The Junior Department was authorized by the General Board in 1889. The Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in 1887 at Rock Island by Miss Emery and Bishop Burgess.

Impress upon the women of your parish that they are, by virtue of their baptism, members of the Auxiliary. Urge them to recognize this claim by working along the appointed lines.

Miss Emery suggests the following order of business:

- 2.—Roll Call.
- 3.—Reading of Minutes.
- 4.—Treasurer's Report.
- 5.—Report of Committees.
- 6.—Communications.
- 7.—Unfinished Business.
- 8.—New Business.
- 9.—Prayer.
- 10.—Adjournment.

Every branch is expected to give to the Apportionment, to the United Offering and General Missions. After this develop any general or diocesan work that has the approval of your Rector.

The United Offering is the thank offering presented at every triennial session of the Woman's Auxiliary. The United Offering is to be made by all members of the Auxiliary at the next tri-ennial meeting, to be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields, including the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico.

Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering in March and September, or it may be given in the form of a birthday offering. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great thank offering. Keep ready for reference, a church almanac with clergy list, the last report of your Diocesan branch, Miss Emery's last report and the Spirit of Missions; and keep in supply copies of auxiliary prayers and leaflets from the Church Missions House and Mite Chests for the United Offering.

When a project is laid before your branch do not fail to report its action after due deliberation. When you begin a box advise the recipient and the Diocesan secretary. When you ship it, advise again giving date and mode of shipment, notifying the Secretary of its money value, urge the acknowledgement of the same by the recipient.

If you cannot secure free shipment, always prepay charges and state this in your notification.

Remit money by express, postoffice order or bank drafts.

cesan Secretaries and notify them of any change of officers.

See that all notices of meetings sent out by the Diocesan Secretaries are read by your Rector at the church services.

Lists for Missionary Boxes should be filled by new articles of good quality, durable and tasteful. If all cannot be sent, report to the secretary.

If possible add some little gift not asked for in the list, also a box of candy that there may be a little surprise for the missionary's family in unpacking the box.

The Bishop and Auxiliary officers recommend to your care Jubilee College, in addition to the above work.

MINUTES.

The 25th annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Quincy was held in the city at the Cathedral of St. John, May 14, 1912.

At 9:30 a. m., Holy Communion was celebrated by Father Cone, of the Church of the Good Shepherd. After the celebration the delegates were given an automobile ride over the city, out to the Soldiers' Home, through the various beautiful parks and the Country Club. They were then taken to the Quincy Hotel where luncheon was served at 12:30, followed by a social hour.

At 2:00 o'clock the afternoon meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Woodward.

A short devotional meeting was followed by an address of welcome from Mrs. Fawcett.

Mrs. Woodward's annual address was fine, touching upon the gospel of Christ and the spreading of his kingdom. The Bishop then gave his annual message in his happy manner.

Mrs. Eastes then called the roll, showing twenty-seven delegates present, twenty-five Seniors and two Juniors.

In the absence of Mrs. Zeller, the Secretary's report was read by Miss Alice J. Hedding. Mrs. Eastes, the treasurer, then gave her report.

Miss Sherwood, the custodian of the United Offering, gave her report showing a fund of \$345.63 on hand.

Sister Josephine, Secretary of the Juniors, gave her report showing an increase of interest and work done by the Juniors.

A short report of the Church Periodical Club was given from St. Paul's, Peoria, and St. Peter's, Canton. Reports of the different parishes were given by the different Vice-Presidents, telling of the various ways of conducting the Auxiliary meetings.

Bills were allowed for postage to the amount of \$12.50.

Sister Josephine was elected Educational Secretary.

Dues were raised from \$1.00 a year to \$2.00 for each Woman's Auxiliary. The offering taken amounted to \$5.82.

The consent of the Bishop was given to form a Junior Auxiliary and to adopt a constitution.

A committee on Revision of the Constitution was appointed by the President.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

We were able to get our Diocesan printed report in fairly good time this year and have had the use of it so that it has been very satisfactory. A little study each year of the report will show our growth as to branches, members, boxes, or money.

In writing Miss Emery for work, she directed our interests to new fields, except one, asking for hospital supplies for the new St. John's Hospital at Ketchikan, Alaska, for Fort Washaki, Wyoming, in Bishop Thomas' Diocese, who at the Triennial at Cincinnati told us about it, and for the newly built St. Mary's School at Rosebud, S. D. We were asked to give two complete outfits of wearing apparel for Indian girls at this school and to assist the mission at Morgantown, N. C.

