

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held on October 29, 1914, in S. Stephen's Parish, Wilkinsburg. The meeting began at 9:30 o'clock with the celebration of the Holy Communion.

Bishop Whitehead gave a short meditation on the Epistle for the preceding Sunday—the twentieth Sunday after Trinity—and 140 women were present at their corporate Communion. At the close of this beautiful service the business meeting was called to order by the President. The Bishop spoke a few words of greeting and read a letter sent out by the General Board of Missions to stir up interest in the plans for Missionary Sunday, November 15.

Mrs. Adams' address to the women was a commendation of their evident desire to be present at their corporate Communion, and she thanked the young women of the Parish who had formed the choir at this service.

The roll call was then read, with a response of 232 delegates from 29 Parishes. Pledges on apportionment amounting to \$898.00 were received, and 31 Parishes paid their yearly dues.

Following the time-honored custom of the Auxiliary, the officers of the preceding year resigned, and Miss Byram, as Chairman of the Nominating Committee took the chair and read the following report:

"The members of the Nominating Committee regret that the continued illness of Mrs. Wurts makes it necessary to elect a new Treasurer, feeling that the duties of the office undertaken so kindly for many months, in addition to her own work, by the President, ought no longer to be imposed on her. Removal from the city is the reason for dropping two other names from last year's list of officers. With this explanation, we submit the following names for your approval, further nominations from the floor being in order:

Further nominations from the floor were as follows:

Vice Presidents—Miss Eliza Byram, Mrs. George Richards.

No further nominations from the floor being made, the nominations were closed and the Recording Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot. The officers submitted by the Nominating Committee, with the addition of two Vice Presidents nominated from the floor, namely, Miss Eliza Byram and Mrs. George Richards, were declared to be duly elected.

The President then resumed the Chair and made the following appointments:

Educational Secretary—Mrs. H. P. Allen.

Treasurer of Sybil Carter Memorial Fund—Mrs. H. D. W. English.

Director of Little Helpers' Branch—Mrs. T. J. Bigham.

Chairman Committee on Resolutions—Mrs. Cortlandt Whitehead.

A resolution of sympathy was made by Mrs. Richards, seconded by Mrs. Whitehead, conveying to Mrs. Wurts the regrets of the Auxiliary over her inability to continue her services as Treasurer, and that she was always missed at the meetings of the society. This was unanimously adopted, and the Recording Secretary was instructed to inform Mrs. Wurts of this action by the Auxiliary.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered to the Rector and members of S. Stephen's Parish for their bounteous hospitality to the visiting delegates.

As there was no further business to come before the meeting, Mrs. Adams called on the officers for short talks on the different departments of the work.

Miss Phillips, the newly elected Treasurer, asked the sympathy and co-operation of the Auxiliary in undertaking her new duties, and also, at the request of Mrs. English, spoke in behalf of the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund.

Miss Cuddy told the history and growth of the United Offering, and, at the close of her talk, the semi-annual ingathering was made,

amounting, as was later reported, to \$586.43, making a present sum of \$1,167.92.

Mrs. Bigham asked the help of the Auxiliary in establishing a branch of the Little Helpers in every Parish in the Diocese.

Mrs. Allen told of the good showing made by the Mission Study Classes during the last year, and Mrs. Hawley spoke most enthusiastically of the growth of the Junior Auxiliary, both in numbers and amount of work accomplished.

In conclusion, Mrs. Adams made a little address that was a worthy tribute to the memory of Mrs. Ormsby Phillips, and Mrs. Duroe told of three gifts of money that had been offered through her to the Auxiliary to be used in memory of Mrs. Phillips in whatever way the Auxiliary should see fit to use them. No action was taken on the matter at this time, as the women were invited to adjourn for luncheon in the Parish House, which was beautifully decorated to welcome its Auxiliary guests, and a most appetizing luncheon was served to 300 members and friends.

At 2:30 o'clock the women assembled in the Church for a missionary service, with addresses by Rev. Mr. Limric, of Mexico, and Rev. Mr. Johnson, of Christ Church, North Side. Rev. Mr. Limrick spoke of the progress of the Protestant influence in Mexico, Brazil and Cuba, and Rev. Mr. Johnson spoke of the possible effect of the present war on missions.

This service closed the Thirty-fifth Annual Meeting, that will be remembered as noteworthy in point of numbers, harmony and enthusiasm. The opening service was attended by a larger number than ever before, and the keynote of the day was service—to serve the Master and to serve His followers, in singleness of heart, fearing God.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

Looking from the standpoint of the interested workers in the Woman's Auxiliary, a report from the Recording Secretary seems a superfluity. Working in our Parish Branches and coming to the monthly Diocesan meetings, we are so familiar with the whole Auxiliary plan that we can follow the very clear reports of each branch of the work with as much ease as we can tread our way through the streets of our native city. But when our friends visit us we are most anxious to give them a comprehensive view of our city, and we take them to the surrounding heights or to the top of a tall building to see the panorama of our bigness. And to the friends of the Auxiliary who are not familiar with the details of the work, the streets and lanes of figures in the various reports seem rather perplexing, and they prefer to look at the work as a whole.

