




REMINDERS FOR PARISH OFFICERS.

1. Annual dues of 25 cents per member, should be paid in March.
2. Delegates to annual convention should be elected in April.
3. All money, except for the United Offering, must be sent to the *Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. Jessie Dean Johnson*, otherwise the Branch sending it will receive no credit therefor.
4. The United Offering should be collected twice a year, in October and April, by the parish custodians.

The October offering should be sent at once to the United Offering Custodian, Miss Duvall, Cheraw, and the April offering be carried to the Convention at Spartanburg in an envelope provided for the purpose, giving name of branch, name of custodian, amount of October offering, and amount enclosed. Should there be no delegate, the offering should be sent direct to Miss Duvall.

The whole will be presented on the alms basin at the United Offering Service at the Convention.

5. Books of the Diocesan Treasurer close May 4th. Money sent in after that time cannot be included in report for current year.

6. Any work that aids the Board of Missions to meet its obligations is legitimate work for the Auxiliary. When in doubt about it, write to the Diocesan Secretary.

FOUR DEFINITIONS, BY THE ASSISTANT TREASURER OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

1. *An Appropriation* is a promise made by the Board of Missions to give something it does not at the time possess. This promise is *always fulfilled*.

The appropriations are made in May, for the year beginning on the following first of September, not only with no money in the treasury for that purpose, but (speaking from experience) without sufficient contributions on hand to meet the third of the current year's appropriations, which are then still to be paid.

2. *An Apportionment* is a Minimum contribution asked for from the Church to enable the Board to fulfil its promises. The Apportionment is *not always fulfilled*.

The Apportionment is made to each Diocese the first of each year by the Board of Missions by direction of the General Convention, in proportion to the average gross receipts of the Diocese for all purposes. The Apportionment to each Diocese is then divided among the parishes, by the Bishop or some local authority of the Diocese, to be paid as early as may be in the fiscal year which begins September 1.

3. A *Designated Contribution* is a gift for some stated portion of the work to aid the Board of Missions in meeting its appropriation or promise. These gifts are *always applied as requested*.

Designated contributions apply upon the apportionment of the parish or the Woman's Auxiliary, as the case may be, and can be made in any amount, for a large number of purposes connected with mission work at home or abroad, hospitals, schools, etc., for which the Board of Missions has made an appropriation. The Officers of the Church Missions House can always give information as to such appropriations.

4. A *Special* is a gift for some stated purpose, to be sent over and above any appropriation by Board of Missions. Specials are *always paid as requested*.

Specials necessarily, therefore, do not apply on the Apportionment, for that is to enable the Board to pay its promises or appropriations, while Specials, on the other hand, are to be sent to the field over and above any appropriation, or for some stated work for which no appropriation has been made.

The Woman's Auxiliary's share in the Diocesan apportionment is \$1,600 this year.

CONDENSED REPORT OF THE 29TH ANNUAL CONVENTION

The 29th Annual Convention of the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, convened in St. Luke's Church, Charleston at 10 a. m., on Ascension Day, Thursday, May 21st. The delegates and members of the Diocesan Branch met together in their Annual Corporate Communion Service, presented their United Offering, and listened to the encouraging and inspiring words of their Bishop in his Annual Address. The Bishop was assisted in this service by the Rev. Louis G. Wood, rector of the church, and by the Reverends H. H. Lumpkin and Walter Mitchell.

Special music and missionary hymns were rendered by St. Luke's Choir, and a most beautiful and impressive service was the result.

The first business session of the Convention was called to order by the President Mrs. Wm E. Haskell, in St. Luke's Parish Hall at 12:15, P. M.

Prayers for Missions and for guidance in the work of the Convention were offered by the Bishop, after which the Reverend Mr. Wood, Rector of St. Luke's, welcomed the delegates and members of the Auxiliary to Charleston, and to St. Luke's Parish. He spoke of the splendid work accomplished, and of the high ideals upheld by the Woman's Auxiliary, but urged a greater simplicity of organization. Mr. Wood gave a particular welcome to our president, who for many years was a most earnest and devoted member of St. Luke's.

Mrs. Haskell expressed for the members of the Convention, their appreciation of Mr. Wood's welcome, and assured St. Luke's Parish and Auxiliary Branch, of their pleasure in meeting here, and of their anticipation of the benefits and blessings to be derived from the convention. She then introduced Miss Alice Gregg and Miss Frances Marshall, two of our missionary volunteers, to whom the Convention gave a rising vote of welcome.

The president read the "Special Rules of Order" which were to govern the convention, and then delivered her annual address.

The secretary read the annual message of Miss Emery, the general secretary, which was listened to with interest and attention.

President's address and reports of officers are printed in full in the Annual.

It was moved and carried that a letter of love and greeting be sent to Miss Emery from the convention.

The secretary called the roll, which showed an attendance of 12 out of 13 of our Diocesan officers, and 178 representatives of 47 Woman's branches, 19 representatives of 7 branches of Chapter B—27 Juniors, representing 17 branches, 4 representatives of 4 Babies' Branches, and 2 Associate Members; making a total attendance of 230. No representation from 20 parish branches.

Upon motion of Mrs. I. G. Ball, which was formally carried, the extracts from the minutes of the 1913 convention, were dispensed with. The secretary read extracts from the minutes of the Executive Board meetings, after which the president announced the following committees:

The delegates and members of the Auxiliary were most cordially invited to luncheon, in St. Luke's rectory, and the morning session was adjourned with the benediction, pronounced by the Rev. F. A. deRosset, of Charleston.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

The Thursday afternoon session was called to order at 3:30 p. m. The opening prayers being offered by the Rev. L. G. Wood. The minutes of the morning session were read, and with minor corrections, approved, after which the routine business of the convention was resumed.

The Vice Presidents of the Greenville, Columbia and Charleston Convocations made their reports. The *Recording Secretary rendered a statement of her year's work, and the treasurer preceded her *statistical report, with the most welcome salutation, "The apportionment is paid and overpaid!"

Miss Edgerton called attention to the fact that the "Specials" to the Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund, the scholarship at Nenana, Alaska, and Arch Deacon Russell, at Lawrenceville, Va., had not been as popular as was to be desired. The contingent fund is discouragingly low, and must be enlarged in some way if the regular work of the branch is to be carried on as heretofore. Miss Edgerton felt it necessary to decline a renomination this year.

The *Box Secretary made an interesting and encouraging report. *The Educational Secretary reported interest and enthusiasm in her department. The Secretary read the *Report of the Church Periodical Club for Mrs. Heyward, who was unable to be present, which was followed by the reports of the *Junior Department, including the *Babies' Branch, and *Miss Boykin's report as secretary of the Spirit of Missions. Bishop Guerry here urged that similar steps be taken to increase the circulation of the *Diocese*.

Hymn 261 was sung, after which Mrs. Robt. Wilson, first president of the Diocesan Branch, presented a most interesting paper, entitled: †"A Sketch of our South Carolina Auxiliary." Mrs. Long moved a resolution of thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Wilson, and suggested that this paper be preserved, as one of the most valuable autograph records of the Branch.

In closing, Miss Lee spoke of the wonderful growth of the work under Mrs. Haskell and of "The Offering of Life" as the crowning glory of her leadership. Miss Ford read a most interesting and instructive paper, entitled "A Short History of the Church's Work Among the Negroes," after which Bishop Guerry told the con-

vention of the action taken at Council, in which they "approved the plan of the Colored Suffragan Bishop" and which had been referred to the committee on constitution and canons.

Miss Julia Clarkson then read a touching and interesting account of the birth of St. Thomas' Mission in 1879—under the loving, consecrated service of her father, and of the special work which had been carried on there by her mother, which is continued by herself. At the close of this paper, the Bishop added eloquent words of tribute to Mrs. Clarkson for her most efficient service, and especially commended a catechism which she had compiled for use among the negroes. He also spoke of the special negro work, done by Mrs. Willett of Brookgreen, on the Waccamaw River, and of the Sinkler family on their plantation at Belvedere.

Bishop Guerry announced that he had given permission for the organization of a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary among the negro church-women of the Diocese, and stated that he had placed Miss Clarkson in charge of the work until the organization shall be completed.

Mrs. Long moved the adoption of a resolution already adopted by the Executive Board:

"Whereas, the Bishop has given his approval of, and consent to, the organization of a Woman's Auxiliary, among the colored women of the Church of this Diocese, under officers of their own jurisdiction, separate from this branch of the Auxiliary, be it resolved: We, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of South Carolina, in Convention assembled, at Charleston, S. C., shall extend to the colored women's branch of the Auxiliary, when organized, the assurance of our interest, and desire to render them assistance when called upon."

Motion carried unanimously.

The Rev. Mr. Wood announced that Bishop and Mrs. Guerry would entertain all the members of the Auxiliary at their home on Broad street from 6:30 to 7:30 p. m. Also that the Charleston Branches of the Auxiliary would take the members of the convention to Fort Sumter the following day from 4 to 6 p. m.

