MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING

The Thirty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held October the 29th, 1915, in S. Stephen's Church, Sewickley.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 10:00 o'clock, Bishop Whitehead spoke briefly on Christian Preparedness and three hundred and ten women joined in the corporate Communion. Immediately following this service the business meeting was called to order, Mrs. Adams presiding.

The roll was called, thirty-three parishes and Missions responding with two hundred and fifty delegates.

Pledges on apportionment amounting to \$1,053.00 were received. Dues from parishes and individuals amounting to \$28.00 were paid and five memorial and honorary memberships were recorded.

Noonday prayers for missions were said by the Bishop. The election of officers then followed.

Mrs. Harvey Childs, Jr., took the Chair and called for the report of the Nominating Committee.

No further nominations being made it was moved by Mrs. Ayres and seconded that the report of the Nominating Committee be adopted and the ballot cast by the Secretary. The motion was carried and the Secretary cast the ballot for the ticket presented by the Nominating Committee.

The President then took the Chair and the following appointments were made:

Mrs. Adams spoke of her great regret over the resignation of

Mrs. Daniel Duroe, who for so many years helped and inspired all as Recording Secretary; over the resignation of Mrs. Harry Westervelt, who for a year had done such splendid work as Librarian of the Church Periodical Club, and over the death of Miss Frances Howell of Uniontown, who was for four years one of the vice-presidents. Mrs. Adams then called on the different officers for brief talks.

Miss Phillips made an earnest plea for greater help towards current expenses. Mrs. Armstrong expressed her appreciation of the response to letters and asked that notices be read in parish meetings. Miss Cuddy recalled that she had been treasurer of the United Offering for twenty years and hoped that more parishes would contribute to the united offering.

Mrs. Bigham said she was far from satisfied that there are only twelve branches of the Little Helpers and urged the forming of new branches in every parish. Mrs. Wishart felt her newness in her work, but spoke most enthusiastically of her desire to advance the work of the C. P. C.

Mrs. English told of a visit to Bishop and Mrs. Thomas during the summer which brought her work very near to her.

Mrs. Richards read a letter from Miss Langdon in Alaska, a most appreciative but pathetic letter expressing her faith in the ones at home. Mrs. Allen urged that leaders be found in every parish for Mission Study Classes. Mrs. Hawley asked that the spiritual life of the children be not forgotten.

Mrs. Adams, at the close of the talks, spoke of the progress of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the encouragement and inspiration derived from so large and enthusiastic a gathering.

Mr. Connolly of Valle Crucis being in the room, Mrs. Adams asked him to speak a few moments on his work among the Mountain boys of North Carolina, after which the delegates were invited to adjourn to the parish house where a delicious luncheon was served to about three hundred and fifty guests. After luncheon, Mrs. Pancoast, of Philadelphia, spoke on her trip through the Orient, illustrating by wonderfully beautiful stereoptican slides, and closing with a strong appeal for Saint Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan.

Mrs. Allen moved that the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary raise \$1,000.00 to endow a bed in S. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, which motion was unanimously adopted.

And then closed the Thirty-Sixth Annual Meeting, one unusually strong in numbers and enthusiasm, and one whose influence should be felt in every parish during the coming year.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

It is with a feeling of gratitude in looking back over a year of joyful service, that the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions presents this, the thirty-sixth annual report of its work.

Our Auxiliary women are numbered among those whose hearts and minds are alive to the many calls upon time and money that each day brings in bewildering numbers. The difficulty is not which cause to be interested in, but which we can afford to neglect. At the beginning of our work in the fall the outlook for our missionary boxes seemed somewhat uncertain, for there were repeated and urgent demands from many quarters that we bend our energies towards the alleviation of those immediate needs caused by the frightful war conditions in Europe. Our women have responded and have helped these needs both by work and money, but as an organization we are proud to say we have had our share in meeting the rightful claims of our missionaries and the mission work both within and without the diocese. Our help for the war sufferers of Europe, with a few exceptions, has been over and above our regular Auxiliary work. When we read letter after letter from our missionaries appealing for help because their regular support in money and boxes has been cut down, we are grateful that we have been permitted to do a little more than last year to meet these needs. There is surely interest and money enough to do both; our missionary work should not be called upon to pay for our philanthropic work.

