

WHEREAS, Emily Elizabeth Nicholas, our beloved Diocesan Honorary President, entered into Paradise August 13, 1935, at the age of eighty-nine years, we the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Rochester desire to pay to her memory a tribute of love, gratitude and honor. A charter member of the "Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions" in the Diocese of Western New York, her chief interest during her long and active life was the spread of Christ's Kingdom through the missionary work of the Church. President of the Diocese of Western New York for twenty-one years, she served not only her diocese but the women of the whole Church by her consecration, vision and fair-mindedness. As changing conditions necessitated new methods of work, she was ready to meet them with intelligence, toleration and a sense of humor. As Honorary President she retained active interest in the causes so dear to her and continued to give to those who followed her the benefit of her rich experience. She was generous and enthusiastic over work done, but her inner vision filled her with that "divine discontent" which made self-satisfaction impossible, and inspired her to give to the Auxiliary at its Golden Anniversary the challenging message, "Remember that the good can always be better." Her gracious personality will live vividly in the hearts of those who have known her.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That we her followers and friends in the Woman's Auxiliary record our appreciation of the heritage which she has left to us and our desire to follow in the way she has led; and that we offer our prayers that having served God with constancy in this life, she may go from strength to strength in the joy of perfect service in the Heavenly Kingdom.

EXCERPTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester was held on October 2nd, 1935, in Christ Church, Hornell, instead of in January, 1936. Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, Diocesan President, presided.

Holy Communion was celebrated by the Right Reverend David Lincoln Ferris, Bishop of Rochester, assisted by the Very Reverend John Gilbert Spencer, Rector of Christ Church, Hornell, and Dean of the Southeastern Deanery.

A memorial offering to the late Emily Elizabeth Nicholas, Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary for twenty-one years, was taken at the Communion service, the form of the memorial to be decided by the Executive Committee.

Mrs. Wilber D. Vair, Diocesan Treasurer, after reading her financial statement, referred to the 1936 budget and explained the emergency items. She then made the announcement that the Auxiliary had received a legacy from the late Mrs. Helen Oberdorf, of Dansville. Mrs. Bloomer read a letter from the Reverend David L. Leach, rector of St. Peter's Church, Dansville, commemorative of Mrs. Oberdorf's love and devotion to her church work.

The offering of the business meeting was \$89.22. It was voted that after deducting the expenses of the meeting, the balance of the offering should be applied to the emergency items.

Mrs. W. Herbert Wall, Chairman of the Corporate Gift Committee, explained the Corporate Gift.

The report of the Committee on the Constitution was read by Mrs. Gladys Brokaw, recommending a number of changes in the Constitution and By-Laws, such proposed changes to be sent to the parishes six months before the next Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Wm. H. McMillen, Jr., of Corning, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the ticket prepared by the Committee. The Secretary cast one ballot for these officers who were pronounced duly elected. Their names are marked with this sign * on page 6. Mrs. Edwards Pierrepont Ward of Geneseo, and Mrs. Arthur Boller of Sodus were elected members-at-large on the Executive Committee. Delegates to the Provincial Meeting were nominated from the floor and elected as follows: Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins, Rochester; Mrs. Wm. H. McMillen, Jr., Corning; Mrs. J. W. Denness Cooper, Geneseo; Mrs. Walter B. Slifer, Rochester, and Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, Newark.

The meeting adjourned to the Church where the members listened to a most interesting address by Miss Mary Louise Pardee, representative on the National Executive Board from the Woman's Auxiliary of the First Province.

Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins spoke on the Forward Movement, then led the Noon-day Prayers with responses from an inspiring leaflet prepared by her for this meeting under the title, "The Fruit of the Spirit is Love."

After luncheon Miss Mary Louise Pardee conducted a conference for the presidents and vice-presidents. The U. T. O. conference and those of the standing committees were led by their chairmen or chosen representatives.

At the afternoon meeting Mrs. Bloomer read the President's message, suggesting thoughts to be taken away for meditation, and expressing the wish that all members might live up to the ideals announced at a previous meeting by Mrs. Emily Nicholas to "Be just a little more spiritual, a little more industrious, and a little more generous."

Mrs. H. B. Graves, of Geneva, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented a resolution in honor of the late Emily Elizabeth Nicholas.

A motion was passed that a resolution be sent by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese to the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, asking that the Supply Department be given a part in the Triennial program of 1937.

Mr. Spencer expressed the appreciation of his parish over the decision of the Woman's Auxiliary to hold this meeting in Hornell, notwithstanding the havoc wrought by the recent flood. Mr. Spencer also described the many gifts of money and supplies from Bishop Ferris, from the various parishes, and from individuals, sent to his Church at the time of the disaster of last summer, and in behalf of the parish thanked all who helped in any way.

