"Hope" was Rev. Richard T. Lyford's message to us in September, and that spirit carried us through our season's work.

Sidelights in the mission field were given to us by visitors to Indian Missions. In October, Mrs. Habersham showed us moving pictures of our missions in the Southwest, the buildings, the Navajo hogans, and the missionaries who minister to souls and bodies. In November, Mrs. Harry Baker told us of her visit to the Alaskan missions, of the almost deserted towns where once we had thriving missions for gold seekers, of other places where our church is still active for natives and whites. Most of all, Mrs. Baker told us of Fort Yukon and of Dr. and Mrs. Burke's hospital there, which fills so great a need in all that region.

Mrs. Baker's talk gave a fine background for Wyatt Brown, Jr.'s., talk and pictures on December 26. Mr. Brown, a student at Sewanee, spent a Winter working with Dr. Burke at the Hudson Stuck Hospital. His moving pictures of church, mission buildings, and hospital, of hunting caribou for the Winter's meat supply for the mission, and of the huge stacks of felled trees needed for the Winter's fuel, gave a splendid idea of the life and work of these brave missionaries.

In January Mr. Spencer Ervin, our Diocesan Secretary, explained to us how absolutely necessary it is for us all to see that our parishes give their full proportion to missions.

In February Sister Horner, of the Church Army, was with us. She used to be the worker we support in Crow Creek, South Dakota. She told of the work there now being carried on by Sister Gunton, a young woman, and of her own present work in Pine Ridge, a wilder and more desolate region. These Church Army workers are doing valiant service in trying situations.

In March, Mrs. Robert Frazier, a former missionary in South Dakota, explained to us some of the intricacies of the new governmental policies. If it is difficult for us to grasp the situation, what can it be to the simple-minded Indian. The present policy in Washington is to put the Indian back onto the reservation with the lands again in common. Like all communistic ideas, this expects more unselfish virtue that has been shown by human beings, except by the earliest members of the Christian Church. Most unfortunately Mr. Collier, the Indian Commissioner, is not interested in the Indians being taught Christianity, and is making it difficult to give religious instruction to the Indian. Knowing the excellent administration of Mr. Rhoads and Mr. Scattergood, we grieve over the backward step of the present administration of Indian affairs.

The meetings of the Foreign Committee have been full of interest. It is certainly an inspiration to see the spirit and courage of those who have come to us from the mission fields. Do we in America realize what it means to those who have renounced so much that we hold dear in this life, to be a foreign missionary in these days? To receive repeated cuts in an already meagre salary, to forego regular furloughs in many cases, to curtail and close work, and what must be hardest of all, to realize that the Church at home is failing the Church in the field. Does the economic distress of the past few years really account in full for the much-reduced contributions to the Church? Here are some of those who have spoken to us since last September:

Miss Kawai, a Japanese Christian, a Presbyterian, with many friends among our missionaries in Japan, commended highly our institutions in her country. She considers her life a miracle. Though born in a very humble home, through the Church's influence in her life, she has established a school for girls which has 160 pupils and 25 teachers.

Mrs. Reifsnyder, charming and very capable, whose three children must remain in America while she and Bishop Reifsnyder represent us in Tokyo, is doing splendid work among the boys at St. Paul's College. Indeed, to listen to all the activities she is responsible for, one wonders how she is able to accomplish what she does.

Mrs. Huntington, the wife of our Bishop of Anking, China, told us especially of her work for the rickshaw coolies. She has done a great work for these men, establishing and maintaining a shelter for them with recreational, educational and evangelical activities.

Bishop Nichols addressed the Committee, too. He took us about his diocese in Kyoto, telling us particularly about Miss Skiles and her kindergartens, and of St. Agnes' School, which now has an enrollment of 600 pupils.

Mr. Ervin, of our own diocese, came to tell us something of the financial problems of the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

Rev. Thomas Harris made a devotional address at the April meeting, which occurred in Holy Week, and his meditations were very helpful.

In May the Committee met at the home of Mrs. Irvin King at Gwynedd Valley, when Miss Regina Lustgarten, of China, and Miss Ellen Jarvis, from the Philippines, were our speakers.

The Committee was able to meet its pledges for 1934 with the help of the interest from several legacy funds, and by its efforts through the Summer to raise a mile of pennies, which realized over \$875.00.

It was with the greatest regret that we were forced to accept in April the withdrawal of Mrs. Haines as chairman of the Committee, who led us

faithfully and splendidly for two terms of three years each. According to the Woman's Auxiliary By-Laws she could not be re-elected. Her wise counsel and fine spirit, however, will not be lost to us; she has consented to be a vice-chairman. We welcome two new officers at the same time, Mrs. Malcolm E. Peabody, as Recording Secretary, and Mrs. J. Harold Austin, as Registrar. Mrs. Dean Parker, formerly Registrar, becomes Corresponding Secretary.

