THE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

To review the work of the Auxiliary in our Diocese in detail one has only to turn the pages of this book. For a view of the whole, we have space only to mention a few of the outstanding things accomplished or ideas presented at the Executive Board Meetings from October through May.

The Educational Institute held in October, 1935, gave such impetus and afforded such benefit that the Executive Board voted to have another Conference this Coming October 26th, 27th, 28th. The subjects will be "The Negro in the United States and Africa," and the "Forward Movement of the Church."

In October the Board confirmed the appointment of Miss Katherine Harley as Supply Secretary for the current year. Miss Harley filled with great ability the vacancy in that department created by the resignation of Mrs. Benjamin West Frazier and the Board desires to express its appreciation of her fine service. In December the appointment of Mrs. James Davis, as Field Secretary, and Mrs. Charles Hunsicker as Devotional Chairman were confirmed. Mrs. Hunsicker succeeds Mrs. Lewis G. Morris who was obliged to retire.

It is hoped that through these appointments the work of the Auxiliary may be taken into every parish and mission in the Diocese and that the devotional part of our work may be strengthened. In April the appointment of Mrs. Thomas McCrae was also confirmed. Mrs. McCrae is to be the Supply Secretary for the next two years and brings to her task a knowledge of the Auxiliary and its work, and also an understanding of it from the Parish view-point.

A Committee, comprising Mrs. Jaspar Nicholls, Miss Caroline Z. Watts and Mrs. Charles Watson, was appointed to investigate the invested funds of the Auxiliary. This was in response to a request from the Diocese that all such funds be safeguarded. The Committee will bring in its report at the October Meeting.

The threatened deficit of the National Council was discussed at the April Meeting. The Diocese of Pennsylvania pledged one-tenth of the deficit, or \$12,700.00, in addition to the \$135,000.00 promised for the year 1936, and the Bishop and Council are depending on the help of the women of the Auxiliary in meeting these pledges.

The three delegates to the Synod, which is to be held in the fall are: Mrs. John E. Hill, Mrs. J. Burriss West and Mrs. Francis R. Packard. Alternates elected are: Mrs. Edward Ingersoll, Mrs. James T. Davis and Mrs. A. Moseley Hopkins, Jr.

An effort is being made, with the aid of the Five Committee Chairmen, to develop the Women's Auxiliary page of the Church News so that the page will contain valuable missionary news of wide scope.

Important changes in the By-Laws of the Constitution of our Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania have been made by a Committee comprising Mrs. James F. Bullitt, Mrs. Francis R. Packard and Mrs. J. Burriss West, assisted by the Executive Board. The new By-Laws will be voted on at the October Meeting.

The past year has been interesting for the Indian's Hope Association. The Government policy, which is being put into effect on Reservations, was presented by well informed speakers.

The Quota and Specials for the year 1935 were met by January, 1936.

Rev. Robert Frazier described his visit among Indians in South Dakota. The Hare School of Agriculture for Indian boys represents the very best type of work being done for them. The financial situation of the school is *grave*. Despite this, under the excellent management of Mr. and Mrs. Mengel the school is still in operation. Mrs. John Hill spoke of her trip into New Mexico and other Indian settlements and made an earnest appeal for cod liver oil for undernourished Indian children.

Dr. Tyler told of the peace, happiness and progress at Ethete, Wyoming. He was most enthusiastic over Mr. Forrest Stone, a Government man who believes in "homes." Dr. Tyler regrets the Indian men leaving their reservation homes to work on roads far in the mountains as the men forget Christian teachings.

Bishop Jenkins of Nevada stressed the advantage taken of the Indians and their need of a standard of living, saying, "We who are interested must be very interested adjusting the Indian to the new order." The association of the Indian with the white man has its perils and the number of Indians with no church training is appalling.

Mr. Wyatt Brown showed moving pictures of places around Dr. and Mrs. Burke's Mission at Fort Yukon, Alaska. These pictures graphically describe the continued provision necessary for shelter, warmth, food, and medical and religious care.

Mr. Jonathan M. Steere of the Indian Rights Association discussed the Wheeler-Howard Bill, which aims at self-government for the Indians, through definite organizations. The Indian has never been taught how to care for his lands and the need for vocational education is great.

Mrs. Paul H. Barbour of Rosebud Mission, South Dakota, spoke on the quantity of work being accomplished. She was most appreciative of the many prayer books and hymnals sent by prayer book societies. The English printed books are one of the greatest holds upon the younger people.

