MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Thomas' Memorial Church, Oakmont, November 2. There were seventy present besides the Bishop, Clergy and Choir, at the Corporate Communion service at 9:30 A. M. The Bishop's helpful words cheered and encouraged all who heard him.

At 11 o'clock the business meeting was held in the Parish House. Mrs. Adams presided, and made some very happy remarks about how fitting it was that the annual meeting should be held in a Parish that had given such faithful workers to the Auxiliary in days gone by, Mrs. Felix Brunot having been the first Corresponding Secretary, and Miss Wade and Miss Macrum having their names in the first report.

Twenty-four Parishes were represented by delegates, and the usual pledges were made toward the apportionment, which this year will be sent through the Parish Treasurer, Mrs. Wurts, Treasurer of the Auxiliary, that it may be counted on the Parish apportionment, and at the same time permit a record to be made of the work done by the women. Gifts for special objects should be sent direct to Mrs. Wurts, under which class will fall all contributions to the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund.

The terms of all the officers having expired, Miss Byram presented the following report as Chairman of the Nominating Committee:

"The division of the Diocese has made necessary a change in the officers of the Auxiliary, two of the Vice Presidents, Mrs. Mackey, of Franklin, and Mrs. Brooks, of Oil City, now being connected with the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Erie. It has also been thought expedient to appoint a new officer as a sort of link between the Mission Study Class and the Traveling Secretary, to be named 'Educational Secretary.' This makes a further change in the Executive Board. The Nominating Committee, therefore, submits the following list of names to be voted on, hoping that it will be remembered that nominations from the floor are in order if desired:

These officers having been duly elected, Mrs. Adams gave an interesting review of the Auxiliary and its officers, the items being culled from the annual reports of the Auxiliary from the establishment of the Pittsburgh Branch up to the present time.

Mrs. Whitehead presented the following Memorial:

IN MEMORIAM—MARGARET BATEMAN PADDOCK.

"Seldom has the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese been called upon to mourn the loss of an officer and member more beloved than Margaret Bateman Paddock. She served most efficiently as Vice President for six years. Our meetings were always enriched when she was present, and when her removal from this city caused her to withdraw from attendance we were all conscious of the loss of much which gave value to our assembly. She was singularly well fitted for the work, as she kept in remarkably close touch with missionary interest in this country and in foreign lands. She attracted all to her by her personality, and influenced all who knew her by her gentleness, sincerity and fidelity. In every relation of life she was most highly esteemed, and her departure from the city, and now from the Church below, has been a bereavement to us all. Her name and face and influence will long abide as a benediction with all who knew her. We commend her loved ones, sadly deprived of her constant presence, to the consolation which comes from the Christian hope of a blessed reunion in a fairer and a better world.

About two hundred partook of a delicious luncheon provided by the ladies of St. Thomas' Parish, and at 2 o'clock the Auxiliary assembled in the Church to listen to addresses by the Right Reverend, the Bishop of Idaho, who told what it meant to be a Missionary Bishop, and of his work in the Diocese with the beautiful Indian name which means "Light Upon the Mountains," a Diocese so large that ours would be lost in it; and the Rev. Hugh L. Burleson, one of the Secretaries of the General Board of Missions, who told of the new arrangements in the Board's administration of the Church's Missionary Work, and showed how economically the funds are handled.

Bishop Whitehead announced the second ingathering of the United Offering at \$416.66, which has since been considerably increased, a report of which is subjoined.

A vote of thanks was given to the Rector and people of St. Thomas' Church for their charming hospitality.

A greeting was received from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Erie.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

The privilege of being an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary is a rare one, bringing many pleasures as well as many duties. One of the pleasures is to look back over the work of the year, as we may in this collection of reports, finding satisfaction in each and every statement of Parish branches and organizations.

But from the greater number is withheld the privilege of being active members, and to them the different reports cannot make the harmonious whole that appears to those members who are fully familiar with all the details of the work.

And to this large body of friends who sympathize with the work and the workers, the Recording Secretary presents the following resume of the year's work:

The Woman's Auxiliary has passed through two years of changing conditions both within and without the Diocese. This is our first complete year of work since the Diocese of Erie was formally separated from the Diocese of Pittsburgh, and at our annual meeting the Nominating Committee took cognizance of this fact, and regret-

fully removed the names of the officers in the old Northern Convocation, who have always held high standards and have been unwavering in their loyalty and devotion.

Our past relations as "workers together" will be a pleasant memory and a present inspiration, and we pray for them that in assuming greater responsibilities they may gain increased blessings. Our annual meeting was a very successful one, a large number being present, the business of the day being carried through with enthusiasm and good will. Some features were noteworthy, as, for instance, the holding of the business meeting in the morning and reserving the afternoon for the missionary addresses. The order of business was disposed of with greater promptness, and it seemed more convenient for the general public to come in the afternoon to hear Bishop Funsten and the Rev. Hugh Burleson, who were the speakers of the day. Another feature was the literature exhibit, which could not fail to impress everyone who studied it, and great credit is due the women who carried out their work so attractively and so well.

