ANNUAL REPORT

In the spring, we bring our winter's work to an end with a brief report, at the Annual Meeting, by the chairman of each department or committee, to whom we have committed the responsibility for that particular activity.

These reports you will find, ably covered elsewhere in this Annual Report under their separate titles, the work of 213 branches, including Junior Woman's Auxiliary groups and Evening groups in 162 parishes and missions with at total of \$54,881.62. There is also a valuation of \$9,715.63 placed on the Sewing and Box work done by the parishes and missions. There are a few changes in organization and other matters, however, that I feel I must review briefly. One was the appointment of Mrs. William H. Jefferys in October, as Educational Secretary to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. John A. Slemons, who in turn was filling the unexpired term of Mrs. Thomas L. Harris, which will expire in 1942. This for the matter of record.

Another, the consolidation of an effort to stress the importance of Christian marriage and family life (which had been organized and known as the Mothers' Union) with the work already being carried on in the Auxiliary to create Christian public opinion in our other social relations. This consolidation is now to be known as the Department of Christian Social Relations as proscribed in the new By-Laws. It is very important that your parish be represented by a regular delegate (as in the five missionary committees) at these meetings, the third Wednesday afternoons at 2 P. M. in the Church House. Another, is the change in the By-Laws. In accordance with the requirements "at a stated meeting of the Executive Board, by a two-thirds vote, providing the amendments were submitted in writing at the previous meeting" certain amendments were voted. In general, it brings our Diocesan branch in line with the set-up of the National Council, to which we are Auxiliary, in establishing the same five departments: Missions, Christian Education, Christian Social Relations, Promotion, Finance. It provides for a change in time of Executive Board meetings, it permits the representation on the Executive Board of additional Co-operating Agencies, the Department of Religious Education and the Daughters of the King; it provides for the staggering of the election of officers; it outlines clearly the duties of the Departments and creates a vice-president in charge of each; it provides uniform terms for elections and appointments; it also provides for some committees which were functioning without official provision such as the Christian Family and Social Relations, the Diocesan Evening Branch and the Book of Remembrance. The only change which in any way affects the former allocation of responsibility is that the social service and diocesan institutions, now become the responsibility of the Department of Christian Social Relations instead of the Diocesan Committee, which now becomes charged with the interest and support of the fifty-one missions in the diocese.

Another is the Church School by Mail. It was started as an activity of the Auxiliary and the salary of the worker, Miss Dorothy E. Kohl, for 1940, was paid by the Auxiliary to demonstrate the need in this diocese for such a service. It has now been taken over by the Diocesan Department of Religious Education but we urge your continued interest and support for both the \$3.00 scholarships and the volunteer motor drivers which have made much of Miss Kohl's work in the field possible. To date there are 245 children on the roll with 75 to 80% of lessons being returned for correction.

The Book of Remembrance, that beautifully bound and illuminated book which was presented to the Womans' Auxiliary just a year ago to-day, dedicated to the loving memory of three diocesan officers, Mrs. McCrae, Mrs. Howland and Mrs. Phillips has been placed on a lectern in a wonderful plexiglass case to preserve it from dust and careless handling, in the Library of the Church House. Those of you who have never seen it might stop in some day and see what a lovely memorial can be made in this way to those women whose witness in their life must ever be an inspiration to us all. Seventeen names have already been inscribed in it and gifts totaling \$1,006 accompanying these names have been forwarded to the Church Farm School, Supply Department, Indian's Hope Asso. for Fort Thompson in So. Dakota, Bishop Beecher, United Thank Offering, Deaconess Retiring Fund, Christ Church, Mrs. Blake's United Thank Offering work in Wyoming, Mrs. Grafton Burke for Alaska and the Committee for Negro Work. Application blanks will be found in the Auxiliary office for anyone wishing to place a name in this Book of Remembrance.

The Diocesan Evening Branch, for business and professional women and others, was re-organized a year ago, to meet the need of parish evening groups to keep in touch with the diocesan organization for worship, study, service and gifts and also to give the individual woman a chance to participate in the Church's program where there is no evening group in her parish. It is important that this opportunity be made known to all the women in your parish and that a delegate is sent to these meetings, the second Wednesday evenings at 8 P. M. in Holy Trinity Parish House. In regard to our Provincial responsibility: the Synod will be held in Washington, D. C. on October 1, 1941. Pennsylvania's dues have been raised to \$50. a justifiable raise as all the other twelve dioceses in the Third Province took a proportionate raise too. We pay \$20. a year for 1939, 1940, 1941, our share of the Provincial Project, the hospital at Cape Mount, Liberia.

I want you to know of the Volunteer Bureau for Home Defense and community agencies being developed by the Emergency Aid. It is hoped to concentrate all requests for workers and all volunteers in one place. The Woman's Inter-denominational Union is a member organization embracing all the Protestant church women so if any member of our Church wants to volunteer for such work she should register with the Emergency Aid, 20th and Sansom Sts. as a member of the Woman's Inter-denominational Union (Episcopal).

The Triennial meeting in Kansas City, sent us home committed to several things, to be briefly mentioned in this report.