Miss Cady pictured her orphan home, and life among the Navajos. Motherless or homeless Indian children, often times ill and undernourished, are pathetic little figures. There is no Government provision for these children. Miss Cady has the only Mission home for them on the reservation. The cost of a child is \$10.00 a month. Miss Cady asks people to "adopt" them financially. There are 45,000 Navajos and infinite opportunities for Social Service.

The treasurer's report gives the amount pledged to various enterprises of the church. The interest of the Foreign Committee in meeting these pledges is great, but the figures would remain cold and lifeless, were it not for the speakers who come to us month by month turning these figures into symbols of lives given sacrificially, of souls won to a discipleship that puts our own to shame.

From Liberia came Father Kroll to tell of the African mission where the Fathers of the Holy Cross minister to the people by preaching, teaching and healing.

Dr. Harold Morris, from St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai, Miss Carol Clark, teacher of chemistry at Boone College, Hankow and Mr. Craighill of Nanchang, China, gave us a picture of China, that greatly disturbed country where the teaching of religion in the schools is so hampered by government regulations. Nevertheless there seems to be a greater demand than ever for Christianity. The opportunity is limited only by lack of funds and people to send. The Chinese themselves are rising to the need, building their own churches, sending their own missionaries. But it will be many years before they can do without our help as the task of reaching those millions is so enormous.

Bishop Binsted of Tohoku and Miss Christine Nuno, from Tokyo, were the representatives of Japan. Both are particularly interested in St. Luke's Hospital. The influence of Dr. Teussler's life still remains strong and the appeal which the hospital makes to Christians and non-Christians, rich and poor, is extraordinary. The religious life of the hospital focuses about the chapel given by the women of Pennsylvania in memory of Miss Mary Coles.

Dr. Lewis Franklin talked to us about some of the missionaries in the field: of Dr. Anderson who has gone to the hospital in Sagada, the only doctor in that part of the Igorot country; of Dr. Ritchie, whose salary the Foreign Committee has assumed, who is leaving St. Elizabeth's to run a little dispensary in Chan-Zhu, and who will be the only doctor in that city of 100,000.

Our devotional Lenten meeting was led by Father Vernon of St. Mark's Church, Philadelphia. The subject was Foreign Missions and World Peace.

Dr. Arthur Sherman, now associated with Bishop Hobson in the Forward Movement, provided much food for thought. He said there were four great forces at work in the world, communism, nationalism, secularism, and the power of the Christian Church. We should be aware of the great changes taking place around us, but we should realize the tremendous

power which is ours, the greatest dynamic one ever released among men. We must be keenly aware of the need of the revival of true religion and be aware that all the resources of heaven and earth are ours. All around the world missionaries look to us for a re-invigorated church to back them up. May the Church of Christ put first things first and go forth to transform mankind.

Meetings of this Committee from October 1935 through April 1936 have been filled with interest and activities.

Speakers were secured for each meeting. They brought their own stories of their particular fields, which fitted together gave a comprehensive picture of the work of the American Church Institute for Negroes.

Miss Ludie Willis was the first person to come and tell of the things the women of her race are doing. Splendidly prepared in the Institute Schools, these graduates are going back into the homes and parishes of their own people, bringing them knowledge and inspiration. The Reverend George Plaskett from Orange, New Jersey, presented the need of the Bishop Tuttle Training School for an endowment fund whereby it can become a grade A accredited Social Service School as well as a trainer of girls for Church work. Miss Bertha Richards, head mistress of the Tuttle School has since written that such a project is being undertaken. One of our delegates has generously started a fund for the Colored Committee towards this truly Forward Work.

The Reverend Cyril Bentley reviewed briefly the entire Institute Group of Schools. Special emphasis was given to Mississippi and the racial prejudices there which he and the famous Quintet have done so much toward reducing. Each year shows an increase in gifts and support of the schools by the Colored people themselves who are quick to appreciate how much these have meant to their race.

Mr. Blanton, head of the Voorhees School brought the Quintet to sing their lovely Spirituals. He spoke of the new chapel that the boys are helping build at their school.

Archdeacon Baskerville reminded the Colored Committee of the importance of rural work, without which the fountain from which the upper schools are fed would run dry. He calls this work among the back country people in the deep south the real Missionary work among the negroes.