The enthusiasm manifested at the annual meeting has never flagged during the entire year. All the meetings have been well attended, and we have been highly privileged in having speakers come from time to time, who touched on many sides of a many-sided question. Rev. Mr. Cleaveland has told of the work among the white mountaineers in Virginia; Dr. Bratenahl, the Educational Secretary of the Third Missionary Department, has cleared up some misty outlooks; Deaconess Goodwin has told of her work among college girls to turn their thoughts to a consecration of their lives to missionary service, and the President of the Los Angeles branch has told of the methods in a sister Diocese. At the time of the Indian lace sale (and a very successful sale it was) Bishop Thomas spoke of the conditions that existed in the Diocese of Wyoming; and at a later date we had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Hadsell, a lace teacher, whose salary is pledged by those to whom the memory of Miss Carter's work is sacred. The money thus raised is held apart from the regular funds and called the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund, to be used in sending a lace teacher to the Indian women; and as our efficient Treasurers have been able to secure \$500 each year since Miss Carter's death we do not feel that there is any lessening of interest in the work so dear to Miss Carter and to her friends. The smaller area of the present Diocese of Pittsburgh has made it more practicable to bring the Auxiliary work to the notice of every Parish and Mission Station, and for this and other reasons the educational side of missionary problems has been more strongly emphasized. We hope in time to have a Secretary in every Parish who will make an effort to come to some central point to a Missions Study Class, and, being herself instructed and inspired, she will be able to interest others, for we are becoming more alive to the

absurdity of expecting people to give anything to a cause with which they are unfamiliar. The Misions Study Class has had a most successful year, taking up a review of the book, "The Why and How of Foreign Missions," and four meetings were held, three papers being read at each meeting. The papers were carefully prepared and the attendance was most gratifiyng, while the social hour that followed was a very pleasant feature.

One of our old Auxiliary landmarks has been left behind in the march of progress. "Joint Work"—how many memories of oft repeated and fruitless discussions are conjured up by these words! Let us make of this old and not always illuminative milestone a monument to the old methods and a finger-post to the new. For from the old method of Joint Work has been evolved the newer and better method of Apportionment, which deals not only with the Diocese, but with the Parish and with the individual. At first, in our simplicity, we feared that the Parish apportionment would hamper the work of the Auxiliary, but the very opposite result has obtained.

The Woman's Missionary Society in every Parish can now be assured that when they pledge a certain amount to pass through the hands of the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary it will be credited on their Parish apportionment, unless it is stipulated that their pledge be applied to some special work, and this applies also to all funds sent through the Junior Auxiliary and the Babies' Branch. From the experience of this first year we have found that it is better to send the money through our Auxiliary Treasurer, as in that case it is not only credited on the Parish apportionment, but is also included in the official report of the Diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In looking over the work of the past year we are filled with thankfulness that so much has been accomplished. The first three ingatherings of the United Offering amount to \$1,424.09. Cannot we set ourselves the task during the next 18 months of making this offering to equal, if not to exceed, the last Triennial Offering of \$3,300 from the Diocese of Pittsburgh when we still had the co-operation of the Diocese of Erie?

One of the most encouraging features of the Junior Auxiliary work has been the interest taken by all the Parish Directors in a Missions Study Class held for their benefit, and in the formation of study classes in all the Parish branches.

We who work among the young people find them so eager and so competent, and it is an encouragement to know that when the work is taken out of our hands these beloved children will be more fully trained than we were, and may avoid many of our mistakes. We regret to note the removal from the Diocese of one of our beloved and faithful Directors, but we still rejoice in the possession of a Director compe-

tent and considerate, progressive and patient, showing the utmost tact in dealing with different conditions in different Parishes; and we pray that her new associate may find much happiness in assuming a fair proportion of the duties and responsibilities that are imposed on the Directors of the Junior Auxiliary. One new branch of the Junior Auxiliary has been formed and two Babies' Branches.

Here it will not be amiss to call attention to the practical workings of the Babies' Branch, since we are still without a Director to organize and instruct. Some there are who feel that the Babies' Branch is only a sentimental expression of missionary zeal, but if they would study the magnitude of this work among the denominations, and also learn of its successful operation in some Dioceses, they would become its zealous supporters. For Parishes with limited resources it is one of the most practical forms of missionary activity. In such Parishes the women who can give their time are enrolled in the Sewing Society, and working to keep up repairs and make improvements, and beyond the stated collections they cannot lay aside money for Missions. They never count on much help from the mothers of young children, and right here is the finest opportunity to organize a Missionary Society. For the Babies' Branch includes the mothers as well as the babies, and the thought of giving one penny each week is not terrifying, and to the one who organizes the branch the thought of arranging for two social meetings each year is not appalling. The mothers enjoy the meetings and become interested in one another, and the babies grow so fast and become so attached to one another that in a few short years there is the natural growth into the Junior Auxiliary.

