Special Funds of the Woman's Auxiliary

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

This great gift of the Women of the Auxiliary is presented every three years, at the time of General Convention. The offering is given through the blue boxes and the contents gathered by the Parish Branch Treasurers, just before the Diocesan In-gatherings in May and November. It is the hope of the Auxiliary that every Parish treasurer of the United Thank offering will try to give every woman in her Parish an opportunity to share in this Offering.

CORPORATE GIFT

The amount of the Corporate Gift to be given by the Woman's Auxiliary during the year 1929 will be \$50,000.00. Twenty-five thousand dollars of this amount was designated at the triennial meeting held in Washington, D. C., in October, 1928, for building a church in Santo Domingo. This is to be raised by Easter. The other \$25,000.00 is to be used as follows:

Water Supply at St. Michael's Mission, Ethete, Wyo.	\$10,000.00
Dormitory at Christ School, Arden, N. C.	10,000.00
Church at Silver City, Panama Canal Zone	5,000.00
Share of the Diocese of Pittsburgh	1,500.00

MEMORIAL MEMBERSHIP FUND

At the Annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held January 13, 1927, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary establish a Memorial Membership Fund, to be used for two scholarships, one in Liberia, in memory of Miss Mabel Prothero, and one in Porto Rico, in memory of Miss Frances Cuddy. Any balance in this Fund may be used for scholarships by a vote of the Auxiliary."

These Memorial Memberships, of five dollars a year, are taken out by women of the Auxiliary and sometimes by Parish Branches in memory of some dear one, who has passed into Life Eternal. This fund creates a beautiful memorial, while at the same time supports through its scholarships the education of youth in the mission fields.

THE SYBIL CARTER MEMORIAL FUND

Among the many beautiful stories of love and sacrifice of self for others that fill the Missionary pages, none is more interesting than that of Miss Sybil Carter, who, filled with the love of Christ,

went abroad and through many weary months of earnest work, fitted herself to teach the making of lace. All this was done that she might by establishing schools and teaching lace-making to the Indian Women of Minnesota, show her loving sympathy for them, and while teaching them the beautiful stitches, weave into their lives the wonderful story of the Christ Child and His love for them.

During her life it was the privilege of our Branch to pay Miss Carter's salary, and after her death to pay that of Miss Hemmingway, her successor. When the nation-wide campaign took over this work among the Indians, the Pittsburgh Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary felt unwilling to discontinue this Fund, so it has remained one of our Special Funds, through the channels of which extra help and comfort go to women workers in the Indian field.

FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING

January 10th, 1929

The Forty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 10th, 1929, at Church of the Ascension.

At 10 o'clock the service of Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Alexander Mann, assisted by Dr. John Dows Hills, Dr. Homer Flint and Mr. Boyd Edwards, rector of Church of the Ascension.

Bishop Mann made a short address, opening with greetings to the Auxiliary and spoke of Dr. Rudolph Teusler's visit to Pittsburgh from whom we are going to hear what the gospel of Christ has been doing in Japan. Bishop Mann traced the altruistic endeavors from the beginning, with the Christian Church as the background.

The address was followed by a reading of the names of those for whom Memorial memberships had been given to the Auxiliary during 1928.

Following the service, the business session was called to order by Mrs. Fleming, the President.

The Roll was called, 130 being present from twenty-nine parish branches.

It was moved by Mrs. Peirce, the reading of the minutes of the December meeting be omitted. The motion carried.

The annual report of the Recording Secretary was read. It was moved by Mrs. Adams, this report be recorded as read. The motion carried.

Miss Phillips, Treasurer read her yearly report, announcing a balance of \$1,191.01 on December 31st, 1928. This report was ordered filed as read. Miss Phillips read the Budget for 1929. Mrs. Cornelius moved the budget be accepted as read. The motion carried.

Dr. Flint explained the somewhat lower interest from the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund for the year 1928, the interest for the year 1928 amounting to \$877.74. Dr. Flint also spoke of the bequest from Miss Hoag—one-half of this interest to go to the U. T. Offering, and one-half to the Memorial Membership Fund.