Mrs. Haskell announced that she had appointed Miss Edgerton and Miss Duvall to serve as a committee to apportion the Diocesan apportionment of the Auxiliary. This committee proceeded to call a roll of the Branches

present. The branch apportionments for the current year were read, and were accepted, altered or rejected, as the delegates thought best.

The afternoon session then adjourned with the benediction.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION.

The Friday morning session was opened at 9:30 a. m., with prayer by the Rev. Louis T. Wood. The minutes of Thursday were read and approved, after which the president read an urgent *appeal from Miss Emery for a renewed interest in the Missionary Insurance Fund. The Treasurer stated that South Carolina had decided to give, at least \$50 per annum to this fund and that only \$33 had been given this year; \$67 is therefore necessary to meet last year's and the coming year's required amount. The secretary was instructed to call this matter to the attention of the branches.

The president read an appeal from St. John's Mission School, Corbin, Kentucky.

*The United Offering Custodian reported the result of her year's work, both as custodian and as chairman of the committee on *“The Offering of Life.” She likewise expressed her thanks to Messrs. Walter Williman, Granger Van Ness and Kenneth Parsons, for their kind help in counting the United Offering. At the close of Mrs Long's report the Rev. L. G. Wood offered prayers of thanksgiving for the wonderful way in which God has answered our prayer for the “Offering of Life.”

Miss Gregg and Miss Marshall, two of our volunteers, spoke a few words to the convention, expressive of their gratitude and appreciation of the wonderful opportunity and privilege, which they felt is offered them, and of their hope that their service may be found acceptable to God, to the Church, and to their fellowmen.

Miss Lee moved that a telegram of love and greeting be sent to Miss Singleton, and Miss Lee was requested to send the same.

Mrs. Tupper moved that \$125 be raised immediately to defray the traveling expenses of our “Limited Term of Service Missionaries” to St. Mary's on the Mountain, Tenn. Motion carried and pledges amounting to \$132.50 were handed in.

The next business on the programme was the “Conference of the Woman's Auxiliary, and its Junior Department.”

The president asked Miss Ford to read letters from Miss Emery, and Miss Lindley, relative to action of the Triennial, on the suggested grading of the Junior Department.

The suggested grading of the Junior Department is as follows:

The Little Helpers, Children from Baptism to 8 years ~~ca~~ age.

Sec. 2. Children from 8 to 16 years of age.

Sec. 3. Young people from 16 upwards.

It is further suggested that "where practicable" the Junior Department shall be equipped with a complete corps of officers. As the object of this proposed plan is to draw the two departments more closely together and to train the Junior Leaders and give them opportunity to develop their department." Miss Emery and Miss Lirdler, urge the Diocese to overlook the possible objections and to "experiment." Mrs. Cornell moved that "th: S. C. Branch adopt the grading of the Junior Department, as suggested by the Triennial, seconded by Miss Reid, and unanimously carried.

It was moved and seconded that "the head of the Junior Department shall be known as president." Much discussion followed, many feeling that there cannot be two presidents in one branch, and that such a course would separate rather than unite the two departments. A final vote upon the question resulted in the decision that the head of the Junior Department should remain as heretofore, the Secretary of that Department.

The Rev. L. G. Wood here asked for a few moments which were willingly accorded him. He stated that the Woman's Auxiliary is in the Diocese by courtesy of the Bishop, and in the Parish by courtesy of the Rector. That he understands the burning question of the day, to be the desire for the enthusiastic interest and co-operation of the clergy. He feels that to receive this enthusiastic co-operation, the Auxiliary must simplify her methods and must, to some extent, change her policy; also that she must become the incentive, which will deepen and educate the missionary life of the Parish, leaving the offerings of the parish, to come to the altar, in the Church herself.

The question was asked as to the disposition of the offering, to be taken at the missionary

evening service. Several suggestions were made. Mrs. Cornell moved that "the offering be given to the Rev. H. H. Lumpkin, to be used as he deems best," and stated that she felt this Auxiliary could not do better than take such a step, when it realizes that Mr. Lumpkin is the first missionary volunteer from the Priesthood that our Church in South Carolina has had in fifty years. Motion seconded and carried.

Amendments to the Constitution were next in order and with one exception were carried according to the suggestions printed in the Convention Call. Above exception being that Art. VI, Sec. 9, was amended to read:

"The secretary of the Junior Department shall guide the work of the Juniors. She shall have two assistants, appointed by her, upon consultation with the board."

The Church Periodical Club was next discussed, and Miss Emery's letter relative to the independent organization of same, was read and discussed.

Mrs. Cornell moved "that until matters of the C. P. C. in this diocese readjust themselves to altered conditions, a correspondent of the C. P. C. shall be appointed by the president, and shall be allowed to work through the Parish Branches, and to report their work through the Annual Convention."

Miss Jersey amended Mrs. Cornell's motion to provide that *"the Bishop shall appoint said correspondent."

The Rev. R. W. Patton arrived and was welcomed with a rising vote. Miss Duvall gave notice of an amendment to the constitution which she purposed to offer in 1915. This amendment is to provide representation at the conventions for associate members of the Auxiliary.

The delegate from the Church of the Advent, Spartanburg, gave a most cordial invitation to the convention to meet in that parish in 1915. The invitation was accepted with a rising vote of thanks and appreciation.

Miss Duvall moved the adoption of the following resolution:

(*Bishop Guerry has appointed Mrs. Albert Heyward, 1573 Pendleton Street, to carry on this work.)

"We, the women of the Woman's Auxiliary, believing that there is great need of a separate organization of the boys and young men of the Church, for the purpose of making them an auxiliary to the Board of Missions, along the lines of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Department, be it resolved:

"That we cordially endorse the action of the recent Diocesan Council, and we do hereby petition the Board of Missions to take steps to carry this resolution into effect as soon as practicable." Motion carried.

The election of officers resulted in the following:

President: Mrs. Alexander Long, Rock Hill.

Vice President of Greenville Convocation: Miss Scotia B. Reid, Rock Hill.

Vice President of Columbia Convocation: Mrs. O. T. Porcher, Darlington.

Vice President Charleston Convocation: Mrs. J. C. Bissell, Charleston.

Secretary: Mrs. Wm. P. Cornell, Charleston.

Treasurer: Mrs. Jessie D. Johnson, Spartanburg.

Educational Secretary: Miss Katie Lee, Charleston.

Box Secretary: Miss Anna C. Neufville, Charleston.

Secretary of Junior Department: Miss M. P. Ford, Aiken.

Miss F. B. Duvall was elected United Offering Custodian, but declined to serve. Another election to be deferred to the Saturday morning session.

It was moved and carried that the four delegates to the Woman's Auxiliary meeting in the Fourth Province, be left to the appointment of the President.

The following note was read to the convention, and the offer contained therein, was unanimously accepted with a rising vote of gratitude and appreciation:

"Because the very name of Gregg is synonymous with all Christian attributes, as personified in the early missionary Bishop of Texas (my native State), beloved Bishop Gregg, who was given us by South Carolina, I wish to pledge the \$86 towards the completion of Miss Gregg's Training Fund, in loving memory of him."

The session here adjourned with the benediction pronounced by the Rev. Wood.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON AND EVENING.

Friday afternoon at 4 p. m. some 263 delegates, visitors and members of the Parish Branches enjoyed a very delightful harbor excursion and visit to historic Fort Sumter, returning to the city at 6 p. m.

At 8:30 p. m. St. Luke's Church was comfortably filled with an appreciative congregation who were there to attend the missionary service of the convention. The Bishop, the Secretary of the Fourth Province and ten of the Charleston clergy officiated in the chancel. Special missionary hymns and music were rendered by congregation and choir. The addresses of the evening were made by the Rev. H. H. Lumpkin, soon to leave the Diocese for Fairbanks, Alaska, and by the Rev. R. W. Patton, secretary of the Fourth Province. Both addresses were appropriate and inspiring and were listened to with great interest and appreciation.

SATURDAY MORNING.

The Saturday morning session was opened by the Rev. L. G. Wood with the saying of the Creed and with prayer.

After the minutes of Friday morning's session were read and approved, the secretary read a short account of the afternoon excursion and of the evening missionary service. The president then led up to the spiritual side of the program and introduced the first of the "Assets Actually Available in the Work of the Woman's Auxiliary," the "Gift of the Holy Spirit." This beautiful paper was delivered by the president.

Mrs. Louis D. Simonds of St. Luke's Church read an interesting and instructive paper on "The Sacraments of the Church."

Mrs. A. C. Haskell, of North Augusta, was to have been with us, and to have taken the subject of "Prayer." Mrs. Haskell was detained, but her most able paper was read by Mrs. Long, of Rock Hill.

Mrs. St. James Cummings, of St. Paul's Church, Charleston, read a most comprehensive paper, on "The Bible and Prayer Book as Missionary Text Books."

Mrs. Wm. A. Guerry, of Charleston, described clearly

the work and personnel of the "General Board of Missions." "The Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary" was most fully explained in a paper written by Mrs. Henry Martin, of Columbia. Mrs. Martin was unable to be with us, but had asked Miss Lee to read her paper to the convention.