A comparison with the figures of last year shows a gain in the value of our work of over \$2,000.00. Perhaps some measure of this gain may be due to better methods of keeping our records, for in Auxiliary affairs the old adage may be changed to read, "What is worth doing well is worth reporting well." Surely no officer who takes a pride in an accurate report can be accused of either boastfulness or vain glory. Indeed, a well kept and well given report has a very decided educational value, and it would be a distinct advantage to many societies to cultivate a healthy feeling of pride in their work rather than an apologetic spirit. Even small gifts bulk large when many are added together. An honest review of our resources and how we have used them is the foundation upon which we wish to build our records.

We feel that not only our own Diocesan Branch but the Auxiliary in general has benefited by the very valuable piece of work completed by Mrs. Arthur Scully and her committee, consisting of Mrs. Snodgrass, Mrs. James E. Brown, Miss Dunlevy and Mrs.

George Taylor. A standard of valuation for work that should be reasonable from the point of view of the recipient and fair in consideration of those doing the work, has long been needed. It has also been found difficult to strike a fair mean between the extreme high price put upon work by some branches and the overly low prices of other communities. These difficulties have been overcome in the schedule of prices adopted, and we feel sure that as only words of praise have been spoken concerning it the results are satisfying to all. The complete list of items as adopted will be found under Special Reports.

To this committee is also due our thanks for an admirably worked out report blank, and only those making out the annual report from these blanks can appreciate the satisfaction that comes from not having to sort out items from the scraps of paper and personal letters that too often used to constitute the annual report of a parish branch.

Two conferences for parish officers have been held, one on February 21st, in S. Mary's Memorial Church, and the other on June 8th, at S. Matthew's Church, Homestead. A conference does not always fulfill its function, but we feel these meetings have been the means of bringing about a better understanding of the varying conditions of parish life. When we hear the experiences of other people we realize that while there is much we can work out in common, there are often plans that are feasible in some parishes and most difficult to work out in others. The interchange of ideas has already borne much fruit and we hope the officers' conferences will be even more utilized next year.

On the 18th of February, in the Church of the Ascension, was held a Quiet Day for all women of the Diocese with the Rev. Dr. Floyd W. Tompkins of Philadelphia as the leader. Pronounced by many to be the worst day of the year with respect to the weather, the attendance of over one hundred women from nineteen parishes was most gratifying. To Dr. Tompkins for his practical and stimulating remarks we are most grateful. We wish to offer our thanks to the Bishop for his help in completing the necessary arrangements, to Dr. Brown, the rector of the Church of the Ascension for the use of the Church and parish house, and to Mrs. Eckert and her committee of helpers from the Young Woman's Auxiliary of Calvary Church for their efficient management of the lunch.

Our Semi-Annual Meeting took on a different form this year, being appointed for the afternoon before the Diocesan Convention, May 16th. A brief service, during which the United Offering was collected, was conducted by Bishop Whitehead in the Chapel of the Church of the Ascension. Immediately following, in the parish house, there was given a lecture on the United Offering by Mrs. Adams

These pictures and material for the lecture had been prepared by Miss Julia Emery, and brought before the audience the places where the United Offering is helping and the people whose support is made possible by this fund. The Assembly room in the parish house was well filled, and all felt the innovation in our Semi-Annual Meeting was justified.

Another sign of growth has been the necessity for making a change in the place of meeting of our regular monthly sessions. For many years Trinity Church has been our Auxiliary home and we owe much to the long extended hospitality of both rector and vestry. The removal of the Church Rooms to the Jenkins Arcade Building, where a large assembly room could be secured, gave an opportunity for the Woman's Auxiliary to acquire some permanent place for work and meeting. At our June meeting we availed ourselves of the invitation of the Bishop and moved from our old home to new quarters.

A large supply closet has already proved a boon to the officers, in whose homes for years the Auxiliary business with its accompaniment of packages of leaflets and articles for missionary boxes has had to find a place. We are grateful to Trinity Church for past hospitality and to the Diocese for the provision of greater accommodation for the work of our organization.

For three years our missionary giving during Lent has been systematized and enlarged through the use of the Lenten Plans. As over 2,000 of these leaflets were printed last year the plan is well known to you all, but that it has become an established method of work for us is shown by the enthusiastic use of the leaflets by clergy, parish officers and auxiliary members alike. Perhaps one of its greatest products is the bond of personal friendship that is growing between many a missionary and the branch working for her. The letters received from the field this last year in response to boxes sent have done more than anything else to vitalize our missionary endeavor. The new fields for which we work each year broaden our vision, while we still cling, as to old friends, to those who have had our help in former years. More boxes were sent through the parishes this year thus lightening the expense of transportation to be taken from the diocesan treasury. But the Chairman of the Packing Committee, Mrs. George Barrow, found much material sent for general boxes, and to her careful management the Auxiliary is most grateful.

