NOON-DAY PRAYER FOR MISSIONS.



Minutes.

The eighteenth annual meeting of the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Guild Room of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Quincy, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 16 and 17, 1905. There was a large attendance of auxiliary members at the opening service of the Convention in the Cathedral of St. John, at 10:30 a. m., Tuesday, where the ordination took place of Rev. Arthur W. Behrends, Head Master of St. Alban's School, Knoxville, conducted by Bishop Fawcett of Quincy, and Bishop Osborn of Springfield Diocese.

A tempting luncheon was served in the Guild Rooms of the Cathedral at the noon hour by Auxiliary members.

In order to hear the opening address of Bishop Fawcett to the Convention then in session, the business meeting of the Auxiliary did not open until 3:30 p. m.

After a short prayer service by the President, Mrs. Purce, Mrs. Edward Fawcett, wife of the Bishop of Quincy, made an address of welcome which was helpful and inspiring, touching many phases of Auxiliary work. To many this was the first opportunity of meeting the wife of the Bishop.

Miss Gertrude Leffingwell of St. Mary's, Knoxville, responded to Mrs. Fawcett's address in behalf of the Quincy Branch.

On motion the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting was omitted, as they had been published and sent to each parish branch.

The President, Mrs. Purce, then gave her annual address, which follows:

My Dear Friends:

As those engaged in large enterprises pause from time to time in their active work to review the past, note the present, and make plans for the future, so it seems well for us at this the close of our 18th anniversary to take a glance backward, before we look forward.

Eighteen years ago the Auxiliary was organized in this Diocese with one branch and three members. Today, we have twenty branches and a large membership. During these years we have been able to pay all of our expenses, and at the same time make our gifts of money

to General Missions. This is a gain by proving that we are able to take care of ourselves. There has been a steady growth of interest throughout the Diocese, especially so during the past year. In 1901, our boxes were valued at \$478.52; our cash contributions, \$146.49, united offering, \$44.45. Total, \$764.52.

Last year, our box work amounted to \$749.60; cash contributions, \$119.76; united offering, \$95.48. Total, \$964.84.

At present there are three Junior and one Baby Branch, but we might increase this number, and I would suggest that it be wise and best to have special officers for these different departments of Auxiliary work. During the past two years, several of the branches have adopted a year book system which has proved very successful to those who are using it, showing that a number of our members are sufficiently interested, not only to search out knowledge for themselves, but are willing to give it to others in an attractive form. In one of our deaneries, a Quiet Day last December, was held. It was largely attended, and was most helpful to all those who were fortunate to attend. May the close of this next year find that a Quiet Day has become a regular feature in the Auxiliary work, for it has been forcibly said "There is no danger in these executive days, that we will not plan enough, and toil enough, and haste enough, but there is danger that we will not wait enough on Him from whom cometh our help. When there falls upon us a spirit of prayer to match the spirit of enterprise, then will the dreams of patriarchs and prophets come to pass, and our country and the world lie fair and peaceful under the gospel light." During the past year it has been my privilege and pleasure to visit Macomb, Preemption and Woodhull at the request of the rectors for the purpose of organizing branches of the Auxiliary. At each place, I have been most cordially received, and a hearty co-operation has been given in the work. I find that wherever I go people are ready and willing to do the Auxiliary work when they understand what it is.

The reports of our Secretary will show what these new branches have been doing the past year, as well as the older branches.

The members of the Auxiliary have been reminded from time to time of the existence of the Church Periodical club, which is a branch of the church work. Since my election to the President's office, I have not had the time to devote to this work as I had before, but it is my intention to take it up again. May I urge upon the generous and sympathetic women of the Auxiliary, who are wont to respond to my appeal for the church's work, that they give more thought to this especially appealing branch. The work of the Church Periodical club is, it is true, a work requiring patience and continuity. Sometimes we feel that recipients of good reading matter are not as appreciative as might seem proper, but we are more than repaid for the inconvenience to ourselves in that we have made it possible for people to enjoy good literature, otherwise unattainable.

