



**CONDENSED REPORT OF THE 32ND ANNUAL CONVENTION  
Including Reports of Diocesan Officers**

The opening service of the 32nd Annual Convention of the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in the Church of Prince George, Winyah, Georgetown, S. C., on Wednesday, May 23rd, 1917, at 10 a. m. The Clergy officiating in the Chancel were the Rt. Rev. Wm. A. Guerry, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, and the Rev. John S. Lightbourn, the Rector of the Parish.

The United Offering of 1917 was presented by the Delegates, while the Choir and congregation sang the familiar and appropriate Hymn, "Holy Offerings, Rich and Rare". The Bishop then asked the congregation to remain standing while he read the roll of the Officers of the Parish Branches who had passed into eternal rest during the year:

Mrs. T. Grange Simons, President, St. Pauls, Charleston.

Mrs. Agnes Hudson, President, St. Johns, Charleston.

Miss S. C. Grimball, President, St. Johns, Johns Island.

Miss Henrietta Murdoch, Diocesan Treas, 1901-9, Charleston.

The Auxiliary will miss their faithful service and loving co-operation.

The Holy Communion was celebrated and the service was closed with prayers for God's guidance over our Convention, and for his care and protection over the Rev. H. H. Lumpkin in Alaska, Miss Alice Gregg in China, our Nation and those who are engaged in war.

The first business session of the Convention was called to order by the President at 11:30 A. M., in the Historic Hall of the Winyah Indigo Society.

The Invocation was made by the Bishop and was followed by a most gracious and hospitable welcome by the Rev. John S. Lightbourn on behalf of the Parish of Prince George, Winyah, and by Mrs. S. M. Ward, on behalf of the Parish Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. Miss Lee responded in a few well chosen sentences and added her personal words of appreciation to the Georgetown Parish, and her welcome to the delegates assembled.

Messages of greeting from our former Diocesan Presidents, Mrs. Robert Wilson, Mrs. Albert R. Heyward and Mrs. William

E. Haskell, were read. Mrs. Alexander Long was present to bring her own call to renewed consecration and service in the cause of Christ, our Master.

Mrs. J. J. Miles offered a resolution that messages of greeting be sent to our absent former Presidents. This was unanimously carried. The Secretary pro tem read the rules of order for the Convention, after which the President appointed Committees on "Credentials", "Recommendations", "Courtesy", "Publicity", "Pages", "Bulletin", and "Readjustment of Fiscal Year".

The Rev. John S. Lightbourn offered the noonday prayers. A telegram of greeting from Miss Marion Mazyck, Secretary of Sec. 1, Juniors, was read and appreciated. Mrs. Long moved that greetings be sent to the Florida Convention of the Womans' Auxiliary in session today. The resolution was carried and Mrs. Long was asked to be responsible for same.

The Secretary called the roll of Parish Branches which showed an attendance of the Bishop, 2 Clergy, 7 Board members, 3 Appointive officers, 60 Representatives of Section A, 6 of Section B, 16 of the Junior Department, making a total attendance of 95.

The Secretary pro tem read excerpts from the minutes of the Convention of 1916-17, recalling to the attention of the Convention the two resloutions passed at that time; viz, that this Diocesan Branch shall hereafter seek to minimize "specials", and to stress giving to General Missions; and that Our Own Missionary Fund be merged into the United Offering, so that hereafter the Board of Missions shall, through our gifts, assume the responsibility of the training of such of our South Carolina volunteers as may be accepted by that body.

Mrs. George Tupper offered an appropriate resolution upon the death of Miss Henrietta Murdoch, Diocesan Treasurer from 1901-1909, which was adopted with a rising vote and ordered spread upon the minutes.

The President then presented her Annual address which follows:

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

My Friends:

How many of us *really* believe with Tennyson that:

"More things are wrought by prayer  
Than this world dreams of"?

How many of us follow Martin Luther's plan,—of spending double our usual time in prayer, when we expect to be twice as busy as usual? Doesn't the busy life of our time and of our people rather tend to shut out prayer? and we lose sight of the power that comes from it.

In every Christian life there is needed the foundation of disciplinary prayer—prayer by rule and method. The secret of spontaneous prayer is systematic prayer, and he who most jealously guards his time of prayer, is he who will most readily pray at any time.

If we wonder at the growth of the early Church—the reason is not hard to find when we read in the Acts that "prayer was ever wont to be made, at all times and in all places."

Flood, famine, pestilence and war drive us to our knees. These are extraordinary incidents of life, but our life consists mainly of the daily round of small duties. Do we pray enough over the every-day requirements of our lives? asking God to show us what He would have us to do? and then do we pause and wait for His answer? And when He shows us our part, are we willing and glad to do it? Many a time God's answer to our prayer is to put into our minds *how* to obtain our desires, and thus answer our own requests!

You remember the little girl who was so distressed over her brother's setting bird traps, how she prayed that the traps might not catch any birds; then she prayed that the birds might not find the traps, then,—she went and knocked the traps to pieces.

Reviewing our lives in the light of the heroism of Europe in its hour of anguish, do we find ourselves *more* willing to devote our lives to a great ideal in Christ's name—than we did two years ago? If *not*, then God's greatest challenge issued to the human race—finds us asleep!

Under the title of "War and Missions" in the May Spirit of Missions, the Rev. F. J. Clark, one of the Board's Secretaries, answers the suggestion that perhaps in this time of distress our Missionary work will suffer. By references to history he shows how Missionary Societies have been founded during times of war, and how activities and contributions have increased at such times. The Woman's Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Church of England, in Canada, is furnishing us a stimulating

example. In the midst of their sacrifices, and the sorrows of this great war, they are not selfishly brooding over their own troubles, but are bravely going forward in obedience to Christ's last command 'Go, teach all nations'.

The little island of New Zealand, after paying her huge war bills, and sending a quarter of a million of her wage-earners to the front, has given for Voluntary Relief funds *eighteen* times as much per capita as rich America has given!— and *England*, despite the terrific drain of war, has given *thirty* times as much, per capita, as America!

Missionaries and Consulates in Palestine, Syria and other Bible lands, report such suffering and poverty as *we* simply *cannot* comprehend. Hundreds of thousands are homeless,—hopeless wanderers in desolate places! And the only hope for these starving multitudes is thro' American assistance,—help from *us*, who have a plenty to eat and live in comfort!

Must we not then double and redouble our gifts and consecrate ourselves to devoted service as never before? Remembering that the real benefit in getting is *giving!* and that each Christian's hands should be as the clouds of heaven, which gather up the mists *only* to dispense them in free distillations of life, ministry and fruitfulness.

Comparing our devotion to God with Europe's devotion to the ideal of patriotism, we see that we are but beginners in the school of sacrifice and service! But, that some of us are beginning to appreciate the meaning and joy of sacrifice is shown in the fact that a young woman in this Diocese—whose fiance has been called to Life eternal,—gave her dearest earthly possession,—her diamond ring,—to help build St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo!

This has been a momentous year in the history of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. There was the Triennial meeting in St. Louis—with its wonderful United Offering, its many privileges and the many opportunities afforded for greater service in almost *every* Missionary District.

Among the big things undertaken at the Triennial was Miss Emery's suggestion of the heart-stirring "Pilgrimage of Prayer," which is still sweeping over this country! and Miss Lindley's "New Junior Plan", which, when carried out, is going to produce

a more earnest and intelligent generation of Church men and women than we have yet known.

