## Special Funds of the Woman's Auxiliary

---

### THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

This great gift of the Women of the Auxiliary is presented every three years, at the time of General Convention. The offering is given through the blue boxes and the contents gathered by the Parish Branch Treasurers, just before the Diocesan In-gatherings in May and November. It is the hope of the Auxiliary that every Parish treasurer of the United Thank Offering will try to give every woman in her Parish an opportunity to share in this Offering.

### THE SYBIL CARTER MEMORIAL FUND

Among the many beautiful stories of love and sacrifice of self for others that fill the Missionary pages, none is more interesting than that of Miss Sybil Carter, who, filled with the love of Christ, went abroad and through many weary months of earnest work, fitted herself to teach the making of lace. All this was done that she might by establishing schools and teaching lace-making to the Indian women of Minnesota, show her loving sympathy for them, and while teaching them the beautiful stitches, weave into their lives the wonderful story of the Christ Child and His love for them.

During her life it was the privilege of our Branch to pay Miss Carter's salary, and after her death to pay that of Miss Hemmingway, her successor. When the nation-wide campaign took over this work among the Indians, the Pittsburgh Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary felt unwilling to discontinue this Fund, so it has remained one of our Special Funds, through the channels of which extra help and comfort go to women workers in the Indian field.

### MEMORIAL MEMBERSHIP FUND

At the Annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held January 13, 1927, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary establish a Memorial Membership Fund, to be used for two scholarships, one in Liberia, in memory of Miss Mabel Prothero, and one in Porto Rico, in memory of Miss Frances Cuddy. Any balance in this Fund may be used for scholarships by a vote of the Auxiliary."

These Memorial Memberships, of five dollars a year, are taken out by women of the Auxiliary and sometimes by Parish Branches in memory of some dear one, who has passed into Life Eternal. This fund creates a beautiful memorial, while at the same time supports through its scholarships the education of youth in the mission fields.

#### HONORARY MEMBERSHIP FUND

This fund is made up of gifts of \$5.00 a year by those women of the church who are unable to do active work in the Auxiliary and wish to support its activities. This is a part of the Contingent Fund.

#### CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

After the death of Mrs. Charles Bailey, former president of the Woman's Auxiliary, it was decided by the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, that a fund should be raised, the interest from which would be used annually for some missionary project, one-half in the Diocese and one-half in the church at large, as a Memorial to Mrs. Bailey. Mrs. Bailey's children, hearing of this plan of the Auxiliary stated they would double any amount up to \$10,000, which the Auxiliary would raise. Ten thousand dollars immediately became the objective of the Auxiliary. The Bailey family did not wait for the Auxiliary to raise the \$10,000, but shortly after making this wonderful offer, they turned over to the Diocesan Board of Trustees \$10,000 as their half of the Fund.

As we realize how the voting of this money is going to be an interesting part in all the Annual Meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary for the years to come, how the interest which it arouses may be so varied and so widely spread, how great its opportunities for service will be, then we cannot help but feel that this Memorial to Mrs. Bailey is a very beautiful and a lasting one.

#### CORPORATE GIFT

The amount of the Corporate Gift to be given by the Woman's Auxiliary during the year 1930 will be \$50,000.00. Twenty-five thousand dollars of this amount was designated at the triennial meeting held in Washington, D. C., in October, 1928, for building a church in Santo Domingo. This is to be raised by Easter. The other \$25,000.00 is to be used as follows:

REPORT OF THE MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE  
DIOCESE OF PITTSBURGH

January 17, 1929 - January 17, 1930

A letter from Mrs. Royce of Haiti, to the chairman of this committee contains this statement: "I think you and I in some former reincarnation must have been store-keepers."

The work of the Mission Industries Committee is indeed store-keeping when one thinks of the many articles made in our mission fields for which a market must be found. The store-keeping of this committee in the past year has been a joy and a delight and the hard work and endless detail have been abundantly repaid by the unstinted praise of the missionaries' letters.

There has been much generous help from the members of this committee and the excellent showing of the year would not have been possible without their keen interest in these products both for themselves and for their friends.

