ANNUAL REPORT

The year has been necessarily a period of intensive training and experience for your president. The training has been tremendously interesting but tremendously strenuous. Presiding at the eight Executive Board meetings, covering the seventy odd meetings of our Departments and Standing Committees, attending the meetings of all the Diocesan Departments, at least fifty during the winter, was part of the program. The President of the Woman's Auxiliary is ex-officio member of all Diocesan Departments. The greatest satisfaction has come from my visits to parish groups, but I have only succeeded in reaching fifty so far.

The emphasis has been on the vital need for a "plus quality" in Church work, driving into the minds and hearts of all women the fact that Christianity is the first line of defense, and we are the ones that can help most. We have endeavored to always keep before us the goals set at General Convention: to be "better witnesses" in the five fields of service, stressing the Unified Program, Parish Council and Tithing, and above all standing behind the Forward In Service program, which has been presented periodically by members of the Diocesan Commission to groups of parish presidents and other meetings and published in our monthly Calendar.

We have made one re-organization and created one new standing committee. The Mission Shop was continued, for the sale of mission goods only, under volunteer management with Mrs. George Trowbridge as the head. It was a great success. A new Committee was appointed for War Service under Mrs. James Davis in the Department of Christian Social Relations. I refer to the report for a description of its accomplishments. It has been a great pleasure to co-operate in this work with the Girls' Friendly Society. Another experiment which was made was in having two meetings during the winter of parish presidents to exchange ideas and discuss problems, and also having, from time to time, groups of ten to fifteen parish presidents meet for the same purpose in a more intimate way. From my own point of view these have been most helpful.

I want to call everyone's attention to the new publication issued by the National Woman's Auxiliary "Pointers," which gives an opportunity of exchange of ideas and information for the Woman's Auxiliary in the world. Please remember it, only twenty-five cents a year.

We have co-operated with all the war relief and defense organizations and the Red Cross. Fifty women are serving as Gray Ladies and Nurses-Aides in our Episcopal Hospital and many elsewhere. We have also co-operated with the Home Defense and the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief. And we have participated in all inter-denominational activities that have taken place in this Diocese.

I want to thank each and every woman in the Auxiliary and the Co-operating Agencies for her loyal and generous support. I have been touched beyond words by the confidence, kindness and patience that has been accorded me.

Taken from the report of the Treasurers of the various Committees and Departments the total in contributions was \$26,624.29 from 216 parishes and missions with a valuation of \$9,410.34 on the sewing and box work that was handled by the Supply Department. The combined total for the Spring and Fall Presentations of the United Thank Offering amounted to \$26,638.15.

In looking back over the year in which it has been my privilege to head this committee the words "we have left undone the things we ought to have done" come forcibly to mind, yet owing to the loyalty of the officers and delegates my term of office has been a happy and profitable one. We were slightly in arrears in meeting our \$5,000 budget but the specials amounted to a considerable sum. We have determined to reach our goal this year and have taken \$5,000 again.

Eighty-seven (87) parishes send delegates to the Domestic Committee. Our average attendance is 68. Twenty parishes have never missed a meeting and eight only one meeting. Eighty-seven is only about sixty-five per cent of the parishes and missions who might be represented. If these others could share with us the inspiring reports we get from our missionary speakers, who can tell how much greater would be the "harvest."

In October the Rev. Dudley B. McNeil told a thrilling story of his work in the desert and mountain regions of Wyoming among miners, oil drillers and cattle men. In November Mr. Wiese of the Patterson School, Leger-

wood, North Carolina, was the speaker; he teaches boys not only from books but how to *live* and has given valuable agricultural information. In December the Rev. Clifford L. Samuelson, Secretary for Rural Work for the National Council, related in a most charming, forceful manner the plans of the National Church for forwarding and financing religious work in small towns and villages. In January the Rev. Aronah H. MacDonnell was our speaker; he is vicar of what is known as the Tonopah, Nevada, field, dreary, uphill work among almost pagan people. Then we had two Bishops in February and March. The Rt. Rev. Walter Mitchell of the missionary district of Arizona and the following month his brother, the Rt. Rev. R. Bland Mitchell of Arkansas, who is doing a splendid job of rebuilding a run down diocese. At the April meeting Miss Martha Pray, now director of Religious Education in Yonkers, N. Y., and formerly at St. John the Baptist Mission in the Blue Ridge region of Virginia, gave a picturesque account of the life and work of a missionary in a remote corner of the "Field." Mrs. Emily T. Hopkins, our last speaker of the season, is head of the Valle Crucis School for girls in North Carolina; the mission Church, the community and the school are all closely integrated and form a perfect example of co-operation between home, school, and parish Church.

