MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held on October 31 and November 1, 1912. The exercises of the first day were held in S. James' Memorial Church, Pittsburgh, beginning with the celebration of the Holy Communion at 9:30 o'clock, about ninety women being present. At this service Bishop Whitehead spoke on the Epistle for the twenty-first Sunday after Trinity, and his words were calculated to cheer and encourage the Auxiliary workers.

The annual business meeting immediately followed, and Mrs. Adams, in her greeting to the Auxiliary, emphasized the need of consecrated women to carry on all missionary endeavor. The roll call was responded to by 150 delegates from 26 Parishes, and pledges amounting to \$887.00 were made on the apportionment.

Following the time-honored custom of the Auxiliary, the officers of the past year resigned, and Miss Byram, as Chairman of the Nominating Committee, became Temporary Chairman of the meeting, and presented the report of the Nominating Committee. At the close of this report further nominations were called for, and no nominations being made, it was regularly moved, seconded and carried that the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot for the names presented by the Nominating Committee, as follows:

The collection of the United Offering was made, and Miss Cuddy, Treasurer, read the report to date, showing receipts amounting to \$2,001.71.

The President called the attention of the meeting to the literature exhibit, to the Junior exhibit, and to a Missionary map of the Diocese, prepared by Mrs. Emerling, indicating by colored pennants the different departments of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary undertaken by the different Parishes in the Diocese.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered to the congregation of S. James' Church for its generous hospitality to the Auxiliary, and the business meeting was adjourned.

At 12:30 o'clock a bountiful luncheon was served to more than two hundred members and friends of the Auxiliary, and at 2 o'clock addresses were made in the Church by the speakers who had come to Pittsburgh for the occasion. The Rev. John G. Meem, of Brazil, well known to the older generation of Auxiliary workers, told of the wonderful progress made by our Church in the district of Rio Grande de Sul in South America. Only a trifle over a score of years have passed since four young men went there to fight against appalling odds of ignorance, superstition and the corrupt practices of a debased religion. One of these four young men is now the Bishop of an organized Diocese with 20 native Clergy and 1,200 communicants.

Miss Elizabeth Wood, of Wu Chang, China, then gave a most interesting account of her experiences as one of the Red Cross workers during the late rebellion in China. She outlined her principal mission to this country, which was to arouse interest in and to secure books and funds for the Boone Library in Wu Chang.

This closed the program for the first day of the annual meeting, which had been a most helpful and enjoyable day to all who were present.

The second day of the annual meeting—All Saints' Day—was devoted to an all-day conference at the Church of the Ascension. The attendance was limited to Diocesan officers, officers of Parish Branches, and to Parish officers over various departments of the work. After the celebration of the Holy Communion by the Rev. Mr. McFettridge the morning was devoted to conferences, and Miss Tillottson, the Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, conducted a Model Missions Study class, assisted by Mrs. H. P. Allen, our own Educational Secretary.

At 1 o'clock a simple luncheon was served to eighty guests, and

at 2 o'clock the women assembled for a further conference, and Miss Tillottson conducted another Missions Study class on the closing chapter of the new text book on Japan which is to be used in the winter's work of the Missions Study classes.

The meeting then closed, and all present signified their hearty sympathy and support in repeating next year the experiment of this season, namely, a two-day session of the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary.

These are the bare statistics of a busy year of Auxiliary life within our own Diocese, and a very satisfactory summing up it is to those who can trace each sum back to its source of self-denial, and can look forward to the results to be accomplished by means of this work. We are justified this year in looking forward as well as backward, for while the official disbursement of the United Offering will appear in next year's report, the itemized account of the three years' ingathering will be found on a separate leaf at the back of this pamphlet—kept back until the last minute that no sum may go unnoticed. So that in addition to the figures given at the head of this report there will still be an additional sum of approximately

\$3,000.00, which represents the faith and thankfulness of the United Offering workers. Three years ago, before the Diocese of Erie had been set off from the Diocese of Pittsburgh, the Triennial Offering for the united Diocese totaled \$3,300.00. This year it seems certain that the offering in our own Diocese will reach, if not exceed, the sum of \$3,000.00, while that of the Diocese of Erie will approximately reach to \$2,000.00—a happy instance of the truth that in missionary arithmetic division is not subtraction, but multiplication.

At the back of this pamphlet will be found still another itemized report of the Diocesan share in a sum gathered by loving friends for a devoted worker at the Church Missions House, and this adds approximately still another \$570.00 to our work of this year which will appear in the disbursements of next year.

Truly it has been a happy year in the Auxiliary, marked by peaceful, well-ordered endeavor, and by a steady growth in interest and results.