Miss Emery's resignation from the General Secretaryship, immediately after the Triennial, stunned the Auxiliary. But when we learned that she was only giving up the office and title, but would continue at the Missions House and that our friend, Miss Lindley, of the Junior Department, was to be the General Secretary, we felt that things would'nt be so different, after all. Bishop Lloyd has written each Diocesan Branch expressing "his sympathy for them in the resignation of the leader whom they had followed with such generosity and devotion", and asking for Miss Lindley "the same unselfish support which had given such joy to Miss Emery". Feeling confident of this, he "expects the work of the women of the Church to continue to grow, with ever increasing blessing attending it".

The history of our own Diocesan Branch you will hear in detail from the officers. Each in her department is serving you to the best of her ability—deeming the service a privilege and a pleasure. They earnestly ask your help in the more prompt return of your Parish Branch reports, some have not *yet* come in!

On account of illness, our Secretary, Miss Darrell, was compelled to resign her office in the middle of the year. She had been so efficient in her service, that the Board accepted her resignation with reluctance and much regret.

Our own Missionary, Alice Gregg, writes such happy enthusiastic letters, telling in the most interesting way of her work in the Language School at Nanking, where she is progressing so well in her studies. In her last letter she reported having acquired two hundred of the two thousand characters necessary to read a Chinese newspaper with intelligence.

Of our Volunteers, that most important part of our work, you will hear from the Chairman of the Committee on the "Offering of Life". Let us always aim towards having at least *one* Volunteer a year from South Carolina! There are two capable young women in this Diocese who are ready and anxious to give their lives to work in the Foreign field, but the way is not yet open to them. Will you not add your prayers to theirs, that, if it is God's will, they may be permitted in the near future to make their "Offering of Life"?

A Resolution at the General Convention, and passed by our own Diocesan Council, brings to us the problem of readjusting our work and pledges to agree with the Calendar year instead of from May to May as heretofore. A Committee will report to us before this Convention closes on the most efficient way to make this change.

Last June, the Colored Woman's Auxiliary met in Aiken. Your President was invited to attend, and at the meeting was asked to be the bearer of their United Offering to the Triennial. Their Offering amounted to \$50.00. Their work had been strengthening the Branches formed during the previous year rather than gaining new ones; and they had an earnest discussion on the subject of the Junior Department which they hoped to organize.

When this war is over, the Church must be prepared for the greatest opportunity that has ever faced Christianity. Men are thinking seriously of the deep things of life. The veneer has been struck off, and we have come down to the real human being. So in these days of our testing—our task as "Brother's-keeper" must become more pressing.

Let uspray daily for purity of aim and purpose—purity of body and soul for ourselves, for the nation, and for the commonwealth of nations. And that our hearts may be kept from all bitterness and hate, that we may be kept strong in hope, tender in spirit, and with an unshakable trust in God, our Father, and in His far-seeing Power. But, most of all, let us pray for a deeper consecration thro' the indwelling of the Holy Spirit in our own hearts, remembering that the coming of the Kingdom is to be accomplished "not by might nor by power, but by *My Spirit* saith the Lord of Hosts".

Mrs. Long here addressed the Convention and asked "Why our Clergy were not present with us, asking if their absence was a sign of their supreme confidence in, or their indifference to the Auxiliary, and suggesting that greater efforts be made in future to secure their presence with us.

Reports of Convocational Vice-Presidents were received as follows:

**REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT OF COLUMBIA CONVOCATION**

An unavoidable absence prevents me from standing before the Convention to make my third and last report as Vice-President of the Columbia Convocation. I am thankful for the three years which to me have meant added grace, strength, interest and knowledge, and a fuller gratitude for the share of the Master's work which belongs to the women of the Church.

May God continue to bless our efforts and may we be prepared for the joy of living with Him.

The Columbia Convocation showed an increase during the past year in the Box work, and also in money offerings. There is only one Branch now working in two Sections; that of Florence, Aiken and Trinity, Columbia having united their two sections. Aiken very hospitably entertained our Fall meeting with the Mission Study Institute and Clerical Convocation. This joint meeting was postponed until January, which probably accounts for the small attendance. Visits to two community or rural branches proved an inspiring pleasure. Congaree and Hagood prove that a scattered membership, with willing hearts and hands, can meet, work and contribute to the cause so near and dear to our hearts.

On October 3rd, I presided at the Convocational meeting at Spartanburg. I regret

that the Branches reported "dead" when I took charge have remained extinct. The smallness of the congregation, and those without a shepherd being the causes assigned in answer to my earnest inquiries. In Anderson the gain of three Junior Sections was reported by Mrs. Gibboney. The leaflet on the Junior Plan, Triennial pledge and Pilgrimage of Prayer were forwarded by me to each Branch as requested by our President.

#### REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT OF CHARLESTON CONVOCATION

The past year's work has been encouraging in spite of the fact that no new branches were formed; though various trials were made. Never-the-less, the interest and enthusiasm of the existing branches has been splendid, and the spiritual side developed by Mission Study Classes, and the more general taking and reading of the "Spirit of Missions". Some Bible classes now in progress are the direct result of the work of the Mission Study Class leaders.

In Charleston on January 20th, St. Paul's Day, we celebrated our corporate Communion, this was followed by the convocational meeting and after that, a two days Institute led most interestingly by Miss Annie Hanckel; this proving very profitable. Both of these meetings were held in Grace Church Parish

Hall. The Vice-President is still working on two Branches which dissolved several years ago, and with the assistance of helpful workers in both of these, hopes for a revival of same. Up to date we have thirty Branches, and the contributions in money and boxes from these during the past year amounted to \$3,702.42.

#### REPORT OF BOX SECRETARY

Boxes have gone to Alaska, Oklahoma, Idaho, Virginia and North Carolina. The number of boxes was 89 and their total value was \$2,956.12.

The Conference on Box work, led by Miss Barnwell, emphasized the following points:

1st. That the Box Secretary should be conferred with before any box is sent out by a Parish Branch.

2nd. That a greater number of Branches should strive to send "Family Boxes".

3rd. That Branches should enlarge their vision and send more Boxes to distant diocese and districts.

Bishop Guerry urged the Auxiliary to remember the Latin American fields, especially those under Bishop Colmore and Bishop Hulse, in our Box work this year.

It was moved and carried that hereafter, Mission Boxes shall be assigned to the Branches by the Box Secretary, and that these assignments be alternated each year, so that a Branch will send a Box one year to a near-by field and the following year to a distant one, reserving to the Branches the right to appeal to the Box Secretary for a change of Box if the assignment is found impracticable.

The Annual Message of Miss Grace Lindley, the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was received with interest and appreciation, and a motion was passed that letters of greeting be sent to both Miss Lindley and Miss Emery.

The Credential Committee here reported 80 voting delegates, 51 from Charleston Convocation, 27 from Columbia and 6 from Greenville; 6 on the Executive Board.

Announcements of subsequent sessions were made by the President, and the morning session was adjourned with the benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session was opened with prayers by the Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Miss Grace Hutchins, of Boston was presented to the Convention and brought greetings from the Massachusetts Branch.

The Treasurer then read her report which was as follows:

**REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEPARTMENT**

The Junior Department has 37 Parish Branches, with 76 sections—an increase during the year of 6 new Branches and 16 sections, 3 of which are boys. 24 sections made no report, but only one of these failed to meet its pledges, as shown by the Treasurer's books.

