EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

Our year was saddened at the start by the sudden, tragic deaths of Mrs. Frederick H. Howland, Mrs. Thomas McCrae and Mrs. Joseph Phillips, three faithful members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania. Mrs. McCrae had been head of the Supply Department for three years, giving it new energy and efficiency under her leadership; Mrs. Howland was president of her parish auxiliary and in charge of the knitting branch of the Supply Department at the time of her death; and Mrs. Phillips was president of her parish auxiliary. By a unanimous vote, the Executive Board decided to form a permanent memorial for these and other devoted Churchwomen, in a Book of Remembrance patterned after a similar book in Canada in which Mrs. McCrae had been much interested. In this book, the names of deceased Churchwomen will be inscribed, each with an appropriate Bible verse; gifts of money accompanying the names will be used in missionary work. It was voted that this memorial be established, and a committee was appointed, consisting of Mrs. John Gibbon, Chairman; Mrs. Francis Packard, Mrs. George B. Roberts and Miss Louisa Phillips, to draw up plans for this book. At the Woman's Auxiliary Annual Meeting on April 23rd, the beautifully bound and inscribed Book of Remembrance was presented. The cost of the book had been given by friends of Mrs. Howland, Mrs. McCrae and Mrs. Phillips, to whom it was dedicated by Bishop Taitt at the United Thank Offering Spring In-Gathering Service. The names of Mrs. John Markoe, Mrs. J. Willis Martin and Miss Elisabeth Mockridge are to be the first ones inscribed in the book. The whole Woman's Auxiliary is grateful to Mrs. Gibbon and her committee for their fine work in making the Book of Remembrance so beautiful in form and context, and they were asked to continue for another year the work of inscription and administration of this living tribute to the Christian lives of their fellow-members.

The Executive Board is most grateful to Mrs. William Kent for her splendid work in administering the Supply Department of which she has been in charge since Mrs. McCrae's death. At the April meeting of the board, Mrs. Edward C. Page and Mrs. Rowland Evans were introduced to us, and were appointed Supply Secretary and Supply Treasurer respectively to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. McCrae. Mrs. Page and Mrs. Evans were elected to these two offices at the Annual Meeting. During the past year, the board asked the Supply Shop to stress mission-made goods and to stock up with them whenever possible in preference to commercial goods; though the shop derives more profit from the sale of the latter, the board feels that we should do everything to encourage and help our missions and their work.

At the October meeting, the Executive Board, "for the sake of more perfect cooperation," requested that the Department of Religious Education be represented on the Woman's Auxiliary Executive Board by its Field Secretary. This invitation was most graciously accepted by the Department of Religious Education, which was represented at each following board meeting by Miss Beryl Newman (in Miss Elizabeth Frazier's absence) who brought us interesting reports from her department. Also in the field of education, "as a demonstration," the board (at the October meeting) made itself responsible for a salary of \$50 per month from November 1st, 1939, to January 1st, 1941, for Miss Dorothy Kohl's work for the Church School by Mail, which has already increased from 40 to 212 in membership. To run the Educational Conference this Fall, the following committee was appointed:

Mrs. Grant Beath, Chairman, (Mrs. Edward Ingersoll and Mrs. John A. Slemmons ex officio), Mrs. A. Moseley Hopkins, Jr., Mrs. Thomas Budd, Mrs. Joseph Myers, Mrs. Earl T. Stockton and Mrs. Granville Taylor. The conference will open with a Communion service on Tuesday, October 29th, at 10 o'clock at Holy Trinity Church, followed by a session in Holy Trinity Parish-House from 11 to 1 o'clock. On Wednesday, October 30th, the Mission Study Session will be held in Holy Trinity Parish-House at 10.30 o'clock. The conference will close with a dinner at the Penn Athletic Club at 6.30 o'clock on Wednesday, October 30th.

Mrs. William Jefferys and Mrs. Welsh Strawbridge were elected to serve next year as our official representatives on the Women's Interdenominational Union Board.

At our February meeting, we were asked to consider the three questions sent to us by Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce of the National Council. The consensus of our opinions was incorporated in Mrs. Ingersoll's answer to this letter, as follows:

Question I. Should lay employees of non-profit organizations be included in the provisions of the Social Security Act?

Answer I. There was a predominant belief that lay employees of the Church should be included in the provisions of the Social Security Act, thereby giving them the protection secured to other workers; that the alarm of entangling alliances with the State was ungrounded as they are not being dealt with as the Church, but as individual citizens of a non-profit organization. Also, that if the Church does not accept this plan for old age security, we are obliged to provide some other, thereby removing the present discrimination.

Question II. Should we give greater cooperation to interdenominational agencies through increased appropriations for the Foreign Missions Conference and authorized consultation with other boards about policy in mission fields?

Answer II. We said that we felt the need and "expressed the desire for greater cooperation with interdenominational agencies" in national as well as local opportunities, as a means of better understanding what Christian unity would mean. We moved to follow up our membership in the local Women's Interdenominational Union with more active participation, and urged that parishes also become members.

Question III. Desirability of increased missionary giving for 1940, because, if additional pledges are not in prospect by the February 15th meeting of the National Council, it must act decisively.

Answer III. The Diocese reports a \$4000 increase in Expectations for 1940, some part of which we believe can be traced to the effort of our informed and interested women. We are happy to undertake, on our own initiative, to raise an additional \$2000 for the general Church missionary work for 1940.

