In Memoriam

MATILDA CAMPBELL MARKOE. 1849-1937.

Not alone as a member of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, in an official capacity, and of the Indians' Hope Association for sixty-one years, is Mrs. Markoe to be remembered; but as one who shared herself and every talent she possessed—intellectual, physical, and above all, spiritual as well as her material possessions, with the Church all over the world, and with the State, wherever there was a wrong to right or a cause to help.

Many a Mission gives thanks today for her gift of water, in foreign lands and in Indian schools at home; and hospitals in Alaska and the United States and the Orient are better equipped because she cared; many a Missionary Bishop remembers the generous cheque he found in his mail when first facing the problems of the Mission Field.

When on Wednesday in Easter Week, Mrs. Markoe died, it was but the crossing of the threshold on which her feet had long rested, into that more abundant Life which God has prepared for those who unfeignedly love Him.

She richly lived her eighty-seven years, and

"Age could not wither, nor custom stale
Her infinite variety."

Thanks be to God for His gift of her to us, and for our long and happy association with her: may we prove worthy of so rich a heritage.

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The loss of Mrs. John Markoe to the Board is incalculable and the memory of her intrepid personality will serve as a glowing inspiration to the members. Because of Mrs. Markoe's deep interest in the Indian, and particularly in Trinity Church, Mission, South Dakota, which was burned, the Board voted that the new Chapel should be refurnished by Mrs. Markoe's friends as a Memorial to her. Contributions may be sent to the Indians' Hope Association marked for this Memorial. The Executive Board also voted that our United Thank Offering for this Triennium be presented at Cincinnati in memory of Mrs. Markoe.

The Unemployment Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary being an emergency measure, was dissolved last fall because Federal and State Relief had taken care of those in need. This committee was the first of its kind in the United States.

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania were revised this past winter and are printed and for sale in convenient booklet form at the office.

The Flood Relief Committee, organized by Mrs. Hill, performed a real service by making garments for the sufferers. Eleven boxes containing 2500 new garments were sent to clergy of our church in the flood area.

The Board voted that a Department of Christian Social Service be created and the President was empowered to appoint a chairman.

Mrs. John E. Hill, Mrs. Edward Ingersoll, Mrs. Thomas L. Harris, Mrs. J. Burriss West, and Mrs. George Woodward were elected delegates to the Triennial Convention; Mrs. John Van Pelt, Mrs. Thomas McCrae, Mrs. James F. Bullitt, Mrs. Francis R. Packard and Mrs. Marmaduke Tilden were elected alternates. The Executive Board will be responsible for traveling expenses and lodging of each delegate.

The Board created a Finance Committee and appointed Mrs. Charles Wiggins, Chairman, and Miss Margaret Bullitt and Miss Katharine Van Dusen to serve with her. Other appointments during the year were Mrs. Albert Hill, Chairman of the League of Intercessors to succeed Mrs. Charles Biddle. In accordance with the new By-Laws the following Diocesan Officers were elected for a term of three years: Mrs. Jaspar W. Nicolls, Treasurer, and Mrs. Thomas McCrae, Supply Department Chairman. Mrs. John Slemons was appointed Chairman of the Education Conference to succeed Mrs. James Bullitt.

The Educational Conference which was held in October 1936, proved so stimulating that the Board voted to hold another conference October 25, 26, 27, 1937, on Rural Work, the selected mission study subject for the year. The Board is happy to announce that the Reverend H. W. B. Donagan, rector of St. James Church, New York, will be one of the speakers at the dinner meeting at which Mrs. John Hill will preside.

May your secretary leave this with you for the ensuing year? "He has achieved success who has lived well, laughed often and loved much; who has gained the respect of intelligent men, the trust of pure women and the love of little children; who has filled his niche and accomplished his task; who has left the world better than he found it, whether by an improved poppy, a perfect poem, or a rescued soul; who has never lacked appreciation of earth's beauty or failed to express it; who has looked for the best in others and given them the best he had; whose life was an inspiration, his memory a benediction."

