ANNUAL ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT

We are now closing a year of our lives as members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. It has been a very important year, a very eventful year, and a year of great seriousness. Problems of every kind have pressed upon us. Sadness and sorrow and turmoil are on every hand. How have we met them? We must look back and pray for forgiveness for our shortcomings, and we must pray also for help in our future duties, for God alone knows what these may be, and the strength that He must give us to perform them. This has been peculiarly a season of prayer, and it seems to me that, in the light of the complications that have come to us in our country, we must feel that it was the guiding finger of God, nothing short of it, that influenced our leaders in the Church Missions House to prepare for us a Pilgrimage of Prayer. You know *we* had our turn here in Rhode Island during Christmas week. Now it is going on its course, and it will traverse the entire country from the Atlantic Coast to the Pacific, from the Canadian borders to the Gulf of Mexico. In turn each week every diocese in our land will be offering these prayers. May it not be that they have been especially appointed to prepare us, as Church women, as communicants of the

American Church, to meet the terrible crises that have come to us.

The first thing for which we are to pray is the unity of Christ's Church. In praying for the unity of Christ's Church, is it not that we also pray as a nation, one great unit? Now that nation calls upon all its citizens to do his and her bit. So the Church as one great family of God, the common father, is calling in a peculiar way to each of her children to do his or her bit.

The second heading for our combined prayers reads, "the binding together of the hearts of His people in the bonds of love." As God's first request, His first admonition, we are told to love one another. Let this love bind us together for service and self-sacrifice, for unselfishness and brotherly-kindness. This will surely help us as we meet the problems of our town, and of our country, quite as well as those of our Church. Both press upon us and both must be regarded as duties to be faced and undertaken by us Christian women.

Then follows the prayer for the spread of His Kingdom through all the world. That, of course, means nothing to us as the auxiliaries to the Board of Missions if it doesn't mean that we shall "speed the message glorious." And how can we speed it better than maintaining those missions where Christ's Gospel and His Life are taught? How can we possibly consider ourselves as faithful members of His church or faithful citizens of a Christian land if we

don't keep up, as far as it is possible for us to do, that work of the Church which carries the cross together with the flag?

Then comes the petition that peace may prevail among the nations, among the divided members of Christ's body. Surely, in no other way can peace be brought about so well as loving one another, as helping to lead these distraught, suffering nations to see what Christ wants with them, to be a loving child, a loving nation, in God's family of nations; not a hating, not a savage, not a barbarous character, but a loving one.

Then we pray that organizations formed for good may work in loving harmony together for the one great aim, of making Christ's name better known. There our church gives us a slight hint of reproof, and it is one that we deserve, no doubt, because she remembers that her children are human and that there are sometimes over-ardent enthusiasms which create jealousies, and here we are cautioned not to be jealous, but to set aside all idea of self, and work as just one of this great family for the good of all the others, in our particular line, as we are trained, as we are directed, by our leaders, of course, and according to the light that is in us, which is a very peculiar one as communicants of the Church, but not to check, and not to thwart other efforts which are made for the cause of humanity and for the love of Christ.

"That our enterprises of love and study and gifts

and prayer may be blessed through the outpouring of the Spirit upon our souls." That is our next petition. The Church points very clearly there that the Holy Spirit Himself must guide and direct us, must ever be over us. He certainly is with us if we pray to Him earnestly, and if we listen to our consciences, we may feel that He is guiding us in the way in which God, our Father, would have us go.

