NOON-DAY PRAYER FOR MISSIONS.



The Woman's Auxiliary was created by the Board of Missions during the session of the General Convention, October, 1871, in the City of Baltimore, and approved by the Board of Missions at the General Convention of 1880, to assist it in meeting its regular appropriations and to aid all missionary work of the church in any direction and in any way that may be recommended by the Board, or endorsed by the several Bishops.

The Junior Department was authorized by the General Board in 1889. The Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in 1887.

Counsels to Parochial Offices.

Impress upon the women of your parish that they are, by virtue of their baptism, members of the Auxiliary. Urge them to recognize this claim by working along the appointed lines.

Mrs. Emery suggests the following order of business:

- 1.—Prayer.
- 2.—Roll call.
- 3.—Reading of minutes.
- 4.—Treasurer's report.
- 5.—Report of Committees.
- 6.—Communications.
- 7.—Unfinished business.
- 8.—New business.
- 9.—Prayer.
- 10.—Adjournment.

Begin every meeting with prayer.

Every branch is expected to give to General Missions and to the United Offering. After this develop any general or diocesan work that has the approval of your Rector.

The United Offering is the thank offering presented at every triennial session of the Woman's Auxiliary until October, 1907. The United Offering is to be made by all branches of the Auxiliary at the next triennial meeting, to be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields, including the training, sending, and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico. This is to be gathered by mite boxes. Send for them and for the leaflets to the Treasurer of the Diocesan branch.

Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering in March and September. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great thank offering. Keep ready for reference, a church almanac

with clergy list, the Cathedral chimes, the last report of your Diocesan branch, Miss Emery's last report and the Spirit of Missions; and keep in supply copies of auxiliary prayers and leaflets from the Church Missions House and Mite Chests for the United Offering.

When a project is laid before your branch do not fail to report its action after due deliberation. When you begin a box advise the recipient and the Diocesan secretary. When you ship it, advise again giving date and mode of shipment, notifying the Secretary of its money value, urge the acknowledgement of the same by the recipient.

If you cannot secure free shipment, always prepay charges and state this in your notification.

Remit money by express, postoffice order or bank drafts.

Please send the names and addresses of all parish officers to the Diocesan Secretary and notify her at once of any change of officers.

See that all notices of meetings sent out by the Diocesan Secretary are read by your Rector at the church services.

Lists for Missionary boxes should be filled by new articles of good quality, durable and tasteful. If all cannot be sent, report to the secretary.

If possible add some little gift not asked for in the list, also a box of candy that there may a little surprise for the missionary's family in unpacking the box.

The Bishop and Auxiliary officers recommend to your care Jubilee College, in addition to the above work.

MINUTES.

The 20th annual meeting of the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Galesburg, Friday, May 10, 1907, in the Guild Room of Grace church.

Luncheon was served in the rooms at 12:30 to the visiting delegates and Miss Julia C. Emery, General Secretary, who was the honored guest.

The meeting was called to order at 2:30 p. m., and the printed program used for the first time this year because of Miss Emery's presence and the twentieth anniversary of the founding of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.

After the address of welcome by the Galesburg Vice-President, Mrs. Peck, responded to by Mrs. Barnhart of Peoria, the President gave her annual address, which follows:

My Dear Friends:—Our annual meeting this year is fraught with more than usual interest in the fact that we have with us our honored and beloved General Secretary, Miss Emery. It is with sincere pleasure we welcome her in our midst today and we trust that in the hearing of the reports which are to follow, of our work as a Diocesan Branch during the current year, she will feel some degree of compensation for her long journey taken in our behalf. Her presence adds in a great measure to one feature which presents itself in our annual meeting this year, i. e., the fact that we have now completed a full score of years in our existence as a Diocesan Branch. Twenty years ago our branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized by a few earnest church women under the direction of Bishop Burgess. While it was small in the beginning and even now cannot claim the strength and vigor of many of the other branches, still we have much to be thankful for, as the knowledge of the work has spread over the diocese and the spiritual life which it invariably weakens, has deepened through the years. Beginning with one

branch we now report twenty-five branches in the Quincy diocese, including the Juniors. So you see though it is still the day of small things with us, yet we are making progress, and progress, too, which may well encourage us when we consider that our diocese is one of the weakest numerically and financially of any in the Union.

There is still another feature which adds interest to our gathering today, and that is one which lifts us up from our circumscribed view as a diocesan branch into a clearer vision which stirs our pulses as American citizens and members too of the Anglican Communion. Three hundred years ago, in 1607, the Pilgrim Fathers landed at Jamestown, Virginia. These early settlers brought with them their chaplain, and thus was the church brought to our fair native land, with services established in a language "understood by the people." This great event will be celebrated with fitting ceremony at the time of the General Convention at Richmond this year. Very few of us will find it possible to go East, but in our little gathering here today we may call to mind a few primal facts "lest we forget." We all will presently join in the singing of that grand old hymn, "America," and our hearts will surely send fervent thanks to "Our Father's God" for the blessings He has vouchsafed us in our native land and in the blessed Mother Church which has been so much comfort to each one of us. The Guild room in which we are assembled is decorated with the national colors in honor of this event. You will hear from the lips of a devoted churchwoman of the younger generation, an account of the establishing of the church on our shores, and Miss Emery has also kindly consented to talk to us on this subject this evening. Thus we shall feel that even here in the Middle West we may do something to commemorate so great an occasion as the planting of the church on American soil.

