Special Funds of Woman's Auxiliary

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

This great gift of the women of the Auxiliary is presented every three years, at the time of General Convention. The offering is given through the blue boxes and the contents gathered by the parish branch treasurers, just before the diocesan ingatherings in May and November. It is the hope of the Auxiliary that every parish treasurer of the United Thank Offering will try to give every woman in her parish an opportunity to share in this.

THE SYBIL CARTER MEMORIAL FUND

Among the many beautiful stories of love and sacrifice of self for others that fill the missionary pages, none is more interesting than that of Miss Sybil Carter, who, filled with the love of Christ, went abroad and through many weary months of earnest work, fitted herself to teach the making of lace. All this was done that she might by establishing schools and teaching lace-making to the Indian women of Minnesota, show her loving sympathy for them, and while teaching them the beautiful stitches, weave into their lives the wonderful story of the Christ Child and his love for them.

During her life it was the privilege of our branch to pay Miss Carter's salary, and after her death to pay that of Miss Hemmingway, her successor. When the nation-wide campaign took over this work among the Indians, the Pittsburgh branch of the Woman's Auxiliary felt unwilling to discontinue this fund, so it has remained one of our special funds, through the channels of which extra help and comfort go to women workers in the Indian field.

MEMORIAL MEMBERSHIP FUND

At the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, held January 13, 1927, the following resolution was passed:

"Resolved: That the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary establish a Memorial Membership Fund, to be used for two scholarships, one in Liberia, in memory of Miss Mabel Prothero, and one in Porto Rico, in memory of Miss Frances Cuddy. Any balance in this fund may be used for scholarships by a vote of the Auxiliary."

These memorial memberships of five dollars a year, are taken out by women of the Auxiliary and sometimes by parish branches in memory of some dear one, who has passed into Life Eternal. This fund creates a beautiful memorial, while at the same time supporting through its scholarship the education of youth in the mission fields.

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP FUND

This fund is made up of gifts of five dollars a year by those women of the church who are unable to do active work in the Auxiliary and wish to support its activities. This is a part of the Contingent Fund.

THE DIOCESAN CORPORATE GIFT

For a number of years the parish branches of the Auxiliary have contributed to a fund of at least a thousand dollars a year to be used for advance work. This fund has been known at various times as the Emery Fund, the Woman's Auxiliary Special, the Corporate Gift, Advance Work, etc.

At the 1932 Annual Meeting, on recommendation of the Executive Board, it was voted to establish a permanent fund to be known as the Diocesan Corporate Gift Fund, to have as its goal \$1,000 annually. To this fund parish branches will contribute the same percentage as to the annual budget. Disbursements are to be made by vote of the Diocesan Auxiliary upon recommendation of the Executive Board.

THE CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

After the death of Mrs. Charles Bailey, President of the Woman's Auxiliary, it was decided by the Auxiliary that a fund of ten thousand dollars should be raised as a memorial to Mrs. Bailey. Her children then doubled this amount. The interest from the fund is used annually for some missionary projects, half in the diocese and half in the church at large. The voting of this money is an interesting feature of the annual meetings of the Auxiliary and we cannot but feel that this memorial to Mrs. Bailey is very beautiful and a lasting one.

THE LOUIS AND LULU EATON BROWN MEMORIAL FUND

Early in January, 1931, Mrs. Thomas Fleming, former President of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Pittsburgh, made a donation of \$10,000 to this diocese as a memorial to her father and mother, Louis and Lulu Eaton Brown. This money is in the nature of a trust fund. Of the income "One-fourth is to be paid to the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to be made a part of the Diocesan ingathering for said purpose:

One-fourth is to be paid to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to be expended at the discretion of the Executive Board of the said Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch."

As the interest in each case amounts to approximately one hundred and twenty-five dollars, it is a source of satisfaction to the Auxiliary to know that the United Thank Offering and the Treasurer will receive this amount each year.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

My dear members of the Auxiliary:

We have listened to the reports given by the several chairmen and secretaries representing the amount of work accomplished during the year 1932 and we may well be proud of our achievements.

My address to you this year will not be in the form of a report but rather my impressions of the year's work, the trends and what I consider outstanding events toward advancement.

In a recent survey I conducted of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary from its beginning in 1881, each year showed that some advancement had been made. Perhaps it had not always progressed to the fullness of its possible strength but its growth had nevertheless been steady. It was largely through the efforts of a few devoted women in every parish that this advancement was made and it is to them that we owe our gratitude.

