ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE PRESIDENT

In this last year before the Triennial of 1919, efforts have been made by committees appointed at the last Triennial to secure from all dioceses answers to certain questionnaires necessary for the reports that must be presented at our meeting in Detroit next October. In the replies thus secured from parishes in our diocese, it is evident that the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions is regarded by some of the clergy and many of their people, as only one of many organizations for work, which would claim time and money from women who are already so over-burdened with the demands of their legitimate parish activities as to preclude the chance of launching "anything else" among such busy people. We would plead for a readjustment in the minds of these Church people to enable them to regard those who represent the cause of Missions not as a separate society, but rather as a committee whose particular duty it is to bring to all women in the Church the opportunity and privilege of joining in the extension of our Church life into new fields both at home and abroad. We have conspicuously before us now, the possibility of such a plan, in the work of the Red Cross, which is successfully carried out through every kind of organization in the community, enlisting the help of all sorts of civic and religious bodies. Why should not the needs of sufferers in the spiritual combat be made to ap-

peal in a similar way to all groups of men and women in our Church? Now is the time for us to apply the lessons learned in the emergencies of war, to our Church work, which in many instances has suffered from the energy and gifts of Church people being diverted into other channels. The report from the Treasurer of the Board of Missions of a deficit of \$267,000 tells the sad consequences of such conditions. Let us Church women resolve that in this new year opening for us with the blessing of promised Peace, we will strive more earnestly than ever before to uphold all parish and diocesan activities for the betterment of our community life and the extension of the Gospel message into regions beyond.

The recent change of our Auxiliary working year from May to January, makes us pause to take account of our stewardship in Epiphanytide, which is the season when the Church's missionary aspect is specially emphasized and is therefore, an appropriate new year for us. As we follow the life of the Christ Child through His epiphanies, let us take for our watchword one of His own sayings, "Wist ye not that I must be about My Father's business?" This will remind us of our close and sacred relation with Him, as Father and child, and should enable us, His dear children to bear such faithful witness for Him as may show Him to all nations as our Father and their Father, and hasten the day when His name may be hallowed in all the world.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

Since the last report was published the chief event in the annals of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese was the Provincial Conference held in Grace Church, Providence, in October, 1917, when Rhode Island entertained the Diocesan officers of the Province of New England. Fifty-six delegates attended and represented all the New England Dioceses except Vermont. The Conference was most helpful and the services inspiring. Our thanks are due to Rev. Philemon F. Sturges, Dean Rousmaniere of Boston, Miss Grace Lindley, General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, Miss Eva Corey of Boston, Mrs. Walter Alexander of New York, Bishop Lloyd and Bishop Perry, who addressed the meetings and contributed to the success of the two days' program.

The last Annual Meeting of the Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in May 1918, but to coincide with the work of the Board of Missions in New York, the Annual Meetings have since been changed from May to January.

From January, 1918 to January, 1919 the Board met eight times to discuss and transact business.

The first Quarterly Meeting was at St. John's Church, Providence, in January, the second at the two parishes of St. Mary's and Holy Cross in Ports-

mouth, Rhode Island; and the third was held at St. James' Church, Woonsocket.

The speakers included the Reverend Royal H. Balcom from Wind River Reservation, Wyoming; Reverend William M. M. Thomas from Brazil; Bishop Perry; Reverend Frank D. Gifford, a missionary to Japan; Miss Couch of Hankow, China; and Chaplain Kent.

In place of the March meeting there was held in Grace Church a Devotional Service with an address by the Reverend Samuel McComb, D. D., of Baltimore.

At the Monthly Meeting in April at Emmanuel Church, Manville, the speakers were the Reverend Mr. Toll and Miss Skinner, a worker among the Italians in Providence.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The Educational Department reports the following Classes for the year ending December 31, 1918:

Normal or Preliminary Class held Monday mornings during January and February. The subject chosen was "Missions According to the Bible."

Twenty Lenten Classes, Missionary Talks and Lectures. One feature of the work this year which has done more to unite and inspire people in the study of the Church in action has been the fact that in many of the parishes, the rector himself has led the Classes.

The fall of 1918 was distinguished by the Advent Call to Prayer. In this Diocese it was observed by holding Union Services in various centres. An invitation was issued to "all Christian people" of whatever denomination or creed, to join in thanksgiving for victory on the battle fields, and for guidance in the coming days of reconstruction.

