## REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Rochester was held on January 16th and 17th, 1935, at St. Paul's Church, Rochester, with 223 present, thirty parishes being represented. Holy Communion was celebrated, after which the women of the Auxiliary were cordially welcomed by Dr. George E. Norton.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, who then read telegrams of good wishes from Bishop and Mrs. Ferris, and from Mrs. Benedict, our treasurer. The Diocese of Western New York also sent greetings.

It was moved and carried that the minutes of the last Annual Meeting be accepted as printed in the Year Book.

Mr. A. F. Freeman, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, gave a talk on "Diocesan Finances in Relation to the Action of General Convention."

In the absence of Mrs. Benedict, the auditor's report was read by Mrs. Slifer and its adoption moved and carried.

The proposed Budget for 1935 was presented by Mrs. Slifer and the first five items were unanimously adopted. It was moved and carried also that the part of the Budget called "Administration Expenses" be adopted.

Mrs. Stebbins explained the Emergency Schedule, saying it seemed fitting for the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council to co-operate with the Council and with the Diocese in the attempt to increase our giving by 25%. Suggestions were made as to additional items for this 25% increase,—first, that it be given for travel expenses of Bishop Jenkins in the deserts of Nevada, and second, that it be given to the Bishop Tuttle Training School. It was moved that the Emergency Item be divided equally between the two projects. This motion was carried and later reconsidered. It was then moved and carried that the division of the \$300 for the Emergency Item be left to the diocesan Executive Committee.

Mrs. Leggett gave a three-minute talk on the plans for the United Thank Offering for the next triennium. Mrs. Whitmore spoke for the Supply Department.

Mrs. Hedrick, for the Program Committee, reported that there were 67 from this Diocese at the General Convention. She reported on the recent meeting of all those who had attended the meetings of our Church in Atlantic City, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harper Sibley, which had been held under the auspices of the Program Committee. At that time, the Bishop appointed the Rev. Wm. C. Compton, Mr. S. King Brown, of Scottsville, and Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins, as a continuation committee to consider and carry forward various proposals made then.

Mrs. Snyder made a brief report for the Missions Committee.

Noon-day prayers were led by Miss Morehouse.

Mrs. Jameson spoke three minutes for the Educational Committee and Mrs. Wall for the same length of time for the Corporate Gift.

The adoption of the Corporate Gift items for 1935, amounting to \$675., was moved and carried.

Mrs. Harman gave the report of the Nominating Committee, explaining how difficult it had been to secure women to serve as diocesan officers, particularly from parishes outside of Rochester. She presented the following ticket:

It was moved that nominations be closed. Carried.

Miss Blacknall, of Nenana, Alaska, gave a very interesting account of her life and work at St. Mark's Mission.

After luncheon in the Parish House, prayers were led by Mrs. Samuel Edsall, the national Devotional Secretary of the Girls' Friendly Society.

It was moved that the expenses of this meeting be taken from the offering today. Carried. It was moved that we give the balance of the offering to Miss Blacknall. Carried. Members of the Girls' Friendly Society of the Diocese presented the offering.

Mrs. George Anderson, chairman of the Elections Committee, announced that the ticket as presented by the Nomination Committee was unanimously elected, with the addition of Mrs. Pierre Ward of Geneseo and Mrs. Arthur Boller of Sodus, who had been nominated from the floor as members-at-large on the Executive Committee.

Father Brown spoke a few words of thanks from the people of St. Simon's Mission for the support given by the Woman's Auxiliary, both moral and financial, and invited the members to attend the dedication of the new Church.

Miss Eva Corey, of Brookline, Mass., one of the four women elected by General Convention to serve on the National Council, gave a most interesting address.

Mrs. W. H. McMahon presented the report of the Resolutions Committee.

Two memorial resolutions for Miss Florence Hart and Miss Lucy Arnold were adopted by rising vote.

A resolution of thanks to St. Paul's Church for their hospitality was adopted.

It was moved that the following resolution with regard to the Supply Department be studied in the deanery meetings next year and reported on at the next annual meeting. Carried.

