

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To the officers and members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

The year that has just passed has been filled with deep shadows which concern vitally all of us who belong to that world fellowship which is the Church. The tragic conflict in Spain; the continuing struggle in the Far East; and the constant threat of war in Europe make us pause and turn searchingly to God to try and discover anew His will, and the mind that was in Christ Jesus which guides us still through His Holy Spirit.

Humbly we are forced to confess our own share in the world's tragedy. Christ gave us a pattern of the world He trusted us to build. He called it the Kingdom of God, and the substance out of which it was to be built, He said, was "love" — love of God and, equally, love of our fellow man. In the last twenty years, which is the generation for which we are responsible, we have not created enough love to maintain even one village, really Christian, let alone a World Community. Fear and hate and suspicion have had the upper hand, even among those who call themselves Christians.

Let us confess our sin and then let us take as our goal this coming year the fourth chapter of the first epistle of St. John, beginning at the seventh verse, — "Beloved, let us love one another, for love is of God."

It has been a very great joy to me to serve as your President for this year. At the annual meeting in Geneva it was most encouraging that, in response to Bishop Reinheimer's request for one hundred new members, 238 were admitted to different branches of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Our first activity this fall was the participation of the Woman's Auxiliary in the "Mission of Witness" under the chairmanship of Mrs. John Tyler of Canandaigua. Twenty-seven women took part. After an all day session of instruction conducted by Bishop Reinheimer, the members were given their assignments, going two by two. The subjects covered were:

The Program of the Church

Evangelism

Church Unity

Forty-two meetings were held; sixty-three parishes and missions took part; and eleven hundred people participated. At the closing meeting of the "Missioners" we were very sure that the Mission had been worth while—but we were equally sure that it had done us more good than anyone else.

At our first meeting of the Executive Board we set as one of our goals a closer, more understanding and more tangible relationship with the Girls' Friendly Society. This was begun by having Margaret Jefferson—a field secretary from the National G. F. S.—speak at each of the fall Deanery meetings. She gave us a most clear picture of the new up-to-date Girls' Friendly Branch, and added much to the inspiration of each meeting. On December 12th at Epiphany Church a joint meeting of the two boards was held, and further plans for co-operation were discussed. At our open Board meeting in January — notwithstanding the blizzard — Margaret Bridges — a member of the Girls' Friendly — came from Geneva to Rochester to speak on India, one of our regular budget items.

Our interest in India is, of course, especially great, as Marian Latz of this Diocese is now in India—our first woman missionary to the Diocese of Dornakal. It was our privilege to help raise the budget for her expenses, and \$25.00 more was given than was asked for.

Finally, as we have already noted in the dedication of the Year Book, we feel deeply the loss of Bishop Ferris as our Diocesan. For 18 years he has been not only our leader but a friend to each one of us personally. Such a relationship does not end with a term of office, or even with life itself, but belongs to that realm which we know to be eternal. To Bishop and Mrs. Ferris belong always our deep devotion.

In closing, we pledge to Bishop Reinheimer our loyal support and constant co-operation as we work together for the coming of Christ's Kingdom in each individual, in each family, in every parish, in this Diocese, in America, and unto the uttermost parts of the world.

I have on hand, December 11, 1938, \$162.15.

Over 250 blue boxes have been given out since June, and I attended and spoke for the United Thank Offering at all four Deanery meetings in October.

I am urging all custodians to send in their offerings twice a year—in June and in November. I think it helps to keep up interest in the United Thank Offering. There has been no meeting of this Committee as yet. I am waiting for our new appointment.

I should welcome the chance to speak in any parish on the United Thank Offering and to distribute boxes, posters and literature.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

There is a need for more co-operation with churches of other denominations, and I hope our women will take advantage of any opportunity to work with women of other religions in any community project.

Mrs. I. V. A. Snyder, chairman, held a conference on Missions at the annual meeting in Geneva, June first, which was attended by forty persons.