The Memorial Resolution for Mrs. Markoe is given elsewhere in this annual report but the Indians' Hope Association must record its own great loss by the death of one who had been its leader for sixty years. Mrs. Markoe's presence was an unfailing joy and her spirituality and generosity an inspiration. We give her love and homage for unfailing devotion to the cause of the Indian and to all other missions of the church.

The regular monthly meeting of the Indians' Hope Committee began on September 23rd with a corporate communion service followed by an inspiring address by Rev. Charles Collett, on having our lives God-centered.

In October, Bishop Roberts gave a graphic picture of the Indians of South Dakota; the devotion they showed at their convocation in the pitiful "dust bowl," and their determination to carry on their church responsibilities. The United States Government, by closing boarding schools, is making it more than ever necessary to have our workers take the gospel to the scattered people. So we again are responsible for supporting a Church Army worker at Fort Thompson.

Dr. Grafton Burke told us in November about his hospital at Ft. Yukon, inside the Arctic Circle. No appropriation is made for the heating of the hospital. So again we have promised \$700 for fuel where heat is so necessary.

The December meeting ratified these pledges and promised \$100 to Miss Cady for her difficult work among the Navajos in Arizona. The Government has cut down the number of sheep which a Navajo can own and so has brought distress to these Indians, who are perhaps best known by their weaving of blankets.

In January, Mr. Sniffen of the Indian Rights Association gave an interesting account of the Indians—their trials in new adjustments.

For many years we have designated \$100 for the Oneida Mission in Wisconsin. So, in February, we were greatly interested in Sister Mary Kathleen's story of the early days of the Oneidas in New York State and of their transfer as Christian Indians to Wisconsin.

The March meeting was in Holy Week, and we asked Sister Mary Kathleen to lead our devotional service that morning. While she was conducting these devotions Mrs. Markoe came in to appeal on behalf of Trinity Chapel, Mission, South Dakota, which had been completely destroyed by fire. She was too ill to remain until the close of the devotions. She was at the Maundy Thursday Service and at part of the three hour services on Good Friday. She went home ill and on Wednesday in Easter Week she died.

A Memorial Service for Mrs. Markoe was most fitting for the April meeting. It was held in her parish church, old St. Peter's, on April 28th. There we gave thanks to God for the wonderful grace and virtue of Matilda Markoe, who had been a choice vessel of God's grace and a light of the world in her generation.

After the Communion service, Dr. John W. Wood, of the Church Missions House, New York, Dr. Grafton Burke and Mrs. Paul H. Barbour told of what Mrs. Markoe had meant to them and to the mission field.

Mrs. Charles Biddle read the Memorial Resolution which had been accepted at the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and the service closed by all singing the Doxology.

There is a practical way in which we can show our appreciation and esteem of our former leader. Because of the very deep concern Mrs. Markoe felt about the rebuilding of Trinity Chapel, Mission, South Dakota, and because she had come to speak for it when physical suffering such as hers would have kept most people at home, giving to this Indian cause the "last, full measure of devotion," we have chosen as a Memorial to her the refurnishing of this chapel. This will cost about \$1200.00, some of which has already been contributed. The insurance money will rebuild the walls and roof.

The winter of 1936-7 was a most encouraging year for the Domestic Committee. It is impossible to look back over the meetings and not be impressed and inspired by the splendid men and women who came to tell us of their work in the various mission fields in this country.

The following are some of our year's speakers, all emphasizing the terrific handicap under which everyone is working owing to the very serious cuts and curtailment of the work.

From the mountains of North Carolina came Caroline Gillespie who, at Rosborough House, is carrying on a marvelous community work earning the money as a school teacher and by personal appeals.

Miss Charlotte Brown and Deaconess Edith Smith from Nevada where, through their Church School By Mail, they reach hundreds of children who otherwise would have no contacts with the church.

Nellie Walton, who is graduating this year from our own Church Training and Deaconess School, was outstanding. Hers was the story of Corbin Hollow, Virginia, where she brought a whole settlement of Mountain people out of the darkness of ignorance and neglect into the light and knowledge of Christ.

Mrs. Grafton Burke, was thrilling and is doing more work than ever at the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska.