"WHEREAS the Supply Department is such a necessity to the existence of the mission work in the Field, especially in these days of cut budgets, and

"WHEREAS it is such a large factor in starting new branches of the Auxiliary, and keeping them interested by giving them something concrete to do, and

"WHEREAS, in the past Triennium, 1931-1934, the value of the help given through this department to the mission field amounted to \$617,000.00

"BE IT RESOLVED that the National Executive Board be asked to give it a part in the program of the next Triennial Meeting."

The Annual Meeting was closed with a service of installation of diocesan officers, with Dean Williamson of the Northeastern Deanery officiating. The service took place before the Altar and was an inspiration to the officers and to the members of the Auxiliary present, many feeling that a similar service each year in the parish would be of great value.

The following members, Kate H. Bloomer, Louise G. Benedict, Georgiana Sibley, Elizabeth Sibley Stebbins and Mary M. Slifer having been elected by the Rochester Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in annual meeting assembled January 1934 as delegates to the 21st Triennial Convention, held in Atlantic City, expressed their appreciation of this privilege and responsibility given them.

On Thursday, January 17, the Holy Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock in Christ Church. Following this service group conferences were held in St. Paul's Parish House.

*Presidents' and Treasurers' Conference.* Leaders, Mrs. Bloomer and Mrs. Herbert Wall. Discussion of the Budget with the recommendation of a public hearing for the coming year; discussion of the difficulty of securing officers both in the parish and in the diocese.

*Educational Secretaries.* Leader, Mrs. Jameson. Subjects discussed, Missions in This Age, and a Suggestive Outline for Bible Study.

*United Thank Offering Custodians.* Leader, Mrs. Leggett. Plans for increasing interest in the U. T. O. and making its purpose known to a larger number of women in each parish.

*Supply Secretaries.* Leader, Mrs. Whitmore. Recommendation made that layettes be cut by machinery and sold at cost to the branches. It was decided that it would be better, instead of taking so many hospital and dispensary supplies, to have more personal boxes, especially for children, and to send money to New York with which to purchase the supplies.

*Devotional Life and Missions.* Leaders, Mrs. Edsall, Mrs. Sibley and Mrs. Snyder. Subject discussed: The Life of the Spirit, with Dean Robbins' pamphlet as the basis for discussion; a special prayer for the prayer partners was recommended. It was also recommended that a missions secretary be appointed in each parish, and that the fund for Junior Hall be continued.

*Social Service.* Leaders, Mrs. Stebbins and Mrs. Seward. Discussion period on the subject of forming a diocesan program of Social Service was followed by two speakers. Miss Esther M. Hilton, of the Family Welfare Society, spoke on Family Problems, and Miss Margaret Bacon spoke on the Use of Leisure.

The total attendance was over 120.

## \*REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES, 1934

### DEVOTIONAL LIFE

In January, 1934, I sent a letter of greeting to each deanery devotional secretary, with suggestions for the use of branches.

Sent to each deanery, calls for the World Day of Prayer, February 16th, for distribution to branches, with letter urging participation wherever possible in this international, interdenominational gathering of women to pray for world-wide peace. In the program arranged by the Rochester Council of Church Women, I took part, as representing the women of the Episcopal Church; the assigned topic being "Peace in the Church of Christ."

Sent to each deanery for distribution to the branches, copies of the "Message in Brief," with letter calling attention to the Church Wide Endeavor movement and ways of co-operating in this plan for making our religion more vital.

Secured from deaneries estimate of number of copies desired of leaflets for the Quiet Day to be observed on November 12th. Ordered and distributed these leaflets to the deaneries, with letter urging co-operation.

In connection with the work of this department, I have written forty-five post cards and letters, and an item for the news letter sent out in September.

I regret having been unable to know the deanery devotional secretaries personally, to have had so little contact with the membership, and to have been unable to advance the work of this department as I am sure my successor will be able to do, for the devotional life is the mainspring of all our work.