1. Forward in Service, the Presiding Bishop's 10 year plan to re-vitalize the Church for more faithful witness. The Woman's Auxiliary pledged their loyalty and co-operation in the development of this plan which Dr. Arthur H. Sherman, presented to the women of our Auxiliary in March, when forty parishes were represented with an attendance of sixty-nine women. I feel sure that in every parish that is taking part in this great revival, the women will be found fulfilling their pledge of support.
2. The importance of the Unified Parish Program as stressed in Kansas City, has been followed up by a course on ways and means of unifying a parish at both the Diocesan and Winter Conferences, at the request of the Auxiliary, which was well attended by Auxiliary officers and members.
3. Tithing; or proportionate giving of our time, our ability and our re-

sources, as recognized as a right standard for Christian giving and we were urged to accept tithing (1/10 of our income) as our standard. This is of course not a matter for legislation but a suggestion to be joyfully and willingly accepted.

4. In the acceptance by our Church in General Convention of membership in both the Federal and World Council of Churches, the women saw an opportunity for new paths of inter-denominational service. We have found new paths in a growing co-operation in the World Day of Prayer, a wider participation in the annual inter-denominational Institute, an increasing membership in the Woman's Inter-denominational Union and the fact that our Mission Study offering for Migrants is being sent to this inter-denominational work carried on by the Home Missions Council.
5. Another Triennial influence: the election of a representative from the Daughters of the King, on our diocesan Executive Board, following the precedent the National Executive Board at Triennial.
6. Lastly, for emphasis: the great Youth Movement of young men and women to unite in worship, study and action, sponsored by the National Council and to which the Woman's Auxiliary promises their co-operation. They now call on to help them by informing our own parish Auxiliary groups (by a folder available for every parish president in the Auxiliary office in the Church House), by helping your rector and youth leaders to interest other young people in this movement, by offering to provide supper for a youth rally or a Fellowship Breakfast to follow the Whitsunday Corporate Communion, or by giving money to enable some young person to attend a summer conference or camp. So much for our Triennial promises.

Consideration of a change in the By-Laws led us to examine the Constitution and an additional Article has been added on Organization which reads "This organization shall function through Departments and Committees following the plan of organization of the National Council". The following ticket for the election of officers was unanimously elected at the Annual meeting. President: Mrs. Francis R. Packard, First Vice-President in charge of the Department of Missions: Mrs. Marmaduke Tilden, Sixth Vice-President in charge of Promotion: Mrs. J. Holcombe Genung, United Thank Offering Custodian: Mrs. A. Disston Rile.

It seems incredible that my term of office as your president can have come to an end so soon. They have been for me three years of such happy privilege and opportunity as I never could have dreamed of, for I have come to know so many of you personally and the parish branches are no longer just names to me because I have visited with you in your meetings and have shared the experience with you of worship, study and fellowship. If it had not been for your loyal support and acceptance by every one of you, officers and members, of all our plans the work reported in this annual report would never have been possible, for the woman back in the parish is the Auxiliary, not the officers, not the program. These are great days in which to be a Christian, days in which our Presiding Bishop tells us our Christian witness can save the world. God grant that we may, in all humility yet in conquering might of love and faith, meet this challenge in the days at hand. Let me thank you for all it has meant to me to have served with you these past three years, my only regret is that I was not able to do far, far better the task you entrusted to me.

We have heard letters read from our friends at work in the field, many of whom have visited us in the past and who we have been able to help. All the letters and reports show the bravery and cheerfulness and consecration of the men and women who go forth to serve the Lord in distant places. We can be proud that they trust us at home to uphold them, and it is for us to show them that we shall not fail.

Words fail me adequately to express my gratitude to the delegates and their respective parishes for helping to make possible the fulfilling of our pledge. The money has been spent in aiding missions in Wyoming, Western North Carolina, New Mexico, Northern Indiana, Utah, Nevada, and North Dakota, and for work among the foreign-born. Besides the \$5000.00 Quota, we have sent Specials amounting to \$233.00. (Itemized in our Treasurer's Report.) I am happy to say that we renewed our \$5000.00 pledge in January, 1941, and have set ourselves also to work toward a Special during the coming year to go to the Migrants.

The fine cooperation of my fellow-officers has carried me, a new and untried chairman, through a difficult winter, and I want to thank each and every one of them for her support.

Ninety parishes and Missions have sent delegates to the meetings of the Foreign Committee since last September. I want to thank them deeply for their support, for while we had increased our budget by \$750.00, 15%, over the previous year, we paid in full the total of \$5,750.00 pledged. Of this amount \$416.76 was in pennies! In addition the Committee gave \$100.00 to British Missions, \$25.00 to Henry Azariah, the son of Bishop Azariah, who is taking post graduate work in Agriculture at Cornell, \$10.00 additional to the China Emergency Relief Fund, \$100.00 for a scholarship at the Sarah W. Ashhurst School at Guantanamo, Cuba, \$95.00 to Deaconess Shaw in the Philippines, \$25.00 to Bishop Azariah for quinine, \$6.00 for Chinese Refugees. Our money went to support work in other countries.