At the end of the petition, that our fellow Christians, untouched as yet, may be led to pray and work and give. Upon us devolves a great responsibility in this respect. If *we* are true, active witnesses to the power of the Holy Ghost, and to the joy of service in Christ's name and under His banner, the cross, our fellow Christians will want to join us in our work for Him; so let us endeavour to take them by the hand and, working within the blessed fold of our mother Church, add to that family which shall bow the knee to God, our Father, and come at last into His Glorious Kingdom, where we are told the nations shall throw down their crowns before Him. That, it seems to me, is what this year should mean to us, and what our Church has tried to teach us in our Pilgrimage of Prayer.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The last Annual Meeting was held in St. Luke's Church, East Greenwich, on Wednesday, May 24th. Celebration of the Holy Communion at 10:00 A. M. The Bishop presided at the regular meeting at 11:00 o'clock. The Rector, the Rev. A. Conover, welcomed the Auxiliary for his Parish. The first speaker was the Rt. Rev. H. R. Hulse, Bishop of Cuba, who gave very interesting details of his work. Miss Hopwood, of Anking, China, spoke of her special work among young girls in China and was very enthusiastic over the possibilities of the future. She especially pleaded for a little chapel which is so needed. After roll call, offertory and prayers, the meeting adjourned. At 2:00 P. M. the meeting was called to order by Mrs. J. H. Coggeshall, who presided in the absence of the President. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The annual reports of Secretary and Treasurer were read and accepted. Reports were received from all the departments of work, showing good work done by all the Secretaries. By special request, Miss Hopwood spoke again upon her work in China. Voted to send a message of sympathy to the President, Mrs. Howard Hoppin, who was detained at home by illness. Mrs. Cady made a report of the raising of the \$1600.00 fund for a helper in Alaska. After a

vote of thanks to Rector and parish, for hospitality received, the meeting adjourned.

The first Quarterly Meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, Pawtucket, November 9th. Celebration of the Holy Communion at 10:30 A. M., the Bishop being the celebrant. Bishop Perry presided at the meeting at 11:00 o'clock. The rector, the Rev. Marion Law, welcomed most cordially the Auxiliary to his parish. The speakers were the Rt. Rev. Logan H. Roots, Bishop of Hankow, China, and the Rt. Rev. C. H. Brent, Bishop of the Philippine Islands. A large congregation was present. After roll call and offertory, the meeting adjourned.

At 2:00 P. M., the meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Howard Hoppin, who gave a most inspiring account of the meeting of the Auxiliary at the General Convention at St. Louis, and mentioned several small pledges made for our Auxiliary. Reports were read from the various departments of work. Mrs. Arnold made an appeal for a scholarship at the St. Andrew's School, as a memorial to Mrs. William Ames, who was for eighteen years the beloved President of the Auxiliary. It was voted to do so unanimously. It was suggested that every parish give at least \$2.00 for this object. After prayers, the meeting adjourned.

A Quarterly Meeting was held at St. Stephen's Church, Providence, Thursday, February 1st. Celebration of the Holy Communion at 10:00 o'clock. The morning session was held at 11:00 o'clock, the

Bishop presiding. The Rev. Dr. Fiske welcomed the Auxiliary to his parish. The speakers were the Rt. Rev. N. S. Thomas, Bishop of Wyoming, and the Rev. Charles S. Reifsnider, of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, Japan. After roll call and offertory, the meeting adjourned.

At 2:00 P. M. the meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Howard Hoppin. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Treasurer's report read and accepted. The reports of the several secretaries were read and accepted. The President introduced Mrs. Walter Hughson of Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C., who told of the needs of that work. The next speaker was Miss Eva D. Corey (Educational Secretary of the Diocese of Massachusetts). After prayers, the meeting adjourned.

The regular Board Meetings have been well attended and several special meetings have been held. The first third Friday meeting was held in the Parish House of the Church of the Ascension, Auburn, October 20th. In the absence of the President, Mrs. J. H. Coggeshall called the meeting to order and reports were received from several of the secretaries. The Rev. Mr. Meader welcomed the Auxiliary to his parish. Mrs. Henry Lippitt, the new Junior Auxiliary President, gave an interesting account of the work of the Juniors. The Rev. Mr. Maslin, from Shanghai, gave an entertaining account of his work in the boys' schools of that city. After

the adjournment, tea was served by the ladies of the Parish.

The second third Friday meeting was held in the Parish House of All Saints' Church, December 15th. Although the day was snowy, there was a good attendance. Mrs. Hoppin read Miss Emery's letter on "The Pilgrimage of Prayer," and spoke of arrangement having been made by the parishes to observe Rhode Island week, December 24th to 31st. Reports were then received. The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Emerson, announced a Normal Mission Study Class to meet Thursdays at 66 Benefit Street. Mrs. Hoppin introduced the Rev. Mr. Hefflon, Missionary to the Deaf Mutes, who gave a very interesting account of his work. At the close of the meeting, he called for a deaf mute and her hearing daughter to interpret two stanzas of "Nearer, My God, to Thee." Meeting adjourned.