### MISSIONS

The work of the Missions Committee has continued along the same lines as last year, contacts made through prayers offered, letters and gifts sent, and occasional speakers from the field.

One digression from our usual course was an appeal for money for the education of Junior Hall, a southern mountain white boy, at Splashdam, Va. \$79.11 was received from 24 branches and this sum, with gifts from other dioceses, enabled Miss Pickard to send Junior to our school at Covington, Ky.

Through Committee efforts, Mrs. Miller, of St. Hilda's School, Wuchang; Miss Anne Lamberton, of St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai; and Miss Augusta Peters, of St. Luke's, Tokyo, were heard in several parishes. Miss Sarah G. White expected to sail from Tokyo for America in December and we shall hear from her later.

A questionnaire was sent out in November, with only a fairly satisfactory response, and we hope increased effort on the part of the committee will mean a greater interest in the work on the part of the branches.

We have suffered a great loss in the death of Miss Florence A. Hart, our member-at-large, but we welcome in her place, Mrs. George E. Anderson of St. Luke's Parish.

One meeting of the Committee was held at the home of the Chairman, and we look forward to a meeting in the spring, outside of Rochester, to visiting any parish that wants us, and to making another appeal for Junior Hall, who obviously cannot complete his education in one year.

And so may we do our small part in taking to them that sit in darkness the "Wonder and the Glory of the Light."

## EDUCATIONAL

Statistics, often dry as dust, can be made very significant and of great interest when properly interpreted. May I try to translate a few figures into facts, tendencies and attitudes which serve to indicate the progress of our educational work?

My data is derived from the reports of twenty-two branches. Eleven groups studied the suggested theme "Christ and the Modern World," using "The Never Failing Light" as the text-book. Eleven studied home missions, using "Our Heritage." It is interesting to note that many branches enjoyed their freedom to select other topics. A list of these, presents a wide variety of themes and includes Russia, the Orient, Dr. Grenfell's Labrador, Oriental Women, History of the Church, History of Church Hymns, The Prayer Book, The United Thank Offering, The Oxford Movement, Problems of Peace and War, Re-thinking Missions, The Church-Wide Endeavor, The Bible, Problems of Everyday Living. Ten branches, representing all deaneries, made use of the material illustrating "A Century of Progress in the Church." Information regarding this project has been requested by the Dioceses of Kentucky and Nevada.

Discussion proved to be just as popular a method as reading, since fourteen branches chose these two forms of presentation. Twelve groups invited outside speakers to address them. Movies entered the field and scrap-books and bulletin boards were also used.

It is interesting to note progress in the development of leadership indicated by the fact that while six groups depended upon one leader, nine were directed by several leaders and ten led by committees. Furthermore, twelve branches used individuals who had not previously taken an active part in the educational work. Nine reported classes conducted by the clergy.

Nine branches expressed a preference for the study of home missions; eight stating that they preferred a topic definitely linked with our Church.

It was gratifying to learn that four groups possessed their own religious bookshelves and two more were planning to start theirs. Six supported Church papers in general and ten the "Spirit of Missions."

The number of meetings per branch varied from a minimum of 4 to a maximum of 27. The average attendance varied from 6 to 50.

Thirteen branches report a growing interest in the educational work. Some of the reasons given are significant and challenging. One secretary says growth is due to good leadership—another attributes it to interesting and varied text-books and reference material—and another to an informal and interesting approach through papers and reviews and a lack of emphasis on the obligation to study—still another to membership of many younger women. Of four branches reporting a static condition, one states that it is due to the financial status of the parish necessitating the bending of all energies toward meeting expenses; another reports a lack of leadership; a third a lack of enthusiasm due to a paucity of meetings; a fourth lays the blame on "modern trends."

On February 19th, an "Intensive Educational Day" was held at Christ Church. A committee from St. Pauls presented a program setting forth the salient points of the theme "Christ and the Modern World." The afternoon session was given over to a discussion of Bible study following a presentation of the "Church-Wide Endeavor."

