Special Funds of Woman's Auxiliary

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

This great gift of the women of the Auxiliary is presented every three years, at the time of General Convention. The offering is given through the blue boxes and the contents gathered by the parish branch treasurers, just before the diocesan ingathering in May and November. It is the hope of the Auxiliary that every parish treasurer of the United Thank Offering will try to give every woman in her parish an opportunity to share in this.

THE SYBIL CARTER MEMORIAL FUND

Among the many beautiful stories of love and sacrifice of self for others that fill the missionary pages, none is more interesting than that of Miss Sybil Carter, who, filled with the love of Christ, went abroad and through many weary months of earnest work, fitted herself to teach the making of lace. All this was done that she might by establishing schools and teaching lace-making to the Indian women of Minnesota, show her loving sympathy for them, and while teaching them the beautiful stitches, weave into their lives the wonderful story of the Christ Child and his love for them.

During her life it was the privilege of our branch to pay Miss Carter's salary, and after her death to pay that of Miss Hemmingway, her successor. When the nation-wide campaign took over this work among the Indians, the Pittsburgh branch of the Woman's Auxiliary felt unwilling to discontinue this fund, so it has remained one of our special funds, through the channels of which extra help and comfort go to women workers in the Indian field.

MEMORIAL MEMBERSHIP FUND

At the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held January 13, 1927, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary establish a Memorial Membership Fund, to be used for two scholarships, one in Liberia, in memory of Miss Mabel Prothero, and one in Porto Rico, in memory of Miss Frances Cuddy. Any balance in this fund may be used for scholarships by a vote of the Auxiliary."

These Memorial memberships of five dollars a year, are taken out by women of the Auxiliary and sometimes by parish branches in memory of some dear one, who has passed into Life Eternal. This fund creates a beautiful memorial, while at the same time supports through its scholarship the education of youth in the mission fields.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP FUND

This fund is made up of gifts of five dollars a year by those women of the church who are unable to do active work in the Auxiliary and wish to support its activities. This is a part of the Contingent Fund.

THE CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

After the death of Mrs. Charles Bailey, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, it was decided by the Auxiliary that a fund of ten thousand dollars should be raised as a memorial to Mrs. Bailey. Her children then doubled this amount. The interest from the fund is used annually for some missionary projects, half in the diocese and half in the church at large. The voting of this money is an interesting feature of the annual meetings of the Auxiliary and we cannot help but feel that this memorial to Mrs. Bailey is a very beautiful and a lasting one.

THE LOUIS AND LULU EATON BROWN MEMORIAL FUND

Early in January, 1931, Mrs. Thomas Fleming, former President of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Pittsburgh, made a donation of \$10,000 to this diocese as a memorial to her father and mother, Louis and Lulu Eaton Brown. This money is in the nature of a trust fund. Of the income "One-fourth is to be paid to the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary 'to be made a part of the Diocesan ingathering for said purpose':

"One-fourth is to be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary 'to be expended at the discretion of the Executive Board of the said Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch'."

As the interest in each case amounts to approximately one hundred and twenty-five dollars, it is a source of satisfaction to the Auxiliary to know that the United Thank Offering and the Treasurer will receive this amount each year.

THE DIOCESAN CORPORATE GIFT

For a number of years the parish branches of the Auxiliary have contributed to a fund of at least a thousand dollars a year to be used for advance work. This fund has been known at various times as the Emery Fund, the Woman's Auxiliary Special, the Corporate Gift, Advance Work, etc.

At the recent Annual Meeting on recommendation of the Executive Board, it was voted to establish a permanent fund to be known as the Diocesan Corporate Gift Fund, to have as its goal \$1,000 annually. To this fund parish branches will contribute the same percentage as to the annual budget. Disbursements are to be made by vote of the diocesan Auxiliary upon recommendation of the Executive Board.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE AUXILIARY

My dear Members of the Auxiliary:

The Church year 1931 comes to a close with this 52nd Annual meeting of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. We come together today to count our gains and losses in the past year and to decide concerning the work of the coming year.