We made this pledge of \$2000 (or more if possible) because of the sums we anticipate through the very generous offer of Henry A. Dreer, Inc., to give the Pennsylvania branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for a year 10% of the money that we, our friends and Garden Clubs spend for seeds, plants and everything else listed in their 1940 catalogue. The Woman's Auxiliary Office has special stickers for us to mail or present when we make our pur-

chases by mail or in person. Dreer will also give us this 10% rebate on telephoned orders, if the Woman's Auxiliary is mentioned.

This year, through the generosity of Mr. Roger K. Nevius of Heins & Co., the books of our Treasury and all the committees were audited free of charge. At the Annual Meeting, our very capable Treasurer, Mrs. Jasper Nicolls, was re-elected for a term of three years.

At the April meeting, the following delegates and alternates were elected to go to the Triennium of the Woman's Auxiliary at the General Church Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, in October:

Delegates: Mrs. Edward Ingersoll (President, Woman's Auxiliary); Mrs. John E. Hill (Provincial Representative); Mrs. John A. Slemmons (Educational Secretary); Mrs. Francis R. Packard (United Thank Offering Treasurer); Miss Julia E. Hill (Chairman, Junior Woman's Auxiliary).

Alternates: Mrs. Marmaduke Tilden (Vice-Chairman-at-Large, Woman's Auxiliary); Mrs. William Jefferys (Chairman of Committee for Colored Work); Mrs. Edward C. Page (Vice-Chairman for Supply Department); Mrs. James T. Davis (Field Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary); Miss Ray Phillips (United Thank Offering Treasurer, J. W. A.).

Next year, the Devotional Chairman, Mrs. Hunsicker, plans to hold the Quiet Days in the Bishop's Chapel at the Church House. Other changes in plan for next year are that the Woman's Auxiliary Office will be open from September 1st, until the end of June, and will be closed on Saturday mornings. And, finally, the Executive Board has decided to meet on Tuesday, October 22nd, and thereafter on the *first* Tuesday of *each* month from 10 to 1 o'clock, instead of the bi-monthly all-day meetings tried out this year.

Increased interest in the four-fold program of the Woman's Auxiliary—worship, study, service and gifts, has been shown this past year!

It is an outstanding fact that we have come closer together in corporate worship. On two Sundays set aside during the year each group in the diocese had a corporate communion in its own parish, all groups offering special prayers together.

All but two of our branches had mission study classes and our share in the diocesan offering was greatly increased this year. A special evening meeting was held in connection with the Educational Conference when we were addressed by the Rev. George F. Nostrand of Montclair, New Jersey, a delegate to the World Conference of Christian Youth at Amsterdam, Holland last summer.

Our monthly diocesan meetings at the Church House were extremely well attended and continue to be of educational value. The theme chosen for the year was "Christ and World Community", and each month different phases of this absorbing topic were spoken of and deeply considered. There were two outstanding meetings which brought definite action. One was addressed by Dr. Gertrude K. Pollak, a Viennese refugee, when we considered inter-racial understanding. As a result of this meeting \$20.00 worth of refugee stamps were sold for the Episcopal Committee and Dr. Pollak was entertained by many of our groups. The second meeting was addressed by Miss Clare Zelle, Chairman of the Evening Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary, who addressed us as an observer at the World Conference for Christian Youth at Amsterdam, Holland; her subject was "Church Unity through Ecumenical Movements." The result of this meeting was our seeking membership in the Woman's Interdenominational Union of Philadelphia, with Miss Gladys Rondinella as our representative.

Cheering the shut-in and less fortunate continues to be the main task of our social service department. Parties, visits and special gifts mount to an amazing sum. The February issue of the Church News contains a complete report of the Christmas work done by all junior parish groups in the diocese.

The year has brought about greater cooperation with young people's organizations within the diocese and we hope this may continue in a greater fellowship in the coming year.

The Executive Board has tried to reach some of our rural auxiliaries that find it impossible to attend our monthly diocesan meetings. One successful meeting was held at St. James', Downingtown and it was thrilling to hear what their active young group is doing. A similar meeting will be held this fall at St. Luke's, Newtown.

The card party given for Christian social service, our first attempt at a social event, was a success socially and financially, for which we are most proud. Some of the money was designated to Christian social service in our diocese, nation and world with a reasonable balance left in the fund we have now started for this work.

The board deeply regrets the retirement of two of its active and inspiring members, Mrs. Thomas Budd and Miss Miriam Hussey. We have learned to respect their valuable opinions and we trust their efforts will be further extended in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The result of this increased activity has been the addition during the year of nine new groups to our ever increasing number making a total of thirty-five groups on our roll.

In the coming year we wish to see a Junior Woman's Auxiliary in every parish, an increased attendance at summer conferences and more worthwhile programs, and a strengthening of our spiritual lives that we may be more influential witnesses in the kingdom of God.

The winter of 1939-1940 was a good one for the Indians' Hope Association. Our interests and efforts were expended over a wide field.

In January we were able to report that \$5,250. had been raised in 1939 for both quota and special objects, with an extra \$300. for Dr. Burke's Memorial Fund. For this great effort and enviable result the delegates are to be congratulated.

The mission stations which serve the Indians of our country are varied and scattered. Among those stations we sent help to St. Mary's School at Springfield, South Dakota, and to St. Elizabeth's School at Wakpala, South Dakota, in the form of scholarships for Indian girls; to Bishop Roberts of South Dakota for repairs on buildings and for the salary of a Church Army worker; to the Good Shepherd Mission to the Navajos at Fort Defiance, Arizona; to the Rev. Frank Christian at Oneida, Wisconsin; to Bishop Kemerer for his Indian work in the Diocese of Duluth; to the San Juan Mission at Farmington, New Mexico; to the Rev. Hector Thompson at Ethete, Wyoming for maintaining a car for a visiting nurse.