We have had splendid speakers! Bishop Nicholls of Kyoto, Mr. Reed Russell with beautiful colored pictures of the work in Hayti, Rev. Alfred Griffiths from the Philippines, Mr. B. W. Lanphear, a missionary who has spent many years in Anking, and who has ten legally adopted Chinese sons, Miss Mary Shipp who worked for ten years in the Social Service Department at St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, Miss Gertrude Selzer who was in China seventeen years, Dr. Suknandan, a native doctor from India, who is taking a year's post graduate work at the Pennsylvania Hospital, and Bishop Kroll from Liberia, who had interesting pictures of his work in this distant and difficult field. To hear them is to want to help them.

Bishop Tucker has called the Church to "Go Forward in Service". He further tells us that the task to which he calls us will require "endless effort, serious sacrifice, and daring devotion". We see a world filled with disaster and destruction, and we know that these are the result of irreligion and paganism. By supporting the work of the Church around the world, we are helping, even in a small way to establish a World Christian Fellowship, a World Christian Community.

The Committee began the year 1940-41 with two changes. A change of Chairmen, due to the resignation of Mrs. Jeffreys to become Educational Secretary; also a change in time of meetings from morning to afternoon, so as not to conflict with Diocesan Committee meetings. This was to be a trial for a year, so, at the meeting in May, a decision will be made as to the continuance of same. A third change in February was the name of the committee. It is now Committee on Negro Work.

The delegates were so cooperative, the Treasurer was able to close the books for the year 1940, before the New Year, the Budget having been met, plus \$250.00, which we had hoped for. This enabled us to send the additional amount to the American Church Institute for Negroes to distribute. Our Specials amounted to \$351.00 as compared to \$219.00 last year. This encouraged us to raise our Quota \$100.00, with a contingent fund of \$200.00. A total of \$4200.00.

The speakers who have come to us each month have been most helpful, inspiring us to go forward. October: Rev. Robert W. Bagnall spoke feelingly on the Negro with regard to the Church. November: Rev. George E. Benedict, D. D., Dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral and the Theological Seminary of Port au Prince, Haiti, told us about the work the Church is doing there. December: Dr. George E. Loder, principal of the Gailor Industrial School, a very enthusiastic person, gave us a splendid account of the work being accomplished, with insufficient funds. January: Miss Bertha Richards, Dean of the Bishop Tuttle Training School, told of the excellent training received at this school, but there is need for greater support. February: Mrs. Fannie Gross, Field Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary, National Council, made a return visit, at our request, bringing so much help to us for a better understanding between the races, that once again we say, our Church may well be proud of such a woman. March: Rev. Max Whittington, St. Barnabas Mission, Jenkinsville, S. C., told of the work he is doing with inadequate funds, in such a humble as well as eloquent manner, donations came during the month which enabled us to send him \$25.00. A Special. April: Rev. Tollie Caution uplifted us spiritually with a service of Meditation. May: Rev. Thomas D. Brown, Associate Archdeacon of the Colored Missionary Jurisdiction of the Diocese of Virginia, is to be our speaker. June: We plan to make a pilgrimage to the Cathedral.

Truly we seem to be learning that what makes life worth while, is to know we are in a world that needs us, and with God's help, we can meet that need.

The headline news for the Diocesan Committee, from October 1940 to May 1941, can be brief, but nevertheless revealing. As it has been a Committee reaching far out to the edges of the Diocese, and deep into its many problems, and responsibilities, so the Speakers have reflected that diversity of interests.

In October, it was enlightening from a very real informative standpoint, to have Father Della Cioppa speak of his particular sphere of work, and to hear the Armenian Clergyman, Father Kavokjian, aided by an interpreter, tell of the work among his people, and how much it means to them to be able to worship as they have done for centuries. The interpreter also gave his own experiences as an immigrant in New York, and how vital a part our Church played, in his Americanization.

Uppermost in our minds in November, was the news of the General Convention in Cincinnati, and we were most fortunate in having Mrs. Ingersoll give us first hand reports of it. Bishop Tucker's challenge to "Go Forward in Service", was one of the outstanding messages she brought back.

In endeavoring to understand as thoroughly as possible, the ramifications, and plan of organization of the Foreign Born work in the Diocese, we asked the late Archdeacon Bullitt, who was in charge of it, to explain it in December. It was a fortunate choice for us. Mr. Keener a lay-chaplain and Social worker, from Byberry, shared the program with Mr. Bullitt, which enabled us to bear of the Christmas needs out there. Word received since, told of the generous response this Committee gave to that appeal.

Starting the New Year with the Reverend E. Sydnor Thomas, rector of St. Barnabas, Germantown, the whole story of the growth of Negro work in the Diocese, was outlined for us by him. It is a moving story of continued progress, a real demonstration of "Forward in Service". Turning from the general work of different Diocesan departments, to one specific group, we found St. Barnabas, Kensington, with the Rev. Mr. Eastburn doing a wonderful piece of relief work, under terrific odds. He gave us food for thought, in his statements of some of the unhappy conditions existing there. The offering for that day went to his work, and was generously supported.