During my year's service it has been a source of encouragement and pleasure to me to visit several of the parochial branches. I have been present at meetings in the following places: Christ church, Rushville; St. George's, Macomb; Grace, Galesburg; St. Peter's Canton; Calvary, Farmington; Grace, Osco; St. Andrew's, Peoria; also St. Andrew's Junior Auxiliary, and the Church of the Holy Communion, Galva. At Osco I had the pleasure of being present at the annual meeting, and in Canton and Rushville new branches were established. Although in some of the places visited there seemed to be a lack of information regarding the character and scope of Auxiliary work, yet I found a certain receptivity everywhere. Almost without exception they were anxious for more knowledge, and I feel constrained to say this

much: even in the very smallest and weakest branch I found something to learn myself—something to carry on to another branch for their improvement along Auxiliary lines. There is a devotion to missionary work and a type of churchmanship growing up in most of our branches which I am certain must please our good bishop when he comes in contact with it. While we report 25 branches, there are still a number of places in the diocese where there is no Auxiliary work of any kind being done. I have written to each clergyman or lay-reader in charge, and have received replies from all with but one exception. These letters were very encouraging, and you may hope in them the next year or two to add several branches to your list.

In the month of January, the Galesburg Deanery branches met in this church. There were about thirty members present though the day was perhaps the most inclement of the winter, some of our speakers being storm-bound and unable to be at the meeting. Sister Josephine gave a very interesting address; Mrs. George F. Peck, vice-president of the Galesburg Deanery, presented an able paper on China Missions, and there was a discussion on the subject of restricted representation at our Tri-ennial meetings. The present annual meeting was deliberated upon, and some good ideas were brought out in connection with it. This was a most helpful gathering and I believe if carried out in the other deaneries would result in quickening us into new life as a diocesan branch.

Our department in the Cathedral Chimes seems to be gaining in usefulness and this past month we encroached considerably upon the editor's space. I hope every member of the Auxiliary read the stirring appeal from our treasurer in regard to the United Offering.

The work of the Juniors is one of much promise. When the young people of the parish are gathered together and enthused with the missionary spirit which is all about us if we will but seize hold of it, you will find them to be of immense assistance. Work along this line needs developing in our Quincy Branch. We should have some one to take entire charge of the Juniors and push this department to its fullest capacity, as they say in business parlance. I wish you all could peep in as I did one day on St. Andrew's Juniors at Peoria. They are a bevy of bright girls from fifteen to nineteen and their enthusiasm and willingness to work was an inspiration to me. They are now engaged in preparing a Christmas box and have also formed a Mission Study Class under a capable leader. I would like to see one of these classes in every parochial branch with a leader who would conscientiously dis-

charge her duties. If this could be done we would no longer hear the cry against Foreign Missions. Our members would realize that whether the work was in the foreign or in the domestic field that it was all one—all our dear Lord's work which He has left us to do, and that He loves the yellow and the brown faces as well as He does our fairer ones. We would find that the field was white indeed to the harvest, and with swift feet, like the holy women of old, we would press on to fulfill our Lord's command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The singing of hymn 249 was followed by the Secretary's roll call to which fourteen branches of the Auxiliary responded, and two of the Junior Auxiliaries—twenty-four delegates being present of the Auxiliary and three from the Juniors, or twenty-seven in all.

All officers were present and have been counted in as some one of the delegates from the branches of Grace, Galesburg; Rock Island; St. Paul's, Peoria; and Macomb. Miss Hedding representing both St. Stephen's branch of Woman's Auxiliary and Juniors.

The Cathedral sent two delegates; Canton St. Peter's two; Farmington, Calvary, one; Galva, Holy Communion, two; Galesburg, St. John's, two; Galesburg, Grace, two; Kewanee, St. John's one; Knoxville, St. Mary's two; Macomb, St. George's, two; Oscos, Grace, two; Peoria, St. Andrew's, two; St. Paul's, two; St. Stephens, two; Rock Island, one. Of the Juniors, St. Andrew's, Peoria, sent two; St. Stephen's, one.

The minutes of the last meeting were voted to be omitted as the printed reports, although very late this year, had been distributed among the various branches.

The Secretary's report was then read of the work which had been done for the Indians, poor whites, and mountain whites in answer to appeals sent out from the Church Missions house, work having been done for the students of St. John's Academy, Corbin, Ky.; Rev. Joyner of Tryon, N. C., and St. Mary's On the Mountain; two catechists suits have been sent to the missions at Pine Ridge, S. D., under Rev. Cleveland, while St. Mary's school, S. D., and Rev. Frank Randall of Dell Rapids, S. D., have sent them complete winter outfits for young pupils.