In closing, we would urge upon you more strongly than ever—more knowledge, more prayer as being the forerunners of a deeper interest and larger gifts, for

"The restless millions wait,
That Light, whose dawning maketh all things new.
Christ also waits, but we are slow and late.
Have we done all we could? Have I? Have you?"

A cloud of witnesses encompass us round about;
We love to think of all they do and know,
But what of that vast multitude in peril
Which sadly waits below?
Oh, let this thrilling vision daily move us,
To earnest prayers and deeds before unknown.
That souls redeemed from many lands may join us.
When Christ brings back his own."

The Secretary, Mrs. Zeller, then called the roll to which some sixteen delegates and officers responded, St. John's, Galesburg, having two delegates; Grace, Galesburg, one; St. Mary's, Knoxville, two; Grace, Osco, one; St. Paul's, Peoria, two; St. Stephen's, Peoria, one; St. John's, Quincy, two; Good Shepherd, Quincy, three; Trinity, Rock Island, one; St. George's, Macomb, one.

The officers present were: President, Mrs. W. M. Purce; Vice Presidents, Mrs. H. H. Chase of the Rock Island Deanery, Miss Henrietta Miller of the Quincy Deanery; Secretary, Mrs. Sophie Zeller. The secretary, Mrs. Zeller, then read her report of the year's work which was accepted.

After the close of the May meeting, 1904, the annual report was gotten ready for distribution about September first, the printed form remaining the same. Many changes could be made which would make it more useful and helpful as a directory for auxiliary workers. A pamphlet thicker and smaller in shape could be laid upon one's desk or kept upon a book shelf. The Constitution should be added, the parishes classified into deaneries, and a directory of auxiliary parish officers given. New books should be added for the Treasurer's and Secretary's report.

Having been appointed delegate to the Triennial at Boston in October, 1904, it was the Secretary's pleasure and rare privilege to carry the United Offering of the Quincy branch, \$350, and place it upon the altar of Trinity Church, Boston, to help swell the \$150,000 given by the women of the church. Miss Emery sent greetings to the Quincy branch and remembers her pleasant visit to the Diocese.

Our Bishop asking for help for workers in our own Diocese, the first appeals of the past year were sent out to the various branches for these workers. But early in the year so many are making ready for fairs or sales, or preparing boxes for needy city families, towards holiday time that serious work of the Auxiliary is usually not taken up until Lent and then Miss Emery's appeals have a response which is generous and encouraging. Maybe that more work can be done in the early part of the year as we learn to carry on greater enterprises.

All of Miss Emery's appeals have been taken except that of the Church, Home and Hospital, Orlando, Florida, which was thought to

be too far away, the Quincy Diocese favoring missions near at hand. More than one parish has fitted out the box sent to Rev. Delona, South Dakota, St. Mary's On the Mountain, Oneida Mission, Wisconsin, while Valle Crucis, North Carolina and St. Elizabeth's, South Dakota, have each had boxes. Parishes have interested themselves individually in other missions and eight other boxes have also been sent.

Unfortunately some of our strong parishes have been without services the past year and this has caused a loss of interest in the Auxiliary work in the branch.

Miss Emery wrote of Mr. and Mrs. Andrews spending the winter in Chicago and urged having Mrs. Andrews speak in the Diocese. Correspondence with the parish secretaries resulted in the three branches of Peoria having Mrs. Andrews come for two meetings to speak upon her work in Mito, Japan. Moline and Rock Island also united for a similar meeting the next day. Mrs. Andrews left a most favorable impression and was an interesting speaker. It is to be regretted that more branches do not make the effort to secure these workers in foreign field when an opportunity presents itself.

Both Mrs. J. Hopkins of Chicago and Lyman of LaGrange were secured for this meeting, to address the members, but were compelled to cancel the engagement, owing to illness.