Dr. Flint suggested an amount be placed with the Board of Trustees by individuals for the Memorial Membership Fund (during their lifetime). Miss Phillips suggested setting aside a certain amount in our wills for this fund.

Mrs. Emmerling, Treasurer, reported the Clara Chester Bailey Fund—the interest (\$877.74), to be used, one-half for domestic and one-half for foreign missions and presented the following recommendation:

The Committee on the administration of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund therefore recommends to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh that of the \$877.74 interest available from the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, \$500.00 be sent to Dr. Takamatsu of St. Mary's Parish, Kyoto, Japan, and \$377.74 be given to Sandy Creek in our own Diocese toward their Parish House. It was moved by Mrs. Todd that the recommendation be accepted. The motion carried.

Reports were given by the United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Cornelius and Mrs. Flint, Educational Chairmen. Mrs. Flint announced the date January 29th for Training Classes for Group Discussion at St. Peter's Parish House. Miss Fleming moved Mrs. Flint's report be recorded. The motion carried. Mrs. Bigham spoke of the

Institute for the Training for Parish Officers to be held January 15th, 1929.

The report of the Corporate Gift was read by Miss Fleming, Treasurer. It was moved by Miss Phillips this report be filed as read. The motion carried.

Mrs. Peirce, Supply Secretary, gave a report.

Mrs. Hawley, Chairman, reported for the Extension Department. It was moved by Mrs. Higgins this report be filed as read. The motion carried.

Mrs. Searles, Chairman, reported for the Social Service Department. Mrs. James moved the report be recorded. The motion carried.

Mrs. Adams reported the Mission Industries.

The report of the Sybil Carter—the Memorial Membership and the Honorary Membership Funds was given by Mrs. English, Treasurer. It was moved by Mrs. Dickson these reports be recorded. The motion carried. It was moved by Mrs. English that we send \$500 from the Sybil Carter Fund to St. Michael's Mission, Wind River Reservation, Ethete, Wyoming, for the pre-natal work among the Indians. The motion carried.

Mrs. Leighou, 1st Vice President, read the report of the Publicity Committee. It was moved by Mrs. Peirce this report be recorded. The motion carried.

There was no report from the Devotional Committee.

The report of the Literature Committee was read by the Secretary. It was moved by Mrs. Dickson this report be filed as read. Motion carried. Mrs. Flint read the report of the Church Periodical Club.

Mrs. Emmerling announced an interested member of the Auxiliary had increased the amount to be given to Sandy Creek by \$22.26, bringing the total to \$400.00. This announcement was received and accepted with much pleasure.

Mrs. Harvey Childs read the report for St. Margaret Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Fleming asked for the report of the Nominating Committee.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The regular monthly meetings, U. T. O. Ingatherings, the Institute for the Training of Parish Officers, Bishop Mann's Lenten Bible Classes sponsored by the Auxiliary and the Day Intercession on St. Luke's Day, filled the calendar of the Woman's Auxiliary for the year 1928.

The Annual meeting was held at St. Peter's Church, Dr. Takanmatsu, rector of St. Mary's Church, Kyoto, Japan, being the special speaker on that occasion. Other speakers throughout the year were: the Rev. Drury Patchell, rector of St. John's Church, Donora; Miss Evelyn Buchanan, Superintendent of Religious Education; Miss Marguerite Bartberger, of Anvik, Alaska; Canon Bailie, of Newfoundland; Bishop Mann, and the presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev. John G. Murray, Bishop of Maryland.

The outstanding events were the June meeting and reception at Calvary Church in honor of Bishop Murray, the completion of the Corporate Gift and the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, the Ingatherings of the United Thank Offering and the reports from the General Convention at Washington.

For various reasons there were many changes among the officers of the Auxiliary. Resignations were presented by Mrs. Emmerling, Mrs. Austin, Mrs. Armstrong, Mrs. Douglas, and Mrs. Peirce. The offices of President and 1st Vice President were filled respectively, by the election of Mrs. Fleming, Jr., and Mrs. Robert Leighou; Mrs. Leighou assuming the duties of the Publicity Chairman made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Douglas.