The January third Friday meeting was held in the Parish House of the Church of the Advent, Pawtucket. The meeting opened with prayer. The President introduced the Rev. Father Harrison of St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tenn. He gave an illustrated talk upon his work in that mountain region. Mrs. Hoppin then called for reports of work. After these were read and received, the meeting adjourned. Tea was served by the ladies of the parish. A pleasant social hour was enjoyed by all.

A service of "Quiet Hours," conducted by the

Bishop, was held in St. Stephen's Church, Providence, on March 24th.

A third Friday meeting was held in the Parish House of St. Thomas', Greenville, on April 20th. Meeting opened with prayer. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Reports of work were received. Miss Mary Henshaw, Indian Missions, gave a most interesting account of the meeting at Lake Mohonk.

Since the last Annual Meeting, a much beloved member of our Board, Miss Eliza A. Peckham, has passed to life eternal. We were remembered in her will and gratefully accept her thought of us for our future work.

The reports of the Secretaries will be given separately.

In giving this, my last report after thirty years of service as Secretary, I wish to express my appreciation of the kindness and consideration shown me by the Board and members of this Auxiliary.

May God prosper this work in the future as He has done in the past.

IN MEMORIAM

It is fitting that mention should be made at this time of the life of Miss Eliza Almy Peckham, one of the oldest and most devoted members of Grace Church, who passed into life eternal on November twenty-second, 1916. She was confirmed there in 1862, and of her it may well be said that "she continued Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto her life's end." In the unassuming nature of her constant devotion to all good works, and in the purity of her character, she has given to the Church a life which is an enduring part of its spiritual associations, and for which we shall give thanks. The history of the work of the Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary is closely identified with Miss Peckham and her efforts. She was one of the Charter Members of the Indian Aid Society, which was organized in 1873 and which was in 1909 merged into the Auxiliary, and until her death she held the office of Vice-President of the Auxiliary. After her death it was found that she had bequeathed one thousand dollars to the Auxiliary, the interest of which was to be applied to the work among the Indians. She was devoted to this work during her life, and "in death her works do follow her."

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Foreign Department

Twenty-nine of the fifty-eight parishes and missions of this Diocese contributed to the work of this department of the Auxiliary in China, Africa, Mexico and Japan. Our pledges for the year were completed and with the help of individual contributors we were enabled to send \$96.43 to St. Agnes School.

The newly formed Newport County Woman's Auxiliary and the Guild of the Holy Cross, Middletown, sent \$449.00 to the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China, and the active Crosby Branch of St. George's, Newport, has sent specials to China, Mexico and Japan.

A special need this year is a fund for the Elizabeth Bunn Memorial Hospital which is the woman's hospital to be connected with the new Church General Hospital in Wuchang.

Thirty-seven boxes have been sent as follows:

- 9 personal boxes for missionaries and their families.
- 9 general boxes to schools and hospitals.
- 6 boxes to Tigara (Point Hope) Alaska.

13 boxes to the "mountain whites" of North Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee.

Thirty-four parishes have taken part in the work.

Monetary contributions have been sent to Alaska, St. Paul's Mission (Lee's Summitt, Missouri), Oklahoma, New Mexico, Wyoming and Porto Rico.

The Junior Auxiliary contributed a generous donation of \$35.00 and various articles for the Alaskan Boxes.

The total valuation of \$2,394.58, while not so large as last year, is gratifying in that it represents in almost every case the exact valuation of new articles and is not an amount set upon second hand clothing.

Junior Auxiliary

This was sent away on the 16th of November, and on the 15th an interesting meeting was held at St. Stephen's Parish House, Providence. The Christmas gifts for the box were exhibited, and a lecture, illustrated by lantern slides, was given by the Rev. Mr. Phillips of Newport, a sometime resident of Sewanee, and one who was able to tell us much of interest about Sewanee and the people to whom our box was to go. During the winter, yarn has been given out by Deaconess Semle, to those who wished to make knitted garments to go to Alaska. This yarn was purchased with money left from our apportionment fund of last year. Subscriptions to three magazines have also been given from the same fund, one sent to Miss Marjorie Reese, Salt Lake City; one to Ruth J. Lowery, Troy, Alabama; and one to Dr. Barker, Say, Oklahoma.