The past year has been a very happy one. We have seen growth in the parishes. Three new branches have been formed; one at All Saints' Church, Aliquippa, and two young women branches; one at St. Andrew's Church and the other at St. Paul's Church, Mt. Lebanon.

In some other branches we have endeavored to revive the work already begun. This not only represents a greater activity in our Woman's Auxiliary but a spiritual growth in the parish life.

It has been my pleasure to visit fifteen branches individually where I could become better acquainted with the women and where I could see their needs, thus helping to make the work in the diocese more effective. Members of the Board have held four regional meetings; at Charleroi, at Greensburg, which also included the Johnstown district, at Monongahela City, and at Tarentum. At these meetings we endeavored to explain to the women the opportunities, problems, and responsibilities of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In the diocese there are 75 parishes and missions. There are branches of the Auxiliary in 48, which leaves 27 parishes where there is no branch at the present time. In about half of these parishes the nucleus of a branch exists. There are groups of women doing certain phases of Auxiliary work, sometimes United Thank Offering or Supply Work. Nearly all groups work for our three diocesan institutions, St. Margaret Memorial Hospital, the Church Home, and St. Barnabas Free Home.

It is my earnest desire to have the women in every parish understand the real object of the Woman's Auxiliary. Bishop Lloyd says, "It is a worldwide view of what the Church of Christ is sent to do and a real sense of personal responsibility in carrying on that work." The real call is to devotion and service. In these parishes, therefore, it gives us plenty of opportunity to apply our devotion and service.

Were it not for the monthly Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin, this letter would necessarily be a summary of the work accomplished this past year. Through the Bulletin items of interest are told by the president as well as by chairmen of the departments and committees, with the idea in mind that these items will be discussed in the parish branches. If at any time further information is needed, please communicate with the Board Member whom it concerns. Ask her to come to your branch and explain it.

Although this is not a detailed report of the year, there are a few subjects of especial interest. The Auxiliary made it possible for four women to attend the Erie-Pittsburgh Summer Conference at Kiskiminetas. For the first time the Educational Chairmen of both Dioceses were responsible for the selection of a leader in Auxiliary activities. Two courses were given; one on "Opportunity for Service through the Woman's Auxiliary" and the other on the new study book, "Building a Christian Nation."

It would be impossible to estimate the value Miss Marston's visit was to the diocese. Her message from the Triennial to us was so clear and direct, describing the two weeks at Denver under three heads: living together, thinking together, and worshipping together. Miss Marston spoke at our regional meetings and conducted an all-day conference at Trinity Cathedral.

I want to express to you my appreciation for the great privilege you gave me to be your delegate to the General Convention. The experience of being one of so great a multitude, meeting together in fellowship, cooperation, responsibility, and above all in faith, filled me with high aspirations and purpose to the end that in our diocese our work will be stimulated so that we live our religion.

Through the thoughtfulness and generosity of Mrs. T. Fleming, Jr., the Auxiliary is the recipient of a portion of the income from a fund which Mrs. Fleming has created as a memorial to her mother and father. It is to be known as the Louis and Lulu Eaton Brown Memorial.

It is a joy to us that from our Diocese Miss Louise Reiley has gone into the mission field. Miss Reiley is associated with Dr. Mary James at Wuchang, China. She is living in the house which this diocese gave as a memorial to Mrs. Ormsby Philipps, President of the Auxiliary for many years.

This afternoon you will hear the reports of the various committees. The reports speak for themselves as to the success of the year. To the Board Members, I wish to express my thanks. It is to them we owe the success of the Diocesan work. To the parish officers I extend my appreciation for the interest shown in assisting the Board. Without your loyal cooperation we could not carry out the plans entrusted to us.

The last topic I want to mention concerns the major purpose of Christianity. "Peace on Earth—Good Will toward Men."

The thoughts of all nations are today turned to the Geneva Conference and prayers are offered for the peace of the world. I am quoting the following from an address given by Bishop Brent. The prayer with which he concludes was written three centuries ago.