Brooke Stabler, Chaplain at the University of Pennsylvania, drove home to us the need of more and more work in our educational centres, if we are to save our Church.

\$34.00 over our pledge of \$5,000.00 was received from the Parishes for the Quota, \$1,323.00 more than last year. Thus with interest from investments and offerings the total for the Quota was \$5,333.78. And for Specials \$638.00.

This most gratifying result is due in large part to the Delegates who so successfully carried back the message to their Parishes, and in many cases made the raising of the extra amount their personal responsibility.

We have pledged \$5,600.00 for 1937. This will mean an extra 10% from every Parish.

As this is my last year as Chairman may I take this opportunity to say "Thank You" for your wonderful co-operation and support. No other work has ever given me the happiness this has.

Another year has come and gone, and the delegates of the Foreign Committee and the parishes of the diocese that they represent have given the Committee their loyal support, and as usual, the quota of \$5,000.00 was met.

I chanced to see, a few months ago, the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year 1879, and found that in that year the gifts of the Foreign Committee amounted to \$4,602.47. That was fifty-eight years ago! During the intervening years considerably more was given, and in 1937 our pledges amounted to \$5,000.00. But the fact remains, that for some years past our apparent interest in the cause of foreign missions has hardly kept pace with the opportunities and the needs in the field.

We have heard each month the inspiring tale of a foreign missionary who is giving his or her life to telling the story of Christ in distant lands. If we are honest, we ask ourselves how they are able to carry on in the face of continuing lack of support from the church at home. Have we fallen into the habit of merely doing the same each year?

Bishop Hulse of Cuba has worked untiringly through one revolution after another, and has doubled the communicants while the offerings are steadily declining. The Reverend E. G. Mullen of Zamboango, Philippine Islands, brought the message of a great opportunity there to drive a wedge into the large Mohammedan group and to fill in the gaps of the Health and Educational Program which the government has cut in order to increase the size of the army. The Reverend E. F. Kloman, a missionary fresh from Liberia, and Father Parsell of the Order of the Holy Cross gave the picture of conditions which our church is facing in Africa. Deaconess Shaw from All Saints Mission, Bontoc, and Deaconess Stewart of St. Lois' School, Hankow, are two speakers with great appeal and force, and the committee was fortunate in having these outstanding missionaries tell of their work in their different and outstanding fields. The Reverend W. P. Roberts, of Nanking, told of the plan to combine the different denominations in the Church of Christ in China. Though agreeing in creed and doctrine, we are still divided by the question of orders. Miss Reid, Bishop Graves's Secretary in Shanghai, brought a more optimistic story. Work is progressing there rapidly, money is being raised regularly. And the women insist in sending their first U. T. O. gift to America! Can we listen to such people without redoubling our efforts?

This work must go forward, and I feel sure that we of the Foreign Committee will accept our share of the responsibility and work in helping it on.

The work of the Committee on Colored Missions has had an added impetus this past year because the Mission Study subject during Lent was the Negro in America and in Africa. Frequent visitors have come to the meetings and new delegates have been appointed. Requests for speakers on the whole Negro question, besides Mission Study Leaders, have been numerous.

A marked change is noticeable in the reactions of the groups. A sincere and eager interest is being shown throughout the Auxiliaries. With this extra stimulus and help which seems to be growing, the Committee can not fail to go on and become ever a force for intelligent application of the principles of Christian brotherhood as related to the racial question.

The speakers at the monthly meetings from October 1936 through April 1937 have included Mr. J. E. Blanton, head of the Voorhees School, Denmark, S. C. Besides telling of the new library and other improvements on their campus, he made the encouraging statement that at the close of the civil war the illiteracy among the negroes was 73% and it is now 17%. Mr. Hunt, President of Fort Valley School in Georgia, was another speaker. The work he is doing with the Credit Unions under the Co-operative movement is especially worthy of note.