In trying to discover just what our efforts should be and where they should be placed, regarding a suitable Home for Old Men, in the Diocese, we invited Miss Elinor Lutes, of the Christian Settlement House, to come to our Meeting, bringing her pictures explaining their contribution to this problem of caring for aged men, in the absence of a recognized Home for them. This particular private endeavor seems most worthy, and the pictures

were well done and eye-opening. It seems to me, that an interested group in the Diocesan Committee, could devote themselves to fact finding, on this subject. Much of this can be continued in the Christian Social Relations Committee, next year, when the Diocesan Committee, in the reorganization plan, worked out recently, and outlined to us in April by Mrs. Ingersoll, turns over its work with Institutions, and along purely Social Service lines, to it. The Diocesan Committee will concentrate on the Missions of the Diocese, of which there are 51. This is a great undertaking in itself, and this new set-up may overcome some of the confusion that our former all-inclusive program sometimes caused.

Our May Meeting was a short one, with the election of Officers of first importance. The Annual Spring Party followed, which was held at the Philadelphia Divinity School, where we were graciously welcomed by Dean Evans. We had a tour of the buildings and grounds, Intercessions in the beautiful Chapel, followed by a short Organ Recital, after lunch.

I want to take this opportunity to express my heartfelt appreciation of the cooperation I have received as Chairman of this Committee, from the officers and delegates, and to acknowledge my deep debt of gratitude at being asked to head it, because I feel I have gained so much through this association.

The incentive for Missionary Education can be summed up under the two Great Commandments: "Thou shalt love the Lord Thy God with all thy heart . . . and mind . . . and thy neighbor as thyself." Love-in-action is service. To serve our "neighbor" helpfully requires knowledge of him; hence the need of study. Our specific neighbors this past year included the Migrants and the Chinese. In addition to this specific study, the general theme for the monthly programs of the Parish Branches was "Witnesses to the Power of God," the material for these programs being based on a series of addresses given at the W. A. Triennium.

Here is the statistical story of our Witness through Study:

 " —Jan.-Feb.—*Pre-Lenten Training-Class—China*—5 sessions.

II—*Missionary Education*: 73 parishes participated in the special Study Program, many of them including both the "Migrants" and "China". Classes were conducted in 32 parishes. Educational Days number 33; luncheon speakers, 8. A corps of 38 leaders and speakers, among whom were 6 clergymen and 4 Chinese, made this program possible. An increase in evening classes and the attendance of men at several denote progress.

Offering: To date, 54 parishes and 3 Convocations have served our neighbor in this tangible way. Total amount received: \$1146.46. Part will go to Bishop Tsue in Southwest China and part to pay the salary for a religious worker among the Migrants in New Jersey.

FORWARD STEPS: Three suggestions received at the W. A. Triennium have been incorporated in our diocesan set-up. 1) There should be a Dio. Educational Committee — 2) Scope of activity should not be limited to Study-Classes — 3) Dio. Ed. Com. should stimulate parish groups to plan their own programs.

1) An educational Committee of 18 members was organized last fall and has already proved its worth. Members are not only advisors; the majority of them served as leaders and teachers this past winter.

2) The W. A. Parish-Program Com. is now under this department. This sub-committee has met regularly and has planned the Suggested Outlines for Parish Programs edited monthly in the W. A. News.

3) The Dio. Program Com. should be a crutch to lead the way for each parish to build its own program. Several parishes did plan their own Mission-Study programs this past year.

In reviewing the history of Missionary Education in our Church, we find this statement: "The first Study Groups *prayed* and studied, and the first Summer Conferences led their members *to face their own responsibilities as Christian disciples before* they could be ready to return to their dioceses and parishes as leaders." Those leaders who attended the Quiet Day conducted by Canon Earp were helped to better face their responsibilities as Christian disciples. Our closing word is a deep thank-you to the faithful Intercessors who remembered our leaders during Lent. Let us always, in our educational work, keep the spiritual emphasis foremost.

Annual Report of the Christian Family and Social Relations Committee to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pennsylvania April 1941.

Great inspiration and impetus was gained for your committee at the Triennial at Kansas City in October for one third of its entire program was devoted to the Christian Family. Both your Chairmen were privileged to hear the stimulating papers prepared and to participate in the discussions and seminars which followed. 1000 copies of the leaflet "The Family" prepared by your Chairman were distributed with the result that already the Diocese of Florida, Hawaii, Harrisburg, and Texas are developing programs such as we have here and as outlined in the leaflet. Many interesting conversations and exchanges of ideas were made possible with women from other parts of the country.

In order to cover the wide scope and responsibilities of the committee three sub-committees, each with their own chairmen have been set up. These committees are the Family, Legislative, and Refugee, the purposes of these committees are as follows:

The Family Committee to carry out a program for the strengthening of the christian aspect of our home life. Daily prayer and witness to our full responsibilities toward the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony is the foundation upon which we desire to build our ever widening Christian Social Relations. Within the practice of our religion we have untapped resources for meeting these responsibilities and privileges. In trying to create and maintain an atmosphere of love and peace a power may be liberated to radiate far beyond the limits of our individual homes.

The Legislative Committee to keep church women posted factually on legislation as it affects us as Christians. It is difficult if not impossible for individuals to know the true significance of many of our laws in the making. Often too late we wake up to find laws have been passed which are not consistent with beliefs of Christian people. This committee is non-partisan, non-political but will carry out a purely fact finding program.