"The Organized Church, and the Missionaries Themselves," was ably presented by Mrs. W. P. Breeden, of Bennettsville, and Miss McCabe, of Columbia, read a splendid paper on "The Resources of the Whole World of Modern Science as Applied to Mission Work," which was prepared by Miss M. C. Squier, of Columbia.

At the close of these papers Miss Hayne moved that they be published for the benefit of the Branches. Method of publication to be left to the discretion of the Executive Board.

The president summed up these "assets" of the work of our organization, and the Rev. Mr. Wood, complimented the Auxiliary on the splendidly orthodox and heartfelt papers, just read by the members and suggested that the convention offer a prayer of thanksgiving for the same. This suggestion was immediately adopted and Mr. Wood led in this service.

The president announced that Miss Duvall had agreed to accept the position of United Offering Custodian, after urgent pleading from the Bishop. A rising vote declared Miss Duvall elected.

It was announced that Mrs. Porcher, the elected vice president of the Columbia Convocation, found it impossible to serve, and that the delegates of that Convocation had unanimously chosen Mrs. W. P. Breeden, of Bennettsville, who was declared elected.

Mrs. Long moved the following resolution:

"Whereas, amid the many social diversions and club duties of our daily life, there is a growing tendency to give little heed to the precedence of those organizations which call to us in the name of Christ, be it resolved: That we, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of this diocese in convention assembled, do go on record as asserting the determination on our part to put first things first, and to refuse to consider the claims of other organizations, when they conflict with our bounden duty and service."

Miss Duvall seconded and endorsed the same, which was unanimously carried.

JUNIOR SESSION.

The Junior Secretary here took the chair and asked the Rev. H. H. Lumpkin to open the Junior session with prayer.

Immediately after the prayers, Miss Duvall offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote, first by the whole convention, and then by the Juniors alone:

"Whereas, the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of South Carolina, has sustained a great loss in the removal from the Diocese of our beloved president, Mrs. Wm. E. Haskell, be it resolved, That we do hereby express our sincere sorrow at her leaving and are deeply appreciative of her service.

Under her wise leadership the work has advanced and been uplifted; her influence will be a far-reaching and lasting one, and we give her the assurance that her influence and leadership will remain with us, and will spur us on to greater accomplishments in the service of the Master, in the future."

The secretary called the roll of Junior Department, showing 26 branches represented by 71 Juniors and directresses.

Miss Ford prefaced her *report by a few remarks relative to the action of the Junior Conferences at the Triennial. She spoke of the Junior exhibit, and of the Juniors at the corporate communion service. She stressed the importance of a corporate communion service of the Junior Department in the Diocese of South Carolina, and suggested the day of the "Holy Innocents" as being appropriate.

Kenneth Parsons moved that this day be recommended for this purpose. The motion was carried.

The Junior Secretary urged the use of the Junior Collect by the Juniors and women, also the "use" of the officers of the Executive Board. She spoke of the "Boy Problem," as discussed at the Triennial, and assured the boys of the "Brotherhood of St. Paul" and the members of the Auxiliary, that the matter is under serious consideration at the Missions House. A *letter of greeting from Miss Lindley was read and on motion of Miss Fitz Simons, the secretary was instructed to send to Miss Lindley a letter of loving greeting, and of deep regret at her absence.

Miss Ford explained that Mrs. Wetmore, of Christ School, Arden, had been detained by illness, and Miss Heins moved that a letter of sympathy and greeting be sent to her.

The Rev. H. H. Lumpkin led the noon-day prayers, and then spoke to the Juniors, both boys and girls, on the necessity of preparing themselves for their life as men and women of the Church, and urged them to awaken to a realization of their duty, obligation and privilege.

Miss Ford urged the Juniors to work for Nenana, Alaska, this year and Mr. Parsons moved that the Junior branches devote their surplus funds to this end. Discussion of this motion resulted in the decision that although it is wise to devote all surplus funds to some missionary purpose, it is wiser to allow the individual branches to select their own object.

Mrs. Cornell asked that in future, a greater stress be laid upon the attendance of the Juniors at the celebration of the Holy Communion on Junior Day. It was decided to stress attendance at these early services of the convention hereafter, both in call and in convention. The Junior secretary asked Miss Gregg to read a letter of greeting from Uta Saito, and then urged pledges for her college course for the coming year. The Treasurer urged that this pledge be paid as early as possible. Also that all funds be sent to her as collected, and not held to be sent in a lump sum.

Pledges for the Uta Saito Fund amounted to \$44. The remainder of the \$60 necessary to be brought up at the afternoon session.

The Parish Branches made their reports, showing much good work accomplished, and giving many good suggestions to the convention.

Mrs. Long spoke a few words on the claims of the United Offering, saying that the Juniors should "be taught to give their *pennies now and lives of service in future.*"

The Rev. Mr. Wood asked permission to speak on the "Boy Problem" and urged the Auxiliary, that until other provision be made they "go slow" in any plans that will separate the boys from the leadership of the women, who he thinks, are needed to train the present boys into the new leaders of the future. He spoke admiringly of the

Brotherhood of St. Paul Chapter of the Auxiliary in his own parish, and gave credit for their existence and progressiveness to the Woman's Auxiliary.

The morning session adjourned with the benediction pronounced by Mr. Wood.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The closing session of the convention was called to order by the president, shortly after 4 p. m. The Rev. Mr. Wood opened with prayer, the minutes of the morning session were read and approved, and routine business was resumed.

The Junior Secretary urged members of the Woman's Auxiliary, present, who have no Junior branch in their parish, to go home and organize one.

Miss Lee read a letter from Miss Singleton inviting the Woman's Auxiliary of South Carolina, to be present at her graduation.

Mrs. Haskell read a letter from Mr. John B. Mott relative to the Blue Ridge Conference on June 26 to July 5th and Miss Lee urged attendance at this or at one of the other summer conferences.

Miss Edgerton was asked to lead a discussion on the "Contingent Fund." Balance now on hand, after all expenses of the convention are paid, is only \$135.50. This amount falls short by some \$300 of the amount needed to cover the working expenses of the Branch. Miss Duvall asked if it would be expedient to raise the amount of the annual dues. It was thought to be an unwise step.

Mrs. Cornell suggested that copies of the Annual Report be sold at 25 cents to branches and individuals alike.

Mrs. Cornell moved that "Annual Reports be sent to the vice presidents of parish branches as formerly, but that with the report should go a request that 25 cents be paid for the same." Miss Edgerton seconded this motion which was carried.

Mrs. de Jersey moved that "one delegate be sent to the meeting of the Fourth Province in New Orleans at the expense of the Branch." Motion carried.

Mrs. Porcher moved that "the deficiency in the contingent fund be placed before the branches and that they be asked to make a voluntary contribution to the same." Motion carried. Miss Ford moved "that the first parish

meeting held after Easter, become the annual meeting, and that officers be elected at this meeting so that the new officers may sign reports and pledges." Motion carried.

Miss Lee moved that "the Branch hold an Educational Institute this year, the expense to be met by the payment of \$1 per branch." Motion carried, and Mrs. de Jersey invited the Institute to meet in Columbia in the fall.

The Question Box was opened and the questions of interest are as follows:

Question 1. "Shall parish branch officers be known as presidents or as vice presidents?"

Miss Lee moved that, "hereafter, the list of parish officers shall be headed by the rector as president, ex-officio, but that the working officer shall be known as president." Motion carried.

Question 2. "Should sections of the Woman's Auxiliary be known as A. and B.?"

Mrs. Wood stated that this method has been recommended by the Triennial.

Question 3. "Has the use of the duplex envelopes in the parishes affected the Auxiliary offerings?"

The Spartanburg branch feels that it has done so. The president read a letter from the Diocese of Atlanta, which feels likewise.

Question 4. "Should second-hand articles in boxes have a valuation?"

The Box Secretary said "yes, certainly, when in first-class condition. The total valuation of boxes will be printed in the S. C. Annual, but only new articles will be reported to the missions house."

Question 5. "Should express or freight rates be included in box valuation?"

Yes.

Question 6. "Is St. Peter's mission, Waverly Mills, legitimate Auxiliary work?" No.

Question 7. "Who will appoint the parish librarian of the C. P. C.?" The rector.

Question 8. "Are the age limits of the grades in the Junior Department to be iron-clad or elastic?" Undoubtedly they are to be elastic.

Miss Lee recommended that the directress of the Junior parish branches be elected an alternate, if not the accredited delegate to the conventions.

Mr. Parsons thanked the convention for the interest shown in the Boy Problem and offered his services in extension work.

Mrs. Tupper moved that a letter of love and greetings be sent to Mrs. Heyward, expressing our regret that she was unable to be present, and that she can no longer be an officer of the Executive Board in her office of correspondent of the C. P. C." Motion carried. Mrs. Cornell moved a like resolution with regard to the secretary of the Babies' Branch, being no longer on the board.