This year has been no exception as far as advancement is concerned, but I think even more praise and recognition should be given when we consider the stress of the economic situation under which the work has been carried on. It shows the depth of courage and faith of these devout and broad spirited women in the parishes. It is with a feeling of deep appreciation of the kindness and the help that has been given me that I review the work.

Before considering further the subject about which I wish to speak, let us think first of those members closely connected with the Executive Board who have died within the year.

Nellie Gerrish Knapp Mann, our Honorary Vice-president, whose death occurred August 1, 1932.

Mrs. Rose Jones of St. Mark's Parish, a member of the United Thank Offering Diocesan Committee, died October 23, 1932.

Mrs. Margaret McCandless Rott, a member of the Church of the Redeemer and President of the Auxiliary there for many years, died May 5, 1932.

Unite us here to-day,
Our Father,
With all thy blessed ones
Who have fought the good fight of faith
And passed through the shining veil
of death to their reward—
Thy unclouded companionship.

This year has been an exceptionally busy one in the diocese—so much "going on" and I can conscientiously say so much "going forward." I am happy to report the organization of three new branches, one at Trinity, Sharpsburg, a Junior Woman's Auxiliary at Canonsburg and a branch at Rochester. This one is somewhat unique in that it is made up of women from Bridgewater, Beaver, Monaca and Rochester.

There are still too many parishes where there is no branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. I am very eager that every woman may catch the vision of the importance of our work and of the high place it occupies in the life of the church. These days are days of opportunity for us. Surely in every parish there are women, and especially young women, who are looking for just the things the Woman's Auxiliary has to offer. Are we letting these opportunities pass unseen?

I have felt that an important task of the President was to make the relationship between the parish branch and the diocesan board a close one. To accomplish this it is necessary that the women in the parishes know more about what we are doing. It is impossible for the board members to make all of the suggestions to the parishes for we cannot know their needs. A parish branch should make the acquaintance of the officers—learn the plans of the diocesan auxiliary and then analyze their parish problems. I'm sure that if this were done the spirit of co-operation would be an inspiration to greater effort in the interests of the work. In carrying forward this task I feel that progress has been made through the instructive programs given at our monthly meetings, the institute and the training classes, also by the regional meetings.

The board members have held two regional meetings this year, one at Jeannette and the other at Canonsburg. We also presented a program at Butler. At these meetings we gave a presentation of the Year Book as arranged by the Educational Chairman—explaining in detail the diocesan work. At Jeannette we had the pleasure of having Miss Helen Skiles with us who talked most refreshingly of her work in Japan.

In addition to the fifteen branches I personally visited in 1931 it has been my pleasure to call upon fifteen others this year besides those parishes covered by the regional meetings, from which I have derived a great deal of help and satisfaction.

I attended the Kiskiminetas Conference in June as your delegate. In order that one may fully understand just what value might be derived from such a conference one must attend. This conference was so well organized that there was never a dull moment throughout the five days devoted to its program. I recommend the conference for educational and spiritual values. Besides there is the value of contacts made with others in attendance interested in other phases of the church's work.

We all have very happy memories of the Provincial Synod which met in Pittsburgh in October.

To Mrs. Marcellin Adams as General Chairman and to all the members of committees who gave their enthusiastic support much praise is due. Every detail so wisely arranged resulted in a most satisfactory meeting. To you women in the parishes I extend my heartiest thanks. Through your generosity it was possible for us to complete our plans.

The work of the Executive Board has been especially co-operative. Each chairman has been sufficiently well acquainted with the work to not only effectively put its plans into operation but to offer constructive suggestions toward developing the work. We all regret that through a change of position Miss Swan had to leave Pittsburgh. Miss Swan carries with her the high regard of the members of the Board. At the election you were all conscious that another change must be made on the Board—that of the Educational Chairman.

The educational work demands great expenditure of strength, both mental and physical. Mrs. Flint has carried this office with extraordinary ability in working out details for programs. We are fortunate that Mrs. Flint will remain on the Educational Committee and we know that she will be of invaluable assistance as a member.

As you know Mrs. Demms has been elected to fill that office. Mrs. Demms understands the Auxiliary work thoroughly and has given such dependable service in compiling the Bulletin each month that we are confident of her continued success. May I ask you to give the educational work especial attention in your parishes thereby assisting Mrs. Demms in her new office.

I should like to particularly mention the class in Personal Religion conducted by Dean Moor each week. The course is divided into two parts: the study of the meaning of the words in the service of the Holy Communion and the study of the Life of Jesus. In my opinion this class is accomplishing just what we all need. Dean Moor interprets to us the mind of the Master and gives us his understanding of the deep and significant values of life.

