**The Rhode Island Branch**

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With the cordial approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the co-operation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interest in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little, may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn of the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed.

## Constitution.

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I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all the parishes in this diocese in the five branches of mission work, viz.: Domestic, Diocesan, Foreign, Freedmen, Indian.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer; also an Executive Committee of six ladies, who shall attend to the several branches of missionary work.

This Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between the annual meetings.

IV. This society shall hold an annual meeting in Providence, in October, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports of the parish secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and transacting all other business.

V. This society shall also hold meetings at stated intervals in the different parishes for mutual inter-

course and information. Each parish shall send delegates to the annual meeting, also a written report to the Secretary of the work done during the year.

VI. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Society, send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them, keep an account of the work done by the women of the diocese, as reported by the parish secretaries, and report this annually to the Secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work and for the expenses of the Society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Seven persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at the Board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the people present.

## Charter.

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As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at the May session, 1900:

I hereby certify that Anne I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Eureka McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State, according to law, their agreement to form a corporation under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid into the general Treasury of the State the sum required by law.

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SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Annual meeting held November 7th, in the Church of the Epiphany. After the celebration of the Holy Communion, the President called the meeting to order.

The Bishop of the diocese then introduced the speakers, Bishop Root and Mrs. Root, of China, and the Rev. Mr. Snavelly, of Porto Rico.

Resolutions prepared by Miss Peckham and offered by Mrs. Arnold were read and adopted by standing vote in memory of the faithful services of Mrs. Abby J. Slocum, our diocesan secretary, who passed away October 22d, 1908.

After roll call and offertory the meeting adjourned.

At two P. M. the business meeting called to order by the President. Minutes read and approved. Treasurer's report read and accepted.

Election of officers: Old Board re-elected.

After an informal talk the meeting adjourned.

The quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in the Church of the Redeemer, Providence, on Thursday, February 6th. Notwithstanding the very bad weather the meeting was a large one. The Holy Communion was administered by the rector, Rev. Dr. Bassett, assisted by the Rev. A. W. H. Thompson, rector of All Saints' Church, Pontiac. The rector made an address of welcome to the Auxiliary and afterwards introduced the speakers.

The Rev. Mr. Clairborne, of Tennessee, spoke of the missionary work among the white people of the mountains in the South, and Archdeacon Stuck, of Alaska, spoke of the heroic work being done in Alaska by Bishop Rowe and his workers there. The Archdeacon spoke especially of the splendid work being done in various departments of work by the fifteen women who have been sent to Alaska and kept there by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church.

The quarterly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Trinity Parish, Newport, on Wednesday, May 27th, and was one of the largest meetings ever held by the Auxiliary. About three hundred from Providence and vicinity went down on a chartered steamer, the Bishop and many of the clergy being among the number. There were present large delegations from the churches in Newport and vicinity.

The rector of the parish, Rev. Stanley C. Hughes, being abroad, the curate, Rev. Elroy G. Bowers, made an address, welcoming the Auxiliary to the parish, after which the Bishop addressed the meeting.

Lunch was served in the Guild Hall of the parish, and notwithstanding the unusually large attendance, the ladies of the parish were fully equal to the occasion, and, with much manifested delight, bountifully served the large gathering. The afternoon session was held in the Guild Hall, and the President, Miss McVickar, presided. Most interesting and inspiring addresses were made by the Rev. Robb White, who has recently resigned the rectorship of St. James' Church, Cambridge, Mass., to go as a missionary to the Philippines, and Miss Florence Langdon, who has been for some time a missionary in Alaska, and Miss Elizabeth Kennard, who spoke of the work among the mountaineers of the South, where she has been working for some time.

It was felt that the meeting was one of marked success and of unusual interest, the one regret being that the time for the meeting was so limited. Incidentally, the treasury of the Auxiliary was enriched by \$63.71, which was the amount made on the chartered boat.

The Board and monthly meetings have been well attended. We have had the pleasure of hearing from Miss Wood, representing the Boone Library at Wu-chang, China, and were able to send over \$250 for that work. Chaplain Cassard, of the Naval Station at Newport, gave a most interesting address upon the Philippines. Our diocesan missionary spoke to us of the needs of "Pine Ridge," where he holds occasional services. At one meeting the Rev. Robb White gave

a most entertaining account of work among the mountains of West Virginia.

These monthly meetings are really what might be called the "clearing house" of the Auxiliary, for at this time letters are read and all are asked to take part in the meeting.

The Rev. Mr. Bradner, the Rev. Frederick Bassett, and the Rev. Mr. Hiliker gave us a most interesting report of the Convention at Jamestown.

All our pledges are filled, and we close the year with thankful hearts, hoping the coming season will find us ever ready for this great and needed work for Missions.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS.

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The Foreign department can report, as usual, all pledges completed, the six scholarships in St. John's School and the Girls' School, St. Paul's River, Cape Mount, West Africa, the pledge of a portion of the salary of Miss Bull, Bishop Partridge's helper in Osaka, Japan, and that of the support of a bed in the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital, Wuchang, China, and of our scholarship in St. Hilda's School for Girls in Wuchang.

