
NOON-DAY PRAYER FOR MISSIONS.

MINUTES.

The first semi-annual meeting of the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Galesburg on Wednesday, November 15, 1905, the time for holding the annual synod of the diocese of Quincy having been changed from May to November.

In Grace church choir rooms at 3 p. m. the Auxiliary meeting was opened with missionary collects and hymns, led by Rev. Francis Wilson of Macomb. Mrs. Field, President of Grace church Auxiliary branch made the address of welcome. Mrs. Chase, Vice President of the Rock Island Deanery responding in behalf of the Quincy branch.

The Diocesan President, Mrs. Purce then gave her annual address:

My Dear Friends:—

Once again, we assemble at this, our nineteenth annual meeting. Though it has been but a short time since our last meeting, yet we believe a great deal has been accomplished, as the reports will show. It is not necessary for me at this time, to say anything regarding the needs of our Diocese, as undoubtedly every member of the Auxiliary is fully acquainted with the conditions existing. There are however, a number of subjects, which will come before you at this meeting for discussion. Of the annual offering of the Woman's Auxiliary, \$100,000 has been appropriated towards the appropriations of the General Board of Missions. The Quincy branch from September 1904 to September 1905, gave \$12.17 of which \$10 was from the Auxiliary; \$2.17 from the Junior Auxiliary. The general secretary, Miss Emery, has asked that during the coming year from September 1905 to September 1906, the Auxiliary of this Diocese give \$60 and the Juniors \$10. The Bishop has suggested and urged that the Auxiliary do not in the future meet at the same time as the Diocesan Synod. He would prefer that we hold our meeting in May. This would give two Diocesan gatherings per year, and would make the Bishop able to attend our meetings and assist us with his counsel and advice, and I am very sure that his presence with us would add

much to the interests of our meeting. At the last annual meeting this subject came up for discussion, and it was urged against the proposition that the matter of entertaining two meetings would be a serious drawback. It must be remembered however, that it would not be necessary for the Auxiliary to meet in the same place in which the Diocesan Synod meets. Further, the number of persons attending the Auxiliary meeting, under our present restrictions regarding the number of delegates, would not be so large, as to be a drain upon any of our parishes. Also, it would lessen the number of persons, to be entertained at the meeting of the Synod. It was further urged, that the wives of the clergy could not afford to attend the meetings of the auxiliary, if held at a different time from that of the Synod, but as special rates are not given for the meetings of the Synod, I can not see where the added cost would come. Some of the ladies objected, because they desired to attend the sessions of the Synod, but if we attend to our business and give it the attention that it should have, we have no time to attend the sessions of the Synod. You are all acquainted with the work which has been started at Jubilee. Since the inauguration of that work, the Woman's Auxiliary has done nobly, in furthering our beloved Bishop's project. Each and every branch assisting in this work must be given much credit for what they have done. A new cottage is to be erected to accommodate some twenty pupils, help will probably be made here, in assisting to furnish the necessary linen. At our last meeting we all remember with much interest, Dr. Mary Glentin and her splendid talk. She asked us to assist her, in furnishing the heating apparatus, for the diet kitchen, at her hospital at Wuchang, China, the cost to be about \$35. More than this amount has been raised for her. On July 12, it was my privilege and pleasure to visit Bradford at the request of some of our churchwomen there for the purpose of organizing a branch of the Auxiliary. A very pleasant and informal meeting resulted in the organization of a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary there, with ten members. This branch has been faithfully doing its work. The next day I was present at a meeting of St. John's branch, Kewanee, which I enjoyed very much. During the coming year, it is hoped that new branches may be organized at Canton, Lewistown, Rushville and Wyoming, the work there being in charge of the Rev. George Mackay, who has particularly interested himself in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, feeling that what a mission will do for missionary work, is a good index of what it will

do for itself. From Rev. Mackay, we look for much assistance in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. We now have 22 active branches, a good showing, but not yet what it should be, nor what it will be when the names of Warsaw, Griggsville, Bushnell, Carthage, Pittsfield, Geneseo, Princeton and others are added to our list. Last year our secretary reported boxes and money to the value of \$1049.49, having been sent during the year.

You remember that nineteen years ago, the women of the Diocese of Quincy, acknowledged our duty, not only at home, but towards the whole country and towards distant lands, and organized a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, to this board of missions. By our study, our prayers and our gifts, we are organized to assist the Board of Missions. Let us not allow ourselves to confine our work entirely in the Diocese. In some of our larger branches there are well organized lines of study about missions, but there should not be the smallest branch without a plan of learning all they can about mission fields. Let us learn all we can about missions and let us desire more earnestly the spread of the Kingdom. Thus shall we have a share in the advancement of Christ's cause and hasten the fulfillment of the promise, "Ye shall receive power; after that the Holy Ghost is Come Upon You; and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria and unto the utter most part of the earth."