It has been a year of world-wide uncertainty and distress, but our small part of the Master's work has gone steadily on, and for this great privilege we are filled with sober thankfulness, feeling it a call to assume, if needful, still greater responsibilities and to bear still heavier burdens.

Our total amount of work, both in gifts of money and in box work, slightly exceeds the record of last year. The monthly Diocesan meetings have been unusually large and interesting, spirited conferences have been held, and concerted work undertaken during Lent for various objects. The Missions Study Classes have been a great feature of the year's work, and a desire for a more intimate knowledge of missionary matters has been awakened in every part of the Diocese.

At the annual meeting in the fall the Junior Auxiliary celebrated its twenty-fifth year of organized work, and the inspiration of that meeting has remained with the juniors during the entire year, as shown by the formation of six new Branches and a very creditable amount of work accomplished.

The third ingathering of the United Offering has brought the amount up to \$1,973.32, and it is the aim of the Auxiliary to send \$5,000.00 to the Triennial of 1916.

The correspondent of the Church Periodical Club awakened much enthusiasm and interest in a plan to send traveling libraries to places too remote from cities and towns to obtain fresh reading matter, and four of these libraries in substantial oak cases have been sent. From every part of the Missionary field come words of commendation for the work of the Church Periodical Club, and its silent ministry is

most effective among pioneer people who lead lives of solitary toil.

The women of the Auxiliary are deeply grieved that the continued illness of Mrs. Westervelt compels her to give up her duties as correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, and pray that someone may be found to take the office she has so acceptably held.

The Little Helpers' Branch is growing slowly but surely. Four new Branches have been formed, and many of the children have reached the age when they should enter the Junior Auxiliary. The Director of the Little Helpers has been so faithful and zealous that it cannot fail that in the near future she will see the fruit of her labors. A Parish without a Branch of the Little Helpers is more to be pitied than blamed—the Parish does not know what it misses, and once awakened to a sense of this sad lack it will never repeat the mistake, for the children will see to it that the work is passed on.

The Treasurer of the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund has been able to complete her yearly task of raising \$600.00 for the salary of a teacher to the Indians in the Diocese of Wyoming, under Bishop Thomas. For several years the sum of \$500.00 was raised, but the cost of living has increased, and for the past three years this sum has been increased to \$600.00.

We feel that a great privilege was accorded to us last November, when the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch entertained the first Provincial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the newly-formed Province of Washington. Fifty-four delegates from ten Dioceses were present, and more than one hundred women from the Parish Branches attended every meeting. All-day sessions were held for three days, at which study classes and conferences were conducted by able leaders, and a provisional constitution was adopted as a working basis for the next Provincial Meeting at Richmond, Va. We look upon this as the most notable event of the year, as we are now more closely affiliated with neighboring Dioceses and are able to confer on local problems, and to understand more intelligently than heretofore the varying conditions caused by social and geographical differences.

Our conferences for the past two years have drawn the Parish Branches much more closely together, and we have learned, through happy experiences, the value of studying together, working together and praying together. The working together has been most admirably exemplified for two years by the Lenten plan, and this year we grew a little more and adopted a plan of having two all-day sewings every year for the benefit of S. Margaret's Hospital—one in May after the Lenten work is finished, and one in October before the press of work

begins. The one held in May was highly successful, with an attendance during the day of 135 women from the city Parishes and work and donation of material to the value of \$118.65.

The daring zeal of our devoted executive even overstepped the sacred boundaries of our summer vacation. It seemed inexpedient for the Auxiliary as a corporate body to take up war relief work during its prescribed period of missionary activity. But during the summer our President called for volunteers to make surgical dressings for the field hospitals in Europe, and again the tireless quality of our Auxiliary mettle was demonstrated. For nine weeks a band of devoted women met at Calvary Parish House and prepared 12,000 surgical dressings, while a goodly number were prepared at home by some of the Parish Branches.

Our year has been crowned with the blessings of cheerful activity and successful achievement. But the momentum of last year's success will not carry us through the coming year if we do not see to it that the Auxiliary machinery is carefully looked over, and every possible source of friction and loss of power eliminated. Through our Auxiliary machinery we have fulfilled all our promises and pledges, but we must not forget that it costs something to run this machinery and that no funds are available for this purpose except the collection at the annual meeting, the Parish dues and the dues of honorary members. Last year this amounted to \$267.65, and, while this was sufficient to defray our expenses, there should have been a greater sum to enable us to meet some of the urgent appeals that come up during the year.

