Bishop's Message

President's Message

To the Women of the Diocese:

At the close of my first year of office I should like to make a short report of my activities and impressions. Due to your co-operation and encouragement it has been a very happy and instructive year for me

I have visited at least twenty parishes; have seen the conditions under which you are working and the spirit that has animated your work; I have organized two new groups, both composed of young women; and had on my calendar for the year approximately ninety engagements all connected with the Auxiliary or allied interests.

I cannot speak too highly of the admiration I feel for many of our parish branches that are carrying on so well under adverse conditions. I am grateful for the loyalty of the women of the diocese, and I know that your work has continued only because of your love and devotion to the Church. Such efforts are never lost, and I am sure that you will reap a rich reward in seeing your work prosper.

There have been some disappointments in the year's work, it is true, but I feel that there is generally throughout the diocese a spirit that can overcome all our difficulties. Do not allow yourselves to be discouraged by small numbers or financial drawbacks. Keep in touch with your other parish activities, especially the young people's groups. If our work is presented to our young women in the interesting way it can and should be, our Auxiliaries should gain many new members, as these young women outgrow other organizations. Encourage your board by your attendance at the monthly meetings of the Auxiliary. A real effort is made to make them helpful to you. Above all, keep always before you an ideal of truly Christian womanhood, the greatest factor of all in making our work a glory to God.

I cannot close without expressing my gratitude to Bishop Mann and the entire staff of Trinity House for the generous assistance they have given me throughout the year; to the Executive Board for the patience they have shown with a new and untried executive, and to the parishes that have offered me such cordial hospitality. I have learned so much from my contacts with you that I am greatly in your debt. My prayers and hopes are with you all for another year of still more successful and happy endeavor.

RECORDING SECRETARY

The Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church held nine meetings during the year 1935, with an average attendance of one hundred fifteen members, representing forty-eight parish branches. This includes the Annual Meeting in January at St. Luke's Church, the Semi-Annual Meeting held at Oakmont, and the September meeting at Trinity House, at which time the Supply Department distributed Personal and Institutional Box Work.

The Program for the year was so arranged as to give each Department Chairman an opportunity to emphasize the function of her Department, and its relation to the whole work of the Auxiliary.

There were eleven meetings of the Executive Board, with an average attendance of fifteen. Changes in the personnel of the Board included the election of Mrs. Ralph T. Rowles as President, to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Robert B. Leighou, and of Mrs. T. J. Bigham who succeeded Mrs. Rowles as First Vice President, also Mrs. Edward Schempp to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Percy Demms, as 2nd Vice President and Educational Secretary.

The Annual Training Institute for Parish Officers was held in conjunction with the February monthly meeting, and was as usual, in charge of the Educational Department, as was the Training Class for Mission Study Leaders held in October.

The Spring Ingathering of the United Thank Offering was an evening meeting in Trinity Cathedral, with a Devotional Hour conducted by Dean Moor, and music led by girl choirs from several churches in the Diocese. The Fall Ingathering was held in the morning, at a service of the Holy Communion, and was followed by the regular monthly business meeting in Trinity House.

The President and several members of the Executive Board conducted three regional meetings in the Diocese during April. Two new branches were organized during the year—one at St. Mary's, Charleroi, and a Junior Branch at St. Stephen's, McKeesport.

Through the income of the Louis and Lulu Eaton Brown Fund, four delegates were sent to the Erie-Pittsburgh Summer Conference. The Auxiliary also sent Mrs. Rowles as a representative to the Regional Conference in Philadelphia, to discuss the problems facing the Church.

Members of the Executive Board contributed toward a Scholarship for a boy from the Episcopal Church Home to the Blue Ridge Industrial School, as a Memorial to the late Robert B. Leighou.

The Auxiliary supported the World Day of Prayer, Dean Moor's Class, the Church Home Donation Day, the Erie-Pittsburgh Conference, the All-Day Sewing and Donation Day at The St. Margaret Memorial Hospital, the Quiet Day of Prayer, sale of Mission Industry Products, sale of Articles made by the Blind, and the sale of Christmas Seals.

Guest speakers during the year included—Bishop Mann, Bishop Ward, Bishop Bartlett, the Reverend L. Herdman Harris, Miss Evelyn Buchanan, Miss Avery, Mr. Sutton, Miss Lucy Newton, Mrs. Robert Leighou, Miss Ethel Springer, Mr. Paul Douglas, Mrs. J. Frederik Virgin, and Mrs. Marcellin Adams.

CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

At the semi-annual meeting in June, 1935, the Auxiliary voted to spend the share of the 1934 income from the fund, which is used within the diocese, on repairs at three mission churches. The Rev. Mr. Bayle was in charge of the work, and it is due to his splendid management and economies that the work has been accomplished with such amazing results.

