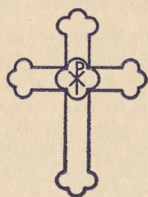

Special Funds of the Woman's Auxiliary

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

This great gift of the Women of the Auxiliary is presented every three years, at the time of General Convention. The offering is given through the blue boxes and the contents gathered by the parish branch treasurers, just before the Diocesan In-gatherings in May and November. It is the hope of the Auxiliary that every parish treasurer of the United Thank Offering will try to give every woman in her parish an opportunity to share in this offering.

THE SYBIL CARTER MEMORIAL FUND

Among the many beautiful stories of love and sacrifice of self for others that fill the Missionary pages, none is more interesting than that of Miss Sybil Carter, who, filled with the love of Christ, went abroad and through many weary months of earnest work, fitted herself to teach the making of lace. All this was done that she might by establishing schools and teaching lace-making to the Indian women of Minnesota, show her loving sympathy for them, and while teaching them the beautiful stitches, weave into their lives the wonderful story of the Christ Child and His love for them.

During her life it was the privilege of our branch to pay Miss Carter's salary, and after her death to pay that of Miss Hemmingway, her successor. When the nation-wide campaign took over this work among the Indians, the Pittsburgh Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary felt unwilling to discontinue this Fund, so it has remained one of our Special Funds, through the channels of which extra help and comfort go to women workers in the Indian field.

MEMORIAL MEMBERSHIP FUND

At the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held January 13, 1927, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary establish a Memorial Membership Fund, to be used for two scholarships, one in Liberia, in memory of Miss Mabel Prothero, and one in Porto Rico, in memory of Miss Frances Cuddy. Any balance in this Fund may be used for scholarships by a vote of the Auxiliary."

These Memorial Memberships, of five dollars a year, are taken out by women of the Auxiliary and sometimes by Parish Branches in memory of some dear one, who has passed into Life Eternal. This Fund creates a beautiful memorial, while at the same time supports through its scholarships the education of youth in the mission fields.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP FUND

This Fund is made up of gifts of \$5.00 a year by those women of the church who are unable to do active work in the Auxiliary and wish to support its activities. This is a part of the Contingent Fund.

ADVANCE WORK FUND

Instead of assuming some special item of Advance Work as the Diocesan Auxiliary has done in the past few years—known as the Corporate Gift—the Auxiliary has decided to accept a share of the Advance Work which the Diocese has undertaken, the erection of a church for colored churchmen at Orangeburg, South Carolina, a Student Center, the seat of Claflin University and of the State University for Negroes. The Rt. Rev. Albert Sidney Thomas, D.D., Bishop of South Carolina, addressed the Diocesan Convention on Tuesday afternoon, January 27th, on "The Advance Work Program", stressing particularly the necessity for an adequate church building in order that the work might progress—also expressing his gratitude to the Pittsburgh Diocese for undertaking this work. The Auxiliary has undertaken as its share, the amount of one thousand dollars, each parish contributing on the basis of their percentage, to be collected by September, 1931.

GREETINGS FROM THE BISHOP

No one perhaps knows better than the Bishop what a missionary force in the Diocese the Auxiliary is. In many a parish it is the one missionary flame that burns brightly. In good times and in bad, in prosperity and in adversity, the Woman's Auxiliary holds on its loyal and helpful way.

I hope to see the day when there is a Branch of the Auxiliary in every parish and mission of the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

Message from the President of the Auxiliary

My dear Auxiliary,

In the past year, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh has grown in spirit, in number and in purpose. The monthly meetings have been planned so that every individual member will realize what the purpose of the Auxiliary is. If the delegates to the monthly meetings do not carry back to their respective parish branches a report of what has gone on in the meeting, then the meeting has lost its point. Won't you see to it that each month an opportunity is given for this report in your parish meeting, so that there will be greater activity in the Woman's Auxiliary and more spiritual growth in the Parish life.