In order to bring the work of these missions before us vividly, we have had speakers at our monthly meetings: Mrs. Robert Frazier, one time President of this Association, and Deaconess Adams from Wyoming; Miss Lena Wilcox from Farmington, New Mexico and Mrs. David Clark from South Dakota. We heard also from Mr. Lawrence Lindley of the Indian Rights Association and from Miss Ella Deloria, missionary at large, and daughter of the Reverend Philip Deloria, Bishop Hare's first Indian priest. We had two meetings illustrated by moving pictures, one given by Mr. John Burleson, son of the late Bishop Burleson, who showed us our Church's work in Alaska. The other was given by Sister Mary Kathleen and showed our work among the Oneida Indians near Lake Michigan.

Because of the consecration and enthusiasm of these speakers and workers we, as a committee, are inspired to continue our interest and efforts on behalf of the Indians of all tribes who now live among us as guests in the land which was once their own.

Our election comes every third April, and this year will see some changes in the officers of the Domestic Committee. It has been a great pleasure and happiness to be chairman, and a great deal of my pleasure has come from working with such capable officers. Indeed, all the committee have cooperated to the best of their ability, and I want to take this opportunity to thank them, one and all.

During the year, our First Vice Chairman, Mrs. John A. Slemons, retreated to the Third Vice Chairmanship, as she needed more time for her new duties as Educational Secretary. We were pleased not to lose her entirely, as we are proud to number her among our officers. Mrs. Edward Osborne Coates, our Second Vice Chairman, was obliged to resign on account of illness in her family, and it was with deep regret that we saw her go.* These two vacancies were filled by Mrs. John D. Samuel as First Vice Chairman, an office in which she has been a tower of strength to us all and by Mrs. James E. Aiguier as Second Vice Chairman. Mrs. Aiguier gave youthful enthusiasm to the work, and brought us as Aide, Mrs. Earl R. Snedaker, who has been faithful and capable.

For the year, we gave to the Quota \$4,686.12. Our pledge was \$5,000, so I must regretfully report that we fell short of our pledge by \$313.88. But I know that each member of the committee did all that she was able to raise the pledged money, and I am grateful to them. For Specials, we gave \$160.75, a gain over last year of \$69.75. For the coming year, we pledged \$5,000. The money we gave to the Quota went to Arkansas, Lexington, Kentucky, Nevada, North Dakota, El Paso, Texas, Western North Carolina, and Wyoming.

Our speakers for the year were: Rev. Robert H. Thomas of Waynesboro, Pa., Miss Agnes Hickson of North Dakota, Miss Isabel Wagner of Amherst, Virginia, Mrs. Robert Frazier of Wyoming, Miss Aline Cronshey of Bat Cave, North Carolina, Miss Mary Louise Wood of Callaway, Virginia, Miss Marie O. Turley of northern Indiana, and Rev. Hector Thompson of Ethete, Wyoming. All these were interesting speakers and well worth while.

Each meeting of the Domestic Committee was well attended and was enjoyed by us all.

Hats off to the delegates of the Foreign Committee and to the parishes for their valiant support this past year of 1939! Thanks to the Junior Woman's Auxiliary for their contribution of \$79.90! Thanks to all those who saved their pennies, \$451.36, over a half a mile of pennies, a splendid help! Thanks to my fellow officers for their work, and especially to a fine Treasurer, who closed the books on December 31st, 1939, with all pledges paid! For Quota \$5,083.70, for Specials \$525.00, total \$5,608.70! For the first time in many, many years the interest from our legacies was used not in a frantic effort to complete our pledges in the last days of the year, but as they were meant to be used, for some "special" need not included in the appropriations of the National Council. Look at the Treasurer's Report and see where all your money went!

The world needs the kind of help that Christianity alone can give. Whole mission fields are at stake to-day. The Presiding Bishop has urged the Church to "Go Forward". In response to this challenge, the officers and delegates of the Foreign Committee in January voted to increase our pledges for 1940 by 15%, and to assume a "special" pledge for the first time in more than ten years. This increased the budget by \$750.00. Five hundred dollars of this amount is for quota objects, St. Timothy's Hospital, Cape Mount, Liberia; and St. Theodore's Hospital, Sagada, Philippine Islands. Two hundred and fifty dollars is for a "special" object, for the support of the Rev. and Mrs. George B. Shriver, in Dornakal, India, our newest foreign missionary field.

We shall need to strive very hard to meet these obligations successfully.

Since last September 86 parishes have sent delegates to our meetings—one less than last year, most unfortunately.

February: Ven. Wm. T. Sherwood, Cuba.

March: Rev. F. W. Golden, Howes, Mexico.

April: Rev. Edmund Hsu, Nanking.

On April 30th a special and extra meeting was held at which Mr. Henry S. Azariah, the son of Bishop Azariah of Dornakal, spoke about the work there among the masses seeking admission to the Christian church. Mr. Azariah is taking a special course in agriculture at Cornell this winter. He is accompanied by his wife, and will return to India in the early summer to teach scientific agriculture to his own people. Following Mr. Azariah's address, Mrs. William W. Fuller showed the pictures she had taken during her visit with Mr. Fuller to India a few years ago.