Our own Mrs. Bonynge, early in the fall, told the story of her trip to each of the Institute Schools this summer. After her trip she wrote "Rambles in the Black Belt," a complete set of sketches of these schools. This she sold throughout the Diocese for the benefit of the Colored Committee, raising \$200.00. Miss Bertha Richards, from the Bishop Tuttle Training School in Raleigh, N. C., came herself to tell of the needs of this unique social service school for young colored girls, and to plead for an endowment fund for it. Archdeacon Baskervil's rural work in South Carolina was made impressive by his usual dramatic fervor.

The Reverend Beverly Tucker from St. Paul's Church, Richmond, Va., not only led a beautiful devotional service in Lent, but gave a great many pertinent facts about the negroes and of the work being done for and with them near his parish. Mr. Wallace Battle, Field Secretary of the American Church Institute for Negroes followed these others and put the Committee in touch with the latest developments of all the schools including the Okolona School in Mississippi, the recipient of this year's Mission Study offering.

Rev. J. E. Culmer, of St. Agnes' Church, Miami, Florida, told of the work in Florida, his large and busy parish in particular.

The Colored Committee budget for 1936 was completely paid with a little over for a special and the budget for 1937 was raised to \$4000.00. All this was done in the secure knowledge that the Delegates were supporting the work faithfully and continuously. To them go the grateful thanks of the officers of the Committee.

Let me review in a few words our meetings. October had the organization meeting for the winter's work which had been prayerfully planned by Mrs. Ingersoll to be sure this committee would do its part in the great Forward Witness for the Missions of Diocese and Church at large. In November, work among the colored with Reverend Vincent Pottle, Vicar of St. Mary's Chapel of St. Mark's Church, gave a comprehensive account. December, of course, was for our Christmas appeals which were so well presented that they were fully met. January, our first meeting with the experiment of having delegates visit and report was a great success. This was work for children with Mrs. Shreiner as chairman. Her committee had visited all of the ten child welfare organizations of the diocese and brought their word pictures with helpful suggestions. February was our day for City Missions. Miss Fewsmith told of her work of the Child Welfare Depot and introduced cases very graphically. Then Father Smith gave us a tremendously interesting and moving description of his Chaplain work in the Prisons. Who of us who were there will forget the intercessions led by him?

March was our work among the Foreign Born. Rev. Edward Baczewski told of the Churches for the Poles and Father Biagini his growing work among the Italians. Also Rev. William Emhardt, rector at the Pro-Cathedral, came to tell us of revival of interest and work there. In April again we had our delegates bring reports—this time on Work among the Aged. Mrs. Samuel introduced the 7 members who had visited and reported on the 7 homes. In closing she spoke of the urgent need of a church home for aged couples in this diocese.

You who read this will fully realize how inadequate a report like this is for this committee has done so much to carry that torch which our valiant Mrs. Martin left with us to light the dark places with Christian light and to do God's work. Amen.

The Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, Unit No. 1, has had a very active year. Weekly visits made in the wards by our various committees, and many parties and treats were given. At Christmas we were responsible for 750 patients, besides much more extra work was done.

In answer to an S. O. S. call from Miss Johnson, we bought 104 yards white dotted swiss, to cover all the basinettes in the nursery of the maternity department. We have answered many appeals from the Social Service Department for baby clothes, used clothing, taxi and carfare to take patients to clinics, bought a special pair of shoes for a diabetic woman, gave \$30.00 to pay board of a diabetic child at special camp, bought several pairs of glasses.

Twenty layettes given in the maternity ward, known as the "Elizabeth Price Martin Memorial," have made many mothers happy. All these families were followed up and many helped in various ways. The babies are baptized, children brought to Sunday School, and there were three confirmations during the past year. We have rehabilitated three families, which is always a good piece of Christian Social Service work, and our families are very grateful for just the chance to get a start, and away from furnished rooms.

We are grateful to all the Churches who have assisted us, both at Christmas and with the beautiful layettes, for their interest and co-operation.

It bought 2 book rests for the use of the patients, paid for the picture borrowed from the Art Alliance. At the Committee's suggestion, St. Mark's, Frankford, placed awnings outside the windows of the children's ward.

Miss Gnade Jakobs has continued her good work of distributing books and magazines weekly through the Hospital.