Owing to the meeting of the Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in October, and the subsequent visit of a missionary team to this Diocese, the intensive day usually held in the Fall was omitted.

On February 14th your secretary spoke at Epiphany Church on "A Century of Progress in the Church" and addressed the Bishop Brent Branch at St. Paul's on March 12th on "Rethinking Missions."

178 books and pamphlets have been sold during the year. "If we be His disciples" let us try to use our hours of study, reading and discussion as a means whereby we may draw nearer to God and discover more surely His purpose for us and for human society. Learning under His guidance we may be sure that He will "illumine our minds and strengthen our wills" so that we may be able to do our share in revitalizing the life and furthering the Mission of His Church.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

In reporting the social service activities of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year, a detailed account of efforts and accomplishments might be listed by communities and by churches. But such a list, while effective in showing the scope and extent of this work, would miss the main purpose of such a report as this. To best record the accomplishments in Social Service of such a large group as the Woman's Auxiliary is to show how the organization has worked as a unit towards one common end.

A marked change has taken place during the last year among the Social Service groups of the Woman's Auxiliary in that the women have more than ever before grasped a broader sense of the word Social Service. Study groups have been formed, and plans are under way for forming more. An increasing number of auxiliaries are asking for good speakers on Social subjects. During the past year many well known speakers have been supplied to our various churches. At several of the Deanery meetings these speakers have been called in to tell the Auxiliary leaders in what common direction their efforts should be directed.

The women are better acquainting themselves and affiliating themselves with the various social agencies in their communities. Very many of our church women are active as volunteers, and as such they have rendered an immeasurable service to their community.

A request was sent out by Miss Pickard of the Splashdam Mission in Virginia for quilt pieces. The following branches are to be thanked for their hearty support, both by Miss Pickard and by the chairman:

In visiting from one church to another, a very cordial welcome is always found, and always is there present a desire to discover how the Woman's Auxiliary can be of further service to the Social aspect of the Community.

My contact with the women in the Diocese has meant a great deal to me and it is with regret that I resign.

## LOOKING FORWARD 1935

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

*To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:*

It is fitting that we should be taking a forward look at the start of 1935. The Woman's Auxiliary has a supply of objectives for the next three years, that should find and use the ability of every woman in it. If we try, even a little, to live up to the ideals given to us at the Triennial our power will be a great one.

I will review some of the opportunities suggested to us:

To think out our individual position on War is a duty. When an idea and a conviction enters the minds of enough people, there will be a change.

The communists are acting upon that principle, but are Christians acting upon it? There is no way to world peace but the Christian way. How shall the world follow the Christian way unless it is shown what it is and Who it is that leads us upon it? Is not this the strongest of reasons for Missions in this age?

As to our own Christian living. Shall we be able to sacrifice ourselves so that we make our citizenship Christian?

To take the trouble to insist on clean moving pictures and plays.

To require Christian standards in the matter of birth control.

To inform ourselves and educate others about the affairs of our Diocese and of the General Church. So that our giving of prayers, and work and money will be sympathetic and intelligent. Perhaps we shall gain by this study, a sense of personal responsibility which I could wish for us all to acquire in the next three years.

We are told to adventure for our religion. One of the dictionary definitions of the word adventure is "a bold undertaking." Women are not afraid of an undertaking if they feel they are right, so why not more adventure? Sometimes an adventure is a state of mind. Two persons may make a trip and to one it is an adventure, to the other just another trip. This last unfortunate state of mind is curable. If we are afraid to follow the forward moves our Church is making we shall miss the thrill of adventure. Our timidity in adventuring for our religion might shame us when we contrast our privileges with those of women in another land where they hardly dare to pray in a church or teach their children about God.

We are asked to make definite efforts to interest the women who are not interested. To help in the church schools. And, at the end of every endeavor, to bring ourselves and our work to the Presence for a humble sacrifice, and to renew the life of our spirit.

## REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Rochester was held on January 16th and 17th, 1935, at St. Paul's Church, Rochester, with 223 present, thirty parishes being represented. Holy Communion was celebrated, after which the women of the Auxiliary were cordially welcomed by Dr. George E. Norton.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, who then read telegrams of good wishes from Bishop and Mrs. Ferris, and from Mrs. Benedict, our treasurer. The Diocese of Western New York also sent greetings.

It was moved and carried that the minutes of the last Annual Meeting be accepted as printed in the Year Book.

Mr. A. F. Freeman, Executive Secretary of the Diocese, gave a talk on "Diocesan Finances in Relation to the Action of General Convention."

In the absence of Mrs. Benedict, the auditor's report was read by Mrs. Slifer and its adoption moved and carried.

The proposed Budget for 1935 was presented by Mrs. Slifer and the first five items were unanimously adopted. It was moved and carried also that the part of the Budget called "Administration Expenses" be adopted.

Mrs. Stebbins explained the Emergency Schedule, saying it seemed fitting for the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council to co-operate with the Council and with the Diocese in the attempt to increase our giving by 25%. Suggestions were made as to additional items for this 25% increase,—first, that it be given for travel expenses of Bishop Jenkins in the deserts of Nevada, and second, that it be given to the Bishop Tuttle Training School. It was moved that the Emergency Item be divided equally between the two projects. This motion was carried and later reconsidered. It was then moved and carried that the division of the \$300 for the Emergency Item be left to the diocesan Executive Committee.

Mrs. Leggett gave a three-minute talk on the plans for the United Thank Offering for the next triennium. Mrs. Whitmore spoke for the Supply Department.

Mrs. Hedrick, for the Program Committee, reported that there were 67 from this Diocese at the General Convention. She reported on the recent meeting of all those who had attended the meetings of our Church in Atlantic City, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harper Sibley, which had been held under the auspices of the Program Committee. At that time, the Bishop appointed the Rev. Wm. C. Compton, Mr. S. King Brown, of Scottsville, and Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins, as a continuation committee to consider and carry forward various proposals made then.

Mrs. Snyder made a brief report for the Missions Committee.

Noon-day prayers were led by Miss Morehouse.

Mrs. Jameson spoke three minutes for the Educational Committee and Mrs. Wall for the same length of time for the Corporate Gift.

The adoption of the Corporate Gift items for 1935, amounting to \$675., was moved and carried.

Mrs. Harman gave the report of the Nominating Committee, explaining how difficult it had been to secure women to serve as diocesan officers, particularly from parishes outside of Rochester. She presented the following ticket:

It was moved that nominations be closed. Carried.

Miss Blacknall, of Nenana, Alaska, gave a very interesting account of her life and work at St. Mark's Mission.

After luncheon in the Parish House, prayers were led by Mrs. Samuel Edsall, the national Devotional Secretary of the Girls' Friendly Society.

It was moved that the expenses of this meeting be taken from the offering today. Carried. It was moved that we give the balance of the offering to Miss Blacknall. Carried. Members of the Girls' Friendly Society of the Diocese presented the offering.

Mrs. George Anderson, chairman of the Elections Committee, announced that the ticket as presented by the Nomination Committee was unanimously elected, with the addition of Mrs. Pierre Ward of Geneseo and Mrs. Arthur Boller of Sodus, who had been nominated from the floor as members-at-large on the Executive Committee.

Father Brown spoke a few words of thanks from the people of St. Simon's Mission for the support given by the Woman's Auxiliary, both moral and financial, and invited the members to attend the dedication of the new Church.

Miss Eva Corey, of Brookline, Mass., one of the four women elected by General Convention to serve on the National Council, gave a most interesting address.

Mrs. W. H. McMahon presented the report of the Resolutions Committee.

Two memorial resolutions for Miss Florence Hart and Miss Lucy Arnold were adopted by rising vote.

A resolution of thanks to St. Paul's Church for their hospitality was adopted.

It was moved that the following resolution with regard to the Supply Department be studied in the deanery meetings next year and reported on at the next annual meeting. Carried.