The Field of Work: The Committee on Colored Work is designated by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese to assist the American Church Institute for Negroes and church work among the colored in 11 of the southern dioceses.

Our Speakers: Various aspects and developments of the work of the Institute have been presented to us during the past year by: Rev. Cyril Bentley, Associate Director, American Church Institute for Negroes; Rev. J. Alvin Russell, Principal, St. Paul's Normal & Industrial School, Lawrenceville, Va.; Mr. J. E. Blanton, Principal, Voorhees School, Denmark, S. C.; and Mrs. Fannie Gross, graduate, Bishop Tuttle Training School. To listen to such an outstanding person and speaker as Mrs. Gross makes one more fully appreciate the educative value of the Institute Schools.

The Rt. Rev. E. Thomas Demby, D.D., retired Suffragan Bishop for Negro Work in Arkansas and the Southwest, presented the progress and needs of the Church's work among Negroes in the southern dioceses.

Other speakers included: Rev. Robert W. Bagnall, President, Provincial Conference of Church Workers among Colored People, who gave a most interesting account of some of the "highlights" of this Conference which was held this year in Philadelphia; Mr. Harold Evans, United Charities Campaign representative; and the Rt. Rev. Douglas Wilson, D.D., Ass't. Bishop of British Honduras.

1939 Budget: \$3500 was allocated to the American Church Institute; \$650 to work in the southern diocese. Our "Specials" included: \$100 to St. Philip's Junior College, San Antonio, Texas; \$60 to Good Shepherd Hospital, New Bern, N. C.; \$59 to the Archdeacon Baskerville Fund. TOTAL BUDGET: \$4,369.00.

Steps Forward: The appointment of Mrs. Arthur Moore to serve on the Executive Committee, representing the colored parishes and missions; through her efforts, attendance from these parishes has increased.

To cooperate with the Diocesan Committee, at our April meeting, it was unanimously voted to hold our meetings beginning October next, on the first Wednesdays, 2:00 P. M.

Is It Worthwhile? Noteworthy to report is that the Fort Valley School, Georgia, because of its high standard of education and esteem of the surrounding community, has been taken over by the state and will thereby be

equipped to render a wider service. Our Church will continue to serve the students through a community center with resident chaplain.

An outstanding Presbyterian, distinguished in three continents for his service to education says: "The Institute and its schools have in my opinion rendered a greater service to negroes and to better race relations than any other single agency."

The Diocesan Committee completed another year functioning as the one missionary committee operating at the doorsteps of the parishes. The delegates proved again the truth of the saying that to know is to act. As each month brought reports and inside stories from institutions, missions and organizations interest manifested itself through contributions of time and money for the various causes.

Knowledge concerning the vital question of Housing was enlarged by the Rev. Thomas A. Merywether's presentation of the relation of crime to bad housing. He is the able head of the Crime Prevention Committee in Philadelphia. Dr. Charles Hatfield was the speaker sent by the Red Cross in November and his reasons for the need of supporting this great organization fitted in with the lessons in Housing.

No more fortunate choice could have been found to give such a clear and concise picture of the Missions of the Diocese than Dean Willcox of the Convocation of Chester, who came and talked in December. In an endeavor to follow the gleam of service in another direction beyond the immediate surroundings, Mrs. Gertrude Pollak, a refugee from Austria, was asked to address jointly this committee and that of Christian Social Relations. As Mrs. Pollak touched on conditions in her native land she also gave a definite feeling of what we in this country can do for those groups forced to leave their homes and come to the comparative safety of the new world.

A phase of church work on the campuses of our colleges and universities was appealingly outlined by Canon Jacobson who has charge of work among Episcopalians at the University of Pennsylvania and is one of six ministers of different denominations who direct the Christian Association there.

Throughout the year the goal of keeping alive the twelve subcommittees formed last year has been in the thoughts and plans of this Diocesan group. Reports were given on different phases of housing, conditions at Moyamensing prison and progress of the fine work Dr. Emhardt is doing at the Pro-Cathedral with international groups. An all day outing for the Diocesan Committee is planned in June at Sleighton Farms and Glen Mills Schools. The immediate purpose of this visit is to learn at first hand of the conditions at these splendid institutions for delinquent and maladjusted boys and girls. A great hope is entertained that a fund can be started that will be increased eventually by other churches' giving to build a chapel at Sleighton Farms. Father Smith's talk inspired this proposed visit.

Besides the regular amounts contributed through the Quota, two specials were raised: scholarships for the Church Farm School and one month's salary for Miss Kohl, the head of the Church School by Mail. A revised system of bookkeeping, including a definite budget for the year, is in the plans for next year. Church women are urged to join any of the sub-committees that appeal to their special talents whether or not they are regular delegates to the Diocesan Committee. More opportunities for concrete work in these groups is also planned.

It was with regret that the resignation of Mrs. Alan Reed as first Vice-Chairman was accepted. She will continue to head the Committee on Housing. We are fortunate in having Mrs. George Trowbridge, the wife of the rector of St. Paul's, Chestnut Hill as one of the Vice-President's and Mrs. K. M. Irwin of St. Martin's, Radnor, as second Registrar. We welcome them with joy.

The officers wish to express their appreciation for the unvarying quality of hearty co-operation they have felt has been offered at all times from the delegates and their response is unhesitatingly "Forward".

The Field Department has devoted much time and thought during the past year as to the method of reaching all women of the Church, to arouse them to their great opportunity to share in working out a Christian answer to the world's need.

