## MINUTES

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The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Quincy held its thirty-second annual meeting in St. Paul's Church and Guild Hall, Peoria, on May 12 and 13, 1919, the hostesses being the women's societies of St. Andrew's, St. Paul's and St. Stephen's Churches, Peoria.

The Peoria women having arranged for the entertaining of delegates and visitors over night, nearly all were present at the meeting in the Guild room Monday evening, when after devotionals and felicitous introductions by Father Bowen and Bishop Fawcett, Miss Nannie Hite Winston of Louisville, Ky., gave the address. It was a wish expressed by many that every woman in the diocese might have had the rare opportunity of hearing Miss Winston, for the combination of her charming personality with such a subject as the History and Development of the W. A., left nothing to be desired in the way of inspiration and enthusiasm. Following this, a delightfully informal reception was held, delicious refreshments served, and an opportunity afforded to renew old acquaintances and form new ones.

The Holy Communion was celebrated Tuesday morning at seven-thirty. The privilege of making their communions at this time was exercised by an exceptionally large number of women, and a deeply devotional spirit was evident. The celebrant was the Rev. H. L. Bowen, Rector of St. Paul's, Peoria, assisted by the Rev. W. L. Essex, Rector of Trinity Church, Rock Island.

With breakfast served in the Parish Hall, it was easily possible for all to be on time for the Junior meeting at nine o'clock, the minutes of which appear in this annual.

At ten o'clock, Bishop Fawcett led in devotionals and then introduced Deaconess Fuller of the Diocese of Chicago who spoke on "Co-operation as a Means toward Unity." Deaconess Fuller's coming was eagerly anticipated by those who had heard her earlier in the year when she spoke in Galesburg on the Advent Call and they were not disappointed. Herself a most consecrated worker, strong in her loyalty and her tolerance, she filled the hearts of all who heard her with a renewed desire and resolve to work for the coming of the Kingdom. Like Miss Winston, Deaconess Fuller emphasized above all else the mighty power of prayer. To have had two such women for our speakers was high privilege indeed.

Next in order was the annual business meeting, Mrs. Bohl presiding.

Response to the roll as called by the secretary showed that in addition to the Bishop there were present the following clergy: Fathers Bowen, Burgess, Dew-Brittain, Essex, Foley, Long and Musson. Of officers there were six, of delegates twenty-eight, of visitors twenty-one from out-of-town and a large number of the members of the Peoria branches.

The minutes of the last annual meeting having been published, it was voted to dispense with their reading.

The reports of the President, Secretary, Treasurer and Educational Secretary were all read and accepted, as were likewise those of the officers of the Junior Auxiliary, and these reports are all to be found in this annual.

After prayer by the Rev. George Long, the meeting was adjourned for luncheon, which had been so arranged that all could lunch together, a plan which added greatly to the social spirit which pervaded the entire meeting.

With the resuming of business at two p. m., it was voted that strong effort be made to bring the United Offering up to \$1500.00 for the Triennial at Detroit.

Dean Long took the chair for the election of officers, which resulted as follows:

President—Mrs. Bohl, Galesburg.

Vice-President—Miss Marsh, Warsaw.

Secretary—Mrs. Corbin, Galesburg.

Treasurer—Mrs. Covell, Moline.

Interested criticism then took place of the present form of blanks furnished the branch secretaries for making up their annual reports to the diocesan secretary. This resulted in the appointment of a committee consisting of the two President (W. A. and Junior), and the in-coming and out-going secretaries, to work out a simpler blank, the same to be submitted for criticism to Church Missions House.

Delegates to the Triennial were chosen as follows: Mesdames Bardens, Bohl, Cockle, Essex and McCoy. Alternates: Mesdames Fawcett, Bowen, Hartley, Stokes and Miss Anna Heading, the last named in each group representing the Juniors.

An invitation for next year's meeting was extended by Trinity Church, Rock Island, and was gratefully accepted.

The need of a Contingent Fund was stated and in accordance with a helpful suggestion made by Miss Winston, it was voted to adopt a sliding scale for the amount of dues assigned each branch, by which plan each branch will pay more nearly according to its ability, the diocesan officers to arrange this scale.

Rising votes of gratitude were extended to Deaconess Fuller and Miss Winston for the inspiration of their addresses and their presence and to the Peoria hostesses for their abundant hospitality.

The secretary was instructed to write a note of sympathy to Mr. Hastings of Quincy in the loss of Mrs. Hastings, who had been a faithful member of the Auxiliary.

The Rev. Mr. Essex read a note from Mrs. Dart, expressing her regret at being unable to be present.

Father Bowen, by way of expediting matters for future hostesses of the Auxiliary, urged more prompt and definite replies than in the past to the invitations sent out by entertaining branches.