The secretary, Mrs. Zeller, then called the roll to which some 17 delegates responded from 13 branches, and four officers. These were, Calvary, Farmington, one delegate; Holy Communion, Galva, two; St. John's, Galesburg, two; Grace Galesburg, two; St. Mary's, Knoxville, two; Macomb, St. Georges, one; Grace, Osco, one; St. Paul's, Peoria, one; St. Stephen's Peoria, one; Rock Island, Trinity, one; Woodhull, Emmanuel, one; St. James, Bradford, one; St. Stephen's, Peoria, Junior Auxiliary, one.

The officers present were: President, Mrs. W. M. Purce; Vice President, Mrs. N. N. Chase, Rock Island Deanery; Mrs. Frances Wilson, Treasurer; Secretary, Mrs. Sophie Zeller. A large attendance of members was present.

A motion was made to omit the reading of the last minutes since they had been published and distributed among the members.

The secretary, Mrs. Zeller, then rendered a report of the work done during the year as reported to her, which was accepted.

In making the yealy report ready for the printers, Rev. V. H. Webb, secretary of the Synod had assisted most generously in carry-

ing out the suggestions made at the Quincy meeting for a smaller and thicker pamphlet, to add a cover, to include the constitution, a map of the diocese, and parishes classified into deaneries with a clergy directory, and auxiliary branch directory.

At its annual meeting in Quincy, the Synod offered to print these reports free, making it 500 copies, as against some 50 copies of previous years. We now have a neat book which is valuable as an auxiliary directory.

One new branch had been successfully organized and its officers elected at Bradford by Mrs. Purce.

The \$35 voted Dr. Glenton at Quincy annual meeting had been apportioned among the various branches, collected, and forwarded to Wuchang, China for the Diet kitchens of the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital.

The Bishop desired that Dioc auxiliary work be confined to Jubilee College, and the mission at Meyer, Ill.

The time was so short that Miss Emery's appeals had not yet been taken—a matter more often done after the holidays than before. The fund of \$100 voted Bishop Osborne at the Quincy Annual meeting May 1, 1905, to be paid in 3 years, has not yet been apportioned. This is for the building of a Residence Hall for church girls at the State University.

The treasurer then gave her semi-annual report which was heartily approved and accepted. A solo followed from one of the young women of Galesburg to which she graciously responded with an encore.

A bevy of St. Mary's girls coming in at this point, representing the auxiliary branch, the roll call for Knoxville was again made, an additional delegate being present.

The Vice President of Rock Island read her report which was encouraging and full of enthusiasm. No other vice president being present, reports of the other deaneries could not be heard. St. Mary's however, had brought a report of its new branch and its rapid growth and interest.

Mrs. Purce spoke of the Bishop's desire to change the annual meeting hereafter to May, so as not to conflict with the meetings of the Synod and that he might give his undivided time to it. A vote being taken, resulted in the majority being in favor of November, at the same time the Synod met. Kewanee, Farmington, Osco, St. Paul's, Peoria; Grace, Galesburg, favored May. Macomb, St. Stephen's Peoria, Rock Island and Woodhull, favored November,

while Galva and Knoxville were indifferent as to which month was chosen, and two delegates from each branch having power to vote, the final vote gave the majority for November.

A slight opposition to paying the \$100 voted at Quincy for the Bishop Osborne fund, a discussion followed as to a release from the obligation. So many uses for such a fund within our own diocese was the plea of one of the members—such as a Residence Hall for girls at the Macomb State Normal school—a matter Bishop Fawcett hoped in the future to carry out. When the amount was pledged such a work in Macomb was not then thought of.

The voluntary offering given at the meeting was sent to Bishop Van Buren of Porto Rico, whose letter to the President was read by the secretary, followed by two from Miss Emery regarding the appeal sent from the church Missions House.

The Vice President of the Rock Island Deanery, Mrs. Chase, proposed a vote of thanks be given the Secretary, Mrs. Zeller, for her indefatigable efforts in getting out the annual report in a new form and cover.

A vote of thanks was also extended Rev. V. H. Webb for his interest and assistance, and the Convention for their willingness to do all that was possible to carry out the wishes of the Auxiliary.

A solo then being given by one of Galesburg's singers was followed by the election of officers for which a motion was made by Mrs. Hedding of St. Stephen's, Peoria, that the voting be done by ballot which resulted in the same officers being again re-elected.

A motion to appoint a diocesan secretary for the Junior Auxiliary, Mrs. Behrends of Knoxville was appointed to that office.

Reports from various branches and a reminder of the address to be given at the morning session by Deaconess Sloan of Champaign brought the meeting to a close.

