



A Bit of History

National Auxiliary

In the Episcopal Church in the United States there are seven organizations among women that are national in scope. These are: The Woman's Auxiliary, the Church Periodical Club, Daughters of the King, Church Mission of Help, St. Barnabas' Guild for Nurses, and the League for Patriotic Service. Of these, the Woman's Auxiliary is the oldest and the largest.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions came into being October 16, 1871. In January, 1872, headquarters were established in a rented room in the Bible House, New York, with Miss M. A. Emery as the first Secretary. The Mission Board assisted the Auxiliary in every way possible in getting its object known and its work established in the Dioceses all over the country. The Secretary obtained the approval of one bishop after another and one priest after another and they established diocesan and parochial branches, until, in 1919, 3,678 parishes were enrolled in the Woman's Auxiliary, and diocesan branches stretched from Hankow to Texas and Porto Rico to New York.

In 1919, at the Great Detroit Triennial Convention, great changes took place in the organization of the Church. Up to this time, the work of the general Church was carried on by three boards—Board of Missions, Board of Religious Education, and Board of Christian Social Service. For nearly fifty years the Woman's Auxiliary had worked as an auxiliary to the Board of Missions. At this time, however, the Presiding Bishop and Council was created, and the work of the Church divided among six departments of which the Department of Missions is one. At this Convention the question arose as to whether the Woman's Auxiliary should become an auxiliary to one department or to the National Council. The Convention de-

cided that it was an organization too large and too important to become an auxiliary to the Department of Missions, so the Woman's Auxiliary was asked to become an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, which means that we now share in all phases of the Church's work.

HISTORY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN SOUTH CAROLINA

The South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was organized in Grace Church, Charleston, May 19, 1885, with Mrs. Robert Wilson as its first President, who remained its leader for twenty-one years. From a small beginning, the work began to spread, so that when the Convention met on May 26, 1920, to re-organize as an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, there were about 74 parochial branches, with a total membership of 1,656 women.

On October 24, 1922, the Woman's Auxiliary was called to meet in convention at the Church of the Holy Communion, Charleston, for another reorganization, due to the division of the Diocese. This division left us with forty-four parish branches. As the name of the Presiding Bishop and Council has been changed to the National Council, our official name from this time became the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of South Carolina.

In 1925 it was decided to divide the Diocese into six district as follows: Beaufort, Charleston, and Orangeburg in the Charleston Convocation; Florence, Georgetown, and Sumter in the Pee Dee Convocation.

The new year, 1935, begins with 69 branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, representing 48 parishes and missions.

Convention Proceedings

Opening Service

January 8, 1935—10 A. M.

(All reports appear in the Year Book. Outlines of Addresses at the end of the Minutes.)

The Fiftieth Annual Convention of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and the Fifteenth, to the National Council, in the Diocese of South Carolina, opened with a celebration of the Holy Communion in Grace Church, Charleston, at 10 o'clock, on Tuesday, January 8th, the Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas, Bishop of the Diocese, celebrant, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Way, Rector of the Parish.

At this time the Bishop made his annual address to the Auxiliary. His stress on the need of "Spirit of Adventure" in the Church, in the World, the Diocese, the Parish and the Individual, was inspiring and timely.

Opening Business Session

January 8—11:30 A. M.

The opening business session was held in Grace Church, Charleston, at 11:30 A. M., with Mrs. W. H. Grimball, Director of the Charleston District, presiding, in the absence of the President, Mrs. E. E. Rembert, who was ill in the Hospital in Sumter.

Words of Welcome were spoken by Dr. Way, who reminded the Auxiliary that Grace Church, Charleston, was the birth-place of the South Carolina Branch, since it was established here in 1885—50 years ago. Again in Grace Church, it was made an Auxiliary to the National Council.

Mrs. W. H. Johnson's welcome was read by Miss Fannie O'Hear, and the response given by Mrs. C. S. Anderson of the Holy Comforter, Sumter.

The Rules of order were then read by the Secretary, and the Roll called, which showed an attendance of

Dr. Homer W. Starr made an address on "Ways of Training Church School Teachers."

Miss Louise Starr told of her work in the University of Georgia among the students, which showed plainly the advantage of having such a worker.

Mrs. MacMillan of North Carolina, made an address on "Discipleship" explaining that "Disciple" means "learner."

Report on the Advancement Society by the Rev. Wallace Martin, Treasurer.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that the offering of \$34.00 be given the Bishop to be used in the repair of the clergy house in Saluda.

The Bishop here asked for the floor and explained that the amount of \$1518.11 on the Advanced Work was not really a debt, but an obligation, but he still hopes that in time it will be paid off.

The hour of Noon having arrived, in the absence of Mr. Tisdale, Dr Starr had the Noon-day Prayers.

The Presentation of the Budget for 1935 was made by Miss Stoney voted on item by item and accepted. It amounted to \$2760.00.

Distribution of Ballots for the Delegates to the synod in Lexington, Va., in September, 1935.

The Convention recessed for a cup of tea served in the Parish House, by the ladies of Grace Church Auxiliary.

The Tellers reported the following delegates elected: Mrs. E. E. Rembert, Mrs. Skardon, Mrs. Grimball and Mrs. Goodwin.