In arranging Dr. Glenton's schedule for the large cities of the northwest, Miss Emery gave her the Quincy annual meeting, much to our advantage.

About 125 letters have been written and 20 blank reports sent out to be filled, letters coming instead if no work had been done in the branch, but promising a better condition another year.

The expenses of the officers increase each year in carrying out the work, whether in stationery, postage or organizing branches, and therefore the dues should be promptly paid that there may be a General fund.

The Treasurer's report was also read by the Secretary, the Treasurer, Mrs. Hoendorf, being absent. Then followed reports from the Vice Presidents, those of Quincy and Rock Island only being present.

Miss Miller, Vice President of Quincy, reported no new branches organized of the Woman's Auxiliary. Early in the year the work had been more among the parishes and city families and after the holidays boxes were prepared for missions out of the Diocese.

Rock Island's Vice President, Mrs. Chase, reported four new branches having been organized, three by the President, Mrs. Purce—at Woodhull, Preemption and Cambridge.

Kewanee had formed its own branch and with new officers promised good work for next year.

Pre-emption had added the study of missions as prescribed by the "Spirit of Missions."

Moline added to its regular missionary work the carrying out of the monthly programs of its Year Book which has added so much interest for the past two years. They united with Rock Island in a joint meeting at Moline in the Rectory and in the church to hear Mrs. Andrews of Mito, Japan, speak afternoon and evening, a reception and tea following the afternoon meeting. Mrs. Andrews with her family has spent the past five years in Japan.

Osco had gained seven members and had carried out programs at each meeting along the line of the Peoria Year Book interspersed with two missionary teas and music. At one, Mrs. Barnhart of Peoria had given a talk upon Mexico, with views and curios, at which light refreshments were served for 10 cents—two such gatherings bringing \$14 for Diocesan work.

Rock Island had gained ten members and with Moline had united in the meetings at which Mrs. Andrews spoke. In the city they had been asked with other churches to establish a missionary department in the Public Library and had pledged \$5 a year and a year's subscription to the "Spirit of Missions."

The Vice President of Galesburg Deanery, Miss Peterson, a graduate of the Church Deaconess' Home of St. Paul, had been absent part of the year but a new branch had been organized by the Diocesan President at Macomb in June 1904, and it has a remarkable showing for the first year, standing second in amount of united offering and value of boxes.

St. Mary's, Knoxville, had formed an organization of the Auxiliary and elected officers.

Mrs. Barnhart reported for the Peoria Deanery. The only new branch was the Junior Auxiliary formed in St. Stephen's parish. Peoria has the only branches in the Deanery, three in number, which do the most satisfactory work. They united in March to bring Mrs. E. B. Andrews of Mito, Japan, who with her family was spending the year in Chicago, to St. Paul's chapel, which is most central. She talked in the afternoon on, "The women and children of Japan, including their condition, as affected by the present crisis," followed by a reception and tea. In the evening she spoke on "Mito and the church station there." The offering given her was to go towards a church organ at Mito. The following day she gave the same talks in Moline.

The yearly calendar of St. Paul's has been carried out success

fully and all of the branches have given missionary teas, for which homes have been generously offered.

Although at the annual meeting in Galesburg, 1903, it was voted that all business be transacted the first day of the Convention, including the election of officers, a motion was made by the President and accepted, that business be laid aside until the following morning in order to hear Dr. Mary C. Glenton of Wu Chang, China, head of the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital, the first foreign missionary appointed with support from the United Offering. Dr. Glenton did faithful work, formerly in St. Peters' Hospital, Helena, The Good Physician Hospital, Columbia, S. Car., and at Anvik, Alaska.

She began with a description of the city of Wu Chang and then told of the various missions of different churches and how there is no medical work except in the hospitals. The Elizabeth Bunn building was built by the gifts of the Woman's Auxiliary in 1880 and made a memorial to the wife of Dr. Bunn who was then a missionary physician in Wu Chang. The work moved along smoothly until the Boxer Insurrection when Dr. Glenton and other workers fled to Shanghai to remain until the excitement had passed over.