The delegates have been very faithful in their attendance and in difficult days have interested their parishes to stand back of the work of the Committee to their utmost. Without the work of the delegates the Foreign Committee, of course, would not exist. We thank them all.

The Committee on Colored Missions started in October, 1934, when Mr. Hunt, President of Fort Valley School, was the speaker. He brought a very comprehensive picture of negro work through this school, and of the activities he supervises, extending credit to negro land owners. Rev. Charles A. Levy, who conducts a mission at Twentieth and Susquehanna Avenue, spoke at the November meeting and gave us an opportunity of hearing something of Diocesan enterprises. Miss Artemisia Bowdin, of St. Philip's School, San Antonio, Texas, brought an appealing message in December from that struggling school. In January, Rev. Wallace Conkling explained the Emergency and Challenge Budget adopted by the National Council. The February meeting was held jointly with the All-Day Missionary Meeting at Holy Trinity Church. Addresses were given by Rev. Robert Patton, head of the American Church Institute for Negroes, and Mr. Wallace Battle, one of his able assistants. A choir from the Institute sang spirituals. Dr. John Mockridge gave a beautiful devotional address at the March meeting in Lent, which renewed our vision of the higher things we are pledged to support. Rev. Cyril Bentley spoke in April; he stresses especially the pitiable state of most of the buildings at Hoffman-St. Mary's, at Mason, Tenn. The picture was brightened by the encouraging statement that the Diocese of Tennessee has promised \$5,000.00 a year for five years. Louisiana seems equally enthusiastic about Gaudet School in New Orleans, and Virginia has pledged \$6,500.00 toward the support of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Va., despite the fact that the State itself is behind with its own budget. Mr. J. E. Blanton, head of the Voorhees School, in Denmark, S. C., spoke in May and made the school live before our eyes as he recalled each incident in a typical school day and rounded out the picture with the plans for the new chapel and the work to be done by the young men who stay at the school this Summer.

The Diocesan Committee has held its usual monthly meetings this year and its Spring outing at the May Fete at the Episcopal Hospital. The speakers at our meetings were: October, Rev. Percy Stockman, Dean of North Philadelphia Convocation, and Mr. William Hunt, principal of Fort Valley School on Colored Missions and Schools; November, Dean Ethel Springer, of the Church Training School; December, three speakers on Christmas work: Mrs. Winfield Scott in behalf of the 1000 children of fifteen missions of North Philadelphia; Deaconess Young in behalf of 200 children in St. John's House Sunday School, and Miss Eleanor Deane in behalf of 500 Italian children in this Diocese; January, Mr. Spencer Irvin, Vice-Chancellor to the Executive Council of this Diocese, on Church finances and the budget; in February, in place of our regular meeting, we joined the women of the Diocese at Missionary Day in Holy Trinity Church, hearing interesting speeches by Rev. Spence Burton, Dr. Francis Wei and Senator Pepper; March, Miss Irene Syle brought the choir from All Souls' Church for the Deaf to interpret their hymns for us, and Rev. Howard Weir (rector of Holy Trinity Church), gave us a Lenten talk; April, Miss Sarah Lowrie on "The Children of the City," May, Mrs. Hill spoke on the Woman's Auxiliary. Each month we had reports from the Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, the Unemployment Committee and the Supply Department, as well as special reports on Christmas work, Episcopal Day at the Week for the Blind, and news of Frederick Webb, for whose scholarship at the Church Farm School we are responsible. The Treasurer reported that, in spite of hard times, the delegates had given \$316.00 more to the Quota in 1934 than they had in 1933. We are most grateful to Miss Elsie Douglas for her splendid monthly NEWS-LETTERS, and to Mrs. R. C. Loving for playing the accompaniments to the hymns with which our meetings have been opened. All of the delegates and officers join-in thanks to our retiring Chairman, and our Treasurer (for six years) for their inspiring leadership and help and in regrets that they are leaving us; we owe to them the fact that this has been a year of helpful achievement for the Diocesan Committee.

During the past year forty volunteers have been active, visiting the various wards practically every week, distributing tobacco, cigarettes, jigsaw puzzles, crochet cotton and other gifts. Seven special parties were given; three in the Men's Nervous Wards, when 350 men were served coffee, sandwiches and fruit, and four in the Women's and T. B. Wards, when refreshments were ice cream and cake.

Thirty-one layettes have been distributed; 25 of these were given to our Unit in memory of Mrs. J. Willis Martin.

Other services rendered include: Five Christmas baskets; Christmas card to each baby; candy and toys to four families; three Thanksgiving baskets; clothing, furniture and payment of rent for one family; four cribs and three baby coaches given away; burial fees paid; convalescent care, glasses and medicinal supplies provided; one party given at Harrison Home.