The Refugee Committee was formed to cooperate with the same committee of the National Council. The program includes principally giving friendship to lonely people who have sought refuge in this country and helping immediately on a summer camp program for children.

Regular monthly meetings have been attended by representatives from 47 parishes. While we are thankful and grateful for the interest thus far evinced in our objectives we shall not rest or be at all content until we have greater cooperation from more parishes in our large Diocese. All women interested in our purposes are most cordially invited to meet with us and share in our program.

During this year, our chief gain has been, not in the formation of new groups, but rather in providing the Woman's Auxiliary with several of our most valuable and active groups. These young women felt that the time had come when the younger women of their parishes should be given the chance to take their places in the senior branch of the auxiliary. We, as Juniors, feel that this is the most worthy contribution we can make to the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is, indeed, the only motive for the existence of the organization of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. This change was made in five parishes, with three of these immediately forming new junior groups to take their place. Besides these, three new parish Junior Auxiliaries were started during the year.

The four-fold program of Worship, Study, Service and Gifts was emphasized in our work. Nearly all of our groups had at least two Corporate Communion on the Sundays in the year selected for all Junior Auxiliaries. Most of our branches had a worthwhile study program on one of the missionary topics.

A forum of the parish chairmen was held at the October Executive Board Meeting. This proved of valuable assistance in stimulating an interesting program for the monthly Diocesan Meetings. "Witnessing to the power of God" (through the five fields of service) was the theme for these monthly programs.

From the Social Service Fund, created from our first Annual Card-party, and with the cooperation of our groups, we did a vast piece of Christmas work, the complete report appearing in the February issue of "The Church News" and in the file of annual reports of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. We have also been able to take care of a year's incidental expenses of a young woman, who, through the City Mission, is studying to be a nurse.

Our Social Service Chairman, Mrs. LaRoche, in cooperation with our various diocesan institutions and the Emergency Aid of Pennsylvania, has succeeded in outlining an interesting and worthwhile program of social service activity for our negro groups, which is a valuable contribution to the diocese.

The Executive Board regrets the retirement of Mrs. Paul Moore, whose efficient and valuable contribution as Chairman for Supply Department Work will be greatly missed. We trust she will continue her service in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Fellowship has been expressed by each branch which gave a "reciprocity meeting" and either invited members of neighbouring auxiliaries or young women of other denominations in the community to attend. Many of our young women participated in the Annual Missionary Institute of the Women's Interdenominational Union, assisting the Young Women's Committee of the Union with their educational program.

On the occasion of our tenth Annual Dinner, we were privileged to present as our speaker the Rev. Frederick Arterton, Secretary for Youth to the National Council. We also had the pleasure of having members of other youth organizations of the diocese present to share in our program.

We are now looking forward to the future and the welcoming of new young groups, and thinking and planning how our younger women may cooperate with the united movement of the Church's youth, so that we of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary may do our part to go "Forward in Service."

Personally, I have been in touch with many parish presidents, who have consulted me regarding their problems. 1940 marked the end of a Triennium. The following is a brief report for the year and a summary of the three years. Three objectives were before us; 1—To have very woman sharing. 2—To make women realize more and more what a great spiritual experience this approach to our daily lives is. 3—To increase our gifts for the missionary enterprise. To have every woman sharing seemed very little nearer. It is difficult to determine the actual increase in numbers, owing to the two offerings each year and the many incomplete reports. It was decided to find an average for each parish by adding the total number reported for the Triennium and dividing by the number of times they were reported: Previous Triennium \$5,250 and the last \$5,680 which is a bare increase of \$500.

The second objective can only be measured by our way of life. The third by the amount for the year \$27,786 an increase of \$2,311—For the Triennium \$78,070 a decrease from the previous of \$2,082. This can be accounted for by a very special and very generous anonymous gift and the actual amount from the parishes was a little over the amount of the previous Triennium.

The Spring Presentation Service was held at St. Stephen's and the Autumn Service at St. Luke and the Epiphany. We want to thank most truly the Bishop and the rectors for their generous interest and help.

The usual business meeting for Treasurers was held in February and four meetings with the Convocation Treasurers.

Thanks to the Treasurers and the consent of the Auxiliaries and rectors I was invited to speak at 38 parishes, including several Sunday services and special meetings. Miss Ray Phillips, Treasurer for the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, has been doing splendidly and held a meeting for Junior Woman's Auxiliary Treasurers at her house which was very profitable.

Hospital Wards: The regular visiting continued as usual, in the various wards of the hospital. Treats of ice cream were given in the summer, and coffee and buns in the winter. Many personal requests were granted, letters written, etc.

Maternity Department: Many layettes and large quantities of new infant garments were given by the various Auxiliaries, and dozens of blankets and shirts were purchased by the League for the Social Service Department.

Follow-up Work: Every family was visited where a layette was given, the baby baptized, and, in most cases, material aid was given. This winter, 7 tons of coal, 12 pairs of new shoes, warm clothing, bedding and furniture were supplied. Money was given one man so that he could take out his citizenship papers, to enable him to get a position.

Christmas Cheer: Several crates of oranges were given to the Fever and T. B. Wards. 1096 beautifully wrapped Christmas packages were given to patients. We furnished the entire Christmas for many of the families, under the Follow-up Work.