I'm sure you feel that the work of the Auxiliary has been quite thoroughly reviewed today. It not only marks the progress of the past year but it provides a starting point for our service to the church in the months to come.

Perhaps many of you are anticipating a difficult year under the present conditions.

The unusual needs and difficulties of the day for you as Auxiliary women should not be a cause for discouragement but rather a challenge for greater courage and greater effort than you have been called upon to use in past years. The women have always been alert to the needs and have responded with courage and faith.

There will be many things we will need to carry out the program for the year, but there is one thing that we can all give toward advancing this program—that is service.

Service that is the result of your faith.

REPORT OF RECORDING SECRETARY

During the year 1932 the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council held nine regular meetings with an average attendance of seventy-two and a gross representation of forty-three branches.

The Executive Board met in seven regular and three special sessions, the average attendance being twelve. A change in the date of meeting was made to the Tuesday immediately preceding the monthly meeting of the Auxiliary.

In addition to the meetings mentioned, the spring and fall gatherings of the United Thank Offering were held in Trinity Cathedral when our handsome U. T. O. bag was used for the first time.

The Auxiliary devoted three days to training classes, one for parish officers and two for parish leaders.

Two regional meetings were held, one at Jeannette and the other at Canonsburg, and several of the Executive Board made a pilgrimage to Butler.

Three new branches were welcomed during the year - Trinity, Rochester; the newly organized branch at Trinity, Sharpsburg; and the Young Woman's Auxiliary at Canonsburg.

The outstanding event of the year was the meeting here in October of the Women's Division of the Province of Washington, when in addition to meeting many of the significant women of the Province we also had the privilege of hearing Bishop Creighton of Mexico; Miss Edmonds of Dabney House, Southern Virginia; Mrs. Campbell of Christ Church Mission, West Virginia; Miss Helen Skiles of Kyoto, Japan; Miss Marston, National Educational Secretary and Miss Deane, Chairman of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

Other events of interest were the establishing of the Diocesan Corporate Gift as a permanent thing, the continuation of Dean Moor's classes, and Mrs. Habersham's lectures with motion pictures of our missions.

The Auxiliary has also assisted with the following: the Church Home Donation Day, the Summer Conference at Kiski, the all day sewing at St. Margaret's Memorial Hospital, Work Among the Isolated, the sale of products from our missions and the sale of Christmas seals.

During the year we have had as speakers: Bishop Mann, Bishop Johnson of Colorado, Bishop Remington of Eastern Oregon, Mrs. Bayard Stewart of Manila, Miss Marguerite Barberger of Alaska, Dean Moor, Dr. Flint and the Rev. Mr. Bayle.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

The educational year began with the customary institute for training parish branch officers, held at Trinity House on January 28. The program as planned emphasized anew three great phases in the Auxiliary plan: worship, study, service. Following opening devotions, lead by Mrs. Leighou, Mrs. Judd Holt as chairman for the day, announced the following program: "Worship: Its Place in the Individual Life", Miss Evelyn Buchanan; "Study: Its Importance to the Parish Branch", Mrs. Homer Flint; "The Logical Outcome: Devoted and Intelligent Service", Mrs. Robert Leighou. Service as rendered through gifts of money included the United Thank Offering, explained by Mrs. H. B. Kirkpatrick, and the Budget and Special Funds, by Miss Margaret Phillips. Gifts of personal effort included Social Service and Mission Industries, both handled by Miss Annie Swan; Supply Work, by Mrs. Edgar Masters; and the Church periodical Club, by Mrs. T. J. Bigham. In the afternoon Mrs. Edward Schempp, under the topic: "Necessary Organization for the Parish Branch", spoke briefly of the need for adequate organization in order to develop a well-balanced year's work, but indicated how various responsibilities could be combined in a small group. Following a brief period given to officers' conferences came "The Day's Summary" in catechism form, conducted by the Educational Chairman, and closing devotions, led by the President. An encouraging attendance of 97 officers from 24 branches was recorded for the day.

To meet requests from some prospective study class leaders, the fall class was supplemented by a second Intensive Day, held at Trinity House on Tuesday, February 2, under the leadership of Miss Evelyn Buchanan, using the text-book, "Building a Christian Nation." The chapter on the negro was impressively given by Mrs. Marguerite Strother, Educational Secretary at Holy Cross, while that on "Youth" was presented by the Rev. Mr. Harris, Diocesan Chairman for Youth under the Department of Religious Education. Sixteen persons from 13 branches were in attendance and later reports show that the text-book was used in 14 parish classes.

