THE RHODE ISLAND BRANCH
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions.

WITH the cordial approval of the Bishop of this Diocese a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the co-operation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interests in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed :

CONSTITUTION.

I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all the parishes in this diocese in the five branches of mission work, viz.: Domestic, Diocesan, Foreign, Freedmen, Indian.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer; also an Executive Committee of six ladies, who shall attend to the several branches of missionary work. This Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between the annual meetings.

IV. This society shall hold an annual meeting in Providence, in October, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports of the parish secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and transacting all other business.

V. This society shall also hold meetings at stated intervals in the different parishes for mutual intercourse and information. Each parish shall send delegates to the annual meeting, also a written report to the Secretary of the work done during the year.

VI. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Society, send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them, keep an account of the work done by the women of the diocese, as reported by the parish secretaries, and report this annually to the Secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work and for the expenses of the society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Seven persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at the Board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the people present.

CHARTER.

As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Island at the May session, 1900:

I hereby certify that Annie I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Euretta McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State according to law, their agreement to form a corporation, under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid in the general treasury of the State the sum required by law.

To those who knew Miss Andrews her life is her best eulogy. Her quiet, regular work for Christ and His Church since her earliest youth made her beloved and appreciated by every one with whom she came in contact. She spent her entire time for the benefit of others, making her memory a blessed one to all those to whom she ministered. Happy by nature, she created an atmosphere of cheerfulness wherever she went, never allowing her own troubles or cares to sadden either her family or friends. Every labor she undertook she carried out with zeal and faithfulness, many times to the detriment of her own health. She was greatly respected by the community, and the influence she exerted for good through her Bible-class for young men and many other ways, may cause many a young man to look back to those years when he received his first spiritual instruction from her lips, and feel that the best of his knowledge was the result of her faithful teaching. To the Rhode Island branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, where she held the office of treasurer since the organization of the society until her death, a space of twenty-three years, her loss is beyond all words. With a ready judgment and a generous hand, she administered her office, and difficult indeed will it be to find her successor, and to fill her place will be impossible. The record of so helpful a life is her best epitaph. Let us who remain so closely follow in her footsteps that when we are called hence we may leave as grateful a memory:

“ May light perpetual shine upon her.”

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

THE annual meeting was held in St. Stephen's Church, October 31st. Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read and accepted. Election of officers followed, and the old Board were re-elected. Speakers of the day were the Rev. Mr. Merrill, of Oneida; Rev. Mr. Tunnell of King's Hall, Washington, D. C., and the Rev. F. L. Whittemore, of our own diocese. A large attendance and an interesting meeting.

First quarterly meeting was held in Grace Church, January 31st. During the morning, addresses were

given by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Hare of South Dakota, Rev. T. C. Whetmore of Asheville, N. C., Rev. Arch-deacon B. M. Spurr of West Virginia.

In the afternoon the Rev. P. P. Alston of Charlotte, N. C., spoke at some length of his work among his own (colored) people. Reports were also read at this time from the United Offering and the foreign work.

After a review of the various departments of the Auxiliary by the President, the meeting closed with the benediction by the Rev. Mr. Rousmaniere.

The second quarterly meeting was held in the Church of the Messiah, Wednesday, May 29th. The speakers of the day were the Rt. Rev. Bishop Brown, Arkansas, and the Rev. Jules Prevost of Alaska. A large attendance and great interest manifested in the various addresses made. After remarks by the President, the meeting closed with benediction by the Rev. Jules Prevost.

Again it is my pleasant duty to report upon the completion of a most successful year of this Auxiliary, and to all those who have helped to make this so we extend our most cordial thanks, and ask the same co-operation for the work, some new, and more old laid out for the coming year.

The Foreign work has its pledges filled, and the needs of this department were never more pressing; the presence of Miss Bull, so well and so favorably known to you all, and now in this country, it is hoped will stimulate a strong feeling for her work. We hope to have her here late in the season.

The Domestic work goes quietly on, fewer boxes, but of greater value. This part of our work will never cease. There will always be missionaries whose stipends are barely adequate for even daily needs, to say nothing of respectable clothing and a few luxuries. One missionary Bishop has said "that it not only added to a man's comfort, but to his own self respect to be well dressed." It should be our care that those who are willing to give up so much, and to labor unweariedly for our blessed Lord, should be at least comfortable, and cheered by a substantial evidence of our sympathy.

The work of the Freedmen, always hard, goes on, but there is no surplus to report, but the pledges are filled. Two parishes have sent boxes, and good ones. We can easily imagine how grateful the recipients were. We hope more boxes will go from here another year.

The Indian work is always in one place. You know where and how you will find it. Quietly, but ever going on, and so much accomplished with so little to do with, and there is no more interesting work in our Auxiliary.