The Unit takes great interest in the Occupational Therapy Department under the chairmanship of Mrs. Meigs, by paying the salary of an orderly,

and an assistant to Miss Brown, by helping at the Emergency Aid Bazaar, and by giving an Entertainment and supper to the Harrison Home. Mrs. Fowler, as chairman of the "Shop," has worked to widen its usefulness and has opened a booth to serve milk and sandwiches in the Clinics. The Unit helped the Social Service Committee under the chairmanship of Miss Ingersoll by sending 2 boys to a Diabetic Camp and by helping with Christmas parties.

Thrifty volunteers work regularly in the Hospital under Mrs. William Jefferys. Many more are needed.

Two tickets to the Dell Concerts were given to the nurses, and a flag and staff for their auditorium.

This Unit held the third annual May Fete at the Hospital under the chairmanship of Mrs. Hill, with a profit of \$594.00, besides \$133.00 at the Occupational Therapy table of which \$51.00 was given to the patients.

Supper parties given to the patients in the Harrison Home through the interest of some of our members have been greatly enjoyed.

Mrs. Scheffey took moving pictures of activities in the Occupational Therapy and Social Service Departments which she showed at the Provincial Synod in Wilmington.

The Social Service committee of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary has sought to have all members gain a knowledge of our diocesan institutions by visiting them, helping on boards, working in clinics, hospital library, etc., and serving as motor messengers.

We served as the luncheon committee at the Episcopal Hospital May Fete and have kept a continuous interest in the special wards of the Harrison Home.

Africa and the American Negro was studied by nineteen groups through the medium of a class, an institute or a special meeting. The program of the monthly meetings of the Diocesan Executive Board was a consideration of the Church's responsibility toward some of the present day social problems.

Twenty-two auxiliaries, five more than last year, participated in the work of the Supply Department to the extent of \$120.00 for sewing, \$42.25 for readymades, \$146.25 for knitting and \$56.50 for Personal boxes. Four Junior Woman's Auxiliary branches have been successful in organizing a second and younger group in their own parishes.

2,377 cut garments were assembled;
2,300 directions for making garments were typed;
2,534 notions were enclosed in the assembled garments;
999 yards of ribbon, lingerie tape, bobbin, elastic;

In addition to the above cuttings, the Supply Department purchased from the Unemployment Relief Committee 2,342 cut garments, which were on their shelves at the time they dissolved.

The Diocese of Pennsylvania during the season 1936-1937, through your Supply Bureau, filled the requisitions of 5 Missions, 1 School, and 1 Hospital. We also sent nineteen personal boxes and 16 Christmas packages to women missionaries.

I came to this work last fall, absolutely ignorant of its machinery, and I found here a very splendid group of women who lightened my burden considerably.

The success of this work depends entirely upon our workers at the Church House, and the support of the Parish Auxiliaries. I cannot express

in words what the encouragement of the latter has meant. Very few auxiliaries have decreased their work, and most of them have increased it. This is all a big step in our Forward Movement.

We have had but seven missions this year, in comparison with ten other years, so that we must hold ourselves in readiness for increased demands next year, remembering that the Supply Bureau of this Diocese has always met all its requisitions.

The Knitting Department, under the very able direction of Mrs. Howland, has collected and sent out hundreds of useful garments. May we add that we knit only the garments we are asked for, and we would ask the auxiliaries to co-operate with us in this respect.

What a satisfaction to know that the piece of work given us last fall is completed and on its way by the time this report goes into your hands. This should always be an inspiration to all of us.

The spring in-gathering presented at Calvary, Germantown, on May 7, 1936, and up to July 1, amounted to \$12,250.00. The fall "intake" presented on November 5, 1936, at the Church House, and up to February 1, 1937, was \$12,150.00, a total of \$24,400.00 for the year 1936. The total on deposit in New York with the National Council was, with interest, and interest from special legacies, \$47,413.22 for the first two years of this Triennium, an increase of over \$4,500.00 above this time three years ago. We are doing better than the last Triennium, but not nearly so well as we should, if we hope to approach our 1931 offering at Denver of \$95,000.00.