"WHEREAS the Supply Department is such a necessity to the existence of the mission work in the Field, especially in these days of cut budgets, and

"WHEREAS it is such a large factor in starting new branches of the Auxiliary, and keeping them interested by giving them something concrete to do, and

"WHEREAS, in the past Triennium, 1931-1934, the value of the help given through this department to the mission field amounted to \$617,000.00

"BE IT RESOLVED that the National Executive Board be asked to give it a part in the program of the next Triennial Meeting."

The Annual Meeting was closed with a service of installation of diocesan officers, with Dean Williamson of the Northeastern Deanery officiating. The service took place before the Altar and was an inspiration to the officers and to the members of the Auxiliary present, many feeling that a similar service each year in the parish would be of great value.

The following members, Kate H. Bloomer, Louise G. Benedict, Georgiana Sibley, Elizabeth Sibley Stebbins and Mary M. Slifer having been elected by the Rochester Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in annual meeting assembled January 1934 as delegates to the 21st Triennial Convention, held in Atlantic City, expressed their appreciation of this privilege and responsibility given them.

On Thursday, January 17, the Holy Communion was celebrated at ten o'clock in Christ Church. Following this service group conferences were held in St. Paul's Parish House.

*Presidents' and Treasurers' Conference.* Leaders, Mrs. Bloomer and Mrs. Herbert Wall. Discussion of the Budget with the recommendation of a public hearing for the coming year; discussion of the difficulty of securing officers both in the parish and in the diocese.

*Educational Secretaries.* Leader, Mrs. Jameson. Subjects discussed, Missions in This Age, and a Suggestive Outline for Bible Study.

*United Thank Offering Custodians.* Leader, Mrs. Leggett. Plans for increasing interest in the U. T. O. and making its purpose known to a larger number of women in each parish.

*Supply Secretaries.* Leader, Mrs. Whitmore. Recommendation made that layettes be cut by machinery and sold at cost to the branches. It was decided that it would be better, instead of taking so many hospital and dispensary supplies, to have more personal boxes, especially for children, and to send money to New York with which to purchase the supplies.

*Devotional Life and Missions.* Leaders, Mrs. Edsall, Mrs. Sibley and Mrs. Snyder. Subject discussed: The Life of the Spirit, with Dean Robbins' pamphlet as the basis for discussion; a special prayer for the prayer partners was recommended. It was also recommended that a missions secretary be appointed in each parish, and that the fund for Junior Hall be continued.

*Social Service.* Leaders, Mrs. Stebbins and Mrs. Seward. Discussion period on the subject of forming a diocesan program of Social Service was followed by two speakers. Miss Esther M. Hilton, of the Family Welfare Society, spoke on Family Problems, and Miss Margaret Bacon spoke on the Use of Leisure.

The total attendance was over 120.

## \*REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES, 1934

### DEVOTIONAL LIFE

In January, 1934, I sent a letter of greeting to each deanery devotional secretary, with suggestions for the use of branches.

Sent to each deanery, calls for the World Day of Prayer, February 16th, for distribution to branches, with letter urging participation wherever possible in this international, interdenominational gathering of women to pray for world-wide peace. In the program arranged by the Rochester Council of Church Women, I took part, as representing the women of the Episcopal Church; the assigned topic being "Peace in the Church of Christ."

Sent to each deanery for distribution to the branches, copies of the "Message in Brief," with letter calling attention to the Church Wide Endeavor movement and ways of co-operating in this plan for making our religion more vital.

Secured from deaneries estimate of number of copies desired of leaflets for the Quiet Day to be observed on November 12th. Ordered and distributed these leaflets to the deaneries, with letter urging co-operation.

In connection with the work of this department, I have written forty-five post cards and letters, and an item for the news letter sent out in September.

I regret having been unable to know the deanery devotional secretaries personally, to have had so little contact with the membership, and to have been unable to advance the work of this department as I am sure my successor will be able to do, for the devotional life is the mainspring of all our work.

### MISSIONS

The work of the Missions Committee has continued along the same lines as last year, contacts made through prayers offered, letters and gifts sent, and occasional speakers from the field.