After a resolution of thanks to the rector and members of Christ Church Parish, the meeting closed with the Service of Installation of Officers, with Mr. Spencer officiating.

EXCERPTS FROM THE REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1935

The eight meetings of the Executive Committee, with an average attendance of 14 out of 17 members, have been conducted by the president, Mrs. R. A. S. Bloomer, with one exception, when the first vice-president was in the chair. The meetings were preceded with the Communion service when possible, and Noon-day Prayers were offered.

After many discussions, long planning and a great deal of thought, the time of the fourth Annual Meeting was changed from January to October on account of weather conditions, and the place from the northern to the southern part of the Diocese to ascertain if the change would not result in an increased attendance.

At the third Annual Meeting, held on January 16th, 1935, at St. Paul's Church, Rochester, there was an attendance of 223 persons registered from 30 parishes. At the fourth Annual Meeting, held October 2nd, 1935, at Christ Church, Hornell, 221 persons answered to roll call at the morning session, with 31 parishes voting as follows: Genesee Valley Deanery, 6; Northeastern Deanery, 9; Rochester Deanery, 11; Southeastern Deanery, 5.

Many new appointments of officers were made during the year 1935 due to necessary resignations.

At one meeting of the Committee each officer discussed the duties of the parish officer corresponding to her diocesan office. The Diocesan Relations Committee met with the Executive Committee to consider the duties and relationships of diocesan and deanery officers and committees, and the visiting and personal contacts of the officers of the Executive Committee with the parish branches. No diocesan officer works alone but with a co-operating committee. The discussion at this time resulted in a conference between the diocesan and deanery officers and all diocesan committees at a meeting held in June at St. Michael's Church, Geneseo.

Among many interesting letters received was one from Miss Betty Warren of Geneva, expressing her appreciation of her summer course at Alfred University, made possible by the Hortense Nelson Trust Fund.

The several meetings of the Executive Committee during the year were well attended and replete with interest and inspiration for the members. The work accomplished was undertaken with enthusiasm and the year as a whole was one of progress and accomplishment.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Rochester:

Our Year Book, as you see, is in new form. It is designed for the use of the Parish Branches.

The summaries of the work of 1935 are tabulated by parishes. Each parish will find it worth while to look over these tables. The complete reports of the officers were read, accepted and ordered filed with the corresponding secretary by the Executive Committee on January 18. They are to be bound and made available for parish use, on request.

The 1935 reports of the treasurers of the parish branches total \$14,599.65 with twelve reports missing, and exclusive of the United Thank Offering. A complete financial record of the Auxiliary in our Diocese must necessarily be an inspiring report. May we have that more complete record for 1936?

It is with the desire to be helpful that we offer the chart on page 20, hoping that all parish branches will reproduce it in suitable size to hang on the wall of their respective meeting places and use it as a reminder and perpetual inventory or record of accomplishment. Pages 22 to 33 will guide you in filling in the chart.

Diocesan officers will endeavor to visit each Branch during the year, not always to give a formal talk, but for conference and explanation when needed.

At the triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Atlantic City, a resolution was passed to the effect that the United Thank Offering be studied by the branches during the triennium. What is the United Thank Offering used for? What should it be used for? Suggestions as to its future use will be welcome and may be sent to the Diocesan United Thank Offering treasurer who will report to the Diocesan Executive Committee, which in turn will transmit suggestions to the National Executive Board. Will you please act on this resolution?

When Miss Pardee addressed the Diocesan annual meeting, she outlined the ideals which we should seek in our branches. One of these I would stress this year. It is *Enthusiasm*. Miss Pardee said, "Present opportunities to serve, not in a 'take it or leave it' attitude, but as pearls of great price."

Aims and Suggestions for 1936

The devotional life of the Auxiliary is a continuation of the devotional life of the parish, the diocese and the general Church. The devotional program should be a source of strength for every day living, a help in creating higher standards of companionship and in developing that quality of discipleship which the Church is asking of her members through the Forward Movement.

Our prayer life together is an activity of mind and spirit, uniting us with our Lord, with one another, and with his purpose for the world. Through prayer and sacrament we enter the ever widening fellowship of his Kingdom on earth and in Paradise. We help to make room for him everywhere and in every sphere of life. Love, Peace, Light, Power, Truth, Joy—the fruits of his Spirit—come among us and into the world and displace the fruits of materialism. We cease to be a business organization or a club, and become “members one of another.”

We shall want to enlarge our conception of prayer; to learn more of meditation; to enter more fully into the sacramental life of the Church; to know how to worship God in spirit and in truth; to offer ourselves to him more fully; to engage in the work of prayer for others; to cultivate that spiritual awareness which leads us to see him in many places and in those whom we meet. We shall want to make every expression of the devotional life an act of discipleship.