After many years of loyal service our Treasurer, Mrs. Disston, leaves us to take up the larger work of the Supply Bureau. We are fortunate that Mrs. Beck, our assistant Treasurer, has consented to take the Treasurership. An account of our finances is appended to this report.

At this time when so much of the work of our missionaries in foreign fields is being threatened, and when communication with them is, in many cases impossible, the Foreign Committee is steadfastly endeavoring to support and encourage them in their fiery trials.

For the year beginning last September we adopted a new plan for our pledges. We reduced the number of our objectives from thirty to eight, keeping the same total budget, but giving more largely to each and in some cases assuming the total amount contributed by the Church, thereby establishing a more intimate and personal relation with those missions and missionaries. We paid in full our total of \$5,750.00 pledged for 1941, \$5,500.00 for our quota and \$250.00 for a special to Dornakal, India. These and other items of interest the treasurer's report will show.

The average attendance of the delegates at our monthly meetings, 72, has been greater than in the past two years, though there has been a decrease of one from last year's total of ninety in the number of parishes sending delegates.

We have entered enthusiastically with raising money by the "talents" plan and have prepared a chart, which hangs in the Woman's Auxiliary office in the Church House, giving the names and addresses of the delegates who have specified articles to sell, entertainments and services to give, etc. The chart also has the names and addresses of those who would like to buy or order specified articles. It is hoped that interest in this chart will not be limited to the Foreign Committee!

Of those who have spoken to us at our meetings, five have worked in China. Mrs. Henry A. McNulty, Shanghai; Mrs. Harry B. Taylor, Anking; Deaconess Gertrude Stewart, Hankow; Dean Shryock, who gave a Lenten meditation, and the Rev. N. Lascelles-Ward, now Chaplain at the Philadelphia General Hospital. Three worked in the Philippines, Mrs. Bayard Stewart and the Rev. Edward G. Mullen, Manila, and the Rev. Lee L. Rose, Sagada.

May the seeds planted by these faithful men and women bear an abundant harvest for "The Healing of the Nations."

The spirit of the delegates to this Committee has been to "Go Forward." We feel we must have a better understanding of all peoples and to send where we cannot go. The year 1941 ended with all our pledges paid and nearly \$200.00 additional for unpledged "Specials." The enthusiasm of our women is very encouraging.

We have been fortunate in having had excellent speakers: Dr. Hobbs, Church Mission House, gave a sketch of work being done through "The American Church Institute for Negroes." Dr. Russell rekindled our interest in St. Paul's Polytechnic Institute. Mr. J. E. Blanton, principal of Voorhees School, told of the progress at this school and its needs. Bishop Mitchell,

Diocese of Arkansas, convinced us he has a splendid understanding of the negro race, as he told of his work in his Diocese which is composed of negroes as well as whites. The Venerable Bravid W. Harris, Archdeacon of Negro Work, Diocese of Southern Virginia, was very interesting and appealing as he told of his visits to the missions under his jurisdiction. Rev. Robert J. Johnson came to us from Warrenton, Virginia. His story was so interesting he convinced us he is giving everything of himself trying to show his people the way to a better life. We all felt confident of the value of our work after having listened to such fine Christian negro gentlemen as Dr. Russell, Mr. Blanton, Mr. Harris and Mr. Johnson, we know it is bearing fruit as these men are all graduates of one of our American Church Institute Schools.

The April meeting was in Holy Week, so instead of a speaker, Mrs. Charles Hunsicker led us in a period of devotion which was a helpful spiritual experience.

I wish to express my deep appreciation and thanks to all who helped so splendidly during the past year. My faith in the continued support of this work is in the knowledge of our understanding as Christians of how necessary it is at this time, especially, that all who are made in the image of Christ should know and love Him.

The Diocesan Committee completed an interesting year in learning about the missions of the Diocese. Having had the institutions of the Diocese separated from our Committee, and taken over by the Department of Christian Social Relations, the missions have been given our undivided attention.