St. Paul's, Peoria, selected the box for St. John's Hospital, complete medical supplies being asked for. This was fitted out in the east and shipped with freight charges prepaid to the Pacific coast. These articles consisted of sputum cups, rubber sheets, bed pans, gauze, muslin for operating, gowns, dressings and scissors, cut gut, drug scales, etc., everything that would be needed in a first-class hospital. Associated with Miss Huntoon and in charge of the Mission was Miss Louise Smart, to whom a package of woolen articles was sent last year by the Osco Branch. Miss Smart wrote an appreciative letter at the time. She has never been strong and word has just been received of her death from pneumonia, lying ill and dying in the hospital room of St. John's, Ketchikan which had been furnished by St. Mary's School Branch, Knoxville. We may hope that the medical supplies sent recently will prove as valuable as the gifts from Knoxville.

Getting the new outfits for the Indian girls, Anna Good Voice and Corinne Smith, interested a number of small branches who contributed the less expensive articles while stronger branches sent money to the Secretary to be spent to the best advantage in a large city, and to forward the articles. Postals of the pupils and school sent by the principal, Mr. Travis, greatly increased the interest.

Fort Washaki, Wyoming, is a new field, but is appreciative of any help for the Shoshone and Arapahoe Indians. Miss Foss to whom boxes were sent this year, becomes assistant superintendent of the new Bishop Randall Hospital

Other Missions have been remembered, because they continue to hold the interest of the same branches from year to year.

All of the branches newly identified with us at our last annual meeting have done very good work, asking for literature and assistance in forming the branch and manifesting much interest, St. Elizabeth's, Peoria, which graduated from the Juniors to the Woman's Auxiliary is the new branch. Macomb has been revived and we welcome her again in our midst.

The new method of disposing of the apportionment seems to have worked successfully, seven branches contributing.

The giving of one-half the price of the Churchman, \$1.50, from a branch, the other half given by the Churchman Co., for some missionary priest is so helpful that others may wish to do the same.

The box work represents \$1121.68, the money not including United Offering or annual dues, is \$388.32, or \$1510.00, a gain of \$300 or so.

The item of second hand clothing has dropped out of some of the branches, much of the box work being new and upon higher lines.

In 1909 the Branch of Western New York at its annual meeting voted to place no further value upon second hand clothing, either in Woman's or Junior Auxiliary. With older parishes such things are possible, but not yet in the newer ones.

Postage for mailing annual reports, letters, postals and express for printed reports has been about \$5.00.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The objects of this Association shall be those of the General Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III.

All women of the Diocese desiring it, who offer prayer or gifts for Missions, shall be considered members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers shall consist of an Honorary President, President, four Vice-Presidents, (one from each Deanery), a Secretary and a Treasurer.

ARTICLE V.

The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, to arrange for the organization of Parochial branches, and to have general charge of the work.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice-Presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the President, and to co-operate with her in the

general supervision of the work of the Association in the Deaneries to which they belong.

ARTICLE VII.

The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary, and with the Vice-President of each Deanery concerning work of each Parish branch, and shall give notice of meetings and keep minutes of them.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duties of the Treasurer shall be to receive all Special and General Funds; to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

The officers of the Diocesan Branch shall be a committee to use such means as lie in their power to increase Missionary knowledge and interest in the women of the diocese.

ARTICLE X.

There shall be one general meeting each year during the third week in May, when each Parish branch may be represented by two (2) delegates with power to vote. Special meetings may be called by the Officers.

ARTICLE XI.

The constitution may be altered at any general meeting by a majority vote, or at a special meeting, if notice has been given of the desired change.

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The one club, St. Paul's, Peoria, has 14 members.

Ten Periodicals were sent to individual addresses, by five members. These magazines were sent regularly each month.

A number of Christmas cards were mailed.

Easter cards with writing on one side, otherwise in good condition, contributed by some ladies in the Church. Writing, neatly covered with white paper by the Parish Librarian and the Corresponding Secretary, and fifty sent to the Indian school at Crow Creek agency, and fifty to a colored mission. Three dozen were mailed to individual addresses which were obtained from headquarters in New York.

Two boxes of magazines have been sent.

We have begun a Shut-In-Mission. That is, we write to addresses furnished us, where there are invalids; some wholly so, others partially so. That correspondence, is steadily growing, as many of those poor souls, shut off from all the brightness and sunshine of life, hail with delight and gratitude, cheering words of interest and sympathy from another more fortunately situated and more in touch with the outside world. Communications received from some of the afflicted ones, are most touching and make one feel that such work for the Master, is indeed uplifting and worth while.

