A Bit of History

National Auxiliary

IN the Episcopal Church in the United States there are seven organizations among women that are national in scope. These are: The Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and the League for Patriotic Service. Of these, the Woman's Auxiliary is the oldest and the largest.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions came into being October 16, 1871. In January, 1872, headquarters were established in a rented room in the Bible House, New York, with Miss M. A. Emery as the first Secretary. The Mission Board assisted the Auxiliary in every way possible in getting its object known and its work established in the Dioceses all over the country. The Secretary obtained the approval of one bishop after another and one priest after another and they established diocesan and parochial branches, until, in 1919, 3,678 parishes were enrolled in the Woman's Auxiliary, and diocesan branches stretched from Hankow to Texas and Porto Rico to New York.

In 1919, at the Great Detroit Triennial Convention, great changes took place in the organization of the Church. Up to this time, the work of the general Church was carried on by three boards—Board of Missions, Board of Religious Education, and Board of Christian Social Service. For nearly fifty years the Woman's Auxiliary had worked as an auxiliary to the Board of Missions. At this time, however, the Presiding Bishop and Council was created, and the work of the Church divided among six departments of which the Department of Missions is one. At this Convention the question arose as to whether the Woman's Auxiliary should become an auxiliary to one department or to the National Council. The Convention decided that it was an organization too large and too important to become an auxiliary to the Department of Missions, so the Woman's Auxiliary was asked

to become an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, which means that we now share in all phases of the Church's work.

History of the Woman's Auxiliary in South Carolina

The South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was organized in Grace Church Charleston, May 19, 1885, with Mrs. Robert Wilson as its first President, who remained its leader for twenty-one years. From a small beginning, the work began to spread, so that when the Convention met on May 26, 1920, to reorganize as an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, there were about seventy-four parochial branches, with a total membership of 1,656 women.

On October 24, 1922, the Woman's Auxiliary was called to meet in convention at the Church of the Holy Communion, Charleston, for another reorganization, due to the division of the Diocese. This division left us with forty-four parish branches. As the name of the Presiding Bishop and Council has been changed to the National Council, our official name from this time became the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of South Carolina.

In 1925 it was decided to divide the Diocese into six districts as follows: Beaufort, Charleston, and Orangeburg in the Charleston Convocation; Florence, Georgetown, and Sumter in the Pee Dee Convocation.

The new year, 1934, begins with — branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, representing 47 parishes and missions.

Convention Proceedings

Opening Service

January 11, 1934, 10 A. M.

(All reports appear in full in Year Book. Outlines of addresses at end of minutes.)

The Forty-ninth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and the fourteenth of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, in the Diocese of South Carolina, opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion at Prince George, Winyah, Georgetown, at 10 o'clock on Thursday morning, January 11. The Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas, Bishop of the Diocese, was Celebrant, and was assisted by the Rev. H. D. Bull, Rector of Prince George, Winyah, Georgetown.

At this time the Bishop made his annual address to the Woman's Auxiliary.

Opening Business Session

January 11, 11:30 A. M.

The opening business session was held in the Church of Prince George, Winyah, at 11:30 A. M., with Miss Caroline P. Cain, Diocesan President, presiding. After the singing of hymn 95, words of welcome were extended the convention by the Rev. H. D. Bull on behalf of Prince George Parish; and by Mrs. H. D. Bull for the hostess branch. Mrs. W. McG. Morrison of Charleston responded for the convention.

The Secretary then read the Rules of Order, after which the Roll was called, and showed the following attendance: Clergy, 9; Executive Board Members, 17; Delegates, 60; Visitors, 55.

The hour of noon having arrived, the Rev. Robert N. MacCallum conducted noon-day prayers and gave a meditation.

The President then appointed the following committees:

Registration or Credential: Mrs. F. W. Ford, Jr., Chairman; Mrs. Henly Chapman, and Mrs. Ben Fraser, all of Prince George, Winyah. Tellers: Miss Annie Keels of Ascension, Hagood, Chmn.; Mrs. F. F. Converse of Holy Comforter, Sumter; Mrs. Chester Perry of St. John's, Johns Island. Publicity: Miss Marie Heyward, St. Philip's, Chas., Chmn.; Miss Jennie Cason, Grace Church, Chas.; Mrs. W. W. Smoak, St. Jude's, Walterboro. Resolutions of Courtesy: Mrs. W. B. Colclough, St. Philip's, Bradford Eprings, Chmn.; Mrs. W. A. Boykin, Ascension, Hagood; Mrs. John Weiters, St. Luke's, Charleston.

The introduction of guests by the President followed. Those present were the Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas, D.D., The Rev. H. D. Bull and the Rev. R. N. MacCallum. The following were introduced as expected: The Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina; Miss Marie Lou Thompson, President of the Y. P. P. S. L., Diocese of S. C.; Miss Maria Prentiss, Summer Volunteer Worker; the Rev. Robert E. Gribbin, Bishop-elect of the Diocese of Western North Carolina; the Rev. Kerr Taylor, Rector of the Second Presbyterian Church, Charleston.

The report of the President followed, Miss Florence Lachicotte, Director of the Georgetown District, presiding.

The report was accepted with a rising vote of thanks.

The Secretary's report was then read and accepted.

The district reports were made as follows: Beaufort, Mrs. James C. Tison; Charleston, Mrs. Claude Whaley, read by Mrs. Grimball; Florence, Mrs. Wm. Egleston; Georgetown, Miss Florence Lachicotte; Orangeburg, Mrs. A. W. Skardon; Sumter, Mrs. Stanyarne Burrows. All reports were encouraging.

Nominating ballots were then distributed. The President made the announcement that by a ruling of the Executive Board, the delegates and visitors would be requested to purchase luncheon tickets at fifty cents each. The hour of one having arrived the convention recessed for lunch until 1:45.

Afternoon Business Session

January 11, 1:45 P. M.

The Convention reconvened for the afternoon business session at 2 P. M., and opened with the singing of the hymn 502. The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The following changes in committees were announced by the President: Tellers, Mrs. E. G. Palmer, Epiphany, Eutawville, in the place of Mrs. W. N. Jacobs; Publicity, Mrs. Chas. Shluer, Holy Communion, Charleston, in the place of Miss Marie Heyward.

Mrs. Louis D. Simonds then made her report on the work of the Department of Missions and Church Extension.

The Rev. Mr. Kerr Taylor of Charleston, made an address, telling of his work as a missionary to China. He showed many interesting pictures and posters which he had used while there for the purpose of teaching the truths of the Bible to the Chinese.

In the absence of the Custodian, the report of the U. T. O. was made by Mrs. Sharkey, a former Custodian, and showed a balance of \$1400.06 on hand and a balance of \$3449.99 in New York.

The chairman being absent, the report on the Offering of Life was made by Mrs. John Blackwell. Miss Caroline Gillespie then told of the work she is planning to do at Roseboro House in the Mountains of North Carolina—farming, canning, teaching, and giving opportunity and leadership for social and religious activities.

Miss Marie Lou Thompson then made an address on the Y. P. S. L. explaining its functions.

After the reading of the report on the Department of Publicity by Mrs. Poynor, the Rev. Mr. Bull spoke on the "Place and Value of Church Papers." He stressed the need for a definite plan for increasing the subscriptions for The Diocese. The Bishop asked that a resolution be adopted urging immediate and definite action on the part of the parish branches. The Publicity Chairman was in-

structed to draw up a resolution to be presented later.

The report of the Department of Religious Education was then made by Mrs. Prouty and the report of the Supply Department was made by Mrs. Bruner.

The President then made announcements as to the Conference, Evening Service, the Quiet Hour, and the Ballot Box, and adjourned the meeting until the evening session.

Evening Session

Prince George Winyah, January 11, 8:00 P. M.

The evening service was held at Prince George, Winyah, at 8 o'clock. Evening Service was read by Bishop Thomas who introduced the Rev. Robert E. Gribbin, Bishop-elect of Western North Carolina, who made an address.

Business Session

Friday, January 12

A quiet Hour was held on Thursday morning at 9:15 A. M., and was conducted by the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Pennick, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina. This was closed with Hymn 439.

At 10:45 the business session was called to order by the President.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved.

A bouquet of flowers was then presented by the Orangeburg District to the President who expressed appreciation and thanks.

The report of the Orphanage Supply Secretary, Miss Duvall, was then made, with the suggestion that parishes put an appropriation for the Orphanage work in their parish budgets.

The report of the Department of Christian Social Service was made by Mrs. Grimball.

The Registration Committee then made its report as follows:

Delegates 60; visitors 67; clergy 5; and Executive Board members 16.

Miss Maria Prentiss of McClellanville then told about the work done during the summer as a Volunteer Worker in the mountain region of Virginia. She said she spent the month of July at Richland, Va., where the chief industries were brick making and coal mining. Her work was of a social and religious nature at Richland, but she told of going to a small place near there where they held a Bible school among the children, most of whom could not read although they were old enough. They taught the Lord's Prayer, Commandments, Bible verses and stories. She and Miss Gardner visited the homes and found living conditions deplorable. Miss Prentiss said that the work was very interesting and she expressed her thanks for being sent by the Woman's Auxiliary.

A report on Advance Work was made by Miss Hazard who showed some pictures of the Church which is our project, and read a letter from Bishop Mitchell, telling of his work in Arizona, and of the work of the Rev. and Mrs. Simpson, for whom the Rectory was built. Mrs. Simonds then spoke of the pleasant contact made with Mr. and Mrs. Simpson at Denver.

At this time Mrs. Bull announced that Mrs. Rast had just been called home on account of the death of her mother, Mrs. Whaley. A motion to send an expression of sympathy and flowers to Mrs. Rast was carried, and the President asked Mrs. Grimball to see that this was done. Mrs. Grimball requested that contributions be handed her at the door after adjournment.

Mrs. I. G. Ball then made the report of the Church Periodical Club of which she is the Secretary in the diocese, being appointed by the Bishop. She stated that books will be needed for the Three Cs Camps and that Miss Gillespie will need books at her mountain mission next year.

Before the report of the Tellers was given, a motion was made and carried that all those who received a majority on the nomination ballot would be declared elected.

The following were declared elected, having a majority on the nomination ballot: Secretary, Miss Marie Hey-

ward; Treasurer, Miss Charlotte Stoney; Educational Secretary, Mrs. Leonard Prouty; U. T. O. Custodian, Mrs. L. L. Overton; Supply Secretary, Mrs. G. E. Bruner; Members-at-Large, Pee Dee Convocation, Miss Paula Hazard and Miss Elise Duvall; Charleston Convocation, Miss Caroline Cain and Mrs. Lawrence Barrett.

A motion was carried to vote for the president first and later vote for the other two members-at-large. The ballots for president were then cast, the vote being taken between Mrs. E. E. Rembert and Mrs. A. W. Skardon.

The Finance report was then made by Miss Stoney, who reported that she had been able to balance her books, and had a balance on hand of \$2.81.

The Tellers then reported that Mrs. Edward E. Rembert had received a majority of votes, and was declared elected President.

The ballot was then cast for the election of one member-at-large from each convocation.

Mrs. Weiters then read a letter from Mrs. Pierce concerning the plans for the U. T. O. Presentation Service and Mass Meeting to be held at Atlantic City. She also read the following resolution which had been adopted by the National Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary in December, 1933:

Whereas, The April number of The Spirit of Missions will be a special United Thank Offering number, offering opportunity to promote the United Thank Offering through a generous profit on yearly subscriptions, on renewals and on sales of single copies, and

Whereas, The United Thank Offering number will be of utmost value in stimulating the interest and securing the cooperation of the Church on behalf of the United Thank offering in this final year of the triennium, therefore

Be it Resolved: That the Executive Board urge all diocesan and parish officers to present this plan to communicants generally, that parish committees be named to promote the distribution of the United Thank Offering number; that all other proper means be utilized promptly to assure the widest possible circulation of the number, and that steps be taken to increase the number of parish representatives of The Spirit of Missions.

(From Woman's Auxiliary Executive Board Minutes, Dec. 1933.)

This resolution was presented to the Diocesan Executive Board at its meeting held previous to the convention and the following action was taken:

"The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, in the Diocese of South Carolina, wishes to go on record as not endorsing the plan of raising money for the U. T. O. by selling the April number and securing subscriptions to The Spirit of Missions for a commission, feeling that the plan of raising money is not in accord with the ideal of a voluntary Thank Offering of the Women of the Church."

The Convention then adopted the following resolution:

Be it Resolved: 1. That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of South Carolina in convention assembled do endorse the action taken by the Executive Board in regard to the sale of the April number of the Spirit of Missions.

2. That we heartily approve and will in every way endeavor to sell this U. T. O. number in order to give publicity to the U. T. O., provide no profits from the sale be accepted and applied to this offering from this diocese.

3. That a copy of this resolution and the action of the Executive Board be sent to the National Chairman of the Special Committee on the U. T. O.

The Tellers made a report that the following Executive Board members at-large had been elected: Pee Dee Convocation: Mrs. Stanyarne Burrows; Charleston Convocation: Mrs. A. W. Skardon.

Ballots were then distributed for the nomination of delegates to the Triennial Convention to be held at Atlantic City in the Fall. A motion was carried that those receiving the five highest number of votes be declared elected delegates, and the five next in order be elected alternates.

The Budget for 1934 was then read and explained by Miss Stoney, and adopted as read, by the Convention, the total amount being \$2,530.00).

The Tellers then reported the following delegates elected: Miss Cain, Mrs. Rembert, Mrs. Skardon, Mrs. Simonds, and Miss Stoney; Alternates as follows: Mrs.