A survey has been made of all parishes. Personal visits have been made by me to auxiliaries, in an effort to arouse more enthusiasm. In several instances the interest has been so evident, I have been requested to send Mrs. Packard and the chairman of the Standing Committees to succeeding meetings, and the result has been very satisfactory.

Several branches of the Auxiliary have been revived and new ones formed, but we cannot report an auxiliary in every parish. However, through the efforts of the District Chairman, we do have the answer as to why some of our parishes do not have it's women organized as an auxiliary. These are comparatively few and the reasons are not unsurmountable, so there is hope for a hundred per cent in the near future.

Inspiration is always necessary to keep a group alive, and just to meet without any real understanding as to the work women are trying to do, becomes deadly dull. All women are anxious to give service, even to the extent of sacrifice, if they are aroused. This is only possible by either hearing a worker from the field, tell of his or her work, or by having someone bring the message to them. Parishes having delegates to the meetings of the Standing Committees receive this message. However, after making a survey of the parishes sending delegates (with the assistance of the registrars of the committees), we found the average number sending delegates, is 87, which is approximately 50%. What about the other parishes? How are they to receive their inspiration? We discovered the reasons for not sending delegates were chiefly two. Some auxiliaries, although they are within the city limits, find it impossible for their women to attend daytime meetings. In these cases we advised attendance at the meeting of the Evening Committee. The other group do not attend because of distance. The women feel they cannot travel so far for a meeting. Many have never had an opportunity to see the Church House. Distances have been carefully gone over, and a definite plan for these outlying sections will be put into action next year. Several auxiliaries, within a certain radius, will gather together, and a missionary meeting, with a speaker from the field, will be taken to them. One such meeting was held last year, and was a great success.

Reports of District Chairmen:

North Philadelphia—A meeting of officers was held in April at the Church of the Covenant, which was a benefit to all attending.

Church News: One of the excellent publicity channels through which to make your plans and activities known to the Diocese is the "Church News of the Diocese of Pennsylvania" with its 5,000 subscribers. As the editors are anxious that the Women's Auxiliary page be of real service in forwarding the diocesan and parish work of the Auxiliary, and as the page is being used more all the time, let us pause to ask a question:

"What is "news"?"

News is "recent tidings, information, intelligence." An event may have occurred a thousand years ago and still be "news", if it is being told for the first time. "Information, intelligence"—these mean, of course, keeping pace with developments of all kinds which affect us directly or indirectly. They may be insignificant things, but if they have a direct bearing on what we plan to do, they become important as news in direct ratio to their influence upon us.

In judging what is news, an editor must weigh these things as in his opinion, they affect the greatest number of his readers. Each item must be weighed against every other one, so that each may be treated in its proper relation to the mass of items that pour over his desk.

The reporter, often being closer to the event, sees it in larger dimensions, which frequently distorts his perspective and causes him to attach more significance to the story than it merits when considered in relation to all the stories gathered by his fellow reporters in the day's work."

Let us work in letter and spirit with the editors. The "dead line" for the "Church News" is the 10th of each month.

The goal is to have *every* woman sharing. It is difficult to determine what gain is made each year, as many parishes are not able to send in complete reports. According to the figures that are available and comparing 1939 to the previous year, 115 parishes increased the numbers of those sharing, the total being about 1,100—but others decreased approximately 500 making a real increase of about 600.

The amount of the offering was increased in 136 parishes. 51 parishes increased both in number of those sharing and in the amount given.

4 more than doubled the numbers
6 more than doubled the offering
3 more than doubled both

S. John, Concord reported that every woman who is an active member of the parish was sharing.

S. Paul's Chestnut Hill increased the offering over \$600.

The *total* was \$25,475.89, a gain of \$2,200 over 1939, but only \$1,075 over the same year of the previous Triennium.

They will endeavor to get the treasurers together in smaller groups to discuss ways of strengthening and broadening the work.

The 50th Birthday was celebrated by having the Fall Presentation Service in the evening, at S. Mark's Church—it was most inspiring and very well attended. Also many parishes had a special U. T. O. service the first Sunday in October.

A beautiful poster was painted for us by Mrs. Mildred Buckley Klammer, which has been printed and is for sale at the Church House. Miss Emilie Buckley, Mrs. Klammer's sister, originated a novel and most interesting U. T. O. entertainment which consists of fascinating water colors of 10 mission fields with a short description mentioning the U. T. O. workers in each field. For a nominal sum of \$1.00 to cover expenses, Miss Buckley will be glad to take it to any group.

The Spring Presentation Service was held in Holy Trinity Church. We are deeply grateful to the Bishop and the rectors of both Holy Trinity and S. Mark's for their gracious cooperation.

Over 2,000 of the new Blue Boxes were distributed, besides several thousand leaflets. Nearly 300 copies of the September issue of the "Spirit of Missions" were sold.

A business meeting for treasurers was held in February.

I trust that more and more we have learned to follow the 50th anniversary text—"I thank my God on every remembrance".

The Rev. Thomas A. Meryweather opened the Fall meeting of the League with a Corporate Communion in the Bishop's Chapel, with special prayers for our isolated and for those who had died during the year. In his talk he reminded us that the isolated and lonely are not cut off from everything by their own wish and surely this visiting and carrying cheer to them is the essence of Christianity.

The meetings are begun in the Bishop's Chapel by Sister Mary Kathleen, devotional chairman, reading the intercessions for the sick and troubled, whose names are given her by the various chairmen.