"No longer can a man be a private citizen concerned only with his own affairs. We have always known that all the world is kin. Now all the world is one neighborhood. Science has demonstrated that to be a fact which Christianity has ever taught. It is the superb duty and opportunity of the churches to shed their timidity, their self-importance, their localism, and put on the seamless garment of brotherhood and unity according to the mind of Christ. To this end Christ commissioned his church. So to God we pray

"Lord lift us out of private mindedness and give us public souls to work for thy Kingdom, by daily creating that atmosphere of a happy temper and generous heart which alone can bring the Great Peace."

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1931

The Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council during 1931 held eight regular monthly meetings with an average attendance of 99 and a gross representation of 44 parish branches.

The Executive Board, in addition to nine regular sessions, held a Quiet Day at St. Barnabas' Home.

There were two United Thank Offering Ingatherings, one in May and one in September.

In addition to these meetings the Auxiliary either sponsored or participated in the following: Annual Institute for Training Parish Officers, three days of intensive training for educational leaders (one day under the leadership of Miss Marston), a Quiet Day as guests of Calvary Church, a class in Personal Religion as guests of the Church of the Ascension, the First Annual Pilgrimage to St. Margaret Memorial Hospital, all day sewing at St. Margaret's, Day of Prayer for all branches February 20, week of prayer for Church Unity, the Bishop's Eastertide lectures on "The Story of the Episcopal Church in the United States", and four regional group meetings.

The Auxiliary sent three delegates to the General Convention in Denver. They also sent four young women to the summer conference at Kiskiminetas.

The Auxiliary also assumed responsibility for the Church Periodical Club.

During the year three new branches of the Auxiliary were formed—one at All Saints, Aliquippa, and a Young Woman's branch at St. Andrew's, Pittsburgh, and at St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon.

Our interest in foreign missions has been quickened by the departure of Miss Louise Reiley of Christ Church, Greensburg, and a graduate of St. Margaret Memorial Hospital, for work under Dr. Mary James at Wuchang, China.

The Auxiliary was also the recipient of Mrs. Thomas Fleming's gift to the Auxiliary—one-half the interest on a fund of \$10,000 given in memory of her father and mother.

It was our privilege to have as our guest this fall, Miss Margaret I. Marston, National Educational Secretary, who spent several days in the diocese.

In addition to Miss Marston we have had as speakers during the year Bishop Mann; Dr. Robert W. Patton, Director of the American Church Institute for Negroes; Mrs. Judith Appassamy of Tinevelly, Presidency of Madras, India; Dean Moor; Deaconess Williams of Dante, Va.; Deaconess Bechtol of Charlottesville, Va.; Dr. Mary James of Wuchang, China; and Miss Isabel Kennedy, Executive Secretary of the Pittsburgh Girls' Conference.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

The Kingdom of Heaven shares with the educational phase of Auxiliary work a marked resemblance to the "little leaven that leavens the whole lump". Imagine, however, the difficulty of catching and analyzing the bit of leaven in the midst of the process! At best, results are intangible and figures misleading.

Many individuals and many factors are involved each year in what may properly be classed as educational activities. During the past year practically the entire executive board has gone crusading at one time or another. Every personal visit and every crusade serves to correct some misunderstanding, to suggest better methods and, in general to make clearer the true purpose for which the Auxiliary exists.

Of those activities sponsored more directly by this department, the annual institute for training parish officers has come to be regarded as more or less a fixture. The institute of 1931 was held at St. Peter's Parish House on January 29, with an attendance of 70 officers from 19 branches. Group meetings for exchange of ideas, together with their "Findings", and a "Missionary Quiz", lent variety to the program, which in addition to the customary officers' conferences also contained an excellent presentation of devotional plans by Mrs. J. F. Virgin, and a practical demonstration of "Building a Parish Program", conducted by Mrs. T. J. Bigham.