Frank McLeod, Mrs. Grimbail, Mrs. Poynor, Mrs. L. L. Overton, and Mrs. Prouty.

Those receiving the next number of votes were Mrs. Barrett and Mrs. Burrows.

Mrs. Frank McLeod made a most comprehensive report of the Provincial meeting which was held at Montgomery, Ala., in November.

The report of the Field Department was made by Mrs. Barrett and she stressed bringing in all the uninterested women.

The following amendments to the By-Laws, as recommended by the Executive Board, were adopted:

By-Laws, Article 1, Section 8. By striking out the words "the" and "of any member elected by the Diocesan Convention."

By-Laws, Article 1. By adding: "Section 10. A Corresponding Secretary shall be appointed by the President."

By-Laws, Article 2, Section 3. By striking out the words "conduct all necessary correspondence."

By-Laws, Article 2. By adding "Section 10. The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on all necessary correspondence."

The following recommendation from the Executive Board was endorsed by the body:

The Executive Board recommends that the Convention go on record as requesting the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary to send the \$200.00, which is entered on the Budget for The Program of the Church, to the Diocesan Treasurer with the stipulation that it be designated **over and above** the amount which is sent by the Diocesan Treasurer from this diocese to the National Treasurer for the Program of the Church.

The following resolution from the Publicity Department was adopted with addition:

Whereas, Our Church paper, The Diocese, is the official organ for publicity in our diocese, and

Whereas, this organ is failing to fulfill its purpose in the large way that it should, because of the very small number of subscribers, and

Whereas, the women of the Auxiliary are vitally concerned in the success of every effort to better inform the communicants of our Church of every phase of its activity, and

Whereas, the additional funds secured by additional subscriptions will enable our editor to publish a fuller and more interesting paper,

Therefore, be it Resolved: That the recommendation of Mr. Bull be adopted—namely that each parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary make a definite campaign to increase the subscriptions to "The Diocese" by securing at least one new subscriber for every ten families in the parish. 2. That this plan be included as a definite part of the Department of Publicity for this year.

An invitation was extended by the three branches of the Woman's Auxiliary of Grace Church, Charleston, for the next Diocesan Convention, which will be held in January, 1935, and was accepted with appreciation.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the retiring officers, who have served so faithfully for three years.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions of Courtesy was read by Mrs. J. C. Weiters and was adopted with a rising vote of thanks.

A motion was carried to give the two Convention offerings to the Bishop for his work.

Mrs. Grimball made a motion that the body give a rising vote of thanks and appreciation to our retiring president, Miss Cain, for her splendid spiritual leadership during the past three years.

At this time the President introduced the new President, Mrs. Rembert, who asked the cooperation of women of the Auxiliary in the task before her. A meeting of the new Executive Board was announced to be held immediately after lunch in the parish house.

The meeting was pronounced adjourned by the President who asked that all remain seated for the Consecration of Officers. An impressive service of Consecration was conducted by Bishop Thomas, who made a short talk to the officers. His words were most encouraging. He said that strength for the task will come from God.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

Convention Addresses

Bishop's Annual Address

The Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas, D.D.

Bishop Thomas in his annual address to the Woman's Auxiliary said that it is excellent that we have completed the year's work with success—that we have accomplished what we set out to do. But, of course, we realize that more might have been done. As Christians, we shall never reach our ideal. The Woman's Auxiliary has shown that where there is a will there is a way. They have set an example; through sacrificial effort they have reached the mark. The Church could do more through the same spirit of sacrificial service. Bishop Thomas said that he prayed God that this will be an incentive in the year that lies before us. He expressed thanks to the Woman's Auxiliary for the assistance given to him during the past year.

Bishop Thomas said that as his message he wished to discuss the motive of missions for two reasons: first, it is a living subject in the Church, and second, the Auxiliary is primarily a missionary organization.

Bishop Thomas continued: This is a day of crises—political, social, economic, moral, and religious—on all sides. Crises comes from the root word which means a day of judgment, also the derivation means, a separation. This is a day of separating good from evil, right from wrong, the sheep from the goats; and distinctions shall be made clear. This is a day of choice—"Choose ye the one ye shall serve." It is an important time. We must decide whether we shall align ourselves with the sheep or with the goats.

The first crisis with which we are concerned is the failure in missions. Because of the failure in the support of missions there is a fear of failure in loyalty and interest. We fear that their cause is not where it belongs; we are bound to admit that the people as a whole are not interested in the missionary quota. We would not have to struggle so hard to meet the necessities of our missionary work in the diocese and our share in it abroad if the large percentage of our people were interested and cared about it.

We will consider the motive of missions. There are not wanting signs that the prevailing tendency to humanism in religion has touched the missionary cause. It may be a very noble thing to foster the cause of missionary endeavor simply from the standpoint of love of humanity, as it is. It is a very worthy thing to extend the benefits of education, of medicine, of all kinds of culture to the

less fortunate races of the earth, that they may share these things with us. The simple desire to extend the benefits of civilization to all men is a desire not to be despised, but as a motive of missions it is sufficient. There is some reason to think that the threatening failure to support the great movement of missions is due to the inroads of a humanistic faith in a greater measure than it is due to the financial depression.

It is a very important question: What is the right motive for missions? At the root of a real support of missions is necessarily the right motive, without which interest and loyalty soon wane. The true motive centers in Christ, and if not, it is insufficient. This motive alone makes it our impelling duty. The duty of the Catholic religion is to give the Gospel to the world and what a Gospel she has to give—a God who has revealed himself as Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. By this Gospel only will the world be converted.

Christ is the motive of missions: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel."

The motive will take form in different minds in different ways. To some minds it will take the form of simple obedience to His command, unquestioning obedience for those whose religion is personal allegiance. Beginning at home but with no limitations they support the Church enterprises by prayer and giving. Others will rather find the impulse of duty and the enthusiasm of service in the revealing of God's love. They see not only the power which can redeem from sin and make possible the inheritance of an abundant life, but they see the message of love and nothing is left but to carry the Gospel to every man.

Bishop Thomas asked: Can one be a Christian and not believe that the missions is to spread the Gospel at home and abroad? The true faith in Christ will recognize God's love and will stand by Christ and will do all in his power to lead all men to Him. The Christian Church that neglects the missionary character has denied its birthright and can not expect the life abundant. The parish or diocese that is auto-centric exists in violation of its constitution and is almost dead. We can not violate the laws of Christian faith.

Bishop Thomas declared, however, that wonderful strides have been made in the past generation in the missionary endeavor. He cited figures tending to show a great increase in the number of people turning to Christ during the past thirty years—twenty million men and women of non-Christian areas of India, Asia, and Africa looking Christward. Is not this enough to give the endorsement of success and to inspire enthusiasm and confidence? We

must not listen to the uninformed but hold fast to a cause sanctioned by God in Christ, and labor on with faith in Christ for its accomplishment.

The world's need today—at home and abroad is Christ. In the name of Jesus, the world is reborn.

NOON-DAY MEDITATION—REV. ROBERT N. MacCALLUM

In a meditation Mr. MacCallum spoke of these as being days of tremendous spiritual significance. There are three great movements going on—the First Century Christian Fellowship in America and England, the Kingdom of God movement in Japan, and the Theology of Carl Barth in Geneva. All of these are one—or parts of one great movement by which God is seeking to call mankind to himself.

We are all sharing in a common experience that has a splendid significance. The use we make of this movement is going to produce in us the result of our own faith. Another power we have on hand all the time—we do not work alone, God is at work. We are feeling this experience. God is using the adversities of people as He has always done. A humanizing spirit is coming out of it all. This is happening to us—it will grow through you and me in our work—we with God. We are working upon real problems and difficulties. Something great is happening, something of spiritual significance. Our mission is to make real in a living way the fact of a triumphant and eternal life which will bring courage, fortitude, and endurance into the lives of the people around us. The reality of a spiritual life as Christ represented it on the Cross is a continuing reality throughout all eternity.

The glorious fact of the risen Christ and an exalted humanity in our lives, is that which inspires comfort and fortitude to all those looking to the Christian Church in the year 1934.

THE MISSION FIELD IN CHINA—REV. H. KERR TAYLOR

Mr. Taylor in speaking of missionary work, stated that there has been a vast amount of writing on the subject in all manner of magazines and papers, but all of this has not cast much light on the subject. Long-distance advertising is difficult, and the longer a man stays in the field the less cocksure he is of the problems. Follow the lead of the headquarters Board and the missionaries, is the best one can do.

Foreign missions doesn't need an argument, it convinces you if you can see. To know is to believe in it.

Mr. Taylor showed many pictures which he had used while in

China to teach the truths of the Bible. These pictures cause the idea to go on through their minds and work itself down into their thinking and living. By having the picture with the message on it in their homes, the truth seeps into the living and the thinking of the people.

Mr. Taylor also showed a newspaper, "The Chinese Christian Intelligence"—a living vital tract that goes into five thousand homes. It is a practical home newspaper and is sold for fifty cents a year, which, of course, does not pay for it, and that is one reason we must send money—to make it possible to give the people such a newspaper. We could not do better with our money.

In the foreign field we have to start back of the Bible—with God. We must advertise the Scriptures to them. Mr. Taylor showed posters, used for this purpose. The Bible gives them a message of hope that neither Confucius nor Buddah ever did give; it says, "Overcome sin," "it can be done." The task of the missionary is to get Hebrew concepts into an Oriental heart via an Occidental mind. The old testament is used mostly; it just spreads the Gospel. It is Oriental. The missionary makes use of everything that is good in their faiths.

You who give to missions have made it possible for many of those living in ignorance and darkness to find the light—those sent are your messengers. The Church in China is growing as it has never grown before. Give it your prayers, your endeavor, your support, your life, maybe. Make His life known where it has never been known before.

THE YOUNG PEOPLES SERVICE LEAGUE

Miss Marie Lou Thompson

Miss Thompson, in speaking of the Y. P. S. L., said that the work comes under four heads: Worship, service, study, and fellowship. Worship includes public worship and private prayer. The Y. P. S. L. of the Province of Sewanee has adopted a thank offering. Another important part in its life is the Corporate Communion. Some places they have four a year and some, one a month.

Service means a personal service to follow Christ. They try to work in each of the five fields. They strive to see that every member is a member of some Church.

Under study there is a definite course of the study of God's revelation through the Bible and the manifestation of Jesus Christ. If we are to follow Him we must know Him. We must see Him in our fellow man.

The Bishop's test is a course on the Church's teaching—the building, the Prayer Book, its history, and the Bible.

Fellowship means fellowship with God and by means of God with our fellow man; also a deeper feeling of fellowship with God and man.

We believe that the Y. P. S. L. has filled a great need in the Church; it has awakened in the young people the great call, and fits them for further work when they get older. They are eager to know the Christ and to make Him known.

THE PLACE AND VALUE OF CHURCH PAPERS

Rev. H. D. Bull

Mr. Bull in speaking on Church periodicals, said that one difficulty is the tendency of earnest, devout Church people to confine their devotion to their own four walls. It means a lack of cohesion between the diocese and the country with the people.

There is a failure to think of the church as a body of Christ—a living body of which we are members. All one body in Christ gives unity to our Christian idea of our one-ness with Christ. There must be a concept of the Church in which the well being of the whole is, the concern of every member of it.

The reason we confine our thoughts to our own parish and think of it as our concern is that the problems of the local organization demand attention. The defunct or extinct parishes have no problems. Local problems take up the whole thought of the people and cause a deadly parochialism.

These people confine their whole observation to the Church as they see it, the consequence is a failure to support the whole Church.

One remedy is that the people shall be informed, through religious education or publicity—a publicity which reaches Church people and informs them of the purpose of the Church. It should teach them that they have a concern outside of the well-being of their own parish. They are ignorant of the work of the diocese, of the nation, and of the world. The Church press is the only agency that tells about the work of the Church. There are three weeklies—The Living Church, The Churchman, and The Witness; then monthly, The Spirit of Missions. Then our own monthly paper, The Diocese. It is getting increasingly difficult to run it. The only sources of income are from subscriptions, advertisements, and donations or payments—the Woman's Auxiliary pays for the publishing of its educational programs. Subscriptions and advertisements have shrunk.

The remedy is to increase the number of subscriptions. The paper belongs to the Church people of the diocese; it is your paper.

The situation is: there are 2758 families besides 1070 individuals in the Church in this diocese. The Church paper should go into all the homes, but it does not, it goes into only 630 homes—one in every six. We should have at least one thousand subscribers.

Mr. Bull recommended an organized effort to obtain one new subscriber for each ten homes. More than one thousand subscriptions would reach more people and raise more money.

If the Auxiliary through its branches would undertake to do this, the paper would better fulfill its object—to go into the homes of the people. Its object is **not** to make money.

Now The Diocese is not going into a sufficient number of homes to fulfill the purpose of giving out information.

A CENTURY OF PROGRESS IN THE CHURCH

Rev. Robert E. Gribbin

Mr. Gribbin said that we have heard during the past year much about the "Century of Progress" but few realize what is really back of that progress that was shown at the World's Fair. Those things are the product of the Christian Religion—of God. Other religions never produced new discoveries in science, and so did not have the problems of science. It is only Christianity that has brought out the realization to men of what God has about them and the use of these things.

A survey of the Church's work shows that we have much to be thankful for in progress in the past one hundred years. The examples of the past will inspire us to do as we have never done before.

