## THE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

At the first fall meeting, the Auxiliary's great and good friend, Mrs. George Woodward, was unanimously elected Honorary President of the Woman's Auxiliary.

As the work, and therefore the overhead expenses of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, is increasing, the Board asked the Parishes for a 10% increase in 1938 to provide for the Maintenance Budget of the Woman's Auxiliary. the response of the parishes has been good and as a result the necessary increase is coming in to the Treasurer.

The Board, at the first fall meeting, voted that Mrs. McCrae should present at the meeting of the Supply Secretaries in Cincinnati a resolution to the effect that the Diocese of Pennsylvania feels the ideal toward which we work is adequate salaries for the missionaries, but the time has not come to give up personal boxes.

The Supply Bureau Treasurer, Mrs. Glendinning, has resigned. Therefore the Board, at the April Meeting, gave authority to Mrs. McCrae to act as Treasurer of the Supply Department during her term of office as Supply Secretary. This gives the Supply Secretary the opportunity to be fully cognizant of the Supply Department's finances.

At this meeting the Board also regretfully accepted the resignation of Mrs. J. Burriss West as Vice-President in charge of the Junior Work. Mrs. West has accomplished much for the Auxiliary and given of herself unstintedly. At present there are twenty-six branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary with an approximate membership of nine hundred.

Among those things which the Executive Board has sponsored this year are: The Educational Conference last fall, the Supply Department's raising of the \$750.00 fund for St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai; the Lenten Service of Thursday evening, March 10th, at Holy Trinity Church; the work of Miss Esther Brown for the first four months of the year among the Negroes in the Diocese.

The Board has been concerned over the financial crisis which has faced the National Council. It was inadvisable to make further pledges—but everyone has felt that further cuts in the missionary fields would be crucial.

Therefore the Board voted at the April 5th meeting to ask the parishes to set aside the Ember Days of June 8th, 10th and 11th for the special prayer and sacrifice for the "Save the Cuts" Offering, the offering to be presented at St. Luke's, Germantown, on Wednesday, June 22nd, at 8 P. M.



The Board has amended Article 1, Section IV of the the By-Laws to read, "The election for President, Vice President at Large, and United Thank Offering Custodian, shall be held at the Annual Meeting of the year following the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary."

At the April Board Meeting the Executive Board unanimously passed the Nominating Committee's choice of new officers for the coming election. They are for:

President—Mrs. Edward Ingersoll.

Vice-President at Large—Mrs. Marmaduke Tilden.

United Thank Offering Treasurer—Mrs. Francis R. Packard.

At the Annual Luncheon, held on Tuesday, April 26th, the Parish Representatives elected to office the Nominating Committee's choice of officers, and the Bishop of Pennsylvania inducted them into office.

The Board cordially greeted anew Mrs. Ingersoll, Mrs. Tilden and Mrs. Packard and looks to them for leadership in the coming years.

Mrs. Francis Packard introduced the following resolution which was unanimously passed by the Woman's Auxiliary as a whole:

"Be it resolved that we, the members of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania wish to express our most profound and sincere appreciation:

For the splendid contribution made to the Auxiliary by Lea Hill, our President, during the last six years. Her brilliant leadership, breadth of vision, and unfailing devotion to the work are a combination of qualities rare indeed. Our prayer is that we can 'carry on' in the way she has shown us.

To Marian VanPelt, who also for six years has been the United Thank Offering Custodian of the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Never has there been such a difficult time for us to show our "Thankfulness" in a concrete way. So to have helped to keep Pennsylvania in the very first place is proof of the fulfilment of the task. And we are truly grateful.

And to Martha Davis who, as our Field Secretary, has carried a new office with all the attendant difficulties to a most important place in the Diocese and who has opened the way for the Auxiliary to reach many new parishes—And to her as Chairman of the Arrangements Committee, we owe the success of this year's Luncheon and Dinner Meetings—a most difficult and arduous task. We are most appreciative."

During the past year five of our strongest branches indicated assumption of their full responsibilities in woman's work in the Church by allying themselves with Woman's Auxiliary groups. Two J. W. A. branches "died" and two new ones were formed. Our new chairman looks to your sympathetic support during the coming year in a renewed drive for Auxiliary membership through formation of new Junior Woman's Auxiliary branches.