One digression from our usual course was an appeal for money for the education of Junior Hall, a southern mountain white boy, at Splashdam, Va. \$79.11 was received from 24 branches and this sum, with gifts from other dioceses, enabled Miss Pickard to send Junior to our school at Covington, Ky.

Through Committee efforts, Mrs. Miller, of St. Hilda's School, Wuchang; Miss Anne Lamberton, of St. Luke's Hospital, Shanghai; and Miss Augusta Peters, of St. Luke's, Tokyo, were heard in several parishes. Miss Sarah G. White expected to sail from Tokyo for America in December and we shall hear from her later.

A questionnaire was sent out in November, with only a fairly satisfactory response, and we hope increased effort on the part of the committee will mean a greater interest in the work on the part of the branches.

We have suffered a great loss in the death of Miss Florence A. Hart, our member-at-large, but we welcome in her place, Mrs. George E. Anderson of St. Luke's Parish.

One meeting of the Committee was held at the home of the Chairman, and we look forward to a meeting in the spring, outside of Rochester, to visiting any parish that wants us, and to making another appeal for Junior Hall, who obviously cannot complete his education in one year.

And so may we do our small part in taking to them that sit in darkness the "Wonder and the Glory of the Light."

## EDUCATIONAL

Statistics, often dry as dust, can be made very significant and of great interest when properly interpreted. May I try to translate a few figures into facts, tendencies and attitudes which serve to indicate the progress of our educational work?

My data is derived from the reports of twenty-two branches. Eleven groups studied the suggested theme "Christ and the Modern World," using "The Never Failing Light" as the text-book. Eleven studied home missions, using "Our Heritage." It is interesting to note that many branches enjoyed their freedom to select other topics. A list of these, presents a wide variety of themes and includes Russia, the Orient, Dr. Grenfell's Labrador, Oriental Women, History of the Church, History of Church Hymns, The Prayer Book, The United Thank Offering, The Oxford Movement, Problems of Peace and War, Re-thinking Missions, The Church-Wide Endeavor, The Bible, Problems of Everyday Living. Ten branches, representing all deaneries, made use of the material illustrating "A Century of Progress in the Church." Information regarding this project has been requested by the Dioceses of Kentucky and Nevada.

Discussion proved to be just as popular a method as reading, since fourteen branches chose these two forms of presentation. Twelve groups invited outside speakers to address them. Movies entered the field and scrap-books and bulletin boards were also used.

It is interesting to note progress in the development of leadership indicated by the fact that while six groups depended upon one leader, nine were directed by several leaders and ten led by committees. Furthermore, twelve branches used individuals who had not previously taken an active part in the educational work. Nine reported classes conducted by the clergy.

Nine branches expressed a preference for the study of home missions; eight stating that they preferred a topic definitely linked with our Church.

It was gratifying to learn that four groups possessed their own religious bookshelves and two more were planning to start theirs. Six supported Church papers in general and ten the "Spirit of Missions."

The number of meetings per branch varied from a minimum of 4 to a maximum of 27. The average attendance varied from 6 to 50.

Thirteen branches report a growing interest in the educational work. Some of the reasons given are significant and challenging. One secretary says growth is due to good leadership—another attributes it to interesting and varied text-books and reference material—and another to an informal and interesting approach through papers and reviews and a lack of emphasis on the obligation to study—still another to membership of many younger women. Of four branches reporting a static condition, one states that it is due to the financial status of the parish necessitating the bending of all energies toward meeting expenses; another reports a lack of leadership; a third a lack of enthusiasm due to a paucity of meetings; a fourth lays the blame on "modern trends."

On February 19th, an "Intensive Educational Day" was held at Christ Church. A committee from St. Pauls presented a program setting forth the salient points of the theme "Christ and the Modern World." The afternoon session was given over to a discussion of Bible study following a presentation of the "Church-Wide Endeavor."

Owing to the meeting of the Triennial Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in October, and the subsequent visit of a missionary team to this Diocese, the intensive day usually held in the Fall was omitted.

