**The Rhode Island Branch
of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.**

With the cordial approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the co-operation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interest in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn of the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed.

Constitution.

I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all parishes in this diocese in the five branches of mission work, viz.: Domestic, Diocesan, Foreign, Freedmen, Indian.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer; also an Executive Committee of six ladies, who shall attend to the several branches of missionary work.

This Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between the annual meetings.

IV This society shall hold an annual meeting in Providence in October, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports of the parish secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and transacting all other business.

V. This society shall also hold meetings at stated intervals in the different parishes for mutual intercourse and information. Each parish shall send delegates to the annual meeting, also a written report to the Secretary, of the work done during the year.

VI. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Society, send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them, keep an account of the work done by the women of the diocese, as reported by the parish secretaries, and report this annually to the Secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work and for the expenses of the Society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Seven persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at the Board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the people present.

Charter.

As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at the May session 1900:

I hereby certify that Anne I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Eureka McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State according to law, their agreement to form a corporation under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid into the general Treasury of the State, the sum required by law.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Annual Meeting held in Grace Church, Providence, Thursday, November seventh. Celebration of the Holy Communion at ten o'clock.

Miss Manchester called the meeting to order at eleven o'clock. The minutes were read and approved and the Treasurer's report read and accepted. The Rev. Mr. Walton, in the absence of the Rector, gave a most cordial welcome to the Auxiliary. The Secretary then read a summary of the work of the year. The election of officers came next and the old Board were re-elected.

The President then introduced the Rev. Mr. Littell of Hankow, China, who gave a most instructive address upon his especial work.

After roll call and offertory the meeting adjourned.

At two o'clock the meeting was again called to order. The Rev. Mr. Edwards and the Rev. Mr. Chapin spoke briefly; one for the Record and the other for St. Andrew's School.

Archdeacon Hughson of Morganton made a very telling address upon his work among the mountaineers. Miss Manchester then thanked the Church and Parish for its hospitality and the meeting adjourned.

The first quarterly meeting was held in St. John's Church, Providence. Speakers, Miss Carter of Alaska, Mrs. Wetmore of North Carolina and Bishop Johnson of South Dakota.

The second quarterly meeting was held in St. Luke's, East Greenwich. The speakers were The Rev. S. H. Bishop and Mr. Malcolm S. Taylor. The monthly meetings were held as usual in Room 6 Wayland Building, No. Main St. and many interesting papers upon the missions of the Church were read.

This is the year of the United Offering and we are glad to be able to say that our offering was a large one for us.

Much good work has been done; the boxes sent for the Colored work are of much more value than for many years.

The loss of our Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Abby J. Slocum, has saddened all our hearts and we know her faithful service will never be forgotten.

May the coming year bring us new opportunities for action and many warm hearts and willing hands to carry on the work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A year ago this department felt itself justified in making an additional pledge as there had been some increase in the receipts, and it had long seemed that this branch of our Auxiliary should go forward and not remain at a standstill as it had done for many years. Accordingly the support of a bed in the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital in Wuchang, China was undertaken. Although there was prompt response from one or two sources, it was a disappointment to find it necessary at the close of the year to draw upon the general funds of the Auxiliary to complete the small sum of \$30. which is the amount of the pledge. This year when we must feel the new impulse given to all our work by the influence of the Triennial Convention, may we not hope that the entire sum may be given?

Twice in the year we have listened to most hopeful and encouraging reports direct from the field. Bishop Roots and Mr. Littell have told us of the positive and increasing influence of Christianity in China, even in districts remote from direct Christian teaching. Facts showing the breaking down of heathen customs, the loosening of the bondage in which women are held, the eager desire for Christian schools prove that China's time of awakening has come and should inspire us to have a larger part in it.

From Africa comes the news of progress in the building of the school for girls on St. Paul's River at Bromley. This is the school formerly at Cape Mount under the care of Mrs. W. R. Brierley. Now it is in charge of Mrs. Moort, the widow of the Rev. Paulus Moort, long a presbyter in the Missionary District of Cape Palmas. In this school are trained girls supported by

our Branch of the Auxiliary in memory of Mrs. Carrington and Miss Emily Waterman.

Our work in Japan is still the partial support of Miss Leila Bull.

Only a part of the \$290 which we pledge to the Board of Missions is promised to us by contributors and it often happens that a deficiency has to be made up from the general funds of the Auxiliary. A friend in renewing her subscription to the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital writes;

"It seems strange to me that there should be any special effort necessary to secure Miss Bull's salary. I had thought that many would be glad to contribute to support such a noble, consecrated worker in the field. Bishop Partridge at the Vacation Conference this summer spoke to a friend, of Miss Bull's work in the highest terms that he could possibly use. He said she was his right hand and spoke as though she were almost too good to stay on this earth."