But for the large attendance, between 500 and 600 at the June meeting the average attendance for the year 1928 would have been lower than for the previous year. The average was 150, representing 49 parish branches; Church of the Messiah being added to the list of members of the Auxiliary.

CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

After the death of Mrs. Charles Bailey, former president of the Woman's Auxiliary, it was decided by the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, that a fund should be raised, the interest from which

would be used annually for some missionary project, one-half in the Diocese and one-half in the church at large, as a Memorial to Mrs. Bailey.

Mrs. Bailey's children, hearing of this plan of the Auxiliary stated they would double any amount up to \$10,000, which the Auxiliary would raise. Ten thousand dollars immediately became the objective of the Auxiliary. The Bailey family did not wait for the Auxiliary to raise the \$10,000, but shortly after making this wonderful offer, they turned over to the Diocesan Board of Trustees \$10,000 as their half of the Fund.

During 1927 the interest from this \$10,000 amounting to \$556.06 was used, one-half for the Altar and Memorial Cross in the new Parish Church at Monessen, the other half being sent to Bishop Carson at Haiti to be used toward Cathedral chairs in the new Cathedral at Port au Prince.

In April of last year the Auxiliary's gift being complete, the Chairman of the Committee, Mrs. George Dickson, turned over to the Diocesan Board of Trustees, the Auxiliary's part of this Memorial Fund. But owing to the fact that part of the investments did not come due within the year, the amount was only \$874.44.

At the Annual Meeting held in the Church of Ascension, January, 1929, the following objects were recommended to the Auxiliary for the Fund for this year: \$500 to be sent to Doctor Takamatsu, of St. Mary's Parish, Kyoto, Japan, and the balance amounting to \$374.44 would be given toward the Building Fund of the new Parish House at Sandy Creek to be placed at the disposal of the Building Fund Committee. Before the meeting was over an interested member of the Auxiliary increased the amount to be given to Sandy Creek by \$22.26, bringing the total for this work to \$400.00.

As we realize how the voting of this money is going to be an interesting part in all the Annual Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary for the years to come, how the interest which it arouses may be so varied and so widely spread, how great its opportunities for service will be, then we cannot help but feel that this Memorial to Mrs. Bailey is a very beautiful and a lasting one.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

1928

In accordance with the custom of several years, the first educational effort of 1928 was the annual Institute for Training Parish Officers, held at St. Peter's Parish House on January 24. Counting the 18 members of St. Peter's Guild, by whom the luncheon was served, 112 women from 22 parishes were in attendance. The Program included model devotional exercises, led by Mrs. R. L. Regester; a General Conference on the Educational Work of the Woman's Auxiliary, conducted by Mrs. Marcellin Adams; a series of group Conferences for Officers, and a second General Conference on the Corporate Gift, conducted by Miss Lydia Fleming; followed by closing Devotions.

Despite the fact that it was deemed advisable to cancel arrangements for a training class for leaders of Discussion Groups, seven parishes held successful classes, using the text-book, "A Church Awake." For these accomplishments great credit is due. Three other parish groups attended Bible Classes conducted by their respective rectors.

An inspiring series of afternoon lectures on "The Earliest Gospel" was conducted by Bishop Mann on five successive Monday afternoons during Lent. These were open to all women of the community, and their response was encouraging, an average attendance of approximately 125 being maintained. Twenty-seven parishes were represented, and there were also present members of the United Presbyterian, Methodist Episcopal and Christian bodies.

At the Conneaut Conference for Church Workers in July, a course on "The New Africa" was presented by the Rev. Felix Kloman, but the attendance of Auxiliary women from this Diocese was regrettably small.

General Convention and the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary attracted many Pittsburgh Auxiliary women in October. The reports of delegates occupied a large part of the November meeting and were enthusiastically received. The chairman of this Department gained much inspiration from contact with the 65 other Educational Secretaries and acquired several new ideas that may later be put to use.

Issues Three and Four of the "Bulletin", were prepared during the year by the Chairman, the earlier one appearing first in the January issue of the Church News and later reprinted; the second was sent out in mimeographed form in December, having been purposely delayed until after the Triennial.