On February 14th your secretary spoke at Epiphany Church on "A Century of Progress in the Church" and addressed the Bishop Brent Branch at St. Paul's on March 12th on "Rethinking Missions."

178 books and pamphlets have been sold during the year. "If we be His disciples" let us try to use our hours of study, reading and discussion as a means whereby we may draw nearer to God and discover more surely His purpose for us and for human society. Learning under His guidance we may be sure that He will "illumine our minds and strengthen our wills" so that we may be able to do our share in revitalizing the life and furthering the Mission of His Church.

## CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

In reporting the social service activities of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year, a detailed account of efforts and accomplishments might be listed by communities and by churches. But such a list, while effective in showing the scope and extent of this work, would miss the main purpose of such a report as this. To best record the accomplishments in Social Service of such a large group as the Woman's Auxiliary is to show how the organization has worked as a unit towards one common end.

A marked change has taken place during the last year among the Social Service groups of the Woman's Auxiliary in that the women have more than ever before grasped a broader sense of the word Social Service. Study groups have been formed, and plans are under way for forming more. An increasing number of auxiliaries are asking for good speakers on Social subjects. During the past year many well known speakers have been supplied to our various churches. At several of the Deanery meetings these speakers have been called in to tell the Auxiliary leaders in what common direction their efforts should be directed.

The women are better acquainting themselves and affiliating themselves with the various social agencies in their communities. Very many of our church women are active as volunteers, and as such they have rendered an immeasurable service to their community.

A request was sent out by Miss Pickard of the Splashdam Mission in Virginia for quilt pieces. The following branches are to be thanked for their hearty support, both by Miss Pickard and by the chairman:

The Chairman was instructed to write the Congressmen from this district urging favorable action on the National Child Labor Amendment. Representative Whitley replied that the subject is at present before the State Legislature at Albany for ratification of the federal amendment.

The attitude of all the Women's Auxiliaries towards Social Service is most gratifying. In visiting from one church to another, a very cordial welcome is always found, and always is there present a desire to discover how the Woman's Auxiliary can be of further service to the Social aspect of the Community.

My contact with the women in the Diocese has meant a great deal to me and it is with regret that I resign.

## LOOKING FORWARD 1935

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

*To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:*

It is fitting that we should be taking a forward look at the start of 1935. The Woman's Auxiliary has a supply of objectives for the next three years, that should find and use the ability of every woman in it. If we try, even a little, to live up to the ideals given to us at the Triennial our power will be a great one.

I will review some of the opportunities suggested to us:

To think out our individual position on War is a duty. When an idea and a conviction enters the minds of enough people, there will be a change.

The communists are acting upon that principle, but are Christians acting upon it? There is no way to world peace but the Christian way. How shall the world follow the Christian way unless it is shown what it is and Who it is that leads us upon it? Is not this the strongest of reasons for Missions in this age?

As to our own Christian living. Shall we be able to sacrifice ourselves so that we make our citizenship Christian?

To take the trouble to insist on clean moving pictures and plays.

To require Christian standards in the matter of birth control.

To inform ourselves and educate others about the affairs of our Diocese and of the General Church. So that our giving of prayers, and work and money will be sympathetic and intelligent. Perhaps we shall gain by this study, a sense of personal responsibility which I could wish for us all to acquire in the next three years.

We are told to adventure for our religion. One of the dictionary definitions of the word adventure is "a bold undertaking." Women are not afraid of an undertaking if they feel they are right, so why not more adventure? Sometimes an adventure is a state of mind. Two persons may make a trip and to one it is an adventure, to the other just another trip. This last unfortunate state of mind is curable. If we are afraid to follow the forward moves our Church is making we shall miss the thrill of adventure. Our timidity in adventuring for our religion might shame us when we contrast our privileges with those of women in another land where they hardly dare to pray in a church or teach their children about God.

We are asked to make definite efforts to interest the women who are not interested. To help in the church schools. And, at the end of every endeavor, to bring ourselves and our work to the Presence for a humble sacrifice, and to renew the life of our spirit.