At St. Mary's, Charleroi, in addition to painting the interior of the Church, providing a new cement walk around the Rectory, and a retaining wall at the back of the Rectory, both the Church and Rectory were given two coats of paint on the outside. Six dozen chairs were purchased as well. Some money was contributed by the organizations in the parish for labor, because more was done there than had been anticipated.

St. John's Church at Dunbar was put in good repair. Some of the men who donated their services came from a distance of five to ten miles.

The Church of the Holy Cross, Pittsburgh, presented a serious situation, because there was so much to be done. It was difficult to know where to begin and where it would end. Equipment was furnished for use in the Church School. The Parish House, inside and out, was painted and a new porch added. A portion of the exterior of the Church was painted and necessary repairs were made at the Rectory also. The men organized themselves for work and each day a free lunch was served to the workers.

These congregations have shown a wonderful spirit of appreciation of what was done for them and have enjoyed giving their service. The money granted to them was about \$435 and the labor donated on these three churches amounted to approximately \$1550.

At the Annual Meeting, the Auxiliary voted to reserve the spending of the share of the 1935 income used within the diocese, until June 1936.

The share used outside the diocese was appropriated to the diocese of Hankow for increasing the water facilities on the Boone Compound in the City of Wuchang. The amount of the interest was \$373.06, and through the generosity of an unknown donor the amount was increased to \$500.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

In accordance with the wish of Bishop Bartlett, expressed at the Annual Meeting, that we stress education this year in the Woman's Auxiliary, the Annual Institute for Parish Officers, held February 7, 1935, was planned to illustrate how a parish branch might have a year-round educational program. The morning session was called "A Model Branch Meeting", with members of various parishes taking part as officers. At the afternoon session the Institute was addressed by Miss Evelyn G. Buchanan, Superintendent of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education, giving practical suggestions for helping the work of the parish Department of Religious Education.

The Rev. L. Herdman Harris spoke on the youth of the Church and our responsibility toward them, and Mrs. Homer A. Flint conducted a demonstration of the World Wide Church that might be used in program meetings. The program closed with the usual conference for Parish Officers.

A week-end for adults at the Kiskiminetas Summer Conference was a new feature this year, and one quite worthwhile. Mrs. John H. Moore presented the study book, "That Other America", and Bishop Ward, Sister Joanna Mary and Canon Symons furnished inspiration and strength to those in attendance.

For the benefit of those unable to attend the Summer Conference, a special training class was held Tuesday, October 22, in Trinity Cathedral chapel. Fairly well attended, those present heard Mrs. J. F. Virgin give a comprehensive review of the text book; Mrs. Ellsworth Strother spoke most interestingly on "Mexico", and the Chairman of the Department spoke on "How to Conduct a Study Class."

Help has been given to branches planning programs for the year, and material has been furnished to carry out programs.

The Speakers Bureau provided speakers for the following parishes: St. Peter's, Butler; St. Thomas', Canonsburg; Junior Branch, Epiphany, Bellevue; St. Mary's, Charleroi; St. Paul's, Mt. Lebanon; All Saints', North Side; Advent, Pittsburgh; Junior Branch, Trinity Cathedral; St. Bartholomew's, Scottdale and Junior Branch, St. Stephen's, McKeesport.

The Chairman was a member of the Diocesan Committee to arrange programs for regional meetings, and took part in the meetings at Sewickley, Johnstown and Monessen.

Incomplete returns from Annual Report Blanks show that the majority of Parish Branches have some form of educational work. The Monthly Bulletin is read, study classes were held, representatives were sent to Monthly Diocesan meetings and to the Summer Conference, and the Spirit of Missions is known and used in most branches.

It is difficult to measure results in this phase of work, but if increased calls on the Chairman for help and material is an indication of growth and an increase of interest, then there is a little for which we are happy.

MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE

The Mission Industries Committee of the Diocese of Pittsburgh reports a very good year. The various elements that enter into its work all show much improvement over last year, and there are some new features as well.

It seems wise to again emphasize that there are two distinct aspects of this activity. One is the financial side, and that again resolves itself into several practical forms. The money from sales serves such purposes as helping mission groups, families and individuals to dispose of their products, thus enabling them to help themselves as well as their communities. In addition, a small cash commission has been turned back to parishes holding sales.

Equally important, although more difficult to define, in practical terms, is the dissemination of the knowledge of our mission fields, the missionaries and the people they are trying to help. One realizes that the work of a missionary at the present time requires much more than was considered necessary in earlier days. An artistic sense that encourages the production of the best of a country, such as the use of the beautiful old patterns of China and the old weaving patterns of our own Southern Mountains is essential, and this must be allied to the practical, for articles must be salable as well as artistic. Business ability is an additional requirement, for the marketing of these products is no small matter. Altogether, those handling these things acquire a genuine respect for our missionaries, who by their encouragements of such projects, are helping people keep their self-respect through their own industry.