There is a page devoted to special reports, and one report is concerning the cost of sending boxes and packages and, although incomplete, it promises to be interesting reading. It would almost seem to indicate that the present system of sending small packages by express and parcels post was more expensive than the old method of packing a joint box.

Looking through these streets and lanes of figures someone may see a vision—a "prophet's chamber," perchance, in one of the great downtown buildings—where we might hold many meetings, both great and small, where we might bring our goods to be exhibited and packed, where we might have permanent exhibits, and where our Educational Secretary might hold her classes. It is the natural craving of womankind to want a permanent home, and in the background of her mind that home always contains tables and cupboards and many chairs, and some of the older Auxiliary workers who have traveled about from one meeting place to another long for the abiding place of our vision.

At our last annual meeting we expressed our grief at the loss of one who for more than a quarter of a century had served the Auxiliary wisely and well. At this time a fund of \$250.00 was given in memory of Mrs. Ormsby Phillips, and several expressed a desire to add their token of love and esteem. The object of the fund has not yet been designated, but it seemed to be the wish of the donors that the interest be devoted to the expenses of administration in the Auxiliary. Is a vision of \$20,000.00 for a "Memorial Administration Fund" too dim and far away to thrill the busy and practical women in our Auxiliary? Sometimes our vision grows clearer by great blessings, sometimes by great sorrows, and there may be those who will remember the Auxiliary in these crucial periods and make an offering to this fund. But this is a vision of the future and may not concern the most of us.

But the vision of daily service can be with each of us as we rise in the morning to take up our appointed task and is needful to keep us sweet in temper and sane in mind. And every day the vision will grow clearer until we will see beyond our own little corner of the vineyard to the far-away fields, where the laborers are few and overburdened, and some will send the laborers and others will go themselves, seeing not only the vision but hearing the call: "Come over and help us!"

Report on War Relief Work.

An urgent appeal, endorsed by Bishop Whitehead, came to the Woman's Auxiliary at the close of our work last spring. The great need of surgical dressings for the wounded soldiers in Europe was being urged, and we felt that we would like to have a share in this work. Organized as a section under the Surgical Dressings Committee, which has its headquarters in New York, the women from many Parishes and also from other Christian bodies, met for nine successive weeks during the summer in Calvary Parish House. Luncheon, for which a nominal sum was paid, was served by members of the Young Woman's Auxiliary of Calvary Parish, their report showing a total of 212 luncheons served. Quantities of splendid old material, as well as much new material, was given, and we were able to send to New York 27 large express packages, containing a total of 12,000 dressings and miscellaneous articles. In addition to this the Ladies' Aid Society of S. Luke's Church sent a separate shipment of three packages containing 400 dressings, making a grand total of 30 packages, containing 12,400 articles. It is impossible to place a valuation on work of this kind, but, besides the large amount of old material contributed, there was given and used: 7 pieces of gauze, 7 pieces of ticking, 1 bale cotton batting, 2 bales waste, 30 pounds absorbent cotton, 6 pounds oakum, 14 gross safety pins, 1 dozen papers common pins, tape, 2 pieces unbleached muslin, short lengths new material, 1 bandage roll, miscellaneous supplies, such as soap, socks, etc. Contributions of money to the amount of \$23.31 was received. The disbursements were: For supplies, \$9.59; for expressage, \$8.45. Leaving a balance unexpended of \$5.27.

In closing this report, an extract from a letter from headquarters as to the kind of work and its value may be interesting:

"Your perfectly splendid and enormous contribution of finished dressings and numerous other valuable articles have just been received and unpacked. We have only the warmest praise for all of your work and no word of criticism could possibly be passed upon the excellent quality of the articles. It was a delight to open your splendid packages yesterday and to sort and put into our bins the splendidly-made dressings. Though you have worked with us only a brief time, you are already among our very best sections in the quality as well as the quantity of your work."

One of the "In Memoriam" memberships is in memory of Mrs. Margaret Scott Anderson, who was one of the victims of the Lusitania, and the women of Emmanuel Parish have requested the Recording Secretary to add the following tribute to her life among them:

MARGARET SCOTT ANDERSON.

EMMANUEL PARISH, NORTH SIDE, PITTSBURGH.