Another work going on quietly year after year with ever-increasing results has been the Church Periodical Club, whose correspondent has many letters to write and many tedious details to arrange that require patience and accuracy. But when she can point to the amount accomplished, as shown by her yearly report, she can lay claim to the blessings in store for those who, for love of the Master, are willing to gather up the fragments and redistribute them, miraculously multiplied.

In bringing together this statement of the year's work we feel very much like the thrifty housewife who looks over her accounts for the year. The memory of her toilsome efforts to obtain certain results will cast out all unworthy pride; but as she reviews her struggles, with honest satisfaction, no doubt, she yet cannot repress the wish that clothes itself in the homely phrase, "If only I had a little more to come and go on." And there is the rub in our Auxiliary housekeeping. We have shown you of our comings and goings, and we know how much more efficient they could be made with an increased allowance. We ought to have more funds to pay the necessary bills for

printing and postage, and the traveling expenses of the speakers, who are always an inspiration, and we ought to be able to give occasional help to the needy and distressed. For this purpose, during the past two years, we have been soliciting friends to become honorary members of the Auxiliary, and this list now numbers 11, but we need 100, and it is not too many to ask for.

Are you too absorbed in social engagements to take any active part in the Auxiliary work? You can, at least, give us your moral support, just as you would become a patroness of some worthy benefit.

Is your time entirely taken up with civic matters or club work? Let us have your name as counting for us and not against us.

Has ill health, or some sad break in your family circle, caused you to withdraw your once-active interest in the Auxiliary?

Dear friend, you are still responsible for the work you helped to develop. We need your gifts, we need your prayers, and, perchance, the dear one who has left you was interested, and it might comfort you to know that a gift "In Memoriam" was helping on the work she loved. Truly, that little more to come and go on would make our Auxiliary household a well-ordered household. Your slight denial would help those who are "ministering to the needs of the saints" to go about their work with less of the worry and care of Martha, and enable them to cultivate more of the spirit of Mary, who, having made due preparation to welcome the Master, was ready to listen to each word that came from the lips of her Divine Guest.

REPORT OF MISSIONS STUDY CLASS

There has been conducted in the Diocese, under the leadership of the Woman's Auxiliary, for many years a splendid program Missions Study Class, of which Miss E. S. Wade, of St. Thomas' Parish, Oakmont, was the able and enthusiastic Chairman, and the Auxiliary feels the keenest regret that she feels obliged to give up the office this year. This class meets four times during the winter, and papers are prepared and read on some branch of Christian Missions. Last year it was the "How and Why of Foreign Missions;" this year it will be the "Conquest of the Continent," dealing with Missions in our own land. A printed program giving the dates and places of meeting and the subjects of papers, etc., will be issued, and it is hoped that every one who can attend these meetings will do so. There will also be held in some of the Parishes, and for the Junior Auxiliary leaders, smaller classes for the study of Japan, the course prescribed for the whole Church by the Board of Missions, and the Educational Secretary of the Auxiliary, Mrs. H. P. Allen, 652 Maryland avenue, Pittsburgh, will be glad if any Parish branch wishing to have such a class will call upon her for any counsel or advice they may need to form one. She has had an unusual opportunity in the past summer in attending the Missionary Educational Movement Conference at Silver Bay, Lake George, and is anxious that the Diocese should have the benefit of the knowledge and inspiration gained there. Is it too much to hope that every Parish will have at least one such Missions Study class during the winter. The Junior Missions Study plans are not yet definitely made, but it is hoped that after the course begun last year has been finished their leaders will be ready for the Junior course on Japan.

The first occasion of a visit to St. Peter's, Butler, with an afternoon meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, proved most interesting. There being an opportunity to organize a Branch of the Junior Auxiliary at the Church of the Epiphany, Bellevue, it was a great pleasure to find assembled a group of young girls, who started in at once as an organization.

Another phase of work was the forming of a Babies' Branch at the Church of the Nativity, Crafton. The 26 "Little Helpers," all ready and eager to begin their part in the great endeavor of the Church, made one feel that this field must be better cared for in the future.

A new Branch having been formed at Aspinwall it was most gratifying to see the interest in learning the best ways of doing Auxiliary work.

The Church of the Incarnation, Knoxville, presented a new field for the Auxiliary, and at a meeting with a fine attendance a Branch was formed.

St. Peter's, Pittsburgh, was visited during Lent, and later a most pleasant afternoon was spent with the ladies of the Church of the Redeemer, Pittsburgh. The last visit of the year was to St. Stephen's, McKeesport, where the special topic of "The United Offering" was discussed.