The need for renewed consecration and thought is felt; the challenge to each Christian to so live his life that Christ will be enthroned upon this earth, has brought every Christian to face the issues of the day. Thought, study and prayer must go hand in hand. Then only can we go forward in Christ's name.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Foreign Missions

Gifts to Foreign Missions in this Diocese happily have not fallen off during this year of multiplied appeals. All the pledges to our work in China, Africa and Japan have been fully met and we have been able besides to send some small gifts to Brazil and Mexico and substantial ones to St. Hilda's School Chapel, Wuchang, China, to St. Paul's College, and St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokio. We have also sent more than fifty dollars to the Church Missions House for the fund to compensate for loss in the salaries of missionaries due to the high rate of money exchange.

Bishop Lloyd has brought from his inspection of the mission in Liberia a report of great need of generous help for building, repairs, education and industrial training. So much good work has been accomplished by the Liberians themselves in our poorly equipped Mission that the help it deserves should be generously and promptly given and we trust that Africa's silent appeal will not be ignored.

6 were personal boxes for missionaries and their families.

1 was a Christmas Box to a Western mission.

2 were sent to Christ School, Arden, N. C.

1 to Patterson School for Boys at Legerwood, N. C.

10 packages were sent to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C.

10 were sent to various missions among the mountain whites of Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee.

Very little has been sent in the way of second-hand clothing, the boxes having contained for the most part, new articles. The pledge for All Saints' Hospital, McAlester, Oklahoma, was over-subscribed.

The total valuation of the Domestic work for the past year is \$2,569.17.

Our annual pledge of \$250 for the salary of a teacher at St. Elizabeth's has been paid, and \$10 sent to Rev. W. B. Thorn, Oneida, Wisconsin. Grace Church, Providence, also sent \$195 to St. Michael's Mission, Wind River, Wyoming.

Two boxes and many packages have been sent to Oneida, Wisconsin; Rosebud and Lower Brule, South Dakota; and St. Michael's Mission, Wind River, Wyoming, the total value being \$492.78.

Charter

*As passed by the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island
at the May session, 1900.*

I hereby certify that Anne I. C. D. Ames, Anna B. Manchester, Delia W. Porter, Eliza A. Peckham, Jennie M. Clark, Eurette McVickar, Nancy A. Greene, Mary E. W. Arnold, Mary B. Wheeler, Elizabeth E. Andrews, Cornelia A. Upton, Rebecca P. Henshaw, Susan M. S. Crouch, Abby J. Slocum, Maria E. Stiness, Edith Macomb, and Elizabeth A. Hoppin, have filed in the office of the Secretary of State, according to law, their agreement to form a corporation under the name of The Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, for the purpose of uniting the parishes of the diocese of Rhode Island in mission work for the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States of America, in accordance with law, and have also filed the certificate of the General Treasurer, that they have paid into the general Treasury of the State the sum required by law.

**The Rhode Island Branch
of the
Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions**

With the cordial approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, a society has been formed which hopes to include all the parishes in the diocese, and asks the coöperation of all the clergy. It does not propose to change the work of any parish, but by united and sympathetic action to increase the interest in, and render more effective, the missionary work of the Church. It is hoped by this union that the smaller parishes that are able to do but little, may unite with the larger, or with each other, in working; also, that the larger parishes may learn of the needs of the smaller and assist them if desired.

At a meeting called by the Bishop, February 8, 1878, the following Constitution was adopted, and the officers appointed.

Constitution

I. This organization shall be called the "Rhode Island Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions."

II. Its object is to unite all the parishes in the diocese in the different branches of mission work, viz.: Foreign, Latin American, Domestic, Indian,

Colored, Diocesan, Junior Auxiliary, United Offering, Church Periodical Club, and Girls' Friendly.

III. The officers of this society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, and an Educational Secretary, a Treasurer and an Assistant Treasurer, also an Executive Committee who shall attend to the several branches of the missionary work. The Board shall fill all vacancies that may occur in the offices between annual meetings.

IV. This society shall hold an annual meeting in January for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, hearing the reports, and transacting all other business. Meetings shall be held at stated intervals in different parishes. Special meetings may be called by the President, or upon the request of three members.

V. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings, and to have general knowledge of the work that is in progress. A Vice-President shall preside in her absence.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all meetings, and an account of the work done by the women of the Diocese, as reported by the department secretaries, and to report this annually to the secretary of the "Woman's Auxiliary" in New York.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct all the correspondence of the society, and to send notices of all meetings.

VIII. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all money sent to her for any branch of missionary work, and for the expenses of the society, and shall present a report at the annual meeting.

IX. Fifteen persons shall constitute a quorum at the annual meeting, and five at any board meeting.

X. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