The number reporting Corporate Communion, and having participated in the Pilgrimage of Prayer is very encouraging.

The Department sent 57 Boxes, valued at \$707.42. They went to Alaska, South Dakota, Arden, Morgantown and Lincolnton, N. C., a negro mission, St. Mary's, Ga., and Graniteville, S. C. The money contributions to pledges were \$732.41, making the total for the Junior Department of \$1,439.83.

I visited Anderson, Union and Glen Springs forming new Branches in each place; also the Greenville and Spartanburg Branches were visited.

Mrs. Myers, Secretary of Section II and Miss Mazyck of Section I, visited many of the Branches in the Charleston Convocation, forming two new Branches, St. Johns, Charleston, and St. Andrews, Charleston; also several new Sections where Branches already exist.

It is much to be regretted that distance and lack of funds

prevented any visiting in the Columbia Convocation, where only one new Branch is reported, this being ST. DAVIDS, CHERAW.

I presided at the Junior Session of the Greenville Convocational meeting, but being unable to attend either of the others, Mrs. J. S. Myers kindly represented me at the Charleston Convocational Meeting and Miss Marianna Ford at the Columbia Convocational Meeting at Aiken.

I had the good fortune to be in Boston shortly before the Cambridge Conference which, with your assistance, I attended.

There I attended Miss Lucy Sturgis class on "Junior Methods" and again at the Triennial I had the same privilege. Wonderful as had been the Cambridge Class, this latter was even more so, for in St. Louis we had the advantage of hearing from Junior Leaders from all parts of the Country.

At the Triennial the "New Junior Plan" was proposed by Miss Grace Lindley. I feel sure that you are all familiar with the details of the "New Plan" as leaflets explaining it have been sent to all Branches both of the Woman's Auxiliary and the Junior Department. Also the Diocese has printed two Articles on the subject.

We were fortunate in having Miss Grace Lindley present the "New Plan" at the Sunday School Convention held in Columbia in February, thus giving it at first hand to the Superintendents and Teachers of the Diocese, whose cooperation is so necessary to its success.

During the next year we hope to successfully introduce it into many of our Parishes.

While the Junior Officers are pleased to note that the Department has gone forward in the past year in every way, membership, gifts, study and most important of all, Spiritually, we are even now looking to the *Future*, planning a campaign to reach every Parish in the Diocese.

There are 63 Parishes in the Diocese and 28 Organized Missions.

Only 33 Parishes and 4 of the Organized Missions have the Junior Auxiliary.

So we have a broad Field before us.

There has never been a time in the history of the World when *Opportunities* and *Responsibilities* were so great as *Today*.

There has never been a time when it was as necessary that the *Youth* of the Country should be *Trained* to meet these *Responsibilities*.

The Junior Auxiliary is the training school where our Boys and Girls may learn to recognize the joy and privilege of His Service and receive the necessary equipment.

We ask the cooperation of every member of the Womans Auxiliary in organizing the Junior Auxiliary, according to the "New Plan", in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese.

Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton spoke on "Missionary Instruction in our Sunday Schools" and emphasized the need of the co-operation of the members of the Auxiliary in the systematic teaching of Missions in the Sunday Schools.

Informal ballots were then distributed. Announcement of the evening service was made. Rev. Mr. Pendleton pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned.

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING

A Missionary service was held in Prince George, Winyah, Church, Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, the speakers being the Bishop who spoke on our responsibility to the Negro in the South; Deaconess Sands and Miss Robinson, who spoke on the work among the people in the Mill districts.

#### THURSDAY MORNING

Holy Communion was celebrated on Thursday morning at seven thirty, by Rev. J. S. Lightbourn.

The business session was opened at 9:45 with the Apostles Creed and prayers by Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton. Minutes of Wednesday afternoon session were read and approved and mention was made of the Missionary service.

Several Articles of the By-laws were amended as follows:

Article II, Section 6, amended by inserting the words "with Convocational Assistants" after "she shall endeavor", and omit the clause "she shall have two assistants appointed by her upon consultation with the Executive Board".

Article II, Section 7, amended by inserting the clause "with Convocational Assistants, and an Assistant in the Junior Department" after the words "and shall endeavor".

Article II, Section 3, amended by changing the word "Auditor" to "Auditing Committee".

Mrs. Cornell brought to the attention of the Convention the fact that the appointive officers have no right, under the Constitution, to a vote, and gave notice that at a later session she would offer an amendment to the Constitution giving these officers the privilege of the vote.

The Tellers Committee here reported that 63 votes were cast on the informal ballot and that the names of the nominees for offices would be placed on a board in the vestibule.

The report of the Committee on Readjustment of the Fiscal Year was given and three points were brought out:

1st. That it would necessitate changing the fiscal year of the Womans Auxiliary.

2nd. Changing the time for holding the Annual Convention.

3rd. Changing the pledges for the current year.

A motion was made and carried that the President appoint a Committee to look over the whole Constitution and make such recommendations as will accord with the change in the fiscal year of the Church.

The report of the Committee on Recommendations of the President was that they be adopted as read, and are as follows:

1. That a "Prayer Committee" be formed in each Branch.

2. That the women inform themselves about the Junior work, and, as soon as possible devote sufficient time to the discussion of the "New Junior Plan" to familiarize themselves thoroughly with it. For the women pledged themselves at the Triennial to help the Junior Department put the plan into operation.

3. That the "Spirit of Missions" and the "Diocese" be used at each Parish Branch meeting.

4. That the offerings at the Missionary services and early celebrations during this Convention be given to General Missions.

Mrs. Osteen offered the following resolution, which was unanimously carried: "That the thanks and appreciation of the Auxiliary be tendered all retiring officers for their faithful and efficient service.

The Educational Secretary, Miss Virginia T. Singleton, read her report as follows:

"The first thing to be reported was the great privilege that was mine in being one of the Auxiliary representatives at the Triennial which met at St. Louis during October. During those two weeks, Mission Study had the second place on almost every day's program, following the early celebration of the Holy Communion at 9:45 for 15 classes so wonderfully planned by Miss Lindley met for an hour. By virtue of my office, I was assigned to Rev. Arthur R. Gray's class for Educational Secretaries. It was wonderful inspiration and help to me, not only in the study of Mr. Gray's own book, "The New World", but the daily contact with those interested women who were leaders in many Dioceses.

There were classes on "Prayer", "The New World", and "Manana". One of the latter classes was lead by our Miss Ford. She is also to lead a class this summer at the Cambridge Conference. We are very proud of having our Diocese represented by so gifted a leader. The reports show that Mission Study classes are slowly but surely increasing in our Diocese. With the efficient co-operation of my convocational assistants, 400 copies of "The New World" were sold and 100 more were needed, but the stock at the Mission House was exhausted just at the beginning of Lent. "The New World" was generally used and some classes have had "The Why and How of Foreign Missions", and one used the "Church Disciple". Some of the results of these classes are as follows:

1. Prayer Circles formed to meet weekly to pray for the Kingdom.
2. That at every Branch meeting there shall be Mission study.
3. Yearly classes in Mission Study in place of Lenten.
4. The importance of sending at least one member of a branch to a Summer Conference, and the intention to do so.
5. That through knowledge, giving is the natural sequence and some members of the classes have given to the school in

Porto Rico; others to St. Agnes School, Kyoto, and the Church General Hospital, Wu Chang.