Mr. Gribbin cited that last year was the centennial of the Oxford Movement; that in 1826 our country sent the first medical missionary to Liberia; in 1832 the first two missionaries were sent to China, now there are seven native Bishops; and the strides made in Japan. From 1587 to 1873 there was an edict against Christianity in Japan, and last year Bishop Perry was peculiarly welcomed as the grand-nephew or Commodore Perry, the man who opened up Japan to the world.

We have a great deal to be thankful for. In the mountain province of Luzon, P. I., is shown the remarkable effect of Christianity on the barbarians.

Mr. Gribbin spoke of Dr. Burke and his wonderful work in Alaska where he went in 1895. When someone told him that he should take more time for doctoring and less for prayer and re-

ligion. Dr. Burke replied: "Were it not for prayer I would not be here."

Then right in our own country much has been done, one hundred years ago there were only twenty-nine Bishops. In 1821 a missionary society was organized. But the Church changed from the idea that it had a missionary society to the fact that it is a missionary society.

In 1835 our Church engaged upon a new project, two missionary Bishops were elected for the West and Middle-west—only one went, however.

It is just one hundred years since James Oldham, the man who conceived the idea of Sewanee, was consecrated; and one can not begin to estimate the value of Sewanee. In South Carolina one hundred years ago there were twenty-five parishes and five missions and only three churches in Charleston. In 1834 Trinity, Columbia was a mission. We have much to be thankful for in South Carolina.

In 1871 the Woman's Auxiliary was organized and think of what the women have done in these years through study, gifts, and prayers.

We have so much to be grateful for in this century of progress.

Now the seriousness of the situation—we haven't begun to sacrifice, to get the spirit of really giving, until we realize that everything we have comes from God. We carry nothing with us. We must not go out failing to share the knowledge of Christ. At times when we are discouraged we can look back and join with the angels and archangels and praise Him with whom we move and have our being. We must continue to go forward. "Onward, the line advances."

QUIET HOUR

The Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, D.D.

Bishop Penick in conducting the Quiet Hour discussed St. John's great definition of God: "God is love." He said: It is very difficult to think about. Its difficulty is in proportion to its importance. We must think about the characters of God. It is imperative if we are to know God and to do His will. It is the well-spring of the Church. People become disappointed and think the world spirit has pre-dominated. That is not so. God is greater than he that is in the world. Be still and know that He is God. Much of the futility is due to the foundation of spirituality on which it rests.

"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." The Gospel seems almost too good to be true. The character of

God is made manifest not in a visionary or shadowy way—that men might know God. It does not admit argument. Genuinely religious people seldom argue—only testify.

Before we can erect any structure of faith, we must lay down on our minds any timber that we can use as foundation for an edifice of faith. First, God is love is a good secure foundation—a rock. The rock is the character of God, and it is—God is love.

What do we mean by love? The heart of love is givingness. There are two things, the givingness of God and the givingness of Christ. A friendship is not possible where a veil is dropped over the innermost thoughts and feelings. God does not withhold himself in that way. God does not hold himself aloof from His children. He is not that kind of a parent.

The love of God is not only giving but is searching—until He finds. Further more, God's love is sacrificial. Let's welcome sacrificial service. God's love is seeking. Jesus is seeking to save. Jesus' love is sacrificial—"Jesus being in agony, prayed."

God said: "Let there be light and there was light." This was easy for God to do but it was not easy to create character. If God had created character we would be puppets and not sons. If we are to fulfill our sonship there is something bound to intervene—"being in agony." We shall never have certainty; if we had it the faith would fly out. Faith is better than certainty—faith is growing, certainty stops. Faith is giving, seeking, sacrificing.

Bishop Penick said we must let these elements of God enter more into our Auxiliary life. There must not be a selfish retirement into one's indulgence in God. We must keep the balance, love God on one side and thy neighbor on the other—both, "on these two—" It is a balanced or well-proportioned religious life that we must have.

The first approach toward the beauty of holiness is to remember that the most precious thing which life possess is companionship with God.

Amid all the strain of this modern age, we shall be wise enough to find that the God of love will grant us, His power to perform, in peace.

Reports

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Reverend Father in God, members of the clergy, visitors, and women of the Auxiliary: Again it is my pleasure and privilege to greet you, to welcome you to our annual convention. We have met to review our work of the past year and to plan for the future: May the Holy Spirit direct and rule our hearts and minds and wills as we go about our tasks.

After the usual routine of the setting up of the organization for the year, my first work was with the long-planned Provincial Field Project. The first part of the project, Mrs. Taber's conferences, was carried out successfully. Conferences were held in and around four centers in the diocese, with very good attendance and results. The second part, the large central Institute in Charlotte, had to be given up on account of financial conditions. This was a great disappointment as the delegates, who had been very carefully selected, were eager to go and all other arrangements had been made.

In January I met with the women of old St. Stephen's Parish and spoke to them on the purpose and plans of the Woman's Auxiliary. They then formed a parish branch which has since been very active and of great help to the Rev. Mr. Guerry in his work in this part of Berkeley County.

In the spring, our efforts were again directed toward the Whitsunday offering for the deficit. In preparation for this we observed throughout the Diocese a Day of Intercession for the mission of the Church.

Early in the summer I accepted with much regret the resignation on account of illness of Mrs. Arthur Haynsworth, our U. T. O. Custodian. I then appointed Mrs. Louis Overton of the Parish of Prince George, Winyah, to fill out the unexpired term. I am glad to be able to report that Mrs. Haynsworth is, showing satisfactory improvement.

In July I attended the the Adult Conference in Kanuga, and at the request of the Bishop, took the special course sponsored by the Field Department, looking to the reconstituting of the parishes. It was my pleasant duty to prepare the program for Auxiliary Day and to preside at the meeting, which was an unusually large and enthusiastic one. I also attended a meeting of the Provincial Board of the Woman's Auxiliary at which time plans were made for the provincial meeting in Montgomery.

In the fall, as in the spring, I attended all the district meetings and had a place on the programs. These meetings give a very valuable opportunity to the diocesan officers to come in contact with the women of the parish branches and to explain and commend the various phases of their work. This has greatly helped in breaking down parochialism and in developing a diocesan consciousness among our women.

In addition to these meetings I have attended parish branch meetings in Hagood and in Orangeburg and conducted informal conferences on the work of the departments.

The Executive Board met again in Pinopolis, Nov. 3 and 4. The usual careful consideration was given to conditions in the six districts and to the work, past and future, of the departments. Plans were then made for this convention.

Of outstanding importance this year has been the Quiet Day for Prayer observed on Armistice Day. Beginning early in the summer very careful preparations were made which resulted in a general and faithful observance of the day.

To my great regret I was prevented by sickness from attending the Provincial Meeting in Montgomery. We were, however, well represented and later in our session we will hear the report of the delegates.

This closes my report for 1933, and with it the record of my three years as Diocesan President. I shall ask your attention to a brief summary of the outstanding accomplishments of these years. Your officers have tried faithfully to carry out the Triennial Program as outlined for the Province of Sewanee. In accordance with the resolution on prayer, Advent classes planned for the deepening of the devotional life have been held with gratifying attendance and interest. In the past year in addition to the World Day of Prayer we have observed the Quiet Day and the Day of Intercession. A Quiet Hour has been made a part of our annual conventions.

The five subjects considered at the Triennial meeting in Denver—Family Life, Property and Economics, Inter-Racial Contacts, International Relations, and Religious Thinking Today—have been the basis of our study and have been considered in monthly programs, in study classes, and at annual and district meetings. We hope too that through the educational page in *The Diocese* we have reached and interested a wider circle of readers. This study has shown the need of accessible books and so we have the beginnings of district libraries to fill this need.

These studies have resulted in an aroused and intelligent inter-

est and sympathy so that the Christian Social Service committees have extended their activities and have co-operated with local agencies for social betterment. There has been a more sensitive approach to some of the rural and inter-racial problems at our doors, and an honest effort toward their solution.

Our cooperation with the Field Department has been outstanding. Each spring there has been a call to an important piece of work—Advancework, and, for two years, the National Deficit—and the Auxiliary has responded with an intelligent enthusiasm which has made itself felt throughout the Diocese with worthwhile results. It is now customary at the fall district meetings to give the Field Department always an opportunity for presenting the Program of the Church, and the plans of the department in regard to the Every-Member Canvass.

The efforts toward enlisting the younger women of the Church have borne fruit, the ten new chapters formed during this period being almost all from this group. In Florence we have the outstanding example of a unified organization embracing all the women of the parish. The other departments have functioned satisfactorily. In spite of existing conditions our budget has remained substantially the same and our financial obligations have been met, though with difficulty.

This summary shows steady development and progress along all lines. It is small use, however, to review past work unless to gain a starting point for fresher endeavor. And so from my experience of the past three years I wish to make the following recommendations for your consideration:

1. That we keep before us the ideal that the Womans Auxiliary should embrace the whole womanhood of the church;
2. That our responsibility to the Program of the Church should be ever before us requiring our prayer, our study, our service, our gifts;
3. That the Advent classes be continued on lines of devotional study and reading;
4. That Days of intercession and Quiet Days be held, and the use of Armistice Day for this purpose be continued;
5. That renewed effort be made to reach all women through the U. T. O. so that the offering next fall at the Triennial will be more truly the gift of the women of the Diocese;
6. That an effort be made to have The Diocese and the Spirit of Missions in every Church Family;

7. That remittances to the treasurer be regular and systematic in order that obligations may be met at the proper time.

My report would be quite incomplete without an acknowledgment of the debt I owe to the officers and other women of the Auxiliary for their sympathetic understanding and their unfailing and generous cooperation. I feel a very real gratitude for the privilege that, through you, has been mine. The opportunity of knowing the church people of our Diocese and of working with them has brought me a happiness and satisfaction which will remain with me in the years to come.

We are about to begin a new year. Many problems press upon us, many difficulties surround our path, many questions puzzle and distress us. How shall we stand fast and bear our witness in these times? Only by keeping clearly before us, our true profession "which is to follow the example of our Saviour Christ and to be made like unto Him." Our Bishops in their recent Pastoral summon us anew to show our allegiance. Let us hear and heed their words.

"Christ's way is the only way for a Christian, and the only way for a world in need. Stand alone if we must. Be counted a fool if it is necessary. Let us dare to do the thing now that counts. Let us practice what our religion stands for The foundations of the Church remain secure. We cannot be dismayed. God reigns. We dare not be discouraged, Christ lives. We may not relax our Christian loyalty, the Holy Spirit moves again over a chaotic world. Let us prove our faith in practice, and nothing can withstand the spiritual momentum that must follow."

REPORT OF CHARLESTON DISTRICT

During the year 1933 Charleston District has tried to stress religious education and to deepen the spiritual life of our women.

The World Day of Prayer and the Quiet Day have been observed by practically all of the chapters and only five have failed to have Advent or Lenten Study classes.

At our Spring Conference at St. Paul, Meggett, the morning session was devoted to meditations upon spiritual thoughts. Mrs. Conrad Goodwin spoke on "Consecration," the Rev. MacCallum on "God's Resources," and Dr. Starr, "The Union of God's Port and Ours." Dr. Starr made the basis of his address a quotation from St. Paul: "I can do all things through Thee." A Conference on the Field Department was conducted by Mrs. Lawrence Barrett and a general survey of the Field Department of the National Protestant Episcopal Church was given by the Rev. Robert Trapnell. We were fortunate in having with us the Bishop and Miss Cain and as our guest, the Rev. Roderick Jackson who spoke of the offering on Whitsunday for the deficit of the National Church. About 150 attended the Conference.

The attendance at the Fall meeting was smaller than it has been in years, but the addresses by Miss Cain on the "Woman's Auxiliary in the Parish," the "Program of the Church" and the meditation by the Rev. Conrad Goodwin were inspiring. It was our privilege to have Dr. Kerr Taylor of the Presbyterian Church, who has been a missionary in China for years, speak on the problems of missionaries in China.

Another one of our objectives has been to try to interest our young women who are leaving the Service League, in Auxiliary work. Our Recruiting Chairman, Mrs. Conrad Goodwin, has been busy and three new chapters have been organized. Chapter "C," Holy Communion reports 10 members. They have had a 100 per cent. attendance at their study class and they give a good report in other work. Chapter "C" of Grace Church and St. Peters "B," Charleston, are still in their infancy but we trust they will grow during the coming year.

The District has twenty-seven old branches, and three new ones. The total enrollment is 584, but two of the new branches have not reported their membership.

In some ways the financial report shows a falling off, but the U. T. O. shows that there are still many thankful hearts and the growth in education and spiritual development show that our women are giving more of their time and thought to the things of the spirit.

The work of the Charleston District has been carried on for the past three years by our District Board, consisting of fifteen members who have met four times a year. Their cooperation, planning and discussion of the problems has been of invaluable aid to me as the Director. These ladies have shared the burden and added to the pleasure of my work.

In behalf of the District, I welcome Mrs. William Grimball of Charleston as our new Director, confident that through her leadership the Charleston District will go forward.

REPORT OF ORANGEBURG DISTRICT

In reviewing the work of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Orangeburg District, we can see progress in the departmental work as well as in the activities of the different branches. After eight years we are happy to welcome a new branch at St. Stephens. Our President, Miss Cain, evidently heard of some very active church workers in that vicinity and immediately seized the opportunity to organize an Auxiliary of ten members. Miss Elise Nixon was made president and a most capable one, she has proven to be. She attended summer school at Kanuga, and instead of staying two weeks, she became so impressed with the church work that she remained six weeks. In the early Fall, this Auxiliary was entertained by the Eutawville Branch who was also at this time, celebrating the birthday of its Auxiliary. I was glad to have been a guest at such an interesting gathering.