Lent brought a devotional address from Father Lander of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rosemont, and Rev. Alvin Russel who succeeded his father the Reverend Archdeacon Russel. Mr. Russel told of the progress of St. Paul's school, Lawrenceville, Va. giving a touching memorial address that covered the life work of this founder of the school. The Rev. Frederick P. Houghton, Field Secretary of the National Council, told us further of the rural work in the black belt.

Our budget was met this year. A few specials as gifts were given, and attendance increased. The delegates' splendid understanding and support, made possible this wonderful work.

The Diocesan Committee has had a pleasant and profitable year under the leadership of Mrs. Ingersoll. At six of our eight regular monthly meetings, the Deans of the Convocations were our chief speakers, introducing to us a speaker from one institution and one or more missions in each Convocation: In October, our subject was Norristown, with Dean West and Mrs. Roberts of the House of the Holy Child as speakers; November, West Philadelphia, with Dean Taylor, Rev. A. L. Millet, of St. Titus', Elmwood, Rev. C. Moore of St. Cyprian's, Elmwood and Rev. William Stimson, Chaplain in charge of Church work at the University of Pennsylvania; January, Chester, with Dean Shreiner, Rev. William Powell of St. Faith's Mission, Brookline and Mr. Matthew Davis, lay-reader at St. Mary's Mission, Chester, Dean Shreiner speaking for the Church Farm School; February, West Philadelphia, with Dean Stockman, Rev. Robert Hubbs of St. Ambrose Church, Kensington, Miss Lucy Welte, teacher at the Galilee Mission Sunday School and Rev. James Deaver of St. Christopher's Mission; March, South Philadelphia, with Dean Hill, Miss Hagans, head worker at St. Martha's House and Rev. John Logan of the chapel of St. Simon the Cyrenian; April, Germantown, with Dean Eder, Rev. C. S. Goodman of St. John's Mission, West Oak Lane, Miss Weightman, house-mother at the House of Rest and Rev. E. Sydnor Thomas of St. Barnabas' Church. In December, the Church's work among the foreign-born, was presented by Archdeacon Bullitt, Rev. Edward Baczewski and Miss Eleanor Deane; in May the Church's work in prisons and hospitals, Mrs. Henry D. Jump and Rev. Henry Davies, D. D., chaplain at Byberry and Municipal Hospitals, spoke of the Church's work. Our June outing took the form of a visit to the House of the Holy Child in Ambler followed by a tea at Mrs. Ingersoll's house. Each month we had reports from both units of the Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, the Supply Department, the Unemployment Committee and the League for the Isolated; special reports on Christmas work, and Episcopal Day of the Week for the Blind and on our two scholarship students at the Church Farm School, as well as our News Letter from Miss Douglas. Financially, we are much encouraged by the fact that, since January, 1936, we have given \$1,459.77 towards the Quota. Spiritually and educationally, we feel that the year has inspired and strengthened us to carry on our work with ever-increasing zeal.

The Elizabeth P. Martin League for Service, Unit No. 1, Phila. General Hospital, continues its weekly visits in the hospital, and the giving of parties and entertainments.

Among the material things done the past year, include the purchase of a set of artificial teeth for a patient; taking entire charge of a funeral of a patient, paying all expenses; paid \$30.00 for two week's board for a diabetic child to be sent to a special camp; paid \$56.00 for a month's board for a child at camp; outfitted our "adopted boy" for the winter, (over \$25.00) gave one ton of coal, and gave out twenty-five complete layettes in the maternity department.

Intensive follow-up work is done on these baby cases, and food, clothing and medicine furnished when needed. Every baby has been baptized or preparations made for the same. Two adult baptisms, three confirmations and many children entered in Sunday School have been the result this year of the layettes.

This does not include all the work done in the hospital and for our families at Christmas—and the many personal acts of kindness done by our various members.

During 1935 we have endeavored to increase our usefulness in the Hospital. We have re-furnished two rooms in Harrison Home and have supplied such things as a blackboard, vases, jardinières and wicker baskets.

Miss Gnade Jakob and her assistants distribute about 150 books and 200 magazines weekly throughout the Hospital. The Library numbers well over 2,000 volumes and contains books written in many foreign languages. A new library truck and several book rests have been purchased by this Unit.