In some classes, prayer has been so deeply emphasized, that many who never expected to offer petitions, found themselves doing so voluntarily. The Church Missionary Calendar, too, is finding its way into the homes of our Auxiliary women, and this year we have sold a hundred. Last year there were 52 classes in 30 Branches, while this year there were 58 classes in 34 Branches, and, in addition, in a recently organized Parish where no Branches of the Auxiliary existed, there was a fine class on the Why and How of Foreign Missions lead by a member of a nearby Auxiliary Branch.

Total number of classes 59, reading circles 8, and Missionary Lectures 21. Trinity Branch, Columbia, had the largest number of classes, having 9, with nearly 200 women enrolled. The Good Shepherd Branch, Columbia, had 7 classes, and in addition, the Home Department for those who could not attend classes. One of the leaders, realizing that the price of the books would debar some members, made a gift to her Branch of 70 books; so all obstacles are being overcome as Mission Study is recognized as the essential life of the Auxiliary.

I was unable to attend the three Convocational meetings but at each, a class on the New World was led by our own women who attended the Blue Ridge Conference last summer. We, in the Fourth Province are so richly blessed by having three conferences during the summer months; Blue Ridge Interdenominational Conference in June, Gulfport, Miss., early in July, and Sewanee in August are our Church Conferences.

Please let me urge you to make your plans this summer to attend one of these Conferences, so that we may have leaders and thus hasten the time when our goal shall be reached:—a Study Class in every Branch.

If we know, we love; and if we love, we pray and give to Him Who is the Fountain of Life.

Mrs. Cornell spoke of the wonderful spiritual help and inspiration she had received at the Blue Ridge Conference. Mrs. Lundgren told of her experience at the Cambridge Conference and how much the training meant to her in her work as Junior Secretary.

The Bishop spoke of the value to the Auxiliary workers of attending our own Church Conferences at Sewanee, and suggested that each Branch form some plan to send one of their members to this conference, and also try to interest the men in these Conferences.

---

#### **REPORT OF UNITED OFFERING CUSTODIAN AND OF THE COMMITTEE ON "OFFERING OF LIFE"**

The ever increasing amount presented year by year as a United Thank Offering by the women and girls of our Diocese, shows their growing appreciation of their Christian privileges and blessings and desire to share them with others. Not only are all of our branches now sharing in this offering but also many scattered church women throughout the Diocese.

Our Triennial offering of 1916 was the largest ever made by the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, the amount being \$5,229.68 which was placed on the Alms Basin by our President at the opening Communion service in St. Louis. With that gift of money there was also presented the name of Miss Alice Gregg, of Mars Bluff, the first woman to be trained and sent to the Foreign Field by the South Carolina Branch. Miss Gregg graduated last year from the Philadelphia Training School and sailed in August for China. She has completed the course at the Language School and has entered with enthusiasm upon her work in Anking. Miss Uta Saito who has been prepared for work by the South Carolina Branch, has completed a year of study at St. Faith's Training School and plans to sail in August with Deaconess Knapp for Japan where she will work among her own people.

Miss Eloise Dublin has regained her health and again entered the hospital to continue her training as a nurse. Miss Mary Means expects to prepare for medical work and will enter the Medical College of Pennsylvania in October.

The Summer Volunteer work continues to claim the interest of our young women. The little mission at St. George, near Morganton, N. C., was open four months last summer, Misses Kate Mears, Elizabeth Waddill, and Leila Barnwell being in charge. The great desire on the part of the people of the mountains as well as of the Rector in charge, to have these young ladies return, testifies to their good work and we are glad that the mission is again open this summer, with Misses Mears and Waddill in charge. Miss Barnwell has been requested to open a nearby mission and she will probably do so, with another volunteer as assistant.

Miss Mary Rutledge assisted the Rev. Mr. Atkins at Todd, N. C., and did what was possible under the unfavorable conditions existing. She arrived just before the fearful storm which prevented her accomplishing those things which she had planned. Miss Harrington, who was to have been her assistant, was unable for the same reason to reach Todd.

We regret not being able to accept the services of several other young women who have volunteered for the coming summer, but it does not seem wise to open other missions this year.

According to a resolution passed at the last Convention, the O. O. M. Fund which has been used for the training of the South Carolina volunteers, has been merged in the United Offering Fund.

The work of this department has been directed as heretofore, the Diocesan Custodian having as assistants; Convocational Custodians, Parish Custodians, County Custodians, with a Custodian for the Junior Department. Miss Ethel Brunson has had charge of the Junior work during the past year, while Mrs. J. W. Peterman in the Charleston Convocation, Mrs. A. B. Henry in the Greenville Convocation, and Miss Theo. W. Woods in the Columbia Convocation, have assisted in getting literature and boxes from the Missions House and distributing them to the various branches.

Meetings have been held as usual in the fall and spring. The programs for these meetings have been varied as some of the Parish Custodians have preferred to plan their own. Others have used the leaflets furnished them. In some branches the Senior and Junior branches have held joint meetings. In some

instances there was a celebration of the Holy Communion before the meeting; in other parishes the Holy Communion was celebrated at the time of the Communion service with which the Triennial was opened. Several branches used the United Offering Stereopticon Lecture sent from the Missions House.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

This Committee recommends that the sum of \$50.00 be pledged for the Summer Volunteer work and that it be sent to the Treasurer as soon as possible.

That a Committee on the Offering of Life be formed in every parish where there is not such a committee.

That our continued interest and prayers be given to our volunteers in training and to those already in the field.

Noonday prayers were offered by the Bishop followed by a helpful meditation, the theme being "Sacrifice". He urged a more frequent celebration of the Holy Communion, especially at this time of great strife and turmoil.

Miss Mazyck offered a resolution, which was carried, that a

committee be appointed by the President to formulate a suitable noonday prayer to be used by the women of our Diocese during the present world crisis.

During the Conference on Volunteers and Summer Workers which followed, Miss Hutchins stressed the great need of more workers and the opportunity of the Juniors to fit themselves for this work.

A motion was made and carried that greetings and assurances of our sympathy and prayers be sent Miss Eloise Dublin.

Miss Duvall reported that the limited Term of Service Fund had been depleted and that \$50.00 was needed to carry on this work. A plea was made for funds to revive 3 Missions in the Morganton group and a committee was appointed to investigate the conditions of these Missions.

Mrs. Long brought to the attention of the Auxiliary the fact that Miss Uta Saito, who had been trained the past four years by our Auxiliary, had received her final year's training through a scholarship at St. Faith's, the training school in New York, furnished by St. Thomas' Church.

The time for the Junior Session having arrived, discussion of this subject was discontinued.

---

#### JUNIOR SESSION

The Junior Session was opened and the roll called, showing 7 representatives from Section 3, 15 from Section 2, and 4 from Section 1. Miss Lee read a letter from Miss Lindley stating how pleased she was to receive such gratifying reports of new branches formed, and of the many boxes sent out; and urged the Juniors to greater effort during the coming year.

Miss Marion Mazyck, Secretary of Section 1, being absent, her report was read by Mrs. Lundgren, as follows:

#### REPORT OF SECTION ONE

Only thirteen of the 32 Branches of Section 1 on the roll sent reports.

Five new Sections I have been formed during the year. The Christmas collection amounted to \$11.04, Easter collection

\$35.60, United Offering \$24.73, value of gifts \$129.48, making a total of \$200.85.

There are several points I should like to make clear to the Little Helper Directresses.