The United Thank Offering for the year amounted to \$293.54. The offering at both District meetings was \$17.40.

Four Branches have paid the amount accepted on their quota and two branches, Pinopolis and Summerville B, overpaid their quotas.

While talking on money matters, this District, for the last three years, has never called on the Diocesan Treasurer for any financial assistance for its District meetings.

The Spring District meeting was held at Trinity Church, Pinopolis, with the usual splendid attendance. We were especially hon-

ored by having with us our National Field Secretary, the Rev. Richard W. Trapnell, D.D., whose message was very interesting and enlightening, being an outline of the financial situation of the National Church.

Our other speakers were our dear Bishop, whom we always welcome to our meetings, and the Rev. Roderick Jackson, both emphasizing the Whitsunday offering.

It was, at this meeting that our District Library was circulated. In the absence of our Educational Secretary, our Diocesan President, Miss Cain, very interestingly explained the books, fifteen in number, which had been bought with small donations given for this cause.

The library is small but well balanced, there are books on the Bible, the Life of Christ, History and teaching of the Church and Prayerbook, Social teaching, Modern Christian Education, and Missions. An average of 79 women have read the books.

In the afternoon, Mrs. Louis Jervey, one of our younger members, who never misses a summer at Kanuga, gave us a most enjoyable talk on the activities at Kanuga.

The remainder of the afternoon was given over to conferences by our District chairmen.

The Fall meeting was held at the Epiphany Church, Eutawville. The main topic of the day being the Every Member Canvass which was forcibly presented by the Rev. W. S. Poynor, of Florence. At this meeting, was also stressed the Quiet Day of Prayer by Miss Marie Heyward, and the "Woman's Auxiliary in the Parish" by our President, Miss Cain. The District Chairman made splendid reports on their respective departments—to them I give unstinted praise for the way they have carried on their work during the three years of my Directorship.

At the close of the meeting, the women took recognition of the long and faithful service of the Rev. J. E. H. Galbraith, who has now retired.

Mrs. Pollock of Orangeburg was elected District Director.

In November before our Fall meeting, I held a District Board meeting of my chairman and the Presidents of each Auxiliary in the District, at my home in Walterboro.

It is with real regret that my tenure of office has expired. The work has been a great happiness to me, because of the fine spirit of cooperation that I received from the women. To my District Secretary, Miss May Neyle of Walterboro, I express my gratitude for her untiring services rendered so graciously.

REPORT OF FLORENCE DISTRICT

I attended the Executive Board meeting and Auxiliary at the Church of the Holy Communion, Charleston, in January, 1933. In February, Mrs. Derrill Tabor, Field Secretary of the National Board held a three days conference for the women of the Florence District at St. John's Church in Florence. This started with a supper tendered by the Business Women's Group and was well attended by the other Business Women's Chapters from Hartsville and Cheraw. Mrs. Tabor said it was the largest and most interested group of Business women she had ever addressed. The next two days were given up to morning and afternoon meetings held in the church and attended by chapter members, from all chapters in the district. Mrs. Tabor discussed Parish problems with especial emphasis on the need for unification of women's work under the Woman's Auxiliary. St. John's Parish shortly after re-organized their various activities under one branch of the W. A. with seven sections under the following names: 1. Bishop Guerry chapter; 2. Bishop Capers chapter; 3. Bishop Thomas chapter; 4. Wilmer Poyner chapter; 5. Alice Gregg chapter; 6. Business Woman's chapter; 7. St. Agnes chapter. Mrs. Tabor urged the use of the two recommended study books for mission study during Lent, as follows: The book on China and the one on the American Indian. She stressed the Indian study book, having worked among the Indians. The quiet day for prayer preceding Whitsunday was generally observed throughout the district. A very successful and well attended district meeting was held at Bennettsville, on May 9th, being the seventeenth annual meeting. Mr. Roderick Jackson spoke on the Whitsunday offering and Mrs. Grimbball explained the new plan of contributing to the support of the Ladies Home in Charleston as adopted by the convention. May and June being allotted to the Florence District, the Chapters sent liberal gifts of food and money through these months. On November 11th, the quiet day for prayer was observed by most branches. On October 21st, the 18th semi-annual district meeting was held in Hartsville. All of the clergy of the district attended and Bishop Thomas held the noon-day meditation. Miss Cain, our President, was also present and addressed the meeting. At the district meeting in Hartsville, Mrs. Julia McIntyre of Marion was elected district director for the next three years term. On the 3rd of November I attended the Executive Board meeting at Pinopolis. I am glad to report the formation of two new chapters in the Florence district, as follows: The "Hope Lumpkin Chapter" in Darlington and Chapter "B", business and professional women, in Hartsville. It has been a great pleasure

and privilege to serve as director of the Florence District and a member of your executive board, for the past three years.

REPORT OF GEORGETOWN DISTRICT

Reviewing the reports for the District for the year of 1933, we find all branches working busily for the Kingdom. But branches like individuals are prone to stress some features and run a little weak on others. We need a wheel with no missing cogs for the machinery to run smoothly.

The membership of our six branches remains nearly the same. In 1933, 107 members were reported. This year, 92 active and 13 associate, a total of 105.

The District branches made for the Supply Department 81 garments valued at \$56.35, and sent to the Orphanage 142 garments. Every branch participated in these efforts.

Besides these contributions, our District has paid in on apportionments, specials and United Thank Offering, \$364.85. Two branches have paid their budget portion of \$2.60 per member, one of these, a little over-paying. On the face of these reports we wrote large the familiar legend, "WE DO OUR PART." We trust that every branch will this year adopt this slogan and pay their portion of the budget on the basis of membership.

The calls for help this past year have been many and varied and the response has been most generous. Clothing, food, medicines, nursing for the sick and needy were given freely. The months of September and October were assigned this District in which to make special effort to assist the Diocesan Home. Reports indicate that there were sent direct to the Home, \$16.00 in cash, and groceries to the value of \$25.25. Besides \$26.85 was sent to the District Director, who purchased at wholesale prices in Charleston and had delivered to the Home: 200 lbs. rice, 200 lbs. grits, 100 lbs. sugar, 12 lbs. coffee, 48 cans Campbell soup, 24 cans deviled ham, the bills amounting to \$24.96. A money order covering the balance of \$1.89 was sent to Miss Emma McCabe, treasurer of the Home. All entered most gladly into this special giving to the Home.

All branches report using programs at the meetings. All but one branch held Lenten Study Classes, but only two branches had Advent Study. There is a missing cog here. Another missing cog—only one branch reports notices and articles sent to Diocesan chairman and daily press. We are interested in what our neigh-

bors, are doing. They would also like to know what we do. Tell them through the press.

All branches but one observed the Quiet Day for Prayer, Nov. 11th. This branch reports the funeral of their beloved Senior Warden on that day, explaining the omission.

Our United Thank Offering this year amounted to \$105.27. This is quite a bit less than last year. Doubtless there were so many calls for direct help elsewhere that some of our "thankful pennies" were diverted into other channels. The St. James, Santee branch reports under Offering of Life that Miss Maria Keith Prentiss was at Richlands, Va., under Miss Gardner.

Our Spring District meeting was held at St. Alban's Mission, Kingstree. We are glad to have both Bishop Thomas and Miss Cain with us. Rev. O. T. Porcher gave a most interesting address on Christian Social Service. Our "Individual Responsibility" was clearly and forcibly shown by Miss Ruth Hall of the Diocese of Albany, N. Y., whom it was our good fortune to have address us on that subject. Rev. Roderick Jackson spoke on the Whitsunday offering. Conferences were conducted by Mrs. W. H. Grimbail, Mrs. P. O. Arrowsmith and Miss Cain.

The fall meeting was scheduled to be held at Prince Frederick's, Plantersville. Owing to the desperate illness of one of the most faithful members of the Church and branch, it was thought best to have the meeting at Prince George, Winyah, instead. The change of plan was made over night by the prodigious work of this small band of devoted women. We regretted that the Bishop could not be present. Miss Cain spoke on "The Woman's Auxiliary in the Parish." The Rev. H. D. Bull addressed the meeting on the Every Member Canvass and explained in detail the budget which had been recently drawn up by the Council. The Rev. Wallace Martin gave interesting talks on the Program of the Church and the Seaman's Home of which he is Chaplain. Rev. Edward Guerry told of his work in Berkeley made possible by the Advancement Society. By way of aside, two of our branches report that they have subscribed to memberships in the Advancement Society, perhaps directly attributable to Mr. Guerry's address.

The offerings at these meetings amounting to \$10.05, were sent to our treasurer for the Clemson project. All Saints', Waccamaw, has invited the District for the spring meeting.

Your District Director had the privilege and very great pleasure of attending the annual Convention of the Auxiliary at Charleston. Also met with the Executive Board previous to that Convention. She was unable to go to Pinopolis for the Board meeting in No-

vember. At the fall District Meeting she was elected to serve a third term but deemed it advisable to resign, and with this report closes her work as Director.

To our President, Miss Cain, and all her co-workers, we desire to express our sincere thanks, and appreciation for help, advice and encouragement given, and bespeak for our successor that same ready response and cheerful cooperation. Under her leadership, with God's blessing, may the work of this District make great advances this coming year.

Reports show some falling off in membership in some of the

Branches. May we pray and work to enlist the women in each parish in some sort of service for the extension of God's Kingdom.

Am glad to report for the District an increase over last year in our contributions to the Diocesan Auxiliary Budget. Still very few of the Branches gave the quota asked, so may we strive by God's help to measure up more fully in our Branches to our responsibility in this regard.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The Educational Committee has continued through the past year to publish its program material in The Diocese and have a copy sent to each Branch Educational Secretary. It was with regret that the Committee found it financially inexpedient to continue the publication of its little handbook. It hopes, however, that an enlarged subscription list to The Diocese has been proportionately helpful, and that a new plan to be inaugurated this year, of printing a full season's program in the Year Book, may be of even more assistance.

The Educational Secretary has written nine articles for The Diocese and has mailed supplementary material to each Branch for the November and January meetings. A Devotional Program on Faith was prepared by Mrs. Conrad Goodwin and sent to each Branch in time for the Advent Study Classes. The suggested devotions for each Program meeting have been arranged by Mrs. William B. Colcock.

Of the sixty-five Branches of the Auxiliary, fifty-nine have reported a total of 579 program meetings. Thirty-four Advent Study Classes were reported, and 56 Lenten Study Classes. A steady increase in the Advent Study Classes is most gratifying. In 1931 there were 19 classes reported; in 1932, 34 Advent Study Classes. and in 1933, 34. This shows a rising interest in this very suitable observance of the Season.

The sale of the Lenten Study books was not so large in 1933 as in the previous year, but considering the business conditions of last spring was satisfactory. Thirty-six copies of "Facing the Future in Indian Missions" and 40 copies of "Living Issues in China," were bought by the various Branches. A few Branches held Lenten

Classes based on other texts. The Educational Secretary supplied one branch with five used copies of "Roads to the City of God." One Branch reports having used the book, "The Episcopal Church and Its Message to the Men of Today." The Educational Secretary also obtained from Washington some Supplementary material on the American Indian and distributed this to six different Branches who wrote asking for assistance.

A newly organized Branch studied "The Womans Auxiliary in the Life of the Church," and here again the Educational Secretary was able to borrow enough copies of the pamphlet to start this group out on a helpful season of study.

Throughout the year's work the increasing need of library facilities has been evident. The need of building up the District Libraries cannot be stressed too strongly. These Lending Libraries could be made centers of some of the most inspiring and creative work which the Auxiliary could possibly undertake. The plan of giving memorial books has resulted in the presentation of five volumes to the Charleston District. It is hoped that this project may be developed in the coming year.

It is hoped that a large number of women may attend the summer conferences at Kanuga and Sewanee. The inspiration and educational values of these centers cannot be too highly emphasized. No Branch can make a better investment than to send a delegate to one of these Conferences. The ideal of a representative at Kanuga from every Branch in the Diocese would work wonders in the life of the Auxiliary.

The only report on Student Work came from the Florence District where there is a Church School Class of 17 members at Coker College. Mrs. Wm. Egleston is the leader of this group, which has been studying the life of St. Paul. Mrs. Egleston also reports that her Auxiliary entertains the students individually and as a group and keeps in close touch with them through the choir, Church School and Auxiliary. Many opportunities for Student Work present themselves to Auxiliary members who live in college towns and it is hoped that this type of service may receive greater attention in the future.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE SECRETARY

Cheraw, S. C., Jan. 8, 1934.

It is a pleasure to report that our work for the Church Home has been successfully carried out during the year 1933. As the pledges to the Orphanage from the Parishes of the Diocese grew less, the needs of the children increased so that we had to ask for many more garments than formerly.

The District Supply Secretaries have worked faithfully and well and at Easter I had received reports showing that we had sent in a total of 582 spring garments and 38 yards of material.

The Fall list was much larger than that we have had in the past, consequently the Branches received larger allotments. I am proud to report, however, that practically the entire amount was collected, and over 800 garments have been sent to York.

It may be of interest to you that during 1933 we have sent in approximately 1424 garments, as follows:

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Thirty-five years ago I was on the Board with Mrs. Robert Wilson, Miss Henrietta Murdock and Miss Katie Lee when the business of the Convention consisted of the delegate from each Branch reading their own Parish report of the whole undivided Diocese, but I doubt if there were as many branches as there now are in this Diocese. There was no legislation to speak of, no laws or by-laws, very little efficiency, but the real spirit of Missions was kept alive by these devout, earnest, consecrated and prayerful women and the foundation laid for what is now a well organized efficient Branch. May we always keep alive that spirit which is none other than the voice of Our Lord Himself speaking to the Churches which are in Christ through us. May we never fall away from this ideal.