The subject for particular study during 1931 was "India." Last year's report told of the preliminary class held in the fall at which the necessary material was presented. This was supplemented by a two-day training session held at Trinity on February 16 and 17. At this time 19 women from 13 branches studied "India" under Miss Buchanan's leadership, while 12 from 8 branches chose "Our Expanding Church" as their text-book, presented by Mrs. Adams. It must be stated regretfully that despite all these opportunities for preliminary training, only 16 branches reported holding study classes, and it is much to be feared that in many cases the leader was permitted to carry the entire burden. Verily the way of the Educator is hard!

Plans for fall and winter study are each year well under way before the Lenten study ends. The new material makes its first appearance as a rule at the summer conference. At our Erie-Pittsburgh Conference last June two courses for Auxiliary women were jointly arranged for by the educational chairmen of the two diocesan auxiliaries, with Mrs. Reginald Williams from the Diocese of Newark as leader. One of these courses dealt with the theme "Building a Christian Nation", the study subject for 1932. Four scholarships provided by the diocesan branch were made available to one representative each from Trinity Cathedral, St. Stephen's, Wilkinsburg, St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon, and All Saints', Aliquippa. A total attendance of 21 representatives from 10 branches during the conference indicates that this opportunity for recreation receives less appreciation than it deserves.

The outstanding event of the past year was, quite naturally, the visit of our National Educational Secretary, Miss Margaret Marston. During her sojourn of five days, from November 10 to November 15, a very full schedule was provided. This included regional meetings at Greensburg, Monongahela and Tarentum, at each of which was presented a program somewhat like that of

an institute; and intensive day for leaders at Trinity Cathedral, discussing the study material especially as to method of presentation; and a tea at the home of the diocesan president. Miss Marston's share in the regional meetings was to bring an inspirational message from the Triennial Meeting in Denver. Her clear-cut analysis of the values gained during that experience of "living together, praying together, and thinking together", all working to secure the accomplishment of a definite purpose for which careful and prayerful advance preparation had been made, brought not only inspiration, but a very definite suggestion as to the necessary elements for any successful undertaking.

A marked improvement should be noted in the total number of branches discovering and making use of the educational page of the Annual Report blank. A very few still fail to give themselves full credit, and the chairman finds it necessary to draw upon her own knowledge in compiling a complete analysis. However, of a total number of 44 blanks returned, only 8 utterly untouched educational pages were found this year. A few of the facts recorded are as follows:

- 20 branches were represented at all monthly meetings.
- 11 additional branches attended one or more monthly meetings.
- 28 read the president's letter regularly.
- 16 make definite use of the Lenten Leaflet (formerly known as Information Bulletin.)
- 27 branches report 160 subscribers to the Spirit of Missions.
- 11 branches circulate one or more copies regularly.
- 29 speakers were secured by 14 branches.
- 17 arranged program meetings of different types.
- 8 special or diocesan classes or regional meetings were reported.

Subjects covered in special classes or at program meetings include: Assyrian Relief, Personal Religion, Church News, India, Association for the Blind, Alaska, W. A. Organization, South Carolina Missions, Japan, Diocesan Missions, Triennial Meeting, Mission Industries, General Convention, United Thank Offering, Work for the Isolated, The Philippines, Vestment and Altar Linen, The Bible, Church History.

The Auxiliary Book Shelf or Lending Library grows increasingly valuable, if one may judge by the record of the cards. This is supplemented by "News" from the National Department of Publicity, by the Bulletin of the Federal Council of Churches and their "Information Service", by the International Review of Missions, and by a growing series of Scrap Books, or books of current clippings on many vital subjects—all to be found in the Auxiliary Room at Trinity House. Many of the books recommended for this year's supplementary reading have been loaned or given outright in response to an appeal inserted in the Church News. For these thanks is extended by the department.

