President's Message

To the Women of the Diocese:

It is with regret that I write my farewell word to you as President of the Diocesan Auxiliary. I retire with the feeling that much has been left undone that might have been done, and yet with the modest hope that some small progress has been made in my two years of office.

It seems to me that growth in Church work depends so largely upon our individual effort and example. You remember the theme of the last Triennial Convention—"If we be His Disciples." During these last three years have we made clearer to ourselves what "discipleship" means? Have we made any appreciable sacrifice to further the work of our Church? We give so much time, thought, and money to our worldly interests; can we hope for success or progress in our spiritual affairs unless we expend at least the same amount of energy? We are not lacking in leaders; we have all the necessary machinery; all we need is the animation of that machinery with a deep conviction of our duty to make Christ known to all the world.

So many things are wrong with our world today, and it is said that human nature cannot change. Christ came to do just that thing, but we who profess to follow Him must have courage and perseverance. Also, the world has grown closer; we can no longer look upon ourselves as part of just a parish; as Churchmen today we are members of an international and interracial fellowship.

We have tried during the year to bring these points before you, by introducing at our monthly meetings speakers competent to tell you what is being done in other countries and among other races to spread the Gospel of Christ. If YOU believe that this is a vital, God-given responsibility, our membership should grow in large numbers, because if you DO believe it, you will urge other women to help accomplish our purpose, and there is so much potential woman-power in our parishes that is not being put to use.

Many of our Parish Branches are live, active and eager for education; some have not yet learned to avail themselves of the material ready for their use in the hands of the Executive Board. It is my earnest hope that all become aware of it.

I close with a word of sincere gratitude to the many parishes that have been cordial hosts to me. Not only your hospitality, but your interest and activity have been an encouragement and incentive. I know that you will extend to my successor the same courtesy. May I wish you all new joy and new success at the beginning of another year's work.

RECORDING SECRETARY

The Pittsburgh Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church held nine meetings during the year 1936, with an average attendance of one hundred members from forty-eight Parish Branches. The business session of the Annual Meeting in January was held at Calvary Church, Pittsburgh, and the June Meeting was, as usual, held at the home of Mrs. M. S. Verner in Oakmont. All other meetings took place in Trinity House.

The Program for the year included first hand information of the work being done in Mission Fields, as told by the Reverend Edmund L. Souder, Hankow, China; Miss Louise Reilly, Wuchang, China; Miss Marguerite Bartberger, Anvik, Alaska, and Miss Ora Harrison, St. John's-in-the-Mountains, Virginia. Other speakers were—The Reverend Doctor Scott Wood, the Reverend Mr. Newman, the Reverend Mr. Virgin, Doctor Howard Marcy, and Mrs. Marcellin Adams.

There were ten meetings of the Executive Board with an average attendance of thirteen. New members of the Board were Mrs. Thomas Lynch, First Vice-President; Mrs. Joseph K. Webster, Third Vice-President and Supply Secretary, and Mrs. Edward A. Fisher, Corresponding Secretary. Upon the resignation of Mrs. Alice McKinley, Mrs. H. J. Hawthorne remained on the Board as Publicity Chairman.

Besides the regular monthly meetings a Training Institute for Parish Officers was held, and also at the request of the Executive Board Miss Evelyn Buchanan conducted a Class on "The Technique of Leading a Quiet Hour."

In April the Diocese of Pennsylvania sent a quantity of clothing and other supplies for distribution by the Pittsburgh Branch to sufferers in the flood stricken areas.

In the month of June, Bishop Alexander Mann celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his Ordination to the Priesthood, and representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary were privileged to be present at the service in the Cathedral, and later at the luncheon given in Bishop Mann's honor, by the Clergy of the Diocese.

Four persons from various parts of the Diocese went as delegates to the Erie-Pittsburgh Conference at Kiskiminetas, three delegates attended the Provincial Synod at Wilmington, Delaware, and two representatives went to the Special Conference for Leaders in Richmond, Virginia.

There were three Regional Meetings held in October—at New Brighton, Jeannette, and Donora. Approximately one hundred thirty persons were contacted, representing twelve parishes. As a result of the Regional Meeting held at Christ Church, New Brighton, three parish branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, New Brighton, Rochester, and Beaver Falls, and the Beaver Guild, believing that by consolidation they can do more effective work, have formed one branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, to be known as the Beaver Valley Branch.

