The Woman's Auxiliary was created by the Board of Missions during the session of the General Convention, October, 1871, in the City of Baltimore, and approved by the Board of Missions at the General Convention of 1880, to assist it in meeting its regular appropriations and to aid all missionary work of the church in any direction and to aid in any way that may be recommended by the Board or endorsed by the several Bishops.

The Junior Department was authorized by the General Board in 1889. The Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was organized in 1887 at Rock Island by Miss Emery and Bishop Burgess.

Every branch is expected to give to the Apportionment, to the United Offering and General Missions.

The United Offering is the thank offering presented at every triennial session of the Woman's Auxiliary. The United Offering is to be made by all members of the Auxiliary at the next triennial meeting, to be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields, including the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Cuba, Haiti and Mexico

Semi-annual collections are desired for the United Offering in March and September, or it may be given in the form of a birthday offering. Every woman is given an opportunity to share in the great thank offering. Keep ready for reference, a church almanac with clergy list, the last report of your Diocesan branch, Miss Emery's last report and the Spirit of Missions; and keep in supply copies of auxiliary papers and leaflets from the Church Mission House and Mite Chests for the United Offering.

When a project is laid before your branch do not fail to report its action after due deliberation. When you begin a box advise the recipient and the Diocesan secretary. When you ship it, advise again giving date and mode of shipment, notifying the Secretary of its money value, urge the acknowledgement of the same by the recipient.

If you cannot secure free shipment, always prepay charges and state this in your notification.

Remit money by express, postoffice order or bank drafts.

Please send the names and addresses of all parish officers to the Diocesan Secretaries and notify them of any change of officers.

See that all notices of meetings sent out by the Diocesan Secretaries are read by your Rector at the church services.

If possible add some little gift not asked for in the list, also a box of candy that there may be a little surprise for the missionary's family in unpacking the box.

MINUTES.

The twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Quincy, took place on Wednesday, May 13, 1913, in Grace church, Galesburg.

At 10:00 A. M., an informal business meeting of the officers was held in the Guild room of the church, before the regular business meeting at 2:00 P. M., to decide upon some important questions,—such as the Alaska scholarship, for which the Church Missions House had asked assistance. This was found advisable to continue for the coming year.

The matter of apportionment came next, for which a resolution was offered by Deaconess Josephine as follows:

"RESOLVED, That each branch of the Woman's Auxiliary making a payment to apply on the apportionments for general or diocesan missions shall report the same to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary as soon as the payment is made. If the money is sent directly to New York or to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board of Missions (see Journal of Synod, 1911, Page 39), it shall, also, be reported to the Treasurer of the Parish."

This would seem to assure credit for both Woman's Auxiliary and Parish, and the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary would know what Branches were owing and could urge delinquents to do their duty.

If the money to be sent out of the Diocese went first to the Diocesan Treasurer, it would only be in accordance with the Constitution, Article VIII.

The General Convention of New York, coming on in October, the nomination of representatives was next in order, five of these to be delegates, one representing the Junior Auxiliary, and five to be alternates.

The subject of a Bishop's Purse was proposed by the President, Mrs. Woodward. This would be a new Diocesan Offering from the women of Quincy, which would furnish an independent and much needed fund for the Bishop.

Mrs. Woodward was proposed by the Bishop as chairman of the nominating committee for the election of officers, who herself appointed Mrs. Sherwood, of Rock Island and Miss Heading, of Peoria. Mrs. Woodward had declared her inability to serve longer as president, and Mrs. Saville, although absent, had refused to again take the office of Recording Secretary.

The service at 11:00 A. M. was opened by the singing of a hymn. Rev. John Ambler, of Tokyo, Japan, gave the missionary address. Mr. Ambler's work in Japan was the subject of his discourse, which was interesting and helpful.

Luncheon was served at a near by church for 25 cents, an innovation found most practical, as done at the meetings of the Chicago Diocesan Branch. This custom was adopted for future meetings.

Promptly at 2:00 P. M., the members gathered in the church for Miss Emery's address, Miss Emery having become an unexpected and most welcome guest. Having found herself in the vicinity she gave us her time. We cherish always the few times which we have been favored with her inspiring talks. She dwelt upon the privileges which we had as women in giving to the missionary cause and how these had grown from very small things. For the regular business meeting the audience went to the Guild Room, where devotional exercises were led by the President, Mrs. Woodward, reading from the scriptures, followed by a hymn. She then gave a short but earnest address.

The roll was then called by the Secretary, Mrs. Zeller, showing delegates from the Cathedral, Canton, Carthage, Grace and St. John's Galesburg, Kewanee, St. Mary's, Knoxville, Moline, Macomb, Peoria St. Paul's and St. Stephen's, Rock Island and Warsaw.