REPORT OF JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

In the report from the Junior Department last year, the Missionary Institute in Chicago, was mentioned. Last January, another excellent institute was conducted by Miss Lindley, in the same place, invitations to this being sent to the Diocesan Presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Department and to the Educational Secretaries, of the Fifth Missionary Department. Nine of the twelve dioceses were represented. As was the case last year, the Junior officer was unfortunately the only one in attendance from this diocese. It is hoped that when the women of the Fifth Department meet in Cleveland next October in connection with the Council, that the Diocese of Quincy will be well represented to make up for the lack of any representation at Milwaukee last year, as well as to receive the benefits accruing from these missionary gatherings.

The campaign to interest young women was also referred to in last year's report. So far only one such branch has been organized, St. Elizabeth's of

St. Paul's parish, Peoria. This branch was graduated into the Woman's Auxiliary at the beginning of the year. The importance of this movement is felt to be so great that the recommendation to have a special officer for this work comes from the Church Missions House. Some of the dioceses have already acted on the suggestion. Whether we have a special officer for this work or not, it is to be hoped that next year will see more of these branches enrolled. Probably, with a little effort some of the organizations already in existence could be persuaded to devote at least a portion of their time to missionary work.

As a result of the action taken at Cincinnati, toward securing one simple Junior Collect instead of two now in use, a number have been submitted to the Diocesan officers and the new Collect will probably be published and ready for distribution soon.

During the year, we have added two new branches, Warsaw, being under the direction of Mrs. Sack, and Tiskilwa, where our former Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Wilson, is the leader in charge of St. Catherine's Guild.

Inquiries about the Babies' Branch have been received from several places, but no new branches formed this year. In many respects, this is the most important part of the work. If the babies are enlisted as little helpers, there will not be much need to worry about interesting the women of the future. If you will glance at the leaflet you will see by the italics, that the truths emphasized by the Babies' Branch are important, that it is difficult to imagine any church willing to be without a branch. Where there is a Cradle or Font Roll in connection with the Sunday school, the Babies' Branch makes an excellent supplementary organization.

Before reading the reports from the various branches, which you will notice show a splendid advance in membership and contributions, I wish to call attention to the fact that, while individual Junior Branches have been organized, there is no Diocesan organization of the Junior Department in this Diocese; the constitution of the Woman's Auxiliary contains no reference whatever to Junior work; the custom of electing an officer for that work seems to rest merely on a suggestion from a former President of the Woman's Auxiliary. I beg to recommend, therefore, that the Woman's Auxiliary at this time, give its consent to the organization of the Junior Department and its approval of a constitution if it shall be adopted by the Juniors.

One of the interesting things of the year was the sending of Easter cards to 125 Indian children, whose names had been secured from the missionary at Oneida, Wis., and distributed among the Juniors.

An interesting item in the financial report is the amount contributed by the Juniors for the apportionment, about \$140.00, which is more, I believe, than the apportionment against the Woman's Auxiliary in the past.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this Association shall be The Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Quincy.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object shall be to study, to pray for, and to give to Missions.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of that Society. Any organization of baptized children or young women desiring to engage in the work of the Association may become a Branch upon the payment of \$1.00 to the Treasurer.

ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers shall be a President and a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected at the annual meeting or appointed by the Bishop.

The President shall have general supervision of the work and present reports to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese and to the General Secretary.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records and accounts of the Association.

ARTICLE V.—ANNUAL MEETING.

There shall be an annual business meeting at which each Branch and each Diocesan officer of the Department shall have one vote.

The time and place of meeting shall be the same as that of the Woman's Auxiliary, unless a majority of the Branches shall be in favor of some other place and time.

ARTICLE VI.—LEADERS.

Each Branch shall work under the direction of one or more Church-women, who shall be known as Leaders.

The Leaders shall be appointed by the Rector (or Priest-in-charge) or by the President of the Junior Department.

ARTICLE VII.

This Constitution shall go into effect upon its adoption by five Branches and its approval by the Bishop, and by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Quincy. It may be repealed, altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

NOTE.—The Woman's Auxiliary, acting on the recommendation of the officer in charge of the Junior work, gave its consent to the organization of the Junior Department and its approval of the constitution to be adopted. This Constitution has been approved by the Bishop and adopted by the required number of branches, in accord with Article VII.

THE RESOLUTION FOR THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

Adopted at the Conference of Diocesan Officers, October, 1910.

RESOLVED: That the United Thank-Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of woman workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.