Social Service Department: We paid for several pairs of eyeglasses and furnished clothing and baby garments. We arranged for and paid all expenses of the funeral of a dear old lady of over ninety years of age, who had not a relative in the world. Many acts of kindness are performed that are unreportable.

We wish to thank all the Auxiliaries, Girls' Friendly Society and Young People's Fellowships that cooperated and donated to this grand piece of Christian Social Service work. We can always use puzzles, playing cards, magazines, Kleenex tissues, drinking glasses and used clothing.

The Elizabeth Price Martin League of the Episcopal Hospital made definite forward strides in 1940-1941, it's seventh year of service.

The 1940 May Fête netted \$1,816.98! Besides being a money-raising event, the May Fête is the annual festivity for the hospital staff, employees, patients and their friends. Each year, the League plans for a bigger and better fête, making a larger sum of money which is carefully spent for hospital needs during the year. Also, the fête is making more friends for the hospital. This year, the May Fête is to be held on Wednesday, May 28th, 1941.

The House Committee—Mrs. Toland, Chairman—made several improvements throughout the hospital. The employees' rest-room was made more comfortable with furniture, curtains, etc. Sharing expenses with the Men's Board, the private rooms were done over and now are as clean and attractive as paint, chintz and new lamps can make them. The reception room in the X-Ray department was redecorated.

Mrs. John Groton, Chairman of the Harrison Home Committee, has made extensive improvements, with the help of her very efficient committee. Both the Men's and Women's Wards have been made more comfortable and attractive. Two quiet rooms, which were badly needed, have been equipped; and lights, linoleum and fresh paint have been added where they were needed. The two dining-rooms are being modernized and freshened by linoleum, oilcloth mats, etc.

The Children's Ward has been ably looked after by Mrs. Barclay Knight and her committee. Improvements have been made for the comfort and entertainment of these smaller patients.

The Corner Shop, under Mrs. Fowler's management, has become a real asset, not only to the hospital-family, patients and visitors, but also to our Board, as the shop presents an annual profit which can be put to good use.

A set of table and chairs has been placed in the hall for the use of visitors who stop for rest and refreshment at the shop. Cigarettes, magazines, candy, stationery, cosmetics, ice cream and soft drinks are now sold, and soon hot tea and coffee and freshly made sandwiches are to be on sale. You can subscribe to your favorite magazine or order up-to-the-minute stationery at the Corner Shop. Between six and seven thousand dollars passes across the counter in one year!

The Occupational Therapy Committee, the Library Committee, the Nurses' Home and the Grounds Committees are all working to give the service for which our League was formed and which it is learning to render more ably as each year passes.

The League of Intercessors is striving valiantly to minister to its members as seeing our Lord in them and so seeking His promise to those who "visit the sick, those in prison, the stranger"—"Ye have done it unto Me". Ministering to the isolated and shut-ins is one of the oldest missions of the Church. It was a friendly ministry of person to person adapted to individual needs and local conditions, and every Christian *recognized* his individual responsibility to his neighbor. Ever since, this type of ministry has been in constant use in the Church.

In the 14 years since the League was organized in this Diocese, its membership has grown to 816 with 50 parish chairmen who visit and correspond with their individual members, sending them "Forward" booklets, World Day of Prayer leaflets, Birthday, Christmas, and Easter cards, Motto Calendars and the Bishop's special Christmas letter to them.

The Reverend Benjamin R. Priest opened the first meeting of the Fall and Winter's work on September 20th, with a Corporate Communion in the Bishop's Chapel, using prayer for the isolated and those who had died during the year. In his very helpful address, he said, "There are many movements known through the press and the radio, but the League is one *not* so known. Many people do not know you exist, yet your work is of the greatest importance in these troubled times. Many who are hopeless and hysterical are asking, 'What's the use? There's nothing to do about it.' It is a serious time when people get discouraged. We as Christian people can build a better world than is now being destroyed. We get this comfort in our Church, but these people whom you visit are not able to find it there. They have newspapers and radio which often undermine their faith. You go to them with the Church's literature and prayers and put hope back into their lives and help them to hold on to God."

We regret the resignation, owing to ill health, of our Chairman, Deaconess Alice Nutter, who though obliged to give up active Church work is carrying on a vital spiritual ministry with the patients in Harrison Home. The resignation of Miss Julia Hill was regretfully accepted, but we rejoice that she is now able to expand her field of usefulness in the Church.

At the November meeting, Mrs. Biddle appointed Sister Mary Kathleen, S. H. N. to fill the unexpired term of Deaconess Nutter.

There will have been 6 meetings this season, counting the one on May 27th, and a devotional service during Lent. All meetings start in the Bishop's Chapel, when intercessions for the sick, troubled, and the departed, which have been sent in by the various chairmen, are offered, and a short meditation is given by the Chairman.

The League is financed by the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary and individual contributions. We have aided Miss Dorothy Kohl in her work in the Church School by Mail, paying for three scholarships to provide lesson material for three children. Many Auxiliaries have given scholarships, but many more are needed to provide for the 233 children now enrolled.

Help us with your prayers, your contributions; attend our meetings, always scheduled in the "Woman's Auxiliary News", and "Church News"; and you will be more than repaid by the prayers of our many Intercessors.