Known to but comparatively few of the members of the Woman's Auxiliary outside of her own Parish circle, because of her exceptional modesty, in her death she will be brought before us all as one of the silent heroes of one of the world's greatest tragedies. Mrs. Anderson perished with the going down of the Lusitania, leaving with those who knew her best the fine example of a devoted, loyal churchwoman. Working diligently, but always quietly, week by week for those who needed help in the various missionary fields, giving faithfully and systematically, devotedly loyal to her Church and Rector, and to those holding office in the Auxiliary, she has never been known by anyone to repeat what was unkind or critical. What of courage and heroism she was called upon to show at the last we can only imagine by what we knew of her perfect faith and trust in her Heavenly Father, and her absolute diligence in fulfilling to her utmost the duties and tasks set before her in her daily life.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Owing to the meeting of the Province of Washington in Pittsburgh in November, 1914, there was no Missions Study work planned until after that meeting, but the Auxiliary was exceedingly fortunate in being able to arrange for a series of classes in Missions Study at the time of the Province meeting, under two splendid leaders, Miss Emily C. Tillotson, Assistant Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary from the Church's Missions House, and Miss Anne Hubbard, Junior Secretary for the Diocese of Pennsylvania, the latter leading classes twice a day for three days on the junior book, "Building the City;" while Miss Tillotson took for her text-book "The Social Aspect of Missions," by Prof. Faunce. These classes were most helpful, not only to the Woman's Auxiliary delegates from the Dioceses of the Province, but to many of our own Diocesan leaders, so that a class for junior leaders, usually held the first of January, was not considered necessary, but a normal study class for seniors was held at the Church Rooms for six weeks before Lent at the noon hour on Thursdays by the Educational Secretary and, in addition to these classes, twenty-six senior and junior classes were held during Lent in the following Parishes and Missions:

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The year has been marked by considerable activity in certain lines of work, together with some reorganization of the whole system, including the establishing of a card index. This led, naturally, to a careful investigation of individual lists in the various Parishes; comparing them with the files in the New York office, with the result that many obsolete and incorrect names and addresses were cut out, and the lists now in use show only those which are active. It is impossible to state exactly, even after this revision, the number of magazines and papers being sent from this Diocese, but they approximate 500. Fourteen librarians from the 23 Parishes listed have taken an active and progressive interest in the work; one new branch was formed during the year (Incarnation, Knoxville) and, undoubtedly, many magazines are being sent regularly from Parishes which, because of lack of interest on the part of the librarian, or because of lack of a librarian, do not keep in touch with Correspondent.

Your Correspondent has written 129 letters and 103 postal cards; one Parish visit was made and, as already mentioned, a card index was prepared. The supplies for card index, paper, envelopes and postage cost \$9.41 for the year.

The annual dues from each Parish is expected to be \$2.00, to be devoted to the expenses of the home office in New York. This is not obligatory; some of the small Parishes contribute less, some not at all. Two of the strongest Parishes contributed \$5.00 each. In this way \$29.50 was collected and forwarded to New York.

During the year about 600 books were donated by seven Parishes for traveling libraries. From these were selected books for four libraries, averaging 65 books each; three general libraries (fiction,

travel, biography, religious), and one library for children. Personal donations were made by members from several Parishes to the Correspondent, amounting to \$57.00, and the books not available for use in the libraries were sold for \$8.50, making a fund of \$65.50, which was expended as follows: Four bookcases and crates, \$44.00; four plates for cases (Geissler Company), \$10.55; ink, shellac and labels, 75 cents; hauling, \$2.25; freight to Bolton Landing, N. Y., \$2.05; to Graniteville, N. C., \$2.80; to Atchee, Colo., \$5.90; to Roundup, Minn., \$4.80; a total expenditure of \$73.10; being \$7.60 more than funds provided.

Most appreciative letters have already been received from three recipients of libraries.

Much more could have been accomplished had your Correspondent had more time and health at her disposal, and had there been a definite fund set aside for the work of the Church Periodical Club. You will notice all funds collected from the Parish branches go to the New York office to defray its large and necessary expenses; all collected from individuals was for the traveling libraries; the ordinary working expenses of the Church Periodical Club in this Diocese have always had to be met by the Correspondent. Ten dollars a year is about the minimum—\$15.00 or \$20.00 a year could be used with benefit in this work. Indeed, the Correspondent could readily suit the extent of her work to the limits laid down by the diocesan desire expressed in dollars and cents. A personal canvass of Parishes, personal intercourse, conferences as to methods, greater publicity to advertise what is being done, and what may yet be done—in short, a sort of educational campaign in the interest of the Church Periodical Club would be repaying in its results here and wide-reaching in the pleasure and profit it would carry with it.

The retiring Correspondent begs to thank the officers of the Auxiliary, the Parish librarians, and individuals contributing to the work, for their cordial support and their great indulgence during times of illness, when the work was neglected or, at best, illy done. I ask for my successor a similar support, and extend to her my best wishes, my hopes for the work, my desire that she may win inspiration by personal acquaintance with the executive officers in New York, and be repaid, as I have been, by the appreciation which follows effort in each branch of Church Periodical Club work.

MISS FRANCES HOWELL.


At the January meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, the following memorial minute was presented by Mrs. Whitehead and adopted by a rising vote:
