1. Pray for the continued success of the Auxiliary in all of its departments.
2. The chairman of the Educational Department, Mrs. Adams, suggests the appointment of an Educational leader in each parish or mission branch, who shall confer and co-operate with the chairman in organizing and promoting Mission Study Classes and other forms of Missionary Education. The chairman also suggests attendance at the Summer Conference for Church workers.
3. The chairman of the Pageantry Committee, Mrs. Hawley, will be pleased to assist in arranging and presenting a pageant in any of the Parishes. She will have on hand literature pertaining to pageantry.
4. The Chairman of the Literature Committee, Mrs. Ratcliffe, will be pleased to receive subscriptions for any of the Church magazines or books. She will have on hand at the monthly meetings copies of the Church News, the Spirit of Missions, the Missionary Calendar, the Church Calendar, and copies of leaflets from the Church Missions House.
5. The Supply Secretary, Mrs. Peirce, will be pleased to give information in regard to allotments, report blanks, etc., and will receive all contributions of clothing and material for the Supply Room.
6. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Armstrong, will be pleased to receive suggestions which will in any manner help the work of the Auxiliary. She will have on hand for distribution, copies of the annual report, and all information regarding special and regular meetings.
7. The Sybil Carter and Diocesan Memorial and Honorary Membership Treasurer, Mrs. English, will be pleased to receive contributions for each of the above funds. The Sybil Carter Memorial Fund is used for Women workers among the Indians; the Diocesan Memorial Fund is used to establish Memorial Scholarships, or as the Executive Board decides; the Honorary Membership Fund is used for the contingent fund for carrying on the work of the Auxiliary.
8. The Treasurer of the Auxiliary Specials, Mrs. John Brunot, will be pleased to receive all contributions for the 1923-1925 special, the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Fund.
9. The Treasurer, Miss Margaret Phillips, will be pleased to receive ALL money for all other purposes not stated above. She will be pleased to assist any Parish Treasurer in making up her percentage of assessment.
10. The United Thank Offering Treasurer, Miss Cuddy, will be pleased to receive all gifts for this fund, ingatherings to be held semi-annually. The amount decided upon at the annual meeting on February 1, 1923, was \$12,000, to be presented at the Triennial meeting in New Orleans in October, 1925.
11. The United Thank Offering Secretary, Mrs. Cornelius, will be pleased to visit any Parish Branch, or to help any Parish U. T. O. Treasurer. She will have on hand for distribution semi-annually the little blue envelope, which is the follower-up of the "Little Blue Box." Place first of all, your heart and your prayers into the "Little Blue Box," and the contents will soon overflow.

ANNUAL MEETING—1923

The forty-third annual meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held in Calvary Church, February 1, 1923. The Holy Communion was celebrated at 9:30 A. M. with Bishop Mann as celebrant assisted by the Rev. Mr. Whittemore and the Rev. Eames.

Bishop Mann gave a short address and told how pleased he was with the size and enthusiasm of the organization. This was Bishop Mann's first appearance in an official capacity following his consecration on January 25, 1923.

After Bishop Mann's address, Mrs. Bailey asked the members to rise and pledge themselves to assist Bishop Mann in all of his work in the Diocese. The business of the day was then taken up when the reports of officers and committees were read, and are published in the Year Book. It was very interesting to hear the officers and Committee chairman give their reports and tell of the encouraging as well as the discouraging aspects of their work, in this way hoping to improve all the departments of the work.

Miss Forsyth, our Member-at-Large, spoke of the Educational work in the Diocese and announced the Summer Conference at Conneaut Lake, July 5th to 14th. Mrs. Childs gave a report of St. Margaret Hospital, and Mrs. Crombie of the Church Home.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a letter of sympathy be sent to Mrs. A. C. Overholt, of Scottdale on the death of her husband.

The annual election of officers then followed. Mrs. J. J. Miller taking the chair asked for a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Bailey for her splendid work during the year. The report of the Nominating Committee was called for and Mrs. H. D. Scully, Chairman, presented the following:

There was much interesting discussion over the 1923-1925 United Thank Offering, and it is hoped that we reach \$12,000. Roll was called to which 305 members responded, representing 36 parishes and missions. There were many more than that number partook of the luncheon, those who came in after roll call. The meeting adjourned at 12:30 P. M. for luncheon.