Our speakers each month have been the Deans of the six Convocations, who with the Chairmen of the Women's Aids, have given us an excellent picture of the splendid work that is being carried on at the front doors of the parishes.

In October Miss Dean, Diocesan Chairman of Work among the Foreign Born, told us that this work is making great strides forward. In November Dean Stockman of the Convocation of North Philadelphia and Mrs. Tohling, representing the Chairman of the Women's Aid, gave us a very interesting description of the work in this the most difficult of Convocations. In December Dean Caley, of the Convocation of Germantown, and Miss Cheston, Chairman of the Women's Aid, gave us an enthusiastic account of the work done in this large area. In January Dean Taylor, of the Convocation of West Philadelphia, and Mrs. Beath, Chairman of the Women's Aid, described the work going on in their Convocation, which is the smallest in size and scope of them all. In February, Dean Schreiner, of the Convocation of Chester, and Mrs. West, Chairman of the Women's Aid, told us of the progress made in their own missions, and that, having vision for a larger program, they include just as much as they can of outside work. In March Dean Bonyng, of the Convocation of South Philadelphia, and Mrs. Bonyng, Chairman of the Women's Aid, gave us a clear picture of the varied interests of this Convocation, such as the work among the foreign born and the hard-of-hearing. In April Dean Niblo gave us a clear and interesting history of the Convocation of Norristown, beginning with St. John's Church, Norristown, and of some of the other very old parishes. In May Doctor West, Chairman of the Department of Missions, told us how this important Department functions, and how although the problems are heavy the opportunity is magnificent.

The delegates have agreed that the knowledge gained has been great, but we will continue to study so that there will be no duplication of effort and our work and our gifts will be welcome to the missions and will have the approval of the Deans of the Convocations and the Department of Missions. Our budget has not yet been formulated, but it will include at least one Special.

Our attendance has been good and the gifts generous, but we hope for delegates from all the parishes next year, for this work for our home missions is a marvelous opportunity for service.

With a picnic supper on the Cathedral grounds at Roxborough on June 10th, the Diocesan Evening Branch brings to a close its second year. There have been 10 splendid meetings devoted to worship, work, study, and gifts with an average attendance of 53 women representing 29 parishes. The suppers preceding the meetings have been very popular and have contributed much to the good fellowship of this group.

One of our aims this year has been to overcome the "breakdown" in the Woman's Auxiliary that has been felt to exist between the Diocesan Officers and the parish branch members. We have certainly strengthened these ties by following a program this year that brought very nearly all of our Diocesan leaders into the fellowship of our group as guests and as speakers. Any that were missed are heading our list for next year.

Each month, in addition to our offering of money, we made a special contribution in answer to some current need, such as:

1. A huge carton of small bottles for San Juan Mission.
2. A large box of package candies and cigarettes for the Service Men.
3. Towels, washcloths, and 62 cakes of soap for colored regiment in Philadelphia.
4. 28 bed jackets for patients at Byberry.
5. 200 gifts of notions for Byberry patients.
6. 60 Christmas gifts for City Missions.
7. 12 gifts for St. Elizabeth's.
8. 3 gifts for Church School by Mail.

Under the chairmanship of Mrs. Ralph C. Putnam we have done a great work for the Supply Dept. and the Mission Shop. 128 garments and articles have been completed, including: 6 boys' shirts, 10 muslin slips, 40 infants' caps, and 6 dozen diapers, amounting to a total value of \$34.70. Five sweaters are being completed now. At our card party and at meetings nearly \$100.00 worth of gifts from the Mission Shop were sold.

Our group is composed almost entirely of business and professional women whose contributions to the great work of the Woman's Auxiliary are of necessity restricted; but whenever and however we can cooperate, the Diocesan officers may count on our support.

EXECUTIVE: The Department has held five meetings the past year. The District Chairmen who are the liaison officers between the Department and the parishes in their respective Districts are proving increasingly valuable as they become better acquainted with their Districts. Through representation on the Diocesan Board of Religious Education, helpful advice and council is always available to us.

Two Committees are functioning: 1) The *Parish-Program Committee*, Chairman, Mrs. Thomas Budd, has planned the "Suggested Programs for Parish Meetings" edited monthly in the W. A. Calendar. These programs, the past year, were outlined to conform with the "Diocesan Forward-In-Service" so that the Auxiliary program would coincide with the Parish plan. 2) *W. A. Educational Conference Committee*: The Annual Educational Conference is now a responsibility of this Department. Mrs. Beath was appointed Chairman with power to form her own committee. Plans are well under way for the 1942 Educational Conference.

