The Treasurer's report was presented by Mrs. Benedict. It was moved and carried that the auditor's report be accepted.

The Budget for 1934 was then presented and accepted.

The Executive Committee has appointed a new chairman for the Corporate Gift. Mrs. Herbert Wall of Epiphany will be the new Chairman for 1934. Mrs. Wall presented the objects for 1934, as follows:

Mrs. Leggett gave her report of the United Thank Offering. Our Offering for 1932 was \$3,521.69 and for 1933 \$2,735.68, a total of \$6,257.37 in New York toward our Offering at the Triennial in October. The April number of the Spirit of Missions will be offered as a U. T. O. issue and, being bought at five cents, it will be sold at ten cents.

Moved that this auditor's report be accepted. Carried.

Mrs. Jameson read her report as Chairman of the Educational Committee. It was moved and carried that this report be accepted with appreciation.

It was moved and carried that Mrs. Curtis' report of the Program Committee be accepted.

The Nominating Committee reported as follows: President, Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, two years, to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Cooper, resigned; 1st Vice-President, Mrs. Walter B. Slifer, three years; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Thomas D. Tennant, three years; Supply Secretary, Mrs. Walter V. Whitmore, three years; Devotional Secretary, Miss Clara Morehouse, three years.

Nominations were now in order for five delegates for the Triennial, to be held in Atlantic City next October; also five alternates, five delegates for Provincial meeting which may be held at the same time and two members-at-large to take the place of Mrs. Charles, who is eligible for re-election and of Mrs. Case, who has resigned.

Mrs. Slifer wished, before the nominations were made, to explain that, while Mrs. Sibley is a member of the National Board, unless she is elected as a delegate she will not be seated. Another honor which comes to the Diocese this year is that Mrs. Stebbins has been asked to help Miss Matthews in presiding; and that it will also be necessary for Mrs. Stebbins to be elected a delegate in order that she may accept.

Mrs. Cooper gave a short talk, breathing a spirit of optimism, as she approached the end of her work as President.

Noon-day prayers were led by Miss Brent.

Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce, Provincial representative on the National Board spoke very interestingly on the subject of Home Missions.

We have a new Diocesan Prayer Partner, Miss Florence Pickard, Splashdam, Va.

According to the resolution passed last year, the Book of Remembrance is inscribed with the names of those who have been at any time parish presidents, district or deanery officers or diocesan officers. A very handsome book for this purpose has been given by Mrs. Knowlton in memory of her Mother.

After luncheon, the meeting was resumed with the singing of Hymn 226 and a prayer.

Mrs. Nicholas spoke a few words of compliment to the women of the Auxiliary.

Mr. Chace also wished to compliment the Woman's Auxiliary who, in 1932 turned in \$1,620 and in 1933, \$2,296, through the Diocesan Treasurer. He then spoke of the seriousness of the financial situation in the Diocese. Salaries and pledges have been cut, but we have met them all and there is no debt.

It was moved and carried that the expenses of the speakers be defrayed from the offertory and the remainder be given to the Diocese. The total amount of the offerings for the day was \$107.71.

Mr. Spencer Miller gave an exceedingly stimulating talk on "National Recovery and the Church's Responsibility."

The attendance at the meeting was 295, with 35 parishes represented.

The election of officers now took place. The Secretary was instructed to cast one ballot for the ticket presented by the nominating committee. The new president, Mrs. Bloomer, then took the chair.

It was moved and carried that the matter of changing the date of the annual meeting from January to a more suitable time of year be put in the hands of the Executive Committee for decision.

A resolution of thanks was extended to Mrs. Cooper for her twenty-five years of splendid work; one to Miss Brent in appreciation of her devoted service; and one to the women of St. Andrew's Church for their hospitality.

The following were elected Provincial delegates: Mrs. Bloomer, Mrs. Prophet, Mrs. Williamson, Mrs. Curtis and Mrs. Bennet. To the Triennial, Mrs. Sibley, Mrs. Stebbins, Mrs. Slifer, Mrs. Bloomer, Mrs. Benedict. Alternates, Mrs. Jameson, Mrs. Leggett, Mrs. Compton, Mrs. Whelpley and Mrs. Bennett.

After a vote of thanks to Mrs. Knowlton for her beautiful Book of Remembrance had been moved and carried, the meeting was adjourned.

To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

We have come to the end of our second year's work as a new Diocese. As we look back we find much to interest and encourage us. In the midst of general depression and financial distress we have managed to meet our obligations and no department presents a discouraging report. A note of optimism is apparent in our work.

What I have to say is much the same as last year, may I ask you to read it over in the Year Book so as to save printing. Let me urge you to continue the policies and plans outlined there.

It is with great regret that I must resign the office of President. I find it impossible to continue for many reasons, you know, however, that I only accepted it last year for one year more. This year I enter my twenty-fifth year as a Diocesan Officer and I think you should know what helpful and blessed years they have been. REPORT OF THE DEVOTIONAL SECRETARY

The work of the Diocesan Devotional Secretary functions now for the most part through the Deanery officers, and there is no contact with or knowledge of parish activity in this line. But after all the growth of the Spiritual life cannot be mathematically measured and numbers do not indicate very much. Only lives and service for others tell.