The speaking committee, Mrs. Roberts, Mrs. Ingersoll and Mrs. Lockwood, assisted on occasions by Mrs. Baker and Mrs. Hill, have done a most helpful and excellent job, and I want especially to thank them for carrying on as they did for me during the late winter and spring of 1936. Only thirty speaking engagements were filled during the year, but every request for a speaker was accepted and the appointment kept, so the problem still remains how to get invited to speak.

Mrs. Baker's play "Hester Brown's Vision" has become nationally known, and has gone all over the country, through the middle West, out to the coast, and all-around the East, and has helped the cause of the United Thank Offering tremendously.

We are beginning the last great push—the final year of this 1934-1937 Triennium. What we shall present at Cincinnati next October lies in your hands. What shall we say to those 151 self-sacrificing women out in the Mission Field? Is their work to go forward with greater strength and power, or is it to be curtailed and is greater self-denial, further discomfort and self-sacrifice to be demanded of them? We don't ask you to give any more. We feel confident that every woman reading this is a contributor either through a Blue Box or by check, but we do ask you to make advertising mediums of yourselves. Probably not more than half the women of the Church even know about it, and right here is where every one of you comes in. If each of you who knows the story and the ideals of the United Thank Offering, and the joy of using a Blue Box, would go to some woman in your Parish who doesn't come to Church very much and doesn't join in the work of the Auxiliary, and tell her about the U. T. O. and give her a Blue Box and persuade her to use it and then put your Parish Treasurer in touch with her, you would be doing a real bit of Missionary work. Our Parish Treasurers can't do it all. It lies with every member of the Woman's Auxiliary to help, for the United Thank Offering belongs to the Woman's Auxiliary.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

1936-1937

The object of our Educational work is to extend the Kingdom of God by giving special study and attention to some un-Christianized phase of our life in this country, or to some foreign country where our church is making an effort to spread Christianity.

Our efforts this year were devoted to a study of "The American Negro." The offering goes to the Okolona school, Okolona, Mississippi, one of the schools of our American Church Institute for Negroes.

The training classes for leaders of study groups were well attended, and proved to be very useful preparation for the year's study. Miss Jane Welte's class in the Diocesan Normal School was so successful that it was continued through the second semester. Mrs. P. L. Dashiell and Mrs. Thomas L. Harris taught two other classes, one in the fall, the other just before Lent.

There were forty study classes, seventeen all day institutes and thirteen special meetings. Altogether there were forty leaders, speaking and teaching, and the aggregate attendance was approximately 4,189. The offering was \$806.92, for the Okolona school and \$46.00 as a special offering to be sent to Liberia, making a total of \$852.92. Last year's offering for Haiti was \$781.69.

No statistical report can measure the spiritual task accomplished in a year's study of our Negro neighbors. For those who have made a study of this subject in former years, it has been encouraging to note signs of progress and to discover further ways of co-operating with the Negro leaders in our Church, who are doing a splendid piece of Christian service. For those who have studied the subject for the first time, it has been very disillusioning to discover the handicaps under which the Negro has lived and worked. Study of conditions in our own city of Philadelphia have opened our eyes to the housing and health and employment problems where Negroes make 11% of the population.

The women of the Diocese of Pennsylvania have performed a great work of study and prayer and giving this year. May it be only the beginning of a more Christian attitude of sympathy and interracial co-operation in the years to come.

There are now more than eight hundred men, women and children (white and colored) receiving the friendly help and interest of the sixty-three women, working as sub-chairmen in the League of Intercessors.

The year's work started in October with a corporate communion, a message from the celebrant and the reading of the names of those who had passed away during the year, with Commendatory Prayer.

The Forward Movement publications were sent out at regular intervals. Christmas and Easter cards, birthday greetings, the Bishop's personally signed Christmas letter, calendars, prayers for the "World's Day of Peace" and for "Quiet Days" were sent to all members during the year.

The reports of our workers who carry on a friendly correspondence and visit their members from time to time are always interesting and helpful. In many cases these workers write letters for their friends and attend to minor business matters. Books and magazines are read to the blind, and copies of the Forward Movement in Braille are gladly furnished by the League. Books from our Lending Library have been enjoyed, especially in the rural districts.