The Junior Auxiliary is still pressing forward, and our older society will have to work quickly and keep wide awake that it does not go ahead of us. It is a matter of congratulation that we find so much interest aroused, and we feel sure of our places being filled in the coming years by this energetic body of young mission workers.

The United Offering was this year a very creditable sum, not as much as we had hoped, but we expect

much more in the next three years. People are really beginning to know what the United Offering is, and to really feel proud of its existence in the work of the Auxiliary.

The Church Periodical Club has its hands full, and much good work has been accomplished. It is an inspiration for one to visit their headquarters in the Mission House, New York; everyone is busy and cheerful, and how could it be otherwise with such a whole-souled woman as Mrs. Chapin at its head.

The Diocesan work, the Penny-a-Week Fund, is not what it should be, and yet with so small amount as reported, we have helped in so many ways. Please give us more that we may never have to refuse an appeal for aid; it is always so little that is asked for.

It would seem that we would not need to call attention to the three charitable institutions of our diocese, but for fear you may forget them we remind you again. The St. Elizabeth Home, what a refuge for those afflicted by disease, and others needing the best of care that they may be restored to health.

St. Andrew's School, where our boys are. Do all of you know that the trolley cars now pass the door of this school? And where can you find a more pleasant ride, and your reception at the school will more than repay you for the trip, and, if you go once, we are sure you will help it along.

St. Mary's Orphanage. Why! the very name should bring a response in every woman's heart. You

all know how near this work is to our dearaged Bishop; let us brighten his life by helping him in the work he is doing for St. Mary's. All the charities need money, and let us all try in the many ways that are open to us to give more here than we have ever done before.

The Carrington Fund will be such a help to us in the coming years; the most generous response has been received for this fund and we hope to see the \$5,000 raised soon, as we cannot use the interest until that sum is obtained.

The meetings of the year have all been well attended, and the monthly meeting has been more than usually interesting. Come, then, if there are questions you wish to ask, or any information about missions to be obtained, we are always glad to see and help you in any way.

The work of the year so successful has been overshadowed by the death of our beloved Treasurer, Miss E. E. Andrews, whose faithful and devoted service of twenty-three years, as our first and only Treasurer can never be forgotten; her influence will always be felt.

In the General Auxiliary the loss of Mrs. Twing is felt most keenly. Few women have accomplished so much for the woman's work of the Church.

The last year, with all its opportunities has passed; if we have neglected any, see to it that the coming year makes up by extra work and service for the cause, so dear to us—Christ and His Church.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

THE work of the foreign department of the Woman's Auxiliary has gone on much as in former years. Our pledges are all fulfilled and we are able to report several specials for the women's hospital, St. Luke's in Shanghai, as well as the continuance of three for the Christian education of children in Japan. Several parishes have contributed this year which have not for a long time appeared on our list. We are still hoping for the day when every parish in the diocese will be represented in this department of the work according to its ability.

It is with the greatest pleasure and with much hope for the effect upon our work in the future, that we announce the arrival at her home of Miss Lula Bull. After fourteen years of faithful labor in Osaka and Kyoto, she has at last consented to take a years' leave of absence. Later in the season we hope to arrange meetings between Miss Bull and those parishes which have so long contributed to her support.

Two branches of our work are in need this year, and it seems wrong to curtail where we ought to increase. For the Rhode Island School in Tulaki, in Urmia, Persia, we need the small sum of twenty dollars. Five dollars are pledged, and twenty-five supports an entire school. This school is for Armenian Christians in the Archbishop of Canterbury's mission under the direction of Mr. Ncesau who is in charge of the

American share of the work. We have maintained this school for many years, but its support has now come back upon the Auxiliary, as the former pledge cannot be renewed.

The other object is similar. We need twenty dollars for the continuance of a scholarship in St. John's School at Cape Mount, West Africa. These schools are far away, far from communication, and are seldom heard from except through the Archbishop of Canterbury's report and Spirit of Missions; but we must not forget that they are teaching the truth to children whose souls are as dear in the sight of God as ours. Will not some one help us to continue this work?

FREEDMEN'S BRANCH.

It is with some mortification that the Secretary for the Freedmen presents her report. Last year we had exceeded in our receipts all former years of which I had any record. This year we have fallen far behind 1900. True we have met our obligations meaning our pledges, but we have not gone outside them, in ever so small a degree, to help this big work which as Churchwomen and Americans lies at our door. The living have not come forward to fill the gap which death has made in our ranks.

We are helping by our pledge of \$200 to Rev. I. W. Perry of Tarboro, North Carolina, to support a large school of about one hundred pupils, and he writes how much he is needing still of another teacher if he had the salary for her.