The League brings personal interest through calls on the sick, lonely and isolated, and distributes to them helpful literature—Forward Movement booklets, leaflets for the World Day of Prayer, Prayers New and Old, Quiet Day booklets, Birthday, Easter and Christmas cards, and always the Bishop's Christmas letter.

The "Match Box Fund" aided substantially in the purchase of an artificial leg for a young woman who had been in the hospital for several years.

We have aided Miss Dorothy Kohl in her work in the Church School by Mail, having adopted three children, sending three dollars a year for each child for lesson material. The "Match Box Fund" is now used for the same purpose. Many of the auxiliaries have given scholarships, but many more are needed and we will gladly send a speaker to any auxiliary wanting to hear more on this subject.

The League is financed by the Woman's Auxiliary and individual contributions.

Our chairman, Deaconess Alice Nutter has been ill, but with care we hope she will be entirely recovered.

Hospital Wards: The regular visiting continued as usual in the Men's Nervous, Women's Nervous, Medical Annex, Women's Surgical, Metabolic, Tubercular and Maternity Wards. Treats of ice cream in summer, coffee, buns and fruit in winter. Many special personal requests granted.

Appeals from Miss Loretta M. Johnson (Supervisor of Nursing) for drinking glasses, paper cleansing tissues, overcoats, clothing, magazines, playing cards, games and plants received generous responses from numerous churches.

Appeals from Miss Eleanor J. Eldridge (Supervisor of Social Service) for two pairs of special shoes for diabetic patient, several pairs of spectacles, board paid for a blind patient while waiting for adjustment of Old Age Pension, and warm bed clothing for a poor mother were supplied.

Maternity Department: Many layettes and large quantities of new infant garments were donated by auxiliaries, and dozens of infant blankets and shirts purchased by the League were given to the needy. Each layette is taken to the home of the baby selected and conditions of home appraised. Many times, food and warm clothing have been supplied, coal bought, rent paid, furniture secured, and, highest of all our aims—the family affiliated with a church.

Christmas Cheer: 985 packages were distributed to the patients, and crates of oranges, bushels of apples and toys to the Office.

Dr. William G. Turnbull personally appealed to the League for a motor corps service. It is of vital need to further the work of the hospital. Former patients and special treatment patients must be taken to convalescent homes. Many are without means or friends to render this type of service. Here is a golden opportunity for real Christian service. The corps is in the early stage of organization and interest in it is growing.

The work of the unit has grown considerably during the past year, adding greatly to the joy and comfort of all connected with the hospital. The unit has also grown in numbers, thereby creating interest in our hospital throughout the diocese. The work is carried on through the several committees and each member has a particular interest in the work.

The Library Committee is of great value, and, with the splendid Volunteer Unit, brings cheer and happiness to the sick and infirm. The unit gave \$25.00 to purchase cut-out and paint books for the children. Forward booklets are also given to the patients.

Through the House Committee, a piano and song-books brought happiness to the internes. A sitting-room in the Outpatient Department was also furnished. Two subscriptions to the Art Alliance were renewed.

A course on Infant Care has been a great help to the hospital and nurses, as well as being splendid training for the girls who volunteered for the course. \$100.00 was given to buy material, also ready-made "sleepers" and necessary clothing for the Children's Ward. Humidifiers have been installed on the Maternity Floor, through the assistance of the unit.

The Harrison Home patients have been made happier in many ways: new lockers placed for the patients, treats of candy and ice cream, also coach rides and trips to see the Christmas decorations. A concert by the Feltonville String Band brought joy to Harrison Home. Many gift bags were given the men and women there at Christmas.

The Occupational Therapy Department is working hard to be of greater service to the hospital. Money is made by saving tinfoil; interest is always taken in the Emergency Aid Bazaar and \$10.00 given towards the cafeteria.

The Grounds Committee has done a splendid job in beautifying the hospital grounds, and this work will speak for itself in years to come. Many rose bushes and shrubs have been placed this year.

The Shop has undergone a complete renovation, and is a bright and important spot in the hospital. A new line of gifts, toys, cards, personal stationery and many other useful articles have been added to the stock. Volunteers help carry on this work on Visiting Days. Beautiful Christmas and Easter cards are always placed on the patients' trays.

The May Fete is always an affair that the whole hospital and diocese looks forward to. This was more colorful this year, and, in spite of the weather, was a great success. It is the hope of the committee that every Episcopalian in the diocese will save the last Wednesday in May each year, and make the May Fete a great success for the years to come.

The Winter program started with a day's retreat, conducted by the Rev. Edmund Wood of St. Timothy's Church, Roxborough. This retreat was the first held at the new Diocesan Retreat House, and we were happy to enjoy the hospitality of the Sisters of St. Margaret.

The Mothers' Union is composed of about 100 members divided into 3 parish branches, and members at large who belong in 12 more parishes of the diocese. No attempt has been made to form branches in parishes as it was thought better this first year of functioning as a Woman's Auxiliary committee to grow as a diocesan rather than a parish organization. In order to put our objectives and work before the women, your chairman has spoken to diocesan committees, a class in the Winter Conference and on a parish program. There have been seven open meetings during the year with speakers, at the Church House. Considerable inspiration was had when we were visited by Mrs. Remsen Ward, an officer from the London headquarters last May. These opportunities draw us closer together in our common task.

New members received during the year were received by the Rev. Richard Morris in the Bishop's Chapel in the Church House, with the exception of the last two who were received at St. Mark's Church on the Feast of the Annunciation.