The "follow-up" work of this Committee deserves special mention. Patients are visited after they return to their homes, and in many cases are linked with a nearby parish for the first time, resulting in whole families becoming Church members.

Episcopal Hospital Unit

The Women's Committee has continued to meet monthly at the hospital. Several new members have been added, including representatives from the Bishop's Committee, the Social Service Department, and the Volunteers. Two members make a tour of the hospital each month with the Superintendent and report to the Committee; thus close touch with the entire work of the hospital is maintained.

The Unit pays the salary for a part-time assistant in the Occupational Therapy Department. A showcase has been placed in the main entrance hall, in which the finished articles of this department are displayed. Some of our members assisted at the Episcopal Hospital Booth at the Emergency Aid Bazaar.

A "Corner Store" has been installed in one of the main corridors, where ice cream, candy, magazines and other articles are on sale. This shop is supplying a definite place in the life of the hospital and we expect it to develop as new needs are discovered.

The Library has begun its third year of service and has grown from 80 to 1800 books, thanks to the C. P. C. and many Parish Groups and individuals. An average of 200 magazines are distributed weekly. A trained librarian (volunteer) has been instructing other volunteers in the art of book-mending.

Two members of the Committee have entertained the guests at Harrison Home with several supper parties. The Committee has also assisted the Social Service Department with special cases.

The first Annual May Fete Day was held this year and the occasion afforded the opportunity for many people in the Diocese to visit the hospital for the first time.

The Executive Board of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania has held eight meetings during the Winter of 1934-1935 at the Church House. At each meeting Social Service work and work of the Standing Committees were reported and discussed.

Guest speakers were: Mrs. Hill, Mr. and Mrs. Welbourne, Miss Bowdin, Sister Emilie, Mrs. Cross, Mrs. Shipley Thomas, Miss Selzer and Miss Sims.

During the year the parish branches have collected books and magazines for the Church Periodical Club as well as for various institutions and individuals. Several second-hand boxes have been sent to missions. Garments have been made by parish branches and sent to the Supply Bureau. Social Service work has been done in the various Diocesan institutions, and at Christmas gifts were sent to children in the care of the Juvenile Court, and to the inmates of the Home for the Indigent. Most of the groups also did work in their own parishes and communities. Our Motor Corps, under Mrs. Budd, is continuing to give splendid service whenever they are called upon. Our Dramatic Committee, under Miss Miriam Cairns, has been working very hard, and presented a group of one-act plays at several of the churches, and has also visited many Diocesan institutions.

Mrs. Hill made the suggestion that each Junior Auxiliary group give some money-making project during the year for the Unemployment Committee, which quite a few of them carried out.

Over fifteen hundred dollars has been given by the parish branches, directly, to various Diocesan Institutions, Missions, United Thank Offering, the Unemployment Committee, etc.

Five new branches have been added to our group during the past year, making a total of thirty-two Junior Branches in the Diocese. Each year we have grown, and it is our greatest hope that we continue to do so in the future.

Thirty-six volunteers, representing nine Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department during the Winter 1933-1934.

To the Mission Fields:

21,605 articles of new clothing, household supplies, dispensary articles;
849 knitted articles;
4,363 surgical dressings;
At a value of \$13,043.42

To Diocesan Institutions:

2,363 articles of new clothing and household supplies;
572 knitted articles;
At a value of 2,258.35

This work required:

90 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern;
15,096 yards of material were used;
7,000 cut garments were assembled;
7,400 directions for making garments were typed;
18,723 notions were enclosed in the assembled garments;
3,256 yards of ribbon, lingerie tape, bobbin, elastic;
2,044 yards of bias were purchased and 1,703 yards were cut by hand.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania during the year 1934, through your Supply Department, filled the requisitions of two hospitals, three schools and five missions. We also sent nineteen personal boxes and twenty Christmas gifts to missionaries.

Our success depends entirely upon those who work for us at the Church House and the Parish Auxiliaries. Without their help those of us in the office can accomplish nothing, and we want you all to know how much we appreciate all that you have done, and we want to tell you what a pleasure it is to work with such a cheerful and efficient band of workers.

We are suffering a little because of the growing realization in the Auxiliaries that the quota comes first. Of course that is true, but please remember that while the quota means bread and butter, or nowadays plain bread, the Supply Department means clothing, without which bread is not of much use.

We cannot leave you here without expressing to you our deep appreci-

ation of the splendid response to our last appeal for money towards the "Ready-made Fund." The collection taken at Mrs. Hill's request, at the annual Auxiliary luncheon, on May 8, was \$147.37, and we also received pledges at that luncheon for \$75.00, so that our deficit of \$262.00 was met all but \$40.00, most of which has since come into this department. Certainly such loyalty cannot go unmentioned, and we are most grateful to every Auxiliary in this Diocese for coming so nobly to our rescue.