Thanks also go to all officers, committee members and many other individuals who by their interest, appreciation, co-operation and vision have contributed to the progress of the past year's educational activities.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

The year, 1931, has been the most successful year the Social Service Committee has had. Six members were appointed to it: Mrs. L. A. Hamilton, Holy Cross Parish; Mrs. Howard Wilbert, Ascension; Mrs. Henry Braun, Christ Church, North Side; Miss Elizabeth Hays, St. Stephen's, Sewickley; Mrs. Guy Mills, Calvary; and Mrs. John C. Sheriff, Church of the Redeemer. Largely due to the cooperation and time given by them the work undertaken was accomplished.

Mrs. Mills served as the Auxiliary member on the Better Magazine Council and reported its monthly meetings. Last spring she, with the chairman, surveyed the news stands of the Shadyside district, which was the Auxiliary's geographical allotment in the news stand's survey conducted in the city by the council.

Mrs. Braun, a member of the board of the Women's Division, Pittsburgh Council of Churches, reported its monthly meetings. The chairman again served on the Morals Court Committee of the Division. Mrs. Wilbert, as the Episcopal Church's representative, was appointed to the newly organized Young Women's section of the Women's Division. Six members of the Auxiliary's Social Service Committee and of the Auxiliary Board attended the luncheon, sponsored by the Women's Division, held in September at which Judge Soffel was the speaker.

Last spring several members of the Auxiliary and of the committee attended one or more sessions of the Pittsburgh Girls' Conference two day institute on "The Responsibility of the Community to Youth."

Several parishes last spring had days when a speaker with an exhibit talked on the work of the Pittsburgh Association for the Blind. This is a splendid bit of constructive and helpful social service any branch can do and we hope more will avail themselves of this opportunity this spring.

Mrs. Sheriff undertook the Christmas seal booth sale at the Grant Building for us this year. We had fifteen workers from eight branches on duty six days. While our sales only totaled \$14.88 we are told by the general chairman not to be discouraged as most of the largest buildings downtown reported decreased sales due to the decreased number of tenants and that the prime factor of the booth sales—the propaganda element—has not been diminished in this year of greatest need.

The November meeting of the Auxiliary was addressed by Miss Isabel Kennedy, of the staff of the Pittsburgh Federation of Social Agencies, who spoke on "Changing Trends of Social Work."

In October under Mrs. Hamilton, questionnaires covering social service activities of the Auxiliary were sent all the branches. We had twenty-two answers. There is not space in this report for a detailed summary of the replies which we hope to print in the Woman's Auxiliary Bulletin before long. We were pleased with the response and for the first time we could send a report to New York more nearly commensurate with the actual work being done.

In October the chairman visited the Church Missions House and had a conference with Miss Beardsley, national social service secretary of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Wilbert assumed the chairmanship of the first corporate communion of the Auxiliary and social service workers held at the Cathedral in November. There were nineteen present. So successful was it that the workers voted to hold communions at regular intervals during the church year. Dean Moor was elected chaplain. He was host at the breakfast following the communion. It may interest you to know that we have upwards of fifty church people who are professionally engaged in social work in Pittsburgh, many of them holding executive positions.

The chairman also received a questionnaire from the newly appointed chairman of social service of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Newark, asking information concerning our activities. This is the first year of a social service committee in the Diocese of Newark.

In conclusion we wish to thank all the members of the Auxiliary for their support and time rendered in the past year. We have made a good start. We hope in the future that many branches in addition to manifesting interest in social service through group or individual service, will also do it by talks from professional workers and by discussion groups.

REPORT OF MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE

This committee carries on its work of selling the products of various missions from January to December with much interest on the part of those who buy. There is also an increasing interest in using these products for educational purposes, for many times this past year they have been shown at places where sales could not be looked for.

Always there are those who count upon buying their Christmas gifts from among these unique articles, and this year many new customers have been noted. In such a difficult financial year it is truly wonderful to have sold so many articles and to realize how widespread is their distribution.

Each year since this work started there has been added the products of a new mission. The beautiful butterfly and wild grass cut flower lamp shades from the mountains of one neighboring diocese, West Virginia, have added much this year to the colorful character of our display. At present, stock consists of linens, hand-weaving, embroidery, pewter and lamp shades, as well as many other articles not to be found in stores. These are all from our church missions in China, Haiti, Porto Rico, and the mountains of West Virginia, Virginia and North Carolina in our own country.