The speakers we have had at the monthly meetings have told us of their work in and around Jerusalem, among our American Indians, in the southern mountains, and also in China. In the Auxiliary this year, we have accomplished many things, but one of the outstanding ones was a symposium conducted on the Pittsburgh Quota of the National Budget. The purpose of this educational program was to promote a general interest in the church work with the hope that our quota might be paid in full. The money given through the Budget is used to support National and Diocesan missions and to pay salaries. There is never enough to build new buildings or buy new equipment. The need has become so great that the National Council has made definite plans for advance work for the church. Each Diocese has been asked to undertake the raising of money for a specific project and to have the sum available by Epiphany 1931. Our Diocese has assumed the responsibility of building a church in Orangeburg, South Carolina, the cost of which will be \$10,000. Of this amount, the Auxiliary has pledged a tenth. To carry out our program of Advance Work, we must have the co-operation of everyone. This very likely means that self-denials will be necessary. It is not our job to take over the work officially but it is our job to support, encourage, and help it by every means in our power. It is an important privilege before us as Auxiliary women. What we give should not be thought of as money, but as what it represents, hospitals, schools and churches. A resolution was adopted at the last provincial meeting in Philadelphia that the auxiliaries offer to the bishops, clergy, and vestries their best efforts to promote a program of education through the Dioceses in order that the church's

program and the Advance Work may be carried through by each particular church. Let us dedicate ourselves to the accomplishment of the task expressed in this resolution.

I feel I must mention the monthly bulletin which is sent to you. It gives the members of the Board an opportunity to call your attention to the plans that have been made and to give general information which we could not otherwise do. I hope every parish branch is deriving benefit from having this advance information.

During the month of May, two delegates, including myself, were sent to a conference of Diocesan Officers held at Taylor Hall, Racine, Wisconsin. It was one of the finest held at that famous center, with thirty-five dioceses represented. The exchange of ideas and the contacts one make stimulate a greater loyalty to the church.

It has been a great pleasure to me to feel that I have had an active part in the progress made this year. Another enjoyable part of the work has been the association and contact with the women. It has been my pleasure to visit several parish branches. Regional group meetings have been held in Johnstown and Kittanning, and the Church of the Advent, Pittsburgh, thereby getting in touch with several branches at one time. At these meetings the Board members have conducted an educational program. We are looking forward to continuing this plan throughout the Diocese so that we may all know one another, and have a better understanding of our work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom. To each of the Diocesan Officers I wish to express my appreciation for their help in carrying out the work of the year.

One of the difficulties encountered is to find women willing to carry on the work. I wish it were possible to make you realize what you are losing by declining an office. I wish I could make you appreciate how much more we could accomplish if we could have the support of more leaders. This next year I hope that each member will be inspired to take an active interest in the Auxiliary and that when you are called upon to serve officially, you will not refuse. If during the coming year we accomplish no more than the changing of attitude toward the accepting of the responsibilities of leadership, we will have accomplished a very desirable result.

I feel we have made a success of our undertaking this year and I am optimistic enough to believe that we can be still more successful in the future.

At the Triennial Meeting in 1889, it was two thousand dollars—one thousand of this for a church and its furnishings at Anvik Alaska, the other for an outfit, travelling expenses and one year's salary for one new missionary teacher in Japan.

As the years passed, interest in this offering of thanksgiving has grown and so has the amount of money until at the last Triennial Meeting in Washington \$1,101,450.40 was laid on the Golden Alms Basin. This is taking care of two hundred women workers, thirty-two retired workers and four in training. It has spent \$125,000 on new buildings in different parts of the mission field. One-tenth of the offering is set aside to be added to the permanent trust fund for support of retired U. T. O. workers. Also there are disbursements for outfits, travel, medical and dental work. To sum it up—it is taking charge of its workers from their beginning in training on through the work and into retirement.

While this so far has been spoken of as an offering of money, it is also an offering of prayers of thanksgiving. How often have you used the blue box by adding a prayer of thanksgiving, or a prayer for those who are working in the Field or for those who are receiving the benefits of this work, when you have given your offering of money?

The United Thank Offering should be the gift of every woman in the church. Only few can give the gift of life, but all of us can share in making it possible for those who so give, to render their best services.

MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE

Jan. 17, 1930 to Jan. 17, 1931

Pittsburgh is an actual pioneer in the organization of a Missions Industries Committee and our example has borne fruit as shown by the formation of a similar diocesan committee in one of the large eastern dioceses.