In an attempt to awaken wider interest in the contents of the Annual Year Book, the chairman arranged a "Living Presentation" for the regular monthly meeting on March 3. This same dramatic arrangement was used later by members of the Executive Board both at Butler and at a regional meeting in Canonsburg.

On the evening of March 11 a regrettably small number availed themselves of a valuable educational opportunity when Mrs. F. A. Habersham presented at Ascension parish house her unique lecture on the church's work in the Philippines, illustrated by her personally—taken moving pictures.

Through the thoughtful consideration of the Program Chairman, Miss Buchanan, the presidents and educational secretaries of Erie and Pittsburgh were enabled to meet and arrange the Woman's Auxiliary program for the Kiskiminetas Summer Conference. This program was later vitalized by the presence and personal contribution of Miss Ruth Osgood, one of our outstanding National Field Workers, who conducted two daily conferences—one dealing

with the new study material and the other for discussion of parish branch problems and methods. The conference plan as a whole provided that on Monday, June 27, the emphasis throughout the day should be placed upon the Woman's Auxiliary. At the general conference hour Bishop Ward presided while officers from the two diocesan branches outlined the aim, purpose, organization and achievements of the world-wide organization. Twenty-nine women from ten Pittsburgh Auxiliaries spent from one to five days each at the conference, three of the number having been sent as delegates.

The recognized "high spot" of the year came with the Provincial Meeting in October. A notable exhibit of charts, literature and helpful suggestions, as well as a subscription table for church publications, contributed much to the success of the meeting, as did also an afternoon program arranged by the Educational Chairman to illustrate the educational possibilities of simple dramatics.

On November 10 at Trinity House the study material for 1933 was presented by Mrs. Marcellin Adams before a group of forty-one women representing twenty parishes. As the diocesan preference had been expressed in favor of The American India, the subject of China was but briefly touched. Following a morning session given largely to materials and methods, the afternoon was varied by the reading and reviewing of three short plays illustrative of present-day Indian problems, closing with an enlightening interpretation of India, music given through violin numbers played by Mrs. Leighou.

Throughout the year the Lending Library has grown in both size and usefulness. The Monthly Bulletin also has proved increasingly valuable as a means of reaching all branches with regularity.

The following details gleaned from the Annual Report blanks are of varied significance.

45 branches returned the blanks

All but 6 of these made at least some entry on the educational page—a gain of 3 over the previous year

24 were represented at all monthly meetings, 7 others at one to four meetings each, and in practically all cases some sort of report was made.

If accurately reported, the number making use of the President's Letter (now incorporated in the Monthly Bulletin), and of the Lenten Leaflet (formerly Information Bulletin) is disconcertingly small, considering the amount of both time and effort spent in their preparation and the genuine excellence and educational value of both.

30 branches report a total of 110 subscribers to the Spirit of Missions, many share their copies and 11 branches have a definite plan for circulation.

44 speakers were secured by 17 branches, exactly one-half through the Speaker's Bureau—a total gain of 13 over the previous year.

An interesting array of subjects was presented by the various speakers. They included Alaska, Japan, China, The Philippines, Archaeology in Palestine, Church Membership, Church Symbols, Personal Religion, Social Service Through Pittsburgh Schools, Economic Conditions, Community Work, The Bishop Tuttle School, Colored Work in the Province, the Year Book, The Woman's Auxiliary, The United Thank Offering, and Supply Work.

21 branches report from 1 to 15 Program Meetings each
10 featured Missionary Current Events

Readings, papers, addresses, 1 pageant, 3 plays and 6 exhibits are also reported.

To those classes using the study book should be added one class each on The Bible, The Spirit of Missions, The General Church Program, and India; two classes on Personal Religion and Special Lenten Lectures; and in one case participating in a Community Class; with a varying number of individuals attending Dean Moor's Lenten Class on Personal Religion.

Ascension Woman's Guild regularly places 10 copies of the Monthly Bulletin

From St. Peter's goes an annual subscription to the Living Church for the Rev. Albert Roberts in Brazil
Current Events were a feature at every meeting of Christ Church Auxiliary as were readings from the General Church Program in Messiah Branch
Oakmont had 15 Program Meetings.

Looking back over her seven-year tenure, the retiring chairman sees more to encourage than to discourage, and although far from having attained the goal set for every educational secretary—"to awaken and to develop among *all* the women of her diocese an intelligent interest in all that concerns the Mission of the Church", she believes that distinct progress has been made and that the outlook for the future is a hopeful one.