Participation of the branches in the program of the departments of Education, Supply and Christian Social Service continues to be encouraging. Among our speakers we welcomed Mrs. Platt, Chairman of Social Service at Episcopal Hospital, who gave us some very definite suggestions of services we could perform throughout the year, as well as at Christmas time.

Miss Louise Fewell, of the Holy Trinity branch, told of the part played by Youth Hostels in building international friendship and understanding. She gave us an encouraging and sympathetic interpretation of the Youth of Western Europe, particularly Germany, based on her intimate experiences during three summers of travel with the hostels.

Perhaps the high-light of our year was a most carefully planned and beautifully executed devotional pilgrimage conducted for us by Dr. Mockridge through St. James's Church, on Ash Wednesday. Beauties of our heritage in church architecture and liturgy were brought to our attention with freshness and understanding.

If we may be permitted to judge by the greatly increased number of Corporate Communion reported by our groups this year, we are becoming aware of the power and grace which He holds ever before us, and without which all expression is but withered fruit on a sapless branch.

The Indians' Hope Association began its season with a Corporate Communion in the Bishop's Chapel, our new Diocesan Secretary, the Rev. Percy Houghton, D.D., celebrant, on September 22nd. At this meeting we had with us Mrs. Nancy American Horse, a Sioux Indian, the leader of the Indians' Woman's Auxiliary of South Dakota. She spoke to us in her native tongue, another Sioux woman, Mrs. Rouillard, interpreting for her. I wish you could have heard her greeting us as "all my sisters" because of our help to the Indians today. Reverend Rouillard spoke of their mission at Standing Rock, Little Eagle, South Dakota, a gift of the U. T. O. which he considers a gift from God.

In October, Deaconess Bedell told of her work among the neglected Seminole Indians in Florida. Bishop Kemmerer of Duluth, Minnesota, told how our church has helped to Christianize the Chippawa Indians, but the good old Indians are dying with startling rapidity and the younger generation is not taking their place. Bishop Kemmerer, with the devoted aid of The Rev. Dr. Carrington is carrying on a small training school for Indian clergy where they are instilling into the students pride of their race and devotion to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This school needs financial help.

The Rev. Hector Thompson, superintendent of Ethete, Wind River, Wyoming, came to us in November. He is both agriculturist and clergyman and is deeply concerned with teaching the Arapaho Indians to express in their lives that which is best in life,—better homes, better health, better lives.

In December, Mr. Lawrence Lindley of the Indian Rights Association, told us of the very serious condition of the Navajos. They are in greater need than any other Indians. Sheep raising is their chief source of revenue and the United States Government is trying to regulate it but the Indians are



in great distress. Mr. Lindley said there were vicious circles within circles which made the situation a very serious one. We help Miss Cady in her struggle to help these poor Navajos.

In January, we again had a native Indian as speaker, Archdeacon Boyle of the Diocese of Duluth. In closing his address he said, "Discouragements, yes, but the clouds roll by and you see that God's world is beautiful. There is beauty in life, and there are those who give so that those living in heathen lands are helped."

In February, The Rev. S. B. Liebler of Old Greenwich, Connecticut, showed motion pictures which he had taken last summer of various Indians upon the Reservations.

Miss Prentice of New York City came to the March meeting and told in a most interesting way of the Esquimox in our Mission at Point Hope, Alaska. She also showed pictures of Esquimox and of the work of the Rev. Frederick W. Goodman D.D., among them.

Throughout the year we have missed our beloved Mrs. Markoe. The chapel at Mission, South Dakota, has been furnished in loving memory of her. A tablet on the wall of the chancel bears this inscription:

"This Church is furnished to the glory of the Great Father and in loving memory of His faithful servant Matilda Campbell Markoe, who loved His Indian Children.

June 11, 1849—March 31, 1937"

I regret that my six years of chairmanship of the Indians' Hope Association is ended. It gives me great satisfaction that I am succeeded by Mrs. Robert T. Frazier, who has lived as a missionary in South Dakota, and who has the welfare of all Indians very deep in her heart.

