## Minutes of Annual Meeting

On October 26th, 1900, the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Ascension Church, Pittsburgh.

The celebration of the Holy Communion at 10 o'clock was followed by an address of welcome from the Bishop of Pittsburgh who had just returned from the Missionary Council at Louisville.

The Bishop gave his impressions of the stimulating influences of the Council, and then introduced the first speaker, Miss Mann who has spent eight years in Japan. Her present work is among the women and children at Aomori and she gave a very interesting account of her personal experiences.

At the close of her address, Archdeacon Spurr of Western Virginia filled in the few remaining moments before noon by some remarks on his own success in raising money.

After the noonday prayers for Missions, the Auxiliary adjourned to the chapel, where the annual business meeting was held.

The roll call was made by Parishes, twenty-five Parishes being represented with about seventy delegates present.

The reading of the annual reports was omitted.

The Nominating Committee presented their ballot and no other nominations being made from the floor, the following officers were elected by acclamation :

A written proposition was made that the present Constitution be revised.

The Committee on Revision submitted the changes which seemed necessary in the present Constitution, and while there were differing opinions on the wording of some articles, the revision as a whole seemed to meet with general approval.

There was some discussion on a fixed date for the Annual Meeting.

It was finally moved and seconded that the date of the Annual Meeting be left for further consideration and incorporated in Article XIV. of the new Constitution. Carried.

The Temporary Committee on Revision asked to be discharged, but it was moved and seconded that the Committee be retained to complete the work. Carried.

It was regularly moved and seconded that the appropriations for Joint Work for the coming year be the same in object and amount as last year. Carried.

A motion was made and seconded that an additional appropriation of \$50.00 be given to the Church at Sendai, Japan, making our appropriations for this year \$700.00. Carried.

The report of the Treasurer of the United Offering was read, and the amount raised in the past two years has been \$1,028.67.

There is still one year for the further increase of this fund before the time of the General Convention, and it was unanimously agreed that the amount from our own Diocese ought to exceed the \$1,400.00 given at the time of the last General Convention.

A motion to adjourn until 2:30 was made and carried, and the members assembled in the Parish House where an abundant luncheon was served by the ladies of the Parish.

At 2:30 the business meeting was resumed. A vote of thanks was tendered to the ladies of Ascension Church for their generous hospitality.

The change of time and place for the November meeting was announced, and the business meeting closed.

The members returned to the Church for the afternoon addresses.

Bishop Holly, of Haiti, made an address, telling how the foundations of his work were laid forty years ago, and how the work had steadily progressed. He now desired funds to establish trades schools and was asking help for this purpose.

Archdeacon Spurr told more fully of his own parochial work in Moundsville, West Virginia, and of its needs.

Miss Mann made another address on her work in Japan and the exercises of the day closed with a few fitting words from Bishop Whitehead.

All who were present felt that the meeting had been successful in numbers and interest; that the social side had been most carefully considered, and that the influences of the day ought to stimulate us to greater zeal in the coming year of work.

## Recording Secretary's Report.

---

There is reason for encouragement in the attendance at the monthly meetings during the past year, and the interest shown in all work undertaken by the Auxiliary.

Nine regular and two special meetings have been held at which much routine business was transacted, yet nearly every meeting has been enlivened by addresses from Church workers, enthusiastic over their special line of work.

The Bishop and Clergy have spoken words of cheer and encouragement, and we have listened to Auxiliary workers from the Dioceses of Albany, California and Western New York.

The Annual Meeting was held in October, in Ascension Church, and was very successful in numbers and interest, 70 delegates being present who represented 25 parishes.

In November the Auxiliary went visiting and held an all-day meeting in St. Thomas' Church, Oakmont. Thirty-five (35) members were present and the day was one of pleasure and profit.

On December 1st a special meeting was held when the members of the Auxiliary enjoyed the privilege of listening to an address by Bishop Partridge of Japan.

The April meeting was largely devoted to the interests of the United Offering.

The contents of the mite boxes were collected and arrangements were made to present the Offering at the time of the General Convention in an envelope to be decorated with a sketch of the first church building in the Diocese and also the Diocesan Seal.

One of the Vice Presidents gave an interesting account of a visit to Dr. Hunter's School at Raleigh, N. C., and was enthusiastic over the many evidences she saw of the careful expenditure of the money entrusted to them.

The May meeting was occupied in hearing the yearly statements and in arrangements for the semi-annual meeting.

The report of the Treasurer for the current year showed a sufficient balance to warrant an additional appropriation of \$100.00 to Dr. Hunter's work and reports from the other departments of the work were equally satisfactory.