Our ultimate aim is to have a representative of each Parish on the Board. We feel that we are reaching but a small fraction of those who need the service of the League of Intercessors.

A brief history of the organization of the League and its service to the Diocese during the past ten years is now in print and will be ready for distribution in the Fall.

The Junior Woman's Auxiliary has assisted by taking people to church, to hospitals for treatment and for short outings. The Correspondence Church School has also been of great value in the rural districts.

The work of the League is financed by the Woman's Auxiliary and individual contributions. Associate memberships from ten cents to any amount are greatly desired.

Gracious Father, Thou Companion of all men everywhere; Bless, we pray Thee, all those who are deprived of the ministrations of Thy Church.

THE CORRESPONDENCE CHURCH SCHOOL OF THE CHURCH LEAGUE FOR THE ISOLATED FROM JULY 1, 1936 TO JUNE 1, 1937

A lesson for each Sunday sent monthly to 24 children, totaling in round numbers 1,000 lessons for the year. These have included the Children's Forward Movements, Senior, Junior, and Primary lessons taken from the Christian Nurture Series, copies of the Gospel According to St. Mark, copies of the Office of Instruction, Bibles and pictures. Christmas and Easter cards were also sent to each child. 6 visits were made.

The school is divided into 3 departments. The Senior Department, the Junior, and the Primary, the ages of the present members running from 5 to 19.

We have 4 children living in Oxford, 20 miles from our nearest church at Kennett Square, 6 in the remote districts of the parish, Emmanuel, Quakertown, 1-9 miles from the church of the Messiah, Gwynedd, 6 in the outlying districts of St. James, Perkiomen. All of these are active in their correspondence and in their assigned work. We also have two families with 7 children in the parish of St. James, Perkiomen, who are receiving lessons but have not yet acknowledged them; and 6 families including 9 children in the parish of Newtown whom we have not yet been able to reach through correspondence. There is a large district in the southeastern end of Bucks County comprising the parish of St. Luke's Newtown, and the Country Centre Missions which we have not been able to reach through Correspondence, and we would appreciate an offer from anyone to drive us through there that we might reach these people, especially those whose names have been sent to us, but whom we have not been able to successfully reach by mail.

At Christmas time gifts were sent to the children by the Junior Auxiliaries of St. Johns, Lansdowne, and the Church of the Redeemer, Andalusia. A donation of \$2.00 was also given towards the children's Christmas.

Donations of lesson leaflets were kindly given by the following churches:

All Saints, Torresdale; Christ Church, Philadelphia; St. Simeon's, Philadelphia; The Church of the Saviour, Philadelphia; St. Mary's, Ardmore; St. Peter's, Glenside.

Bibles were donated by the American Bible Society, and individual members of the League. An effort is being made to have the Senior members correspond with each other. This has been successful in three cases. Daily devotions and quiet times are also being stressed in the Senior Group, daily devotion sheets being sent with each month's lessons. These have been successfully used in most cases. A personal letter is sent to each child with

nearly every group of lessons. These have brought a splendid response on the part of the children, and we feel that we are getting close to, and helping these girls and boys who are lacking in normal contact and companionship with boys and girls of their own age. One girl, 15 years old, who lives alone and very much isolated with her father, and who gets up at 5.30 each morning to get his breakfast, cooks, bakes, cleans, washes, irons, feeds the cattle and fowl, and alone with them most of the time, gets a great deal of pleasure out of the letters and lessons she receives. She has started correspondence with another girl 15 years old who also has very little companionship with girls of her own age and lives away back on an isolated country road nine miles from church. This latter girl has done a wonderful work with her lessons, and designed crosses and sent them to the other members of the school at Easter, which gave her a great deal of pleasure and contact with others. She has also started correspondence with two other girls. Another girl with three younger brothers lives very much isolated and loves the Bible we sent her. Such are the examples of the help the League has given in the rural districts this year through the C. C. S.

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club is happy to report a decided upward trend in both interest and work during the past year.

The meetings have been held regularly on the fourth Friday in each month, and have been well attended.