In addition to the financial report, there are other aspects of this work that should be noted. The Educational value of the sale of Mission goods is most important for the purchaser of such articles can readily be interested in the places where these are made. It is an easy step to create further interest in the people making the goods and the part of our Mission plays in promoting these industries. The preservation and cultivation of many native arts and crafts is yet another approach, while the beauty and desirability of the articles themselves lifts them out of the class of things bought purely from a sense of duty.

The money received also has a diversified use. The largest part goes for materials and for the wages of the workers. It is truly a Missionary effort when one can help people to help themselves.

A part of the proceeds is retained by the Mission for necessary expenses incurred in the work and a percentage is allowed for the selling of the goods. In this way parish and diocesan organizations as well as other groups undertaking the sale of Mission goods are enabled to retain a percentage of the proceeds for their own treasury. The increase of such sales is greatly to be desired since the marketing of goods is one of the ever present problems of all Mission industries.

During 1929, the products of six different Missions have been sold at four summer conferences, in five places outside the diocese, as well as to several groups and many individuals in the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

The Committee prepared and sent out one hundred copies of a mimeographed bulletin concerning Haiti and the problems our Church is there facing.

From the profits of the Diocesan Committee the sum of twenty-five dollars was sent back to Haiti to be used in the building of a much needed orphanage. A like amount was sent back to Porto Rico to aid in the purchase of a building needed for the enlargement of the industrial work. The sum of sixty-six dollars was added to each amount from donations made by parish branches; an itemized account of which is included in the financial report.

Another gift from the profit account enabled one of our missionaries in the North Carolina Mountains to attend a summer conference, where she had opportunity to tell of her work and make many new friends.

The holidays prove the most active time for this committee and returns on such sales have not been made. At the time this report is due. The financial statement therefore becomes a summary of the money activities of the year since several items can be credited only as estimated returns on sales.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

During the year 1929, in addition to the regular meetings, the principal activities of the Woman's Auxiliary were five Bible classes arranged by the Department of Religious Education, led by Bishop Mann, the work of the Institute for training Parish Officers, Quiet Day with Holy Communion celebrated by Bishop Strider, and the regular In-gatherings of the United Thank Offering.

The annual meeting was held January 10, 1929, at the Church of the Ascension. It was opened with the celebration of Holy Communion by Bishop Mann, assisted by Dr. Hills, Dr. Flint, and Mr. Edwards, followed by a short address from Bishop Mann.

At the June meeting the Auxiliary was again the guest of Mrs. Verner at her Oakmont home.

During the year the Auxiliary had a number of outstanding guest speakers including Dr. John W. Wood, Executive Secretary of the Department of Missions; Rev. W. T. Bayle, Secretary of Department of Missions; Miss Rowden, of St. Phillips Junior College, San Antonio, Texas; Miss Nickerson, Rev. Frederick Hurd, and Deaconess Stewart of Philadelphia.

Several changes were made in the officers during the year. By reason of the resignation of Mrs. Thomas Fleming, Jr., as President, necessitated by her removal from Pittsburgh, the first vice President, Mrs. Robert Leighou, assumed the presidency, and Mrs. H. B. Kirkpatrick was appointed by the President as the United Thank Offering Custodian, to succeed Mrs. W. A. Cornelius, who has left the city.

Nine regular meetings were held during the year with an average attendance of 91, and with a gross representation of 41 parishes.

**REPORT OF DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE**

A Quiet Day was held in Trinity Cathedral on Tuesday, November twenty-six, Bishop Strider, of West Virginia, was in charge. It was a splendid service and much needed in these hurried times.

Besides this Quiet Day, there have been two diocesan Auxiliary corporate communions—one at the Annual Meeting last January, at the Church of the Ascension—the other at the fall ingathering of the United Thank Offering, in Trinity Cathedral. At both these services our own Bishop Mann, officiated.

In going over the parish auxiliary reports I find forty-five corporate Communions—one auxiliary having had twelve. That leaves thirty-three to be divided among the rest. And so many auxiliaries have had no corporate Communions, no quiet hours.

The difference between our work and just the ordinary charitable work is that ours has the spiritual side. We are in a materialistic age—have been for some time. There is now the unrest for something else—for the other side—not of material. There are many new “isms”—new conceptions of the old principles of religion, that are being taken up by hungry souls. Our Church has not taught emotional religious feeling, but that of quiet dignity. People of today are past primitive emotions and so our Church can not neglect this work in our auxiliary life.