Our year closed with a Corporate Communion of over 50 members on the Feast of the Annunciation, which is the day specially celebrated by Mothers' Union all over the world. At that time we were the guests of the St. Mark's branch for breakfast. Mrs. John E. Hill and Miss Julia Hill spoke on Mothers' Union and the Fellowship of Marriage in the Auxiliary.

Anticipating the program of the Triennial with its emphasis on strengthening Christian Family Relations, we have written Mothers' Union, London, asking to be relieved of our financial obligations to the Church of England. While retaining Mothers' Union objectives and requirements of prayers and membership, we will be more free to be of value to the women of our country and to cooperate with the Woman's Auxiliary.

In closing this report, may I recommend that next year we make a definite plan to develop parish branches through the initiative of our members at large, as well as reaching out to parishes where as yet there is no visible indication of interest.

The Department of Religious Education is working more closely each year with the Woman's Auxiliary. There is Woman's Auxiliary representation on the Department and Department representation on the Executive Board. With our offices on the same floor there is continual inter-change of resources and ideas. And this year we have co-operated on the specific project of Church School-by-Mail. We will give a full report of that preceded by some items from our Annual Report for 1939 which will be of interest to you.

Twenty-three hundred and one visitors to the office were recorded in 1939. They came for help along many lines—i. e., Church School; Young People; Adult Education; to borrow books from our Library or to purchase Forward Movement Literature, etc. The office had working contracts with 154 of the nearly 200 Church Schools.

The first Diocesan Summer Conference was sponsored by the Department followed by a Winter Conference. Both were received with enthusiasm in the Diocese. With the provincial conferences at Shrine Mont, Sweet Briar and Lawrenceville attendance totaled a little over 600.

Offerings from the Church Schools through the Lenten and Advent Offerings and the Christmas box totaled \$42,965.71 and 2420 gifts.

The Church School-by-Mail came under the Department of Religious Education in June 1938 from the Church League for the Isolated. Under Miss Dorothy Kohl as director it has steadily grown. At the Autumn 1939, meeting of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary it was voted to raise a salary for a full time worker from November 1, 1939, to January 1, 1941, to extend this work. Miss Dorothy Kohl was secured for this position and now being able to give full time the enrollment has increased rapidly. Here is Miss Kohl's report for 1939—(from January 1st to May 1st, 100 more have been enrolled.)

Twenty-three children were given us by Vicars; 6 by laymen, 32 were enrolled Jan. 1, 1939. 61 located by canvass between Nov. 1, 1939, and December 31, 1939. Total 141.

Two Confirmations; 14 gotten into our mission schools; 13 gotten into other Sunday Schools.

Lessons Mailed: A total of 2,897 lessons were prepared and mailed in monthly lots, accompanied by a question sheet and stamped envelope. These included Nursery, Beginner, and Primary printed Graded Series, Junior

printed Christian Living, Senior Work Books on the Bible, mimeographed Junior Life of Our Lord, typed Junior Office of Instruction, and typed Senior on the Prayer Book. Each lesson included a story, picture, Bible memory verse or Bible reading, a daily prayer, and questions.

1,196 question sheets were received, (over 80% of those sent out) corrected and returned. 10 Bibles, 5 Prayer Books, 20 Thoughts of God books, and 102 Forwards were mailed.

Correspondence: A total of 194 letters were mailed to children and publishing houses; 51 scholarship letters were written, and 200 promotional letters.

Promotional: 31 Conferences and miscellaneous contracts were made; 13 speeches were made at Woman's Auxiliary Branches and Church Schools; 1 pamphlet was printed; 3 articles written for the Church News, and 3 type-written articles mailed to Auxiliary chairmen and clergymen.

Visits: Volunteer drivers are being solicited to drive the worker to visit country schools and far-off families to find children needing us.

Work in the Girls' Friendly Society is as fascinating as a Cruise round the world, for the sun never sets on the Friendly. Organized branches are active in every country where either the Protestant Episcopal Church or the Church of England exists. Only last year members from Australia and China dropped in at our Council meetings to exchange greetings and ideas. From personal contact we realized once more, that girls of every race are alike in their hopes and ideals. A Girls' Friendly Society commendation letter can precede a member to any country where she may be bound, thereby assuring her a welcome and interested guidance and friendship. The Branch President of our newest Branch told me last month that she was met at the dock in New York on her arrival from England. Now she is desirous of the same opportunities of friendship for her own daughter.

In our country there are some 25,000 members of the organization, of which number 2500 are active in the 51 Branches and 39 Candidate groups of this Diocese. The object of the Girls' Friendly Society is "to unite for the glory of God in one fellowship of prayer and service the women and girls of the nation to uphold the Christian standard of honor and morality." An organization with such ideals does not compete with other groups, but strengthens them.

The Girls' Friendly Society is one avenue through which the Church can reach many types of girlhood, and help them to better know the way of Life. Membership may be varied, according to the special needs of any parish, to include Candidates from 5 to 12, the teen-age girl, and the business girl. Any one or all of these may form a Branch.

The membership includes girls of all denominations, girls from all types of homes, girls of all races, and girls of varying types of communities, always under the guidance of a Church woman.

The program is a free, creative one, based on the interests and needs of the girls, and the social and religious needs of the day. It is a balanced program of service, study, worship, and fellowship.