In the past year the membership of the committee has remained the same. Its members have given loyal cooperation and service and through them old and new functions of the Social Service department have been carried out. There was one regret and that was the serious illness of Mrs. Howard Wilbert. Fortunately now she is on the way to recovery. Though unable to take active part in the work of the committee she has been interested in it and has followed its year in every detail. The chairman wishes to speak especially of how much therefore she appreciates her interest, sympathy and advice in this past year and of how much it has meant to her.

As usual the committee informed the Auxiliary of local meetings in the interest of social welfare and research to which the public was invited. Mrs. Braun continued to report the meetings of the Woman's Division of the Pittsburgh Council of Churches. The chairman continued as a member of the Morals Court Committee of the Division, representing the Episcopal churches.

Several parishes had "days" for the blind in their branches. We hope that in the winter and spring ahead of us more branches will avail themselves of these "days", which can be arranged through "The Pennsylvania Association for the Blind."

Again this year we had our Tuberculosis Seal Sale booth and Mrs. Sherriff again served as chairman. We wish to thank those branches who gave us volunteers. The propaganda of the booth sales, despite low monetary returns, is of inestimable value to the Tuberculosis League.

Mrs. Hamilton tabulated the reports of the Social Service Questionnaire of the parish branches, which Mrs. Mills compiled. Due to this questionnaire we are able to make a more commensurate report on our Diocesan Auxiliary Social Service to the National Auxiliary.

The corporate communions of the Auxiliary and professional social workers continued during the year. In November this group of communicants held an evening service to which all social workers of whatever denomination were invited. At the supper following it was decided that future services should be arranged and held under the Cathedral Staff. Dean Moor, as chaplain, assumed responsibility for them.

In May at the request of Dr. Barnes, Chairman of the Social Service Department of the National Council, the chairman gave a paper on "The Cooperation of the Woman's Auxiliary in a Diocesan Social Service Programme" at the opening meeting in Philadelphia of the Episcopal Church Conference on Social Work, held in conjunction with the National Conference on Social Work. This paper has subsequently been used as an information guide for various diocesan auxiliary social service committees.

The committee in charge of the Kiski Conference arranged a fine course on social service given by Mr. Walkoenig of the State Public Charities Association.

In November after five years of service the chairman tendered her resignation as she was leaving the city to take a position in Altoona.

In the coming year the chairman hopes that in addition to the service of hands rendered by the branches that there may be the service of minds with the branches having speakers on social service, book lists or study groups and corporately diocesan lectures. These are stirring days in the fields of social welfare and much is happening of which we as members one of the other should know.

In closing may the chairman voice a very personal word? Her years of chairmanship have been happy ones. She has loved the work and enjoyed the contacts. She wishes to thank you all for your sympathy and interest in what the committee has tried to do. Though she is away she will think of her Diocesan Auxiliary with love and high hopes always.

Finally to her fellow members on the committee and to you all she gives her best wishes, especially to her successor.

REPORT OF MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE

January 15, 1932 to January 15, 1933

Like many other things that belong in the luxury, rather than in the necessity class, the report of the Missions Industries for the year 1932 but reflects the lessened sales of general business. This falling scale of sales amounts has been in progress for the last three years, and quite naturally our total for this year is considerably less than that of last. Many missions have lowered the price of their articles and this in turn means some loss in the value of stock when this reduction is passed on to our own goods that have already been paid for. Furthermore it is the cheaper, smaller article that now has the more ready sale and this means many more of these have to be disposed of to attain the same financial results.

On the other hand the figures in this report do not in any degree show the sustained interest in all these articles of hand-craft from our missions. The committee feels that perhaps as great as the financial help, is the educational asset of our exhibits, in that through this medium of seeing and handling, our women of the Auxiliary and other groups are becoming familiar with the workers and fields represented.

At the close of the year the committee had on hand products of fourteen different missions. Five, located in the mountains of West Virginia, Virginia and North Carolina, produce beautiful hand weaving, hand hammered pewter, rugs and other articles that utilize the native material and craftsmanship. One colored school in Georgia sends us beautiful baskets, while from Porto Rico, Haiti and China come exquisite linens and embroideries.

Many church groups have been given the opportunity to sell these goods and by retaining the commission have helped themselves as well as others.

It is the policy of the committee to turn back any profit into buying more stock as there is nothing we can do that is more helpful to these people than to increase their sales. This will be noted in the large amount of paid up stock indicated in the financial report. We are also quite critical as to the standard of work to be sold, since by this we eliminate that weakness of goods selling on a purely sentimental basis. Our aim is always to give value received and to have articles for sale that cannot be obtained elsewhere.