Necessary and delightful as work for the Orphanage is, it is not Auxiliary work as it is not under the Board of Missions. Boxes, Money, etc., sent to the Orphanage can not be reported as Little Helper work.

The United Offering should represent twenty per cent. of all money collected in the Barrels, the remainder to be sent to the Treasurer for General Missions. Any other gifts or collections may be sent to the Treasurer for any designated object in which the members are interested.

Please notify the Junior Secretary of any change of Directresses; this would save much time and confusion.

I hope the Little Helpers will continue their pledges for Chester Foster at Christ School, Arden, N. C.

My years' work is ended, it has not been as successful as I had hoped, but for what it is worth I offer it to the Convention with an earnest prayer that next year will be a better one for all of us in all we try to do.

#### REPORT OF SECTION TWO

Before submitting the report of Section 2 of the Junior Department, I must express my appreciation of the great privilege which you bestowed upon me at Camden when you made me Secretary, for it has been a joy to serve. Unless one were in a like position, one could never know how many charming "Juniors" there are in our Diocese, and how they stand ready with open hearts and willing hands to fulfill the command of our Blessed Lord to extend His Kingdom upon earth—and right here, let me say that there would be a greater number if there were more Directresses; if more women would be "Junior Mothers", and gather them and teach them, first, being instructed themselves,

or seeking to know just what to teach them; then having acquired that knowledge, to impart it to others, for "knowledge is power". Leaders should realize their responsibility as such, and should bear in mind that as those branches of the great tree known as the Woman's Auxiliary grow, each will bear witness and silently give account of the stewardship of its Leader. Enthusiasm is contagious, and if a leader is enthusiastic and filled with the spirit of love, the love that will seal into one Communion, one Holy Fellowship the scattered nations of the earth, the children in her care will partake of that spirit.

I would like, if I may, to make a few suggestions to Junior Leaders: When you gather the members of your Branch about you, don't talk money at first, do not start study at once, but teach them to pray. "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you". Teach them the sacredness of the trust and you will have results.

One of the Sections 2 in our Charleston Convocation has undertaken to canvass the Sunday School, placing each child's name in the Section it will belong, and afterwards there will be a Junior Day and the result will be the begining of the New Junior Plan in that Parish. The Leader of every branch or Section should instruct her branch concerning the New Junior Plan. Let me advise that you who have the honor of being Junior Leaders appreciate that honor and give your Juniors vision of the call of the "Thousand voices o'er the waters blue"; have a definite work for each meeting, take them to China one afternoon, picture the heartaches of little children like themselves and tell them how they, the Juniors, can help to heal those wounded hearts. To those who have no branch in your Parish, organize at once.

It is a pleasure to note splendid reports from the newly organized Section 2; special mention should be made of St. Michael's, Charleston, which sends a report of a beautiful box to Valle Crucis, and a total report of \$19.00, although only organized one month ago; of St. Paul's, Summerville, where Section 2 was formed; of St. John's, Charleston, where a Section of boys and girls was formed, of St. Andrew's Mission, Charleston.

There are now 31 Sections 2, 3 being boys. 27 Boxes have been sent valued at \$277.72, money contributions amounting to

\$315.64, making a total of \$593.36, and all have not reported, much to my regret.

After these reports, a conference was held on the "New Junior

Plan" work, the object of the plan being to make every child in the Sunday School a member of the Junior Auxiliary. Emphasis was laid on the Sunday School teachers and leaders of the Junior Department being familiar with and in touch with each others work. Different methods of introducing the new plan could be devised to suit the needs of each branch. Some Branches have adopted the Christian Nurture Course. It was suggested that where Sunday School teachers were not members of the Auxiliary, Mission Study classes be formed among them.

Mrs. Long here presented the following resolution: "That the Convention, through its Executive Board, shall request the Board of Missions to return to St. Thomas' Church, New York, the amount given to the Uta Saito Training Fund, and that the special Our Own Missionary Fund in the United Offering from the Auxiliary be applied to her tuition fund, the balance of \$136.00 to be taken from our United Offering at this meeting".

This resolution was passed.

After the benediction was pronounced, the Junior Session adjourned until afternoon.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The Junior Session was resumed at 4 o'clock on Thursday afternoon, being opened with prayers by the Rev. J. S. Lightbourn.

Then followed:

#### THE REPORT OF THE JUNIOR EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

The Missionary education of the young people of the Church is a sacred responsibility, as well as a wonderful opportunity which is entrusted in a very special way to us, as members of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. Whether we are actually Officers in the Junior Department or not, we should each one of us know about, and feel a deep interest in all that pertains to the educational work of the young people of our Parishes. And not only should we know about and be interested in this phase of our Auxiliary work, but we should be willing to give of our time and ability, to develop in our young people a deep sense of love and responsibility for the Church's mission, and a knowledge of how and where the Church is meeting her opportunities.

The growth of Mission study in our Junior Department during the past year has not been as great as I had hoped for, yet, on the whole, my work has been encouraging. 13 branches of Section 3, 12 branches of Section 2, and 1 branch of Section 1, have reported Mission study, carried out either in each monthly meeting, in special seasons, or through a combination of both methods. 15 study classes, 8 reading circles, and 10 Missionary lectures are reported to me, while the study of specific courses in mission study are reported in the Church of Our Savior, Rock Hill. 6 Parishes report "Manana" introduced with great success in the Sunday Schools during the season of Lent. 3 Parishes report their Sunday School teachers enrolled in Mission Study classes. The courses used throughout these classes were as follows: "Torch Bearers of the King's Highway", "The Why and How of Foreign Missions", "The Honorable Little Miss Love", "Round the World with Jack and Janet", "Lives That Have Helped", "Helping Hands in the Sunrise Kingdom", "The First Americans", "The Kingdom Growing", "Hearing God Speak through the Churches Message", "The New World", "Manana", and general Missionary subjects as presented by leaflets of the Board of Missions, and by the Spirit of Missions.

The amount of cash expended through my department has been as follows:

Postage on circular letters, literature, etc., \$4.50, sale of books, \$33.13, making a total of \$37.63. I still have on hand books valued at \$2.50 which are on sale here at the Convention.

Early in the fall I mailed lists of Study Courses and Educational Leaflets and catalogues to all Sections of the Junior Department, and in February, I wrote each branch and Rector urging the use of "Manana" in the Sunday Schools.

Again I wish to thank the Auxiliary for the privilege they conferred upon me in sending me to the Blue Ridge Conference last June.

I feel sure that no better way exists in which our leaders may be filled with enthusiasm and efficiency for their work, than by attending these Church Conferences.

Miss Hutchins then told the Juniors many incidents in the lives of the Chinese children and of the many opportunities of our Juniors to help bring to these people the message of Christ's love. A rising vote of thanks and appreciation for her interesting and instructive talk was tendered Miss Hutchins.

A plea was made for assistance in keeping the sister of Lula Harmon in the Valle Crucis school, and a motion was made and carried that the Juniors undertake the Harmon Scholarship as well as the Chester Foster Scholarship. Pledges were offered from the floor for both of these objects.

The report of the United Offering Custodian of the Junior Department showed total receipts of \$162.46; \$25.15 of this amount having been received from the "Little Helpers".

Deaconess Sands told of a young boy who had offered himself for the ministry and made a plea for funds to support him while he was obtaining his preliminary education. A request was made that the delegates take this appeal back to their branches.

Announcements were made, after which the afternoon session was dismissed with the benediction pronounced by the Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton.