The Committee on Resolutions presented their report as follows:

"Whereas, we, the officers and delegates of the 29th Annual Convention of the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, desire to express our deep appreciation of the cordial welcome and hospitable entertainment we have received in Charleston, therefore,

Be it Resolved, That we hereby convey our heartfelt thanks to the Rector of St. Luke's, his family and congregation, for their unstinted courtesy and hospitality, and for the inspiring services of his church and music of his choir.

That we will keep in heart the words of our beloved Bishop, of Mr. Patton, and Mr. Lumpkin, and the Rector of St. Luke's, and express appreciation for their presence amongst us.

That we give expression to our peculiar pleasure in welcoming the esteemed first president of the South Carolina Auxiliary, and that we extend our thanks for her invaluable autograph history of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese.

That we make mention of our gratification at meeting the two young girls, Miss Gregg and Miss Marshall, who have given their lives to service, and for tidings of the three young volunteers who have offered for the limited term of service at St. Mary's on the Highland. (Sewanee). We rejoice with the congregation of St. John's, and our whole Church in South Carolina, that one of our Priesthood has volunteered for foreign service, and we say "Godspeed" to Mr. Lumpkin.

Resolved, That we express our sorrow in saying farewell to Mrs. Haskell, our retiring president, whose rare sweetness of character and beautiful interpretation of Christianity in our Auxiliary will be always an

invisible, but forceful influence, and that with our regrets in parting with old and faithful officers, we extend greeting and loving co-operation to the new.

Furthermore, *Be it Resolved*, That we herein express our appreciation of the most cordial invitation extended this body to hold its next convention at the Church of the Advent, in Spartanburg, which we gladly accept.

That we extend our thanks to the Germania Bank, as represented by Mr. Williman, and to Mr. Van Ness and Mr. Parsons, for valuable assistance to our United Offering Custodian.

Resolved, That thanks of this convention are further extended to the press for the full and careful reports made of the several meetings, and,

Lastly, *Resolved*, That thanking God for the opportunity, we will go forth into His vineyard, rejoicing.

The Rev. Mr. Wood added a few parting words of farewell to the convention and to Mrs. Haskell in particular, saying that he knew the Auxiliary had but one impulse and desire, the extension of Christ's Kingdom here upon earth. He again said that he had never listened to a better class of papers, and he wished God's blessing on the Auxiliary, during the coming year. Mrs. Haskell responded in a few well-chosen words and stated that she turned the Auxiliary over to her friend and co-worker, Mrs. Long, knowing that she fully realized her privilege and responsibility. Miss Heins, speaking for St. Lukes, said: "St. Luke's isn't sorry to lose Mrs. Haskell, for she hasn't lost her. She belongs to us, and will always be here with us."

The minutes of the afternoon session were adopted.

Rev. Mr. Wood closed the convention with prayer and singing of the Doxology.

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

It has seemed best to me in preparing my Annual Report to submit to you, to dwell as briefly as possible on the statistics of our year's work, and to give more time to the discussion of conditions as they are found to exist in our parish branches. There is, of course, a certain

significance in round numbers, as they present the only concrete form in which our work can take shape, but we all know that it is impossible to record that inner and more sacred service, known only to God, of fervent prayer and sanctified worship, and quiet, unobserved self-sacrifice, without which, all the rest becomes "as sounding brass and tinkling cymbal." Each of us, in separate entity, with heart-searching fears and deep humility, must render this account to God. He alone is permitted to judge, but it does seem to me, from the tone of the many letters I have received, that there has been a deepening of spiritual vision, and a widening comprehension of the spiritual significance of our work. As "co-workers with God," we are striving with the help of His Holy Spirit, to learn more of His methods and with a more submissive will to lift the Cross of Christ for His glory, and not for our own.

Our greatest cause for gratitude is in the Offering of Life for the foreign field.

Can anything equal the joy of knowing that five young women in our diocese, have sent in their names, and are definitely training for services in the mission field? Our dear Miss Singleton has now had eight months in the Philadelphia Training School, and hopes to leave this fall for Kyoto, Japan, and our United Offering Custodian, who is chairman of our committee on the Offering of Life, is going to tell us of each of the other four volunteers, and just what we hope and plan for them.

Our three Convocational meetings under the leadership of our zealous vice presidents, are becoming more and more of an inspiration and encouragement, the only discouraging feature being the relatively small attendance. We know that it is difficult for women to leave home for so many meetings, but, if it is at all possible, we urge attendance at these Convocational meetings.

The very fact that they are not tied and bound to a set program such as we are obliged to have at these annual meetings, gives more opportunity for discussing problems and devising intelligent methods.

Because of the Triennial, and the expense attendant thereon, it was not possible for the Educational Secretary to hold again this year, an Educational Institute, such as was held last year, in Sumter, but she has tried to supplement this loss by most interesting and helpful

Study Classes, at each of the three Convocational Meeting, has visited parish branches and organized Study Classes. She reports 55 classes, 39 in the Woman's Auxiliary and 16 in the Junior Department.

The record of boxes sent is 61, valued at \$2,297.25, as against 60, value \$2,711.04, last year, a falling off in cash value, but more and more our women are learning what one might call the "dignity" of giving only what is suitable and good, and will contribute real cheer and comfort to our missionaries, our mission schools and hospitals.

The Junior Department makes an encouraging report, eleven new parish branches being formed.

Even the Babies' Branch, now promoted to be "Little Helpers," has grown and flourished, six new branches being established, making a total of 19 branches, and we see these tiny pilgrims setting bravely forth on the pathway of life, (illumined for them by the sinless childhood of the Babe of Bethlehem). "Wist ye not that they too, shouldst be about their Father's business?"

I am glad that I can report the appointment of a secretary for the "Spirit of Missions," one of our "younger women," Miss Sarah Boykin, coming to the rescue and with bright young enthusiasm going forth to open this door of real information direct from the mission fields. It is your bounden duty to help Miss Boykin in this department of our work for the "Spirit of Missions," is the official organ of the General Board, to which we are an Auxiliary.

I would recommend the appointment of a similar officer for our own home magazine, *The Diocese*, which generously prints each month, letters from Auxiliary officers, and many articles pertaining to our work.

Unfortunately, our correspondent of The Church Periodical Club was unable to attend the Triennial, but she appointed a substitute, who attended the meetings of the C. P. C. in New York, and we hope to have a careful discussion of this work at this convention. Still further unfortunately, Mrs. Heyward was unable to be with us today, but has sent her report, which will be read later.

The three vice presidents record the names of associates members added to our list, which shows that the tide of our endeavor creeps steadily on, into the quiet and lonely corners of our Diocese.

To sum up:

Number of branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, 76, (Sec. A-67; Sec. B-9) as against 62 branches last year.

Number of branches of the Junior Department 35, (43 sections) as against 24 parish branches last year.

Number of Babies' Branches 19, as against 13 branches last year.

Number of individual members, including women, Juniors and Babies 2,534, against 2,371 last year.

Gifts, including boxes, but not the United Offering \$7,112.36, last year \$6,357.21.

We have not thought it necessary to make further report of the Triennial to this convention, as the delegates have already reported, at each of our Convocational meetings. We merely call your attention to the Philadelphia resolution, providing that the United Offering of 1916 be devoted entirely to the "Training, Testing and Leading of our Women Workers, and to the Care of Such as Are Sick and Disabled." Motion carried by a majority vote.

To the Iowa resolution, which was voted down, leaving it to the discretion of the missionary, whether to accept our boxes, or their equivalent in money.

To the resolution on Provincial Organization of the Woman's Auxiliary, carried by a majority vote, and which reads as follows:

"Resolved, That meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary in each department shall be held when advisable, at the same time and place as the missionary councils of the various departments, the question of organization to be left to the Woman's Auxiliary in each department in consultation with the Bishop of the same department."

You will notice that the resolution does not necessarily rule for Provincial Organization. The question will come up for consideration at the annual meeting of the Fourth Province, to be held this fall in New Orleans.

Certain resolutions pertaining to the Junior department will be presented to this convention by our secretary of the Junior Department.

In the two years in which I have been president, and one year vice president, it has happened that I have resided, first in the Charleston Convocation, then in the Columbia and then in the Greenville Convocation and so have come in personal touch with the work in all parts of the diocese. At first sight, it would seem that prevailing conditions are very different in each of the

three Convocations, but a more careful insight shows that the problems in all large branches are practically the same, and the problems in all small branches approximately the same; the only sad feature that seems almost uniformly the same, is that practically everywhere missions—and by "missions" I mean home and foreign missions—are regarded as a separate endeavor, almost a minor part of the Church's work, instead of being accepted as the reason of the Church's very existence; the ultimate purpose of our Lord's living and dying—His resurrection and ascension, and the coming of the Holy Spirit.