The hospital is for women and children, and has grown out of its proportions until additions are necessary, a new morgue and diet kitchen being much needed.

After listening for an hour to this interesting speaker, and looking forward to again hearing her in the evening at the General Missionary meeting, the Treasurer's accounts were audited by Mrs. Diggs and Mrs. Wilson, and the meeting adjourned to 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, at the same place.

The voluntary offering, amounting to \$5 00, was given to Dr. Glenton.

The morning session was called to order by the President at 9:30, followed by the Litany for Missions.

At the election of officers balloting was dispensed with and the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot for the present officers, except the Treasurer, Mrs. Herndorf, who had returned her books and was unwilling to serve another year, much to the regret of every one. Mrs. Francis M. Wilson of Macomb, was elected in her place. The officers now are Mrs. W. M. Purce, President; Vice Presidents Miss Peterson of the Galesburg Deanery; Mrs. Chase, of the Rock Island, Mrs. Law of the Peoria, Miss Miller of the Quincy; Mrs. George Zel-

ler, Secretary; Mrs. Francis M. Wilson, Treasurer; Mrs. Purce, Librarian.

Madame Bauer, delegate from Knoxville, gave a history of the Missionary Guild of St. Mary's, which will now become the Auxiliary branch.

A report of the work of the Junior Auxiliaries was given, and reference made to the need of a head officer for these branches.

It was moved and seconded to give Dr. Glenton \$35.00 towards heating herdiet kitchen, the amount to be apportioned among the various branches, the Secretary to take charge of the fund. Three members of the Auxiliary voluntarily contributing towards it.

Bishop Osborne expressing a hope that the Auxiliary might assist him in his work at the State University, \$100.00 was voted to be given him within three years, this also to be apportioned among branches of the Diocese.

Miss Emery's annual letter was then read by the Secretary.

The contingent fund provided for last year, was declared discontinued and to read that money drawn to pay expenses of the President in her visits for the formation of new parish branches be taken from the general fund.

That quarterly meetings had not been found profitable because of the small attendance. Frank expressions from the Vice Presidents upon this matter resulted in the decision that two meetings a year were quite enough. It was then voted to have two meetings a year. This was afterwards reconsidered and left to a committee to decide upon after the adjournment of the meeting, who were in favor of one meeting a year.

A voluntary offering then being made, it was decided to give it to Bishop Osborne for his work at Champaign University.

A vote of thanks was offered the women of the Quincy branches for their hospitality and their successful efforts in making the meetings so successful.

The President thanked the members for their interest in the meetings, and then adjourned to meet with the Convention in Galesburg in November, 1905, the time of the Convention of the Quincy Diocese having been changed to November.

Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the Quincy Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The objects of this Association shall be those of the General Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III.

All women of the Diocese desiring it, who offer prayers or gifts for Missions, shall be considered members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV.

The Officers shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, (one from each Deanery), a Secretary, and a Treasurer.

ARTICLE V.

The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, to arrange for the organization of Parochial branches, and to have general charge of the work.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice-Presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the President, and to co-operate with her in the general supervision of the work of the Association in the Deaneries to which they belong.

ARTICLE VII.

The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary; and with the Vice-President of each Deanery concerning work of each Parish branch and shall give notice of meetings and keep minutes of them.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all Special and General Funds; to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

The Officers of the Diocesan Branch shall be a Committee to use such means as lie in their power to increase Missionary knowledge and interest in the women of the Diocese.

ARTICLE X.

There shall be one general meeting each year at the time of the Convention; when each Parish branch may be represented by two (2) delegates with power to vote. Special meetings may be called by the Officers.

ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution may be altered at any general meeting by a majority vote, or at a special meeting, if notice has been given of the desired change.