#### THURSDAY EVENING

The 2nd Missionary Service of the Convention was held in the Church on Thursday evening at 8:30. The service was devoted to the consideration of the opportunities and responsibility of the Church for Foreign Missions, the speakers being Miss Grace Hutchins, of St. Hilda's School, Wu Chang, China, and the Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton.

#### FRIDAY MORNING

The Friday morning Session was opened at 9:30 with prayer by the Rev. J. S. Lightbourn, after which the minutes of the Thursday Session were read and approved.

Miss Singleton offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

"That this Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary and its

Junior Department urge the Diocesan Board of Religious Education to endeavor to get the Christian Nurture Course used in every Sunday School in our Diocese as quickly as possible."

Miss Uto Saita, our Japanese Volunteer for service in Japan, then spoke a few words of greeting to the Convention and told of some of her future plans. She assured the Auxiliary of her love and gratitude to its members and promised to always keep in touch with them.

The Secretary then read the report of the Secretary of the Spirit of Missions as follows:

---

#### REPORT OF SECRETARY OF "SPIRIT OF MISSIONS"

Before making my report as Secretary of The Spirit of Missions, I beg leave to call your attention to conditions caused by the very generous offer of the business manager of our missionary magazine to the children of the Sunday School.

By this offer children securing new subscriptions may keep 50c. of the \$1.00 for their mite boxes. Parents and friends naturally prefer to give their orders to the children, especially under such an advantage. So parish representatives complain and with reason, I think, that they cannot compete, and have no wish to appear to compete, with the children. And not only that, but their work would also seem ineffectual if not actually unnecessary, as this condition creates an overlapping.

So I would suggest that different arrangements be made for the coming year. Notwithstanding these difficulties and the fact that, unlike last year, we have no large individual gift, the report is very encouraging.

54 Parish Representatives. 129 Reply cards sent out. 46 Letters written. 130 Postal cards written. 50 New subscriptions. 75 Renewals.

It gives me pleasure to tell you that Prince George, Winyah branch of Georgetown with a membership of 27, leads the diocese in subscriptions to the Spirit of Missions, with 12 new subscriptions and 20 renewals for the year just ending.

Trinity, Columbia comes next with ten new subscriptions, and Good Shepherd, Columbia, third with eight.

The report of Mrs. Heyward, Diocesan Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, bespeaking the interest and aid of our women in this work, and urging each Parish to send books and magazines to soldiers' training camps, was read by Miss Singleton.

Mrs. McCarrel, of St. Lukes Church, Charleston, spoke on the Periodical work and urged a greater use of this department in our Parishes. 5 branches reported Periodical work being done through the Auxiliary, while several other branches reported the same work being carried on through other Parish organizations. These branches were urged to secure reports of this work from their Parishes for the Periodical Club another year.

Mrs. Kennedy reported that the Secretary of the "Diocese" had been unable to do any work this year.

The President read a note of greeting which she had received from Bishop Burleson which was greatly enjoyed and appreciated by the Convention.

Mrs. Cornell, Chairman of the Committee on Suggested Amendments to the Constitution and By-laws, made her report, which was adopted after being amended, as follows:

"Before presenting our recommendations for amendments to the Constitution and By-laws, your Committee wishes to present the following resolution for your consideration":

"Resolved, That with the approval and consent of the Bishop of the Diocese, and in order to follow the action already taken by our Diocesan Council, by which it has changed its date of meeting and distribution of business so that they may accord with the Calendar year, this Convention does hereby agree to hold its Annual Convention of 1918 in the month of January, and to make all other changes necessary to the conduct of affairs of the Diocesan Branch of the Womans Auxiliary to the Board of Missions". (Resolution adopted)

We recommend that the Annual Convention of 1918 shall amend the Constitution of the Diocesan Branch as follows:

Article IV. Representative Body. Amend by the insertion of a Section between Sections 1 and 2 which shall read as follows: "The officers of the Board and all officers appointed by the Convention and by the Board shall be entitled to vote".

This clause shall become Section 2 and Section 2 shall become Section 3.

Article VII. Fiscal Year. Amend by changing the words "May" to "January".

Article VIII. Amend Section 1 by changing the word "May" to "January".

Amend Section 2 by striking out the clause "on the Wednesday preceding Ash Wednesday" and by inserting the words "in November".

Amend Section 3 by changing the word "fall" to "spring".

We further recommend that the By-laws be amended at this present time as follows:

Article I. Dues. Amend by striking out the words "in the month of March", and by changing the last clause to read, "This amount shall be paid in November and shall constitute a contingent fund which shall be used at the discretion of the Board".

Article II, Section 5. Amend by changing the word "May" to "January".

Section 7. Amend by inserting "The Junior United Offering Custodian" between the words "President" and "The Educational Secretary", and by adding the clause, "It is recommended that the Parish United Offering meetings shall be held in November and May".

Section 8. Amend by striking out the clause "an assistant in charge of the Little Helpers and an assistant in charge of Section 2", and by inserting the words "two convocational assistants".

Miss Lee, Mrs. Long, Miss Singleton and Mrs. Lundgren reported on the Triennial and gave the Convention much information that was both valuable and interesting.

The President then introduced the subject of the "Pilgrimage of Prayer" by telling of the character of the Pilgrimage carried on in the Mother Church of England last year. Reports from the delegates present showed that the Pilgrimage of Prayer had been kept in our Diocese, during the week from Sunday March 25th to Sunday April 1st, in many Parishes and that much interest and inspiration had been the result. A unique observance of the "Pilgrimage" was reported by Mrs. Arthur Gaillard who gathered together an interdenominational Mission Study

Class in Ninety-six and carried on the week of prayer with them. Miss Singleton stressed the value of teaching our children a prayer to be used in Church before the opening of the service and stated she had a copy of one used at the Orphanage in York. Miss Singleton was requested to publish this in the Diocese so that it might become more widely known.

Sectional Conferences were then held for Presidents, Treasurers, Educational Secretaries, Leaders of Study Classes and for Junior Leaders. These were found most helpful.

The Rev. J. S. Lightbourn then led the noon-day prayers, after which Mrs. Long, the Diocesan Treasurer of Ideas, presented the following which were discussed from the floor and endorsed by the Convention:

We recommend,

1st—Regular meetings of Auxiliaries throughout the year; no discontinuance during summer.

2nd—That no pledges be reduced or withdrawn during this great crisis and opportunity in the Church's history, and that wherever possible increase shall be made ;that there be no panic or lack of courage in our ranks.

3rd—That we shall seize this opportunity to impress on our children what our religion should mean to us in bringing order out of chaos.

4th—That we co-operate as individuals in the work of the Red Cross Society or other patriotic service leagues.

5th—That by financial aid or by lightening his duties, make it possible for your Rector to render Chaplain duties or give series of talks to nearby troops.

6th—Have the Church kept open for all who wish to enter and pray and make a habit of going yourself for quiet prayer for the triumph of the right.

7th—If you have not given a Missionary play recently begin again—two excellent ones making a satisfactory program are the "Blue Cashmere Gown" and "The Little Missionary's Vision".

8th—Make a practice of telling Missionary stories to the children in the twilight hours this summer.

9th—If the Auxiliary in towns nearest you have not sent a

delegate to the Convention, make it your business to begin at once to arouse interest in our next Annual Meeting.

10th—That study classes be divided into two sections and at close of study term, come together for a question and answer contest on text book.

The following were suggested from the floor.