Here are a few suggestions towards the planning of the devotional side of our work.

1. Have your prayers at a definite time.
2. Use prayers that fit the thought of the meeting—or the work on hand. Use the prayers in the Bulletin for the industrial work.
3. Say in unison the Women's Auxiliary Program.
4. Pray a certain time for your Prayer Partner.
5. Have your corporate communions definitely for certain things—such as the first meeting of the Guild—the beginning of Lent, the ingathering of the United Thank Offering, etc.

The Devotional Chairman has prayer cards, leaflets, etc., which is at your disposal to look over and find what suits your particular need. If there are not enough on hand, they may be ordered from New York for a nominal sum.

Let us not starve the Spirit, but let us learn to pray fervently.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

The Aim of a diocesan Educational Chairman has been thus defined: "To awaken and to develop among the women of her diocese an intelligent interest in all that concerns the mission of the Church."

Accepting this as a satisfactory definition, how shall she proceed, first to awaken and then to develop this intelligent interest? The first step is, obviously, to bring before the women in her care the various needs, conditions and opportunities met by the Church and those who are carrying on its mission both at home and abroad. The interest thus awakened will, presumably, lead individuals to desire to render some definite service. This service, to be most effective, requires a measure of training and guidance. Thus it comes about the Information and Training play the major roles in the yearly educational program.

Let us consider how these two factors entered into the plan for the Annual Institute for Training Parish Officers, held at St. Peter's Parish House on January 15. In addition to the Sectional Conferences for individual officers, the forenoon session provided a paper on The Devotional Aspect of Auxiliary Work, given by the Devotional Chairman, Mrs. H. B. Kirkpatrick, and a General Conference on Simple Parliamentary Procedure conducted by Mrs. R. H. Hood, Parliamentarian of the Congress of Clubs. At the afternoon session, open to all Church-women, a paper on The Teaching Value of Religious Drama, prepared by Mrs. A. W. S. Garden, was followed by a brief dramatic sketch, illustrating the work of the Church Periodical Club. This sketch, written by Mrs. Marcellin Adams, demonstrated the possibility of conveying information as well as of enlisting women not interested in the ordinary routine of the Auxiliary.

In January the Study-Book for the year, "The New Africa," was presented before a group of parish leaders at St. Peter's Parish House. Different phases of the subject were handled by Mrs. Adams, Miss Buchanan and Mrs. Flint in a six-session course.

The Auxiliary cooperated with five other diocesan organizations in supporting a series of five "Eastertide Lectures" given by Bishop Mann at Trinity Cathedral, with the subject, "How the Christian Church Began." In the average attendance of slightly over two hundred, the Auxiliary was creditably represented.

At the Conneaut Conference for Church Workers in July, the Study-Book for 1930 was presented by Mrs. C. S. Hutchinson of the Diocese of Newark, while your educational Chairman conducted a class on "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Parish," which was designed to be both informational and inspirational.

To acquire a better understanding of one of the vital problems faced by our Church, a member of the Educational Department, Mrs. B. J. Gudge, was sent to Madison in July as a delegate to the National Rural Workers Conference. Through her report given at the November meeting, and an article appearing in the January issue of the Church News, an excellent idea may be obtained both of the problem and of the share we are asked to contribute toward its solution.

Anticipating the study of "The World Mission of Christianity," an intensive day was spent at St. Peter's Parish House on October 29 under the leadership of Mrs. Adams with 44 members from 15 parishes in attendance.

Your Educational Chairman was privileged to attend as a delegate the sessions of the Auxiliary accompanying the Provincial Synod held

in Harrisburg in October. Comparison of our own Diocesan achievements with those of twelve other Dioceses proved most enlightening and served to stimulate the Pittsburgh delegation to greater effort along all lines.

One page of the new Annual Report Blanks sent out in December was devoted to a record of activities that may properly be said to have educational value. The following data have been compiled from the reports submitted:

Of the 24 Branches represented at Diocesan monthly meetings, 16 listened to reports while 24 read the President's letter. Twenty-one Branches reported some constructive use of the two Information Bulletins issued by the Department. While the data with reference to the Spirit of Missions are no doubt far from being either accurate or complete, they show 129 subscribers in 21 Branches, with 10 copies placed in circulation by 4 Branches.