The Woman's Auxiliary was founded to be an Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, so the Department of Missions, and Church Extension is the very heart and core of its work and the very foundation of this department is our Devotional Life which is the source and strength of our work. "Without Me ye can do nothing" our Lord said, so we must draw closer to Him through prayer and meditation before we can be messengers of His Grace and Love and builders in the Kingdom of God.

Devotional Life

Twenty-seven branches, 12 less than last year, reported 108 Cor-

porate Communion. An increase of 17 over last year with an average attendance of 294, an increase of 33 over last year. Fifteen branches report 31 Prayer Groups with an average attendance of 100. The same as last year.

Forty-three Branches took part in the World Day of Prayer.

Fifty-two Branches took part in the Quiet Day of Prayer.

One Branch only reports taking part in the Day of Prayer before Whitsunday.

Thirty-three Branches only mention Prayer Partner and 15 different Prayer Partners were mentioned.

Our Devotional Life Chairman, Mrs. Conrad Goodwyn, prepared four lessons on Faith for our Advent Study and I think they were very generally used by the Branches. We are most grateful to Mrs. Goodwin for this beautiful Program and I am sure it was very helpful to those that used it.

Rural Work

520 books and Sunday School papers given out; help given the underprivileged. 3 teachers furnished for a Mission; paid 69 visits and assisted in the C. C. Camp; furnish organist and members of a choir for a Mission. Entertained a Rural Branch of the Auxiliary; took baskets at Christmas. Established a Mothers' Club. Taught sewing and canning. Two branches helped their Rector with services in various institutions, playing for them and singing. Several Branches mention sending a membership of the Advancement Society to Mr. Martin.

Mill

Seven teachers furnished 4 Branches for St. Andrews Mission. St. Peters, Charleston has adopted a child. Linen, books, clothes and supplies given. The Orangeburg Branch reports furnishing teachers for a mill Sunday School.

Foreign Born

Florence District reports that there are three teachers from two Branches, also some sing in the choir and members of the Y. P. S. L., Sumter reports work among the foreign born.

Inter-Racial

Help given the nurse at Pineville. Visit to the negro hospital. Garments and china sent to St. Andrew's Colored Mission. Food clothes and fuel given negroes by many Branches. 8 garments to 1 infant; 3 visits paid a sick man; 2 sick persons taken to the Hos-

pital. Sewing done for them. Cooperated with the health department to better conditions. Taught sewing and canning; sent box to a patient at a tuberculosis hospital. Helped with a Boy's Club, visited their institution and helped at the colored Y. W. C. A.

Mr. Martin reports that he has received about \$200 for the Advancement Society.

We still have our goal of 200 members to reach and I hope that the members of the Auxiliary will keep this constantly before them.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF OFFERING OF LIFE

The work in this department has been carried on very bravely and courageously in the face of curtailment and lack of funds.

Alice Gregg has made a notable record in China. In the Department of Religious Education her work has been so out-standing that the Anglican Church asked that she be loaned to their Shanghai office for a year. Bishop Huntington would not consent to this but agreed that she go to Shanghai and divide her time.

Lila Stroman Gilmore is also at Shanghai. Her husband is General Treasurer of our Missions there.

Dr. Hawkins K. Jenkins, and his wife and young daughter are stationed at Sagada in the Philippine Islands. His treatment has had such remarkable results that the people believe him to be a miracle worker and flock in from miles away. He and his nurses care for more than two thousand patients a month. The new medical building has been completed, at least, the half of it, which was all that could be built with the present funds. This is one of the buildings towards which an appropriation was made from the last U. T. O. offering.

In our own diocese, we have lost a devoted and valued worker, Miss Fannie Duvall. She gave up her work at St. Andrews in Charleston, and has gone to wider fields in Macon, Ga. She is Superintendent of The Appleton Church Home. This is a home for girls. There are about thirty-five, ranging from two to sixteen years.

Caroline Gillespie is still doing splendid work among the colored people in Darlington County. She expects to do mountain work in North Carolina this summer.

Caroline Gillespie, who studied in New York in 1931-32 on a U. T. O. Scholarship, is planning to enter mountain work in the Diocese of Western North Carolina in June. She goes to Rosborough House, Edgemont, N. C., to establish her work as a Memorial to Kate Rosborough of Chester, South Carolina. She is to teach in the winter and carry on religious and social work throughout the year.

Agnes Hickson is at St. Faith's in New York City taking the course in Deaconess training. She and Marie Prentiss did excellent work in Virginia during the past summer. Agnes at Dante, and Maria at Richlands.

We have volunteers for work next summer and I trust that the Auxiliary will be able to send them.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

As Publicity Chairman I have contributed news articles for ten issues of "The Diocese." Along with these articles I have sent in twenty-seven parish branch reports and three reports of district meetings. I notice, however, from district reports sent to me that sixty articles are reported sent in to the diocesan chairman. There must be some misunderstanding as to who this, chairman is, for I am sure thirty-three reports could not have been lost in the mails. My record is kept by the month and names of branches reporting entered.

I am sorry to report a steady falling off in the number of parish reports received since we have been given the auxiliary space in "The Diocese." In 1931, there were seventy-six; in 1932, forty-six; and in 1933, only twenty-five. There has been a considerable falling off during the past six months. Only three reports of district meetings were sent to me, most of them having been sent direct to the editor, Mr. Bull. Stateburg and Cheraw have sent in the largest number of parish reports. Each district is represented, however, in reports received.

In addition to publicity given through "The Diocese," I have sent several articles to our local paper and material for convention news articles to the six district chairmen. In March I began distributing the 1933 Year Books as follows: to members of the Clergy, 27; to diocesan, district and parish officers, 200; to National Headquarters, 4; to Diocesan Headquarters, 1; to interested friends at the request of the President, 5; and number sold, 11; making the total

number distributed, 248. Last year 323 were distributed. The difference in number is largely due to the very small number sold this year as compared to last year when seventy-two were sold. Thirty-nine would-be purchasers were reported on last year's report blanks but only eleven orders were received. As a consequence we have sustained a regrettable loss in the number of Year Books still on hand.

In spite of the fact that we have earnestly requested each parish branch to subscribe to "The Diocese," only six branches out of sixty-eight report branch subscriptions. Our educational programs depend upon the material published monthly in "The Diocese" and it will be helpful to have more than the one copy which is sent to the educational secretary.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

The year ending December, 1933, has been one of unusual activity in the Department of Christian Social Service of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. Because of the financial stringency on every hand the demands on the department have been greater than before, and added to these calls has been the help given to the Diocesan Home for Ladies in Charleston. The request for this help was made at our last diocesan convention held in the Church of the Holy Communion in January, 1933, and was made to the Auxiliary by Mrs. W. H. Brawley, a member of the Board of Directors of the Diocesan Home.

The six districts within the diocese each pledged help for two months during the year, and as to that help the following report answers for itself. \$205.65 was given in cash, and in round numbers \$500.00 was saved on the grocery bill by supplies sent. The total help given in this way to the Home amounted to \$705.65.

The Orangeburg District gave the milk supply for two months, getting a reduced price from the dairy. After this, Mr. F. S. Hankel, Jr., head of the Coburg Dairy, has given the Home the benefit of the reduced price of eight cents per quart for milk.

I feel sure that this assistance given has not been a burden to any one of the districts. And it is a pleasure to know of this concrete example of cooperative help and the splendid results derived from our efforts. Each of the six districts helped faithfully in turn, but it is impossible to give a report of this work for each district separately.

The Beaufort District reports: visits, 249; gifts of flowers, food, clothing, milk and magazines made during the year: boxes at Thanksgiving of food and clothing; boxes at Christmas of toys and food; one book read on Christian Social Service, and medicines given the sick.

The Charleston District being much the largest in the Diocese, the report is impossible in detail. But it is most encouraging to see so many Parish Committees of Social Service, and the Auxiliary always cooperating with these. Visits to institutions and individuals, 1315—amount of money given, 216.60—clothing and food were given, medicine, flowers, boxes to the orphanage, garments sent to the Red Cross, Red Cross sewing done, help given to support a small boy—students taken to church and entertained in homes.

The report of St. Philip's Church Branch A, being an outstanding one of work accomplished by the members of that branch—the

largest item being clothing given away, the value of which was \$333.95.

I am sorry to say that nine branches sent their branch reports so late to the chairman that I have been unable to include them in this report.

Reports from the Florence District include 107 visits to hospitals, homes, jails and orphanages—many not reporting the number: many gifts of food, clothing; four branches report Social Service Committees in the parishes.

The Orangeburg District reports numerous visits to hospitals and individuals: gifts of 204 garments.

In Pinopolis, the Social Service Department sews for the local hospital and answers calls for relief.

The Orangeburg branch paid hospital expenses for three persons: also sent two outfits of clothing to an orphanage child: boxes of groceries were given out at Thanksgiving.

Eutawville—Helped St. Stephens branch with a shower for infirmity at the Colored Mission, and showers for the Berkeley County hospital.

At St. Stephen—Books were furnished needy children for school, also many clothes supplied.

The report from the Georgetown District includes the following: visits paid to institutions and individuals, 807; gifts of flowers, books and magazines; 312 quarts of milk given; 23 trips made with car; medicines and clothing to the needy. The Auxiliary helped to pay the expenses of a nurse for an invalid; furnished lunch daily for a school boy: besides other forms of activity.

The Sumter District reports many visits to institutions: Auxiliary working with the Salvation Army: books to the orphanages and help given the poor in the parish; gifts of food and clothing; milk given to four families for the year and also to undernourished children in school; besides gifts of money.

REPORT OF ADVANCE WORK

Owing to the great need of funds for important objects nearer home, our Advance Work Project for the past two years has been necessarily put somewhat into the background, and hence there is very little further to report than was made known last January. As reported last year our pledge of \$3000 for a rectory at Salome Field, Arizona, has been paid in full, the rectory built and in use.

The payment of \$100, which was placed on our 1933 budget for Advance Work, brings the amount given on our pledge of \$2000 to help with the Church at Holbrook, Arizona, up to \$381.89, leaving a deficit still to be raised of \$1618.11.

Now comes the good news from Bishop Mitchell that the church building at Holbrook has been completed, even to the necessary furniture, and was consecrated on December 17, last. From the Bishop's letter it is evident that, lacking the funds which we promised them, in order to finish the building, they have gone into debt. So it behooves us to keep this unfilled pledge ever before us and to strive by every possible means surely, if slowly, to raise the remaining amount.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

January 1, 1933 to January 1, 1934

The reports of the various secretaries show that the work of the Church Periodical Club has been faithfully carried on, though the number of current periodicals sent regularly is less than in former years. Strange to say, the number of books given out is larger this year, due to gifts from two members of St. Michael's Parish, but sent through your Director, who had the pleasure of distributing them. Nineteen were sent to the Rev. Hubert H. Young, in charge of the mountain missions near Bluefield, Va., who made an earnest plea to me for children's books. On September 4 he wrote that "they are all very good and I am sure will bring not only joy, but real benefit to our dear children. I wish to assure you we are deeply and sincerely grateful,"—and in less than two weeks from that date he had passed to his reward.

His work is, being carried on, and the Church Periodical Club is asked to continue their gifts of books, pictures, cards, etc., to these missions. Fourteen other children's books were sent to St. Andrew's Mission, Charleston, where they are much needed.

The sixty-five books of recent fiction were divided among the Seamen's Home, a rural community library at Hagood (which means much to the scattered people), and to several individuals.

Magazines were sent to U. S. Forestry Camps at Fort Moultrie, in Berkeley County, and elsewhere.

The Seaman's Home, schools, hospitals for white and colored, a colored preacher in Charleston, and two colored homes near Summerville, libraries, poor white families in a radius of eight miles

of the church, chain gangs, tuberculosis camps, and many individuals in private homes were the grateful recipients of magazines, books, Christmas cards, puzzles, scrapbooks, etc.

Through the generosity of one secretary, the subscription to a medical journal sent to Dr. Hawkins K. Jenkins in the Philippines was renewed, as well as the subscription to the Ladies Home Journal to a shut-in in the upper part of the State.

Your Director presented the work of the Church Periodical Club to Chapter A, Woman's Auxiliary, St. Peter's, Charleston, and to Chapter B, Woman's Auxiliary of Grace Church, Charleston.

In April last, Miss Clare Jerve, a member of St. Michael's, who for many years had made over Christmas cards for distribution at the Roper Hospital and elsewhere, passed away. Her work has been taken over by two ladies at the Church Home; and the appreciative patients received their attractive cards as usual this Christmas day, while the vested choir of Grace Church sang the familiar carols.

One Secretary reports that with the magazines she distributes at the hospitals, she often carries flowers from her own garden, and even potatoes in some urgent cases.

I regret that no reports have been received from several parishes where I know Church Periodical work is being carried on; and I urge that every one present at this Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary will return to her home determined to show more interest in this important work of the Church in the parish.

REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD

This Diocesan Auxiliary was represented at the Provincial Auxiliary meeting in Montgomery, Alabama, by Mrs. Edward E. Rembert and myself. It was a great regret to us that, on account of illness, Miss Cain, our president, was prevented from attending.

The meeting of the Auxiliary and the joint sessions with the Synod were replete with inspiring and informing addresses by prominent Church men and women, and I wish it were possible to share with you all that we heard. However, I shall try to bring to you some of the outstanding messages that we received.