During 1935 we practically doubled our sales and have more than doubled the number of parishes holding exhibits and sales.

Representatives of the committee attended two summer conferences, putting on an exhibition and sale during the entire time.

Additions have been made to the material used for educational purposes and includes charts, some of which were made in the missions, as well as some excellent photographs.

Sales were held in thirty-one different parishes. Commissions turned back to parishes amounted to \$115.43.

The total amount sold during the year amounted to \$1,876.36.

ANNUAL MEETING

The fifty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church opened at four o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, January 8, with a Quiet Hour held in Trinity Cathedral, conducted by the Reverend J. Frederik Virgin, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Pittsburgh.

From five until six o'clock there was a social hour in Trinity House, when members of the Auxiliary and guests availed themselves of the opportunity to see exhibits from the various departments, and to purchase articles of Mission Industries. Dinner followed, at which time one hundred twenty-five persons were present, including Bishop Mann, and several clergy of the Diocese.

At eight o'clock approximately two hundred persons gathered in the Cathedral for a Missionary Service, with the Reverend Edmund L. Souder, missionary from Hankow, China, as the speaker.

Thursday morning at 10 o'clock members of the Auxiliary met in Calvary Church, for a service of Holy Communion, with Bishop Mann as the Celebrant, assisted by the Reverend C. Ronald Garmey, the Reverend W. F. Bayle, and the Reverend T. J. Bigham.

Bishop Mann followed the usual custom of reading from the Altar steps the names of those persons for whom Memorial Memberships had been subscribed during the year 1935.

At the close of the service Mr. Souder again addressed the Auxiliary, telling more specifically of his work in China, and emphasizing the great need for a more adequate water system in Boone Compound.

Following Mr. Souder's address, the Chairman of the Clara Chester Bailey Fund, Mrs. Leighou, offered a recommendation from the Executive Board of the Auxiliary, to the effect that the Auxiliary send that half of the interest of the Clara Chester Bailey Fund which is to be spent outside the Diocese, amounting to the sum of \$346.12, to Boone Compound, Diocese of Wuchang, China, to be used to increase their water facilities. The board further recommended that the decision as to the disposal of the other half of this Fund, which is to be used in the Diocese, be reserved until the June meeting. Both recommendations were unanimously accepted. The amount for Boone Compound was later increased by private subscription to \$500.00.

At this time the members adjourned to the Parish House Auditorium, and listened to reports from Mrs. A. L. Humphrey, the new President of the Board of The St. Margaret Hospital, and Mrs. C. S. Shoemaker, representing the Church Home.

The Treasurer, Miss Phillips, presented the Annual Budget of \$4000.00, which upon motion of Mrs. Dierks, duly seconded and carried, was accepted as presented. Miss Phillips urged that the branches, who during the past few years have of necessity lowered their percentages toward the budget, increase them as soon as possible.

Roll Call showed an attendance of 169 persons, representing 29 parishes.

There being no nominations from the floor, the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the ticket as presented.

At 12:30 the meeting recessed for lunch, reconvening at 1:30.

Next in the order of business were reports from the Recording Secretary, Memorial Membership Treasurer, Mission Industries Chairman, United Thank Offering Custodian, and Supply Secretary. A motion by Mrs. Dickson was duly seconded and carried, that these reports and all others, not read, be accepted as printed in the Year Book. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Fisher, was requested to write a letter of sympathy to Mrs. Benham, upon the occasion of the death of her sister.

Mrs. McCreedy, Chairman of Literature, announced that Mission Study books are now available from the Literature Department.

Mrs. Masters corrected a mistake which appeared in the January Bulletin, as to the amount of money which has been spent by the Supply Department for clothing, blankets, etc., the correct amount being \$1400.00.

The President spoke of the valuable work done by the retiring members of the board, and announced that while Mrs. Hawthorne is retiring as Corresponding Secretary, she will remain on the board as Publicity Chairman.

Mrs. Rowles then introduced the new officers of the Auxiliary.

The President announced that at the February meeting the speaker will be the Reverend Alvin Russell, Principal of St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, Virginia.

The President addressed the Auxiliary briefly, stating that during her first year as President she has visited twenty-five parish branches, and organized two new ones. Mrs. Rowles said that she is dissatisfied at the progress that has been made, but not discouraged, and that the thing which she considers of prime importance for the year 1936 is to interest more young women in Auxiliary work, and also try to enlist a greater interest on the part of the clergy.

A rising vote of thanks was given the members of the organizations of Calvary Parish for their gracious hospitality, and also to Trinity Cathedral.

The meeting closed at 2 P. M. with the benediction given by the Reverend T. J. Bigham.