In the afternoon, Miss Laura Boyer from the New York office, gave a brief address. This was followed by a "Mystery Play" taken from the pageants "How The Light Came," "Darkness and Dawn," and "The Light of the World." The meeting adjourned at the close of the Pageant.

SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING—MAY 3, 1923

The semi-annual meeting was held on the above date in St. Matthew's Church, Homestead. The meeting was opened with the celebration of the Holy Communion, with Bishop Mann as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. G. A. Sutton, and Rev. T. A. Barlow. A prayer in memory of the late Bishop Tuttle was offered.

Bishop Mann then gave a short but very sincere address on the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and told how our organization was the great helping body of the whole Church. He spoke of how the work goes calmly on, no matter what happens. The regular business followed at the opening of which Mrs. Bailey read an article from the Churchman entitled "Full Jewelled" which was written in memory of Bishop Tuttle.

The minutes of the April meeting were omitted on account of limited time. Miss Phillips, Treasurer, reported \$581.07 in the bank; Mrs. English reported \$416 in the Sybil Carter Fund; \$200 in the Diocesan Memorial Fund, and \$20 in the Honorary Fund.

Mrs. Adams, being absent on account of her attendance at the National Board meeting in New York was represented by Mrs. Armstrong, Secretary of the Educational Committee. Mrs. Armstrong gave an interesting report on the work of the Mission Study Classes.

Miss Forsyth, the Superintendent of Religious Education, read the program to be presented at the Conference of Church Workers to be held at Conneaut Lake, July 5 to 14th. The nominal cost of this conference for each attendant to be \$30.00.

Mrs. Bailey read a letter from Miss Lindley on the Prayer Partnership Plan, a plan to bring the Missionaries in the field into closer relationship with the home people by prayer and correspondence. Mrs. H. P. Allen was chosen as Chairman of this group.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a sliding scale of membership be adopted by the Diocesan Branch, namely, \$1-\$2-\$5 and \$10 memberships.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the Rev. Mr. Sutton and the members of St. Matthew's Branch of the Auxiliary for their splendid hospitality. An invitation from St. John's Parish was extended to hold our fall ingathering of the U. T. O. in that Parish, which invitation was gratefully received. Roll was called which showed 176 members present from 26 parishes and missions. More than that number however, partook of the luncheon, as many members came in after the roll call. Adjourned here for luncheon.

After luncheon the reports were continued. Miss Cuddy reported \$1,701.46 with several parishes to hear from.

Then came the chief address of the day when Miss Nannie Hite Winston, Chairman of the Auxiliary Specials for the 1923-1925 Triennium told in a most interesting manner of the objects of this special. The amount to be raised is \$75,000 for two houses. One in the North for white workers from the field who wish to continue their studies while on furlough, and one in the South for the Colored workers. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch give \$2,000 to this special.

Mr. W. M. Danner, General Secretary of the American Mission to Lepers, gave a most vivid and interesting talk on his work among the lepers in different parts of the country.

The Rev. Mr. Sutton closed the meeting with prayer, after which we adjourned at 3:30 P. M.

SECOND INGATHERING OF THE U. T. O.

The regular monthly meeting which was also the second ingathering of the U. T. O. was held in St. John's Church, on Thursday, November 1, 1923, with Mrs. Bailey presiding. The meeting opened with the celebration of Holy Communion with the Rev. Homer A. Flint, Ph. D., as celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Kanaga, Rev. Mr. Sauber, and the Rev. Dr. Tucker.

At the business session which followed prayers were read at the opening of the meeting by the president. A letter was read from Bishop Mann expressing his deep regret at not being present at this meeting. Bishop Mann was absent from the Diocese attending the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Strider to the Episcopate.

The minutes of the September meeting were read and approved.

The Treasurer, Miss Phillips, reported a balance, October 29, 1923, of \$3,187.43. Mrs. Armstrong, Corresponding Secretary, reported having sent out 78 pieces of mail. The Supply Secretary, Mrs. Peirce, read a letter containing request from Bishop McKim, Japan. The Educational Chairman, Mrs. Adams, announced the Institute to be held in February with Miss Boyer as leader; also classes for Parish Officers. Mrs. English, Treasurer of the Memorial Funds, reported a balance of \$357 for the Sybil Carter, \$20 for the Diocesan Memorial, and \$25 for the Honorary Membership Funds. It was moved and seconded that \$200 of the Sybil Carter Fund be given to Bishop Roberts for

his work among the Indians. This motion was carried. The U. T. O. Treasurer, Miss Cuddy, reported \$2313.88 from the second ingathering, which with \$2,089.39 reported in June, makes a total of \$4,403.27.