The value of this permanent committee becomes more evident when one realizes the number of projects one is asked to keep and the number of products in which a market must be found. Not only does such a central group prevent confusion by eliminating the multitudinous and inferior articles so often urged on a church charity basis but in the choice of goods of superior quality and suitable price it is able to offer full value received to purchasers.

The aim of the committee is first to help the people connected with our mission centers to keep themselves by securing a permanent market for their products. In the second place there is a real benefit for ourselves in the knowledge gained of various fields and their economic problems as well as a financial gain from the small commission allowed. The total of the appended report is much smaller than that presented last year but the chairman desires to call attention to the fact that three large seasonal sales were by force of circumstances omitted in 1930 and that the sum of these as reported in 1929 more than covers the difference in the totals.

Many more actual articles were sold but as in general business they were mostly of the lower price goods so that the money results is smaller. However, there is a real gain when we consider the many handkerchiefs and hand woven towels sold for gifts and when we think of the many more homes into which the mission industries articles have gone and how many more people have learned about who made them and where they came from.

This all makes for an increased market and perhaps the most encouraging thing of all is that in addition to our Auxiliary branches other organizations such as the Church Schools and the Girls Friendly Society have fostered sales and felt repaid by the commission earned.

We want this feature of the work enlarged in 1931, and offer to all groups who will undertake a sale any commission allowed on these articles.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

At the September meeting of the Board of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, a plan was presented and adopted to have printed a bulletin to replace the President's monthly letter and to give advance news of the work of the Auxiliary in the Diocese.

As a result "The Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin" made its appearance.

The first issue of 200 copies was printed in October. About 150 of this number was mailed throughout the Diocese.

Six issues of the "Bulletin" have been printed to date. The requests for the "Bulletin" have increased so that more than 200 copies are now being mailed each month.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

An increasing amount of educational activity on the part of parish branches during the past year indicates a steady upward trend in appreciation of the educational possibilities latent in all phases of Auxiliary work. Since the chief source of information, however, concerning much of that activity is the Annual Report Blank, it is to be regretted that so many still fail to claim the credit that is often due.

To recount in detail some of the year's accomplishments, the annual Institute for Training Parish Officers occurred at St. Peter's Parish House on February 18th. A general conference, replacing the more usual sectional type, and a series of questionnaires calculated to stir memories and stimulate thought, proved acceptable innovations. 78 officers from 19 branches were in attendance.

On February 25th, at the same place, a carefully planned all-day class on Methods, supplementing a Fall class on Materials, was offered to Study Class Leaders, Miss Hopkins and Mrs. Adams sharing the program. Owing, perhaps, to insufficient advertising, only 11 branches were represented, with a total attendance of 23.

Five days spent early in May at the National Conference for Auxiliary officers held at Taylor Hall, Racine, proved immensely stimulating to both your diocesan president and the chairman of this Department. Much of the information there accumulated was embodied in a comprehensive joint report presented briefly at a monthly meeting and more fully in the Church News.

Sharing responsibility with the Erie Diocesan Branch, a four-session program was arranged for the Erie-Pittsburgh Conference in June. This included introduction of the Study Material on INDIA, the subject for 1931.

At a meeting of Branch presidents and educational leaders held in Trinity Cathedral Chapel on the afternoon of December 4th, an exhibit of maps and charts was accompanied by book reviews of "Our Expanding Church", "India On the March", and "India Looks to Her Future", given respectively by Mrs. Virgin, Mrs. Hirsch and Mrs. Holt.

For each study subject a complete set of reference material is to be found each year in the Auxiliary room at the Diocesan Offices, arranged as a Lending Library. Branch libraries for Regional Group use are also contemplated.

Among the major undertakings of the year are to be rated three Regional Group meetings, one arranged by Advent Branch as a "Dramatic Day", and the other two, held respectively in Johnstown and Kittanning, taking the form of educational pilgrimages on the part of Diocesan officers.

Our horizons have also been perceptibly widened by the succession of speakers from many and varied fields procured for the diocesan monthly meetings through the efforts of our President, in whose report they will be mentioned in detail.