**REPORT OF WOMAN'S BOARD
ST. MARGARET'S MEMORIAL HOSPITAL**

Again I have pleasure and pride in presenting to you the work accomplished during the year.

While the number of pay patients is smaller, as is to be expected, the free service has grown with the greater need of the community, over 1300 more free patient days having been given this year than last; without the support of the diocese this would have been impossible. Our board in particular depends for much of its work on the cooperation of the Woman's Auxiliary, with which we feel our relationship grows closer year by year. The Donation Day and All-day sewing is the foundation on which we build and the continued interest, together with the work done in the parishes throughout the year, helps and encourages us. This year Donation Day was more than ever successful—much work was accomplished. The cash donations amounted to \$2,332.00, and gifts of jellies, fruits and canned goods, (so appreciated by sick people) were most generous. With this help we have been able to furnish appliances needed, and all linens, blankets and garments used.

The Dispensary and Social Service Board continues its valuable work, serving in the Dispensary, providing a trained social worker and a car for her use, also some means for temporarily assisting cases where necessary, and distributing books to patients.

The Free Bed Fund, since its start in March, 1929, has received \$5,144.22 from generous friends, providing 1700 free bed-days. There have been 394 new donors, with 194 renewals. The annual pilgrimage of the Sunday Schools attests to their interest in this fund.

Miss Louise Guiraud continues her free care of the Staff Library, keeping files and records.

Miss Louise Reiley writes that she is now giving half time nursing service in the General Church Hospital at Wuchang, and continues her study of Chinese. She is happy in her work.

Finally, I would call attention to the fact that the hospital closed its fiscal year free of debt. If with a very small balance, it is a remarkable achievement, for which we cannot be too grateful.

SAINT BARNABAS FREE HOME

St. Barnabas' Brotherhood wants to thank the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Pittsburgh for the wonderful way in which they have cooperated through their many branches with the work of the Home. The Home naturally in these strenuous times has been full to capacity the year through, and we have done an exceptionally fine piece of work for those who have never had to ask before. Many people have found themselves with their loved ones in some cases in incurable conditions, others convalescing, from over-work or want of nourishment and what not, that has brought sickness and disease in these hard times. Many have had no place to put them and no money to pay their way in sanitariums and have therefore found St. Barnabas' Home a veritable haven of rest. In this way we have saved numbers from incurable diseases and have sent them on their way rejoicing, able to go back home or to work or whatever the case may be.

You would be surprised if you could know the numbers who haven't even been able to bury their dead this year in this place, and what a relief the All Saints' Guild has been in providing this great work of mercy for them. There have been at least three this year who have had absolutely nobody to go to their funerals. The Brothers feel that never is their privilege higher than when they go alone with some poor child of God who has fallen along the way and has absolutely no one to go to his funeral and no one to bury him, and to lay them away in our lovely cemetery lot and give them a Christian burial. It is a high privilege indeed.

The Woman's Auxiliary has played a large part in this work throughout the entire 32 years that the Home has been in existence. They have given money; they have given food and most of all they have been the greatest instrument in providing sheets, pillow cases, towels, hospital garments, etc., that have been needed in this work. Some of the other Christian denominations have sewed for us too and we have never bought any of these articles since the Home first opened, and the Woman's Auxiliary is more responsible for this than anybody. So we as Brothers thank you with all our hearts and are so glad for this opportunity of thanking our friends.

There have been no serious illnesses during the year, in fact there has been uniform good health.

Mr. Virgin, rector of St. John's, is the chaplain and he conducts a service in the chapel every Sunday afternoon. Four children were confirmed during the past year.

The entire family, old and young, has been given parties, picnics, teas, automobile rides and plays by clubs and different church organizations and guilds. A play by the Girls' Friendly Society of Bellevue, a delightful Hallowe'en party by the Girls' Friendly Society of Trinity Cathedral, a tea for the "grown-ups" by the Tuesday Evening Guild of Ascension were a few of the diversions. Two members from Church of the Advent, Pittsburgh, see that each old lady has a birthday cake when the momentous day rolls around. An innovation this year was the establishing of a Free Bread Fund through the efforts of Mrs. A. B. Shepherd of Calvary. The cost of caring for one child for one day is \$1.00 and for one old lady is \$2.00. Pledges to this fund may be taken on birthdays or as memorials or thank offerings.