In reporting for the Department of Religious Education, we will give a full account of the Church School by Mail and a few items from our Annual Report for 1940.

There were about 1800 visitors to the office recorded during the year, exclusive of those who came for meetings and conferences. The office had working contacts with 162 of the 220 parishes and missions.

A Winter Conference was held on five Tuesday evenings in January and February. 359 persons registered in the 30 courses offered in the five schools—School of Church Life, School for Youth, School of Education, School for Clergy, School of Music, and the Graduate School. The second Diocesan Summer Conference was held at Ursinus in June with a registration of 138 persons from 61 parishes. The attendance at all services, classes and meetings was excellent and the fine spirit in evidence at the first conference continued.

The report of the Church School by Mail shows a healthy increase under the direction of Miss Dorothy Kohl; a total of 319 children were enrolled during 1940. Of these 93 have succeeded in getting into the nearest church school, while 27 others have moved or died, leaving a total of 199 as of January 1, 1941, just 58 more than a year ago.

In addition to Bibles, Prayer Books, "Forward Day by Day", "Thoughts of God" books, and Lenten prayers and stories, 8,481 lessons were prepared and mailed. The response from the boys and girls has been 77 per cent, and 1,636 question sheets sent in by the children have been corrected and returned, and 1,057 letters written. Hymns, Bible verses and prayers have been memorized by the children; and they have written prayers, essays and letters.

Districts were canvassed in Delaware, Chester, Bucks, and Montgomery counties, and 23 towns were surveyed to find places without a church; 23 public schools were visited in an effort to locate children needing the Church School by Mail; and 235 visits were made to pupils and prospective pupils. Transportation was provided by 19 volunteer drivers from Woman's Auxiliary branches, and by the rectors in whose parishes the children live. Speeches were made at 14 Woman's Auxiliary branches and Church School organizations, and 31 promotional conferences and individual contacts were made by the worker.

Christmas gifts were provided each child by the scholarship donors, the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, and the League for the Isolated.

Scholarships of \$3.00 each, which provide lessons to a child for a year, were contributed as follows: Church Schools, \$113; Woman's Auxiliary Branches and Individuals, \$97; Junior Woman's Auxiliary Branches, \$15; G. F. S. \$3; Y. P. F. \$3; League of Intercessors \$15.90; and Other Organizations \$12. The cost of the school for the year was \$212.09. plus \$50.00 a month salary for the worker, which latter was paid by the Woman's Auxiliary during 1940. We assume the responsibility of the salary during 1941. One half of it has been added to our budget, and the balance must be raised.

The Girls' Friendly Society in Pennsylvania this year celebrated the Fifty-Fifth Anniversary of its organization. They were honored at their Festival Service of worship by Bishop Taitt, and by the Presiding Bishop who preached the sermon. The offering which amounted to one hundred and forty-seven dollars was presented to the Diocesan Altar Guild for use in purchasing portable altars for use by Episcopal chaplains in the Army and Navy. The first of these altars was displayed and blessed by Bishop Tucker. The National President, Mrs. Harold Woodward visited the Diocese and spoke at the Anniversary Banquet.

During the year the Society continued and enlarged all its general program of worship, missions, social service, recreation, leadership training, and co-operation with the Woman's Auxiliary and the Supply Bureau in sewing and box work.

Most noteworthy of the new projects are:

I. Launching of a series of pilgrimages to study Christian Symbolism and the art of worship in our own and other faiths. Included are visits to a Hebrew Synagogue, a Roman Catholic and a Swedenborgian cathedral. The aim of these pilgrimages is educational and the development of religious tolerance.

II. Sending one of the members with all expenses provided, to work for the month of August in the mission community center at Dante in the mountains of Virginia.

III. Cooperation with the National Society in building a High School for girls in Chennan, Free China, in supplying the salary for a social worker in a migrant center and in sending twelve hundred dollars to the Girls' Friendly Society in Great Britain at Christmas time.

IV. The Committee on Christian Social Relations, with the aid of civic organizations organized monthly forums on such subjects as Social Diseases, Race Relations, and Consumers' Research.

V. A growing consciousness of the Christian responsibility of War Relief work. A knitting unit has been established under the British War Relief Service: 60 filled bags for refugees in Britain were sent through the Emergency Aid Society at Christmas time; furnishings for seven hospital beds for Britain at a cost of \$280. were supplied through the efforts of older members; a fund of \$400.00 is nearly complete for a mobile kitchen trailer for Britain. This sum will be matched by a friend, when complete, for a second kitchen.

VI. A member of the Friendly in this Diocese is one of two Provincial representatives for all youth organizations on the newly formed National Youth Commission.

VII. The Presiding Bishop inspired the Society, in his sermon, to Go Forward in Service, and a clergyman of the Diocesan Commission for Forward in Service will present concrete ways for the Society to actually accomplish this at the Annual Leadership Conference in Cape May in June.

The Church Periodical Club, in looking back over the road traveled during the past year, is conscious that many more miles could have been covered if the interest and help of every Parish in the Diocese would have joined in the march. However the workers have been happy in spreading both help and cheer to many at home and abroad through the printed page.