Within the last few years the bounds of Auxiliary usefulness seem to have enlarged and the opportunities for service outside the Diocese are growing steadily. Last November, in Richmond, the Capitol of that stronghold of missionaries as well as presidents, occurred the meeting of the Synod of the Province of Washington, organized in

Pittsburgh the year before. This was its first real meeting. Those from Pittsburgh travelled perhaps the greatest distance, but we were most proud of our large delegation of seven women representing the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Allen, your educational secretary, led one of the study classes, your president had a place on the program, and all the women from Pittsburgh, by their contributions to the discussions in the conferences and their enthusiastic interest, added much to the success of the meetings. As this opinion comes from outside sources it may not be prideful to express it here. And it may not be amiss to add that your president was honored by being elected president of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province of Washington.

Another opportunity to pass along what wisdom we may have acquired, as well as to gain new ideas, came in the form of an invitation to address a Regional meeting in Akron, Ohio. That meeting, with its large attendance of enthusiastic women, was an inspiration and the only regret your president has is that she was unable to accept a second invitation for a similar meeting near Youngstown several weeks later. The work of each Diocese has so long been a thing apart unto itself that we rejoice to have the opportunity to know more of our neighbors.

If space would permit, your president would like to speak at length concerning the activities of the Diocesan officers whose past record of honorable service has been but continued in the year that has gone. She would tell of our Vice Presidents, always ready to respond to every call upon time or strength; the Secretaries and the Treasurer, whose work can only be fully appreciated in its burden of detail by those who themselves have held such an office; the Custodian of the United Offering, whose faithfulness is so well appreciated; the Officers in charge of the Junior Auxiliary and Little Helpers, through whose reports we are able to catch a glimpse of what efficient leadership is doing for our younger members; our Educational Secretary, at the core of whose work lies the quiet inspiration which helps us all to know and do more for missions; and the Treasurer of the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund, whose work in collecting the salary of a missionary among the Indians means so much to Bishop Thomas at the other end of the line. But one of the compensations for responsibility is the satisfaction that comes from work well done, and this compensation should be a well merited reward of our Auxiliary women.

From clergy and laity alike, from both men and women has come a ready response to help in every way, and we believe a spirit of real co-operation is alive among our people.

Several changes in the list of officers will be noted, and too much credit cannot be given to those new officers who have taken up so cheerfully and efficiently the various departments of Auxiliary work committed to their care.

The serious illness in the spring of our recording secretary, Mrs. Emmerling, to whose able pen the very interesting minutes of the annual meeting are due, made it necessary for someone to act in her place and Mrs. Armstrong, the corresponding secretary, most cheerfully and willingly added this to her already heavy duties. This shifting of work has given to your president the very unusual but pleasant privilege of reporting a most satisfactory year of work.

Mrs. Wishart, the librarian of the Church Periodical Club, has developed many new lines in that department and her ability to make people see and wish to meet the many needs has added much to the interest of both our Diocesan meetings and those held in various parishes.

A long felt need has been met in the appointment of Mrs. George Ratcliffe as secretary for the Spirit of Missions. News of the needs and growth of work in the great field of the world as well as the accomplishments and opportunities in our own Diocese, should be known as much as the regular news obtained in our daily papers. We bespeak for Mrs. Ratcliffe your hearty support, that subscriptions both for the Spirit of Missions and the Church news may be greatly increased this next year.

We believe our foundations are well laid, and under the effective leadership of Diocesan and parochial officers there need be no limit to the influence and usefulness of our Church women in missionary matters.

It is with particular regret that we send this report signed with any other name than that of Mrs. Daniel Duroe, who has been our guide and stay for many years. But the beautiful thing about Auxiliary work is that while one may be no longer found in the stress of affairs, the activity of interest and spirit always remains and continues, a blessing to the work. Some of us are so constantly busy doing the things that seem never to be finished that we forget the help that comes from the "quiet walk with God." REPORT OF FUND FOR S. LUKE'S HOSPITAL, TOKIO, JAPAN