Articles have been written monthly for the Church News. Parish Branches have been sent three communications: Letters covering the Educational Conference and Training-Classes, and Intercessors for Study-Classes; also, a printed leaflet of information about Study-Material, Speakers and the Special Offering.

TRAINING: Members of the Department attended Summer Conferences at Sweet Briar, Shrine Mont and Ursinus; also the Interdenominational Missionary Institute.

1941 W. A. Educational Conference: Special Study Topics were presented by Miss Harvey of our National Staff; and "Women-Forward-In-Service" was presented by Mrs. Charles Griffith, Diocese of Newark. Mimeographed notes of both these addresses were distributed widely.

Two Training-Classes were conducted—Topic: "Christianity and World Order"—*Pre-Advent Class*: Leader, Mrs. Elton Fortiner, Diocese of Newark; *Pre-Lenten Class*: Leader, Mrs. Wm. Stevenson.

Leaders also attended the class on "Christianity and Democracy," conducted by Dr. Shryock, at the Diocesan Normal School.

STUDY-PROGRAM: Parishes participating—75; Classes—36; Educational Days—21. Several parishes report Reading Circles; Luncheon Speakers; and addresses by Rectors on the Study Topics. **STAFF:** Leaders, Teachers and Speakers number 40; Intercessors, 14.

OFFERING: For "The Presiding-Bishop's Fund for World Relief." Amount received to date: \$929.70.

The Lenten-Study Program closed with a Fellowship Luncheon at which an interchange of experiences was shared. The key-note emphasized can be expressed in a portion of Resolutions adopted by a Study-Class: "Believing that God reigns and that ultimately His Will for the world will prevail . . . we resolve: To continue to study world problems and the responsibility of the Church toward their solution. . ."

OUR GOAL: A Prayer-Circle and a Reading-Circle in each Parish. There must be KNOWLEDGE and understanding as well as DEVOTION and activity, on the part of Church women, if we are to have a decisive voice in the establishment of a Christian World Order.

Aims: To make as clear as possible to all women of the Diocese the purposes and functions of this newly created Department.

Programs: At each meeting brief reports of all Committees have been given with the program arranged by each Committee in turn as follows: "*Family and Worship*," speaker the Rev. E. Felix Kloman, member Forward in Service Commission. "*Home Defense and Morale*," Miss Ellen Harris, Director, Philadelphia Social Agencies. "*The Racial Question*," Dr. Bagnall, rector of St. Thomas Church, West Philadelphia, who since 1911 has taken active part in many capacities for the Advancement of Colored People and better interracial understanding. "*The Refugee Situation at the present time*," Miss Denison, Secretary, Episcopal Commission for European Refugees. "*Information Please*," a panel discussion on "Living together as Christians." "*Just and Durable Peace*," Miss Harvey, Woman's Auxiliary Educational Secretary, National Council.

Committee Activities: The Family Committee printed and distributed some 800 prayer cards for private use. They also prepared and conducted a panel discussion on "Living together as Christians" and followed this up by a mimeographed resume available for the use of discussion groups.

Committee on Institutions presented news of activities and appeals for Diocesan Institutions at every meeting, especially the fine work being done at St. John's House, 1332 North 12th Street, in a greatly congested negro district. Delegates attended the dedication of a new addition to St. Martha's House and one scholarship for a boy at the Church Farm School was undertaken.

Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, Unit No. 1, Philadelphia General Hospital. Monthly meetings of the League are now held in All Souls Chapel at the hospital instead of at the Church House as formerly. Occupational therapy has been resumed, is important and needs help to be maintained. Regular visiting continues with closer contact with Episcopalians made possible by the co-operation of Chaplain Ward. Gifts from parish Auxiliaries include: layettes, infant garments; for the men's nervous ward, smokes, plants, games, ice cream and cake; for the children's ward, cushions for wheel chairs, flowers, stuffed animals; for the women's nervous ward and the tubercular wards, ice cream and cake; for the Social Service Department, crutches, spectacles, shoes (diabetics) dental work (money), board furnished in nursing home, adjustment of old age pensions, follow-up work in homes following confinement and Christmas gifts for 1,190 patients.