About one hundred and thirty patients from the Hospital and many others from Harrison Home have worked in Occupational Therapy of which committee, Mrs. Robert R. Meigs is chairman. More patients

have been able to reach this department since the concrete walk has been laid from Harrison Home. This committee has placed pictures and screens in the Children's Ward. The Episcopal Hospital Unit now pays the salary of an orderly and of an assistant to Miss Brown the head of the department. We worked with Miss Brown in promoting interest in the Episcopal Hospital Booth at the Emergency Aid Bazaar.

It is deeply regretted that Mrs. Edward Ingersoll has resigned as chairman of "the Shop." Under her direction it was established and the profits each month added to the treasury of this Unit.

Thirty volunteers representing sixteen parishes now work in the Hospital under Mrs. William Jefferys. There is still need for many more.

The Social Service Committee, Miss Elizabeth Ingersoll, chairman, supplied baskets to some needy families at Christmas time. With the help of the Volunteers seven boys were sent to a Diabetic Camp. A milk depot has been placed in the Clinics so that milk may be purchased by the patients.

We are grateful to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary who attended the second annual Lawn Fete. Mrs. John E. Hill was Chairman and the profit was over four hundred dollars. The Fete provides an opportunity for selling some of the products of the Occupational Therapy workroom thus enabling the patients to make a small amount of money.

The patients in Harrison Home greatly enjoy the supper parties which are arranged for them through the interest of some of our members.

Our aim in the field of social service has been to become familiar with more of our Church institutions. Some auxiliaries have visited them as groups and we hope more will do so next year.

Our Christmas work was the assembling of gift packages for 113 old people at the Almshouse (the list having come from the Episcopal rector) and the filling of Christmas stockings for 27 children under our Juvenile Court worker and 107 children at City Mission and St. Martha's House. Sixteen auxiliaries participated.

Our regular work has been mostly at Episcopal Hospital, in the library, clinics, occupational therapy and serving luncheon at the May Fete. We have started a fund to be used in the special wards of Harrison Home which we hope to make centers of permanent interest and responsibility.

Our first religious education project as a group this year, was a Quiet Evening on December 4th, at Holy Trinity Church, under the leadership of the Rev. J. Jarden Guenther. The group attending although small was very interested and received much stimulating inspiration.

Twelve groups studied Latin America in classes, institutes or meetings at which individuals of the group had the discussion on reading. Branches also participate in the educational work of their parishes by teaching in Church School and attending Bible and other study classes.

Many are looking forward to the Conference at Orkney Springs where Pennsylvania has had an enthusiastic representation for several years. Our program for next season is to include a consideration of our Church's viewpoint on some of the present day world problems.

Eighteen auxiliaries participated in the work of the supply department to the amount of \$413.93. The sewing was sent to St. Stephen's Mission, Fort Yukon, Alaska.

246 yards of bias were purchased and 262 yards were cut by hand.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania during the year 1935-1936, through the Supply Department, filled the requisitions of three hospitals,—one Foreign and two Domestic; three schools,—one for the training of clergymen, one for Indian Girls, and one for Negroes; and three missions,—one Colored, one Domestic, and one Indian. We also sent nineteen personal boxes and fifteen Christmas gifts to missionaries.

We must not lose sight of the fact that the work of the Supply Department represents one of the great projects of the National Church. It is as important in its way as raising the money for salaries, and funds to run missions. It supplies not only many of the essential articles of clothing to the missionaries and their families, but linen and dispensary articles to the mission hospitals, and in many mission schools the children are practically clothed through the Supply Department.

You will note that the report for the Department has been given covering the period from September 15th, 1935 to May 31st, 1936. Since

in the previous report the sewing was reported for the winter 1933-1934, it is necessary to report the following:

During the winter 1934-1935, twenty-nine volunteers, representing twelve Parishes, accomplished the work of the Supply Department.

Our total on deposit in New York so far, including this spring's ingathering is \$34,467.92 for this triennium of which \$246.60 is interest on Deposit in New York. If the second half of the triennium should be as good as the first half, our offering would be only \$69,000. and at Atlantic City in 1934 we presented \$77,782.00. Of course the second half will be better, lots better we hope, but we shall all have to work together with a will if we are to better even our 1934 record. Our goal is "*every* woman sharing." Let's make it a reality.

For over five years the women for whom we are working have been greatly benefited and comforted by their contact with our splendid corps of volunteers. This year the group has been broken by the deaths of Miss Ethel Cushing and Miss Anne M. Bowen.