Of the Junior Auxiliary, Moline and St. Stephen's, Peoria, were represented. Altogether, about fifty members were present from the various Branches of the Diocese.

The Secretary, Mrs. Zeller, then gave her report. The Treasurer, Mrs. Eastes, followed, proving that raising the dues from \$1.00 to \$2.00 had been a success.

The report of the United Offering was given. The President then asked how many presented their United Offering at a Corporate Communion service and spoke of the great value it is to the Branches, just as it is to those who present their joint offerings at the Triennial convention.

The Educational Secretary, Deaconess Josephine, gave a synopsis of her work, under whom works the new officer for the Spirit of Missions, selected from one of the Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Steut, of Rock Island Deanery.

St. Mary's gave a special report of its missionary efforts, because so thoroughly educational. Besides the two delegates, thirteen members were present. The voluntary service into the mission field at Granitesville, S. C., for a year, of one of last year's secretaries and recent graduates of the school, and the maintenance of a Japanese girl at St. Mary's, is unusual.

Rock Island, too, has a member, formerly one of the church choir, who has finished her course at the Philadelphia Training School for Deaconesses, and after work in the Italian Missions of the Quaker City she sails in July for St. John's-in-the-Wilderness, Allakaket, Alaska.

The Treasurer's bill for officers' postage was \$11.00.

Mrs. Sherwood, President of the Juniors, read an interesting report on her work.

The informal business meeting was then brought up and the new Diocesan Offering, called the Bishop's Purse, presented. This was moved by Canton and accepted, one dollar to be paid to the Treasurer by each Branch in April and October.

The Alaskan scholarship had received some pledges for the full amount of \$100. Other pledges were made then and there, the letter from Alaska being read.

Deaconess Josepaine's resolution regarding the apportionment was then read and accepted.

The delegates' and alternates' names were read: Delegates—Mrs. Musson, Moline; Mrs. Wilson, Tiskilwa; Mrs. Zeller, Peoria; Miss Alice Heading, Peoria; Mrs. Sherwood, Rock Island, representing the Juniors. Alternates—Mrs. R. F. Newcomb, Quincy; Mrs. H. J. Woodward, Peoria; Miss Sherwood, Moline; Mrs. Davidson, McComb; Miss Lucy Archer, Pittsfield.

Christ Church, Moline, kindly offered to entertain the Quincy branch in 1914, which was received with hearty thanks.

The following resolution was offered, and adopted unanimously by a rising vote:

"RESOLVED, That the thanks of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Quincy are hereby tendered to Mrs. H. J. Woodward, retiring President, for her faithful, devoted and efficient services in that capacity for the past three years; and we trust that we shall continue to have her wise and loving counsels in our work and in our meetings in the future."

REPORT OF WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Letters from the Church Missions House are always helpful. The appeals which are sent direct from them, we know how to meet, and where to place among the various Branches. But it is the personal ones received during the year from clergymen from other dioceses, who may be starting a mission, who wish to rebuild a church just burned, or build a new one—these come again and again.. They excite sympathy. Shall we take notice of these and leave undone work asked for by the Church Missions House? It is in such a condition of affairs that the letter from New York helps to solve a problem beyond us. In such a case, Miss Emery writes: "He is doing good work, but you will remember that we no longer include in our report to the Board of Missions, gifts in money and boxes sent in response to direct appeals that come to the Branches of the Auxiliary, not through the Church Missions House. Especially in the case of a Branch like the Quincy Branch, which is not strong and is able to give but little in the missionary direction. It is important that the money that it HAS to give should not be divided among many objects, but that it should be devoted first to the apportionment of the Parish; second, to the United Offering, and third to such specials as are presented to the Branch by the Board of Missions through the Woman's Auxiliary."

In writing of another mission, when questioned, she writes: "I think that the needs in the way of boxes for this mission should be supplied within the Diocese of ————. We have many missions in places where such help cannot be given and it would be better for the Quincy Branch, since it can send but few boxes, TO HAVE THEM GO to missions commended from the Church Missions House."

The newest Branches write for assistance in organization and when we have exhausted ourselves this comes to us:

"With regard to the new Branches I would suggest that you form them with the idea that prayer for missions and the gaining of knowledge about missions are the things to be first considered, and then the forming of a habit of systematic and conscientious giving for them.

"You will have received my letter with regard to the new plans for apportionment, and if you follow its suggestions you will want to work them out even in the smallest Branches. You can lay stress on the United Offering. All these things would come before anything like box work, and unless the Branches ask especially for this, I think it better not to take the initiative and suggest it."