Elizabeth Price Martin League for Service, Unit No. 2, Episcopal Hospital. The far-reaching usefulness of this Unit is accomplished by the constant vigilant co-operation of the following Committees: The Shop Committee cleared over \$1,000 with which they bought 60 new bed-side tables for two wards. Occupational therapy works with 63 patients contributing much to their morale and welfare. Articles made by the patients are sold with profit.

The Library Committee brings amusement and cheer to the bed sides. Parties have been held on holidays in the children's ward.

Refugee Committee: The aim of this Committee is to offer Christian friendship and stand ready to be of any service that is possible. To do this close contact is maintained with the Friend's Service Committee on Refugees. Among the group meetings attended was one of an organization which has some 600 members of all nationalities. This organization holds supper meetings with classes in Americanization, art, drama, etc.

War Committee: This Committee was organized to co-operate with other agencies for the benefit of men in the service. Gifts have been made to the 76th Coastal Artillery (negro), stationed at the Municipal Stadium to guard the Philadelphia area, of strips of carpet, two new Philco radios, one second-hand victrola and records, large cartons of toilet articles. These gifts were made possible through the generosity of gifts of money and in kind by individual women and the Diocesan Evening Branch. This Committee co-operates with the Girls' Friendly Society and will help with entertainments as soon as a suitable building is provided by the Army. An office is maintained in the Church House by a volunteer secretarial service to help the Diocesan War Commission.

Meetings have been attended by 45 delegates from 38 parishes plus 81 visitors. Fifteen invitations to present the work of the Department to parish Auxiliaries were accepted. The work was presented to the Diocesan Social Relations Department and to the Associates of the Sisters of St. Margaret. A meeting planned by the Pennsylvania Movie Censor Board at their headquarters for the Diocesan Social Relations Committee was attended and a two day session of the Christian Social Relations Commission of the Third Province at the College of Preachers in Washington, D. C. The first parish unit of the Family Committee has been formed at St. Peter's, Glenside, an evening group for parents and teachers.

This report is a resume of nine detailed reports, written by the officers and Committee Chairmen of the Department, which are filed with the Secretary. It is a most inadequate expression of the time and devotion put into the year's work by a great number of women.

This work required:

- 52 different patterns with a sample garment for each pattern.
- 5,047 yards of material were used.
- 2,742 cut garments were assembled.
- 2,780 directions for making garments were typed.
- 6,048 notions were enclosed in the assembled garments.

This year's report for the Supply Department shows a decided decrease in clothing sent to missions and hospitals. This is due to shipping conditions. The demand for sewing has been most gratifying. We had thought that the great demands of the Red Cross and war organizations would interfere with our work. However, we have found to the contrary that it has not. The interest in sewing for our Church has increased, rather than decreased.

The total value of our work has increased. Due to transportation conditions, mentioned above, the shipment of goods on hand was curtailed, but due to your generosity, we were able to send money to some places to buy efficiently the clothing which would otherwise be sent from here.

We have filled our requisitions and we are, financially, in a very good position. We have a revolving fund of \$666.00. This fund makes it possible to purchase efficiently.

The National Supply Chairman has requested the Supply Departments in Massachusetts, New York, and Pennsylvania to keep hospital supplies available for our churches, missions, and hospitals. The garments are assembled. We also have patterns for compresses, bandages, etc., for the making of which you must supply your own materials. This I hope will be some of your summer work. In order to comply with the request, the garments, bandages, and compresses, etc., must be returned in September.

It is impossible to buy certain materials or enough wool to fill next year's requisitions, so we are storing all completed garments above our allotment, except those specifically designated to Diocesan missions. We can foresee a greater need for supplies than ever before. We must all keep this in mind and continue our efforts and support this department as we have in the past.

Your splendid work has been a great inspiration to me. I wish that I could have contributed as much as I have gained from my association with you. Working for the church is most satisfactory. I would be very sad about giving up this responsibility if it were not for the fact that I will be succeeded by such an able Chairman—Mrs. Jacob Disston.

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The past year has found the various branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, not increased in number but rather strengthened through Prayer, Fellowship, Work, and Gifts.

The bright spot of the year was the formation of a splendid group of young women at St. Giles, Stonehurst. Since last fall this group has been active and most willingly cooperative not only in the four-fold program of the Woman's Auxiliary, but in the various Diocesan functions. This group will be a challenge for all of us to follow and we are proud of them.