A Quiet Hour was conducted by the Right Rev. James Craik Morris, Bishop of Louisiana, on Tuesday afternoon, and on Tuesday evening the opening service was held in St. John's Church. An address of welcome was given by the Bishop of Alabama, the Right Rev. Wm. G. McDowell, and the response was made by the Rt. Rev. H. J. Mikell of Atlanta, President of the Province. The Rt. Rev. Thomas Gailer gave an address, on the Oxford movement, this year being the 100th anniversary of its formation. In speaking of the movement Bishop Gailer said: "It was above all a moral movement, and they desired an increase in worship, in missions, and in sacrificial life. They stressed Life above Doctrine, and that Christianity was, a social life." In closing Bishop Gailer said that today we

still feel keenly the effects of the Oxford Movement, and "How great a fire a little matter kindleth."

The first business session of the Auxiliary was held on Wednesday morning, and was presided over by the Provincial President, Mrs. James R. Cain. In her talk she asked this very pertinent question: "Is the situation in our Church due to the depression or to our lack of faith and belief in the things to which we are supposed to be devoting our lives?" She said, "The Word is 'Go Forward.' We must have faith in ourselves and in the future of our Church."

The Auxiliary then met in joint session with the Synod, at which time reports were given by Bishop Mikell, President of the Province, and Mrs. Cain, President of the Provincial Woman's Auxiliary.

Bishop Mikell reported that the Province of Sewanee stood first in leadership training and summer conferences. Over 2,000 attended during the past year. Kanuga was the most largely attended center. During Mrs. Cain's report she named the four objectives of her administration. 1st. To deepen the Provincial consciousness through fellowship and service. 2nd. To create a committee on the offering of life—not one life, but all, through vows of self to service. 3rd. To unify all the work of the women, regardless of the name of the organization. All the womanhood of the Church should unite for work, and for carrying out the Divine Commission. The object should be the enlisting of the womanhood of the Church, and not the upbuilding of the Woman's Auxiliary. 4th. To build up a clearer conception that the Program of the Church is a duty, and a duty not done until the parish has fulfilled its obligations. Reports were also heard from Bishop K. G. Finlay on Missions, and from Dr. Robert Patton on work among the negroes.

When the Auxiliary reconvened an interesting talk was given by the National Secretary of the Auxiliary, Miss Grace Lindley, who spoke on the World Mission of the Church and the Responsibility of the Women for that Program. After reports from various departments, elections were held. The incumbent officers being ineligible for re-election, the following were elected: President, Mrs. H. J. McMillan of East Carolina. Vice-President, Mrs. Deane Turner of South Florida. Secretary, Mrs. Jos. E. Hart of Upper South Carolina. Provincial Representative on the National Executive Board, Mrs. F. W. Thomas of Western North Carolina.

At the afternoon session several valuable conferences were held. Miss Emma J. Hall led the one on "Enlisting More Workers." She gave four practical ways of accomplishing this: (1) Prayer. (2) Preaching. (3) Publicity. (4) Personal Approach.

1—Prayer. Deep personal prayer. Make a list of the uninter-

ested, and pray for them regularly, persistently and by name.

2—Preaching. Request your rector to preach on the whiteness of the harvest and the need of workers.

3—Publicity. Use the press for the announcement of meetings and speakers, and try to word them so as to excite curiosity.

4—Personal Approach. This was the Master's Way. We must remember that some will never see Christ but through my life.

Mrs. Gill in her talk on the Young Peoples' Service League stressed the need of the cooperation and interest of the Auxiliary. She suggested that branches offer scholarships to camps for Young People's Service League members, and that the Auxiliary send representatives to study the counselor's course.

The Most Rev. James deWolf Perry, presiding Bishop of the Church, conducted the noon-day meditation and gave an inspiring talk on the mission work in the Orient. This talk was based on information gathered in a recent visit. The Bishop spoke of the critical condition of the finances of the Church, and said that unless we meet the quota, the bond of union we have established will be broken; that the morale and unity of our Church is in very positive danger. In closing he said that the valley of depression is becoming the valley of decision. Let it be "We shall not fail."

An outstanding feature of the convention was the School of Prayer conducted by the Very Rev. Wm. H. Nes. He defined prayer as a "Flight of the alone to the alone," and said that the function of prayer is the liberation of the soul, and that we must free our wills from our emotions.

The Inter-racial Program of the Province was presented by Miss Nannie Hite Winston, who introduced Mrs. Jessie Daniel Ames, Director of the Association of Southern Women for the Prevention of Lynching. This association was formed in 1930 with a membership of about only two hundred. In the past two years its membership has increased to over 16,000 members, representing fourteen states. The association has undertaken to create a public opinion against lynching, so strong that a sheriff will be afraid to let a mob lay hands on a prisoner, and that courts will punish those who take part in a mob. Miss Winston has made a strong plea that this matter be presented to our Auxiliaries.

Many other interesting and educational talks were given, but time will not permit me to tell of more.

We were made very welcome to the City of Montgomery, and enjoyed hearing of its history. St. John's Church, in which the meet-

ings were held, was the church in which Jefferson Davis worshipped when Montgomery was the capital of the Confederacy.

On one evening a banquet was given, sponsored by the Sewanee Alumni of Montgomery. Sewanee songs were sung, and short speeches made by Mrs. Cain, Bishop Mikell, Bishop Perry and Dr. McGregor. The spirit of Sewanee was felt by each of the two hundred persons present, and we believed that one of the objectives stated by Mrs. Cain, "a deeper provincial consciousness," had been attained.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The Provincial Program for the Triennium which was adopted at our diocesan convention in 1932 will still form the basis of the work in the departments. We have already followed many of the suggestions, but it will be well to check up and find out what must be done, during this last year of the Triennium, to make our program complete.

I want to call attention to several matters of importance for our consideration during the coming year: 1st: We would enlist the whole womanhood of the Church in the whole work of the Church. 2nd: We would urge that each member of the Auxiliary consider it her personal affair to interest the women in the United Thank Offering, assisting the custodian in stimulating interest in the special U. T. O. number of the Spirit of Missions, and in placing Blue Boxes in the hands of all Church women—thus giving them the opportunity of sharing in this great offering of thankfulness. May we bestir ourselves to make the offering this year larger than ever before. Third: Under the Publicity Department, you will find the definite plan which was endorsed by the convention for the purpose of placing our diocesan Church paper, "The Diocese," in a larger percentage of the homes. Fourth: The Executive Board has had prepared a list of "Suggestions to Parish Leaders" (which will be found further on in the Year Book). These are to be made use of at each monthly meeting. I would heartily recommend the use of these as they have been most carefully thought out with a view to stressing important matters at the right time. The Educational Program will be published in "The Diocese" each month, as heretofore.

We must at all times keep before us the rededication of ourselves, and an increase of the devotional life, through private prayer and public worship. Let there not be a lack of devotion and a lack of consecration in the cause in which we believe. Let us have the courage of our faith—faith in ourselves, in our future, in our Church—and go forward with increased zeal and concerted effort, taking as our motto for the coming year, "We shall not fail."

TRIENNIAL PROGRAM 1932-1933-1934
OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY TO THE NATIONAL COUNCIL
IN THE PROVINCE OF SEWANEE

Believing as the women of the Fourth Province do, that their channels of service for the World Wide Mission of the Church, lie in the departments of the National Council, to which we are an Auxiliary body, we herewith submit our triennial program under the several Departmental headings:

1. Missions and Church Extension

We believe that the power to extend the kingdom of God on earth comes to us through fellowship with Jesus Christ and a knowledge of His will for the world. To this end our "parishes should become places of such true fellowship in seeking to know God, of such adoring worship of Him, of such loving service to man, that they will reveal to the world something of the beauty of God."

We urge upon the women of the Province of Sewanee the resolutions concerning Prayer, Meditation and Retreats adopted at the Triennial Meeting, in Denver, in September, 1931:

Whereas, only with God are all things possible, and

Whereas, the Woman's Auxiliary faces during the coming triennium tasks of great diversity and magnitude,

Therefore be it resolved: That every member of the Woman's Auxiliary be urged to a renewed discipline in the difficult art of prayer that she may become a fit channel for the grace of God in the fulfillment of His redemptive purpose for the world.

To the accomplishment of this we recommend:

That the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Province of Sewanee study the meaning and power of prayer, as found in God's Holy Word, and that they engage in classes on prayer and in the practice of prayer, through Prayer Groups, Retreats and Services of Intercession as regular expressions of their daily Christian lives,

"Now, more than perhaps at any other time, Christians need to go apart to think and rest in the presence of God."

2. Religious Education

Of outstanding importance to our work throughout the coming triennium is the prayerful study, individually and corporately, of

the six addresses, and the Findings of the Discussion Groups on the same, as they were presented to the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

In the Preamble of the Central Findings Committee we read:

We know that the "fields are white to the harvest;" our urgent concern is how we may best prepare ourselves to share in the gathering of that harvest.

"As a result of the work done it is possible to set forth what may confidently be regarded as a cross section of the thinking of the delegates to this meeting. And it is our prayerful hope that the conclusions at which we have arrived may form the basis upon which the women of the whole Church may build their programs of study and work.

"The subjects that have been under discussion in these groups are: Family Life; Property and Economic Conditions; Interracial Contacts; International Relations and Religious Thinking Today.

"Each of these themes has a direct bearing upon the individual Christian life and as well seeks to provide the individual with such knowledge and understanding of the subject as will best fit her for the fulfillment of her Christian Mission to her family, to society, and to the world."

These addresses and findings have been published at No. 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, and may be secured from the Book Store in one booklet for the price of 35 cents. It will also be found that these subjects may be studied to advantage in connection with our Lenten Study Book, Building a Christian Nation. It is our hope that every parish and mission branch of the Auxiliary within the Province of Sewanee will study the above five topics during the coming triennium.

We suggest—and it is only a suggestion—that 1932 be given to the study of "International Relations" and "Property and Economics," 1933 to "Family Life" and Inter-racial Contacts" and 1934 to "Religious Thinking Today."

As further help in this study, we are happy to tell you that Miss Margaret Marston and Dr. Adelaide Case are getting out a booklet of suggestions on such a course of instruction. When ready, this too may be secured from No. 281 Fourth Avenue.

3. Christian Social Service

As a result of our study of the five topics above mentioned, let us stress the need of:

Constructive education for Christian parenthood.

Definite enrichment of life for those upon whom more and more leisure is being thrust.

Eradication of race prejudice and the application of Christ's teaching that "under the Fatherhood of God, all men are brothers" and are entitled to a sympathetic understanding of the culture, tradition, history and religion of the several races so that our points of similarity rather than our points of difference may be stressed and our Christian love be brought to bear in our relationships with the people of all races, and also to Civil justice as expressed in:

"A fair distribution of public and educational funds.

"Proper housing conditions.

"Adequate recreational facilities.

"Justice in Court and Press.

"Political justice."

"Creation of public opinion which will eliminate fear psychology and bring about the peace of the world and the union of Christendom through the Church of Christ.

"Thinking through our own religious problems and attempting to discover ways of helping others, in their religious thinking.

"Prayer and working for Christian unity with emphasis on the value of the World Day of Prayer.

"By making our daily contacts of every sort a joyful witness to our religious convictions."

4. Field Department

Prayer and service in connection with the Teaching Mission on the Great Commission.

"If we claim to follow our Lord, we must give ourselves wholeheartedly to the carrying out of His Commission. We must support the Church's program for carrying it out."

Bishop's Pastoral of the Province of Sewanee.

Departmental Work For 1934

WHY DEPARTMENTS

The question is often asked, "Why do we have Departments?"

The National Council of the Church has found it a better and more business-like way to carry on its work. Because we are an auxiliary to the National Council and because our work is similar to its work, we are similarly organized.

The six departments of the National Council are the Departments of Missions, Religious Education, Christian Social Service, Finance, Publicity and the Field Department.

Because, first, last, and all the time, the Woman's Auxiliary has helped in the Mission Field at home and abroad, we, too, have a Department of Missions. But people must be educated and trained, not only to be missionaries, but also to be intelligent "missionary-minded" church people and so we have a Department of Religious Education.

And then there are those right here in our midst, as well as in foreign and heathen lands, who are more unfortunate than ourselves. They may not be so much in need of Christian teaching but they do need a helping hand. Therefore, the Department of Christian Social Service.

Because none of this work can be done without funds we have a Department of Finance; and because the more people know about a thing the more they will do for it, there is a Department of Publicity.

The Field Department helps to keep all the others linked up with one another. Perhaps it sees that much of the literature gotten out by the Publicity Department for the other four Departments is distributed to every member of the Church. Or, at another time, it may furnish speakers, or canvassers to assist the Finance Department in raising funds to carry on all the work.

But someone is sure to ask what happened to the boxes which the Woman's Auxiliary used to send to missionaries and their families, to mission schools and hospitals. The "Box Work" has not been forgotten or neglected. The Supply Department is one which the National Council does not claim but it is a very important Department of the Woman's Auxiliary. By means of the Supply Department the Box Work is carried on more efficiently than ever before in its history.

Speaking of the Finance Department brings up another business-like procedure—the Budget. Again we are following the lead of

the National Council in the adoption of a Budget. The Budget is made up by the Finance Committee and consists of an estimate of the amount of money needed to carry on our work for one year.

"Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; Teach-

ing them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

In order to carry out this great command, we need the Devotional Life, so may this be emphasized.