Twenty-seven speakers visited 12 Branches sent by the Speakers' Bureau, while 16 speakers were secured independently. Fifty-six Officers from 18 Branches attended the Institute. The Leaders' Class of January 29 enrolled 30 women from 18 Branches while that of October 29 brought out 44 from 15 Branches.

Attendance at the Conneaut Conference is reported from 9 Branches, with a total of 9 delegates while one Branch sent 3.

Papers, readings, addresses, plays, exhibits and current events figured in the Program Meetings of 13 Branches.

Fifteen Discussion Groups used the Study-Book; two others report Bible Classes and one, "Special Lectures."

Contact was established with the Summer Conferences held at Wellesley, Sweetbriar, Bethlehem and Frederick as well as Conneaut by different members of the Educational Department.

The loyal assistance and cooperation given to the Chairman throughout the year by the other members of the Department deserves special acknowledgment at this time.

Although each year brings certain disappointments, the past twelve months have shown a distinct growth in interest, and unmistakable stirrings of conscience have been manifest in groups long indifferent to any educational plea, and the Chairman is led to hope that all Auxiliary women will some day learn to serve God with their minds as well as with their hearts and hands.

#### REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, 1929

The function of the Social Service Committee is to act as representative of the Auxiliary in those civic and social undertakings in which the Auxiliary is asked to cooperate. It is also the Committee's work to interpret to the Branches the nature and needs of those undertakings and to ask of the Branches their support either by endorsement or by volunteer service.

Accordingly the chairman of the Committee is a member of the

Board of Directors of the Department of Women's Work, Pittsburgh Council of Churches and she serves on its Morals Court Committee. Mrs. Harry G. Samson, chairman of the Department, was the speaker at the May meeting of the Auxiliary, which was devoted to social service. She explained the work and aims of the Department.

Mrs. Waldo A. Amos attended for the Committee the meetings last Spring, of the League of Women Voters, which were held in the interest of the voting machines.

Through Mrs. E. J. Searles, who was a member of the National Better Magazines Council, it was voted at the October meeting of the Auxiliary to take membership in the Council. Mrs. Searles attends the meetings as our representative.

We again took active part in the annual "Week for the Blind", held in April in the Wabash Building. Thirteen parishes through their "key women" had the aims of the "week" presented to them. Over \$200 in orders for the work of the Blind was secured through the parishes and during the time of the week fifteen volunteers served at the Wabash Building.

In December, six churches sent eighteen workers to care for our table in the Chamber of Commerce Building during the annual Tuberculosis Seal Sale. In addition, four workers from a seventh church sold at two of the hotels on two evenings of the last week of the sale. Although the official tabulation has not been completed the Booth sale now amounts to over \$2,200, of which we are credited with about \$25.00. The value of the Booth sale lies in the publicity which it gives to the work of the Tuberculosis League.

The chairman of the Committee had the pleasure of speaking on Social Service at St. Stephen's Church, Wilkinsburg, in October.

May she take this opportunity to thank all those who gave of their time so generously during the past year to help in the work of the Committee? We can function properly only through the continued support of the Parish Branches.

#### REPORT OF THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

##### Letters Written

During the year 1929, many letters have been written by the Extension Secretary. Letters to parishes and missions where there is no branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, seeking opportunities for organizing such branches. In some cases, these letters were sent to the rector in charge; in others, to a representative woman of the parish. Following a suggestion made by Mrs. Fleming, attention was called to Mrs. Adams' Mission Industries Committee, and to the possibility of having articles cared for by this committee, exhibited in the different parishes. Appointments were sought for having the president, or some other Diocesan officer visit the parish to meet with the women. Where these letters were answered the words—"No opportunity for Auxiliary work at present," or similar ones were generally found.

Letters to small or new Auxiliary branches, possibly in need of encouragement and stimulation, were sent out, expressing the eager-

ness on the part of Diocesan officers to go out and help in any way they could.

This correspondence in an effort to organize and stimulate has made it apparent that if our Auxiliary branches are to grow in number, if we are to reach the goal of a fine, strong Auxiliary in every parish of the Diocese, the Extension Department is impotent without the hearty cooperation of both clergy and laity.