For purposes of record the following facts gleaned from the Report Blanks are here set down:

- 46 branches (out of a possible 50) returned their blanks,
- all but 8 of which contained some form of educational report.
- 27 branches attended all diocesan monthly meetings.
- 9 report occasional attendance.
- 31 read the President's Letter.
- 29 make some definite use of the Bulletins.
- 23 report a total of 258 subscribers to the Spirit of Missions.
- 20 sent 33 delegates to the December Leader's Class.
- 9 secured 15 speakers through the Bureau and 20 independently.
- 10 were represented by 27 members at Summer Conferences, diocesan or provincial.
- 15 arranged from 1 to 10 Program Meetings each.
- 19 held Study Classes, sessions varying from 3 to 10 and average attendance ranging from 4 to 35.
- 15 used the prescribed Study Books: "Roads to the City of God" and "From Jerusalem to Jerusalem."

Other subjects studied in regular or special classes included: The Bible, the Prayer Book, the General Church Program, The Long Life of the Church, Great Religions of the World, Educational Methods, and Conduct of Devotions.

Appreciative groups from many branches also attended Bishop Mann's five Epiphanytide Lectures on The Story of the Prayer Book.

Looking toward the future this chairman would recommend,

- (1) A definite drive for more subscribers to all Church papers, in particular The Spirit of Missions.
- (2) Fuller utilization of Summer Conference opportunities.
- (3) A greater feeling of individual responsibility for the success of the Study Class, looking toward the development of readers and thinkers, preparing themselves for really intelligent discussion of our Church's activities and problems throughout the world.

Searles the Auxiliary had a number of days for the Blind in various central locations at which time there was an exhibition of the blind work and a speaker from the Workshop. These days proved quite successful.

In April there were eight women from the Auxiliary who attended as representatives of the Church the annual luncheon and Institute of the Pittsburgh Girls' Conference at the William Penn Hotel. The subject was "Women in Industry".

Mr. John C. Sherriff, Chairman of Social Service of the Diocese, asked for our cooperation in the giving of volunteer service to various social agencies. We are sorry that our response to his request has been slow.

In December we again aided in the Booth Sale of the Christmas seal. We had four days at the Grant Building and we are credited with about \$35.00, an increase over last year.

The Chairman wishes to thank all those who have helped her this past year and she asks for continued support in the year to come. We must more and more assume our share of responsibility as Church women in the social and civic undertakings of the community.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH HOME

The Board of Managers consisting of twenty-six members from the various parishes have had thirteen meetings in the past year, with an average attendance of fourteen. The House Committee has seen to necessary repairs such as doing over the floors in the children's dining room and halls, re-painting and repairs and all things relating to the inside management of the Home. Members are appointed to visit each month and report at the monthly meetings. In the spring the members begin an intensive canvass among the churches and their friends for funds for the maintenance of the Home, which funds are presented at Reception and Donation Day held at the Home in May. On May 22, Mrs. Shepherd, chairman of the Donation Day Fund, presented to the Treasurer \$9,482.08. An additional \$1,000.00 was given by the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Stephen's Church, Wilkinsburg, in honor of Mrs. John B. Crombie who was for many years a member of the Board. The interest from the bequest from Mrs. George W. Guthrie is being paid and is being used for necessary repairs to the Children's Bungalow according to her wishes. Mrs. Mary Roach who entered the Home this last year gave besides her admission fee of six hundred dollars, \$1,144.44. Two one thousand dollar bonds have been bought by the treasurer with this money and the check for one thousand dollars for the endowment of the room. During the year the treasurer has received from endowment, private subscriptions and the Donation Day Fund \$34,948.71; the expenses were \$32,789.71, so it is evident that the Home is in need of the continued support of the church people and their friends.

At present there are forty-nine children and ten old ladies in the Home. Mrs. McClintock, aged 76, from Carnegie, died May 16. She had been in the Home a little more than a year and a half. Mrs. Mary Roach has taken her room. During the year 13 children have been admitted; 11 have left to be with relatives. The old ladies attend their own parish churches if they are able. The

children are all members of St. John's Church and are an enthusiastic part of the activities and recreations of that busy little parish. During the year six children have been baptized and two confirmed by the Bishop. Mr. Virgin, the chaplain, conducts services in the chapel of the Home every Sunday afternoon at 4:45, holds mid-week services during Lent and Holy Communion every third Sunday and on holy days and festivals.