During 1939 may our work at home and our prayers for those on the Mission field create a greater interest in our Church Missions Program.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council has held seven meetings during 1938, with as many celebrations of the Holy Communion as possible, and with an average attendance of eighteen members. In addition, one open executive committee meeting was held, and one joint meeting with the executive committee of the Girl's Friendly Society. The annual meeting in June and the four deanery meetings in October were very interesting and well attended by the women of the diocese.

This committee learned with regret of the retirement from active service of Bishop Ferris at the annual meeting in June. His guidance and council through the years have been a source of inspiration to us all. We have dedicated the 1939 Year Book to Bishop Ferris as an expression of our appreciation for his years of leadership and devotion.

We cordially welcome Bishop Reinheimer as successor to Bishop Ferris and are happy to assure him of our loyalty and co-operation in carrying forward his plans for diocesan work.

At the open meeting of this committee last February, Bishop Reinheimer asked for a human offering of one hundred new members of the Woman's Auxiliary to celebrate the centennial of the establishment of the Episcopal Church in Rochester, and at the annual meeting in June, 238 new members were presented to him, many of whom were there in person.

Seven new branches and chapters of the Woman's Auxiliary have been formed during 1938, five of them since the Mission of Witness; also 256 new members of the Woman's Auxiliary have been added.

At the executive committee meeting in December it was decided to hold an open meeting of the executive committee to present the budget and the annual reports of the diocesan officers to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

DEVOTIONAL LIFE

"That we may win our way to justice, freedom, and peace, not by might, nor by power, but by thy Spirit in Jesus Christ our Lord."

During 1938 we have all seen appalling results from the use of force. It is increasingly clear that the things we prize most can only exist where the Spirit of our Lord is allowed to rule. The Committee on Devotional Life has chosen the above words to assist us in keeping this fact in the center of our thoughts and prayers in 1939. Prayer is worship and meditation and communion with God, but it is also service. As a means of bringing the Spirit of Christ into the affairs of men, it is service that is essential, effective and enduring.

The reports received from 47 branches indicate that while there has been a rich variety in the choice of prayers and devotional material, prayers and litanies for peace have been used more often than any others. Prayers from Forward—Day by Day and Prayers New and Old, those in the Year Books for 1936 and 1938, the services and prayers in the new devotional packet, have all been generally used. In addition to these over 50 different kinds of devotional books and pamphlets have been sold at diocesan, deanery and parish meetings by the Committee.

Ninety-three Corporate Communions have been held. One branch reports eleven and six branches report none.

The Quiet Day of Prayer on November 11 was observed in all but two parishes. In many instances, as a result of the "Mission of Witness," members of other communions were invited to attend. The experiences growing out of this invitation were among the most significant of the year. The most complete reports came from Wellsville, Hornell, and St. Peter's, Geneva. 1,700 copies of the leaflet were distributed.

The Quiet Hour held at the time of the Annual Meeting in June was the outstanding single contribution of the Devotional Committee during the year. Four different types of services, all brief, were led by four members. The hour thus spent seemed well worth while in itself, and the services are being used in many branches in whole or in part.

Variety, careful preparation and selection of material, enough time, a quiet atmosphere, talks on prayer and personal religion by the rector and others, special services of intercession and quiet in the Church, relating the devotions to the program and to the seasons of the year, and finally, the need for prayer in the present world situation, have helped to deepen and strengthen the devotional life in 1938. We commend all these to you for 1939.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

"Help us to think honestly, to think courageously, to think unselfishly, to think serenely and to think triumphantly."

It is a happy circumstance which allows me to begin my report on an optimistic and encouraging note. This year a greater number of branches have reported and over half of these have stated that their groups have showed increasing interest in and enthusiasm for the educational work. Varying methods of attacking the study material are more generally used all over the diocese and apparently with greater ease and skill.

The two recommended subjects for 1938, "The Moslem World" and "The Rural Church," were both studied by 13 of the branches heard from. Two branches chose "The Moslem World" and 26 branches concentrated on "The Rural Church," again showing that the appeal of the task that lies upon our door-step exercises the greatest attraction for the majority of persons! "The Rural Church" was a challenging topic and one of the greatest importance, especially to a rural diocese, and it is hoped that the companion topic for 1939, "The City Church" will prove equally popular.