The Foreign Committee has had the same budget of \$5,000.00, all quota, this year as it has had for some years past. This budget includes in its pledges every foreign field in which the Church is at work, except Indian,—a budget in which educational, medical, and evangelical institutions are all represented.

Our speakers this year have been particularly interesting. We have had, beginning with September, the Reverend Francis Cox, from Soochow; the Reverend Claude L. Pickins, who spoke of his work among the Moslems in China; Mr. M. P. Walker, the Treasurer of our Church's work in China, who brought us the most recent news from Shanghai. Mr. Walker spoke of Dr. Margaret Richey, whose full salary of \$1,000.00 this committee pays. We think of her as our particular missionary, and we were glad to hear of the valuable services she was rendering nearly twenty-four hours a day in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, and in the refugee camps established in the vicinity of Shanghai.

We had Bishop Shirley Nicolls of Kyoto, Japan; and Mrs. Harper Sibley, who told us about the Church's newest foreign work under Bishop Azariah in Dornakal, India, which she has seen; the Reverend Lascelles-Ward, who gave us a most interesting address on Oriental Religions and the effect of Christianity on converts from them; Paul Laws, an Igorot from the Philippines, who is studying for the ministry at the General Theological Seminary in New York; the Reverend Joseph Mason who has been in the Hawaiian Islands; and the Reverend Benson Harvey, Canon of the Cathedral in Manilla.

We have been saddened by the terrible conflicts in the Orient and other lands. These have wrung the heart and soul of every Christian. The war in China has come just when the



outlook for the Chinese Republic, now in its twenty-seventh year, seemed very promising. Under General Chiang Kai Chek, national unification and development was progressing splendidly. No national leader in the history of China had won such recognition and personal popularity as was given Chiang Kai Chek. Along with this national progress had gone a growing friendliness towards Christianity on the part of people and officials. But mighty movements have been seeking to shape the course of the life of Japan,—materialism, nationalism, communism all have active leadership and large followings though a mightier force than any of these is the Gospel message of the Christian Church. Several years ago, Kagawa said that Japan needed more Christians. At least a million would be necessary in order that Christianity might make an impact upon the life and course of that nation. Japan has a population of sixty-nine millions and the Christians of all communions number but three hundred thousand.

In Cincinnati, Dr. Francis Wei, in speaking of the suffering of his countrymen, said that great as was his concern for China and Japan at this time, it is insignificant, compared to the concern he would feel if, when hostilities finally cease and peace comes again, the Church were not there to take hold at once to rebuild the spiritual and moral fabric of those two lands. Seeming disaster is but the door of greater opportunity. It is our privilege and duty to support and strengthen the young churches of China and Japan by every means in our power as they meet some of the greatest problems of our times. It is the Christians in these countries who constitute the real hope for the ultimate attainment of the Christian ideal in the nation's life.

Since May 1937 the work of the Committee on Colored Missions has grown. The budget which was raised to \$4,000.00 was completely met with several hundred dollars extra for "Specials." This shows that the raise was justified and that the interest of the delegates reached back to their parishes and into their Woman's Auxiliary treasuries.

It is fortunate for this committee that the Mission Study subject this year was Rural America. So much of the material concerning small farmers, share-croppers and "back of beyond" homesteaders, directly concerns the Negro.

The Reverend Francis Barnett of Christ Church Hospital of Philadelphia, was a picturesque figure in the costume he wore while working in Liberia. The story he told of conditions there, especially the part played by our Church, was one to capture the imagination. This meeting was saddened by news of the death of the well loved Archdeacon Baskervil. It was voted to raise a special sum as a Memorial to his work from this committee.

We heard the Reverend A. C. Moore who has charge of St. Monica and St. Cyprian's Parishes, tell of high points of the Triennial Convention at Cincinnati which were pertinent to colored work from the Negro point of view as it effected his race. The following month Mrs. Francis Packard relived for us the days she spent as one of the Woman's Auxiliary delegates to the Convention from Pennsylvania.

Two subjects for study during the next three years are "Christian Unity" and "War and Peace." Mr. Hugh Moore of the American Friends Service Committee, a non-partisan and non-sectarian organization, talked of the work of that forward looking group along those lines.