Letters to individuals living in outlying centers of the Diocese, were written in May, embodying the proposition of Regional Group meetings for reading or study, to be held during the summer months. It was suggested that parishes in those districts might avail themselves of the opportunity of having some of the trained speakers among the Diocesan officers, who had already given talks on Africa, go out and address these meetings. It was stated that these speakers had accumulated material such as pictures, maps, and charts, which added much interest to their talks, and that they would be glad to go to any parish, where desired. The response to these letters was not what had been anticipated.

Letters were written to other persons in the Diocese, and to persons here and there far beyond the Diocese.

#### **Literature Sent Out**

By request of Auxiliary women of other Dioceses, three copies of "The Church News," June, 1929, containing the article, "The Woman's Auxiliary and the Clergy," and three copies of the 1928 Woman's Auxiliary Annual Report, were sent to them.

#### **Conferences Held**

Conferences were held with Rev. Bayle and interested women from different parishes of the Diocese, as to Auxiliary possibilities.

#### **Auxiliary Branches Organized**

Two Auxiliary branches have been organized: one at Jeannette and one at Latrobe. The Extension Department rejoices at this added power for extending Auxiliary work to all parts of the world.

#### **Diocesan Educational Efforts Attended**

The Extension Secretary attended the Institute for Training Parish officers, held at St. Peter's Parish House on January 15, and the Training Class for Leaders of Discussion Groups, held at St. Peter's Parish House, on January 29.

#### **Rural Leadership Summer School**

As the delegate from the Woman's Auxiliary of Pittsburgh, the Extension Secretary attended the Rural Leadership Summer School and National Conferences on Rural Church Work, held at Madison, Wisconsin, July 1 to 12. A fine spirit of fellowship characterized the school and conferences, and the delegate enthusiastically recommends both as wonderful sources of information and inspiration. She would be glad to see young women of the Diocese of Pittsburgh given the opportunity of going to the Madison School, from year to year, that they might possess its joyful and helpful experiences. Association with the delightful Rural Workers met there, might create a de-

cisive to serve in the Rural Field. Dr. R. J. Colbert has said that, "The city can be served best, by serving the souls in the country side."

**The Rural Messenger**

In order that Auxiliary women may be kept in closer touch with Rural Church work, attention is called to "The Rural Messenger"—the Rural Paper of the National Rural Workers Fellowship.

**The Rural Fellowship**

One dollar covers the annual dues of The Fellowship and a year's subscription to The Messenger. Having become a member of The Fellowship while at Madison last summer, the Extension Secretary can testify to the benefits derived from that membership.

**SAINT MARGARET'S WOMAN'S BOARD  
REPORT FOR WOMAN'S AUXILIARY AND BOARD  
OF MISSIONS FOR 1929**

The Woman's Board of Saint Margaret Hospital has to report another year of progress, much has been done to improve or keep up the physical condition of the hospital. Miss Shaw continues her more than competent supervision. Miss Polk is still the interested and inspiring head of the Nurses' School and both make felt their person-

ality in the individual attention to patients given by them and under them by the entire nursing staff. Many expressions of appreciation come from all classes of patients, some of whom return to Saint Margaret's for treatment even after having moved to other large cities as well as from smaller towns.

You will find the statement of general funds and expenses of the hospital in the report given by the Board of Trustees to the Diocesan Convention. I shall only tell you of the work of the Woman's Board in which you take so large a part.

It has been most gratifying to see the growth of interest throughout the Diocese. Twenty-nine Parishes have contributed in cash or in equally valuable work or gifts of supplies for the pantry, so that it has been possible at times to add some homemade jelly to trays in the wards as well as to private trays, but this supply has reached low ebb. We hope to see it refilled on Donation Day—or before.

Beside the splendid record of Donation and Sewing Day, always held on Shrove Tuesday, when 264 women registered and over 1500 pieces of work were finished, the various Guilds have completed during the year the following:

FIFTIETH ANNUAL MEETING

January 9, 1930

The Fiftieth Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 9th, 1930, at St. Andrew's Church.