It has been the desire of the chairman of this committee to send consignments of the general stock to any responsible group in parishes and missions and to allow to such groups the commission on any sales they might make. This plan has been taken advantage of in many more cases than ever before, and again the chairman desires to call your attention to the several ends secured by such sales; namely, the sale helps in an economic way in that people are helped to help themselves; the sale helps the parish group in that the commission is obtained with no outlay of money and unsold goods can always be returned; and finally, there is a real contribution in familiarizing our people with some of the work done in mission fields.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD, ST. MARGARET MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

I have come today bearing to you a very cheerful and most grateful message from the Woman's Board of St. Margaret's Hospital. In this difficult year, 1931, the hospital has cared for 65 per cent of its patients free of charge. This is a 12 per cent increase over 1930, with no diminution in the quality of the care given, and could only have come to pass through the constant helpfulness of the people of the diocese.

Practically daily kindnesses are shown, and not only is this helpful but encouraging. The work must be well done and worth while, since it has brought such good will.

The Donation Day was a success in every way. \$2,266.75 in cash, and donations to the value of \$381.40 were received. 379 earnest workers from more than 40 parishes and missions were present, and also took with them on leaving much work to finish.

Absolutely all the linen and garments used in the hospital are supplied through this day's work, and that done throughout the year in the various parishes and missions.

One of the outstanding events of the year was the children's pilgrimage, in which 750 children joined and were given mite boxes—the contents of which will be presented to the Free Bed Fund. This work begun in 1929, has since then paid for 1129 beds. Most of the subscriptions are for \$3.00. The diocesan young people made one of \$93.00, which paid for one bed for a whole month.

The dispensary and Social Service Board has helped in the dispensary and supported the social service worker, supplying her with a car and means of giving assistance when necessary.

Miss Louise Guiraud, a trained worker, gives her services free in care of the Staff Library, keeping files and records. She gives so much of her time to this and other work that we feel she must have individual mention.

I am sure you will all be interested in the going of Miss Louise Reiley from our school to mission work in China. She writes from Wuchang that her time is now much taken up in learning the language, but she is very enthusiastic and happy.

I do not want to close without repeating most emphatically that without the fine cooperation of so many parishes, missions and individuals of the diocese, the work of St. Margaret's would be curtailed and the spirit felt there and so often spoken of by patients, would lack a great part of its inspiration, whose foundation is fellowship.

FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING

January 14, 1932 the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council held its fifty-second annual meeting in Emmanuel Church, Northside, Pittsburgh.

Bishop Mann officiated at a celebration of the Holy Communion at 10 A. M. assisted by Dean Moor, the Reverend Mr. Garden, the Reverend Mr. Bigham and the Reverend Mr. Bayle.

Bishop Mann addressed the women briefly on the privilege and opportunity afforded the Auxiliary for keeping before the members of the church the missionary side of its work.

The Reverend Mr. Garden welcomed the Auxiliary and told of the endeavor of Emmanuel Church to help the unemployed of the parish and neighborhood by having a recreation room built in the basement of the church. Because of this work it was necessary for the women to adjourn to Calvary M. E. Church a block away where the meeting was held.

The President, Mrs. Leighou, upon taking the chair called attention to the splendid spirit of co-operation shown by Calvary M. E. Church in allowing us the use of their beautiful church for our meeting.

Mrs. Leighou then introduced the speaker of the day, Mrs. Bayard Stewart, wife of the Treasurer of St. Luke's Hospital, Manila, who told in her charming manner of the work of our church in and around Manila, which work was begun shortly after the Spanish-American war. We were especially interested inasmuch as eight of our branches are working for St. Luke's.

Following this the Reverend Mr. Bayle told of the increase in the number of isolated served through his department. This congregation of the isolated now number 440 to whom the service was sent 30 times during the past year.