1 That every branch should endeavor to send at least one delegate to the Convention each year, and that wherever possible, new delegates be sent so as to arouse intelligent interest and enthusiasm in the Auxiliary work.

2 That our children be encouraged to plant "Missionary Gardens", the produce of which may be sold for the advancement of His Kingdom.

3 That a systematic gift of five cents a month be asked of each Parish member, the fund accumulated in this way to be used to pay the Annual Dues of the members of the Branch and to send a delegate to the Convention.

4 That Branches shall hold quarterly meetings of the entire Parish Branch at which reports and plans of each Section may be presented and discussed.

5 That each Parish Branch establish a fund to send a delegate to a Summer Conference.

6 That Parish and Diocesan Bible Classes produce a spirit of consecration of service which is invaluable in securing officers and leaders for the various departments of Auxiliary work.

7 That "Bishops Day" be established in various parts of the Diocese when groups of Auxiliaries may be gathered together, with the Bishop as the guest of honor, to discuss the work in which both are engaged.

Appeals for help were made for St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, and St. Peters Church, Seward, Alaska.

The President announced that Miss Margaret Hobart, formerly of the Church Missions House, is now editing the Woman's page on the Churchman and invites correspondence.

The President then read a letter from Miss Delafield, Chairman of the Committee appointed by the Triennial, to confer with the Board of Missions concerning Auxiliary affairs, in which our

Diocesan Branch is asked to express its view on the following:

---

### **SUGGESTIONS FOR THE ORGANIZATION OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY**

1. The Auxiliary should have a constitution to be ratified by the Board.
2. The President of the Board of Missions is ex-officio President of the Auxiliary.
3. The General Secretary should be nominated by the Auxiliary, and appointed by the Board of Missions, her term of office to coincide with that of the President of the Board.
4. There should be some sort of unified provincial organization.
5. The delegates of the Woman's Auxiliary at its Triennial meeting shall elect a chairman of its executive committee, who shall preside at all meetings. They shall also elect an executive committee consisting of sixteen members, eight to be nominated by the Provinces, and eight nominated by the whole body of delegates. In case of vacancy in the chairmanship between the Triennial meetings, the executive committee shall have power to fill the same.
6. Eight members of this Executive Committee shall be elected members of the Board of Missions.
7. The executive committee shall meet at the same time as the Board of Missions, either immediately before or immediately after.

---

Recommendation Number 6 was discussed at length, a divided opinion being expressed. After Miss Hutchins stated that the recommendation is desired and thought advisable by the Board itself, the Convention passed a resolution of endorsement.

It was announced that \$45.00 of the \$100.00 pledged by our delegates to the Triennial for St. Agnes School remains unpaid. Pledges were immediately made from the floor to meet this deficit.

The call of the Church General Hospital, Wu Chang, China, was presented and the Diocesan Branch voted to pledge \$100.00

to this cause. Delegates were urged to add this pledge to their pledge slips.

The President announced that Miss Mary Means had been accepted by the Board of Missions and that she had accepted a scholarship in the Woman's Medical College in Philadelphia. The question of raising the necessary \$400.00 to pay her other expenses were brought up for discussion. Mrs. Cornell moved that all arrangements relative to Miss Means training be left in the hands of the Executive Board to be acted upon by them in accordance with the Conventions action of last year relative to the use of the Our Own Missionary Fund. This motion was carried.

The pledges for 1917 were collected after which Mrs. J. J. Miles, Vice-President of the Charleston Convocation, invited the Diocesan Auxiliary to attend the Synod of the Fourth Province which will meet in Charleston in November, and assured all of a hearty welcome at that time.

Two invitations for the Convention of 1918 were extended the Auxiliary, one from Union and one from Greenville. The cordiality and hospitality of both branches were deeply appreciated. A ballot was cast with the result that the invitation of Greenville was accepted.

The Chairman of the Tellers Committee reported 56 votes cast and the following officers elected:

United Offering Custodian, Miss Ethel Brunson.

A rising vote of welcome and appreciation was accorded both the newly elected and retiring officers.

Mrs. Long offered a resolution of loving tribute and affectionate loyalty to our devoted and faithful president, which resolution was passed by a rising vote.

It was moved and passed that the minutes of the morning session be left to the Executive Board for confirmation.

The resolutions of the Committee on Courtesy were read and adopted as follows:

#### RESOLUTIONS OF COURTESY

We, your Committee on Resolutions in behalf of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of South Carolina, assembled in the Thirty-second Annual Convention, esteem it a privilege to extend our thanks to the Parish Branch, and to all the people of Georgetown, especially our hostesses for their warm hospitality and the many courtesies extended to us during our stay here;

To the Rector and to the President of the Georgetown Branch for their gracious words of welcome;

To the Rev. and Mrs. Lightbourn and the members of the Woman's Auxiliary for the beautiful reception held at the Rectory, and for the delightful boat ride;

To the Bishop for his helpful presence;

To the Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton for his many useful suggestions and his sermon so full of strong advice;

To Miss Grace Lindley for her Annual letter;

To the press for their generous notices of our proceedings;

To the Pages for their untiring attentions;

To the Choir for its inspiring music;

We give special thanks to Miss Grace Hutchins for her presence and for the information about the Foreign Field.

*My dear Miss Lee:* It has been Miss Emery's custom to send an annual letter to the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and I am glad to follow her example so that I may say a few words to you about our hopes and plans for the years we are to work together.

You will remember that one suggestion which the Conference Committee is sending to the branches for their discussion reads: "The General Secretary should be nominated by the Auxiliary, and appointed by the Board of Missions, her term of office to coincide with that of the President of the Board". I want to say to the Auxiliary myself, what Bishop Lloyd wrote the Presidents, that I am personally very thankful that we are planning this. Only Miss Emery could ever have the position which she has had. It was natural that we should want to keep the up-builder and guide of the Auxiliary for as long as she would let us keep her; but after this, the office must be filled by the nomination of the Auxiliary, and no one can be more glad than I, because I want you to have the Secretary you want. It is also a very practical help to me in that it gives me a definite time for which to plan, and the purpose of this letter, beside taking my greetings to you and the pledge of my service, is to tell you some of the things we are planning for the time between now and October 1919.

Miss Emery is occupied with editorial work and Auxiliary leaflets and with the oversight of the Pilgrimage of Prayer.

Miss M. T. Emery, who has cared so wonderfully for all our box work through these many years continues in charge of the personal boxes, and the Junior boxes are to be in the care of Miss Underhill who has long been associated with us at the Church Missions House.

The Auxiliary is most fortunate in having Mrs. Biller appointed one of our Secretaries, and her knowledge of the West and her love of the Church's Mission, are going to mean a great deal to us all.

We are hoping to have Miss Tillotson back next fall to guide our educational work. By that time, too, we hope to be able to announce definite plans for the Junior Department. This winter we have been fortunate in having had the help of one of the New York Junior officers, Miss Dorothy Giles.

Thanks to Miss Emery's care the Auxiliary exists in every diocese and missionary district, and it seems to me that most of our work for the future lies along two general lines. First, the strengthening of the organization: We shall make a great mistake if we ever forget the lesson Miss Emery has taught us, that is, to avoid too much red tape. But we can remember that and still perfect our organization. This is the end toward which the Conference Committee and the other committees appointed in St. Louis will work. Second, the present Auxiliary should act as an *educational* force to reach the uninterested and to fill up the ranks. We cannot add new diocesan branches, but anyone who studies the Auxiliary knows that it is imperative that parish branches be strengthened, that we "recruit to war strength".

