## **The Rhode Island Branch**

OF THE

### **Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.**

---

With the cordial approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the co-operation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interest in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little, may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn of the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed:

## Constitution.

---

I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all the parishes in this diocese in the five branches of mission work, viz.: Domestic, Diocesan, Foreign, Freedmen, Indian.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer; also an Executive Committee of six ladies, who shall attend to the several branches of missionary work.

This Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between the annual meetings.

IV. This society shall hold an annual meeting in Providence, in October, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports of the parish secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, and transacting all other business.

V. This society shall also hold meetings at stated intervals in the different parishes for mutual inter-



course and information. Each parish shall send delegates to the annual meeting, also a written report to the Secretary of the work done during the year.

VI. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Society, send notices of the meetings, and keep a record of them, keep an account of the work done by the women of the diocese, as reported by the parish secretaries, and report this annually to the Secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work and for the expenses of the Society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Seven persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at the Board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the people present.

## Charter.

---

As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island at the May session, 1900:

I hereby certify that Anne I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Eureka McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State, according to law, their agreement to form a corporation under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid into the general Treasury of the State the sum required by law.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The annual meeting was held in St. Stephen's Church, Providence, Thursday, November 3d. Miss Manchester in the chair. After the celebration of the Holy Communion the regular meeting opened with an address of welcome from the Rector, the Rev. Dr. Fiske. The speakers, Bishop Spaulding, of Utah, Rev. Mr. Betticher, of Fairbanks, Alaska, and the Rev. L. C. Sanford, bishop-elect of San Joaquin, California, gave most interesting accounts of their special fields of work. After roll call and offertory the meeting adjourned. At 2 o'clock meeting called to order, and after the reports of the various officers had been received the election of officers followed, and the old Board, with the addition of Miss Mary Henshaw as

secretary of the Indian Aid, were all re-elected. During the meeting frequent and tender allusions were made upon the death of our loved Bishop McVickar and special prayers of thanksgiving for his life and work, and for our Bishop-elect. Resolutions upon the death of Bishop McVickar were presented and adopted with a standing vote. After thanks to the Parish for its ever generous hospitality and the singing of Bishop McVickar's favorite hymn, "Lord, speak to me that I may speak," the meeting adjourned.

The first quarterly meeting was held in St. John's Church, Providence, Celebration of the Holy Communion. Bishop Perry Celebrant. After a few words of welcome from the Rector, Rev. Mr. Bradner, the Bishop took charge of the meeting, speaking in a most encouraging way of all our work stood for and his own great pleasure in being present to meet the Church women of his diocese.

Speakers of the morning, Bishop Atwood, of Arizona, Miss Phelps, of Wuchang, China, and Mrs. Wetmore, of Chiot School, Arden, N. C., showed us the great possibilities and what had been accomplished in their fields of labor. After roll call and offertory the meeting adjourned. Meeting called to order at 2 o'clock in the Parish House, Miss McVickar presiding. All business reports were omitted. After lively discussion voted to charge fifteen cents for luncheon at all the large meetings of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Upton and Miss Anthony reported upon the coming Jubilee for Foreign Missions, to be held in this city March 10th and 11th. Meeting adjourned.



The second quarterly meeting was held at Wickford. The morning service was held in the old Church of St. Paul built in 1707. The Rector, the Rev. Richard Graham, gave the Auxiliary a most cordial welcome, and Bishop Perry made a most interesting address upon the history of the old church. Miss McVickar being absent on account of illness, Miss Manchester presided. Minutes read and approved. Treasurer's report received. Reports of the various departments of work followed. Mrs. Upton, Foreign Secretary, alluded most gracefully to Mrs. Arnold's long service of twenty-five years as secretary. The afternoon meeting was held in the new St. Paul's at 2 o'clock, Bishop Perry presiding. Miss Manchester called attention to Mrs. Arnold's services and Mrs. Upton offered the following motion: That the thanks of the Auxiliary be extended to Mrs. Arnold for her twenty-five years of devoted service and recommending that this expression of their appreciation be placed upon the record, carried unanimously with a rising vote. Mrs. Arnold thanked the Auxiliary for their kindness and patience during her long but happy service. The Bishop then introduced the Rev. Mr. Goodman, missionary to Pt. Hope, Alaska, who spoke most feelingly of his work and asked our prayers for his success. Miss Clara Neely, of Japan, gave a very detailed but interesting account of her special work. Mr. George Gordon King, treasurer of the Board of Missions, explained the business methods of the Board, telling us of the apportionment. After an expression of thanks for

hospitality to the parish the meeting adjourned. The Board and monthly meetings have been well attended. A room having been assigned us in the Bishop McVickar Memorial House, 66 Benefit Street, our third Friday, meetings are held there. We have had the pleasure of having the Rev. Mr. Graham speak upon the "Edinboro Conference," before the Providence Jubilee. We had a Mrs. Hall, who had been a missionary in West Africa, speak most entertainingly upon her work in that far away land, and the Diocesan missionary is heard from about his work, so we feel justified in asking you to come to these meetings, knowing you will be pleased. We could not get along without our rooms in the Wayland Building for other parts of our work. Mrs. Abby L. Chesbrough, one of our vice-presidents, has passed away to life eternal during the past year. She was ever interested in all our work and gave generously for its support.

