CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

"Give us grace to be ever willing and ready to minister, as Thou enablest us, to the necessities of our fellow men."

There has been a decided increase in the work our branches are doing for the social agencies in their communities. Thousands of articles of all kinds and many hours of regular service are given for our hospitals, Community Chests, the Red Cross, the Needle-work Guild, Motor Corps and the Public Health Nursing Associations. Some of our groups are working closely with their Boy and Girl Scout troops. One group is doing an outstanding work by helping to americanize a number of young Syrians in its parish. Names of our members also appear on the boards of all important social agencies in their communities.

Social Service Sunday was observed throughout the diocese with appropriate sermons, hymns and prayers.

I hope that the year 1938 will see every parish with a Social Service Committee composed of a member from each organization, with a planned program in which each organization has a definite part.

DEVOTIONAL LIFE

"Help us to glorify thee as becometh those who are trying to follow our Lord Jesus Christ."

In 1937 the chief devotional activities have been, first: co-operation in the panel discussion in May, when Mrs. Edsall prepared us for a larger part in the work of prayer for Church Unity and pointed out fresh opportunities for prayer in the parish branches; second, the Fellowship of Preparation for the World Conferences and the Triennial, in which over a hundred individuals joined and received the intercessions carefully planned by Mrs. Odell; third, the meditation led by Father Hassinger at the time of the Diocesan Institute, which helped those present individually and emphasized again the place meditation might hold in each group; fourth, the conference of devotional leaders in the Geneva Deanery, conducted by Mrs. Odell and Mrs. Hedrick, where problems were shared and suggestions made for making the devotional life richer and deeper.

The parish branches report various ways of making prayer more real and vital, which is always the chief problem. A number find creating the mood of prayer a necessity—by reading a fitting paragraph from a sermon, devotional book or leaflet, or by speaking informally about prayer before using the prayers chosen. One branch plans to have at least two members present at each celebration of the Holy Communion, with special intercessions for the silent moments. Others find it essential to lay aside all work in order to have quiet hands and minds with which to enter into the spirit and work of prayer. To have different leaders has been found helpful. Special devotional services in preparation for Christmas and Easter have been a vital factor in more than one branch.

Devotional books and leaflets have been sent to every diocesan and deanery meeting. In addition to the Quiet Day of Prayer and the Forward-day by day leaflets, approximately 500 books and pamphlets have been sold by deanery and diocesan officers. These have ranged in price from one cent to \$1.75.

New prayers are offered in this Year Book for use in 1938. Devotional books and leaflets may be purchased or borrowed by writing to the devotional chairman.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

"O Heavenly Father, we beseech thee, by the incomparable power of thy Holy Spirit, to renew our minds."

During the past year, the majority of our Diocesan Branches reporting, studied both suggested topics namely, *Africa* and *The Negro in the United States*. But of those selecting a single subject, the majority chose that of the *Negro*, indicating as in past years a predelection for "home missions." The list of additional topics chosen showed a steadily growing desire to study teachings and practices of our Church and her historical background, and problems of personal religion. The study of the Bible is becoming more and more a spiritual adventure. Nearly two-thirds of the branches reported a most encouraging growth of interest in educational work. One of the significant sign-posts along this upward road of fresh vision and renewed effort is that bearing the words—"More reading of Church periodicals!" Perhaps it is because we are a rural diocese that 75% of the branches have decided to study the *Rural Church* for 1937-1938.

The most important event of our educational year was the Institute for the women of the Diocese, held at St. Paul's, Rochester on Nov. 18th and 19th. The program included a class on leadership conducted by Mrs. J. W. D. Cooper; a conference on *Methods of Studying the Bible* led by Dr. George E. Norton; an address on *The Oxford Conference* by Mrs. Harper Sibley; a lecture on *The Romance of the English Bible* by Mrs. Cooper; Officers' conferences; a Mission study class conducted by your Chairman assisted by Mrs. I. V. A. Snyder; an address on *Personal Prayer and The Art of Meditation* by Father H. H. Hassinger; an address on *Missions* by Bishop Reinheimer and a social service conference led by the Rev. F. E. Reissig.

As we look forward to another year of parish and diocesan work, let us think of our responsibilities very seriously and plan very carefully to link up our every effort with those great forces which are working for peace and the spirit of good will in our troubled and fear-possessed world. Education is one of the great stepping-stones to Brotherhood. Using it we gain that accurate information and intelligent and sympathetic understanding which help keep ablaze the torch of Truth whose light is able to dispel the dark shadows, of mistrust, suspicion, fear and prejudice.

In all our reading, study and thinking let us remember that we can thereby do our share, small though it may be, to solve world problems. As Dr. Francis Wei said in a recent address, "Whatever we Christians may be able to do seems a drop in the bucket. But I always say that that drop may change the color of the whole bucket because it is God's drop. God will work miracles if we are His willing instruments."