Let us avail ourselves of Summer Conferences, and try to hold several Mission Study Institutes within our Diocese. The aim of these Institutes is to reach and train a few,—rather than many,—preferably one delegate from each Parish. In this way we shall plan systematic education, and good results must follow.

Let us finish our "Pilgrimage of Prayer" and make it the beautiful thing Miss Emery thought for us.

Inclosing I wish I could say the word which is surely in all our hearts. No one knows what is before us but we cannot help realizing that we may be at the beginning of very solemn days. If we are to work through war times we must be faithful. We shall of course, do our duty as patriotic Americans, but we must see to it that no missionary suffers either in boxes or money gifts. Let us emulate the English missionary societies in making our gifts not less but greater in war times. Let us go further and make a special effort at this time to interest those whose hearts are touched by the suffering caused by the war and seek to make them care also for the suffering caused by the lack of the knowledge of Christ. Our hearts may well thrill with the opportunities before us! We may be tested in many ways, but

it is certain that our King is willing to use us for the hastening of His Kingdom, and that we may be fit for His use let us learn to draw nearer to Him. Let us pray for each other, that we may more perfectly know Him and the power of His Resurrection.

**Constitution of the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's  
Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.**

As amended in Convention, May 1916.

---

**ARTICLE I.—NAME.**

The name of this Association shall be The South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.

**ARTICLE II.—OBJECT.**

The object of this Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of South Carolina the three great aims of the Woman's Auxiliary: Prayer for Missions, Study of Missions, and Giving to Missions.

**ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.**

Section 1. The Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese are ex-officio members.

Sec 2. The Association shall be composed of those women, young people and children who, being by Baptism members of the Missionary Society—the Church— are actively engaged in any department of auxiliary work.

Sec. 3. Women, young people, and children, who are not yet baptized, may be admitted to associate membership and shall be known as "Auxiliary Co-workers."

**ARTICLE IV.—OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE BOARD.**

Sec. 1. The officers of the Association shall be the Bishop, a President, three Vice-Presidents (one in each Convocation), Secretary, Box Secretary, Treasurer, Educational Secretary, United Offering Custodian, and Secretary of the Junior Department.

Sec. 2. The Vice-President of the Convocation in which the Annual Convention is to be held shall rank as First Vice-

President. She shall assume the duties of the President in the absence of the same, and shall take office imediately at the close of the previous Convention.

Sec. 3. These Officers shall constitute the Executive Board, and five of them shall constitute a quorum.

#### ARTICLE V.—ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the annual Convention.

Sec. 2. No officer shall serve longer than three years consecutively in one office, except the Educational Secretary.

Sec 3. Candidates shall be nominated by informal ballot, the two receiving the largest number of votes for an office, being considered candidates therefor. A formal ballot shall then be cast.

#### ARTICLE VI.—REPRESENTATIVE BODY.

Sec. 1. Each Parish and Mission Branch, with its Junior Department shall be entitled to four votes, provided it sends four delegates. Two votes to be cast by the Woman's Auxiliary and two by the Junior Department. Where two Sections exist in either Woman's Auxiliary or Junior Department one vote shall be cast by each section.

Sec. 2. Isolated church women not members of Parish or Mission Branches, shall be known as Associate Members, and may be organized under a Secretary appointed by the President. When organized they shall be entitled to three voting delegates, one from each Convocation. The Secretary of the Associates may have an assistant in each Convocation.

#### ARTICLE VII.—FISCAL YEAR.

The fiscal year of the South Carolina Branch shall be from May first to May first.

**ARTICLE VIII.—MEETINGS.**

Section 1. The Diocesan Branch shall hold an Annual Convention the month of May, alternately in each Convocation.

Sec. 2. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held each year on the Wednesday preceding Ash Wednesday, and immediately after the Annual Convention.

Sec. 3. Convocational Meetings shall be held once a year, preferably in the fall.

**ARTICLE IX.—AMENDMENTS.**

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Convention of the Diocesan Branch by vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been previously given to every Branch.

# **BY-LAWS**

As amended in Convention, May 1917.

**ARTICLES I.—DUES.**

All members of the Woman's Auxiliary shall pay an annual fee of 25 cents, and the Juniors an annual fee of 10 cents. This amount shall be paid in November and shall constitute a contingent fund, to be used at the discretion of the Board.

**ARTICLES II.—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.**

Section 1. The President shall preside at all annual and executive meetings, and shall have the general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese. She may call executive meetings at her discretion and shall call the same at the desire of a majority of the Board. She shall have power, after conferring with the Board, to appoint committees and fill vacancies occurring during term of office. She shall receive and distribute to the Vice-Presidents the general literature issued from the Missions House.

Sec. 2. The Vice-Presidents shall arrange for and preside over Convocational Meetings; shall endeavor to establish a branch of the Auxiliary in every parish and mission, and shall have the general supervision of the work throughout their several Convocations; shall send out report blanks and notices of Annual Convention; shall collect and tabulate annually the report of all the branches in their Convocations, and after giving summary of the same at the Annual Convention, shall pass on to the Treasurer and the Secretary for publication in annual report.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all Diocesan and executive meetings; conduct all necessary correspondence, and with the assistance of the Treasurer and Vice-Presidents shall prepare and edit the annual report.

Sec. 4. The Box Secretary shall receive and distribute all information relative to missionary boxes, and shall make a report at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 5. The Treasurer shall receive ALL the money contributions, except the United Offering from the Parish Branches and forward them to their various destinations. She shall keep an accurate account of same and, closing her books on January the fourth, make an annual report of all the receipts and disbursements.

Sec. 6. The Educational Secretary shall guide the educational work of the Diocesan Branch. She shall endeavor, with convocational assistants, to form a Mission study class in every Parish Branch and shall have charge of and distribute the literature issued by the Educational Department of the Board of Missions.

Sec. 7. The United Offering Custodian shall have charge of all offerings for that fund, and shall endeavor, with Convocational Assistants and an assistant in the Junior Department, to promote interest in the same throughout the Diocese. She shall be Chairman of a Committee on the Offering of Life, of which the other members shall be the President, Junior United Offering Custodian, the Educational Secretary and the Secretary of the

Junior Department. It is recommended that the Parish United Offering meetings shall be held in November and May.

Sec. 8. The Secretary of the Junior Department shall guide the work of the Juniors. She shall have two Convocational assistants, an Educational Secretary and a United Offering Assistant. These officers to be nominated by the Junior Delegates and Directresses and their nomination confirmed by the Convention. (It is understood that these officers, with the exception of the Secretary of the Junior Department, are not officers of the Executive Board.)

Sec. 9. The Executive Board shall have power to adopt By-laws and shall exercise all the powers of the Association not otherwise herein expressly provided for.

### ARTICLE III.—COMMITTEES.

Section 1. A Secretary of the "Spirit of Missions" shall be appointed by the President in each Convocation, said Secretary shall endeavor to increase the circulation of the 'Spirit of Missions" and to promote intelligent interest in, and study of said, magazine.

Sec. 2. A Secretary of "The Diocese," the official organ of the Church in South Carolina, shall be appointed by the President in each Convocation. Said Secretary shall endeavor to increase the circulation of "The Diocese" and to promote intelligent interest in the same.

Sec. 3. "An auditing committee shall be appointed by the Board to examine and report on the books of the Treasurer and the United Offering Custodian.