Miss Cushing has been a wise counsellor throughout these troubled years to every woman in sorrow or bereavement. Her presence has been an inspiration and benediction to us all.

Miss Bowen, who has worked untiringly in the office (distributing sewing) and outside in her efforts to raise funds, died New Year's day. She planned to return to her work last fall, but ill health kept her from us. Her sincerity and enthusiasm we will long remember.

Two of our faithful inspectors, Miss Elizabeth Storrow, and Mrs. William A. Cornelius, have resigned this year. Miss Storrow's strength does not permit her to continue her work, and Mrs. Cornelius has removed from our diocese. Further, our secretary, Miss Helen M. Leary, obtained permanent and regular employment last summer. The Committee was more than fortunate to be able to have her careful and accurate work for four years. Her unfailing and efficient handling of details has been a very real asset to this Committee.

The Committee has struggled through these and other changes this season. The channels through which aid is being given needy women vary continually. Many of our women are old, and those over 70 are one by one being granted an Old Age Pension, and thus we discontinue our assistance in such cases.

We have aided financially 81 women; however, many of that number were helped for only one or two weeks through some difficult time. The weekly pay roll has averaged 15 women. The sewers whose labor brings its own monetary return have handled

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

1935-1936

The objective of the educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary is to extend the Kingdom of God into all lands and among all classes of people. The practical methods for achieving this great ideal are threefold: study, prayer, giving. Latin America has proved to be an intensely interesting topic for this year's concentrated effort.

Many of the leaders started reading early in the spring in preparation for the year's work. Some parishes had lending libraries during the summer and a few had reading groups which met together to read and discuss books, having a pleasant social time and building an excellent foundation for the year's study. About 350 books were sold during the year.

The educational conference, October 28-30, had 312 registrations from 90 different parishes. At the conference dinner there were 832 people present. In the daily meetings attention was focused on Latin America and the material available for study; plans were made for training classes, institutes and classes; it was decided that our Mission Study Offering should go to build a church at Le Borgne in Haiti.

The educational secretary went with the "Flying Squadron" to visit three outlying centers of the diocese to speak on Latin America. She also visited Convocational meetings.

There were three training classes for leaders, one during Advent taught by Mrs. Howard Fulweiler, one at the second session of the Diocesan Normal School conducted by Miss Elizabeth Jenks, and one Epiphany course taught by Mrs. P. T. Dashiell. Mrs. Harris taught a course at the Church Training School.

Most of the classes, institutes and special meetings were conducted during Lent. There were 36 different leaders conducting 40 study classes, 18 institutes and 19 meetings. The aggregate attendance was 3,096.

On April 27 at Holy Trinity Parish House, Mrs. Alexander Zabriskie of the Virginia Theological Seminary spoke on Brazil and showed pictures she had taken on a recent visit there. The offering for Le Borgne was taken. It amounted to \$776.69. The offering for hurricane relief, which also goes to Bishop Carson for the work of our Church in Haiti was \$550.00. This gives a total of \$1,326.69 to be sent from Educational Meetings in the Diocese of Pennsylvania to that stricken area.

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

In looking back through the year, the Church Periodical Club has much for which to be thankful; the meetings have been held regularly on the fourth Friday of each month, and have been well attended.

The secretaries have shown interest and a willingness to shoulder the work, where most needed. The different speakers, each month, have brought a closer realization of the kind of service which the Church Periodical Club can render to all our neighbors, these neighbors extend from Maine to California, from Liberia to Tokyo and from Alaska to the Philippines; and include clergymen, students, men, women and children, in fact, everyone who is hungry for reading material and canot afford to buy it for themselves.

During the last few years, owing to the lack of funds, the Libraries, both at home and abroad, have suffered. Books do wear out, so must be replenished, new technical and scientific books are needed for the progress of study.

In order to help with this necessary work our Diocesan branch is planning in the fall, to have a Tea with an illustrated talk on the work of the Church Periodical Club, the proceeds to be used for the Library Fund.

On her removal to Washington, Mrs. C. M. Kempton, who has been President of the Church Periodical Club for the Diocese of Penna., found it necessary to resign that office which she had held most efficiently since 1913, having been appointed by Bishop Rhinelander.

Bishop Taitt appointed Mrs. Herbert P. Onyx as successor to Mrs. Kempton, and she was inducted in that office on January 24th, 1936.