\* During the past year several new Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have been formed, and we hope that the missionary secretaries in every parish under any other name will change to that of the Woman's Auxiliary.

From the Foreign work Mrs. Upton reports pledges filled. A fund, amounting to \$1,531.43 realized from the Jubilee of Foreign Missions held in Providence in March was sent to aid in placing St. Margaret's School, Tokio, on the basis required by the Japanese government. The Committee, consisting of Mrs. Winslow Upton, Mrs. John H. Stiness, Mrs. Les-



ter Bradner, Jr., Miss Clara Cranston and Miss Mary B. Anthony, rendered most satisfactory service, and this committee was made a permanent one that our church may keep in touch with the "Central Committee" of the Jubilee.

Last summer through the efforts of a number of the Auxiliary in Emmanuel Church, Newport, a sum of money was sent to Miss Bull in Osaka, Japan, to be used for her carfare in the city as she goes from place to place in her work among women. Those who contributed to this helpful gift believed that Miss Bull should save her strength rather than her money for her work, as she had been in the habit of doing. She writes in reply that the thoughtful gift has been "received with the deepest appreciation, and I thank you most heartily for [the gift] and for the sympathy and interest which they show for the mission and for me."

"As I read your regret that so few of the Newport Church ladies know anything definite about their beneficiary in Japan I feel conscience stricken that I have not written oftener to the Branch to report what is being done. I do make good resolutions about writing in time for your annual meeting, but the work right under my hands is so insistent and there are so many interruptions that the time is past before I realize it."

The Domestic Department reports forty boxes and barrels and twenty-nine packages sent to Alaska, Colorado, Kansas, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Ari-

zona, Oklahoma, North and South Carolina, Florida and New Hampshire.

Total valuation, \$2,719.30.

From the Indian Aid we learn that of the sixty-seven parishes and missions in the diocese twenty-seven have contributed to the Indian Aid Department during the past year. This is a gain of six over the year before, but we shall not be satisfied until *all* give *something*. During the past few years the Indian work has lost several of its most loyal supporters. It is most necessary that new contributors come forward to take the place of the faithful friends who are gone—otherwise this important work, instead of increasing, must inevitably diminish year by year. The "Indian Shower" given by the Church of the Messiah, was as successful as it was original, and resulted in forty-five dollars' worth of useful articles for St. Elizabeth's School, South Dakota. Are there not some others who would like to follow their example? The secretary will gladly furnish a list of articles needed for the boxes.

The Colored work has paid its pledges, and a little gain is reported in the number of parishes contributing.

Our penny-a-week fund has enabled the Diocesan Secretary to meet all calls made upon her department.

From the Junior Auxiliary twelve branches worked during the year. Boxes were sent to Pt. Hope, Alaska,



and Fairbanks, Alaska. One of the most encouraging features was the growth of the Branch at Trinity, Newport, from twelve to ninety-one members in a year's time. The Diocesan President visited and spoke at nearly all the Branches during the year.

The United Offering the first year after General Convention grows very slowly. Thus far only eighteen churches have contributed, the amount received being \$628.37. This is a fair beginning, but much better results are hoped for during the coming year.

The work of the R. I. Branch of the Church Periodical Club has continued through the past year, as heretofore, with its weekly meetings on Thursday mornings in the rooms at the Wayland building. There several of the librarians have met regularly with the correspondent, and packed boxes of miscellaneous magazines and books, which have been sent to mission stations in the Southern states, to isolated parts of our New England states, to one of our Army posts in the Philippine Islands, and to Alaska, and three Christmas boxes have gone, one to Nevada and two to West Rutland and neighboring mission stations in Vermont. For all of these we have had most grateful and appreciative thanks. The year's record of boxes sent is a good one—forty-seven in all, which does not include large bundles of magazines that have been sent to the sailors in Providence harbor, to the hospitals in the city, and to different points in Alaska by mail.

The other branch of our work does not stand so well, the dispensing of magazines by the subscriber to individuals at a distance, week by week, or month by month. In this department Rhode Island ought to have a better record than the small total of 156 distributed, and if we consider how much pleasure and profit we obtain through the magazines that come regularly into our homes, we ought to be willing to take the little trouble it requires to pass these on to less favored persons, who cannot afford to subscribe themselves. Addresses for such donations of both secular and religious publications can always be readily obtained through the parish librarians.

Ten parishes have contributed to the Babies' Branch the past year, and money has been sent to hospitals and kindergartens, the apportionment has also been paid.

From the Girls' Friendly the following report is received:

The past year has been an active year in the Girls' Friendly Society in Rhode Island, particularly along social service lines, but some work has been done for missions as well.

There have been many informal talks in the Branch meetings upon missionary topics, the subjects being the Oberammagau Passion Play, Women's Foreign Missions Jubilee, Forward Movement, Missions in China, Labrador, Philippines, work among the Indians and work in Foreign, Domestic and Diocesan fields. One Branch has had a missions study class.



Boxes have been sent amounting in value to \$181.55,  
and \$28.10 have been sent in money.

Our work has been during the year most successful.  
We took our place in the "Jubilee" and our efficient  
committee doing most excellent service.

Let us still be up and doing.