The Friendly is training girls for active leadership in the Church and community by strengthening the religious life of its members, by work for missions and for Altar Guilds, by teaching in Church Schools, by social service work, by study of social issues, and by the practice of self-government. Doctor Adelaide Case has said: "Besides providing material and offering a fellowship the G. F. S. is training a specialized lay leadership for the Church."

Underlying all this fine program and organization work is the deep unfailing relationship between the individual girl and her Associate or Branch

President, who is always a devoted Church woman to whom the girl may go at any time with her most trying problems. This association in many instances lasts a lifetime, and long after all other group contacts have been lost.

Those of you who are fortunate enough to have in your parish an active alert Branch of the Friendly will bear me out in all my statements and will endorse my belief that the G. F. S. should be an integral part of every parish program.

Bishop Page of Michigan has said "The G. F. S. in my Diocese is part of our technical method of organization. Whenever we establish a new mission we start a branch of the G. F. S. and we also establish a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. They are working in one with the other. I want to express my conviction that the G. F. S. has found the way to deal with young folks better than any organization in the Church, because it has evolved a sound method of adult leadership and supervision."

In the Diocese of Vermont, Western Virginia, Texas and Missouri the Woman's Auxiliary forms Branches of the Friendly and furnishes leaders for them. We would welcome a leader from your members in every parish of the Diocese where there is not already a Branch. At the present time we are training a corp of eight young women to act as field secretaries who will supervise work in various new groups where the clergy request their assistance.

In closing I would commend the G. F. S. to you in the words of our Presiding Bishop, Henry St. George Tucker:

"It is urgent that the Church attack fundamental issues in its work with young people, helping them to see Christianity's answer to the evils disturbing the world. Do not think our boys and girls are too young; they are already exposed to every form of propaganda and to conflicting claims on their loyalties. It is one of our most pressing tasks to present the teaching and claims of the Christian faith in a way they can understand. One organization that is attempting to do just that is the Girls' Friendly Society. It is aiding children and girls to build Christian character, to discover the message of our Lord to a divided world, to form loyalties and convictions on which they can act. Such an effort to reach young people, at this critical period, deserves serious support."

The Church Periodical Club has had an interesting and encouraging year. The monthly meetings have been held regularly, five of these business meetings have had a social side as well, three were followed by luncheons, one was preceded by a luncheon and the other was followed by a tea. All have been the means of coming into closer fellowship with each other and we find them of value.

Aside from our regular book and magazine work, we have been able to subscribe to magazines for the Philadelphia Divinity School and for two college centers, the students being most appreciative, financial aid has also been given for books for St. Philip's Junior College, San Antonio, Texas, St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyoming, and to the American Library in St. Paul's University, Tokyo, Japan.

To missionaries in the field have been sent many new books, titles chosen by them, which have been of great assistance in their work.

Much interest is being shown in the appeal for books for the new library in Tucker Lodge, Shrine Mont, Orkney Springs, Va., this, coming as a tribute to our presiding bishop, should be met by a book from every church and mission in the diocese.

273 institutions in our own diocese have been aided and outside our diocese, 95 institutions have been helped.

Five new branches have been added to our list, we are hoping for that number to be doubled and trebled during next year; there is great need for more branches to take care of books and magazines going to waste throughout the diocese.

The C. P. C. has been saddened during the year by the death of two of its valued secretaries, Mrs. Wilhelmina Bosch, parish secretary for S. Giles, Stonehurst and Miss Mary H. Morrell, parish secretary S. Peter's, Philadelphia. Both members were most faithful and conscientious in their duties; the torches they were forced to lay down have been taken up by very efficient successors, appointed by the rectors of the two churches.

THINGS TO KNOW

1. Subscribe to the Woman's Auxiliary News at the Woman's Auxiliary Office. It is 25 cents a year, from October through May; no subscriptions carried over. This will keep you in touch with the plans of the committees.
2. Subscribe to the Church News of the Diocese of Pennsylvania at the Church News Office at the Church House. Yearly subscription is \$1.00. This will keep you in close touch with the things going on in your Diocese.
3. Subscribe to "Forth," \$1.00 a year. Address: 281 Fourth Ave., New York City. This magazine vividly portrays the Church in action in all its branches and will bring you in close touch with the happenings in the domestic and foreign fields.
4. The United Thank Offering presentation: first Thursday in May. Fall In-Gathering: first Thursday in November.
5. Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese: fourth Tuesday in April.
6. The Educational Conference gives the women of the Diocese of Pennsylvania their send off for the year. It will be held October 29th and 30th, 1940. Be sure your Auxiliary does its part in attendance, suggestions and committee work.
7. The best training for officers is to be found at Summer Conferences. Your auxiliary should try to send delegates to Orkney Springs (Woman's Auxiliary Conference), the Diocesan Conference at Ursinus, Pa. (elementary), or the Advance Conference of the Province of Washington, at Sweet Briar, Va. (advanced).
8. Every organization should have up-to-date By-Laws. The Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary By-Laws can be secured at the Woman's Auxiliary Office for 5 cents.
9. The secretary of parish branches should send the names and addresses of new officers to the Woman's Auxiliary Office, 202 South 19th Street as soon as elections or changes take place.
10. Treasurers should pay out funds only by vote of the organization, recorded by the secretary. Accounts should be audited annually.
11. Checks for the Diocesan Auxiliary should be made payable to Evaline T. Nicolls, Treasurer, and sent to Mrs. Jasper W. Nicolls, Plymouth Meeting, Pa.; for the five committees checks should be made to the treasurer of the committee for which the money is intended, and mailed directly to her, and not to the Auxiliary Office.