While the sending of 2,292 current periodicals regularly; 84,254 odd magazines; 35,353 Christmas and Easter Cards and 6,142 books may sound like good numbers, still there is need for more and a need for more workers.

Aside from the sending of magazines, the Church Periodical Club has sent a goodly number of books to different places:—"House of the Holy Child," a mission in North Carolina; one in Tennessee; also to St. Timothy's Mission, Alaska, and over 500 books to help replenish the Library, recently destroyed by fire at Mission, S. D.; between one and two hundred school books have gone to the Gailor Industrial School; at Christmas time many of the Secretaries sent new books to different clergymen and mission workers. These books were chosen by the recipients.

The Church Periodical Club never stresses the need for money. Nevertheless, it is very useful, as in the case of replenishing libraries, especially, in colleges and schools where up-to-date text and reference books are badly needed. To this end, last fall our Diocesan branch gave a Tea at the Church-woman's Club, the proceeds of which enabled us to send a money donation to the Library Fund. By the hearty co-operation of the Secretaries, our Diocesan branch was able to make a money contribution towards the colored schools, and last, but by no means least, a sum to our own Divinity School.

The C. P. C. welcomes three new branches this year: St. Michael's Chapel, Yeadon; St. Paul's, Elkins Park, and Holy Communion Chapel, Philadelphia. They are starting in the work with vigor and enthusiasm, thereby encouraging us all.

REPORT OF DEVOTIONAL CHAIRMAN

The aim of the Devotional Department is to have a Devotional Chairman appointed and a Prayer Group formed in each Parish and that more prayers and intercessions be used at the Woman's Auxiliary Parish Meetings.

The work of the Department began early in September with the first Woman's Retreat under the Retreat Association to be held in Pennsylvania.

Due to the kindness of Mr. Weir, the Retreat was held at Holiday House, Sellersville, Pennsylvania. It was conducted by the Reverend J. Thorne Sparkman, of Christ Church, Baltimore. Eighteen women made the Retreat.

In January, a Diocesan Prayer Group was formed, meeting every Monday, afternoon, at 2.30 o'clock, in the Bishop's Chapel, in the Church House.

The Group was led by the Chairman, with special recognition of the assistance given by Miss Alice Ewing and Sister Mary Kathleen.

Two addresses were given the Group by Mrs. John T. Cuyler, of Princeton, and Mrs. Thomas L. Harris, our Educational Secretary.

The Chairman gave four talks on peace and visited and gave short addresses in twenty parishes.

Invitations have been issued for a second Retreat, to be held at Holiday House, Sellersville, Pennsylvania, June 15th to 18th, 1937, to be conducted by Father Turkington, O. H. C.

THE FORWARD MOVEMENT

In October 1935 the Forward Movement Commission elected, as associate members, one woman from each Province to act as a liaison officer between the women, both as individuals and members of organizations, and the Commission. It was hoped in this way to develop a clearer and more positive sense of true discipleship and also to get back to every woman in the church the aims and ideals of the Forward Movement. This can best be done by appointing a chairman in each Diocese who will keep all the women's organizations in touch with the splendid publications of the Forward Movement.

Three courses "Proving Prayer," "Religion in Family Life" and "Why be a Christian" were prepared at the request of the associate members and been much used. In our Diocese the Altar Guild, the Girls' Friendly Society, Daughters of the King, the Woman's Auxiliary and the Young People's Fellowship have used them with good results.

The Forward Movement has also published several booklets for children, two, for Christmas have been used and enjoyed in family preparation for Christmas as well as in Church Schools and children's groups. Two simple illustrated courses suitable for summer vacation work have proved a great help and pleasure to many.

The clergy have given us splendid leadership in the distribution and use of the manual "Forward Day by Day" (the last report from Forward Movement headquarters lists our diocese as using 30,048 copies) and now we are anticipating the same help in the next objective of the Commission which is Study and Discussion Classes on Missionary Motive.

There is a committee of clergy in our Diocese and it is hoped that through co-operation with them we shall awaken to what it really might mean to our Church and to the world if we would "turn, follow, learn, pray, serve, worship and share" as loyal, loving and faithful followers of our Master.