Dean Long gave a brief, forceful explanation of the mighty spiritual, educational and financial campaign upon which the Church has entered and then the meeting was closed with the benediction.

## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

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Bishop Fawcett and dear Friends:

I am trying to remember how I felt the first time I was elected President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Quincy Diocese. I have about made up my mind that I did not feel any prouder then than I do in coming before you today. It is a wonderful encouragement to see so many attending this meeting.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Peoria parishes for their hospitality and all the courtesies they have extended to this gathering. The success of any meeting of this kind is so dependent on the deep-felt interest in the work that is being pursued, as well as a generous spirit of hospitality; all of which is being shown by the ladies, and Reverend Bowen of Peoria. We are very sure that every delegate not only appreciates their generosity and good will, but will also carry the memory of this meeting in their minds as a valuable and cherished experience.

A year ago I had the great pleasure and honor of standing before you as president of this Auxiliary. The year has slipped by rapidly and much good has been accomplished in our diocese. With the means at my disposal, I have endeavored to spread the teachings of our mission among all the parishes to its fullest extent. The response and co-operation are a great source of thankfulness; but words of appreciation are as nothing to the greater blessings that fall on those who gave themselves to the work. The great privilege of close contact with the head-quarters of our organization, that I have enjoyed, is one that I sincerely wish could have been experienced by each one of you. The broader outlook that is thus obtained, gives a vision of the multitude of things to be accomplished. It gives the strength we need to overlook the shortcomings and seemingly small results of our local work; it urges us onward to greater aims. Only too well do I know of the deadening effect of brickering, prejudices, and fault-finding that arise about us at home. From too many places comes the remark, "The church here is dead." To all such this question must be answered, "Is it the church, or is it our capacity for doing greater things, that is dead?" Dr. Jefferson, in a recent article appearing in "The Independent," has this to say, "The church may be asleep, but it is surprising how it gets on; it walks, as it were, in its sleep, indeed it leaps and runs. The church of today may be in a state of decadence, but it is astonishing how much ahead it is of the church in any preceding epoch of the Christian era. It may be dead, but it is astonishing how active the corpse is. It is doing a thousand more things than it ever tried to do in the days of its most abundant vitality. Being dead, it yet speaks and acts as it were alive. It may be negative and narrow, and stupid, but have you noticed the size of the schemes

the churches are just now launching? It has been said many times that the church has "fallen down," and yet when "down" she seems to be able to render greater assistance than any other institution on its feet." We have only to look around us in order to get the broader outlook, to learn that while we are languishing, others are doing, that when there is a will, by the grace of God, there is a way. Never in the history of the church has the efforts of its members been so united, so far-seeing, so humanized, as they are today.

Last year I emphasized the necessity of a stricter observance of the AUTHORIZED WORK. The splendid results that have been made, by various auxiliaries, show that conscientious efforts were made in this direction. We certainly hope that this feature may be continually heeded in all the work that is ahead of us. I do not want to fail in calling your attention again to this very important detail. This method is the only way in which each parish branch carries out the plan of maintaining all the missionary work, as planned by the Woman's Auxiliary to the Church Board of Missions. If any branch fails to carry out their share, they not only lose credit for their missionary efforts, but they will also fail to support the general missionary work, which always aims to supply material and funds where they are needed most.

A year ago we met, and our country was at war. The women of the church were everywhere engaged in war-relief work. The part that women took, under the stress of war, was clearly shown. That the labor, devotion, and sacrifice of noble women have earned the undying gratitude of the whole world is unquestioned, and is more widely recognized today than ever before. That VICTORY should come to us, after the terrors of battle, the wanton waste of war, the loss of many precious lives, only proves that when we carry in our hearts the principles of the Christian Church shall we triumph over godless nations.

In the midst of our anxieties came the Advent Call. This was an endeavor to arouse the people of the church to the necessity of making the ensuing year, if possible, a more SPIRITUAL one than any before.

Deaconess Fuller came to Galesburg on November twenty-second to instruct leaders and messengers in the Advent Call. It was a wonderful opportunity for the clergy and women of the diocese to meet with one so full of the spirit of this great work, and so well informed of its plans. Her talk was an inspiration to all who heard her. I wish more parishes could have been represented, but owing to the dreadful epidemic raging in our diocese, at that time, many parishes were under quarantine.

