

## EXCERPTS FROM THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, JANUARY 15, 1937

What do we want to accomplish in 1937?

1. We need new branches. In the Genesee Valley Deanery there is no branch in Bolivar or in Piffard. In the Northeastern Deanery we should have branches in Clyde, Dresden, Holcomb, Shortsville and Wolcott. In the Rochester Deanery there is now no branch in East Rochester, Honeoye Falls, or St. Matthew's, Rochester. In the Southeastern Deanery, Canisteo and Hammondsport should be organized. I hereby appoint the Deanery presidents and their Executive Committees to this special work.

2. We must enlist young women in Auxiliary service. I appoint Mrs. Brokaw and Mrs. Boller a committee on junior work for this year.

3. We very much need an institute for officer and leader training even if it be a one day institute. I appoint Mrs. Jameson chairman of a committee whom she will select, to make plans and carry through this project. (Mrs. Charles Persell, Jr., has been added to this committee.)

4. We should continually enlarge the scope of our work by special invitation to women not affiliated with the Auxiliary to participate in our activities. I hereby appoint *each* and *every* parish president to this committee.

5. We need more fellowship between parishes where there are several in one place, thus bringing greater realization of our Church as *one Church*. To this end I suggest that where possible at least one joint project be carried through this year. I appoint Mrs. Whitmore, Mrs. Tunmore and Mrs. Bennett to this committee.

6. We must have special preparation for the coming Triennial meeting. Special prayers should be used at all meetings, the suggested books should be read and discussed, and careful consideration should be given to the selection of delegates whom we shall elect at our Annual Meeting.

Finally, and now I am looking ahead to next October, we need a plan, which I hope will be a diocesan plan, whereby there may be brought back to our Diocese, with a concrete statement for diocesan application, the messages, the spirit and the inspiration of the Triennial meeting and General Convention.

If these aims are accomplished this year, perhaps the Church will have, as Dr. Barry expresses it, "penetrated," and I feel that with this new *penetration* we shall report the one thing which makes for larger meetings, increased church attendance and greater gifts—a deeper spiritual development, for shall we not be following in the steps of the "Disciples' Way"?

The following resolution has been adopted by the Executive Committee:

"Resolved: That a Committee on Custody and Investment of Permanent Funds be appointed by the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Rochester. This committee shall consist of five members whose term of office shall be five years. For self-perpetuation this committee shall be organized as follows: One member appointed for one year, one member for two years, one member for three years, one member for four years and one member for five years. Each member shall be eligible for re-appointment. All income shall be paid to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary and an annual report be made to the Executive Committee."

The membership of this committee on Permanent Funds will probably be completed at the next meeting of the Executive Committee.

## THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

Your United Thank Offering Committee greets you on this new page of the new Year Book. We set before you some facts about the United Thank Offering, since next October is the time for the great Presentation Service which opens the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council to be held in Cincinnati. At that time and place our gifts of money will be placed on the Altar.

Many devoted women who are doing the practical work of the Church's Mission, or who are being prepared to do it, are hoping that the women and girls of this Diocese have filled their little blue boxes generously, so that their work may progress. Also, we must not forget the women who have spent the best of their lives in the service of the Church and who should be cared for, if necessary, when they are no longer able to work.

It appears that only by interesting more women and girls, and by increasing our own gifts, shall we bring our Offering up to a sum large enough to be adequate. Our Diocese is far behind its last Triennial record at the time of this writing.

In a letter from Miss Bessie Blacknall, a United Thank Offering worker in Nenana, Alaska, she writes of the bright, lovable children she has in charge. For a year Deaconess Thompson and Miss Blacknall carried on the work in Nenana which before had been done by four women. This was because the United Thank Offering had failed to provide funds for salaries. Then the Diocese of North Carolina (Miss Blacknall's home diocese) made it possible for one other woman to join the staff.

Remember also that the Alaskan Church, the Chinese Church, Igorot women, and others are doing their share in contributing to the Offering. Nenana is several hundred dollars ahead of their last Triennial Offering.

Do you know what the United Thank Offering is accomplishing in the life of the Church? Will you read *The Spirit of Missions*, particularly the next April issue?

Dropping a coin into the little blue box may develop into a liberal education for you. Please try it!

## GENERAL INFORMATION FOR 1937

*Aims and Suggestions*—For Devotional Life, Religious Education, Missions, Christian Social Service and Supplies will be found in the 1936 Year Book, a few copies of which are still available.