Monthly diocesan programs were based on the theme "Witnesses to the power of God—through Prayer and Service."

A very inspirational Quiet Evening was held with the Diocesan Evening Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary with the Rev. J. Jardin Guenther as the conductor. It is hoped that plans will materialize for two such Quiet Evenings in the coming year.

Many of our groups held interesting Reciprocity Meetings, inviting members of other Auxiliaries to attend.

Substantial gifts promoting Social Relations both at home and abroad continually flow from all our branches and our Social Service Fund. We are continuing to assume responsibility for incidental expenses of the young woman, who through the City Mission, is studying to be a nurse.

The Executive Board regrets the retirement of two of its most valuable members: Miss Emma Brehm, for many years a most willing and efficient secretary and Mrs. Charles LaRoche, gracious and untiring chairman for Christian Social Relations. Both of these places will be hard to fill after years of devoted service rendered by each member.

The year's activities were climaxed with a most successful Annual Dinner. Miss Catherine Smith, young and enthusiastic traveling secretary for the Student Volunteer Movement—which is part of the World Student Chris-

tian Federation, challenged young women, as we have never been before, to our privilege and our task as Christians to help build a World Christian Community.

Several branches are having "porch meetings" during the summer to sew for the Supply Department and to continue discussions on "Christianity and World Order."

We look forward to a new year of adventure and progress as we feel the time has come for a new type of program to take the place of our monthly Diocesan meetings. This fall during the months of October and November, our Executive Board will hold sectional meetings throughout the diocese with one or more groups joining together for these functions. We will endeavour to interpret the Woman's Auxiliary program through the medium of the Panel Discussion. We trust that our new experiment will help us to reach more individual young women and will challenge the formation of new groups.

Plans were made to reach the parishes with no Auxiliaries by means of District meetings. In October a tea meeting was arranged at the house of the Chairman in Bryn Mawr so that Mrs. Burton could explain something about her work in the Department of Christian Social Relations to a group of women of the Church of the Redeemer. As Chairman of Promotion I have spoken to 18 Auxiliaries. I have had several meetings in the houses of people in Bryn Mawr who were interested in starting a group of younger women at the Church of the Redeemer. It has been over fifteen years since the Church League for the Isolated was started in this Diocese. It has had a steady growth during these years and we feel that our work is a help and comfort to those whom we visit, and a means of helping them "to hold on to God."

The Rev. Dr. Armstrong, in his meditation at our first fall meeting, urged us to remember the love, simplicity, and mercy of God, and before making our calls strive for this peace in our own hearts, so we can impart it to our isolated. How to find this peace? We have been told the way as Jesus himself acquired it—to "Be still and know that I am God." Our Devotional Chairman, Miss Ewing, has emphasized this thought in the opening prayers at our meetings.

It is with real regret that we parted with Sister Mary Kathleen, who was called to a larger service outside the Diocese, by the Order of the Holy Nativity.

Our Corresponding Secretary, Miss Elizabeth Haupt Smith, also finds it necessary to sever her connection with the League after holding office for over eleven years. She also will be greatly missed.

The League is financed principally by the Diocesan Auxiliary, by individual gifts, and contributions from several parish Auxiliaries. These enable us to distribute at each meeting over eight hundred Forward booklets, World Day of Prayer leaflets, Christmas and Easter cards, Motto Calendars, and at Christmas the Bishop's personal letter. We aid Miss Dorothy Kohl's work in the Church School by Mail with scholarships, by sending "Forwards" to many of the parents of the pupils enrolled.

One of our correspondents in the Cresson Tuberculosis Sanatorium, speaking for the Episcopalians there, has urged us to endeavor to have services started in the Chapel. We have taken up the matter with Bishop Mann of Pittsburgh. This patient is anxious for contributions of material for the Devotional Hour and for books for the Library.

Will you come to our meetings, (listed in the Church News and the Woman's Auxiliary Calendar), hear some of the interesting details of our work, and help us in any way you can suggest in this very vital activity.