Bishop Gray, to whom we have fulfilled our pledge but nothing more, has a colored school for boys, and another for girls, as well as a hospital, all needing help. Last year we sent a generous contribution to the hospital, but this year nothing.

To Bishop Johnston of Texas, for three years we have given \$75 for the education of a young colored girl at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, from his jurisdiction, and with the most gratifying results. She has graduated, and her letters show how she has profited by her opportunities, not only in learning but in character. The amount of good done by such an one going back among her people we cannot estimate.

After such a review of the little done, and the amount to be done, let us with a fresh consecration and larger hope, begin a new year of greater generosity and increased enthusiasm, and see what we may not be enabled to accomplish for these wards of the Church and the country.

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The Rhode Island Branch of the Church Periodical Club reports as follows:

Twenty-five parishes in this diocese are now represented by librarians, some of whom meet on Friday mornings at the Woman's Auxiliary Rooms in the Wayland Building, for the purpose of packing magazines and books, both religious and secular, which have been sent there in response to solicitations. Bibles, Hymnals and Prayer books, music, calendars and picture cards are also much in demand.

Another, but equally important form of work, is the procuring of contributors, who will send regularly to our applicants, copies of the current weekly or monthly periodicals, which otherwise would be put aside. The Librarians will gladly furnish addresses of clergy and laity in isolated parts of the country, who have been recommended by the Bishops of their dioceses, and many of whom have absolutely no other means of obtaining reading matter. They are always enthusiastic in their gratitude. Sometimes, however, they cannot even afford to buy writing materials with which to acknowledge the receipt of the magazines.

Our records show that over two hundred periodicals are now being sent out regularly, while forty boxes have been forwarded to schools, reading-rooms, forts and prisons; and six packages and two barrels have also been expressed from the rooms.

The amount of cash on hand at the beginning of the

year was \$23.74. The receipts during the year have been \$62.36; making a total of \$86.10. The expenditures have amounted to \$84.85, leaving only \$1.25 in the treasury to defray express and freight charges on boxes which are now ready for shipment.

Among the boxes sent were two for the Hospital at Springhill Mines, Nova Scotia, one for St. Paul's School, Vermillion, S. Dakota, and one for the Church Home and Hospital, Orlando, Florida. A large barrel reached the soldiers stationed in the Island of Luzon, Phillipine Islands. Many of the institutions in our own state have also been remembered.

Without a regular income the work is necessarily limited, but we are confident that our past record of growth will be largely increased during the coming year.

THE UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering of 1901 was made in Grace Church, San Francisco, on Thursday, October 3d, and, with additional sums since received, amounts to \$106,560.34. This Offering has been placed in the care of the Board of Missions, to be divided into equal parts—one part to be given to each of the missionary bishops and one equal part to the commission for work

among the colored people; the offering in each case to be reckoned as a special, and in addition to the appropriations made by the Board of Missions.

The service at which the offering was presented was one of the most splendid and inspiring of the convention. The offering exceeded that of three years ago by more than \$24,000, and when the sum was announced, giving one more proof of the strength that there is in union, every woman who had contributed to it felt rightfully glad and proud.

The statement accompanying this report shows what part in that Offering was Rhode Island's and how it was contributed — by parishes and individuals, in large sums and in many small ones, reaching the total of \$1,570.

From the money point of view this result, showing as it does an increase of five hundred dollars over the Offering of 1898, is encouraging — but a glance at the list of churches is sufficient to prove that it is still far from being a *United* Offering, and that above all this is what we want.

With this end in view it has been decided to adopt the plan found successful in other States of appointing a special treasurer for the offering in each parish — one who will give full information in regard to this branch of auxiliary work, distribute boxes and send the contents yearly to the diocesan secretary. Appointments have already been made in seven parishes, and it is hoped that the list will soon be complete.

Boxes for the Offering of 1904 are in readiness. This Offering will be made in Boston, and will be for "Woman's Work in the Domestic and Foreign Fields,"

including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba, and Mexico.

Miss McVickar has been appointed to the work of the United Offering, and her assistance is cordially welcomed.

THE CARRINGTON MEMORIAL FUND.

The Woman's Auxiliary voted about two years ago to raise a fund in memory of Mrs. Candace Crawford Carrington, the first president of the branch in this diocese, to whom more than to any other one is due the credit for what has been accomplished here. The object of the fund is to enable the Board to have something to rely upon at the last of the year, in case the contributions fall short of the pledges. The purpose is to draw only

from the income of the fund, and it was voted that no income should be used until the principal amounts to five thousand dollars. Twenty-seven hundred dollars have been contributed and deposited in bank, leaving twenty-three hundred still to be raised. The double excellence of the plan, in its memorial character and practical advantage should attract interest and aid in raising the fund to its minimum limit at least. Let every parish do what it can to this end and the time will not be far distant when the income will be available. It will prove a great relief to the officers of the Board in case of emergency. Next October will be the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Rhode Island Branch of the Auxiliary, and it would be a fitting celebration of the event to reach the five thousand dollar mark at that time.

TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Indian Aid Society of Rhode Island,

Which represents the Indian Department of the
Woman's Auxiliary.

On October 18, our weekly meetings were resumed and continued as usual for about six months with an average attendance of six ladies per week. About thirty garments were cut and made up.

We wish to extend our sincere thanks to many parishes and individuals who have helped us to fill our boxes, also to Browning, King & Co., and to the Boston Store for their discount on goods sold to us.

Two boxes have been sent, one to Rev. J. W. Cook, Greenwood, S. Dakota, for one of his catechists, and one to Rev. J. A. Maggrah of White Earth, Minn, Total value of the two boxes, \$111.50.

We received in money, \$439.33 and expended the full amount. We paid towards the salary of Mrs. Jane F. Johnstone of St. Paul's School, S. Dakota, \$250.

To Mr. J. L. Prevost \$100 for the education of an Indian boy in Alaska.

Five dollars were sent to Bishop Hare for his Indian Schools, a special contribution from a member of All Saints' Memorial Church, Providence. The rest of the money was spent in clothing and materials for the boxes, freight, etc., and \$10 for printing report.

At the quarterly meeting in May Mr. Prevost of Alaska, gave us a most interesting account of his work among the Indians in that cold and forbidding country. He found them more responsive and teachable than any of their race that he had seen; men, women and children anxious to learn to read and glad to hear the Gospel preached.

After hearing him it seemed right to us to send him the \$100 pledged for educational purposes. He received it with grateful acknowledgment, and named Arthur, an Indian boy then at Rampart on the Yukon, as the one to receive the benefit. The boy is to be with him this coming year. We shall hope to hear from him later.

The Indian race may be far enough as yet from an ideal one, but they are as capable as any of becoming good and useful citizens, and already are helping to extend the Church's influence, and men and women make sacrifices in behalf of those who are still ignorant of its blessed story.

We lately read of an Indian who had translated the Gospel of St. Luke into the Arrapahoe tongue from the original Greek. And we have a letter from an

Indian girl who wishes to be an archaeologist that she may study the antiquities of her race. She even aspires to a year at Bryn Mawr and a course at Radcliffe. We may smile and say it is in her case impracticable, but it proves what worthy ambitions towards study and intelligent interest in her people have been aroused in her. These results are due to the teaching the pupils have had in the schools which they have attended and which need the support of Christian people.

We feel that we have lost a helper and friend now that Bishop Whipple has been called from his faithful work to his reward. His life is truly an inspiration to us and the path he trod is illumined by his faith and patience.

At this distance from the field we may not be able to realize the importance of the work, nor feel the enthusiasm of the missionaries at the front, but let us try to enter into their labors, and, at last, if it may be, share in their blessed reward, sure that no work is without a blessing that is undertaken for the glory of God.

CONSTITUTION.

I. THIS Association shall be called THE INDIAN AID SOCIETY OF RHODE ISLAND.

II. Its object will be to aid in missionary work among the Indian tribes throughout our land, especially those within the jurisdiction of Niobrara.

III. The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof, annually, at least the sum of one dollar. Any one may be constituted a life member by the payment at any one time of the sum of one hundred dollars.

IV. The officers of this Association shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer. There shall be, moreover, a Board of Managers, consisting of the above-named officers, and of two ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duties it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the Association in the parishes to which they respectively belong. The methods by which the ends of this organization can be promoted are, the raising of money for the support of missionaries and teachers for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the mission; the making, collecting, and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, and the publication of papers and

pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the Indians.

V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and the Board of Managers, and to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association and to obtain and communicate to the Association any fresh information from Indian Missions; to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers; to send out notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Assistant Secretary to act and vote in the absence of the Secretary.

VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and to keep account of all the money and materials contributed for the work of the Association, and to pay all drafts upon the funds.

IX. The Constitution shall not be altered, except at the annual meeting of the Association, or at a special meeting called for that purpose by the President,—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the first Thursday in October in each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with the advice of the President, shall indicate.

II. The election of the officers and of the Board of Managers shall take place at such meeting, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall be appointed.

III. In case of the vacancy in any office by the death or removal of the incumbent, the same shall be filled at a stated meeting by the Board of Managers; and any one so selected shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV. The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the first Thursday of each month.

V. At the meeting of the Board of Managers, six members, representing not less than three parishes, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VI. In raising funds for carrying on its operations, this Society shall not resort to the questionable expedients of fairs, bazaars, tea-parties, dramatic entertainments, or any form of lottery.