The morning session was called to order by 9:30 a. m. followed by the Litany for Missions, thirty members being present.

The Bradford delegate arriving too late on Wednesday, gave a report of this newest branch organized since June by the President, Mrs. Purce.

A motion was made to reconsider the motion of Wednesday to hold the annual meeting in November, instead of May, Bishop Fawcett's preference.

Following a discussion of the same, a motion was made and

carried to change the time to May.

A motion was also made to extend a vote of thanks for the very kind hospitality of St. John's and Grace church ladies during the Convention.

A very interesting talk followed by Deaconess Sloan, of the manner in which a Residence Hall is conducted on a small scale for church girls at Champaign and what are the ambitions of Bishop Osborne to have this meet a crying need in the State University. Professor Riordan of Jubilee College followed her with an account of the work of the school and its relation to missionary work.

The time and place of meeting would be decided by Bishop Fawcett during the year and it was decided to continue helping the Bishop Osborne fund.

After dinner, pledges were given to assist the rector in raising additional salary or \$3000 for the Bishop.

A motion was then made to adjourn.

Minutes of Semi-Annual Meeting May 9, 1906.

The second semi-annual meeting of the Quincy branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Grace Church, Galesburg, on Wednesday, May 9, 1906, a week earlier than heretofore because of the only date that Rev. Frank Du Moulin could be secured for the evening address.

The President Mrs. Purce, having removed from the Diocese, Bishop Fawcett presided at the meeting, which was called to order at 2:30 p. m.

Missionary hymns and prayers followed. The roll was then called by the Secretary, Mrs. Zeller, ten delegates responding from eight branches which made a quorum. These were delegates from Farmington, Calvary, one; St. John's, Galesburg, two; Grace, Galesburg, two; St. Mary's, Knoxville, one; St. George's Macomb, one; Grace, Osco, one; St. Paul's, Peoria, one; St. Stephen's, Peoria, two.

The officers present were: Secretary, Mrs. Sophie Zeller; and Treasurer, Mrs. Francis Wilson.

Bishop Fawcett then addressed the members present, regretting the removal of Mrs. Purce from the Diocese and expressing his appreciation of her earnest and faithful work. He also regretted so small an attendance of members from outside branches necessitated by the sudden change of dates to hear Rev. Frank Du Moulin of St. Peter's, Chicago, speak at the evening missionary meeting.

The Bishop expressed a preference for two yearly meetings and, indeed, wished there might be four, one in each deanery every three months, but these had not proved successful. There was now such a field for Missionary work in the Diocese for women to do and those who do it must be imbued with the spirit of the work. Some of the needs are a church home for young women students at the Macomb Normal school which could be inexpensive. A similar home might be established in Galesburg in connection with Knox College. He then spoke of the work at Jubilee as done in the past

and at the present time with its increasing success. But two pupils have left for dissatisfaction during this first year, and the new school year will see introduced a series of departments for the training of mind and hand, where trades may be learned along with lessons.

The finishing of the Patterson Cottage, whose building is made possible by the liberal donation of \$1000 from Mrs. Patterson, of Topeka, Kansas, is worthy of study. This is for manual training. A beautiful table in Old Mission is also the result of the boys' work while it is hoped that a printing press to do Docesan and Auxiliary reports may be forth coming. Many of the children do not come from church families.

A definite plan should now be formed by the Auxiliary for the coming year's annual meeting, so that it may be large and interesting. There is indication of new life in the diocese when abandoned stations like Rushville and Canton can present confirmation classes. And yet, parishes in so good towns as Pittsfield and Griggsville may be dependent upon the missionary fund for many years.

Following the bishop's talk a vote was taken to omit the minutes of the last meeting and the Secretary's report was then given of the work which had been reported to her from each individual branch of the Auxiliary.

In response to the Bishop's request as to Diocesan mission work for Jubilee College at Meyer, Ill., seven parishes have worked for Jubilee sending quantities of table and bed linen and towels.

Miss Emery's appeals were from six Missions, the one for Brazil being returned as too far away. There was one for Altar Linen at Oakfield, Wisconsin, Rev. J. W. Raker, Priest.

An improvement of importance was the fewer branches which selected work otherwise than that sent to the Diocese through authorized channels. While it may seem more interesting to these parishes to work independently, nevertheless better and more satisfactory work is accomplished when their work is in harmony with that of the mission's house through the Diocesan organization.

The Bishop requested that no boxes be sent to missions with-

in the diocese without notifying him first.

The quality of work done in the past six months is better than ever before because of so much new material having been used in preparing the boxes and the amount given in money towards special funds.

The Diocesan Secretary especially desires that the various secretaries write her when desiring mission work and inform her of what they are able to do.