The Auxiliary, as an organization can hardly be held responsible for this state of affairs, one must go farther back, to the Church itself, and to the individual members of the Church, to find a cause and a remedy. Almost it would seem that the Church had not yet awakened to a full realization of her glorious heritage. Let us read again this appalling paragraph from the January *Spirit of Missions*:

"Ranking easily first among American Christians in per capita wealth, Churchmen rank sixth in per capita giving for the extension of Kingdom in non-Christian lands. Last year living donors sent to the Board of Missions to aid it in meeting the appropriations for the foreign work, \$610,000. On the basis of one million communicants, this is an average gift of sixty-one cents. Baptists, Congregationalists, Dutch Reformed, Presbyterians and United Presbyterians—all outstrip us. A Presbyterian congregation in an eastern city is giving for foreign work within a few hundred dollars of what all the congregations of the diocese of which that city is a part are giving. A Baptist congregation in a Southern city gives yearly \$57,000 for work beyond its own borders. Every member of it practices tithing.

"If Churchmen still lag behind it is surely not because they do not love our Lord as much as Christians of other names. The trouble is, we believe, that they have not clearly seen the great things to be done and their part in doing them. We must pray for and cultivate the capacity for vision. We must acquire the sense of proportion that puts first things first. So shall the Church of apostolic heritage become really apostolic in spirit. For if one thing more than another marked the early Church, it was its zeal to spread the Good News among men everywhere."

In our large branches we find recorded large numbers and large gifts, but only the officers and a few of the members of said branches, and perhaps a few of the diocesan officers, know, by what effort and struggle, these large gifts are obtained. And why? Because out of a possible fifty members just about fifteen are really giving—are really doing—while the remaining thirty five are carried in easy indolence in the safe ark provided for them.

Ah, friends, this is not fair! “Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap.” Let us be honest with ourselves, and not let other women pay our debts; for indeed, in the crowning of God’s kingdom, it is not possible; it is not permitted! Let us take note, before it be too late, of the responsibility resting upon each separate individual. We shall not be judged as a class, but each one of us separately. This is not “The Women’s Auxiliary.” it is “The Woman’s Auxiliary,” the individual woman’s auxiliary to the General Board of Missions.

Our small branches are, most of them, situated in small towns, or rural communities, where the Church is weak, and, in some of these same small branches is found, a consecrated and self-denying service, which casts a glow over this whole Diocesan Branch. We find, perhaps, five or six devoted women, doing possibly all their own work at home, doing noble guild work, noble Auxiliary work, teaching in the Sunday schools, and bearing with the assistance of a few men, the entire burden of the parish, or I will not say “burden, for to them it is a cross of glory.

But alas, there is another type of small branch, which corresponds to the large branch of which we have spoken, where one or two faithful ones are toiling to bring the reluctant others in. One or two, whose hearts are daily wrung by the indifference of those around them.

The “problem of the small town and the rural community”! surely one of the most vital, if not the most vital of the problems confronting the Church today!

Our Methodist brethren and our Baptist brethren are solving the problem, they are winning the small towns and rural communities and why should we hold back as we are doing? Have we any less to offer to the people? Is there a single one of us that believes that? Surely not!

Our Mother Church, fundamentally Catholic, is all-sufficient, as the Body of Christ is sufficient for every community, small or large; for all classes, high or low.

Women of the Auxiliary, are we doing our part, either in these small towns or rural communities, or by sympathetic and generous co-operation if we ourselves are living in the strong Church centers?

You remember Miss Emery's last annual report, touched on the oft-repeated charge of the indifference of the clergy towards the Woman's Auxiliary, (not her own experience, of course, but as reported to her by many diocesan branches.)

We are glad that only in a few instances have we met this indifference. But I ask whether even in these few instances it may not have been at least partly our fault?

In our struggle to supply the money necessary to help the General Board of Missions—and (not for one single instant do I wish to under-rate this supreme duty) may we not have been careless in the observance of those other duties, which inevitably devolve upon us, as the only woman's missionary organization in the Church, of reaching out a hand to the duties beside us? in our own parish or town? or in our own diocese?

I do not wish to confuse you. Let us keep our Auxiliary treasury clearly and distinctly for the money which is to go to help the General Board of Missions, to which we are Auxiliary; but let us, at the same time, as loyal members of our parishes, our parish guilds, or other Church societies, fervently pray, earnestly work, and generously give to the spread of the Gospel in every corner of this beloved diocese, as well as in the uttermost parts of the earth. So, truly, do we help the Board of Missions in its efforts to evangelize the world. Let the Woman's Auxiliary become the great Committee of Influence in every loyal Christian endeavor, the blessed leaven that shall leaven the whole lump! * * * *

Let us take intensive cultivation, individual responsibility, as the key-note of our work for the coming year; let us learn why we are members of the Woman's Auxiliary—why we are members of the Lord Christ Himself, and let us digest this "why" so thoroughly, let us absorb it so entirely, that it will become part of our very life-blood, so that we may walk "worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called," as "not unwise—but understanding what the will of the Lord is."

And now, dear friends, in closing this, my farewell address as your president, I am reminded of a simile once used by Philips Brooks, of the old Grecian Relay Race, in which each runner had not only to reach his stage towards the final goal, but to carry aloft as he ran, a flaming torch, which it was his duty to pass on, brightly burning, to the next runner.

It is my earnest prayer that the flaming torch of our South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, held aloft by my office, but fanned and kept alive by the burning zeal of your loving service, may pass undimmed to the next runner in this godly race of ours, until at last it is merged into the supernal glory of Him who is the Light of the World, our blessed Lord and Saviour.

REPORT OF VICE PRESIDENT OF GREENVILLE CONVOCATION—MAY 1913—1914.

The year just closed has not seen any new branches formed in the Greenville Convocation, though I tried to revive one long dead and made unsuccessful efforts in three other places. We have three new associate members, ten others were asked to join, but they have never answered any of my letters.

We now have 14 branches with 235 active and 4 associate members.

At our convocational meeting in Union in December we had the good fortune of having present our President, United Offering Custodian, Educational Secretary and Junior Secretary. Though the attendance was disappointing, only seven branches being represented in full, the meeting was helpful and the morning devoted to study class methods, productive of much good. Eight branches had mission study classes and to Spartanburg meeting belongs the honor of being the first in this diocese to send a contribution to the New China Fund, a result of in-

terest awakened by their mission study class. 5 boxes valued at \$177.50 were sent. A few branches still send their money through other than our own diocesan treasurer, therefore it does not appear in the printed report.

REPORT OF VICE PRESIDENT OF COLUMBIA CONVOCATION—MAY 1913—1914.

In reviewing the work of the Columbia Convocation for the past year we find much cause for gratitude, for although there have been many shortcomings to deplore, there have been also many encouragements.

Our thoughts turn first to our former Vice-President, Miss Virginia T. Singleton, who entered the Church Training School at Philadelphia in October to prepare herself for a larger field of service, and then to our volunteer from Mars Bluff, Miss Alice Gregg, who expects to begin her training in this school in October. The point stressed throughout the year has been the need of a deeper sense of personal responsibility and service on the part of the women at large, and we are happy to see many of them taking advantage of the study classes, summer conferences, and other means offered to prepare themselves for more efficient service; while the several large personal gifts of money made to the work during the year, prove again the awakened sense of individual privilege and responsibility.

St. Andrew's Day, that appointed for the Corporate Communion Service, was not generally observed this year as this service was held where possible, on the day that the United Offering service was held at the Triennial. A number from the Convocation attended the Triennial, three being diocesan officers.

Our Convocation was also represented at the Blue Ridge Conference, two diocesan officers and six other members, and some being Juniors being present.

Much interest has been taken in the United Offering meetings, the programs prepared by the United Offering custodian being used. Many of our women who are not active members, are enjoying the privilege of uniting in this thank offering.

A committee consisting of one woman from each county, has made an effort to take the Auxiliary to is-

olated church women, while the various branch committees on new members have endeavored to enlist parish members throughout the Convocation.

The Convocational meeting was held in St. David's, Cheraw in January and was attended by fifty delegates. Diocesan officers present, were the president, Junior secretary, educational secretary, and vice president of convocation. Three of the clergy were also present, viz.: Rev. A. S. Thomas, rector; Rev. K. G. Finlay, dean of the convocation, and Rev. E. A. Penick, rector of St. Paul's, Bennettsville.

Several fine papers were read, followed by interesting discussions, chief among them being on the subject of Social Service in the Auxiliary, and on the Need of Volunteers for a Limited Term of Service. A committee was appointed at this meeting to publish in *The Diocese* each month a program for the monthly meetings of the branches. On the second day an educational institute was held, the morning session for the women conducted by the Educational Secretary, and the afternoon session for the Juniors conducted by the Junior secretary.

Three new branches have been organized during the year, at St. John's, Winnsboro, St. Matthews, Fort Mott, and Christ Church, Mars Bluff; also a Chapter B. at St. John's, Florence. The little branch at North Augusta has disbanded, some of the members having moved away and the others joining the branch at St. Paul's, Augusta, Ga. The Chapters B. at Darlington and Orangeburg have also disbanded, the members feeling it better to re-unite with the older women.

Twenty-three boxes have been sent, total value being \$827.86.