In the minds of those who have seen the possibilities of the Advent Call, a newer and bigger work has come out of it. At the meeting of the Board of Missions in December a Nation-Wide Campaign was inaugurated to bring the compelling facts of the church's needs, at home and abroad, to the attention of every member of the church. A survey will be made of all church work under the care of each diocese. Committees will be formed in each

diocese to co-operate with the Bishop and a central committee. In preparation for this great endeavor, educational work will be carried on throughout the whole church, culminating in a week of intensive education, which will be conducted in the Autumn, when meetings will be held all over the United States, ending in an "Every-Member" canvass of each parish during the first week of Advent. So let every delegate feel the importance of this Nation-Wide Campaign, and when you return to your homes, impress upon the members of your church the value and need of absolute surrender to this work. We know what we can do, when our Country calls. Shall the call of the Church be any less heeded? We gave our time and means to make the world in general safe for humanity, should we not give again that our own parish and our own homes shall be better for our giving?

I wish that the women of the diocese would take advantage of the Summer Conferences, which will be held in Racine, Wisconsin, July eighth to eighteenth. Mrs. Biller, organizing secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Church Board of Missions, who was in our diocese in March, spoke of the wonderful opportunities that one receives at these conferences. The expense at the conference is very small. Cannot some Auxiliary branch find a teacher, a parish worker, or a young girl to send to Racine in July? I appeal to you as church-women, who are interested in the mission of the church, to provide a scholarship, or other ways and means that one or more may attend these conferences. It would mean new life and greater efficiency in the affairs of the church.

It was a great privilege to have Mrs. Biller in our diocese. It is with much regret that I could not send her into every parish. But her time was limited to one week in the Quincy diocese. In the near future I hope we will have the pleasure again of her visiting us, and she will be able to give more of her time. The fine impression which Mrs. Biller made in her addresses on Church Missions caused us to feel more than ever, our missionary duty. I am sure, in the coming year, each parish branch will pack their boxes with more love and care, because they had the opportunity of listening to her tell of the practical charity, the wonderful gratitude, the aid that comes so often, almost like a miracle, in answer to prayer, all of which she showed are the results of our united giving.

The Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held in Detroit, Michigan, from October seventh to the twenty-first. If any church woman can see her way clear to attend the convention this year, she will doubtless find it to be one of the greatest events in the life of any of us now living. There will be many interesting and helpful meetings to attend.

What good work has been accomplished during the past year should encourage us to renewed and newer activities for the coming year. If the results obtained were accomplished under conditions that divided our attentions and interest, is it too much to hope for greater results for next year? Proper cooperation of the Woman's Auxiliary and the clergy with

the broad plans, now in contemplation by the Board of Missions should work wonders in our church life. If any parish fails to avail itself of these plans and assistance, they have only themselves to blame for a dormant and listless condition at home.

If the general idea of my address could be summed up in one word, it would be the word "Consecration." The extensive aims, the wide-spread efforts, the contemplation of raising and spending vast sums of money, that is being pursued by all Christian denominations today, calls for nothing less, from every member than absolute consecration to our church. We read in the writings of the early fathers of what value they esteemed their faith. But evidently even in those early days of the church, there must have been those that found it fashionable or expedient to profess a faith that they would not justify by works. That manly disciple, St. James, showed his deep insight into human nature, when he laid this admonition before his people, "Faith, if it hath not works, is dead—being alone. A man may say, thou hast faith and I have works: show me thy faith without thy works, and I will show thee my faith by my works." Does that not sound like a warning from a minister of a modern pulpit. And yet, it was written nearly two thousand years ago.

Is there cause for a feeling of consecration to our church today? Who can question it, if we are to keep to the fore-front of religious activity, or even keep abreast of it? Let me close with this little verse by George Croley:

"Spirit of God, descend upon my heart  
Wean it from earth, through all its pulses move,  
Stoop to my weakness, mighty as Thou art,  
Make me to love Thee, as I ought to love.

"I ask no dream, no prophet's ecstacies,  
No sudden rending of this veil of clay;  
No angel visitant—no opening skies,  
But take the dimness of my soul away.

"Teach me to feel that Thou art always nigh,  
Teach me the struggles of my soul to bear;  
To check the rising doubt—the rebel sigh  
Teach me the patience of unanswered prayer."

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## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

From May 1, 1918, to May 1, 1919

Mission Study for the year just ended, shows little, if any, progress, partly to the conditions of the past fall and winter, which prevented the assembling of ourselves together, and partly to a lack of interest in the Study of Missions.

The book suggested for our use this year, "Our Church and Our Country," by Bishop Burleson, is most interesting and instructive, giving, as it does, a history of our church foundations in this country, and pointing out some of the problems facing us.

A Study Class on this book was held at St. Paul's, Peoria, during lent and was attended by about twenty (20) members of St. Elizabeth's Branch, also some members of the Senior Branch. The class was conducted by Mr. W. G. Russell, and the rector gave a talk on the final chapter, which pertains partly to rural life and work.

St. Peter's Branch, Canton, read during the year, "The Conquest of the Continent," in connection with "Our Church and Our Country."