The business session was stopped here to hear the Rt. Rev. W. B. Roberts tell of his work among the Indians of South Dakota.

Resuming business the roll was called and was responded to by 252 members representing 38 parishes and missions. It was decided to accept the invitation of Epiphany Church, Bellevue, to hold the annual meeting with them on January 3, 1924. Also to accept the invitation of St. James Memorial to hold the third ingathering of the U. T. O. with them on May 1, 1924.

The President announced the following delegates and alternates to the Provincial Synod to be held in Washington, D. C. on November 20-21-22:-

Delegates—Mrs. Emmerling, Mrs. Hawley, Mrs. Bailey.

Alternates—Mrs. Bigham, Miss Forsyth, Sister Dora.

Announcement was also made by the president of the budget of \$3800 for the year 1924, decided upon at the conference of Diocesan officers at the October conference, in Trinity House.

Mrs. Adams, a member of the National Executive Board gave an account of the happenings at their meetings. A letter was read by Mrs. Bailey from Mr. Wood telling of the removal of Bishop Rowe's Hospital, St. Stephen's, Fort Yukon, Alaska, from the banks of the Yukon River to a distance of five hundred yards north. Mrs. Bigham moved that another vote of thanks be given to the Rector and members of St. John's Parish for their delightful hospitality. A rising vote of thanks followed this motion.

The delegates and alternates to the Synod were afterward changed as follows:

Delegates—Mesdames Hawley, Ratcliffe, Bailey.

Alternates—Mrs. Bigham, and the Misses Smith and Forsyth.

Visitors—Mrs. Wishart, Sister Dora Dawson.

The meeting then adjourned.

ANNUAL MEETING—1924

The forty-fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held on Thursday, January 3, 1924, in Epiphany Church, Bellevue. The meeting began with the celebration of the Holy Communion at ten o'clock, Bishop Mann as celebrant was assisted by the Rev. Dr. John Dows Hills.

At the conclusion of this session, Mrs. Bailey presiding, opened the business session with prayers, followed by the reading and approval of the minutes of the annual meeting of February 2, 1923 in Calvary Church.

Bishop Mann then addressed the Auxiliary, and spoke of the plans for the coming year, urging particularly an increase in subscriptions to the Diocesan Church News. He asked for a representative from each Parish organization at the Church News luncheon to be held January 29, closing with a New Year's wish for a most successful year in the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. Bailey thanking the Bishop asked the women of the Auxiliary to stand up and pledge themselves and their untiring efforts to the Bishop.

The annual reports of the Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, United Thank Offering Treasurer, and Treasurer of Memorial Funds were given. It was moved and seconded that these reports be accepted as read. This motion carried. The Rev. A. W. S. Garden made announcements of the Church's Program and plan, and spoke of the visits of Dr. Morris of Brazil on January 10, and of Dr. Souder from China on January 17 to 21. Rev. Mr. Garden suggested that a United Thank Offering Sunday be held in all of the parishes, this plan having met with great success in his own parish. Also that all small parishes and missions be given the Blue Boxes, even though they have no branch of the Auxiliary. Mention was made of the steady increase in the financial standing of the Diocese during the past year, which has greatly encouraged the Bishop.

The reports of the Committee Chairman followed: Mrs. Peirce announced the Lenten meetings of the Auxiliary to be held in Calvary Church to make surgical dressings for the Missionary Hospital at Spokane, Washington. It was moved, seconded and carried that these meetings be held on Monday during Lent, beginning at 9:30 A. M. Each worker was asked to bring her own lunch, coffee being provided by the women of Calvary Church.

Miss Cuddy, U. T. O. Treasurer, reported that more than one-third of the \$12,000 pledged by the Auxiliary is already in the bank bearing interest.

Mrs. Adams, Educational Chairman, announced the Institute to be held in Trinity House on February 4-5-6, morning and evening classes for leaders, and afternoon classes for officers. The study classes to be under the direction of Miss Laura Boyer, Assistant Educational Secretary from the New York office. The book to be studied will be "Creative Forces in Japan."