The meetings have been held regularly on the fourth Friday of each month and have been well attended; four of them have been enlivened by a social atmosphere, namely two luncheons and two teas which always add much to the friendly relationships.

Our speakers have been mostly workers in our own diocese, who have opened our eyes to many needs right here at home. Two from outside the diocese have been, first, Dr. John W. Wood, a former member of the National Council, was the speaker at the Annual Luncheon; having had the experience of world wide travel, coming in contact with missionaries of every country, naturally he brought to us a very instructive message.

The second speaker was Miss Lillie H. Hill of Leakesville, N. C., who gave us a vivid picture of her work in that territory, showing that the worst criminals cannot resist the love of God.

The C. P. C. has contributed specified books to St. Paul's University, Tokyo, where a library representing American thought and culture was deemed highly advisable. For Tucker Lodge, Shrine Mont., a special effort was put forth to have each Parish and Mission in the Diocese represented by a gift to the library; 514 volumes and a large Standard Dictionary were sent. Dr. Mabel Elliott of St. Luke's International Medical Center, Tokyo, received two needed technical works, and to the Nurses' Home of the Episcopal Hospital was given a large Standard Dictionary.

Renewal of magazine subscriptions was granted to the Philadelphia Divinity School; an appeal from the Rev. Clifford E. Barry Nobes of Bontoc, The Philippines, for books and magazines was also answered. New Christmas gift books were sent to missionaries by many parish secretaries; 301 institutions in our own diocese were aided and 161 outside were helped.

A deep loss has been sustained in the passing of our National Executive Secretary, Miss Mary E. Thomas, who had so wisely administered the affairs of the C. P. C. for 26 years, and was loved and honored by everyone. When the "Mary E. Thomas Memorial Fund", for the purchase of books, was established, that her name be perpetuated and her work continued, we were happy to be able to contribute towards it.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP

Since Miss Hilma Newman, our new secretary, came to us, she has reorganized the work and made it more vigorous and thorough-going. Usually statistics are dull reading but as the volume of work has increased so much, we feel that the diocese would like to know something of what is being done by Miss Newman and her staff. During the year, 261 girls have come to the office and received attention; ninety-two were preventive, twelve delinquent and twenty-five illegitimate mothers. These girls are from fourteen to twenty-five years of age, with from sixteen to eighteen in the majority. Each girl receives individual attention as each one presents a different problem. A Christmas party at the house, 2139 Locust Street, was held for these clients, and each received gifts. Bishop Taitt and the Board of Directors entertained at a tea for Miss Newman, to introduce her to other social service workers and diocesan friends. In April, another tea was given to men and women who have interested themselves in this organization. More and more the clergy are turning to us for help in their youth problems. This pleases us because, primarily, we want to be of service to them in the particular field to which we are devoting ourselves.

The Order of the Daughters of the King has for its foundations—Prayer, Bible Study and Service. Within the parishes, the chapters thus constitute prayer groups of praise and thanksgiving and intercession for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, for all missionaries, for the parish, for the diocese, for the sick and isolated, for peace, for the nation, for the world, along with petition for the deepening of the spiritual life of the members.

In 1885 the order started as the outgrowth of a Bible Class; and from its inception Bible Study has been an important part of the program of each meeting. God has so wonderfully revealed Himself and His Son our Lord in His written Word. Therefore in order to know Him better—and His will and purposes for His children—the Daughters of the King value beyond measure their Bible Study, depending upon the Holy Spirit to lead them into all truth.

An enrichment of the spiritual life would naturally impell the members to various types of service, such as work in the Church School, on the Altar Guild, visiting the sick and shut-ins at the request of the rector, and serving in any other place where needed in the parish.

In every diocese of this country and in some foreign places there are chapters of the order, the affairs of which are administered by a National Council. The membership numbers over 5000; and this does not include the Junior Daughters of the King which is a considerably large body in itself.

Besides annual dues which provide a copy of the "ROYAL CROSS," the official organ, for each member, and help with the expenses of the New York office, there are two offerings during the year. One is the Self-Denial Fund to pay the salary of a missionary in China; while the other is the Master's Fund to supply a scholarship for a girl in one of our church training schools.

Here is an order, then, striving to do what all Churchwomen want to do for Christ Jesus,—namely to extend His Kingdom, and to win others to a knowledge and love and acceptance of the Saviour of the world, Who loved us and gave Himself for us.

THE CONVOCATIONS

Reports from the Woman's Aids to the six convocations show that during the past year they have given to diocesan missions the sum of \$4,476.81. The welfare of these missions is, of course, the chief concern of the Woman's Aids and the gifts of money, raised through garden parties, card parties, dues, offerings, and coin cards, are but the expression of a sincere, friendly interest in these groups of people who are always so eager to do their share in helping themselves. In addition to this support of the missions, the women of the convocations maintain an active interest in certain specials. These include Vacation Church Schools, Church School by Mail, St. John's Settlement House, House of Rest, Cathedral League, both units of the Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, Needlework Guild, Clergy Automobile Fund, Episcopal Day of Educational Week for the Blind, Mission Study Offering, and the Speaker's Bureau of the Diocese. To these specials the sum of \$684.09 was given for the year 1940.