St. Paul's, Warsaw, formed a reading circle, meeting weekly during lent at the homes of the different members, the hostess in most cases, acting as leader. "Our Church and Our Country," was used, together with Miss Boyer's "Suggestions to Leaders."

At Trinity, Rock Island, the rector delivered a series of lectures on "The Conquest of the Continent."

The following branches have used "The Spirit of Missions" at their meetings, supplemented in some cases by papers on missions of the church in different lands, viz: St. John's, Kewanee; Christ Church, Moline; St. James, Griggsville; St. Jude's, Tiskilwa.

St. Mary's Branch, Knoxville, while school was in session, held the usual bimonthly meetings with missionary readings.

This comprises all of the educational work of the branches, as reported to me.

A blank recently sent from the Educational Secretary at Church Missions House, was filled out and returned, reporting one Study Class, and six Reading Circles.

In closing let me urge the branches to give more attention to the Study of Missions. You will be repaid many fold for the time and effort. The following quotation contains much food for thought: "Knowledge begets interest, interest begets zeal, zeal begets love, love induces giving, even to the giving of self."

Is it not possible for those of us who take summer vacations, to journey this year to Racine, where the conference for church workers of the mid-west is to be held? If so, let us drink in and absorb, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, the good things offered us there. Then may we become, not only better helpers to the Board of Missions, but the better able to hold up the hands of the Bishop and Clergy in our midst. Respectfully submitted,

## INSTRUCTIONS TO BRANCHES

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The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was established in 1871, with a Junior Department in 1899. The Quincy Branch of the Auxiliary was organized in 1887, at Rock Island, by Miss Emery and Bishop Burgess. Every woman in the Church is by virtue of her baptism a member of the Church's Missionary Society. She becomes an actual member of the Auxiliary by voluntarily sharing in its efforts—prayer for missions, study of missions, and gifts in money and work for missions.

**1. Prayer for Missions.** A special time for prayer for missions, suggested by the General Board and widely adopted throughout the Church, is the noonday hour, and at other times of devotion or together in their Corporate Communion, Auxiliary workers should make special petitions for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.

**2. Study of Missions.** In order to have intelligent, earnest, and interested members praying for and giving to missions, study is necessary. Books and leaflets on the work, including both foreign and domestic fields, can be secured from The Educational Department, Church Missions House, New York City. For advice concerning any particular course consult your Diocesan Educational Secretary. The Spirit of Missions, the official missionary magazine, is indispensable to anyone wishing to keep informed about the forward work of the Church. Each parish branch should have copies of Miss Emery's "Hand-Book of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions," for study and of the Diocesan and General Reports for information and reference.

**3. Gifts in Money and Work for Missions.** Besides the payment of dues, \$2, each branch of the Auxiliary in this Diocese is asked to give \$2 a year to the Bishop's Purse, and to contribute toward a sum of \$50 which the Auxiliary pledged at the convention in May, 1914, for the Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund. This fund supplies yearly a grant of \$50 to pay insurance dues for a missionary. The Diocesan Secretary will notify the branches of their share in the payment of this fund. There has also been added to our yearly pledge a contribution to the Milwaukee Plan.

After these authorized calls are met the next most important money obligation is that of aiding in paying the parish mission apportionment, if that be necessary. It is urged that our money gifts to missions should be increased even at the expense of the box work.

Another and very important obligation which the Auxiliary has assumed is that called the United Offering. This is a personal thank offering collected by Auxiliary members in the little blue mite boxes or given as a birthday offering. This is taken up in March and September and the money

forwarded to the Diocesan Custodian, who places it upon interest until the meeting of the next General Convention, when the entire amount is sent to be placed upon the altar, together with the offerings from other dioceses, at the triennial service of thanksgiving. October, 1916, in St. Louis, a sum in excess of \$300,000, the United Offering made by the women of the Church for three years, was offered up on the altar in Christ Cathedral. In this offering may also be included the Gift of Life, as suggested in the United offering Resolution of 1916:

Resolved, That the United Offering of 1916 be given to the Board of Missions to be devoted entirely to the training, testing, sending and support of women for Mission Work at home and abroad, and to the care of such as are sick or disabled. Also that to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly, as the Lord hath prospered them.

Appeals from Missionaries and Mission stations are sent to the Diocesan Secretary each fall by Miss Emery, and these are apportioned among the branches as carefully as possible. Branches are asked to rely on the Secretary for such work and not choose independent work.

Full instructions accompany the personal appeals. Such boxes should be filled with new articles of good quality, durable and tasteful. If all cannot be sent, report to the Secretary.

If possible, add some little gift not asked for in the list, also a box of candy that there may be a little surprise for the missionary's family in unpacking the box.

If any second-hand clothing is sent in boxes to mission stations it must be clean and in good repair. Put the name of the sending branch both on the inside and outside of the box. Prepay shipping charges.