With these thoughts in mind we make the following suggestions:

Begin the activities of your Auxiliary with a Corporate Communion, and plan other services during the year for the women of the parish.

Use the Church individually and together for silent prayer, meditation and quiet hours.

Worship regularly in the Church on Sunday, take part at other times in the parish devotional plans, and enter fully into the life of the parish.

Participate in the World Day of Prayer, Feb. 28, 1936, in the services at the time of the Diocesan Convention, May 11 and 12, and in the National Quiet Day of Prayer on Nov. 11.

Include at your meetings and in your personal devotions the following objects from time to time: peace and good will among nations, Church unity, all agencies working for the Kingdom of God throughout the world, missionaries and prayer partners, the National Council to which we are Auxiliary, the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, the community, social justice, a Christian social order, the diocese, the bishops and organizations, your parish, your leaders, the sick and one another.

Ask for devotional books and leaflets from the diocesan bookshelf.

If we have something to give others, let us try to share our achievements with different groups in our own and other parishes. Let us use and contribute to a religious book shelf. We suggest for study such topics as Personal Religion, Bible Study, Prayer, and Symbolism of the Church. In studying the Bible we urge the use of a modern translation in addition to the King James version and call attention to the value of supplementary reading.

In thinking of our work in the **Community** we should consider how much we can learn of what the Church is doing in other parishes and through other agencies. Become informed as to the industrial, economic and social conditions in the community and discover how Christian influence and effort may be brought to bear upon the solution of these problems.

Surely we all desire to have a share in the upbuilding and strengthening of our new **Diocese**. Therefore, we must make a real effort to become "diocesan-minded"! A help in achieving this goal would be the study of our rural missions, diocesan organization, or the history of the Diocese. We urge faithful attendance upon Deane-
ry and Diocesan meetings as a means of mutual benefit.

Moving forward into the fields of the **Nation** and the **World**, the great missionary enterprise pleads its cause with a strong voice. Our special mission study topic is "Latin America," to be succeeded by "Africa" and "The Negro in the United States" for 1936-37. We also suggest the following topics: The New American Prayer Book, The History of the Episcopal Church, Christian Citizenship, and International Relations with special reference to World Peace.

Do not forget that a Church paper is a mine of information and a well-spring of inspiration and enthusiasm.

As Pilgrims on the Disciples' Way, let us use our Forward Movement leaflets as our Pilgrim's Staves and Sandals, knowing that they will help us upward a few steps day by day. In our Pilgrim's Wallet, let us store the treasure of our Bibles and Prayer Books to use with fresh insight, new understanding and joyful appreciation. May we choose for our Pilgrim's Lantern the illuminating and guiding power of Prayer which burns the brighter as we learn how to feed the flame—so shall we be able to "turn, follow, learn, pray, serve, worship and share."

Aims and Suggestions for 1936

Each parish chairman of Social Service has a copy of the diocesan program with very definite suggestions for the carrying out of her work. Because, however, the giving of relief and co-operation with secular social agencies is so well taken care of in almost all parishes, we choose to emphasize the following three aims:

FIRST: Co-operation between all parish organizations for women in the working out of a parish social service plan. The diocesan program is made out by such a committee.

SECOND: A Corporate Communion for all those engaged in social service work, whether members of parish organizations or not. This has the two-fold purpose of recognizing their service to humanity and helping them realize that they are serving the Master in their work.

THIRD: The study of some social problem such as world peace or race relations. This is a necessary part of our work. We must have an intelligent understanding of the questions before us if we are to help in preventing social evils and not merely alleviate the resulting suffering. Surely no matter how small your branch, if you do not care to have a study group or a lecture (though this would be a splendid way in which to co-operate with the rest of the parish or some other church), at least one of your members could review a book or magazine article.

Even if you do not have one whole meeting devoted to social service, though this seems very little, will you not at least arrange for the use of social service prayers at your meetings? You will find "Prayers for Self and Society" by James Meyers, and "Social Prayers and Devotions," compiled by Emily M. Morgan, very helpful. Many of the Forward Movement prayers are appropriate also, especially the one "For a New World Order."