Of the fifty-six parishes in this diocese in which there is a parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, thirty-four have contributed to this department in sums ranging from \$1 to \$25. In many cases, however, the contributions were the gifts of one individual, and do not represent active interest on the part of the Parish Branch itself. The result is, that the general funds of the Auxiliary have to be called upon every year to complete the pledged sum of \$605. This sum could easily be doubled if there were intelligent interest in the foreign work of the Church. If the *Spirit of Missions* were generally taken, as it should be, and generally read, as it deserves to be, each member of a Parish Branch, instead of one lone woman, would make some offering for this great cause. Foreign Missions

are no longer looked upon askance by intelligent people. Instead, our greatest statesmen fully appreciate the debt which our country, to say nothing of heathen nations, owes the missionary. To be ignorant or neglectful of this rapidly expanding branch of the Church's work is to be far behind the times.

One of the most effective means of reaching a heathen people is through medical missions. Surely, no one can resist the appeal which suffering humanity, especially women and children, makes to us through the hospitals in foreign lands. There seems no limit to the good which can be done to body and soul through these agencies, but there is a narrow limit put to their ability by the lack of money. Let us do the small part which we have promised, and this year completely support the bed in the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital.

At one of the monthly meetings we had the pleasure of meeting Miss M. E. Wood, of Boone College, who was in this country for the purpose of raising money for the erection of a library in connection with Boone College. The Auxiliary was able to appropriate a considerable sum for this purpose, and through the kindness of the Director of Ladd Observatory and his assistant to respond to her appeal for astronomical lantern slides by sending more than sixty slides to the college.

## DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

During this last year twenty-three churches have contributed \$321.06 to the "Penny-a-week fund." One church showed its interest in missions in our own Diocese by contributing \$84, which was the largest sum received from any one parish.

## THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

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The Church Periodical Club reports satisfactory work accomplished in the past year, as shown by a more widespread interest throughout the diocese. One new branch has been formed in Emmanuel Church, Newport, which has already taken an active part in sending away magazines and boxes. The librarians from the older branches have been faithful in extending the interest in the C. P. C. in their respective parishes, and many of them have come week by week to help assort the periodicals sent to our room No. 6, in the Wayland building, and pack the boxes for shipping. To quote from Rhode Island's report to the New York C. P. C. central office last June, we sent away (from June, 1907, to June, 1908,) 46 boxes of literature, which contained 1,412 bound books, 7,562 miscellaneous magazines, 3,542 cards, besides Bibles, prayer books, music, games and pictures, in every respect a gain over the preceding year. We mean to do even better this year, if possible, but this will depend upon how much money is placed at our disposal, as we must have that in hand before we can ship our boxes, which are invariably sent freight prepaid. Fifteen parishes made donations for this last year, the sum amounting to \$92.

It is gratifying to find some of the out-of-town parishes offering to send away boxes of literature; those that have responded in this way are St. Luke's, East Greenwich; St. James', Woonsocket; St. Michael's, Bristol; Trinity, Pawtucket; Emmanuel, Newport, and Church of the Ascension, Wakefield.

We would urge a more general response by individuals in all the parishes, in offering to send away their magazines month by month to addresses always available through your correspondent. These papers sent regularly give so much pleasure to the recipients, living perhaps in lonely districts where reading matter is scarce and expensive, and, therefore, impossible to obtain, so is it not worth the little trouble it may cost us who send these periodicals away, to feel that we are sharing them with our distant friends in the Church and thereby cheering many a lonely hour of our less favored brothers and sisters.

## GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

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The Diocesan Organization of the Girls' Friendly Society has completed its twenty-second year with the largest number of Branches in the diocese which it has ever had; 21 is the number. During the past year five new Branches have been formed, St. James, Providence; St. David's, Philipsdale; Church of the Ascension, Wakefield; St. Mark's, Riverside; Trinity, Newport.

In May the Diocesan President sent a short report to the secretary of the Diocesan Convention requesting it might be presented to the Convention. The Convention received the report and ordered it printed with its proceedings.

One other event in the society is its incorporation by the state. The officers, with the consent of the G. F. S. Diocesan Council, applied to the Legislature for a charter, which was granted, so now we are a corporate body with power to hold property. To be owners of a holiday house is very desirable, and some day it is hoped the society may be able to own its house.

The subject of the G. F. S. A. Endowment Fund has been considerably discussed during the year, \$50 from the proceeds of the "Diocesan Tea," which was held last winter, have been given to it, and at the May Con-

ference it was voted to devote the offering at the Annual Service in May, 1909, to that object.

The summer at the Holiday House in Saunderstown has certainly been a successful and satisfactory one, the new matron was efficient and most acceptable to everyone, and the assistant also filled her place well, winning the affection of all the girls.

From October nineteenth until the twenty-third the general G. F. S. A. meetings were held in Boston. Several Rhode Island associates and members were there; it was a pity all were not, for the meetings were so helping and interesting, and that great service in Trinity Church was most inspiring. One important thing done in Boston was the decision to discontinue publishing the *Girls' Friendly Magazine* after December, and to issue in its stead a quarterly, free to all members. This will give news of the society, and thus make a better informed membership.