The Diocesan Auxiliary has been active in supporting the World Day of Prayer, Dean Moor's Class, the Inter-Denominational Preaching Mission, the Church Home Donation Day, the All-Day Sewing and Donation Day at the St. Margaret Memorial Hospital, the Quiet Day of Prayer, Sale of Mission Industry Products, and the Sale of Christmas Seals.

The Pittsburgh Diocese has been outstanding in the widespread use of the Forward Movement Literature, and in this respect the Woman's Auxiliary has played an important part.

CLARA CHESTER BAILEY MEMORIAL FUND

Nineteen thirty-seven marks the tenth anniversary of the Clara Chester Bailey Memorial Fund. It has been the wish of the Committee throughout these years to distribute the interest from this Fund each year to as many places as possible where the need seemed greatest. Eleven missions have been assisted outside the Diocese and thirteen missions within the Diocese have profited during these years.

At the Annual Meeting in 1936, the 1935 interest amounting to \$373.06 was voted toward increasing the water facilities on the Boone Compound at Wuchang, China. A check for \$500.00 was sent to China through the generosity of one of the women whose gift brought the sum to this amount.

It was decided to delay spending the Diocesan half of the interest until such time as an appropriate project was found. In May 1936, we had an appeal from Bishop Mann asking that this interest be used toward repairing the damage done to the Rectory at Johnstown during the flood. The interest amounted to \$392.26. A special gift was added to this amount, making the check sent to Johnstown \$400.20.

The 1936 interest was \$702.20. The Auxiliary voted at the last Annual Meeting to give the one-half interest (\$351.10) to Mrs. Grafton Burke to be used toward the purchase of fuel for the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital at Fort Yukon, Alaska. Through a special gift, the amount given to Mrs. Burke was \$500. The Auxiliary will select at the Semi-Annual Meeting in June a Diocesan project upon which the other half of the 1936 interest will be expended.

Nine thousand one hundred and eighty-one dollars and seventy-one cents (\$9,181.71) has been distributed since the Fund was established.

We had a very interesting talk at the October meeting by Dr. Marcy about tuberculosis, the prevention of the disease and cure. The Tuberculosis League is stressing prevention, and we can assist by publicity. The sale of Christmas seals at the Chamber of Commerce was satisfactory.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

The first activity of the Educational Committee for 1936 was the Annual Institute for Parish Officers, held February 18 in Trinity House. The Rev. M. S. Ashton, Rector of Christ Church, New Brighton, Pa., spoke at the morning session on "Current Social Legislation", making very clear our responsibility as church women in keeping informed on social legislation, and our duty to "do something about it". An open forum and discussion of the various phases of Auxiliary work, led by the Diocesan Chairmen, in which the entire assembly took part, was a new feature, replacing the smaller group conferences of other years.

The second Annual Week-end Conference for adults was held at Kiskiminetas Springs School, Saltsburg, Pa. The program included a presentation of the study book material for 1937 by Mrs. Orrin Judd, and a course on "Religion in Family Life" by Mr. C. F. W. McCready.

During the absence of our President from the city, the Chairman of this Department had the privilege of representing her at the Provincial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held at Wilmington, Del.

Mrs. E. Strother, a member of the committee, addressed the Woman's Federation of the Presbyterian Church of Carnegie, Pa., on "The American Negro."

Mrs. Homer Flint and the Chairman took part in the panel discussion on Adult Education at the December meeting of the Diocesan Branch, Mrs. Flint presenting the opportunities for using the Forward Movement literature in Parish Branches, and the Chairman spoke of the aims of the committee.

During the year the Chairman visited the following Parish Branches: St. John's, Donora; Transfiguration, Clairton; St. Peter's Pittsburgh; Trinity, Rochester (Beaver Valley Group Meeting) and Trinity Branch Girls' Friendly Society, Pittsburgh; was a member of the Diocesan Committee on Regional Meetings, held this year at Jeannette, New Brighton, and Donora, taking part in the program at each place.