The Home is greatly indebted to all of the churches, through the different organizations, and many friends throughout the diocese for their generous donations of clothing, jellies, canned goods, fruits, etc., all of which is a woderful help and very much appreciated.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S DIVISION OF THE SYNOD

The thirteenth meeting of the Synod of the Province of Washington was held in Pittsburgh, October 18, 19, and 20. The Synod, or men's groups and two general evening meetings were cared for at Trinity Cathedral, while Ascension Parish provided adequate space and abundant hospitality for the Women's Division.

The majority of the women guests were most comfortably housed in the Schenley Hotel, this arrangement making it possible for our Pittsburgh women to be free to attend the various sessions. In connection with this it is interesting to note that the financial arrangements were so satisfactory, that at the close of the Synod we were enabled to pay all bills and to return a substantial balance remaining to the donors.

The committees had their work well planned in advance, and one could not hope for more efficient service than they rendered. It was all done in such a happy and enthusiastic spirit that this in itself was a distinct contribution to the success of the meetings.

A detailed account of the various activities, as well as the program itself, was printed in the October and November issues of the Church News so that this report will be confined to some of the high spots of those three days.

Two hundred twenty-three delegates meant the preliminary handling of 1915 pieces of material in addition to caring for mail, telegrams, telephone, stationery, stamps and the answering of innumerable questions during the Synod itself.

No account could possibly have been kept of the number of people transported to and from trains and meetings, as well as on sightseeing trips. The satisfaction of our guests was ample testimony as to the efficient service they received.

From the opening meeting of the Women's Division, presided over by the Provincial President of the Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. Charles Pancoast of Philadelphia, with representatives from the Auxiliary, the Daughters of the King, the Girls' Friendly Society and the Church Periodical Club, to the closing service at St. Barnabas Home arranged by the Daughters of the King, there prevailed the spirit of sharing in one another's privileges and responsibilities.

Thus, there were meetings in which the women of all these organizations joined to hear such outstanding speakers as Bishop Creighton and Miss Marston from our headquarters in New York, and our three missionary guests, Miss Mildred Edmonds of Dabney House, Va., Mrs. G. L. Campbell of the West Virginia mountains, and Miss Helen Skiles on furlough from her work in Kyoto, Japan. In addition, each society had several opportunities to attend to its own work in the separate group meetings and conferences.

Since this is a report for our own Year Book it is not amiss to note the contribution our own women made to the program. The Pittsburgh Auxiliary was responsible for one general session at which we presented various phases of work using the appeal of the dramatic. A living presentation of the Year Book, and a fashion show, dramatizing the supply work, were much appreciated as were the mimeographed copies of plays and programs for sale at the literature table. A fine exhibit of charts, showing in a graphic way, the use and growth of the different special funds of our own diocesan branch, elicited much attention from our guests. Well laden tables carrying study class material, and many pamphlets for free distribution proved a source of real value for many who have not access to such things. In addition an interesting exhibit of articles made in our missions was profitable in the sales that were made as well as providing a colorful bit of background.

The Bishop's reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mudge gave our women guests an opportunity of meeting their brethren of the Synod in a most delightful way, and that same evening they again had occasion to partake of Pittsburgh hospitality when they were the guests of Miss Mary Jackson at a delicious supper served in our beautiful and unique Twentieth Century Club.

On the closing day, the proverbial welcome of the Brothers of St. Barnabas at Gibsonia was extended, so that again our guests had occasion to note what the Diocese of Pittsburgh had to show them.

In closing this report, your general chairman would like to be able to express to every one by name her heartfelt appreciation for all that was done to make this meeting such a success. Since that is impossible may she thank the many branches and individuals, the chairmen and members of all women's committees, the chairmen and members of the men's committee who all gave so freely of their time and interest.

FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

St. Stephen's Church, Wilkinsburg, was the scene of the Fifty-third Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council on Thursday, January 12, 1933.

A celebration of the Holy Communion took place in the church at 10 A. M., Bishop Mann officiating, assisted by Dr. Porkess, the Reverend T. J. Bigham and the General Missionary.

The brief address of cordial welcome by Dr. Porkess was followed by that of Bishop Mann who spoke of the wonderful inspiration and encouragement the Woman's Auxiliary had been to him throughout his ten years as Bishop of Pittsburgh.

Following the communion service, Miss Helen Skiles told of her work in Kyoto, Japan. Hers was the story of "A Dream Come True" through the building of the House of Light in a little village north of Kyoto where she had the privilege of telling for the first time the story of the Babe of Bethlehem.