There has been a great increase in the work of the Church Periodical Club, made possible by the increasing efforts of our Librarian, who after her attendance at the twenty-fifth anniversary in New York came home to work with a clearer vision of the possibilities in her work. When we know how our mails are filled with worse than useless printed matter, is it not the bounden duty of every Christian woman to help to stem the evil tide by sharing uplifting reading matter with her less-favored neighbors? If any one of us should try the experiment of keeping our gratuitous mail for one month we would be amazed to see how little of it was sane and wholesome. All honor to our Librarian, therefore, in her efforts to illumine a few of the dark corners of the world!

Our Junior work has never been in better shape, as can be seen by reading its report. The Diocesan and Parish Directors have incited one another to zeal and good works, and underneath all the material gain there has been a growth in things spiritual among the young people, shown by their increased willingness to join Missions Study classes, by their desire to share in the privileges of the United Offering, and by their higher ideals of service.

One great happiness came to the Auxiliary officers in June, when a small coterie of young women, some of them newly married, formed themselves into a missionary society and affiliated with the Auxiliary. In giving them the heartiest welcome we can say to them, without affectation or insincerity, that they are introducing a wholesome savor into their lives that will sweeten and bless their whole earthly existence, and we bid them Godspeed in their work, knowing they will gain far more than they give.

This one instance is a foretaste of the rich harvest of Auxiliary

workers for which the seed is being sown by the Directors of the Junior Auxiliary. One Branch of the Junior Auxiliary has been formed, and one Babies' Branch. How the little ones are overlooked in our Auxiliary work, and what a pity! For if the baby once gets into the missionary family it grows up there as a matter of course. It is very easy to start a Babies' Branch when all the boxes and literature are provided without expense; and as to entertaining the babies, they are quite competent to entertain themselves. We know of one Parish where the little box is given when the child is baptized, and on one occasion, when the box was not forthcoming, the indignant mother demanded it, saying she wanted her child to belong to the "Angels' Branch."

We are happy to note a substantial increase this past year in the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund. The original plan was to collect \$500.00 each year in memory of dear Miss Carter, to be spent in paying the salary of a lace teacher for the Indian women. This plan has not only been carried out, but an additional \$100.00 has been gathered, as many felt that \$500.00 could not adequately support a teacher on the Indian reservation, where fuel and provisions are expensive. We need not fear to give our Missionaries too much. If they had the riches of Solomon they would spend it on others, and Miss Carter's chiefest thought in regard to herself was to reduce the impediments of her earthly pilgrimage until the cost of her living could coincide with an honorable independence.

One of the most gratifying features of our work has been the ever-increasing interest in the study of Missions. The enthusiasm of our Educational Secretary has influenced many women in many Parishes, for she has spared no effort in fitting herself for this important office, freely giving her time to attendance at Missionary gatherings and long journeys to conferences on Missions Study.

Conferences are becoming a very important feature of Missionary endeavor—conferences on work, conferences on study, conferences, in fact, on every aspect of the work. At our annual meeting of last October we had our first Diocesan conference, when our President, working harder than most of us dreamed, lengthened the annual meeting and arranged conferences for the second day with a model Missions Study class, conducted by the Educational Secretary of Southern Ohio and our own Diocesan Secretary. The experiment was most successful—too successful in a way, for everyone was so eager to talk that to an onlooker it might have seemed somewhat effervescent. But to those most interested it was a remarkable expression of the pent-up vigor and activity in many workers. Truly, a very satisfactory meeting, but rather exhausting to our President, who arranged most of the details of the program for the two days. Why not have a committee on arrangements, who will confer with the President and

undertake the necessary correspondence and detail work?

Our annual meeting, with its wealth of good things, has not been our only means of inspiration during the year. Missions Study classes in the Parishes and among the Juniors, a normal class for leaders, and the four meetings of the original program Missions Study Class have given a wider horizon to many and incited them to greater efforts.

At the semi-annual meeting in April, when the fifth ingathering of the United Offering took place, Miss Clarke, from China, gave us a reliable description of the new life in China and the great need for girls' schools.

Bishop Thomas, in a hurried visit, told those who could attend on short notice of the good work done among the Indians in his Diocese by the teacher under the Sybil Carter Fund, and at the March meeting the Educational Secretary of the Third Department made an address to the Auxiliary.

At our last meeting in June we sadly missed one whose presence was always an inspiration. The memory of her life will always be an influence for good, and we pray for ourselves that we may be as prepared to lay down our work when the Master calls. We can never forget how keenly Miss Wade enjoyed her privilege of helping to hasten the coming of His Kingdom, and we can learn from her useful, cheerful life that the greatest reward of faithful service comes in increased opportunities for service.