In January, Mr. Cyril Bentley of the American Church Institute for Negroes came with the fine motion pictures of the Institute schools. The students and faculties of these splendid educational centers were brought to life as the camera recorded them going about their tasks. Mr. Bentley feels that the spiritual teaching in these schools is making a marked difference in the type of Negro being sent out through the Southern states.

Mr. Wayne Hopkins of the Armstrong Association gave a clear picture of the work being done among the Negroes by the United Campaign. He seemed tremendously impressed with the spirit and scope of the work of our Committee on Colored Missions.

We heard Miss Esther Brown, Field Worker from the National Council, who was loaned to this Diocese for forward work among the Negro churches. After her talk we felt we had actually accompanied her on the journey through the Institute schools.

I am a firm believer in rotation of officers, but as I go out of office this spring I am wondering if everyone whose term has expired feels as I do. It is a sad sweet feeling of the regrets at not having accomplished more and thankfulness for the years I have had with this committee. It is impossible to express what is in my heart. I can only say that I am turning over the job to my successor with a great deal of envy because the opportunity is just starting for her to do the wonderful things I know she will. I know I am expressing the attitude of this committee when I pledge their whole hearted support to her and I want to thank them for their help and encouragement to me which made my task a joy and taught me so much.

Living in the middle of our missionary field of 61 missions and 17 institutions gives us an added responsibility to live up to all those things we would teach of Christian faith and love and conduct, in our homes and parishes. We feel that a life so lived is the most effective missionary service that can be rendered.

This year, encouraged by the result of our experiment with the institutions, the Diocesan Committee again created three committees of ten parishes, each represented by their delegates, to visit and report on the missions of this Diocese.

In December the first committee reported. Mrs. Alan Reed, as chairman, introduced her group who told us of the four Polish, two Italian and one French missions. In most cases the delegates attended a Sunday morning service where they were warmly welcomed. They pictured for us devout and earnest congregations, worshipping sometimes only in "an upper room" but always with reverent devotion in a colorful setting of music and lights.

The February meeting brought us the report of Mrs. Shreiner on the eleven colored missions. There again, morning services were attended, with congregations in some instances numbering 75 to 100. Most of these missions have such organized groups at work as Altar Guilds, Woman's Auxiliaries, Girls' Friendly Societies, Mothers' Clubs and Young People's Societies.

At the May meeting the delegates gave a fine report of the 37 white missions and brought in the following recommendations as the result of their visits:

1. That in some of the outlying districts the missions might be consolidated and an effort made to improve the properties, and to increase the salaries.



2. Every mission should have a Woman's Auxiliary branch and be in touch with the Diocesan Committee.
3. That all missions should be in the care of the best of our clergy.
4. That a number of the missions should have the status of a parish with self-support.

The annual election brought to a close our work for the year with the re-election of Mrs. Hewson, Mrs. Shreiner, Mrs. Simonin, and a new chairman, Mrs. J. Holcombe Genung, to whom the Diocesan Committee pledged its support and hearty co-operation. Mrs. Ingersoll, the retiring chairman, expressed her appreciation of the fine spirit of the whole committee in their loyal and interested service to the missions and institutions in the Diocese; and thanked them for the privilege of having served three happy years in that office.

The months between have brought us news of what is being done in the Diocese for the hard of hearing (the Rev. Gustave Mechling); and for the blind (Miss Lillie Rendell, herself a blind woman who, until very recently, worked under the City Mission, visiting the blind in their homes or institutions, teaching and reading Braille, and taking them out to church). Also an explanation of the value of Educational Week for the Blind (Mrs. Frederick Fox); and of the opportunity offered by the Red Cross to volunteers to make Braille books (Mrs. Van Meter).

The work of a woman's committee at both the James C. Smith Memorial Home at Oakbourne, and the Home for Consumptives, Chestnut Hill, although not yet units, were reported.

Mrs. Henry D. Jump, our chairman for Prison Work, keeps us in touch with what she is doing at Moyamensing.