At 12:30 P. M. lunch was served in the parish house and at 1:30 P. M. the members assembled in the auditorium where the business meeting was held.

Thirty-nine branches with a total representation of approximately three hundred responded to roll call.

Mrs. Harvey Childs presented her report of the work being done at St. Margaret's Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Shepherd reported for the Church Home, stressing the Bread Fund Memorial.

Mrs. Garden representing the Daughters of the King urged the observance of the World Day of Prayer, March third.

Mrs. Virgin told of the work of the Girls' Friendly Society.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with.

The President then called for the report of the nominating committee. Mrs. Henry D. James, Chairman presented the following names:

The President called for nominations from the floor. There being none, Mrs. Kirkpatrick moved the nominations be closed. The motion carried. On motion of Mrs. Kirkpatrick, duly seconded, the secretary was instructed to cast the ballot.

The President, Mrs. Leighou, introduced Mrs. Demms, the new educational chairman, who told of plans for the institute for training parish officers and a mission study class.

The report of the Recording Secretary was read and on motion accepted.

The Corresponding Secretary made a very brief report.

Miss Phillips, Treasurer, reported a balance of \$1,635.41 on hand January 1, 1933. This report on motion was accepted and ordered filed. Miss Phillips also presented the proposed Budget of \$4,000 for the current year, which on motion of Mrs. Virgin, seconded by Miss Fleming, was adopted.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick, United Thank Offering Custodian, reported total ingatherings to date \$4,165.80. The report was on motion accepted. Mrs. Edwards of the Auditing Committee reported this account had been audited and found correct.

Report of the Devotional Committee, Miss Buchanan, Chairman, was presented by Mrs. Taliaferro and was on motion accepted.

Reports from Mrs. Flint, Chairman of the Educational Department; Mrs. Masters, Supply Chairman; Mrs. Eavenson, Hospitality Chairman; Mrs. Hirsch, Chairman of the Literature Committee; and Mrs. Demms, Publicity Chairman, were read and on motion accepted. Mrs. Hamilton read the report of Miss Swan, Social Service Chairman, who has moved to Altoona. This report and that submitted by Mrs. Schempp, Extension Chairman, were on motion accepted.

Mrs. Bigham, director of the Church Periodical Club, reported \$21.50 proceeds of the 'Book Exchange' being conducted during the day to raise money to purchase literature for Miss Skiles' work in Japan.

Mrs. Adams, Chairman of the Mission Industries Committee and a member of the Foreign Missions Department of the National Council, spoke very briefly of the women workers among the Indians. She explained that after the new cut in salaries their income would be very small, so that the Executive Board recommended that the money in the Sybil Carter Fund, to the amount of \$600.00, should be applied to offset the cut in salary for 1933 of the following women workers among the Indians:

and that these amounts be sent direct to the missionaries with notice of this action to the Bishops under whom they are working and to the National Council.

Mrs. Benham, Treasurer of the Sybil Carter Memorial and Honorary Membership Funds, reported a balance on hand of \$965.69. This report on motion was accepted, as was also the recommendation of the Executive Board for the disbursement of the Sybil Carter Memorial funds.

Mrs. Thomas R. Alexander, Jr., Chairman of the Administration of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund, reported \$1,126.74 interest in this account and presented the recommendation of the Executive Board that the following disbursement of this fund for the year 1932 be made:—One-half of the interest or \$563.37 be given to Miss Helen Skiles to be used in her work at Matsugasaki, Kyoto, Japan; that one-half of the interest of \$563.37 be divided equally between the Reverend Frederick C. P. Hurd for the purchase of chairs and equipment for his parish hall at Jeannette, Pa., and the Reverend A. W. Garden of Emmanuel Church, North Side, Pittsburgh, to be used for chairs. On motion the recommendation of the Executive Board was adopted.

Miss Fleming, Treasurer of the Diocesan Corporate Gift Fund, reported a balance on January 1, 1933, of \$1,802.57. On motion this report was accepted. Mrs. Leighou then asked the women of the Auxiliary to give authority to the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary to act on any emergency appeal brought to them during the year by the Bishop and the Treasurer and to dispose of the money in the Diocesan Corporate Gift up to \$600.00. Mrs. Hawley moved that this authority be given the Executive Board. The motion carried.

On motion duly seconded, the Treasurer was authorized to send the Reverend Mr. Bayle \$125.00 for his work among the isolated.

A rising vote of thanks was given the women of St. Stephen's and Dr. Porkess for their delightful hospitality.

This was followed by the President's message, after which the meeting was dismissed with prayer by Dr. Porkess.