At the last Annual Meeting this Department released \$125.00 remaining in its Budget allowance toward completing the Clara Chester Bailey Fund; later in the year it sponsored the appropriation of \$25.00 toward a member of the Conneaut Faculty. It also proposed that the sum of \$50.00 be contributed toward the expenses of a delegate to the Rural Workers' Conference to be held in Madison in June.

At this time the Chairman wishes to record the tragic death of that delegate, Mrs. Louis Rothschild, while still in Wisconsin, following the Conference which she had attended with great enjoyment and enthusiasm. As Educational Secretary for Epiphany Branch she had displayed qualities of mind and heart that endeared her to all who knew her and gave promise of unusual future value to both parish and diocese. Together let us mourn her loss.

In an endeavor to frame a clear and comprehensive Annual Report Blank for educational activities of parish branches, the Department sent out in December its second suggested form. While several excellent reports were received, the chairman is far from satisfied. It is evident either that the report blank is still lacking in clearness or that parish branches as a whole have not learned the value of accurate and complete records. Practically all the required data should have been recorded in the regular Minutes of each Branch, so that a report might have been possible even from Branches having no Educational Secretaries. The Chairman is open, however to constructive suggestions on the subject.

Certain interesting additional facts follow: Five new Educational Secretaries have been added during the year making a total of 17;

attendance at Diocesan Monthly Meetings is with certain Branches invariably followed by reports, with others occasionally, and with many apparently never; nine report definite use of the "Bulletins"; in 12 Branches subscribers to the Spirit of Missions vary from one to twenty, but only one suggests any plan for its circulation and use; the Speakers' Bureau has record of 33 visits made to 31 groups, two of these being to Young People's organizations and a third to a Church School. Miss Buchanan's appearance before the Annual Meeting of the Diocese of Erie was arranged through this Bureau. Mrs. Adams also reports addressing 85 members of the Home Missionary Society of Christ Methodist Church on the United Thank Offering. Her part in the Church Club Post-Convention program may well be recorded here also. Ten Branches report from one to eight Program Meetings featuring papers, readings, addresses, plays and current events; under the head of "Special Meetings" are included reports of Bishop Murray's visit, attendance at General Convention, parish and Diocesan Bible Classes and an evening meeting, open to men as guests, with Impressions of General Convention for a topic.

On the whole, the idea of approaching our task as Auxiliary women with intelligence and understanding is unquestionably gaining ground year by year as faith and persistence keep hand in hand.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

The Pittsburgh fifth week for the Blind was held in April, 1928. The women of the Episcopal Church served with other groups of church women on Protestant Day, thus helping to make this social service event a success. The receipts on Protestant Day were about \$3,000.00.

When the Cause and Cure of War conference was held in Pittsburgh, the Department of Social Service was represented by 13 delegates. As has been said, this conference was held to support the "friendly gesture" idea between nations as represented in the Kellog Peace Treaty, which both the Board and the Auxiliary endorsed by sending in the required signed statements.

The booth sale of seals for the Tuberculosis League of Pittsburgh was held in all office buildings, stores and post-offices during December and generously, in this busiest season of the year—from December 12 to 23, was conducted by the women of the Episcopal Church in the Chamber of Commerce Building, with the exception of Calvary women who had charge of the sale in the City-County Building.

As chairman of this Sale, I was much pleased by the faithful cooperation of the many auxiliary women who helped to make this Sale successful. The entire booth sales amounted to about \$2,100.00, and \$50.00 was taken in at the Chamber of Commerce Building.

The work of the Extension Department has shown some progress during the past year.

Mrs. Kendig of Indiana, Miss Jamison of Greensburg, Mrs. Garland and Mrs. Kirkpatrick of Pittsburgh, were added to the Department.

We sent out five letters to five different districts with a view to organizing "Regional Groups." Four of these letters were answered. It will take time to develop this work, but I feel sure that with the assistance of the General Missionary, it will in time be done.

It has been my pleasure to pay several visits this past year, and I feel that the Pittsburgh Branch of the Auxiliary is established on a firm basis.

It seems quite fitting that my term of office should expire at the close of 20 years of continuous service, and I wish to express my appreciation to all the officers and members of the Auxiliary for their loyalty and cooperation.