It was with great regret that we accepted the resignation of Miss E. Gwen Martin as Field Secretary. We were sorry to have another link broken with the past but we record with much appreciation her loyal and devoted work and interest for many years. Mrs. J. Burriss West was appointed to fill her unexpired term as registrar.

As an expression of her continued interest and care for the affairs of the Diocesan Committee, Miss Martin and a friend gave a song recital for any emergency needs of the committee. \$228.50 was cleared and is to be divided among the "special" needs of the foreign born, colored, and white work.

We have an average attendance of 109, representing an average of 68 parishes. If this committee is to shoulder our diocesan responsibility towards the missions and institutions adequately, we must bring to every parish and mission the information and inspiration to be derived from our meetings together on the first Wednesday of each month.

## EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

It seems very fitting that so many of the Educational Classes and Institutes should follow directly upon the service of Holy Communion. The classes are fundamentally based on the two Commandments on which hang all the Law and the Prophets. In the first we are told to love our God with all our heart and all our soul and all our mind; in the second we are told to love our neighbor as ourself. The study for which we prepare ourselves during the year and which comes to its climax during Lent is an attempt to love God with all our *mind*.

The faith which stands back of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council is not one that can be based purely on feeling; intelligent women today are called upon to use their minds to the best of their ability and to face fearlessly any problems of education, public health, child welfare, or the economic basis of our democracy.

The second part of our task is loving our neighbor. When our Lord was asked "Who is my neighbor?" He told the story of the Good Samaritan; the neighbor was the one who fell among thieves, the one in need.

Our study of Rural America this year has taken us to our neighbors in every sense of the word. They are close at hand and they are greatly in need. Our first task is to learn about them and their need; our second is to help in some way. The concrete expression of our interest and our love of our neighbor is the Mission Study Offering to purchase cars for the Missionary Diocese of Nevada.

There have been thirty-four Mission Study Classes and twenty-six Institutes and Special Meetings. Forty different leaders have been teaching classes and speaking on Rural America throughout the Diocese. The aggregate attendance at all meetings and classes was 3,718. The Mission Study Offering which goes to purchase a Station Wagon and a car for the Diocese of Nevada is \$1,018.15.

There are some high spots in the year's work that deserve special mention. The Convocation of Chester has more nearly covered all of its parishes in securing a class or meeting to study Rural America than any other Convocation. St. Elizabeth's Mission has reached a higher percentage of its membership than any other single parish. St. Martin's in the Fields had the largest offering.

The work of the League of Intercessors as an organization is limited to five stated meetings each year for special prayers and reports, and for the distribution of material to thirty-eight interested workers. During the past year we have sent out the Forward Movement booklets; a New Year's motto calendar; leaflets for individual use for the World Day of Prayer and Quiet Day; Christmas, Birthday, and Easter greetings; and the Bishop's annual Christmas letter.

The work of the individual members of our committee is, however, for more extended and personal and brings much cheer and friendliness. In addition to visits, (some women reporting as many as one hundred and fifty visits during the year) and correspondence, our workers endeavor to see that all the isolated receive their Christmas and Easter communions. Many receive Church Bulletins weekly, plants at Easter, and presents at Christmas. Magazines and books are widely distributed.

Our membership is now about 800 men, women and children, both white and colored. The chairman of each Convocation is interested in having our work among the isolated made a part of each Woman's Auxiliary program in every parish and mission in the Diocese.

The primary source of information about isolated people is, of course, the clergy. A few clergymen claim that this belongs to each parish or mission. Ideally this is true, but not every part of the Diocese can be sure of having a resident clergyman, or that he will have time or ability to find local leadership to carry on the work. But where parishes are active, it might help them to send a duplicate list of their isolated people to the League, for the information of the Bishop and to ensure a wider spread.

Our members are naturally of various types but all have one need in common—spiritual fellowship with Christ and His church. Many are undernourished spiritually because we have not shared with them the opportunities for spiritual growth which the Church provides.

During our ten years of service we have had the joy of providing artificial limbs, wheel chairs, radios; of supplying hospital treatment, clothing and blankets, books, pictures, financial aid, and of securing work for unemployed.