At the Annual Meeting held in S. Stephen's Church, Sewickley, a resolution was adopted to the effect that the Diocesan Branch pledge the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for a memorial bed in S. Luke's Hospital, Tokio, Japan. Of the amount pledged, \$733.50 has already been forwarded to Mrs. Pancoast the treasurer. Seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) of this passed through the treasurer's books before they closed, \$20.00 was sent direct from an individual but is credited to the parish branch and \$13.50 was sent direct by the special treasurer, Mrs. Adams. The Junior Auxiliary has in hand the total sum of \$231.08 so that the balance still to be raised is \$35.42. Exclusive of the amount raised by the Juniors the \$733.50 has been given by fourteen parishes. Many have had no share at all in this gift and the need for S. Luke's is still great. It is not necessary to stop at a total of \$1,000.00. The following report shows the detailed statement for this fund.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The Missionary Educational work in the Diocese of Pittsburgh for the year 1915-16 while not as far-reaching as your Educational Secretary would like to have it, has been on the whole very encouraging. In October, 1915, a class was held in the offices of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, in the Chapel of Trinity Church. This class which had a total enrollment of nearly fifty women used as its text book Miss Julia C. Emery's "Hand Book of the Woman's Auxiliary" and met every Tuesday morning for six weeks under the leadership of the Educational Secretary. This took the place of a senior normal class for leaders usually held in January.

The Junior Normal class was held during the Epiphany season using the text-book "How the Cross Goes Round the World" by Osgood. In addition to leading these normal classes your Educational Secretary made two visits to Trinity Church, Rochester and spoke to the women there by invitation of the Rector, and was also invited to speak to the Sunday School of S. Thomas' Memorial Church, Oakmont, on Missions.

These opportunities have been greatly appreciated. There were fourteen senior study and reading classes and twenty-one Junior

Mission study classes held in the Diocese last year. The following list gives names of leaders and the parishes in which these classes were held.

REPORT OF PERIODICAL CLUB

The Church Periodical Club year ends on April 1st. Upon that date this year your Correspondent completed five very busy months, having begun her work last fall after the annual meeting in Sewickley.

The second week of November, six of the active librarians accepted an invitation to meet and discuss the work over a cup of tea. Plans made at that meeting led to a series of talks and visits throughout the winter.

In December, the Correspondent met with the Woman's Auxiliary of S. Thomas' Memorial at the home of their librarian, Mrs. Munnell, and had a very informal talk about the work. Later, in the same month, a visit was made one morning to the Church of the Ascension

to secure a librarian. A member of the Auxiliary volunteered and the work was begun most systematically. On the afternoon of the same day, a short talk on the C. P. C. was given before Calvary Sisterhood.

During January only two visits were made, but they made up in results for the small number. One was to the Calvary Young Women's Auxiliary, the other to the Woman's Guild of the Church of the Redeemer.

In February, visits were made to the branches in Emmanuel, Bellevue, S. Andrew's and S. Peter's Pittsburgh. At S. Andrew's a new librarian was secured to succeed Miss McCandless who carried on the work so faithfully as long as her health permitted. On the tenth of February a fine new branch was organized at a meeting of the Mission Study Class of S. Stephen's, McKeesport, held at the home of Mrs. Cornelius.

A new departure in C. P. C. work was made when, on the evening of March 6th, the Correspondent went with Miss Scully, the Librarian of Calvary, to talk to the Brotherhood of that Parish. The subject was "Traveling Libraries" and the result a unanimous vote to send a library at once in memory of Samuel B. Douglas.

In the same month, new branches were organized at meetings held at S. John's, Pittsburgh, and Trinity, Rochester, and an afternoon tea was given by the Librarian of the Church of the Nativity, Crafton, Mrs. Harvey, and the giving of a library planned.

On March 22d a lunch was given in S. Peter's Parish House, Uniontown, to the members of the C. P. C. in that city, the Clergy and the Correspondent. After lunch a large meeting was held, many new subscribers secured and a library in memory of Alexander D. Ewing pledged.

In all, three libraries were sent out, the one from Calvary Brotherhood, noted above, in memory of Samuel B. Douglas, to the Rev. W. B. Roberts, Winner, South Dakota; one sent from Calvary Sisterhood to the Rev. J. W. Hard, White Sulphur Springs, Montana, in memory of Nellie Douglas Ellis; and one from Mrs. Thomas Hartley, for Shut-ins, in memory of her mother, to Mrs. L. W. King, South Minneapolis, Minn.

This report would not be complete without an expression of sincere appreciation and thanks to the President and members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese, for their unflinching help in the work; to the Parishes visited, for their enthusiastic response to the appeals for the work, and continued support; and last, but not least, to the "men behind the guns," the ones who have really made the C. P. C. work in the Diocese a success—the Parish Librarians.

