, and families far in the country without a car to take them to church.

Rectors in the different convocations were asked to co-operate by giving names of any such persons that they knew, and the Chairman in each section keeps lists of these, and sees that they receive letters, Christmas and Easter cards, and books are loaned, notices of special days of prayer and copies of the *Friendly Visitor*. And they are always reminded that through their prayer life they are a wonderful help to the Church. We know that many of our members appreciate these ministrations, even though there *are* some we seldom hear from. Most of all, they rejoice in having us visit them. Many real friendships have been made through this contact, and I wish you could all read some of the letters received.

There are 40 names on our Working Committee, and 600 names on the list of those we prefer to call our intercessors, rather than isolated folk.

One instance of co-operation; and there could be many more. A woman in a home for old couples gave one of our visitors a penny for missions, saying she wished it was more, and hoped it would grow. Our Committee contributed a penny each and then invested it, and now it is growing, just at present in the shape of matchboxes on sale in the Supply Shop, and we call the penny our talent that was *not* buried.