Our Winter Meeting of the Council took place January 7th, at the Bishop McVickar House. It was decided that our Christmas boxes this year should go to the Indians, and the Church Missions House have given us 100 Indian boys and 100 Indian

girls at Lower Brule Mission, Lower Brule, South Dakota, to provide for.

On the 11th of March, Bishop Perry conducted a very helpful and inspiring quiet hour for the leaders and older Juniors, in the Chantry of St. John's, Providence. We were grateful for his encouragement and inspiration.

Just previous to Lent, Deaconess Semle conducted a Mission Study Class for leaders, so that they would be prepared to carry on the course with their branches.

The Spring Meeting was held at Trinity Church, Bristol, on the 5th of May. At the service which was held in the morning, our apportionment was presented, and the Rev. G. H. Madara of Alaska spoke in the afternoon. Miss Ruoff conducted the conference, while the Council Meeting was being held.

While missions are part of its work, it is by no means its entire work, but almost every branch has either studied or given something to missions this past year. One study class has been held, and many lectures given upon the following topics:

St. Mary's Orphanage; Wyoming; Spokane; Japan; United Offering; New Mexico; Tennessee; North Carolina; Alaska; Utah; Latin America.

It might quite properly be reckoned as missionary work; a home was found for a lame girl, and a boarding school education is being given to another girl.

The Educational Department

The Educational Department reports a Normal Class held at the Bishop McVickar House Monday mornings during January and February; subject: Latin America; seventeen parish classes in Mission Study during Lent; lantern slides in various parishes;

missionary talks and meetings in others, all illustrative of the Church's work in South America. Dr. Arthur Gray's book, *Latin America*, was used for text book. An offering was made by one class for the mission at El Coto. Other small sums have been given for the same cause. A most enthusiastic meeting was held in Newport under Miss Sturges and Miss Crosby, when an offering of \$313.00 was made from the United Mission Study Classes, for the Wuchang Hospital.

Good as the report is, it does not meet the expectation of our Board, nor will it do so, until there is some form of missionary education in every parish in Rhode Island. We believe that the Mission Study Class is one of the most effective means for the advancement of God's Kingdom—because its chief purpose is to deepen and strengthen the spiritual life. And it behooves us as active, loyal Christians in the midst of the suffering and misery of the present day, to realize that the mission entrusted to the Church for the healing of the nations, and only as every member makes vital in the life of the world, the Church's mission, can God's purpose be fulfilled, and His peace established.

Charter

*As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island
at the May session, 1900.*

I hereby certify that Anne I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Eurette McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State, according to law, their agreement to form a corporation under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid into the general Treasury of the State the sum required by law.

**The Rhode Island Branch
of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions**

With the cordial approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the coöperation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interest in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little, may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn of the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed.

Constitution

I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all the parishes in the diocese in the ten branches of mission work, viz.:

Foreign, Domestic, Indian, Colored Diocesan, Junior Auxiliary, United Offering, Church Periodical Club, Educational and Girls' Friendly.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer; also an Executive Committee of ten women who shall attend to the several branches of missionary work.

The Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between the annual meetings.

IV. This society shall hold an annual meeting in May, for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports of the department secretaries, electing delegates to the general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and transacting all other business.

The Board meeting on the third Friday in every month from September to June at 10:00 A. M., in the Bishop McVickar House, 66 Benefit Street, followed by a public meeting at 11:00 o'clock.

Meetings shall be held at stated intervals in different parishes.

Special meetings may be called by the President or upon the request of three members.

V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. The Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all meetings and an account

of the work done by the women of the diocese, as reported by the department secretaries, and report this annually to the Secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct all the correspondence of the society and send notices of all meetings.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work and for the expenses of the Society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Fifteen persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at the Board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the people present.