The Diocesan institutions of Jubilee College, Quincy; Orphanage of the Holy Child, Springfield and St. Mary's Home for Girls, Chicago, have all had boxes, although this is not counted auxiliary work by Miss

Emery, and has not been included in her General Report for two years, each year notifying the Diocesan Secretary of their elimination. It is included in our own printed Diocesan report

Miss Emery writes that the General Report of the Auxiliary does not include any gifts to any institutions or organizations within the cities of a diocese, unless such may be connected with the Board of Missions. Each diocese would support these institutions without the assistance of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. Its work is devoted wholly to missionary enterprises as the word is generally understood. Of course, it is expected that all churchwomen in the Diocese will be interested in helping such institutions but they are expected to do this as churchwomen and not as members of the Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

We have done more fine needle work, such as altar pieces, for the San Francisco churches, and vestments for missionaries in our own Diocese.

There are 22 working branches, 18 of the Woman's Auxiliary, 3 of the Juniors, and a Ministering League. The Juniors have added one branch, that of Christ Church, Moline. Two new branches have come into the Woman's Auxiliary, Canton and Rushville, while three of the Woman's Auxiliary and one Babies Branch have gone out of existence—Eaby Branch of Grace, Galesburg; Cambridge, Preemption and Woodhull.

Thirty-two boxes and packages have been sent away, twenty-one by the Auxiliary and three by the Juniors. Twenty-three boxes were sent to Domestic Missions by the Woman's Auxiliary, valued at \$75.70, while the Juniors sent three boxes, valued at \$22.50. Six boxes were sent to Diocesan Missions, valued at \$112.50, as well as eleven boxes and packages to Jubilee College, valued at \$120.50; sent to Diocesan Missions in money, \$83.20, besides help for Jubilee College, \$30.00.

Another \$33 1-3 has been applied to the \$100 promised Bishop Osborne two years ago, and next year will complete our obligation.

Nineteen hundred and seven has seen a perceptible gain in Domestic and Diocesan Missions with nothing for Foreign Missions. There is a small gain in the U. O. and annual dues and a much larger value of boxes. If we can provide something for Foreign Missions next year and win back the branches which are not active at present, we shall regain our lost forces and move on stronger than ever.

The Treasurer then gave her annual report which was heartily

approved. Each vice-president was called upon for the work done in her Deanery, and the election of officers then followed.

Nominations being in order, Mrs. Barnhart of Peoria, presented a slate which she felt necessary because of two officers at present residing in the same city. For President, Mrs. Zeller, of Peoria; Honorary President, Mrs. M. E. Fawcett; Secretary, Miss Sherwood, of Moline; Treasurer, Mrs. Wilson; vice-president of Peoria Deanery, Miss Hedding; vice-president of Galesburg Deanery, Mrs. George Peck; vice-president of Quincy, Mrs. Rose Getchell; vice-president of Rock Island, Mrs. Chase. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Moore. The President asked for other nominations. Mrs. Chase proposed the names of the board now in office. No second.

Miss Emery then advised that a committee consult together, and Mrs. Henseler, Mrs. Barnhart and Dean Moore retired to an adjoining room. Realizing also that Miss Emery's address was of more importance than an election of officers, it was proposed that the latter be postponed until after her address for which she had come from New York.

She told us of the missionary work in South Dakota which she had recently visited; of Bishop Hare's wonderful courage in bearing up under a terrible disease from which he has suffered for eight years; of seeing another bishop's wife in a New York hospital just before leaving who had come from the Yangtse Kiang with her two young children for an operation—Mrs. Roots—but both hopeful and courageous.

New York seems very large until one has been away three days, and then Galesburg or Jacksonville or Cincinnati seem also to be a center and all is not concentrated in New York. The unity of our belief, our hope, our work, comes to us anywhere we may be and although we may be small in number, we are yet of importance, for the work is always important. She spoke of the remarkable growth of the U. O. from \$2,000 to \$150,000. This money is for such workers as Sister Josephine, who is our only U. O. missionary deaconess. Others are needed everywhere. Bishop McKim wants a musician missionary to train a choir, or one to make altar linen, to teach how to keep an altar guild, show people how to be reverent, to train kindergarten, etc., etc. Each Diocesan Branch ought to have a missionary worker, a musician missionary or a medical missionary. She was listened to with the greatest interest and the wish expressed that we might have her oftener.

Miss Ida Callender then read a paper on the church in America

three hundred years ago which brought us finally to the appointment of the delegates to the Convention at Richmond. Miss Emery stated that instead of the one official delegate as heretofore, eight could be represented, either by the officers or substitutes.

The election of officers again being taken up Mrs. Barnhart reported that the slate presented would be withdrawn. Mrs. Diggs, the President, then retired from the chair, and appointed Rev. McKay to take her place, and nominations were called for. Mrs. Barnhart then nominated Mrs. Zeller for President, seconded by Mrs. Moore. Miss Hedding nominated Mrs. Diggs, which was seconded. No further nominations being made a motion to close them was made. Twenty-seven votes were cast and upon counting them, Mrs. Diggs had received ~~one~~ majority.