The members of the Church Home family have plenty of interests in and out of the Home; their spiritual and temporal welfare are well looked after; their social life is full, happy and suitable for their age; they are being educated in the public schools and their reports carefully examined. The management, with the help from outside, is conscientiously endeavoring to fit them for the responsibilities of life as well as giving them a happy childhood. The superintendent, Mrs. Marshall Wilson, is the heart and soul of all this; she is a real mother to the children—firm, kind and cheerful; wise in her management of every one; an efficient and careful executive; her graciousness attracts the right kind of co-operation from outside; she can always find the proper place for any kind of volunteer assistance. In their manners and behavior the children show her influence.

Miss Virginia Wilson is an energetic and intelligent assistant to her mother.

The Board of Managers wish to thank all those in the churches and outside who have contributed during the past year to the welfare and happiness of these "aged, infirm and helpless members of the Protestant Episcopal church" and to beg them to continue and increase this help in the year to come.

ST. MARGARET'S WOMAN'S BOARD

In reviewing the work accomplished by the Woman's Auxiliary Board of St. Margaret Memorial Hospital the past year presents itself as one of progress and advancement.

There have been nine regular meetings with an average attendance of fifteen.

During the year there has been added to the hospital through the efforts of the Board the following permanent equipment: ten Gatch beds, china for the nurses dining room, furniture for the office of the Directress of Nurses, new springs and mattresses, a urological table, portable X-ray machine, and materials for sewing day.

Many donations and gifts were received each month and the supply of surgical dressings has been well maintained through the work of the churches in the Diocese.

Although the change in the date of our sewing day from Shrove Tuesday to November 13th, gave us two donation days this year they were both unusually well attended and a large amount of work was done.

We were happy to welcome as new members to the Board, Mrs. A. Verner Wasson, Mrs. Dudley Liggett, and Mrs. John C. Oliver and regret to have lost by resignation Mrs. George M. Laughlin III.

The free bed fund has had a remarkably promising year and is now becoming firmly established in the organization of the hospital.

We record with profound sorrow the passing away of Grace C. Liggett for many years secretary of this Board. Her unflinching devotion to duty, her sweet cheerfulness and her boundless love for the hospital will leave to the Board a memory of service splendidly and lovingly done by one whose character will always be an inspiration to us.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL MEETING

The fifty-first Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held January 8, 1931, in Calvary Church.

The meeting opened at ten o'clock with a celebration of the Holy Communion by Bishop Mann, assisted by Dr. Van Etten, Mr. Bayle, Mr. Cheatham, and Mr. Clark.

Following the Communion Service, Dr. Van Etten welcomed the members to Calvary, and asked that they adjourn to the Parish House for the business meeting. The President opened the meeting with roll call, 198 answering, representing twenty-five branches.

On motion the reading of the minutes of the December meeting was dispensed with.

In the absence of the Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary read the annual reports from each of these departments. Mrs. Leighou then introduced Mrs. Demms to the Auxiliary as a new member of the Executive Board. Mrs. Demms is in charge of the new publication, "The Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin."

Miss Phillips, Treasurer, reported the balance in the bank as of January 3, 1931, of \$1193.83. This report was accepted and ordered filed.

Miss Buchanan, member at large, spoke briefly of the Deaconess Endowment Fund. A motion was made by Mrs. Dickson that the Auxiliary contribute \$25 from the Honorary Membership Fund. This motion carried.

Mrs. Flint, Chairman of the Educational Department, presented her report, which, on motion, was accepted. She announced that the Institute for Training Parish Officers would be held in St. Peter's Church, Thursday, January 29, 1931. She further reported that Miss Margaret I. Marston, National Educational Secretary, would be the guest of the Diocese from February 24 to the 27, during which time she will visit as many Parishes in the Diocese as possible.

In the absence of Mrs. Childs, Mrs. Humphrey gave a brief report of the work at St. Margaret's Hospital.

Miss Shaw, Superintendent of St. Margaret's Hospital, spoke of the need of interesting more young girls in the Training School for Nurses.