During the year we have had a gain in membership of 106, 18 being associates. A gain in offerings of \$439.75.

REPORT OF VICE PRESIDENT OF CHARLESTON CONVOCATION—MAY 1913—1914.

Dear friends: In making this, my first report of the Charleston Convocation, I would like to say, before I give you any statistics of the year's work, that it has been such a joy to have learned so much about the Auxiliary, things that I did not dream of before, the strength and endurance, the self-denial and wonderful hope of these branches, working all for the one great cause.

I have learned many things that time can never efface from my memory. Taking the highest act of service which we can show to our Divine Lord and Master I would like to state that some of the Corporate Communions have been well attended as shown by offerings, and an ever increasing value of this beautiful feast of service has been uppermost in the minds of many of our women of the Auxiliary.

On October 9th the Charleston branches held their Corporate Communion and the offering was sent to the United Offering Custodian, to be added to the great Triennial Offering. Mr. Lumpkin made a beautiful address, and there were five (5) of the clergy present. There was also a Corporate Communion and United Offering service held in St. Paul's Summerville by the Summerville Branch, March 5th, at which service \$24 was taken up in the offering. In the Summerville Branches also there were most helpful talks all during Lent, subjects being, Prayer, Study and Gifts, these were given by Mrs. Thorndyke of Milwaukee.

There have been two new branches organized, one at Christ Church, Charleston, and the other at Meggetts, the first named branch was formed through the deep interest and hard work of another. The branch members at Meggetts have made great efforts to "keep going" for the distances are so great, it has been hard to get together even once a month, there were 22 when formed, and now are 27. They have raised \$103.02 in less than a year, as they were only organized in June.

I have visited in the interest of the Auxiliary, Plantersville, St. Peter's mission, All Saints', Waccamaw, Pawley's Island, Meggetts and Charleston, have talked of the Auxiliary from the "Baby Branch" up, hope this was not trespassing.

Efforts have been made to form branches at Eutawville, where there are eleven "associates," at Kingstree, Barnwell and Mt. Pleasant, but these efforts have proved fruitless, perhaps the time was not ripe, so we remember them in our prayers, and feel sure that some day they will share with us the joys and privileges that come to those who are members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

The "associates" in the Convocation number 36, two new ones have been added this year, one in Berkley county, and one in Dorchester county. The chairman also reports the United Offering of the Berkeley County Associates for the year as \$28.05 and \$5 is reported from the new associate in Dorchester county. There are also five children in Summerville who are not Juniors, but have their "Blue" boxes, and about six boys who find it hard to go to meetings but they make their United offering.

The Convocational meeting held in Summerville January 22, 23, 24, was a great success, both on account of the good attendance and unfailing interest, and from the fact that we experienced the real joy of having with us our beloved and honored president, whose beautiful and uplifting talk on the Triennial was the feature of the occasion, we will always be thanking her in our hearts for what she gave us. There were also several well prepared and delightful papers, the roll call was answered by sixty-six women and thirty-eight Juniors. Five of the sixty-six women were diocesan officers. One great joy of the past year was the visit to Summerville of Rev. Dr. Brown of the Church's mission in Brazil. Dr. Brown gave a splendid address and it was a privilege to hear one who had been working so earnestly for the spread of Christ's Kingdom. We wish the Board of Missions would send us more Dr. Brown's, and send them oftener.

There are in the Convocation 25 Branches, and five Chapter "Bs" showing a membership of 793, besides this, there are 36 associates, making a total of 829.

There are 10 study classes among the women, and seven among the Juniors, 17 in all. Gifts from all sources as reported amount to \$2,339.37. The value of boxes alone being \$1,292.39. There were 32 boxes sent by the Convocation in the year. I have sent out 408 letters, 83 of these letters were in printed form, 25 postal cards, and distributed 78 leaflets.

Now I want to thank the president for her unfailing courtesy and kindness, and each member of the Charleston Convocation for her patience, her ready response, and faithful co-operation.

Prepared, edited and distributed to each Branch in the Diocese, as well as to each Diocese and Missionary Jurisdiction in the Fourth Department, to the Missions House and elsewhere, 250 copies of the 28th Annual Report of the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. Had printed and distributed to the Board Members some 10,000 letter-heads and 5,000 envelopes. Had typewritten and mailed to every clergyman in the diocese, letters relative to the formation of a Diocesan Missionary Organization for the Boys. Prepared, had printed and distributed to the vice presidents and Junior secretary for distribution to each branch, Convention Calls, Credential Blanks and Pledge Slips, also distributed General Report Blanks, Educational Report Blanks and Box Reports to above sources.

Have conducted all necessary correspondence and have provided badges for the present Convention. Total expenses of my department have been as follows:

REPORT OF BOX SECRETARY.

We have sent out sixty-one boxes this year, fewer by four than last year, and their total value is \$2,297.25, this being \$413.79 short of last year's record.

The mountains of North Carolina have, as usual, had the largest number, thirty-five going to their different mission stations, i. e. Saluda, Valle Crucis, Rutherfordton, Waynesville, Cooleemee, Arden and Morganton. The remaining twenty-eight boxes to Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Virginia, Tennessee, Minnesota, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Alaska. As you see, they covered a wider area than usual.

Of these, seven were family boxes; four of them being among those taking the longest journeys, going to Oklahoma, Minnesota and South Dakota.

I am glad to say that we have again worked for the Indians. The Church of the Holy Communion branch, Charleston, sent their Christmas box to the family of an Indian Catechist in South Dakota, and the newly formed branch at Christ Church, Charleston, sent their Easter box to St. Mary's School, Rosebud, South Dakota. The principal of the school wrote that this box, which, by request, contained white aprons, gave much pleasure, and that the aprons were so pretty, that the children "liked to put them on."

I believe that our branches realize the obligation to send really good and useful articles of clothing to mountain missions; for, in so many instances they have reported to me that the partly worn garments sent, were warm and comfortable, and in excellent condition, and sometimes more valuable than the new articles included amongst them.

Warm mufflers knit in wools of cheerful colors are most acceptable in Alaska, and St. Michael's branch, Charleston, sent twenty-eight of these by parcel post last July. It would be good work for small branches in country neighborhoods, often unable to get up larger boxes, if, during the winter months they would knit some of these mufflers and send them off by parcel post to Alaska, in the early summer. Scattered Churchwomen prevented by distance, or other causes from belonging to any parish or mission could also render acceptable service in this way.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY—MAY 1913—1914.

Before making the official report of the years work, let me again thank the friends who so generously made it possible for me to attend the Triennial, in New York last fall. There, the study classes, planned by our dear Miss Lindley, were splendidly carried out, and hundreds of women were enrolled. There were five Bible classes; nine studied China; four were on the Junior methods, and one for the Baby Branch officers; nineteen in all, and St. Michael's parish house was a veritable bee-hive.

Each class did good work, and each class thought its teacher the best; But ours must have been the best, for she has since been made an Assistant Secretary of the Auxiliary, in charge of the Educational work.

The result of those classes at the Triennial must be a tremendous impetus to intelligent missionary work, for those hundreds of women returned to their homes, in all parts of this country, to be centers of a teaching force that should help more earnestly in establishing Christ's kingdom here on earth.

The reports that have come in from the study classes in our own Diocese evince the same interest, increased interest, and enthusiasm that characterized the work last year.

Some report that through the influence of the class, new members have been brought into the Auxiliary. Others tell of the change of view in those who before did not believe in Foreign Missions; One reports young women over-coming timidity in praying at the meetings, and the formation of a chapter B. of the Woman's Auxiliary. Another tells of the arousing of personal responsibility, as manifested in a pledge to the New China Fund of \$100. a year, for the next three years. In another class the girls used the information gained in the class, for talks in their grades, and were commended for arousing interest in their school mates. One report tells of an interdenominational class, which aroused much missionary interest, and strengthened church unity. Another says the results of

the class was a "resolution for more earnest prayer and giving."

According to the reports received there have been during the year, forty classes in the Woman's Auxiliary, and sixteen in the Junior Department; fifteen Reading Circles, and ten missionary lectures.

The number of text books used, (381) and the amount (190.81) paid for material are a little behind the standard of last year. Some Branches that had classes last year, did not have them this year, and vice versa.

During the winter it was my privilege to attend the three Convocational meetings at Union, Cheraw, and Summerville; and to visit Florence, Mullins, Darlington, Laurens, and Ft. Motte. Classes were formed in each of these places, except at Ft. Motte, where on account of scattered residences, they formed a Reading Circle instead, and ordered quite an amount of material.

As each Convocational meeting we had a "One-Day-Institute" as an experiment, and the experiment has proved that a "One-Day-Institute" is only better than nothing, and not to be compared to an Institute lasting three days, like the one in Sumter, November, 1912, which was so far reaching in results.

From all sides comes the same story of not having a leader. Let me call your earnest attention to the Conferences held in June and July every year, specially for training leaders;

These are our own Church conference held in Cambridge, Mass, and New York City; and those of the "Missionary Education Movement" held at Blue Ridge, near Asheville, N. C., and at Silver Bay, on Lake George, New York, and urge that you carefully read the folders of these conferences, and make your plans for the summer to include attendance upon one of them.