A lesson for each Sunday was sent monthly to 35 children, totaling 1,025 lessons. These have included the Children's Forwards "We Promise," "On Earth Peace," "Thoughts of God"; six lessons on "Rural Life Around the World"; leaflets, pictures, mimeographed lessons, question sheets, and personal letters to children and their mothers. Bibles were sent to those who had none. The Bishop's Christmas Letter, Christmas and Easter Cards were sent to each family.

At Christmas time three calls were made covering seventy miles.

All question sheets have been returned regularly, often accompanied with personal letters from children and their mothers.

When we started our second year last fall we were hearing from 50% of our people; now we are hearing from 100%.

The names of the children and their ages are sent to us by the Rector or Missionary in the parish nearest the district in which they reside.

Christmas gifts were given to all members of the school by: the Junior Auxiliary of St. John's, Lansdowne; the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Covenant; the Junior Members of the Church School of the Redeemer, Andalusia; Mrs. Charles Biddle; and the Woman's Auxiliary of Calvary, Germantown.

Literature and pictures have been donated by Holy Trinity Chapel; The Church of the Saviour; the Auxiliaries of St. Thomas, Whitemarsh, St. Mary's, Ardmore, and Christ Church and St. Michael's, Germantown.

The League, as well as I, wish to extend sincere thanks to all those who have been interested and have encouraged us in this work.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

The Woman's Christian Social Service Committee was organized in the fall of 1937 and held its first meeting December 8th. Subsequent meetings have been held on the first Wednesday of each month. Mrs. Hill as the organizer and chairman of this committee has been a great source of inspiration and pleasure to us all. The committee was started with an educational purpose rather than with active social work in view, in order that Christian women might be well informed on the engrossing economic and social problems of the day. A delegate from each parish was invited and all others who cared to attend were welcome. It is hoped that the public opinion formed in this way may have a far reaching influence in bringing in the Kingdom of Christ.

Dr. Almon Pepper, the National Secretary of the Department of Christian Social Service, addressed the first meeting on the ideals of Christian Social work. He invited co-operation with his department as did also Mr. Woodruff, the Chairman of the Diocesan Department of Christian Social Service, who addressed the second meeting. Mr. Woodruff gave us some idea of the great work of this Diocese in caring for the sick and needy, the aged and dependent through the various hospitals, homes, and other organizations. Two members represent the committee at the monthly meetings of this department and report on the activities of the standing committees.

Housing was our next program and we learned some of the problems of the National Housing Committee in Philadelphia in carrying out their slogan "Slums must go." Mr. Roake gave us some very tragic examples of the way the overcrowded conditions of South Philadelphia affect the health and morale of that section.

A representative of the Women's International League for Peace addressed us on the aims of that organization and what it has accomplished in bringing about international peace. As church women it was felt we could co-operate with them whole-heartedly in their work.

In April, Spencer Miller, a consultant in the Labor Division of the National Department of Social Service spoke to us on "Delinquency," an increasingly grave problem. In solving this as well as other social problems, prevention is more effective than any other device. The money now spent in the maintenance of prisons could be more economically and constructively spent for schools, churches, play grounds and other recreational agencies.

At our next and last meeting for the year we expect to discuss plans for next year's work. Mrs. Hill has felt that since this was a new committee, it was wise to make haste slowly and to feel our way. We look forward to next year with keen anticipation of new and interesting fields to explore.

727 yards of ribbon, lingerie tape, bobbin, elastic.

In addition to the above cuttings, the Supply Department used 702 garments from the shelves of the Unemployment Relief Committee, for which they paid \$185.93.

Last autumn when the requisitions for clothing, supplies, and money came to this department from headquarters in New York, the total value was \$400.00 above that of last year. When we asked Mrs. Hill, her reply was, "Go ahead and do it." Our campaign, asking each parish to give \$3.50 for the purchase of one blanket, we hope will take care of this, thus making the balance of our budget a surety.

As you have just read above, you have, through this department, sent 20 Personal Boxes to missionaries, 16 Christmas Packages to women missionaries, and supplies of clothing, bedding, hospital equipment, dispensary supplies, etc., to the 10 missions assigned to us this season.

The Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, Philadelphia General Hospital, Unit 1, continues its activities throughout the year, visiting in the wards, giving ice cream treats in the summer, and coffee in the winter.