The Treasurer's report followed, which was concise and interesting and met with general approval.

The Bishop then paused for a decision as to continuing the meeting the following morning, or finishing then. The vote taken was in favor of finishing the business then, and the election of officers followed which was done by ballot. The names of Mrs. Geo. Peck and Mrs. Diggs of Galesburg were placed in nomination for President, Mrs. Diggs receiving the majority of votes. Mrs. Peck's name was then proposed for Vice President of the Galesburg Deanery, to act in place of Miss Josephine Peterson, whose work as Deaconess had called her to St. Louis, much to the loss of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. H. H. Chase was again made Vice President of the Rock Island Deanery, Miss Hannah Hedding of the Peoria Deanery, and Mrs. Anna Gatchel of the Quincy Deanery.

The Secretary was then instructed to cast a ballot unanimously for these officers.

The Secretary and Treasurer were again re-elected unanimously.

Mrs. Hoendorf of Galesburg made a motion that the third week of May be selected as the most desirable time for the annual meeting. Miss Hedding of Peoria wished the matter left to the officers who could notify branches.

Mrs. Hoendorf's motion being seconded the vote was unanimous in favor of the third week in May.

Invitations were given by both Peoria and Galesburg branches for the annual meeting in 1907 and after several ballots Galesburg was chosen.

With an urgent request to remember to be present at the able address of Doctor Du Moulin of Chicago in the evening, the meeting was brought to a close.

Counsels to Parochial Offices.

Impress upon the women of your parish that they are, by virtue of their baptism, members of the Auxiliary. Urge them to recognize this claim by working along the appointed lines.

Mrs. Emery suggests the following order of business:

- 1.—Prayer.
- 2.—Roll call.
- 3.—Reading of minutes.
- 4.—Treasurer's report.
- 5.—Report of Committees.
- 6.—Communications.
- 7.—Unfinished business.
- 8.—New Business.
- 9.—Prayer.
- 10.—Adjournment.

Begin every meeting with prayer.

Every branch is expected to give to General Missions and to the United Offering. After this develop any general or diocesan work that has the approval of your Rector.

The United Offering is the thank offering presented at every tri-ennial session of the Woman's Auxiliary until October 1907. The United Offering is to be made by all branches of the Auxiliary at the next tri-ennial meeting, to be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields, including the training, sending, and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba, and Mexico. This is to be gathered by mite boxes. Send for them and for the leaflets to the Treasurer of the Diocesan branch.

Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering in March and September. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great thank offering. Keep ready for reference, a church almanac with clergy list, the Cathedral chimes, the last report of your Diocesan branch, Miss Emery's last report and the

Spirit of Missions; and keep in supply copies of auxiliary prayers and leaflets from the Church Missions House and Mite Chests for the United Offering.

When a project is laid before your branch do not fail to report its action after due deliberation. When you begin a box advise the recipient and the Diocesan secretary. When you ship it, advise again giving date and mode of shipment, notifying the Secretary of its money value urge the acknowledgment of the same by the recipient.

If you cannot secure free shipment, always prepay charges and state this in your notification.

Remit money by express, postoffice order or bank drafts.

Please send the names and addresses of all parish officers to the Diocesan Secretary and notify her at once of any change of officers.

See that all notices of meetings sent out by the Diocesan Secretary are read by your Rector at the church services.

Lists for Missionary boxes should be filled by new articles of good quality, durable and tasteful. If all cannot be sent, report to the secretary.

If possible add some little gift not asked for in the list, also a box of candy that there may be a little surprise for the missionary's family in unpacking the box.

The Bishop and Auxiliary officers recommend to your care Jubilee College, in addition to the above work.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The objects of this Association shall be those of the General Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III.

All women of the Diocese desiring it, who offer prayer or gifts for Missions, shall be considered members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV.

The Officers shall consist of a President, four Vice-Presidents, (one from each Deanery,) a Secretary and a Treasurer.

ARTICLE V.

The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, to arrange for the organization of Parochial branches, and to have general charge of the work.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice Presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the President, and to co-operate with her in the general supervision of the work of the Association in the Deaneries to which they belong.

ARTICLE VII.

The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary; and with the Vice-President of each Deanery concerning work of each Parish branch and shall give notice of meetings and keep minutes of them.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive all Special and General Funds; to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

The officers of the Diocesan Branch shall be a Committee to use such means as lie in their power to increase Missionary knowledge and interest in the women of the Diocese.

ARTICLE X.

There shall be one general meeting each year during the third week in May when each Parish branch may be represented by two (2) delegates with power to vote. Special meetings may be called by the Officers.

ARTICLE XI.

This Constitution may be altered at any general meeting by a majority vote, or at a special meeting, if notice has been given of the desired change.