A report should include in addition to the figures, a study of which show the carrying forward of the established work, a glance backward over the past year to bring out the changes which have evolved during that time

The work of the Unemployment Committee has dropped in volume and quantity behind that of previous years. The past Winter has brought an increase in the amount of financial aid or relief through Governmental channels. This has decreased in some ways the demand for the work-relief offered by this Committee. However, there is a constant need for the work on the part of a group of women who are for some reason ineligible for County Relief or who are making a desperate effort to avoid the necessity for such support. There are amongst us some women whom we still feel can most appropriately be helped by giving them sewing. There must always be considered the benefit of occupation. The office of the Committee still remains a place of refuge to many women in distress.

The amount of work we have done has been controlled always by the funds in hand. We now give an average weekly payment of \$2.00 where we originally allowed \$7.50. This results in our women having only the bare necessities. At least seven of our women workers have cost our Committee almost nothing; every piece of their work has brought its own monetary return. The Committee, by maintaining this office, has been the means of furnishing them with such work—what is known as “special work.” The women of lesser skill have made plain, strong garments, which have been distributed as follows:

We shall not repeat what we have reported monthly in the *News Letter* and the *Diocesan Church News*, but we do wish to say that the work is steadily growing and deepening in its contacts. More of the clergy and the laity are coming to realize its value.

It is our aim to be of use to every parish and every organization. We have had five meetings during the year; our intercessors have taken part in the Armistice Day of Quiet and the World War Day of Prayer. The Bible Readings were sent at Advent, the Bishop's letter with greeting card at Christmas, and a card at Easter. Many visits have been paid, and letters written and acknowledged.

Due to the inspiration of an aged colored woman, who gave us one penny "to start some good missionary work," fifty dollars and twenty-five cents was raised by decorating and selling match boxes, and sent to St. Michael's and All Angels' Home for Crippled Colored Children. Let the defeatists in the Church who may read this take courage and get to work!

We had hoped to publish before this a small pamphlet giving the aims and methods of the work in this Diocese, but we shall not do so until we are better satisfied with what we have to offer.

Deaconess Colesberry has made a schedule of Thanksgivings and Intercessions with questions, which we feel will be very useful and helpful to everyone in the work.

As the number of our intercessors has increased from 37 to about 650, and the workers from 7 to more than 50, the item of postage is a large one.

We are very grateful for a very generous gift of 800 three cent stamps, and also for a few contributions of money. We would be very glad to have any number of Associate Members, giving any amounts, from twenty-five cents up a year, thus lifting somewhat the burden of support from the Woman's Auxiliary treasury.

The co-operation of the other Church organizations and the sense of fellowship with them and with our intercessors is very rewarding.

In this scattered and silent congregation of intercessors who can tell what power may be released for the coming of the Kingdom of God?

So we are always wondering, wondering long,

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club is deeply grateful to the Woman's Auxiliary for the opportunity of bringing a little of the work before you at this time. The earnest endeavor of this year has had more encouraging results than the past two years.

There are 2,287 magazines being sent regularly, either weekly or monthly; 188 Bibles and Testaments have been sent, 1058 prayer books and hymnals; other books, theological and secular, 6,524; tracts and Church School papers, 7,179; odd magazines, 69,718; Christmas and Easter cards, 42,893; picture cards and calendars, 8,995; carols, music, sheets and books, 615; miscellaneous Christmas gifts, 2,646.

Some of these figures sound rather large, but the need is so very great that every parish and mission in our Diocese should feel it a privilege to serve their neighbors in this way all over the world.

It is hoped that each one here has read the article, "Send Good Books, We Too Would Learn," by Rev. Alexander Macbeth in the April issue of "The Spirit of Missions." In this article Mr. Macbeth has given such a vivid description of the work being done by the C. P. C. in North Dakota.

Similar reports come from other mission fields; books, pictures and magazines for work among the Indians, the rural work in the West and South, work among the seamen. The Seamen's Church Institute of America has seventeen stations on our coasts, three of them very near us; two in Philadelphia and one at Marcus Hook. There are 238,000 men pass yearly through these seventeen stations; 250,000 magazines and 100,000 books are required to supply these stations.

The furnishing and replenishing of libraries, both at home and abroad, is another branch of the Church Periodical Club's work.

The library and literary departments of St. George's Cathedral, Jerusalem; St. Paul's University, Central Theological College, Diocesan Libraries in Kyoto and Tohoko; St. Luke's, St. Margaret's and St. Agnes' Schools are all the work of the C. P. C.

Our Diocesan branch has had a helping hand in all of these projects.

At the Convention last October the Church Periodical Club was placed on the National Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, which means that we take our part in the rank and file of all the missionary works of the Church. While still a separate organization, with its own by-laws and rules, the C. P. C. now has a member serving on the National Board, thus bringing into closer contact all the working agencies of our glorious Church.