A number of appeals were sent to us early in the year from Miss Emery, and from these we selected a missionary box for the family of Rev. Joyner, Pine Ridge Agency, S. D.; a miscellaneous box, the catechists suit being

given up, much to our regret. A clerical suit was given to Mr. LeRoy Weeks, of Newton, Iowa, with various stoles. The hospital at Nenana, Alaska; the church at Orville, Wyoming, Spokane Diocese; the Industrial school of Western Texas, St. Philip's for Colored Girls, claimed our attention. Miss Bowden, head of this school, is very desirous to secure two scholarships for St. Philip's School, asking, "Do you know of any one who will lend aid in this direction?"

Some Branches continue to devote themselves to missions which they feel must receive something from them during the year, such as St. Mary's on the Mountain, St. Andrew's at the Switch, Saluda, N. C., or Mayoden.

We have had no additional Branches and we have lost St. Andrew's Peoria, Rushville and Jubilee. We have not gained perceptibly in numbers, but those who have left the Diocese have carried forward Auxiliary work into other Dioceses, notably at Orville, Wyoming, where interest was aroused by a former member of Warsaw, and the work in Graniteville, S. C., found a strong leader in a former member of St. Mary's Branch. Quietly and effectively the seed is sown. Once an Auxiliary member, always a member.

Suprisingly good work has been done by the newest Branches, like Warsaw, Pittsfield and Griggsville, showing a grasp of the work that some of the older Branches have not reached.

The working of the apportionment has been smooth and is being better understood.

Of much value to two Diocesan officers was a visit to the Chicago Diocese as guests in the home of its President, Mrs. Greeley, at whose invitation they were able to have a day at the Chicago Church Club, where reports were given by the various departmental officers of the Diocesan Branch. Mr. Baker, of "The World in Chicago," gave the status of Episcopalians in this work. Luncheon was served at 25 cents each, and in the afternoon the Model Woman's Auxiliary was held, which was as good as a play,—so amusing and entertaining it proved to be.

Mrs. Greeley and another valued officer, Mrs. Lapham, of the Bureau of Publicity of "The World in Chicago," were visitors at different times in the Diocese during the year, at St. Paul's, Peoria, where their addresses were of inestimable value. Mrs. Greeley also spoke before St. Elizabeth's Branch for Young Women, an evening club.

The printed booklets for 1911-12 were never more satisfactorily done by the printers.

The services of the new Recording Secretary in compiling reports of the Branches and making up tables were of great assistance. Seventy-five letters were written during the year.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be called the Quincy Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

The objects of this Association shall be those of the General Auxiliary.

ARTICLE III.

All women of the Diocese desiring it, who offer prayer or gifts for Missions, shall be considered members of this Association.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers shall consist of an Honorary President, President, four Vice-Presidents, (one from each Deanery), a Secretary and a Treasurer.

ARTICLE V.

The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, to arrange for the organization of Parochial branches, and to have general charge of the work.

ARTICLE VI.

The duties of the Vice-Presidents shall be to choose one of their number to preside in the absence of the President, and to co-operate with her in the general supervision of the work of the Association in the Deaneries to which they belong.

ARTICLE VII.

The Secretary shall correspond with the General Secretary of the Auxiliary, and with the Vice-President of each Deanery concerning work of each Parish Branch, and shall give notice of meetings and keep minutes of them.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duties of the Treasurer shall be to receive all Special and General Funds; to disburse the former as the donors indicate, and the latter under the direction of the Executive Committee, and to render an account of the same at the annual meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

The officers of the Diocesan Branch shall be a committee to use such means as lie in their power to increase Missionary knowledge and interest in the women of the Diocese.

ARTICLE X.

The constitution may be altered at any general meeting by a majority vote or at a special meeting, if notice has been given of the desired change.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

The name of this Association shall be the Junior Department of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Quincy.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.

The object shall be to study to pray for, and to give to Missions.

ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of that Society. Any organization of baptized children or young women desiring to engage in the work of the Association may become a Branch upon the payment of \$1.00 to the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI.—OFFICERS.

The officers shall be a President and a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected at the annual meeting or appointed by the Bishop.

The President shall have general supervision of the work and present reports to the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese and to the General Secretary.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records and accounts of the Association.

ARTICLE V.—ANNUAL MEETING.

There shall be an annual business meeting at which each Branch and each Diocesan officer of the Department shall have one vote.

The time and place of meeting shall be the same as that of the Woman's Auxiliary, unless a majority of the Branches shall be in favor of some other place and time.