The Department has valued the close co-operation with the Woman's Auxiliary during the year. The records of the Department of Religious Education show that almost 1,800 visitors came to Room 30 last year and this

number is exclusive of those who came for meetings and conferences. The department had working contacts with 180 parishes and missions. 125 volunteers have helped to carry on the tremendous work of this department through committee work, teaching and special jobs. Many of these volunteers gave a great deal of time in teaching and administering the School of Christian Education (formerly the Normal School) which is in its 22nd year; the Winter and Summer Conferences which are still very young but very well known for their fine faculties and spirit of fellowship; and the 71st Annual Church School Institute which is known to every one in the diocese. The total enrollment for these events, last year, was 964.

Over 3,000 came to the Presentation Service of the Lenten Offering held on the beautiful grounds of the Episcopal Academy and over \$39,000 was presented for the missionary work of the Church.

The Youth Commission has promoted the program of the United Movement of the Church's Youth throughout the year, and the Week Day Religious Education group is preparing for the time when "released time" is granted by the school boards, and are co-operating in those communities where schools are now established.

The Church School by Mail has had a total of 349 children on the rolls during the year. Of these 40 are now attending Church School, 35 have moved, and 13 are no longer interested, leaving an enrollment at present of 261. These have been connected with 20 rural parishes by sending in the names, addresses and background story to the rectors. In addition to Forward Movement and other literature, 11,020 lessons were prepared and mailed and 2,251 question sheets corrected and returned. 53 towns and districts were surveyed and 19 schools visited to find children unable to attend a Church School. 241 visits were made to the families. To finance the securing and mailing of lesson material 132 scholarships were given by Church Schools, Woman's Auxiliaries and individuals. Some materials were donated and Christmas presents were sent to all the children by the scholarship donors, the Junior Woman's Auxiliary, the League for the Isolated and others. The pupils themselves made a Lenten Offering of \$20.01.

The Church Periodical Club is happy to have had regular monthly meetings during the past season with a very good average attendance; three of these meetings have been of a social nature along with the business sessions, including a tea, the annual luncheon and a picnic luncheon.

Our speakers have included Miss Margaret Hinckley of the Philadelphia Free Library, Rev. Robert Y. Davis of San Juan Indian Mission, N. M., Rev. L. L. Rose, Sagada, P. I., and Miss Blanche M. Nichola, of St. Martha's Settlement House. All of these have brought to us the inside story of the work being done in their various mission fields, making our duty of continued help, interest and enthusiasm very clear to us.

In order to answer more requests, a "Ways and Means" committee was appointed in September which has been very much alive and has worked cheerfully and successfully toward adding more "shekels" to the C. P. C. treasury.

The lack of literature concerning the Episcopal Church is felt by many missionaries and is a need which is keenly realized by the Church Periodical Club whose members are trying to alleviate in so far as their resources will allow. Fifty new books on the history, background and teachings of the Episcopal Church have been sent to the Philadelphia Free Library and two Church magazines as well, to fulfill the request that the Episcopal Church might have a space on their shelves as well as other denominations.

The "Main Line of Defence" for the C. P. C. has been and still is the distribution of reading matter to the Army, Navy, Marine and Air Forces; these requests are being met by the different C. P. C. Secretaries along with the Diocesan branch, the latter having made a money donation of twenty-five dollars to the Army and Navy Commission towards purchasing Prayer Books and Hymnals for the men in service.

It has been most delightful to welcome a new C. P. C. branch into our membership, S. Clement, Phila., which, it is hoped, will be an example for other Churches in the Diocese to follow.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH MISSION OF HELP YOUTH CONSULTATION SERVICE

This service for young women and girls between the ages of fourteen and twenty-five has been going on steadily during the past year, giving more help in behavior problems than ever before.

War conditions inevitably have brought us greater responsibilities, because general unrest, nervous tension and emotional strain always follow in the wake of war. As each client comes to our attention a diagnosis of her problems is made and appropriate treatment advised. Every situation is studied carefully, home, school and working conditions are taken thoroughly into account. Then our planning begins, with her rather than for her, so that our work may be carried on co-operatively.

Our solutions are many and varied; they include physical examinations and medical treatment, psychological examination and psycho-therapy, together with the provision for dental and eye care. Our plans also include help in straightening out school problems and in securing suitable employment. All our efforts are directed toward helping these young women to help themselves.

In Miss Hilma Newman, our Secretary, we have a most capable and understanding director, who is, we are proud to say, recognized as forward looking by other agencies than our own. She is leaving nothing undone to make our own Church Agency useful to the clergy and a great power for good in the lives of girls and young women in this large Diocese. And we of the Board know that she is succeeding.