Mrs. Brunot, Chairman of the 1923-1925 Auxiliary Specials, called attention to the Bishop Tuttle Memorial Houses, and urged each parish and mission to appoint a representative for the fund. The amount to be raised for the next meeting of General Convention in 1925 is \$2,000, each organization being asked to give the percentage of their assessment. Resolutions to raise this fund (\$75,000) were passed at General Convention in Portland, 1922, to build houses in the North and South for women Missionaries who are home on furlough, and who wish to continue their studies. It was moved by Mrs. Allen and seconded, to accept the reports of the Chairman as presented. No report from the Publicity and Church Periodical Chairman. Mrs. Fleming, the newly appointed Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, took charge of the work on January 1, 1924.

Mrs. Bailey at this point, read several letters from Missionaries in the field, after which Bishop Mann spoke of the Summer Schools, urging a larger attendance, and increased interest in the lines of Educational work. He mentioned the change in name from Summer Conference to Conference of Church Workers. The election of officers followed. Mrs. Duncan, of Nativity Parish, Crafton, took the chair and called on Mrs. Fleming, Chairman of the Nominating Committee to present the ticket. Mrs. Fleming announced the following:

PAGEANTRY COMMITTEE

The efforts of the Pageantry Committee for the past year were centered upon the one production which was given at the annual meeting in Calvary Church on February 1, 1923. It was a very good example of what can be done to adapt several pageants to our particular needs. It was not easy to find a suitable pageant with the Missionary Spirit, but by taking parts of "Darkness and Dawn" the Easter pageant, and adding to it the Missionary sentiment of "How the Light Came" and "The Light of the World" it was possible to produce a religious play which had a distinctly spiritual effect. The committee wishes especially to thank the Rev. Mr. Heald and all members of the cast for their very willing and earnest work in this pageant.

We feel that this report does not adequately express the work which the committee has done during the past year, as we are unable to determine just what has been accomplished in the different parishes. We feel, however, that where pageantry has been tried it has met with great success, and will in the future be used extensively for work in the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

To quote from an authority on this subject, "The prayer of the Missionary and other Christian workers everywhere has been for a means whereby they might show world needs in a manner so vivid that people would be inspired to give themselves and their money to carry on the great unfinished work of the Master."

Through dramatic presentation, their prayer is being answered. Several of the most effective means by which knowledge is transmitted may thus be used to make a vivid and lasting impression. In an attractive and true-to-life way, cross sections of the home land, Africa, India, China have been shown, and shown so realistically that the audience has experienced the same longing to be of service that workers on the field feel when they see the great soul hunger for the Gospel. It would be difficult to over-state the value of pageantry in missionary education. We have heard about missions and we have read about missions, but we need to come to action and we will not do this until we see and feel missions.

Two classes were held for men and women; subject, "The World My Neighbor." A Missionary Current Events Class precedes the Diocesan monthly meeting, lasting forty minutes.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

In this blessed Epiphany season the words of the prophet Isaiah ring with renewed emphasis, when years ago he gave us the comforting message, "And a little child shall lead them."

During the year just closed the Woman's Auxiliary has felt this leadership, and has tried to the best of its knowledge and ability to follow. This is evidenced by the increased attendance at the meetings, increased activity in all the departments, and above all, increased devotion. With the helpful messages of the visiting Bishops and Missionaries, and the loyal support of the officers and members of the Auxiliary, the work of the President now beginning her fifth year, has been the happiest in all the years. True, there have been discouragements and disappointments, but in the midst of these, our hearts seek afresh the leadership of "The Little Child" from whose leadership we are so wont to stray, and we again take up the work with renewed courage and assurance.

Annually a questionnaire comes from the New York office, in which among others, these questions are asked: How many new leaders have you developed in your Diocese? How many recruits for the Mission field? A bitter disappointment to my heart is that there is not always a greater number for the answer than I have ever been able to send in. However, the work of developing new leaders is progressing rapidly under the direction of the Educational Department with Mrs. Adams as leader, and great results are expected from these leaders in the future. The attendance of many Auxiliary members at the Conneaut Conference is also another important factor in developing leaders.

The splendid co-operation of the parish and diocesan officers, and the willingness of the parish officers in accepting the work assigned to them, when many times they have not seen where the money was coming from to fulfill their obligations, this venture of faith has always been rewarded by success. They have firm belief in the promise that "Whatsoever ye shall ask in My Name, believing, that shall ye receive."