A call has come from our Presiding Bishop to the communicants of our church to make the Way of Life our own this year. He calls us to prayer, Bible reading, public worship, and partaking of the Holy Communion, as well as to thought and work upon our Lord's special missionary and sacramental purpose for His Church. And surely we need to do these things if we are to know God's purpose, and to be co-workers with Him in the fulfillment of His Will. Let us remember that Lent offers a special opportunity for the development of our devotional life, and may it be so used as to be a blessed season of refreshing. May more prayer circles be formed, and there be more attending the Corporate Communion. May we be faithful in observing special days of Prayer—as the World Day of Prayer a day of Intercession before Whitsunday, and a Quiet Day of Prayer on Armistice Day. Encourage the use of the Daily Bible Readings, and of the Noonday Prayer. (Both of these can be ordered from Headquarters. See list in back of Year Book). Through our Devotional life may we be enlightened, strengthened, and inspired for greater usefulness in the work of God's Kingdom.

Foreign-Born: In those places where there are people of other lands, may we seek to minister to them and to bring them into the fuller life of Christ through His Church.

Associates: Are there any who cannot come to our meetings, but to whom we may bring some of what we receive adding to their information and interest, and usefulness? May the Branches seek out such, and strive to bring them into closer touch with the work of the Kingdom, and encourage them to have a part in this work.

Inter-Racial: Is there not some way in which we can minister to the spiritual uplift of those of other races, with whom we come in contact? Let us pray and work for a better understanding between the races, and for justice, peace and good will. In our dealings with the Negro, who is among us in large numbers, do we follow the Golden Rule?

Rural Work: May there be a willingness to seek out ways of helping those in Rural Districts to a fuller life through Jesus Christ. Remember that our Bishop wishes us to help with the definite Rural Work of our Diocese in Berkeley County by securing members for the Advancement Society at \$2.00 per member. It has been estimated that if about 3% of the members, of our Parishes become members of this society for the Advancement of Christianity in South Carolina, that this work could be financed, but so far

we have come far short of this goal. Rev. Wallace Martin of Charleston can be communicated with for further information.

Mill Work: In those communities where mills are established are we doing our part in ministering to the people of these mills, striving to bring them into a more abundant life through Christ and His Church? Such work is being done at St. Andrews Mission in Charleston, but will not others undertake a work of this nature? For practical suggestions confer with Mrs. Shuler of Charleston.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THOSE INTERESTED IN INTER-RACIAL COOPERATION

Mrs. C. P. McGowan, 5 St. Michael's Place, Charleston, Chairman; Mrs. E. E. LaRoche, John's Island; Mrs. James Pagan, R. 3, Sumter; Mrs. William Cain, Pinopolis.

1. Form a group of white women who are willing to do Inter-racial thinking. Begin with a few, possibly only three, and invite others as they are found to be interested, not curious.

2. Get a book to read, either when the group meets, chapter by chapter, or by passing from member to member. T. J. Woofter's "Basis of Racial Adjustment," Ginn & Co., Atlanta, Ga., is a good, practical work, planned for use in colleges and schools.

3. When the group is sufficiently interested, invite the State Chairman to organize a group of colored women, after which the two groups may meet and work together for betterment of conditions in the community, along lines of schools, or housing, or recreation, justice in the courts, etc.

4. From the very beginning interest can be shown in personal ways; in helping the sick, etc. A Bible class was organized in Spartanburg by Mrs. W. P. Carr, and has grown amazingly, and accomplished much good.

5. Chairman of the State Inter-Racial Committee, Mrs. C. P. McGowan, 5 St. Michael's Place, Charleston, S. C., will be glad to cooperate with any interested group, either by correspondence, or by going to the community.

Two of the major projects now before the inter-racial Commissions, are: 1. to use influence in every possible way against the increase in lynching; 2. to promote constructive discussion of Domestic Service problems, and promote some action toward training for service and the placing of servants at wages based on the amount of quality of service rendered.

DEPARTMENT OF OFFERING OF LIFE

The responsibility of the Department of the Offering of Life is to keep in touch with our missionaries at home and abroad, fostering interest in their work, needs, hopes.

Of importance, also, is the encouragement of young men and women to a further understanding of and loyalty to the missionary work of our Church, perhaps leading to one of the innumerable avenues of service, all of which have the same objective. At a time when vocational guidance is stressed, with youth, especially among family and friends, let us reveal the high calling and keen satisfaction in Christian service.

It is recommended that each Branch have a committee of three, the Chairman of which is the U. T. O. Secretary; to present at each meeting some brief story, statement, letter, pictures, paragraphs, obtained from various Church periodicals or elsewhere, that we may become more informed, and to give added meaning to our prayers for Mission work and for those who are giving unreservedly of self in His name.

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

As we start this last year before the Triennial meeting in Atlantic City, the problem that we, as United Thank Offering Custodians are facing, is, how can we interest all the women in the many parishes

in our Offering so that the blessedness of having a share in this gift may come into the lives of each. Then, through having their gifts of love and thankfulness, we will be able to keep faith with the more than two hundred women missionaries our U. T. O. supports. As an aid in accomplishing this we have a U. T. O. Custodian in each parish or branch who should be responsible for placing a Blue Box in the hands of every woman in the parish whether she is a member of the Auxiliary or not. She should plan to have at least one meeting of her branch given over to learning about the work done by the U. T. O. missionaries. Most important of all, she should see that her women bring in the contents of their boxes and join in the service on the date when the presentation of the Offering is made.

Sometimes word comes to us that an offering is small because a "larger giver" has died or moved away. Of course, we miss such a giver, but suppose you try to get three small givers in her place and see what the result will be. If every woman in our Church placed five cents a week in her Blue Box, the Offering would be more than a million dollars a year. When a letter comes to us saying, "Our gift seems so small when he think of all we have to be thankful for, but it is all we can do this year," we feel that the Master will receive such gifts, and bless them as He did the loaves and fishes, so that they will be multiplied and the hungry will be fed.

The April number of the Spirit of Missions will be a special United Thank Offering number which will be of the utmost value in stimulating the interest and securing the cooperation of the Church on behalf of the U. T. O. in this final year of the triennium. We, therefore, urge all parish officers to make plans to promote the distribution of this U. T. O. number and get into the hands of as many communicants as possible.

We of the Diocese of South Carolina in convention assembled, have gone on record as not endorsing the plan of raising money for the United Thank Offering by selling the April number and securing subscriptions for the Spirit of Missions, for a commission, as we feel that this is not in accord with the ideal of a voluntary thank offering, of the women of the Church.

The motive always for our offering is a free-will gift of love and thankfulness.

PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

The Department of Publicity has no work of its own to promote

and yet it is of great importance for it exists to help the other departments and to serve the church as a whole. It is indispensable as an inspirational and educational medium. The chairmen of Publicity—diocesan, district, and parish—should therefore be constantly on the alert to see that the department performs its important function. The following suggestions will be found helpful:

For Parish Chairmen:

1. Report meetings through local papers.
2. Report to Diocesan Publicity Chairman, items of interest for publication in The Diocese. Send in by the 15th of the month.
3. Increase subscriptions to The Diocese and The Spirit of Missions and to the other Church papers. Keep a list of the congregation and check those who are subscribers to them.
4. Keep accurate record of number of subscribers to the different periodicals.
5. Order leaflets from the Church Missions House for use by your department chairmen.
6. If you have a public library in your community, see that subscriptions to leading church papers are given to them. If individuals will not make these subscriptions, have the branch to do so, then those unable to subscribe can read them in the library. Their presence will help to make our Church known to others.
7. Clip items of interest from Church and secular periodicals and call attention to them at regular meetings of the Auxiliary.
8. Keep an accurate record of information that will be asked for on annual report so that the blanks may be filled in fully and correctly.

For District Chairmen:

1. Report any matters of general interest in your district.
2. Send in the report of your District meetings and copy of program as soon as possible. Stale news is no news.

At the Annual Convention held in January, the Rev. H. D. Bull, Editor of The Diocese, spoke on the Place and Value of Church papers, calling particular attention to the importance of having an adequate diocesan paper which reaches the majority of the communicants of the diocese. Mr. Bull then made certain suggestions of ways in which the Auxiliary might help in making this possible. The following resolution was later presented by the chairman of Publicity and was adopted by the Convention:

Whereas, our Church paper, The Diocese, is the official organ for

the publicity of our diocese, and whereas, this organ in failing to fulfill its purpose in the large way in which it should because of the very small number of subscribers, and whereas the women of the Auxiliary are vitally concerned in the success of every effort made to better inform the communicants of our church of every phase of its activity, and whereas the larger funds secured by additional subscriptions will enable our Editor to publish a fuller and more interesting paper,

Be it resolved: 1. That the recommendation of Mr. Bull be adopted, namely that each parish branch of the Woman's Auxiliary make a definite campaign to increase the subscriptions to The Diocese by securing at least one new subscriber for every ten families in the parish. 2. That this plan be included as a definite part of the Department of Publicity for this year.

The promotion of The Diocese thus becomes the outstanding piece of work for this department for the year. As you will see under "Suggestions for Parish Leaders," in this Year Book, the month of May has been designated as a time of special effort on this line. Further suggestions will be made at an early date.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SOCIAL SERVICE

In beginning our work of Christian Social Service for the coming year, we want first to urge the Christian Life in our own homes, then go out into other homes and in our community to extend this service in His name.

We do not care so much just how many visits to the hospital you make, or the number of trays of flowers you take to the sick—but, how many times, by doing these acts, did you make the sick and the unfortunate feel that you thought of them, and they in turn, were brightened and made glad.

I still feel that every Branch should form a Christian Social Service Committee in their respective branches, and then see that this committee functions.

Last year, our attention was brought to the Church Home for Old Ladies in Charleston, and each District was given two months to supply groceries. This plan worked finely, only there was an over supply of some articles and not enough of others. So at our last Executive Board meeting, after the convention in Georgetown, the Board adopted a resolution, that we consider the Church Home

again this year, but the list of groceries that was actually needed to run the Home on for the month, be divided among the Branches, and given each month throughout the year.

I am writing each Director and each District Christian Social Service Chairman urging them to cooperate with the plan which we have worked out.

We do not want to thrust this expense on any Branch, so we are making it a voluntary giving. We have worked out such a happy plan for the Orphanage at York, why can't we do the same for our dear Old Ladies in Charleston?

Please put forth every effort then to cooperate with your committee's plan and in His name, give. "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

Suggested Outline of Work

"In His Name."

The purpose of this Department is to offer to all Branches a suggested, practical outline for the sewing or supply work.

1st. All Branches and Associate Members are eligible for this work.

2nd. The Supply Funds, also the Allotment of Work, will be apportioned to each of the Convocational Secretaries, according to the membership of the Convocation.

The Convocation Secretaries will purchase all materials and will distribute work to the Branches and the Associate Members, at their request.

All finished work is to be returned to the Convocational Supply Headquarters at a specified time. The Secretary will place the return date on all sewing when it is distributed.

3rd. The Convocational Secretaries will pack and ship the boxes to their proper destinations and will report the progress of their work, quarterly, to the Diocesan Supply Secretary who, in turn, will report to the National Secretary.

4th. Branches should correspond at once with the missionaries for whom, or for whose Missions they are working, just as they have always done in the past.

It is also suggested that Branches should hold a program meeting on the field to which they are sending their boxes. This will supply the direct personal touch that is so necessary to secure the intelligent interest of all women in the Auxiliary. Literature on the Mission Fields may be secured from the Educational Department of the Diocesan Branch.

5th. It is most to be desired that all personal boxes be shipped in time to reach their destinations by Easter. If this is not possible, then Christmas, should be the latest permissible date.

6th. The personal boxes must be filled according to the furnished lists.

7th. No second-hand clothing is allowed to be sent in the personal boxes.

8th. Send all second-hand clothing to the Diocesan Supply Secretary—not to the Convocational Secretaries—to be used for Missions and Institutions at home and abroad. There is liable to be a great call for second-hand clothing in the rural districts of our own Diocese, and the Executive Committee of the Auxiliary Council has authorized the Supply Department to meet these calls, wherever possible.

N. B.—All second-hand clothing should be clean and in good repair before it is shipped to the Diocesan Headquarters in Sumter to Mrs. Bruner.

9th. Branches will not receive credit through the Supply Department for any box work that has not been done at the request of the Supply Department.

10th. The Church Home Orphanage at York is the mutual care of both Dioceses. Each Branch and individual member of the Auxiliary should consider it a privilege to contribute to the comfort and happiness of these children.

Branches desiring to send boxes to the Orphanage should first communicate with Miss Duvall in Cheraw so as to know what garments are needed.

All Orphanage boxes should be reported at once to the Diocesan Supply Secretary, Miss Duvall, Cheraw.

11th. Sewing done by the Branches and Associate Members will be credited as cash on the books of the Convocational Supply Secretaries. Illustration: If we spend two thousand dollars for materials, etc., and do five hundred dollars' worth of sewing, the Diocese will receive credit for having given two thousand five hundred dollars, through its supply department, for the Mission of the Church during the current year.

12th. The National Supply Department has issued the following list of valuation for the garments, etc., that are placed in the boxes. By using this list as the standard value of the making of each article that is made for the boxes, and adding to it the cost of the materials required, each Diocese will be enabled to report the value of its Supply Work on the same basis.

A Parish which may have on hand extra or partly-worn Altar linens, furnishings, vestments, etc., and are willing to give them away, are asked to do so, but before sending to the Supply Secretary who will place them where most needed, it is requested that they be cleaned and repaired.

The following are the measurements for the linen:

Altar Cloth—Varying sizes.

Corporal—22 in. by 24 in. finished—hem 1½ inches.

Purificators—11 in by 11 in. finished.

Covers for Credence Table—28 in. by 28 in. finished—hem 2½ in.

Pall—5¾ in by 5¾ in. finished.