The President then delivered her message to the Auxiliary.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with. Mrs. Leighou announced the election of officers would take place and appointed Mrs. Dally and Mrs. Danner tellers. As the roll was called the various branches cast their vote for the several candidates to be elected using the ballots provided for that purpose. There were 163 members present from 31 branches.

Mrs. Harvey Childs then presented her report of the work at St. Margaret Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Leighou recommended to the Auxiliary the class in personal religion conducted by Dean Moor in Trinity Cathedral each Wednesday morning. She also announced the February meeting of the Auxiliary would be held in Trinity House when the program will include a short talk on current events. It is planned to make this talk a monthly feature.

Following a short prayer by the President the meeting adjourned for luncheon at 12:30 P. M.

Immediately after lunch the President called for the report of the tellers. Mrs. Dally announced a total of 26 ballots cast with 26 votes for each of the following candidates:

The report of Miss Phillips, Treasurer, showing a balance on hand December 31, 1931 of \$1386.40 was accepted and ordered filed.

On motion of Mrs. Kirkpatrick, duly seconded, the budget of \$4,000 for the year 1932 was unanimously adopted.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick then reported briefly on the United Thank Offering showing a diocesan total of \$16,789.46 for the three years, details of the report to be published in the Annual Report of the Auxiliary for 1931. On motion the report was accepted.

Mrs. Benham, Treasurer of the Sybil Carter, Honorary and Memorial Membership Fund, submitted her report showing a balance on hand of \$1232.22 which, on motion, was accepted. The Auxiliary then voted to send \$100.00 from the Sybil Carter Memorial Fund to each of the following workers in the Indian field:

Mrs. Emmerling, Treasurer of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund reported there was interest in the amount of \$1040.92 from this fund to be disposed of and presented the Board's recommendation that one-half be given to All Saints' Church, Aliquippa, Pa., to apply on the church furniture and one-half be given to complete the Girls' Dormitory at Upi, Mindanao, P. I. On motion Mrs. Emmerling's report was accepted and on motion the recommendation of the Board for the disposal of the interest on the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund was adopted.

Miss Fleming, Treasurer of the Advance Work Fund, reported a balance on hand December 31, 1931 of \$1252.81. On motion this report was accepted. Mrs. Leighou presented the recommendation of the Board that this Advance Work Fund hereafter be called the 'Diocesan Corporate Gift Fund', the amount to be set at \$1000 for the year, this amount to be apportioned among the parish branches on the same percentage basis as the budget. The recommendation, on motion duly seconded, was adopted.

Mrs. Hawthorne, Corresponding Secretary, submitted her report which on motion was accepted.

Mrs. Leighou then introduced the following guest speakers: Mrs. Virgin, Diocesan President of the Girls' Friendly Society; Mrs. Garden, President of the Daughters of the King; and Miss Barthberger, one of our missionaries to Alaska; each of whom made a brief address.

Mrs. Bigham told of the honor conferred upon the Auxiliary by the appointment of Mrs. M. C. Adams as a member of the Foreign Missions Department of the National Council, and on motion, duly

seconded, the Corresponding Secretary was instructed to send Mrs. Adams greetings from the meeting and congratulations upon her appointment.

Mrs. Bigham, Director of the Church Periodical Club reported on the activities of the club. This report, on motion, was accepted.

The President then called for reports from the chairmen of the standing committees. Reports from Miss Buchanan of the Devotional Committee, Mrs. Hirsch of the Literature Committee, Mrs. Demms of the Publicity Committee, Mrs. Masters of the Supply Department, and Mrs. Flint of the Educational Department were presented and on motion accepted. In the absence of Miss Swan, Chairman of the Social Service Department, Mrs. Hamilton read her report, which on motion was accepted.

Mrs. Leighou then called for a rising vote of thanks to the members of Calvary M. E. Church and the members of Emmanuel Church for their kind hospitality, after which the meeting was dismissed with the Auxiliary prayer and the blessing.