*Year Book*—Two additional copies may be obtained free of charge by writing to the Corresponding Secretary. If more than two copies are desired, send 25 cents for each additional copy.

*Girls' Friendly Society*—Annual Meeting, May 1st.

*The Diocesan Convention and the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council*—St. Thomas' Church, Winton Road, Rochester, May 11th and 12th.

The program includes joint sessions; a fellowship dinner; an evening service; a Corporate Communion; conferences. There will be separate meetings for business, which for the Auxiliary will include election of officers and delegates to the Triennial Meeting. Deaconess Shaw of the Philippines will be one of the speakers.

*Parish Ingathering of the United Thank Offering*—June 6th, and in the early fall. Everything received before October 5th will be included in the Triennial Offering.

*The Inter-diocesan Summer Conference for Young People*—Alfred, N. Y., June 27th to July 3rd. For information write to Miss Bernice Becker, 307 Hiram Sibley Building, Rochester.

*Fall Deanery Meetings*—will be held after the close of the Triennial Meeting.

*The Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council*, October 6th to 20th, Cincinnati, Ohio.

This meeting is the governing body of the Auxiliary and is always held at the time and place of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. In Cincinnati the House of Bishops, the House of Deputies and the Woman's Auxiliary will assemble under the same roof—if the facilities are still available!

The program of the Triennial is to be centered in the thought of the Church's Mission,—“the deepening of Christian faith and fellowship throughout the world.” There will be addresses and group conferences on “Our Faith,” “Our Opportunity,” “Our Mission.” The National Executive Board hopes that by giving more time for conferences and personal contacts a program for the next three years can be completed by the close of the meeting. The Triennial will *nominate* to the National Council the Executive Secretary for the Woman's Auxiliary and four women to represent the women of the Church; and *elect* eight members at large to the National Executive Board of the Auxiliary.

The General Convention will open on October 6th with a special service which thousands of Church members will attend.

The United Thank Offering of the women of the Church will be presented at the Corporate Communion on October 7th, and the amount of the offering announced at the meeting on the evening of the same day. A generous offering is needed if our United Thank Offering workers are to be adequately taken care of and our buildings kept in even fair repair. Diocesan and parish Corporate Communions will be held on this day throughout the country.

Each diocesan branch is entitled to five delegates and five alternates who are expected to be present during the entire two weeks. On their return to their several dioceses they will bring back much of the faith and vision, knowledge and enthusiasm gained from these crowded and thrilling days. Our Church papers will have daily and weekly issues at special prices for all who wish to subscribe.

The prayers, intelligent interest and faith of those at home are needed to enable the General Convention and Triennial to see clearly the next steps forward along the Disciples' Way. The Call to Prayer, prepared by the Diocese of Southern Ohio is enclosed for the use of every parish branch from now until the close of the meetings.

## World Conferences in 1937

Two important conferences of the Christian world will be held in Great Britain during the summer of 1937.

*The Universal Christian Council for Life and Work*—Oxford, England, July 12th to 25th.

This is a Council of the Churches of the world which is concerned with the practical meaning of the Christian faith in relation to concrete problems of the modern world. This year, delegates from all over the world will think out afresh the essential message and task of Christianity in the face of rival systems which are competing with the Christian Church for the allegiance of the world.

Mrs. Harper Sibley of Rochester is a member of the American Section of the Council and will be a delegate from the Episcopal Church. Mrs. Henry Hill Pierce of New York, our Provincial Representative on the National Executive Board, will also be a delegate from our Church.

*The World Conference on Faith and Order*—Edinburgh, Scotland, August 3rd to 18th.

Bishop Brent was President of the first Conference in Lausanne in 1927. The Faith and Order Movement was initiated by the General Convention on October 19th, 1910, and now includes some 40 nations and 70 churches. This second conference will explore further the possibilities of re-union among Christian bodies themselves. "The pressure of lay opinion, the demand of ordinary men and women who are determined no longer to be kept out of real fellowship and communion with one another in Christ, will help the leaders to see the movement for unity through to the end."

Dr. William Alfred Eddy, President of Hobart College, will be a delegate from the Episcopal Church; and one or two women will be appointed as alternates. The Hon. Alanson B. Houghton of Corning is Treasurer, and Mrs. Edwin Allen Stebbins of Rochester is a member of the American Section of the Continuation Committee.

A special leaflet for the Woman's Auxiliary will be available after March first. It will contain prayers, book lists for general reading, and suggestions as to what lay people can do to help these two conferences.