The list of honorary members has increased in a gratifying manner, and some members have been added "In Memoriam," which seems such a beautiful custom that the list is sure to grow. The older members can feel that their labors will not be forgotten when they see the names of their former fellow-workers on the list of honorary members. There are so many efficient workers and generous givers of former years whose names are practically unknown to the present generation. Could not some loving friend or relative add their names to the memorial list? "God takes the worker, but carries on his work." Truly the heritage of work is passed on to each succeeding generation, and sometimes it strengthens our hands to give a thought to the great host who "having finished their work do now rest from their labors." It may not be our privileges to give costly memorials, and possibly a small sum given yearly for Auxiliary work would exemplify more consistently the life and character of the loved one we wish to honor.

In closing this resume of the year's work, will a word of caution be amiss? The Auxiliary was never more efficiently organized than at this present time, with capable leaders and enthusiastic followers, but all our organizing will become mere machinery instead of a living body without the spirit of prayer. We lean towards deterioration so

naturally that our very eagerness can become our undoing. An honest satisfaction can become conceit, kindly criticism be turned to harsh judgment, and sympathy be changed to intolerance, without the habit of prayer. How many Parish meetings are opened with prayer? Possibly in some cases there has been a neglect to supply the suitable prayers for such occasions, and this year a few prayers have been printed on the inside cover of this report for use at Parish meetings. To teach prayerless nations how to pray is indeed a worthy mission. But how can we impart the priceless gift to others when we ourselves are poor in spirit? Or how can we kindle the sacred flame in others when our own hearts do not burn with zeal? We must give ourselves before our service is accepted, so let us see to it that before we teach others we ourselves are "taught of God."

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REPORT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY

It gives us great pleasure to be able to report this the most successful year in the history of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. We have made improvement along all lines, and we feel that the success is almost entirely due to the very efficient directors which we now have in all Parishes. Early is the year we had a very delightful Missions Study Class for Junior leaders on the Junior book, "The Honorable Little Miss Love," under the very capable direction of our Educational Secretary, Mrs. H. P. Allen. The coming year we will have a similar class on the new Junior book on China. We sincerely hope that every Junior leader will attend this class, as we feel it is the most necessary part of our work.

We sent four very nice boxes this year—one to Nebraska, one to Wind River, Wyoming; one to Porto Rico, and one to St. Simon's Mills, Georgia. The coming year we expect to send our principal boxes to the Pine Ridge Reservation, under Rev. Nevill Joyner; to Ponce, Porto Rico, to Miss Cuddy, and to Rev. Mr. Roberts at Wind River, Wyoming.

We paid \$278.41 on apportionment, which was an increase of \$118.41 over any previous year. We also paid our regular scholarship of \$51.00 for S. Hilda's School in Wuchang, China.

We are able to report one new Branch at Tarentum. We feel justly proud to be able to say that every Branch is represented on this report. The Branch of Christ Church, which in years past did such creditable work, has been reorganized under the direction of Mrs. R. M. Head.

May we not reasonably look for even greater success this coming year? We earnestly beg of all the Rectors and women of the Auxiliary to lend us their aid, so that we may wisely train these young people so that they will become capable and earnest soldiers of the Cross, anxious to do their part in making Christ known to the world.

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

There are at present twenty active Branches of the Church Periodical Club with Librarians in charge. During the year three new Branches were started, at S. Thomas' Mission, Canonsburg; All Saints' Mission, Vandergrift, and S. Peter's Church, Blairsville; and three Branches were revived, at the Church of the Epiphany, Bellevue; S. Mary Memorial, Pittsburgh, and Trinity Church, Pittsburgh.

These twenty Branches, numbering 355 contributors, have regularly sent 465 current periodicals, and have contributed the following miscellaneous matter: Books, 341; odd magazines, 1,199; post cards, 75; calendars, 25, and six barrels of reading matter, contents not noted. From these twenty Branches has been received the sum of \$36.75, and \$51.25 was received from all sources and forwarded to New York, including the sale of 18 C. P. C. calendars at 25 cents each.

One hundred and eighty-seven letters, 72 post cards and 20 reports were written and sent out.

REPORT OF MISSIONS STUDY CLASS

There has been aroused a very decided interest in Missions study among the different Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese during the past year. The four meetings of the Program Missions Study Class on "The Conquest of the Continent" were well attended, and splendid papers were written for them. The class enjoyed the hospitality of S. Mary Memorial, Emmanuel, S. Andrew's and S. Thomas' Memorial, Oakmont. The all-day meeting at the last-named Church will always live in the memory of those present, as it was the last meeting attended by Miss Elizabeth S. Wade, the beloved founder of the class and for ten years its inspiring leader, who two weeks after the meeting left us for her heavenly home. May her Missionary spirit abide with us always.