2. Report promptly to the Corresponding Secretary the box decided upon and also write to the recipient to that effect.

3. Before shipping be sure you have the correct address. Write out the name of State in full. Put your own address on the outside and put inside a stamped envelope or a post-card addressed to yourself. A prompt acknowledgment is hereby secured. If sending by freight, mail the receipt to the Missionary.

4. Use the Diocesan standard of values in estimating value of box.

5. Keep a record of cost of shipping boxes, barrels, and packages.

6. See that a report of finished work for the month is made at the regular business meeting in the Church Rooms. Use monthly report blanks.

7. Make out yearly report blank and return to corresponding Secretary by May 1st.

8. Report any changes in your list of officers to the Corresponding Secretary.

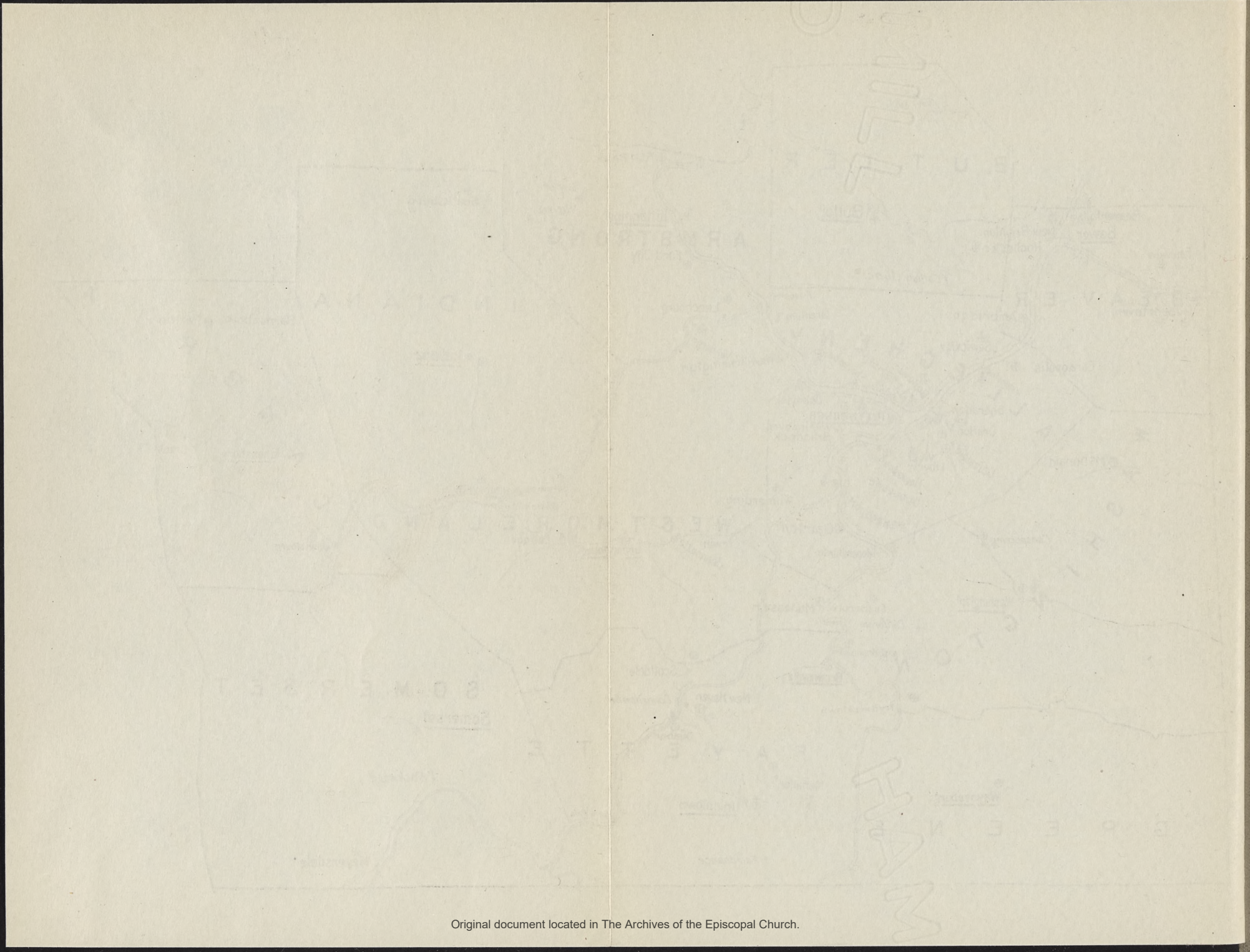