The opportunities open to us to build and equip hospitals, to support scholarships and teachers are so many that we may not rest with doing only what we have done, we must go forward.

DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

The amount of work reported by the Domestic Secretary does not equal that of the preceeding year because several parishes have sent boxes to the Colored people and Indians which is reported elsewhere. There is a slight increase in the number of Missionary Societies who have contributed, but not as many take part in this work as we could wish. Seventeen boxes and nine barrels have been packed and shipped to North, and South Carolina, South, and West Virginia, Arkansas, Kansas, Idaho, Nebraska, New Mexico, Alaska, and Key West.

Mrs. Abby J. Slocum,

Secretary of its Diocesan department. Those of us who knew her well, have a sense of personal bereavement and all must have realized how faithfully and efficiently she carried on her work. The needs that were brought to her notice met with her ready sympathy, and when she asked for means to help them, willing hands responded to her call. In many a parish and many a home her name will be held in grateful remembrance. She was not in her usual health through the summer. Early in the fall a severe cold kept her in the house and for several weeks in her room. Early in the morning on the twenty-second of October, she was suddenly translated from her earthly home to Paradise. When the tidings reached us, sorrow filled our hearts; but for her

"Hope was changed to glad fruition
Faith to sight and prayer to praise".

Knowing that this event was ordered in the "loving wisdom of our God", we are resolved:- "That we bow in humble submission to our Father's will; that we realize that to us there is left a work to do; and that by the grace of God we will be steadfast and unmovable in the doing of it, forasmuch as we know that our labor is not in vain in the Lord".

We trust that this feeling will find a response in some heart that will take up the work that she has laid down and carry it on with the same interest and earnest purpose that she did, and that we all may be found ready when He shall come whose blessing we seek and whose face we shall behold with exceeding joy.

THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary this year gives an additional interest to all branches of its work. The Church Periodical Club feeling perhaps a special stimulus from the meetings in Richmond, Virginia.

A service was held in All Saints' Church of that city in the interests of the Church Periodical Club, at which addresses were made by the Rector, Bishop Olmsted of Central New York, and Archdeacon Stuck of Alaska; all testifying to their appreciation of the good work done by our organization.

At the conference of the C. P. C. Diocesan officers, Rhode Island was represented by your correspondent, who enjoyed the privilege of meeting fellow workers from all parts of the country.

In discussions at that conference it appeared that Rhode Island had some advantage over other dioceses, notably the possession of a large room for our head-quarters, such as we have in the Wayland building. Also the limited area of our State makes it much easier for our Librarians to join in our central work than is the case where they are separated by larger distances.

Forty-three boxes of miscellaneous literature have been sent this past year to mission stations, thus supplying needs of reading rooms, Sunday Schools and lonely districts, where reading matter is so prized for distribution.

For the first time, our attention has been called to Porto Rico and much sympathy aroused in the Church's work there, through the address of the Rev. Mr. Snavelly. We are glad to be able to send him many school-books, Sunday School papers and Christmas Cards, which he will use in his work among the

ignorant natives and the lepers in their pitiable isolation.

Between sixty and seventy dollars have been expended for the forwarding of the boxes.

The work of our branch of the C. P. C. has shown distinct life and vigor during the past year, and it is hoped that it will not fall back upon its good record this season.

Since our last annual report the United Offering for 1907 was completed, and we had the satisfaction of sending to Richmond a check for \$4500. This was a splendid increase over the amount given three years ago, but still does not represent all the parishes in the diocese. At the conference held in Richmond after the offering was presented, the following resolution was adopted;

Resolved: That the United Offering of 1910 be given to the Board of Missions for woman's work in the Mission field, including the training, sending and support of women workers; also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$15,000 be devoted to a building, or buildings, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers, that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field.

We are therefore to continue the work which has been carried on for the past six years. As more workers are needed everywhere, more will be sent out during the next three years, therefore a larger amount of money will be needed to support them. Let each Churchwoman in the Diocese of Rhode Island make up her mind now to have a share in the next United Offering.

GIRLS FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

While our Girls Friendly Society is not primarily a missionary society it is deeply interested in missions and through its fifteen parochial branches gives to some extent to missionary work both diocesan and general.

There is a department of missions in the general society; our Rhode Island Diocesan Missions Associate is Miss Clara L. Cranston who is always working in the Junior Auxiliary.

The combined work of our parochial branches gave during the year to philanthropic and missionary objects \$443.18, but of this amount only \$143.78 was given to missions of our Church.