On the day following the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary on All Saints' Day an institute was held in the Church of the Ascension Parish House after the Communion service in the Church.

Miss Emily C. Tillotson, Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, gave concrete ideas of what Missions study should be, and aroused great interest in the subject. Eighteen Parishes were represented at this meeting, and between fifty and sixty women were present. During the winter a class for Senior leaders, using the textbook, "Japan Advancing Whither?" met once a week for seven weeks and discussed things Japanese; and at the same time and for the same period a class of Junior Auxiliary leaders met, using "The Honorable Little Miss Love." Both of these classes were led by the Educational Secretary.

During Lent nine Parish classes were held conducted by Parish leaders, and one evening class of men and women was most interesting. Over one hundred dollars were expended upon books on Japan (the branch of the Church's missionary effort chosen by the Board of Missions for the year's study), and our horizon has been broadened, our prayer life deepened and our Christianity made more practical by the knowledge so gained.

In addition to the class work done by the Educational Secretary, she visited the Auxiliaries in Butler, Canonsburg, Uniontown, Washington, S. Stephen's, Wilkinsburg; S. Peter's, Pittsburgh, and S. Andrew's Pittsburgh, and spoke to them of what the Church is trying to do for us in broadening our ideas of what her great mission is.

REPORT OF THE ORGANIZING SECRETARY

A most accurate and unique map, comprising the eleven counties of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, was the work of the Organizing Secretary, Mrs. Emerling. This map, on exhibition at the annual meeting last November, showed 36 Parishes and 51 Missions, Parishes being indicated by white pennants and the Missions by brown. The various activities of the Woman's Auxiliary were shown by different colored pennants, so that it was easy to locate the thirty purple flags representing Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, twenty-eight lavender for United Offering, twelve green for Junior Branches; six red for the Babies' Branch, fifteen yellow for Church Periodical Club, and eleven gray for Sybil Carter Memorial Fund.

When this map is shown at the next annual meeting there will be a decided change, as in addition to the new Branches and contributors we are to add a new color indicating the Parishes in which Missions Study Classes have been conducted.

As Mrs. Emerling felt obliged to withdraw, the work of organizing new Branches was taken up by the President, Mrs. Adams,

and the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Allen. A number of new Branches have resulted, as follows: Epiphany, Bellevue, reorganized on new basis; Trinity, Washington; S. Thomas', Canonsburg; S. Mary's, Beaver Falls, and Calvary, Pittsburgh (a Branch of younger women).

A visit was made by Mrs. Adams to S. Andrew's, Pittsburgh, and to S. Thomas' Memorial, Oakmont, both occasions being devoted to a talk dealing particularly with the work of the United Offering. Your President deems it a great privilege to be allowed to enter into such close relations with the Parish Branches, and hopes she may have many such calls in the future.

Your President further wishes to express her appreciation of the great help given her by her fellow-officers and individual members of the Auxiliary in always being ready to respond to opportunities and in the cordial feeling of co-operation which makes our work a joy.

IN MEMORIAM.

ELIZABETH STONE WADE.

"The memory of the just is blessed." No more beautiful instance of the truth of this proverb of the wise King could be found than that furnished by the life and example of that handmaid of the Lord, whose recent loss we mourn—our fellow-worker in the Missionary cause, Miss Elizabeth S. Wade. Only a few short weeks ago she was made happy by the very successful meeting of the Mission Study Class at her Parish Church at Oakmont—a fitting close to her devoted Christian activities. The flowers which she then distributed among those who attended that meeting were emblematic of the blessing of her influence upon all with whom she came in contact in her Missionary work and daily life. Miss Wade was a striking instance of enthusiasm for unselfish service. For sixteen years she lived in California, and for much of that time was President of the Auxiliary of S. Mark's Parish, Berkeley. She was prominent in Church and college life, and her influence on the young people of the university was very marked. Later, at the time of the earthquake, she was visiting in California, and was most active in the relief work. In this Diocese she had been Vice President of the Women's Auxiliary since 1902. In 1903 she organized the Mission Study Class, which was made a part of the Auxiliary work in 1908. In her Parish and in every good cause she was intensely interested, and her associates ever felt the force of her ability and sympathy, and were the better for her friendship.

She fell asleep peacefully—her work well done—her worldly and spiritual affairs well ordered. Her reward is with the Lord, and the care of her is with the Most High; for "grace and mercy is to his saints, and He has care for His elect."

We desire to record our affectionate appreciation of our fellow-worker, and extend our heartfelt sympathy to those related to her by ties of kinship.