If our classes are conducted in the right spirit, the result must be a clearer vision of what it means to be a Christian, and how we as individuals can best help, carry out the command to "teach all nations".

REPORT OF UNITED OFFERING CUSTODIAN AND OF THE
COMMITTEE ON "THE OFFERING OF LIFE"—MAY 1913
—7914.

The first step immediately after the Convention of 1913 was the appointment of an Assistant Custodian in each convocation: Mrs. Manning, Mrs. Ball and Miss Clarkson, responded promptly to this appeal and began aggressive work in their respective convocations, with the definite aim of securing a custodian for every county and parish branch.

While this purpose has not been fully realized, much has been accomplished and repeated effort should result in complete success. United Offering boxes and literature, personal letters from Diocesan and Assistant Custodians, and circular letters have been sent to every county and parish Custodian. Twice during the year United Offering Meetings have been held with special programs; the October Offering was sent immediately to the Triennial Thanksgiving Service in New York; the April Offering was presented at the opening service of the Convention.

With the approval of our Bishop and our President the celebration of a corporate communion was observed by the parish branches of the Diocese at the hour of the Great Triennial Service.

The United Offering from South Carolina amounted to a splendid total, but far greater than this gift, that which animated and consecrated the whole, was our priceless offering of life, the life of a former Vice-President of this Auxiliary, Miss Virginia Taylor Singleton, whose name was placed, together with our material offering, on the great golden alms basin in the Cathedral of St John the Divine on the morning of October 9th.

The other duties of the United Offering Custodian seem light in comparison with the great responsibility of Chairman of Committee on Offering of Life; the work is so intangible: as with the apostles of old at Jerusalem we must await the coming of the Holy Spirit, but even as they we can pray fervently for his coming and ask that the members of the Auxiliary shall continuously and earnestly join their prayers to ours that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master, and that we on our part may respond eagerly to the call to send those whose lives are offered.

Already the answer to these prayers challenges the proof of the sincerity of our petitions, four additional lives, of great promise and attainment are offered in His name: two others of promise have volunteered for a limited term of service. What shall we do with them?

Your committee on "Offering of Life" secure in its faith in the sincerity of your prayers and your profession, has accepted these young lives in your name and has assured them of your loyal support and your gratitude that you may share in the priceless gifts.

At the last Convention generous provision was made for the training and support while needed of Miss Singleton; the training will be completed this summer, and her appointment to Kyoto has been confirmed. Of this fund there remains a surplus.

The Executive Board at its February meeting recommended that this balance be devoted to the similar training and support of our next volunteer, Miss Gregg, of Mars Bluff, who has been accepted by the Board, also by the training school at Philadelphia for entrance in September, and that the matter should be brought before this convention for confirmation and final action.

It was further recommended that the Convention should be asked to supplement this fund to cover full amounts needed for Miss Gregg and to defray the necessary expenses of the two Winthrop students who have volunteered for the summer months, and have been appointed to go to our mission at Sewanee, Tennessee, to serve in our name in the wonderful work that is being done at St. Mary's on the Mountain. This is the beginning of a movement to encourage the offering of our women for a "Limited term of service", when the whole life cannot yet be given. Miss Emery writes that the movement will be followed with great interest and asks to be kept informed of success of same.

The two Winthrop girls who have volunteered for service are Miss Mary Butler, Greenville, granddaughter of our Reverend Mr. Logan and Miss Alta Anderson of Mount Pleasant. Our president warmly endorsed the plan and the definite action of committee, which could not be deferred until this Convention. Two other Winthrop Students, Miss Eloise Doblin, and Miss Uta Saito, whose lives will be consecrated to the foreign field, are not yet ready for graduation. Another Student, Miss Frances Marshall, of Greenville, a graduate in June, has volunteered for the Master's work and it is her desire

and intention to enter St. Luke's Hospital for training when she becomes of age, which will be within the year.

The April issue of the "Spirit of Missions," speaks of the Woman's Auxiliary of South Carolina as leading the other branches in this work. May we ever sustain and hold fast that high distinction, counting ourselves blessed indeed if our offering be found acceptable in His sight.

Fourth: That the continued interest and prayers of every member of this Auxiliary shall be given in behalf of these young Christain Soldiers who go forth under our protection to forward our mutual, bounden duty and service. And that to her who fully equipped and accepted of our Mission Board, will soon enter for duty in a distant land, we extend our heartfelt gratitude that we have been permitted to share her priceless gift of life.

There seems to be very little to report after having worked for two months and a half, to increase the circulation of, and interest in the "Spirit of Missions". I have written over a hundred letters and twenty five postal cards. Thirty two parishes and missions have "Spirit of Missions" representative, added to the two hundred and ninety-eight (298) who already subscribe. I know of twenty new subscribers, but I think the Sunday School children secured a good many new subscriptions during Lent. In some of the parishes without representatives for the magazine, the Sunday School children have covered the ground so thoroughly that nothing more could be done this year. Of course some subscriptions have expired since the list was printed but I hope that they have been renewed. I have not been able to write to twenty-six missions on account of not knowing any one to write to, and letter of inquiry have not been answered. I am very grateful to my helpers and to those who have answered my letters promptly.

Mrs. Loaring Clark, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Fourth Province, writes that there is to be a united effort on Whit Monday and Whit Tuesday, June first and second, by the members of the Auxiliary in this department, to secure more subscriptions to the "Spirit of Missions," so that a wider knowledge may be disseminated regarding the missionary work of the Church. I have written that we would co-operate in this effort. Mrs Clark suggest that I send to each Parochial branch a list of present subscribers to the "Spirit of Missions". Then the officers and members of the Auxiliary should call upon every family in their respective Parishes, not already subscribing, and endeavor to secure the subscription.

JUNIOR DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF SECRETARY—MAY 1913 TO MAY 1914.

There are 43 sections of the Junior department of the Woman's Auxiliary in South Carolina, but only 35 Parishes have a Junior Branch, last year 26 Parishes having a Junior Branch.

The gifts in money were \$528.18 as against \$514.25 last year.

The Christmas boxes must have been unusually good, as they were reported by the Missionaries as the best they had received.

14 of the Christmas boxes went to Miss M. E. Horner at Valle Crucis, valued at \$344.75; 8 went to the Rev. Geo. H. Bell, Asheville N. C. and were valued at \$119.37 1 went to Miss Davidson, Vique, Porto Rico, and was valued at \$35.00.

The Voluntary boxes sent during the year were 8 in number; 3 went to Morganton, N. C., 2 went to Christ School, Arden; 1 went to Stannardsville, Va.; 1 went to Rutherfordton, N. C., and 1 went to Miss M. E. Horner at Valle Crucis, these voluntary boxes were valued at \$294.90 making a sum total value in boxes of \$794.02 in. The total of the year's work in money and boxes is \$1,322.20. During the year I have written 930 letters, I have distributed to every Junior branch in the Diocese a copy of the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, I have distributed a new Junior book to every directress.

I have attended two Executive Board Meetings, and 3 Convocational Meetings and the Triennial in New York and made personal visits to Spartanburg, Columbia, Abbeville and Beaufort, during the year.

There are about 600 Juniors on the roll, being a gain of about 60 during the year. The Juniors of Florence again lead with an average \$5.59 per member. St. Paul's, Summerville; St. Paul's, Bennettsville, and St. Paul's, Graniteville, deserve honorable mention, for their gain in both interest and money gifts during the year.

The year 1913 to 1914, has been marked by changes in the Junior Department. Among these changes is the placing of Miss Grace Lindley at the Missions House in charge of the Junior Department. We all feel these

changes are for the best, and trust that we are beginning to realize our wonderful opportunity and privilege in being allowed to do this work for our master.

A MESSAGE TO THE ANNUAL MEETING FROM THE SECRETARY, MISS JULIA C. EMERY.

My dear Friend:

At this time so many Diocesan Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have their annual meetings, that I take this occasion to send a greeting to all the branches, and to bring before them a few of our present problems.

And first, this is a changing time, and we must be careful to see that it is also a time of growth. Since we have at the Church Missions House Miss Lindley to strengthen the Junior work and to weld the women, older and younger, into one united force and Miss Tillotson to give herself unstintedly to train women as students and teachers of Missions, and since we are realizing more and more the work of Deaconess Goodwin to be an activity of the Board of Missions, to which woman and Juniors may become increasingly auxiliary, we must not lose any of the opportunities they would bring to us.

Cannot the things they stand for be emphasized, in ways in which they have not always been heretofore, at the representative gatherings of our branches, giving as little time as possible to report of work done and to business details, and adding to the service, quiet hours and general missionary meeting, sectional sessions where leaders in study class work and in Junior development and along other lines may meet several times by themselves for a conference, discussion and normal training?

Would it not be a good plan to appoint a committee at this meeting to draw up a program for next year?