Among the answers to appeals from the Social Service Department were: a surgical belt, a brace, a pair of special shoes, milk for a T.B. child, a pair of glasses, \$10.00 toward a picnic for Diabetic children, \$20.00 for supplementary food, and about five hundred new articles of baby apparel.

At Christmas, 850 patients were taken care of, besides fruit and toys given into the office.

Fourteen "Elizabeth Price Martin Memorials" (complete layettes) were given to worthy mothers. Every baby was visited after it left the hospital, when much material help was often given, such as Christmas baskets, coal, clothing, glasses, etc. \$33.00 rent was paid to keep a family from being removed by the constable. Glasses and teeth were furnished another mother.

There were many personal acts of kindness done by all of our faithful members.

We appreciate all the help and co-operation given by the various churches especially for the beautiful layettes.

We cannot keep Him just for ourselves but share with those who do not know this God, and so do our part to try to bring "The Kingdom of God on earth.

## UNITED THANK OFFERING

For the year 1937 the spring "in-gathering" amounted to \$14,725.00 and the fall one to \$17,096.33, a total of \$31,821.33. While I had hoped for between \$83,000.00 and \$85,000.00 for the Triennium, the amount presented in Cincinnati last October was \$80,152.25 for the three years 1934 to 1937. Pennsylvania again led the Church, but our gain over 1934 was far from spectacular, only \$2,370.15. It was not much of an increase, and I trust that my successor will have better luck for 1940.

During the Triennium we have added six parishes, two Junior Woman's Auxiliaries, and some members of the League of Intercessors to our list of contributors. Three parishes have renewed their contributions after a lapse of several years, but, unfortunately they are counter-balanced by three parishes who have not been heard from since 1934. They were small parishes or missions that gave in a desultory manner anyway, and finally gave up the struggle. We shall hope to hear from them again before long.

In closing my term of office as United Thank Offering Treasurer, I want to take this opportunity to thank all the parish treasurers who have worked hard and faithfully, and the members of the speaking committee who have helped me tremendously. The work has been a joy and an inspiration, and I want to extend to my successor every good wish and hope that she may get as much fun and pleasure out of it as I have. And may the \$158,000.00 that has come in during my six years, be increased to at least \$200,000 during her term as treasurer.

I leave the office with real regret for much that I had planned to do and that has been left undone; but with deep gratitude and humility for having learned in some small measure how to be truly thankful, and the joy of having a way to express that thankfulness and help to carry on God's work in the Mission Field at the same time.

## GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

A better mutual understanding and more cooperation between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society have been the watchwords of the past year—in all our relationships. To the cordial working together, which has long characterized our national boards, has been added in many dioceses, what we in Pennsylvania have also long experienced—representation on each other's Diocesan Board. The same subject of Mission Study, and the assuming of box work from your Supply Bureau, has long been the custom. To this we have now added—in Pennsylvania—two new ventures, a United Thank Offering Blue Box in each Branch—the contents to be given annually through the G. F. S. treasurer as a group contribution to the United Thank Offering, and second—a Diocesan set-up of Exchange Speakers who will give information to and learn about each other's work in the parish unit.

Thus we come to the point where I was privileged several years ago to beg you to begin—in your own parish. There is little reason today for group isolation in the Church. There must always be separation for activity according to age and interest, but no longer can we work in self-satisfaction and ignorance of what others are doing.

The Church needs and needs badly, a unity of effort and program, a training of new leaders, a new use of youthful energy and enthusiasm. To these the Woman's Auxiliary and the Girls' Friendly Society, working in mutual understanding, can make a contribution to the strength and purpose of women's work in the Church not possible from any other source today.

## THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The General Convention of last fall gave an impetus to the work of the Church Periodical Club which has lasted all through the year; the meetings have been held regularly, on the fourth Friday of each month, excepting in December, when owing to the nearness of Christmas, this meeting was omitted.

The speakers at these meetings have been: Deaconess Bedell, our own Mrs. Robert Frazier, Mrs. Wm. Speakman, the C. P. C. Provincial President, Mr. Paul Rusch, S. Paul's University, Tokio, Japan, and Captain Atkinson of the Church Army. These speakers have clearly shown the great need of help which the C. P. C. stands ever ready to give.