Mrs. Eavenson, Chairman of the Hospitality Committee, reported having entertained three guests in the past year: Mr. Bridgeman, from Jerusalem; Mr. Hastings, from Ethete, Wyoming; and Miss Winegar.

Mrs. Masters, Chairman of the Supply Department, reported box work to the amount of \$4208.31, and personal box work to the amount of \$1564.82 as having been completed in the past year.

A report from Mrs. Forker, Director of the Church Periodical Club, was read by Mrs. Bigham. On motion, this report was ordered filed.

Mrs. Adams, Chairman of the Missions Industries Committee, in an informal report, told of articles sold in the amount of \$2500.

The President then welcomed the Clergy who were present. The Noon-Day Prayer for Missions was offered, after which the meeting adjourned for luncheon.

Reports from Mrs. Schempp, Chairman of the Extension Department, and Mrs. Burgess, of the Devotional Department, was accepted and ordered filed.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, reported the total of Spring and Fall Ingatherings to be \$5626.29. Upon

request of Mrs. Kirkpatrick, this account was audited and found to be correct, as reported by Mrs. Hartley.

Mrs. Benham, Chairman of the Sybil Carter, Honorary, and Memorial Memberships, reported a balance of \$925.67. Upon motion, this report was ordered filed.

Mrs. Emmerling, Chairman of the Committee on the Administration of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, reported the interest for the year 1930 as \$1154.70. She told of various appeals which had come to her for this fund. The Committee recommended that \$500 be given to Church of the Atonement, Carnegie, Pennsylvania; \$500 to the Blue Ridge Industrial School, at Dyke, Virginia; and \$154.70 to Mrs. Robert Armstrong, former Corresponding Secretary of this Diocese, for use in the small mission Church which she is now attending in the suburbs of Los Angeles. A motion was made by Mrs. Anderson, and seconded, that the recommendation of the Committee be adopted.

Miss Fleming, Treasurer of the Advance Work, reported a total on hand as of January 1, 1931, of \$490.51. The report was ordered filed.

Mrs. Hirsch, Chairman of Literature, presented her report, showing a balance of \$24.89. Upon motion the report was accepted, and ordered filed.

Mrs. Leighou read a message and told of having received greetings from Benson Harvey, in the Philippines, Miss Skiles in Japan, and Miss Bartberger, in Alaska.

The President then announced the following resignations: Mrs. Virgin, as Recording Secretary; Mrs. Burgess, as Chairman of the Devotional Committee; and Mrs. Searles, as Chairman of the Publicity Department.

Upon the request of Mrs. Leighou, Mrs. Emmerling then took the chair, Election of Officers following. In the absence of Mrs. Musgrave, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mrs. Dickson presented the following names:

Mrs. Emmerling asked for nominations from the floor, but as there were none, on motion duly made and seconded, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot. Miss Green fills the unexpired term of Mrs. Virgin.

Mrs. Leighou then resumed the chair. She thanked the members of the Auxiliary for the splendid support and cooperation they had accorded her, and spoke optimistically of plans for the future.

Mrs. Schempp, from Church of the Atonement, Carnegie, then thanked the Auxiliary for the gift from the Clara Chester Bailey Fund. She reminded the Auxiliary that Mrs. Bailey had been founder of that Branch, and that this money would probably be used to purchase some Chancel furniture rather than to go into the Building Fund.

Dr. Robert W. Patton, Director of the American Church Institute for Negroes, was speaker for the day. He gave a very interesting account of the work the Episcopal Church is doing for the negroes. He said that our Church is leading all other religious bodies in the magnitude and efficiency of the work being done among the blacks.

As there was no further business, the meeting closed with prayers by Mrs. Leighou.

families were ministered to. During the first year and a half fifty-nine families were confirmed. The first regular missionary was the Rev. F. B. Ticknor.