Each year the Diocesan Council selects an object to which our missionary pennies are given at our annual service. Next May the pennies will be given to St. Mary's Orphanage.

If only our good Churchwomen were not so afraid to give the personal touch and influence to their work, they could come into the Girls Friendly Society and find there a ready force which they could interest in missions and through which they could truly spread Christ's Kingdom upon earth.

Constitution.

I. This Association shall be called THE INDIAN AID SOCIETY OF RHODE ISLAND.

II. Its object will be to aid in missionary work among the Indian tribes throughout our land, especially those within the jurisdiction of Niobrara.

III. The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof, annually, at least the sum of one dollar. Any one may be constituted a life member by the payment at any one time, of the sum of one hundred dollars.

IV The officers of this Association shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer.

There shall be moreover a board of managers, consisting of the above named officers, and of two ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duties it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the Association, in the parishes to which they respectively belong.

The methods by which the end of this organization can be promoted are, the raising of money for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the missions; the making, collecting, and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the Indians.

V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and the Board of Managers, and to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association and to obtain and communicate to the Association any fresh information from Indian Missions; to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association and of the Board of Managers, to send out notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Assistant Secretary to act and vote in absence of the Secretary.

VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and to keep account of all the money and materials contributed for the work of the Association and to pay all drafts upon the funds.

IX. The Constitution shall not be altered, except at the annual meeting of the Association, or at a Special meeting called for that purpose by the President,—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

By-Laws.

I. There shall be an annual meeting of the association on the first Tuesday in October each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with the advice of the President, shall indicate.

II. The election of the officers and of the Board of Managers shall take place at such meeting, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successors shall be appointed.

III. In case of the vacancy in office by the death or the removal of the incumbent, the same shall be filled at a stated meeting by the Board of Managers, and any one so selected, shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV. The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the first Thursday of each month.

V. At the meeting of the Board of Managers, six members, representing not less than three parishes, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VI. In raising funds for carrying on its operations, this Society shall not resort to the questionable expedients of fairs, bazaars, tea parties, dramatic entertainments, or any form of lottery.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The work of the past year was interesting but may be briefly told.

We felt at the beginning of the year that our promise to clothe ten children of the St. Elizabeth's School S. Dakota, would be almost more than we could accomplish. We have reason to be grateful to Miss McVickar for the help she gave us at the Quarterly meeting at St. John's Church, on which occasion she spoke such stirring words in our behalf that a real enthusiasm was aroused and several parishes vied with each other in their prompt response to take a boy or a girl and provide the necessary outfit. Eleven parishes contributed in this way to supply clothing at the cost of \$274.27 according to the valuation of each parish. One box and one barrel were sent to the school January ninth, value of both, including freight, \$80.

May 2, we sent the largest and most valuable box that we have ever sent, value including freight, \$234.75.

We had such grateful acknowledgment of these boxes as fully repaid us for all our efforts. We earnestly hope that the various parishes may help us in the same way this year. It has been quite impossible for two or three years past for the few who meet at the Wayland Building to accomplish much in the way of sewing. The help of the parishes who assisted us last year was greatly appreciated and we felt that they were conscious of an added interest in the work.

Our usual pledges, \$250.00 for a teacher's salary and \$100.00 for the scholarship of Arthur Wright were paid.

This Indian boy's progress in his studies is in every respect creditable to him and gratifying to his teachers and to Bishop Rowe and Rev. Mr. Prevost who have been interested in him since his early childhood.

In June we sent \$50.00 to Rev. F. W. Merrill of Oneida Wisconsin, as a recognition of the good work he has done in that mission and in consideration of the sudden and serious illness which came to him in the midst of his work and obliged him to give it into other hands.

To his successor, Rev. A. Parker Curtis, we sent \$30.00 in response to his appeal. No more grateful letters have ever been received by us than those in which they acknowledged the gift. For such work as we have done this year we thank all those who by their gifts have made it possible, and pray God will put it into their hearts to do as much, and much more than this, as the years go by.

Although the Board of the Woman's Auxiliary has prepared a memorial of Mrs. Abby J. Slocum this report would not be complete without its tribute to the memory of our dear friend who for many years has been one of our most interested and faithful members.

In our third Annual Report of the Indian Aid Society, 1875 and 1876 her name stands as Vice President. She resigned that office and though she met with us very regularly, she held no official position until six years ago when she allowed herself to be one of the representatives of St. John's Church on our Board of Managers. Just before we entered on this year's work the summons came to her to leave all earthly labors and

enter into the life that has no end.

The loss to us is very great but we try to rejoice with her
in the blessedness she has surely attained.