An added interest, this year, has been the fiftieth anniversary of the birth of the Church Periodical Club, when the Diocesan branches, all over the United States, have made earnest efforts to celebrate the event and to increase the Endowment Fund to \$50,000.00. The interest on this fund as well as the Library Fund to be used for the purchase of new books where needed, especially new text books for students.

The Pennsylvania Diocesan branch was able to send \$100.00 toward the Endowment Fund and, through the Secretaries, the sum of \$106.00 was sent to the Library Fund.



Pennsylvania's share in the list of books needed by Mr. Paul Rusch has been purchased and sent, one volume was given by the Girls' Friendly Society. In each book was pasted a C. P. C. bookplate with the name of donating Parish printed thereon.

The C. P. C. has been working on a list of books needed in St. Mark's School, Birmingham, Ala. So far, only about one half the number has been sent.

In the Annual Report of the National Office, it is interesting as well as pleasing, to note that Pennsylvania stands *first* in the number of magazines given in quantity, also *first* in the number of Institutions aided in the Diocese, and second in magazines being sent regularly.

A sad note during the year was the passing away of Mrs. Otto Heinigke, who had served the Club as National President for thirty years.

During the past year six new branches have been formed in our Diocese: Trinity, Coatesville; Church of the Atonement, West Philadelphia; St. Matthew's, Francisville; St. George's, Ardmore; St. Timothy, Roxborough; and Holy Trinity Memorial Chapel, Philadelphia.

The strengthening influence of these new branches is most encouraging, and the Church Periodical Club hopes the time is not far distant when every church and mission in the Diocese of Pennsylvania will have a C. P. C. branch.

### THE CONVOCATIONS

The women of the Diocese, in addition to the work carried on under the Woman's Auxiliary, are giving extensively to missionary work within the Diocese through the Woman's Aids of the six Convocations. Reports received from the six presidents show that, during the past year, \$5,164.06 have been given to Diocesan Missions; also, \$555.90 to Specials. These Specials include: Christmas Cheer for Children; Summer Outings; Needlework Guild; Work for Blind; House of Rest; Philadelphia General Hospital; Church Vacation Schools; a retired Priest; Cathedral League.

These Convocation groups comprise a large and faithful band of women who are actively carrying on the Missionary program of the Church within our Diocese.

## REPORT OF THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP

We have now been in residence in our new home, 2139 Locust Street, for about two years. The house has been of inestimable value in our work. During this year 274 girls have come under our care and we have had thirty-eight girls living in the house at different times and for varying lengths of time.

We gave two Christmas parties for our girls, one for the colored and one for the white. A Christmas tree and gifts with a Yule-tide talk by our Chaplain, the Rev. Mr. Gilbert, gave them and us much happiness.

Many meetings and conferences have been held at the home as well. Most of these 274 girls have had medical and hospital care, some have been psycho-analyzed. This last helps us to know what is best to do for the child. We must know whether she is capable of more schooling or whether she is better off with a job so we can start her on her way to take her place in society. The maternity cases are sent to the Sheltering Arms, a few to the Salvation Army Hospital, then we take up again with a decently long convalescence. We find employment for some, foster-homes for others, and a few we board while they are training for work.

The Episcopal Church has three splendid training schools. One in Valhalla, N. Y., one in Mamaroneck, N. Y., and one in Ralston, N. J. St. Mary's in Valhalla is especially forward looking and their training is along practical lines. Our girls mix with the high school children in that town so that they do not feel entirely isolated. We stress the preventive side and try to get the girls before any damage is done. The prevented cases go up to these training schools. Those with sex experience go to Slayton Farms.

We are often asked where our girls come from and what kind of girls they are. As to the latter all kinds, good families and bad families, a few in very good circumstances, many more in poor. They are referred to us by the Juvenile Court, Social Agencies, Ministers, Hospitals, and often by parents.

I extend to you a very cordial invitation to visit our home, 2139 Locust Street, to see for yourselves something of what we are trying to accomplish for these girls.