After his resignation the work reverted to the general missionary, who has received considerable help from Rev. G. B. VanWaters, of Greensburg. From the first, the offering of the people at the Bishop's visitation have been reserved and placed at interest for the church building, the corner-stone of which was laid, with impressive ceremonies, on July 17th, 1888. The land was given by the Penn Gas Coal Company, and the location is a most excellent one, being central for all the villages around. The Westmoreland Coal Company gave \$400, and the remainder was raised by the people and clergy. Mr. Locke resigned his lay readership in April, 1888, leaving the affairs in the hands of a committee, with S. Cairns, Sr., as chairman, whose untiring efforts have carried the enterprise to completion. His extensive acquaintance among the wealthy Churchmen of Pittsburgh has greatly assisted him in raising the necessary funds, together with friends in Irwin, who also gave substantial aid.

THE BUILDING.

The church stands on a beautiful knoll, near the Penn Shaft school house. The land belonging to it, was donated to the congregation by the Penn Gas Coal Company, and it is the intention of the members to erect a parsonage, after a while, having ample room to do so. The church is a neat, frame edifice, built in the Gothic style and handsomely painted. The main room is sixty by twenty-eight feet in size, with a Sunday school room 14 by 24 feet. The chancel is 14 by 14; the sanctuary, 7 by 14; and the vestry room 6 by 14 feet. It is furnished with heavy oak pews, handsomely carved, and the inside finish is in oiled hard wood. The windows are filled with stained glass, and the whole interior presents a very pleasant appearance. Everything about it is neat and well executed.

Why Welcome the Bishop?

"Why are the bells ringing?"

"Why are the bells ringing? Don't you know? They are ringing to welcome the Bishop."

"To welcome the Bishop! And what is he more than any other clergyman? Of course, in a worldly sense he is greater, and is set over other clergymen; but why should there be a fuss to welcome him? What is he more than any other clergymen, I should like to know?"

"Should you, indeed? Well good friend, I only overheard your speech quite accidentally and in passing, and it was not addressed to me; but as I saw your companion walk away without telling you that which you said you 'should like to know,' may I, though a stranger, now offer you a few words to the purpose?"

"A Bishop is more than another clergyman in a far higher sense than that of worldly greatness. He holds a higher commission from our Lord. He is of the highest order of ministry, and has received a special Divine gift for his special office. A Bishop is an Apostle. If he had his proper title he would be so called. But out of reverence for those whom we call the Holy Apostles—that is to say, the twelve Apostles of our Lord, with St. Paul and St. Barnabas—their successors dropped that title and only called themselves Bishops, which was then really but the name for those who had the care and oversight of the company of Christians—that is to say, of a portion of the Christian Church—in any place.

"The first twelve Apostles were the first Christian ministers, appointed by our LORD. They were 'to be with Him; and that He might send them forth to preach, and to have power to heal sickness and to cast out devils.' But after His Resurrection our LORD bestowed upon His Apostles a higher commission and a special consecration and heavenly gift. 'Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be to you: as My Father hath sent Me, even so send I you. And when He had said this, He breathed on them, and said unto them. Receive ye the Holy Ghost: whosoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosoever sins ye retain, they are retained.' After this all Scripture goes to show that the Holy Apostles considered especial offices to have been allotted to them by our LORD; and we must remember that His mind on such points was made perfectly clear to them during the forty days between the Resurrection and the Ascension, when he spoke to them of 'the things pertaining to the Kingdom of God;' that is to say, the things concerning His Church.

"We find the Holy Apostles performing all the offices which belong to all orders of the sacred ministry, but we also find that, besides these, certain offices belong to themselves alone. Chief among these special offices of the early Apostles of our LORD we find the ordaining of clergy—priests and deacons; the former being called presbyters or elders—the confirming of the baptized, and the consecration of other Apostles. These other Apostles then performed the same special offices; and without Apostles—

"Clergy could not be ordained,

"Christians could not be confirmed,

"Other Apostles could not be consecrated.

"Now, if I may here repeat that those whom we in these days call Bishops are the successors of those whom the Bible calls Apostles, you will know, I think, that which you said you 'should like to know;' namely, what, more than any other clergyman, a Bishop can be said to be. You will see, too, a fuller meaning in the words which you repeat so often, 'I believe in one Catholic and Apostolic Church;' and knowing and seeing all this, you will, I am sure, no longer consider it undue 'fuss' if loyal Church-folk ring the bells to welcome the Bishop to the parish."—*Selected.*