ARTICLE VI.—LEADERS.

Each Branch shall work under the direction of one or more Church-women, who shall be known as Leaders.

The Leaders shall be appointed by the Rector (or Priest-in-charge) or by the President of the Junior Department.

ARTICLE VII.

This Constitution shall go into effect upon its adoption by five Branches and its approval by the Bishop, and by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Quincy. It may be repealed, altered or amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

Your Educational Secretary presents her first report with very great pleasure. At our annual meeting last year, the importance of the study of missions, as one of the three objects of the Woman's Auxiliary, was recognized by the election of a special officer to take charge of that work. While the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Quincy is not yet remarkable for the number of typically mission study classes, to those familiar with the conditions a few years ago, the statement that during the past year almost every Branch has had some form of mission study will mean much.

The study has varied in subject, kind and character, and from illustrated lectures to personal letters from the missionaries. The text-book most generally used has been, "Japan Advancing—Whither?" Among the Branches using this are: Cathedral, Quincy; St. Paul's, Peoria; St. Mary's, Knoxville; Grace, Galesburg; Warsaw and Griggsville.

The new text-books for next year, "The Present Emergency in China," should be most interesting. It is prepared by the Rev. Dr. Hawks Potts, President of St. John's University, Shanghai,—where so many of China's leading men are educated—and will surely give us an excellent opportunity to learn something of the marvelous awakening and transformation of that great and wonderful nation.

The Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions requests that at this time attention be called to the following points:

1. Watch the Educational page in *The Spirit of Missions*.
2. In order to avoid disappointment, allow sufficient time when ordering books.
3. Please pay small accounts promptly, as material is sold at about cost.
4. Books on mission subjects may be borrowed from the Lending Library at the Church Missions House, for two weeks, by paying postage both ways.
5. Miss Lindley is arranging for twenty or more normal classes in New York at the time of the General Convention next October. If expecting to attend, application should be sent in early.
6. At the Convention, there will be an exposition showing what the church is doing in all parts of the world.
7. The ideal in missionary education should be not so much to provide entertainment for those already interested in missions, as to win those who have not yet thought much about the subject.

Your Secretary would like to suggest that in order to secure the interest of some of the indifferent, as well as that of some of the Marthas, who do not yet appreciate the need of knowing about the work and extending of Christ's Kingdom, it is important to plan, to prepare and to announce a definite program and have it at a definite time. An enthusiastic meeting cannot

be hoped for, if the Leader trusts to chance for material or does not take up the mission study until "everybody" has come and has nothing else to do or say. Have a definite and limited time set for study, and transact any necessary business before or after that time. The preparation will of course take time, but some of us are willing to give time and thought to study and work in organizations of philanthropic but secular character; as churchwomen, we should surely be willing to take some time to learn about the splendid work of our holy mother, the Church, the source of inspiration of all true progress, including the departments of philanthropy, education and social service.

To our Secretary, it seems particularly helpful for those in small places, where the little band of workers may be tempted to become discouraged by their weakness and isolation, to join with the Church at large in acquiring information about the great and glorious work and the difficulties mastered by the Church as a whole.

We expect to have the privilege of having with us Miss Lindley, whom most of you know as the head of the educational work of the Woman's Auxiliary and of the Junior Department. At present the plans are that she spend one day at Rock Island, and it is hoped that arrangements can be made for her to spend another day at another central place, with possibly a local meeting here in the morning, before she leaves for the west. Most of our Branches will have disbanded for the summer by that time, but a visit from Miss Lindey means an opportunity for help and inspiration for next year's work, which should not be neglected. We who are in a field where we lack the advantages of large enthusiastic gatherings of church people, should be especially grateful for the opportunity to have with us one who is the leader, par excellence, in mission study and auxiliary methods.

Lastly, your Secretary desires to call attention to the opportunity to see, learn, and be entertained by visiting "The World in Chicago" The exposition at the Coliseum, showing scenes and customs from various parts of the world, is very interesting, and the pageant, "Darkness and Light," with beautiful and magnificent scenery and a choir of 300 voices, is portrayed superbly at the Auditorium. It is said, by a critic of no mean ability, to compare most favorably with any grand opera given in Chicago. The Bishop of Chicago expressed the wish that every church man, woman and child in Chicago should see "The World in Chicago." After seeing the interesting exposition and wonderful pageant, your educational Secretary expresses the hope that every member of the Woman's Auxiliary and Junior Department of this Diocese may enjoy the same privilege.

THE RESOLUTION FOR THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

Adopted at the Conferene of Diöcesan Officers, October, 1910.

Also that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.