Program material has been supplied when asked for and articles written for the Monthly Bulletin, with the hope that the women of the Church may become more enthusiastic about the work our Church is accomplishing when they KNOW and become familiar with our missionaries and their work.

Incomplete returns from Parish Branches show the following facts: the Monthly Bulletin is read in 90 per cent of the branches; 51 subscribers to the Spirit of Missions; 13 parishes held program meetings; 11 had study classes; 10 sent delegates to Summer Conference; a majority of parishes sent officers to Institute and Monthly Meetings. Figures mean little in this work except to show plenty of room for improvement.

MISSION INDUSTRIES COMMITTEE

The Chairman of the Mission Industries Committee of Pittsburgh desires at the beginning of her report to thank the several members of her Committee and others who have given such efficient help in conducting the sales during the past year. This has made possible the results recorded in this annual statement.

Two items, both new in character are noted. The first was the participation in a community project called "The Garden Market" held in Schenley Park early in the summer. This lasted for two days and the booth with its sign "Mountain Products" was filled with articles from our Mountain Missions. Not only were the financial results very good, but great interest in the articles themselves was shown by all ages and types of people. Their questions made us feel that such events help in the understanding of the problems of people in one section of our country by those living under entirely different conditions.

The other item was the handkerchief campaign put on by our Mission at Mayaguez, Porto Rico. They reported that over 3,000 handkerchiefs, all with special initials had been ordered and made for this campaign. Mrs. Williams, who took charge of our share in this project sent orders amounting to \$81.10.

Our Committee had a representative at both Kiskiminitas and the Blue Mountain Conferences, with a large exhibit at both places. Again, in addition to the very good financial results, there was the more important educational value, for the questions asked and answered, the articles examined and enjoyed, during the days of the Conference, make up no small part of the work.

The several parishes that have held sales have received a commission which is usually put back into Missionary giving. This, again, is a valuable part of the work of this Committee. Sales have been held at two summer conferences, The Garden Market, G.F.S. Bazaar, Parish and Diocesan Meetings as well as at two teas in homes. Several talks about the Mission fields from which the articles came were given. This work includes the sending of packages, the transportations of exhibits, the shipping of material to be used by the Missions as well as the writing of many letters.

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH HOME

The Episcopal Church Home, on Penn Avenue and Fortieth St., is an institution belonging to the whole Diocese, and one in which the Diocese can take much pride. At present there are thirty-six children and fourteen old ladies under its roof, all being given sympathy, understanding and an affectionate care not often found in a place of its kind.

The children are growing up and a group of girls are now reaching the age when high school days are nearly over, and the problem of their future confronts the Board of Managers and the Trustees. One girl, who has been in the Home since she was two years old, graduates from high school next June and is anxious to fit herself for secretarial work. To do this at the State School at Indiana, Pa., will cost \$380.00 a year for four years, and the Board is troubled to know how to meet this expense.

Two of our girls are in hospital training classes, and another graduated from Slippery Rock Normal School last June, and hopes eventually to teach in one of Pittsburgh's public schools.

There should be a fund to meet the expense of training the boys and girls in some business or profession, so that they will be able to support themselves when they leave the Home. Anyone interested in contributing to such a worthy cause may send a check payable to the Episcopal Church Home, to the Treasurer of the Board Mrs. T. R. Alexander, care of the Children's Hospital, Pittsburgh.

Visitors to the Home are always welcome, and the old ladies especially enjoy seeing new faces and hearing the news of the world.

And may I remind those who are interested that partly worn clothing is most gratefully welcomed at the Home. It can always be made to fit one or another of the girls or boys, and helps greatly to reduce the running expense of the Home.

ST. MARGARET MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

The year just passed has been one of activity and progress on the part of the Women's Auxiliary Board and has been marked by a measure of accomplishment surpassing that of any previous year in its history.

The attendance at the Board's meetings has been good. Nine (9) meetings were held with an average of twelve members present.

At the graduation of nurses, which took place on May 20th, the usual prizes were given and the graduation party was celebrated as in prior years.

Wednesday, October 21st, was chosen for Donation Day, at which time 334 women were present representing 33 parishes in the Diocese and during the day's work 2801 articles were completed for the hospital. Food donations to a value of \$183.85 were received and the donations of money amounted to \$4170.05, being the highest ever reached by the Board in the hospital's history.