In looking over the past year's work we see much occasion for renewed hopefulness.

A higher note was struck when the Auxiliary increased its pledge for Joint Work and the pledge fulfilled gives us confidence to attempt greater things in the future.

The fact that the United Offering will probably exceed in amount the sum raised three years ago is an occasion for rejoicing, but a greater joy lies in the fact that through this agency many a woman of humble means has been induced to give of her little for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.

The Treasurer of Miss Carter's Salary has successfully accomplished her year's work and a sale of the Indian lace held in December under the auspices of the Auxiliary was very satisfactory in financial results.

These are bald statements of the work accomplished, but only a few realize the expenditure of time and patience necessary to attain these results.

In January the Treasurer of one of the funds sent out 82 letters of reminder and said she could now realize what the Bishop meant when the two words "much correspondence" appeared in his official diary.

In this connection we must not overlook the work of the Corresponding Secretary, who writes many letters and sends many postals each month and is the distributing agency for missionary letters and literature.

The great discouragement in our year's work has been the lack of directors for the Junior Auxiliary.

In some parishes the work has been faithfully carried on, but it must inevitably suffer without leaders to plan and direct the work and confer with the central organization in New York.

There never was a time when women's powers of organization were more highly developed than at present.

Nearly every community has its Woman's Club where a readiness of address, fluency in debate and parliamentary precision are easily acquired.

Our college women are associated together, each coterie anxious and eager to uphold the honor of its own Alma Mater.

And among all this abundance of trained intellect, wealth and leisure, is there no woman who feels called upon to devote a portion of her time and talents to directing the work of the children of the Church?

There is no Church work so delightful as work among the children. One is fired by their enthusiasm and there is never the deadening weight of utter hopelessness where young life abounds.

This is the 21st Annual Report of the Pittsburgh Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary—this means that it has attained its majority—the work is no longer tentative but an assured success.

The first enthusiasm may have worn away, but the underlying principles that brought the Auxiliary into being still remain strong and vigorous.

Twenty years ago the first report was printed in pamphlet form

where we see our President's name heading the list of officers as it does today.

Many of those whose names appear in that first report have gone to their final rest, but their works do follow them.

The few who remain have seen so many human failures turned into unexpected triumphs that they cannot be easily dismayed.

We feel sure that their mature judgment and chastened faith make a safe foundation for the Woman's Auxiliary to build on in this or any other Dioceses of the Church.

But these "Mothers in Israel" should not lack loyal daughters to ease their burdens and lighten their labors and when the work of the Auxiliary is perfected there will be no break in the succession of service. Where childhood and youth have been spent in the training of the Junior Auxiliary it will be a natural transition in mature years to assume the duties of the older organization.

During the past year, 17 boxes were prepared for city and Diocesan work and 53 boxes for work without the Diocese, with a total value of \$3,370.48.

The Treasurer has disbursed \$1,124.50 and an additional \$600.00 has been applied to Miss Carter's salary by the Treasurer of that fund.

These amounts do not include any money sent for the United Offering, which report must of necessity be incomplete until the time of the General Convention.

The Junior Auxiliary has distributed boxes and money to the value of \$534.84.

The grand total in value of boxes and money given is \$5,629.82.

## A Summary of the 12th Annual Report of the Junior Auxiliary

The State of the Junior Auxiliary in our Diocese is not encouraging, if we judge from its reports.

During the past four years of prosperity and advancement along so many lines, this society has steadily decreased in membership and offerings.

In 1897 there were reports from 28 branches with offerings, in cash and boxes, amounting to \$1,341.00. This year we have reports from 14 branches, their offerings valued at \$534.84.

The Juniors have been without a President for two years and this may partly account for their loss of interest but it cannot be the only cause, as reports show a decrease when under the leadership of a most able and energetic President.

When the Junior Auxiliary was organized at the General Convention in 1889, it was to be under the direction of the Woman's Auxiliary. May we not hope that the women of our Diocese will come to the rescue of this important work for our children and young people, by giving them such wise and patient care and oversight that their interest in Missions may revive and while they are growing in knowledge of all that is desirable for this life, their King and His kingdom shall not be forgotten.

The work suggested by Miss Emery for the coming year is for the Indian Schools under the Rev. John Robinson, Sisseton Agency, South Dakota. Two hundred and fifty gifts are asked for to be sent next fall. Pledges have been given for 225 gifts. Twenty-five remain to be provided. Boxes by freight should be shipped before or during the first week in December.