Fair Linen—Varying sizes.

Standard of Values

These figures are based on estimates received from the East, West, South and Middle West from which we have struck an average. They plus the cost of material will necessarily be higher than those for many garments now on the market which are made in large quantities in factories and in many instances in sweat shops.

Patterns to Use

McCalls Patterns are a good standard to use for hospital garments, if you have no Red Cross patterns on hand.

The women of the Auxiliary have already rallied to the call of this Department. In fact, we have been unable to fill many of the requests for sewing, as so many of the boxes call for garments that have to be purchased read-made, as clergymen's suits, sweaters, hose, hats, blankets, etc. This year we are to have \$650 for Supply work.

ORPHANAGE SUPPLY WORK

The close of 1933 brought out the great increase in the number of garments needed by the Church Home Orphanage. With the de-

creased budget of the Diocese, the Home looks to the two South Carolina Dioceses for practically all the clothing for 120 children; therefore the suggestion has been made that each Branch of the Auxiliary make some provision in their budget for this cause. The Spring list will be sent the District Supply Secretaries the 1st of February and the Fall list about October 1st, which will allow six weeks in which to get the garments to the Home. This plan has been carried out so successfully in the past, that the same system will be used during the coming year, and it is hoped that our work will be carried forward with the same splendid enthusiasm.

FIELD DEPARTMENT

We feel that much has been accomplished in the Field Department in the past year.

We stressed the Recruiting Department with a definite result of forming several new branches. We are going to ask your further cooperation this coming year to enter into this personal evangelistic work and with a systematic effort to enlist all of those disinterested women. According to reports a large percentage of our confirmed women are still inactive. Our Lord asks us to "seek and we will find." This method was His example to extend His Kingdom.

We note the increase in the number of our church women who are cooperating with secular organizations and other denominations in their respective communities; this is a decided step forward, and we have a great opportunity to reach out with a broadening vision in this way.

We thank you for your cooperation in the past and earnestly urge you to seek out someone who is not serving that they too may know the joy of getting by sharing.

ADVANCE WORK

When, in 1929, the Advance Work Program of the whole Church was launched by the National Council, the Diocese of South Carolina undertook a project of \$5,000 for forward work in Bishop Mitchell's Diocese of Arizona: \$3,000 for a rectory at Salome Field and \$2,000 to help finish the Church at Holbrook. This project was to be completed by Epiphany, 1931.

The rectory, built and paid for, has been occupied for over a year by the Rev. and Mrs. Edmund T. Simpson, missionaries in the Salome District. Mrs. Simpson, in a very appreciative letter last winter, told what a comfort and joy the new rectory is to them after having occupied for six years a small, poorly heated shack on the desert. The house, of mission type, is built of adobe bricks (made right in the yard by Mexicans), with stucco inside and out, thus insuring warmth in winter and coolness in summer. It has a sleeping porch over the bed rooms, a study, a large living room, and a garage attached with a large loom room at its rear, and even a real guest room. This has been furnished, a symphony in pink, by the Diocese of Maryland. Now when they return with the Bishop from long trips on cold rainy nights, they find a cozy home awaiting them with a blazing fire in the wide fireplace. This is constructed of native granite, finished in a mosaic effect with specimens of various kinds of ore from nearby mines. "There is so much cheer in the living room," she says, that the people love to come and see us nowadays."

In a recent letter she tells something of how the work goes on in the Salome District. They have now two deacons, with whose help she and Mr. Simpson take charge of eight mission stations scattered over a large area. In spite of the many miles of desert roads to cover; lack of funds, and of buildings in which to hold services; the loss by cyclone and fire of two out of their three church halls; the suffering among the people from unemployment; these two elderly missionaries with their two assistants are struggling bravely against great odds to continue the services at all the stations, to carry God's message and to minister to His needy children. And they are progressing, for in the last year they have started a new mission some miles away, in a thriving little community where at the Christmas celebration the entire community of over 200 were present. Under the leadership of the two deacons several new Sunday Schools have been organized and several troops of Boy Scouts formed. "Mr. Simpson has been appointed the Red Cross distributor of clothing for the entire county and, if you were to look in our garage, you would think we were

running a dry goods shop," writes Mrs. Simpson.

The other work she tells about is the weaving done by the women at the Harqua Hala Industries, where beautiful bags of all types, and other articles, are made, on which are depicted the scenery of the surrounding desert and mountains; and the woodcraft carried on by the men. Exhibits of their handicraft are held at Phoenix and elsewhere, and some income is derived from the sale of the various articles.

The Church at Holbrook, which constitutes the other part of our project, has been at last completed and consecrated. (See Report of Advance Work in this Year Book). Bishop Mitchell writes that, when this Church was being planned, a Canadian woman said very plaintively, "Let us have at least one beautiful thing made by man in Holbrook; and, if it can be to the glory of God, so much the better." "I think we have met the requirement," the Bishop adds. He goes on to tell us that "in neither place is the work among Indians. At Salome it is among the desert people, small miners, small ranchers, but primarily among ex-soldiers, graduates of our veterans' hospitals, who have been told they must live in this wonderful climate, if they are to live at all, who have gone out on the desert and have established homesteads. Their condition right now in many cases is tragic, because so many of them have lost what little compensation they were receiving from Uncle Sam. You would probably be shocked to learn that they find young burros very good eating, and the County Agent has shown the women how to can the meat for the future.

"Holbrook is a county seat, a small town in the midst of an enormous territory. There are a number of wholesale houses there, and some forty-seven different star routes go out from the post office. It is a jumping off place into the Mormon country from which, when we are up to it in man power and resources, we may be able to send out a missionary by having him in residence in Holbrook."

But let us remember that the people have gone into debt to finish the Holbrook Church because, of the \$2000 we promised, only \$381.89 has so far been raised. So although there is to be no concerted effort this year to raise funds for this work, we must realize that it remains an unfilled pledge and hence a sacred responsibility resting on each individual. Hence, I again make my plea of last year that Auxiliary women throughout the Diocese take this project to heart, keep it before their Branches and work for special and personal contributions toward the fund, and that they remember it constantly in their prayers.

DIOCESAN CONSTITUTION

(As amended in Convention January, 1934)

Article I—Name

The name of this Association shall be the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Article II—Object

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of South Carolina the three great aims of the Christian Church—Missions, and Church Extension, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

Article III—Membership

Section 1. The Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese shall be ex-officio members.

Sec. 2. The Association shall be composed of those women who, being by baptism members of the Church, are actively engaged in any department of her work.

Sec. 3. Women who are not yet baptized may be admitted to associate membership, and shall be known as "Auxiliary Co-Workers."

Article IV—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a President, six District Directors, a Secretary, a Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, a Supply Secretary, and an United Thank Offering Custodian.

Article V—Organization

Section 1. This Association shall be organized along the lines of the National Council, and shall be authorized to establish the six Departments already provided for by that Council, as well as to add new departments at its own direction.

Sec. 2. The executive Board shall be composed of a President, six District Directors, a Secretary, an Educational Secretary, a Secretary of Supplies, a Treasurer, and United Thank Offering Custodian, and six women, three from each Convocation, elected annually by the Diocesan Convention from the membership at large.

Sec. 3. The Board shall organize from within its membership the following departments, and shall determine the scope of the work of each Department:

1. A Department of Missions and Church Extension.
2. A Department of Religious Education.

3. A Department of Christian Social Service.
4. A Department of Finance.
5. A Department of Publicity.
6. A Field Department.
7. A Supply Department.
8. An Orphanage Supply Department.

The Board shall have the power to organize such sub-departments as the work may demand.

Sec. 4. Each Department shall have the power to appoint additional members of the Department, who shall have seats and votes in the Department, but only a seat and voice in the Board.

Sec. 5. The President shall be ex-officio a member of each Department.

Sec. 6. The Executive Board may also enact all necessary By-Laws for its own government and the government of the several Departments as well as for the government of the South Carolina Branch, subject to the provisions of the National Council of the Church and of its National Auxiliary.

Article VI—Meetings

Section 1. The Diocesan Branch shall hold an Annual Convention, preferably in the month of January, alternately in each convocation, exact date to be decided by Bishop and Executive Board.

Sec. 2. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held during the first week in November and immediately before and after the Annual Convention, as well as at such other times as the Executive Committee may deem necessary.

Sec. 3. Nine members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 4. Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called at the discretion of the President or upon the request of five members of the Board.

Sec. 5. Five members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 6. District meetings shall be held twice a year, preferably in the Spring and Fall.

Article VII—Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Convention of the Diocesan Branch by vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been previously given to every Branch.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Elections

Section 1. All officers and Board members, except the District Directors, shall be elected at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 2. District Directors shall be elected by their respective Districts, at the Semi-Annual meeting held in the Fall.

Sec. 3. Delegates to the Provincial Synod and Triennial Convention shall be elected at the Annual Diocesan Convention just preceding the respective meetings of those bodies.

Sec. 4. No officer nor Board Member at Large shall serve longer than three years consecutively in one office.

Sec. 5. Candidates for the offices shall be nominated by informal ballot, the two receiving the largest number of votes for any office being considered candidates therefor. Any candidates receiving a majority vote on the first ballot, on motion, shall be declared elected.

Sec. 6. Candidates for the six members at large shall also be nominated by informal ballot, the twelve receiving the largest number of votes being considered candidates therefor.

Sec. 7. A formal ballot shall then be cast and the candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Sec. 8. Members of the Board shall remain in office until their successors are elected. The Executive Board shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur through death, resignation or removal.

Sec. 9. The Educational Secretary shall be elected in January to take office the following September.

Sec. 10. A corresponding Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

Article II—Duties of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings and shall have power to appoint Convocational Supply Secretaries and Chairmen of Triennial Specials, and shall have the general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese.

Sec. 2. The District Directors shall arrange for and preside over the District Meetings; shall appoint Department Chairmen for their Districts; shall endeavor to establish a Branch of the Auxiliary in every Parish and Mission, and shall have the general supervision of the work in their respective Districts; shall collect and tabulate annually the report of all the Branches in their Districts, and shall send detailed Department reports to each Diocesan Department Chairman one week previous to the Convention. The District Di-

rectors shall give full reports of the year's work at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 3. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all Diocesan and Executive Meetings; prepare for publication the proceedings of the Convention and revised Roster of Parish Branches.

Sec. 4. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributions, except the United Thank Offering, from the Parish Branches and forward them to their various destinations. She shall keep an accurate account of same, and closing her books on December 31st, make a report at the Annual Convention of all receipts and disbursements. She shall be Chairman of the Department of Finance.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of Supplies shall obtain allotments from the National Secretary of Supply and distribute same in proportion to the Convocations, and shall, from the budget apportionment, meet all expenses connected with this Department.

Sec. 6. The Educational Secretary shall be Chairman of the Department of Religious Education and shall suggest topics and compile programs for the use of the Parish Branches.

She shall also arrange for Lenten and Advent Study classes and lead Educational Conferences at District Meetings and at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 7. The purpose and claim of the United Thank Offering shall be brought before all the women of the Church by the United Thank Offering Custodian. She shall receive all offerings semi-annually.

The United Thank Offering Custodian shall be a member of a Committee on the Offering of Life.

Section 8. A Chairman of the Committee on the Offering of Life shall be appointed by the President, whose duties shall be to endeavor to arouse an intelligent interest in the Offering of Life and part or whole time volunteers. She shall also keep in personal touch with all missionaries who have gone out from our Diocese.

Sec. 9. Each Department Chairman shall make to the President annually, and at such other times and in such forms as she may require, a report of the work done under its direction.

Sec. 10. The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on all necessary correspondence.

Article III—Committees

Section 1. There shall be four Standing Committees: Executive Committee, Finance Committee, Program Committee, and Inter-Racial Committee.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers and Department Chairmen, and shall have the power to transact

such business as may be necessary between meetings of the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer and two other members at large appointed by the President.

Sec. 4. The Program Committee shall consist of the Educational Secretary and two members at large appointed by the President.

Sec. 5. The Inter-Racial Committee shall consist of three or more members of the white Auxiliary appointed by the President and an equal number of members of the colored Auxiliary appointed by their President, which committee is to meet for conference purposes only at the call of either President subject to the approval of the Bishop.

Article IV.—Fiscal Year and Diocesan Apportionment

Section 1. The fiscal years shall be from January 1 to January 1.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan Apportionment upon each Branch of the Auxiliary shall be upon a per capita basis and shall be determined upon by the Department of Finance.

Sec. 3. Church women who are not connected with any Parish or Mission in the Diocese or in whose Parish or Mission there is no branch of the Auxiliary may become Auxiliary associates by contributing in any way to the work of the Auxiliary.

Article V.—Representative Body of the Annual Convention

Section 1. Each Parish and Mission Branch of the Auxiliary shall be entitled to two votes, provided it sends two delegates. If there are two sections in the Parish or Mission Branch each sends a delegate, one vote shall be cast by each section.

Sec. 2. Where there are more than two sections in a Parish, each section can send one delegate, but only two votes can be cast, the majority vote of the delegation determining the vote of the Parish.

Sec. 3. The Clergy and members of the Board shall be entitled to vote.

Sec. 4. Visiting members of the Auxiliary shall be granted a voice but not a vote.

Article VI.—Auditing Committee

Section 1. The books of Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian shall be audited by the time of the Annual Convention.

Article VII—Amendment

The By-Laws may be amended at any Convention of the Diocesan Branch by a vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amend-

ment having been previously given to each Branch.

Parish Constitution

Any Branch wishing a copy of a suggested constitution may have the same by applying to the Diocesan President.