It is earnestly hoped that prosperity is in store for the society, but mere external prosperity will count for little unless there is the true underlying motive in the work of love to God and to our fellows, and in particular the expression of this love to each other in the Girls' Friendly Society, helping to truly bear each other's burdens.

## Constitution.

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I. This Association shall be called THE INDIAN AID SOCIETY OF RHODE ISLAND.

II. Its object will be to aid in missionary work among the Indian tribes throughout our land, especially those within the jurisdiction of Niobrara.

III. The Association shall consist of all persons who shall contribute to the treasury thereof, annually, at least the sum of one dollar. Any one may be constituted a life member by the payment at any one time, of the sum of one hundred dollars.

IV. The officers of this Association shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer. There shall be moreover, a board of managers, consisting of the above named officers, and of two ladies from each parish represented in the Association, whose duties it shall be to regulate its affairs, and, under the supervision of their rectors, to further the work of the Association in the parishes to which they respectively belong.

The methods by which the end of this organization can be promoted are, the raising of money for the education of those who may be preparing for the work, and for other benevolent purposes connected with the

missions; the making, collecting, and transfer of clothing, and other material aid, the publication of papers and pamphlets that may serve to stir up a public interest in the welfare of the Indians.

V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the business meetings of the Association and the Board of Managers, and to call special meetings of the same when occasion shall arise.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association and to obtain and communicate to the Association any fresh information from Indian Missions; to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association, and of the Board of Managers, to send out notices of the stated and special meetings of the same, and to prepare an annual report.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Assistant Secretary to act and vote in absence of the Secretary.

VIII. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and to keep account of all the money and materials contributed for the work of the Association and to pay all drafts upon the funds.

IX. The Constitution shall not be altered, except at the annual meeting of the Association, or at a Special meeting called for that purpose by the President,—notice of the proposed change having been given at a stated meeting of the Board of Managers.

### By-Laws.

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I. There shall be an annual meeting of the Association on the first Tuesday in October in each year, at such hour and place as the Secretary, with the advice of the President, shall indicate.

II. The election of the officers and of the Board of Managers shall take place at such meeting, and they shall continue in office for one year, or until their successor shall be appointed.

III. In case of the vacancy in office by the death or the removal of the incumbent, the same shall be filled at a stated meeting by the Board of Managers, and any one so selected, shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the Association.

IV. The stated meetings of the Board of Managers shall be on the first Thursday of each month.

V. At the meeting of the Board of Managers, six members, representing not less than three parishes, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VI. In raising funds for carrying on its operations, this Society shall not resort to the questionable expedients of fairs, bazaars, tea parties, dramatic entertainments, or any form of lottery.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

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This is our thirty-fifth annual report. The Society represents the Indian work for the diocese, and it is gratifying to note that the number of parishes contributing has gradually increased. This year twenty parishes are on the Treasurer's list. This is less than half the diocese, and we hope the time is not distant when every parish will be represented.

Of those who have been accustomed to meet every week for six months of the year to sew for the Indians many have been called from their service on earth to the higher service of heaven, and very few are left. We have given up our weekly meetings, as the Indian women, especially the wives of the catechists, prefer to receive the goods not made up and do the sewing themselves. It speaks well for their training that it is so, and is another incentive to us to continue to help the race to rise higher in civilization and in Christian living.

In the year just past we have sent two boxes of clothing and household goods to two catechists under the Rev. Philip J. Deloria, an Indian priest of South Dakota. In these two families there were no children.

Our pledges are for salary of teacher in St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota, \$250, and Scholarship

for Arthur Wright, \$100. In the year upon which we are entering our first work will be to supply the families of two catechists under Rev. Amos Ross, of South Dakota, in one of which there are six children, ages one to sixteen years; in the other are two children, one of seven years and one two months. It will be seen that these two boxes call for a much larger expenditure of money than those of last year. They ask for a business suit for each man, material for a woolen dress and a cotton dress for each woman, underwear for men, women and children, bleached and unbleached muslin, gingham for aprons, red tablecloths and napkins, towels, toilet soap, blankets, shoes, stockings, shawls, overcoats (second-hand, if in very good order), needles, buttons, pins and thread, and scraps of thick pieces for comforters. One family asks for a dinner set.

We shall need a generous supply of money, and we hope our good friends will find it possible to furnish us with plenty of that commodity, that when we begin our shopping for these numerous articles after Christmas we may go out with gladness and fill such boxes as will carry comfort and pleasure to the worthy people who are to receive them. Their salaries are very small, and they work very hard to make the Gospel of Jesus Christ Our Lord known to their race. Bishop Hare makes a special plea for his catechists, and whatever he asks of us we are very, very anxious to do.

We are not satisfied to spend only the same amount year after year in this important work. The results of

our faithful missionaries' work among the Indians have been wonderfully encouraging. Even the Indian women have by the work of their own hands paid many thousands of dollars into the treasury of the Lord.

Let our offerings continue to be given freely more and more as the years go by, that the kingdom of God may come in all the world, and that we may have a part in the glorious consummation.