The work, though hard at times, has always been a joy to me, first as Junior Director, then as chairman of the Pageantry Committee, and for the past four years as chairman of the Extension Department. I have esteemed it an honor to be elected from the Pittsburgh Branch of the Auxiliary as a delegate to every Triennial meeting of the Auxiliary, six of which I have attended. The friendships I have formed during this twenty years of service have been one of my greatest joys. They have been of inestimable value to me, and I shall look back upon them as one of the happiest things in my life.

I shall always be most happy to assist my successor in any way possible and wish her "God-speed" in her work.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S BOARD OF THE ST. MARGARET'S HOSPITAL

To the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of Pittsburgh

I am once more bringing to you a report of some of the work done for and by The Saint Margaret Memorial Hospital. I like to speak and think of it as personal relationship one feels within its walls.

I think you all realize that it grows yearly more dear to the people of our diocese, not that its ministrations are at all confined to our own Church people, but that it is in a very special sense a part of the diocesan work and one of which the diocese has more and more reason to be proud. It is of this relationship I wish to speak today, and I shall not give you statistics which will be presented at the Convention and published in the Church News.

Among the evidences of this growing interest, there are many gifts which have been of great benefit. The John C. Oliver Research Foundation was given by Mrs. Oliver, in memory of her husband, a

complete laboratory for research work was outfitted and a full time bio-chemist is employed. The cost of this has been entirely undertaken by Mrs. Oliver and amounts to \$7,500.00 a year. Much valuable work has been done. This is absolutely separate from the already equipped testing laboratory. The Maternity Department has been entirely remodeled, wards, private rooms, nurseries and delivery rooms, all now on one floor. The whole department is an example of the latest ideas in its arrangement and appliances.

Private rooms have been refurnished by:

The St. Hilda's Guild of the Church of the Ascension.

The Daughters of the King.

One large room with bath has been completely furnished by
Mr. David Oliver and an equally fine suite by Mr. Geo.
Danner.

The rental of these extra rooms helps in making it possible to care for so many free or partially free patients as is done.

Mrs. L. M. Plumer has completed the furnishing of the new dining room for the Superintendent and Directress of Nurses.

The St. Anne's Guild of Calvary Church has promised \$150.00 a year for the upkeep of the Babies' Nurseries.

I could go on with many more items of gifts which come in an almost never-failing stream from parishes and individuals.

The Linen Room and Surgical Supply Room shelves are kept constantly replenished.

When I spoke to Miss Shaw, the superintendent, about making this report to you, she said "Tell them we never lack for anything due to their splendid work."

Could we say as much for our supply of home-made jellies and preserves? Some of these are used in wards as well as private and semi-private rooms. Generous as gifts have been, the demand is still greater. (Jars supplied.)

Perhaps you may not realize that a private room is always at the service of the Clergy of the Diocese and their immediate families, free of charge. So many avail themselves of this privilege that we feel not only the hospital to be of great help to them, but that when they return to their parishes with kindly words, and when their visiting parishioners become interested, it binds them to the hospital with the feeling that all are working together as nothing else can.

May I take a moment to tell of the work of the Social Service and Dispensary Committee, composed of some fifty young women, who, by their efforts employ a social service worker whom they supply with a motor car. They also work daily in the dispensaries, act as librarians and distribute books to patients, and have done much to brighten the children's ward, their last gift being a complete supply of china decorated for children and new silver for their trays.

We are happy to report that Miss Shaw, Superintendent, and Miss Palk, Directress of Nurses, are still with us and still giving the same invaluable, interested and intelligent service.

I am slipping in a few figures at the last as they are virtually connected with the Auxiliary work:

On Donation Day, 1928, 2,771 articles were furnished, and in 1927,

2,442, making a difference of 329 articles, and, as you know, very many were completed later in the parishes besides which much new work was taken during the year.

Don't forget that February 12 will be Shrove Tuesday and Donation and Sewing Day at St. Margaret's, and please come early so as to start sewing promptly at ten, and bring your thimbles and scissors with you. I must again thank you on the part of the Hospital Board, for your work and interest, though I don't know why for St. Margaret's is your hospital as well as ours. May God bless its work and its helpers.