St. Margaret Night was observed by Trinity Cathedral on November 15, with The Rev. Mr. Frederik Virgin officiating at the service, which was well attended.

The Board as in previous years furnished the music for the Nurses' Christmas Dance.

It has been the privilege of the Women's Board during the year to make an unusually large number of gifts to the Hospital.

The splendid record of St. Margaret Memorial Hospital during the year just passed gives us courage to look forward to the coming year with the confident expectation that the institution will be enabled to carry on and extend its work with ever-increasing efficiency.

ST. BARNABAS FREE HOME

The Brothers of St. Barnabas would like to report that we have had a very successful year at St. Barnabas' Free Home, Gibsonia, Pa. The Home has been full to capacity the year through. There are 100 patient beds. We have had an overflow several times to the extent of 107 patients. The number varies according to the condition of the patients. There is at times a great deal of sickness when men are passing away, and there have been three or four empty beds at a time on account of this. The convalescent side of our work has changed considerably and we do not have as many applicants for this type of work as formerly.

However, we have had a very wonderful and blessed year's work with a great deal of good accomplished for men and boys in incurable conditions. We have at the moment nine to ten boys, two-thirds of whom will never walk again. These of course are permanent patients of the Home. There are few homes that admit helpless and incurable boys for life, or care for them after the age of 16. One wonders sometimes just what to do with them. They seem so young and yet some of them are going into manhood and there is little hope of their ever being active in any way.

We want to thank the Woman's Auxiliary for all their gifts through the past year, in money and kind, as individuals and as an Auxiliary in the various chapters. You have been extremely kind to this free work. In return we can say to you that everything you have given us freely has been given away here freely. Money is never mentioned to any of our patients and there hasn't been one in the Home that we know of who has had a cent of money or an income of any kind. So I am thankful to be able to say to you in the thirty-sixth year of the Home's existence we are living up to our first love, of keeping the Home an absolutely free work, the patients being entirely without money and no one able to care for them. In addition they must have an incurable disease or else be convalescing.

ANNUAL MEETING

Thursday morning at 10 o'clock there was a service of the Holy Communion in the Church of the Epiphany, with Bishop Mann as the Celebrant, assisted by the Reverend Mr. Warren, the Reverend Mr. Bigham, and the Reverend Mr. Bayle. At this service Bishop Mann followed the usual custom of reading the names of those persons for whom Memorial Memberships had been subscribed during the year 1936.

Bishop Mann said a few words of greeting to the Auxiliary, after which Mrs. Grafton Burke again addressed the meeting, telling of the work which she and Doctor Burke are doing at the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital and Mission at Fort Yukon.

At the close of Mrs. Burke's address, the President, Mrs. Rowles, called the meeting to order for the business session.

In the absence of Mrs. Leighou, Chairman of the Clara Chester Bailey Fund, Mrs. Rowles presented her report, and on motion of Mrs. Kirkpatrick, duly seconded and carried, it was decided to use that portion of the interest from the Clara Chester Bailey Fund which is to be spent outside the Diocese, amounting to \$351.10, for fuel to heat the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital, Fort Yukon, Alaska. This amount was later increased to \$500.00 by private subscription.

A report for the St. Margaret Memorial Hospital was given by Mrs. James Brown, and Miss Lydia Fleming presented the Episcopal Church Home report.

With the exception of the Annual Report of the Recording Secretary, which was read, all other Annual Reports were accepted as published in the Year Book.

The Treasurer, Miss Phillips, presented the Budget of \$4000.00, which on motion of Mrs. Hartley, duly seconded was accepted.

At 12:30 the meeting recessed for lunch, reconvening at 1:30.

In the absence of Mrs. Schempp, Educational Secretary, Mrs. Strother announced the Institute for Training Parish Officers, to be held Friday, January 29, from 10 A. M. to 3 P. M. and urged that the Parish Branches support this Institute.

At this time the President announced that through the generosity of one of the members of the Auxiliary, the Hudson Stuck Memorial Hospital is to have a proper operating room lamp, the cost of which is \$300.00.