The meeting opened at 10 o'clock with the celebration of Holy Communion by Bishop Mann, assisted by Canon Gookin, Rev. W. T. Bayle, and Rev. J. R. Moodey, Rector of St. Andrew's Church.

After the Communion Service, Mr. Moodey welcomed the Auxiliary as the guests of St. Andrew's.

Mrs. Robert B. Leighou presided.

Bishop Mann opened the business meeting with greetings and a general review of the Church's missionary work.

By motion the reading of the minutes of the meeting of December 2nd was dispensed with and the annual reports were presented.

The Recording Secretary read her annual report which on motion was accepted.

Miss Phillips, Treasurer, reported a balance in the General Fund of \$9,433.65, and in the Savings Account, Mrs. Ormsby Phillips Memorial, Wuchang, a balance of \$14.21. This report was accepted and ordered filed.

Miss Phillips presented the Budget for 1930. Upon motion duly seconded the Budget was adopted and Miss Phillips was authorized to send the special sums designated direct to the Missionary Bishops.

Miss Fleming, Treasurer of the Corporate Gift, reported that the Gift this year had been completed and that there remained a balance of \$181.31. The report was ordered filed.

Miss Fleming read a letter from Mrs. Robert Burkham, President of the Corporate Gift Fund, in which she stated that at the December meeting of the Executive Board, it was decided to discontinue the Corporate Gift for 1930, but that in its place the Board had concluded to throw all the strength of the Auxiliary behind the National Council for its advanced work and that it was vital that this organization be kept intact.

The Roll was called, 182 were present from 27 parishes.

Mrs. Adams gave a verbal report of the Conference held at the Church of the Ascension, between the Clergy and the officers of the Auxiliary.

Reports from Mrs. Hawthorne, Corresponding Secretary; Miss Swan, Chairman of the Social Service Committee; Mrs. Adams, for the Missions Industries Committee; Mrs. Baldwin, Chairman of Devotional Committee; Mrs. Gudge, Chairman of the Extension Department; Mrs. M. M. Shepherd, Secretary of the Church Home Board. Mrs. Harvey Childs, Jr., President of the Woman's Board of St. Margaret Hospital; Miss Gethoefner, President of St. Margaret's Hospital Dispensary Board, were presented and on motion accepted.

Mrs. Masters, Secretary of the Supply Department, presented her report, which was duly accepted.

Mrs. Forker, Diocesan Director of the Church Periodical Club, reported a balance on deposit of \$83.45. The report was on motion ordered filed.

Mrs. Hirsch, Chairman of the Literature Committee, presented her report showing a balance of \$158.31. The report was ordered filed.

Mr. John C. Sherriff, Chairman of the Department of Social Service of the Diocese, presented an appeal from that department for the co-operation of the Auxiliary in obtaining volunteer workers needed by different philanthropic institutions.

After noon-day prayers the meeting adjourned for luncheon which was served in the Parish House.

Mrs. Flint, Chairman, presented the report for the Educational Department, which was accepted as read.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Custodian of the Untied Thank Offering, reported the sum of \$5,951.11 as the amount collected at the two ingatherings. This report ordered filed.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick made a plea for more endowed memberships for the United Thank Offering.

Owing to the illness of Mrs. Benham, Treasurer; Mrs. Dickson presented the report of the Sybil Carter, Memorial, and the Honorary Membership Funds.

Mrs. Emmerling, Chairman of the Committee on the Administration of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, gave the Committee's report, which recommended that the funds this year be given to St. Paul's Church, Mt. Lebanon, toward their new church and to the Building Fund of the proposed church at Bontoc, Philippine Islands. Upon motion duly seconded it was resolved that the Fund be used as the Committee recommended.

Upon the motion of Mrs. Emmerling, duly seconded, it was resolved that the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, be considered the memorial to Mrs. Bailey and not necessarily the gifts, which result from the fund.

Mrs. Bigham, at the request of Mrs. Leighou, took the chair.

The report of the Nominating Committee was then called for. Mrs. Demms, Chairman, presented the following nominations:

Rev. Charles T. Bridgman, representing the American Church in Jerusalem, was the guest speaker for the day. He gave a most interesting description of the Jerusalem Conference and of the great educational work being done there by the Church.

There being no further business, the meeting was dismissed with prayer by Mr. Moodey.