It might involve a longer period of time than has been customary, but time so carefully planned promises to be well spent.

But, meanwhile, is there nothing tangible, practical, minute and detailed it may be, but yet what, if practised with a cheerful vigor, might make the Auxiliary a living power during these next months before the Missionary year closes, and help to avert that deficit so apt to hang as a cloud before our faith and lie as a weight on our aspiring love, but which should be, rather, one more incentive to our best endeavor?

We make a few brief suggestions, each one of which is simple and easy to be carried out, only requiring a little thought and a little will. The tasks they set are so easy they seem hardly worth while, but if every member of the Auxiliary would fulfill them, they would make a difference that would be felt when the year's reckoning shall be made. This is our simple plan:

1. That every member of the Auxiliary shall learn if her parish apportionment has been met, and, if not, exactly how it stands.

2. If it has not been met, that she shall go to her Rector and offer her help in carrying out some plan for meeting it.

3. That she shall explain it to, at least, one person, and ask his or her co-operation.

4. That, whatever she has already given, and whether or not the apportionment shall have been already met, she shall contribute towards it, at least once more, before August 31st.

5. That she will give her summer address to the SPIRIT OF MISSIONS department, and have the magazine sent her there.

6. That she will read, at least, one Missionary book during the next four months.

7. That, when staying in summer hotel or boarding-house, or when visiting, she shall make one opportunity, at least to speak for the Church's work of Missions.

8. That she write one letter to some missionary, Auxiliary associate or uninterested friend upon the subject. .

9. That each Sunday she will find some Missionary principle or example in the Bible and pray one definite prayer for the Kingdom's growth and the unity of Christ's Church, this last, when possible, at the early communion service.

These suggestions are sent out in printed slips. Will not each member take a copy from this meeting, and try to act upon them this summer?

Will not each take copies to pass on to others?

A LETTER TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA BRANCH OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.
THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY INSURANCE FUND.

May - 1914

From Christmas time on through the working year the mail brings us constant reports of boxes sent to our domestic missionaries and letters from them telling of the welcome with which these boxes are received. In one morning's mail we find a branch reporting as sent from the Diocese of Newark to the Diocese of Alabama a box valued at \$310.51, and a letter from the Diocese of South Carolina acknowledging a box, from the Diocese of Lexington, which reads, "I want to thank you for the beautiful box, or rather boxes, which my family received just before Christmas. You kindly sent our name to Lexington and never have we been quite so generously treated before. Each one of us has had beautiful outfits for the winter sent us by these kind friends and you simply can't imagine the help to a poor minister's wife who does all her own sewing. My heart is so full of gratitude I must thank every one connected with it."

The workers in the Woman's Auxiliary are familiar with this experience and many a close tie of friendship has been made between the members of the parish at home and the missionary and his family in the domestic mission field.

The Foreign Missionary Fund is the undertaking in the Woman's Auxiliary which should serve as this personal link between the parish worker and the worker in foreign lands. Established in 1874 it supplies yearly a grant of fifty dollars to married missionaries, which sum applies on their insurance dues, relieving them of just that expenditure from their yearly income. They may insure in such company and according to such method as they deem wisest, but when their payments come due each year they may call upon the Treasury of the Board of Missions for this fifty dollars to help them in making this payment from our long time accredited special, which we call our Foreign Missionary Insurance Fund. Some diocesan and parochial branches have selected an individual missionary and have paid this amount for him year by year; others give fifty dollars yearly towards the general fund; others give a smaller or larger sum. Those who have already given are asked to be sure that the gift is repeated in this present year.

Any diocesan branch that has not yet given, is asked if before the working year closes, they cannot send a contribution, either the fifty dollars which would be for one person, or a part of that amount to be combined with a like gift from another branch. We all realize the success of keeping up an interest once begun. We can all picture what it might be for a man to be in a foreign land with no provision for wife or children. Many of us know the personal pleasure the sending of our missionary boxes has brought to us.

We will not therefore fail in this personal gift of understanding and sympathy that links our workers far away, more nearly to their fellow workers at home.

Please write what we may expect about this.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA
BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE
BOARD OF MISSIONS.

As amended in Convention, May, 1914.

ARTICLE I.—Name.

The name of this Association shall be The South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II. — Object.

The object of this Association shall be to carry out with in the Diocese of South Carolina the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary: Prayer for Missions, Study of Missions and Giving to Missions.

ARTICLE III. — Membership.

Section 1. The Bishop and the Clergy of the Diocese are ex-officio members.

Sec. 2. The Association shall be composed of those women, young people and children who being by Baptism members of the Missionary Society—the Church—are actively engaged in any department of auxiliary work.

Sec. 3. Women, young people, and children, who are not yet baptized, may be admitted to associate membership and shall be known as "Auxiliary Co-workers."

ARTICLE IV. — Officers and Executive Board.

Section 1. The officers of the Association shall be the Bishop, a President, three Vice-Presidents (one in each Convocation), Secretary, Box Secretary, Treasurer, Educational Secretary, United Offering Custodian, and Secretary of the Junior Department.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President of the Convocation in which the Annual Convention is to be held shall rank as First Vice-President. She shall assume the duties of the President in the absence of the same, and shall take office immediately at the close of the previous Convention.

Sec. 3. These officers shall constitute the Executive Board, and five of them shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V. — Election of Officers.

Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the annual Convention.

Sec. 2. No officer shall serve longer than three years consecutively in one office. Except the Educational Secretary.

Sec. 3. Candidates shall be nominated by informal ballot, the two receiving the largest number of votes for an office, being considered candidates therefor. A formal ballot shall then be cast.

ARTICLE VI.—Representative Body.

Each Parish Branch, with its Junior Department, shall be entitled to three votes, provided it sends three delegates. Where two sections of the Woman's Auxiliary exist, each section shall cast one vote. The third vote being cast by the Junior Department. The members of the Executive Board shall be entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VII. — Fiscal Year.

The fiscal year of the South Carolina Branch shall be from May first to May first.

ARTICLE VIII. — Meetings

Section 1. The Diocesan Branch shall hold an Annual Convention the month of May alternately in each Convocation.

Sec. 2. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held each year on the Wednesday preceding Ash Wednesday, and immediately after the Annual Convention.

Sec. 3. Convocational Meetings shall be held once a year, preferably in the fall.

ARTICLE IX. — Amendments.

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Convention of the Diocesan Branch by vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been previously given to every Branch.

BY-LAWS.

ARTICLE I — Dues.

In the month of March all members of the Woman's Auxiliary shall pay an annual fee of 25 cents, and the Juniors an annual fee of 10 cents. This amount to form a contingent fund, to be used at the discretion of the Board.

ARTICLE II. — Duties of Officers.

Section 1. The President shall preside at all annual and executive meetings, and shall have the general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese. She may call executive meetings at her discretion and shall call the same at the desire of a majority of the Board. She shall have power, after conferring with the Board, to appoint committees and fill vacancies occurring during term of office. She shall receive and distribute to the Vice-Presidents the general literature issued from the Missions House.

Sec. 2. The Vice-Presidents shall arrange for and preside over Convocational meetings; shall endeavor to establish a branch of the auxiliary in every parish and mission, and shall have the general supervision of the work

throughout their several Convocations; shall send out report blanks and notices of Annual Convention; shall collect and tabulate annually the reports of all the branches in their Convocations, and after giving summary of the same at the Annual Convention, shall pass on to the Treasurer and the Secretary for publication in annual report.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all Diocesan and executive meetings; conduct all necessary correspondence, and with the assistance of the Treasurer and Vice-Presidents shall prepare and edit the annual report.

Sec. 4. The Box-Secretary shall receive and distribute all information relating to missionary boxes, and shall make a report at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 5. The Treasurer shall receive ALL the money contributions, except the United Offering from the Parish Branches and forward them to their various destinations. She shall keep an accurate account of same and, closing her books on May the fourth, make an annual report of all receipts and disbursements.

Sec. 6. The Educational Secretary shall guide the educational work of the Diocesan Branch. She shall endeavor to form a mission study class in every Parish Branch and shall have charge of and distribute the literature issued by the Educational Department of the Board of Missions.

Sec. 7. The United Offering Custodian shall have charge of all offerings for that fund, and shall endeavor to promote interest in the same throughout the Diocese.

Sec. 8. The Secretary of the Junior Department shall guide the work of the Juniors. She shall have two assistants, appointed by her, upon consultation with the Executive Board.

Sec. 9. The Executive Board shall have power to adopt by-laws and shall exercise all the powers of the Association not otherwise herein expressly provided for.

ARTICLE III. — Committees.

Section 1. A Secretary of the "Spirit of Missions" shall be appointed by the President. Said Secretary shall endeavor to increase the circulation of the "Spirit of Mission" and to promote intelligent interest in, and study of said magazine.

Sec. 2. A Secretary of "The Diocese" the official organ of the Church in South Carolina, shall be appointed by the President. Said Secretary shall endeavor to increase the circulation of "The Diocese" and to promote intelligent interest in the same.