The 22 additional topics studied last year were varied and interesting. They ranged all over the wide world from Alaska to China, India, Africa and Liberia. In our United States, the Crow Creek Mission and the Blue Ridge Industrial School were chosen for special investigation and one branch made a "rural pilgrimage" all over the land visiting outstanding missions and pieces of Church work in many states. Other topics were, "The Church Army," "Living with Our Children," "Church History," "Church Symbolism," "Why Be a Christian?", "Why Go to Church?" This kaleidoscopic list shows a mental alertness to national and world conditions, needs and problems, as well as a seeking for the truth and beauty of the tapestry of the past to which our modern lives are fastened by so many golden and colorful threads.

Our program for this year is further enriched by the choice of India as our second subject. "Moving Millions" is our fascinating text-book and in addition we have Bishop Azariah's splendid and valuable book, "India and the Christian Movement," also an unusually fine leaders' packet. We should have a very personal interest in India this year as the diocese has sent Miss Marion Latz to work under Bishop Azariah in Dornakal.

In October, many of the women of the Auxiliary assisted Bishop Reinheimer in carrying out his "Mission of Witness" which sent its members into every parish and mission of the diocese, that they might speak to the Church women on "Good Works," "Evangelism" and "Unity." Educational conferences were held and brief talks on the material given at all of the October Deanery meetings.

Your secretary has spoken in 14 different parishes on various topics; assisted at the World Day of Prayer in Rochester; attended all Executive Committee meetings but one and the Provincial Synod meeting at Garden City, L. I. I have also conducted three courses in Church History, open to all, on Tuesday mornings and Monday evenings at St. Paul's Church, Rochester.

As we look forward into the new year of our Lord, let us do our share to make it truly our Lord's year, consecrating every talent we possess to build up His Church and His Kingdom. In the Pastoral Letter of 1934, our Bishops said, "Our discipleship relates us to the just and Christian solution of economic, social and political problems. Nothing that is of human interest can be foreign to us." Bishop Lawrence tells us, "We must tackle the seeds of world problems in our own lives, working them out within these dimensions, we will be resolved from a sense of futility and ineffectiveness, the problems of society and of the world are found in miniature in our own lives, so it is there we must face, attack and conquer them."

Everything we think and learn and then share with others in saying and doing, set forces in motion whose influence and power can not be measured. It has been said that of all forms of action the most strategic is the act of thought, "Let us therefore seek to be on God's side, keeping our minds active, receptive and growing, always remembering that they must be kept well-ordered for His thought to enter them and that 'one man with God constitutes a majority'!"

CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

On January 10th, 1938, the Church Periodical Club celebrated its fiftieth birthday. Our big financial endeavor was to bring the Endowment Fund up to \$50,000.00 which meant raising the difference between the present amount and \$50,000.00 or approximately \$2,000.00.

The two-point forward program for 1939-1940 is:

1. An active branch in every Parish and Mission.
2. Every man, woman and child a member.

At present we have about 4,000 unfilled requests at the National Office in New York. Will you help to fill these by sending me the name of the magazine you will either re-mail, or a subscription you will send and help us meet this demand? Our subscriptions go to clergymen, missionaries and their families.

Our diocese has done its share to the best of its ability and with many handicaps. I want to thank all my secretaries for carrying on so well while I was indisposed, and all the parishes for their contributions to the Endowment Fund. We sent the National Office in New York, \$70.00 for this fund.

The proceeds from two card parties made it possible for us to finance our expenses. We sent 500 new Christmas cards to Rev. Mr. McKim for Iola and the County Hospital; Christmas books to Missionaries at home; 15,327 magazines were distributed to 14 institutions, and about 3,000 cards, new and old. Miscellaneous gifts, such as calendars, puzzles, games, scrap books, playing cards and a radio were included in the contributions.

It is more blessed to give than to receive.