Opportunity was given every parish to participate in The Quiet Day for Prayer on November eleventh, and the ready response of the majority of parishes is due the consecrated effort of the Deanery Leaders. The World Day of Prayer in Lent was also taken care of and the cooperation with other communions seems to be growing.

The Devotions at our Executive Committee meetings and the Noon-Day Prayers at two Annual Meetings have been my personal contribution towards the religious life.

In relinquishing this work which should have been much more far-reaching I would like to suggest that there be greater cooperation between the Devotional and the Educational Secretaries in plans for classes in the religious field, and also in the lists of helpful books for devotions and meditations. A quotation and I have finished,—

“Spiritual diligence is never off duty. It begins out of sight, but it is as much at home in public as in private. Our Lord's spiritual activities had their source in the unseen portions of His life, but they never ceased to flow, simply and naturally.”

EDUCATIONAL REPORT FOR 1933

Last year an abundance of riches was laid at our feet when we were given a choice of three subjects for our Lenten Study, China, the North American Indian and "Rethinking Missions." In preparation for this course, a Diocesan Intensive Educational Day was held on Feb. 2 at St. Paul's Church beginning with a Celebration of the Holy Communion. Mrs. E. A. Stebbins and Mrs. Harper Sibley led a most interesting discussion of "Rethinking Missions" at the morning session. Mrs. F. H. Post of St. Luke's gave a splendid talk on China and Methods. She was followed by Mrs. Hippler, Educational Secretary for the Diocese of Western New York, who spoke most helpfully on the North American Indian.

There was no doubt that "Rethinking Missions" was a controversial subject. It aroused favorable and adverse criticism. It was accepted or rejected in part or as a whole. It was received by some with greatest enthusiasm, by others with suspicion and objection. But whatever one's personal opinion of the Laymen's Report may be, it must be conceded that it made people think and read and by so doing created an informed group, prepared to intelligently support the best the Report advocated and to cope with what seemed to many undesirable and subversive.

At the close of the Lenten season, through the assistance of Mrs. Stebbins, questionnaires were sent out on "Rethinking Missions." We received replies from 9 branches. Time does not allow me to place before you the kaleidoscopic material which appears in that mass of varying opinions. However, I may tell you that certain questions were unanimously answered in the affirmative by all 9 branches. There were as many as 10 points of agreement.

Through the instrumentality of Mrs. Stebbins, who acted as editor, a pamphlet was published bearing the title "A Venture in Understanding" which gives the plan and outlines for the study of "Rethinking Missions" used at St. Paul's and the findings and conclusion arrived at by the branches of that parish.

On last Feb. 23 your secretary spoke to the Auxiliary of Trinity Church, Geneva on "Rethinking Missions" and China.

On March 7, I spoke at Christ Church on those chapters of the "Laymen's Report" referring to Education and Publications.

I also spoke on "Rethinking Missions" at St. John's Church, Sodus.

Last Spring an educational committee prepared a series of charts for the Joint Meeting of the Women of the Church held May 16. These illustrated the devotional and educational activities of the women of the Church,—their social service and supply work. Reading lists for this year's course were sent out in June.

The educational work of 26 branches has been reported and is no doubt typical of the other branches in our Diocese.

616 books and pamphlets were sold during the year.

On November 20 an Intensive Educational Day for the Diocese was held at Christ Church. A committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Stebbins, gave a program portraying the history of the Diocese during the last 100 years. We called it "A Century of Progress in the Church." The material used, including an outline, notes of the speakers, posters, maps, etc., has been so arranged that it may be loaned to any parish desiring it. An address was given by Miss Ruth Woodsmall, author of one of the study books on this year's list, "Eastern Women,—Today and Tomorrow."

In conclusion, I would again place emphasis upon the fact that religious education like secular education is but a means to an end. It is a great lever to help raise us to a higher plane of living. It is a powerful instrument whereby we gain a deeper understanding of, and a broader sympathy with others; a more sensitive appreciation of beauty and of all things true and lovely and of good report, a keener realization of our responsibilities and obligations as Christian women, above all a clearer and more radiant vision of our Savior, Jesus Christ, so that day by day we may become more convincing interpreters of Him to our fellow-men.

Mrs. Sheard reported letters from Miss White and Miss Spafford sent to all Branches in Rochester Deanery, missionaries all placed and satisfactory response from Branches. Mrs. Merritt reported letters sent as requested, at least six Branches making interesting contacts, Prayer Partners remembered, while others promise for the future. Miss Hess reported letters written to all Branches in her Deanery, Prayer Partners remembered and many other contacts made, the most notable being by the Branch at St. John's, Wellsville, with Miss Laura Wells at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

Living conditions during the past year have taxed every social agency to the utmost and the members of the Woman's Auxiliaries have responded splendidly to the tremendous task before them.