Patterson, the late Commissioner of Agriculture of this state, and his wife, Mary S. Patterson. Rev. Hugh A. Dobbin is Rector of this school of 100 and a Mission of 15 men and 24 women. This is a school where Christian training is the prevailing rule.
2. St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, California. Deaconess A. G. Newell is in charge. A training school for white girls, also a home for missionaries on furlough, especially those en route to the Orient.
3. All Saints' Mission, Vieques, Puerto Rico. Rev. Modesto Rivera. Boys and girls from 3 to 16 years of age. Men and women enrolled. Accommodations for 186.
4. St. Paul's, Eagle, Alaska. Rev. A. G. Fullerton. 84 women and children. Indian. Girls' Friendly Society is taking this box, minus heavy clothing which has to be bought through Supply Treasurer with Supply Fund money.
5. St. Mary's Mission, Hot Springs, Arkansas. Colored Mission. Rev. Robert Johnson in charge. A three story building with summer camps and special work among the young people. The only school of its kind in the state. Clothing sent there is sold in their Mission store. On account of the "Healing Waters" of Hot Springs, the population jumps from 25,000 to 100,000 during winter months. Many Episcopalian visitors. A U. T. O. worker is needed here.

Aims and Suggestions for 1936

There should be a custodian or committee in each parish co-operating with all parish organizations for women and girls, including the Church School.

Every woman and girl should have a Blue Box, and be given frequent opportunities to know about the U. T. O. and to secure her box.

There should be many larger gifts for particular blessings.

There should be two ingatherings during the year, one on or near the first Sunday in June, and one before All Saints' Day, preceded by a devotional preparation.

The offerings should be sent promptly after the ingatherings to the diocesan treasurer.

A careful study of the use, purpose and meaning of the U. T. O. should be made, and the resolutions of the last Triennial should be familiar to all.

The following recent leaflets of the U. T. O. should be used and distributed as widely as possible: Thankfulness—John W. Suter, Jr., U. T. O. Questions Answered (W. A. 105), The Spirit of the Little Blue Box, The U. T. O. in Action, Thanksgiving, The U. T. O. issue of The Spirit of Missions, The U. T. O. Prayer Card and the Resolution of the Triennial, 1934.

The prayer for the U. T. O. should be included often at the meetings of the various organizations and in the private devotions of the women of the Church.

Let us cultivate the spirit of thankfulness in our daily life and give fuller expression to it through the U. T. O.

EXTRACTS FROM A LETTER OF DR. JOHN W. WOOD

I am deeply gratified with the desire to retain the item for **All Saints Mission, Bontoc**. That is one of the most appealing and needy out-posts we have. The Mission has suffered terribly because of cuts in the budget. **Deaconess Shaw** has been at her wits' end to keep things going. She is working sixteen or seventeen hours a day because the Mission is short-handed, and so much time has to be taken up in finding ways to effect economies.

St. Luke's Hospital, Ponce, Puerto Rico, the only mission hospital on the south coast of Puerto Rico. Its ministration reaches out to the eastern and western ends of the Island, and back into the interior. The hospital was established nearly thirty years ago. The original building passed through several hurricanes and an earthquake, and was finally very badly damaged by the hurricane of 1928. The new building was completed in 1931. It is, so far as possible, earthquake and hurricane proof. It is a most attractive building, accommodating about eighty patients. It is splendidly administered by Miss Ellen T. Hicks as Superintendent.

The young women in the Training School at St. Luke's are devoted to her and go out after their training for work in various parts of Puerto Rico with Miss Hicks' high ideals of the nurse's mission. Over the door of the Training School she placed these words: "Enter to learn. Go out to serve."

St. Mary's School, Springfield, South Dakota, was established many years ago by Bishop Hare. It has been carrying on for the last two generations in making a great contribution to the life of Indian young women. It has grown from an elementary school into the only high school we have for Indian girls in all that region. It has done important work in preparing Indian young women to be the mothers in Christian homes, and for service in various ways to their own people in South Dakota.

Fort Valley School for Negro Young Men and Women, Fort Valley, Georgia, a school whose service is rendered in two directions: First, the training of young people as teachers. Secondly, the training of young people through its Industrial Department to make their living in various trades and occupations. This school is located in the heart of Georgia and in the midst of a Negro population of about 500,000. Its student body comes not only from Georgia, but from other southern cities as well, and a few of the northern states. The principal, Mr. H. A. Hunt, is a man of remarkable balance of mind and spirit, and has had unique opportunities for serving his own people. He has always risen to those opportunities.

Our work in India was begun in 1933. It is not included in the budget of the National Council. It was undertaken, however, in accordance with the action of the General Convention of the church in Denver, when it instructed a committee to undertake the work and raise the money necessary for it up to the amount of \$15,000 a year. We have never been able to reach that amount, but I am glad to be able to tell you that work is going on. We have sent the Rev. and Mrs. George Shriver to serve in the Diocese of Dornakal under that great Indian leader, the Rt. Rev. V. S. Azariah, the only Indian who is a Diocesan Bishop.

Any amount given for India would not count upon the quota. It would be a Special, but I feel sure that the Woman's Auxiliary in Rochester desires to move forward and to see the Church move forward to new tasks.