The following amendments to the Constitution, as recommended by the Executive Board, were adopted:

Art. V, Sec. 2—Insert after "a Secretary," "a Corresponding Secretary, who shall be appointed by the President."

Art. V, Section 4—Strike out, "but only a seat and voice in the Board."

The following amendments to the By-Laws, as recommended by the Executive Board were adopted:

Art. I, Sec. 5—Strike out "first," insert "Nomination."

Art. I, Sec. 8—Strike out last sentence. Add, "The President shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur. The Bishop shall appoint someone to fill a vacancy in the Presidency."

Art. II, Sec. 3—"The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes for all Diocesan and Executive Board Meetings; prepare the Year Book for publication, send out all report blanks and Convention Calls. The corresponding Secretary shall carry on all necessary correspondence.

Art. II, Section 6—Strike out the words "and Advent."

Art. II, Sec. 10—Change to “The Department of Missions and Church Extension, shall arrange through its Devotional Chairman for all Advent study classes.”

Art. IV, Sec. 2—Change to “The Diocesan support from each Branch shall be voluntary but based upon the suggestion from the Department of Finance.”

Art. V, Sec. 1—In the second sentence, after the word “two” insert the words “or more;” change the word “send” to “shall send;” change the word “section” to the word “delegate.”

Art. 5, Sec. 2—Eliminate the whole article.

Mrs. L. D. Simonds, Chairman on Resolutions, presented the following which were lost: 1st, That all District information should be sent to Parish Presidents as well as officers. 2nd To reduce the Committee on Offering of Life to one. 3rd, To bring before the Convention all problems heretofore decided by the Executive Board. 4th, To appoint a Chairman for the Church Home Work, as for the Orphange Supply.

Also the following which was carried: “Whereas, the Woman's Auxiliary is a Missionary Society: Be it resolved that the offerings at the Convention Services will be given to some missionary object outside of the Diocese.”

A motion was made, seconded and carried that a note of thanks be sent Mr. J. C. Ball, for auditing the books for the last nine years.

An invitation was extended by the Summerville Branches for the Executive Board meeting to be held in the Fall.

A Resolution of Courtesy was read by the Chairman, Mrs. J. J. Wilson of Grace Church, Rockville, and Grace Church, Charleston, was given a rising vote of thanks.

The Acting President announced that a meeting of the Executive Board would be held immediately after the adjournment. The meeting was pronounced adjourned, the Bishop asking that all remain seated for the Consecration of Officers, which impressive service he conducted.

Convention Addresses

Bishop's Annual Address

Rt. Rev. Albert S. Thomas, D. D.

In his annual address, Bishop Thomas said that the Church to-day faces the challenge of a changing world, and must look to its own equipment. If faith is the watchword of the Church, then venture must be the chief characteristic of its plan of campaign. The slogan of "Hold the Line" is fine, but not sufficient. It's warfare must not merely be defensive, but offensive. Unless there is something aggressive the life of the Church is failing in its mission.

The disciples lacked the spirit of Adventure, which was the Masters and it is essential that this spirit should possess the soul of the National Church. It is essential that this Spirit of Adventure should possess the soul of the Diocese. We are entrusted with a great responsibility by the Master. We cannot be content to hold the line, with our wonderful tradition behind us. The Master moves on, let us ask "Whither goest Thou" and follow. Likewise is it essential that this Spirit should prevail in the Parish. If there be no exercise of the faith that dares to go forward in active endeavors, that the influence of the parish not only reach about in its own community, but outward to the ends of the earth, according to Christ's command, its mission cannot be fulfilled.

Must we not carry the principle to our own individual lives? Until they are controlled by a faith that endows us with a sacrificial courage to dare and do for Christ we are not true Christians. The Equipment which the Church needs as it faces the challenge of a changing world is a fresh spirit of adventure, which will not be satisfied until greater things are accomplished for Christ and His Kingdom, and which will not count the cost.

The waters of life in our midst, and the world over, are wavering, upon the Church rests the responsibility of turning them into the right channels.

To acquire this spirit is needed first an uncompromising Faith that knows in whom it believes. We must believe that God is all powerful and ready to help; in His all embracing purposes of mercy for mankind; that in Jesus Christ and Him alone have we a way of redemption. When the revelation of the blessed Father, through His Son, becomes a reality to us we shall have the courage which is required to meet the conditions of today. We need, indeed as a people, to make God a reality in daily life. Unless we do, not only will our pews be empty, and attendance on the meet-

ings of our Church organizations be slack, but we shall lack the courage or even the desire to attempt greater things.

Given His grace to see the tasks before us, we will soon realize that the way of their fulfillment must be through sacrifice. This was Christ's way. He won the victory, but came from it with His garments all dyed with blood. Faith must prove itself by sacrifice. Sacrifice is the characteristic of a Christian. He does not seek it, but he inevitably encounters it, and when he does, does not shrink from it. He endures it, he makes it, that God's will may be done. Christ for the "joy before Him endured the Cross"—the joy was the perfect obedience, the perfect service to God. There is supreme joy for the follower of Christ too in doing God's will through sacrifice. To seek sacrifice is unnatural, not human, but to bear it is Christian. How can it be possible that we can be true disciples of Christ unless we too climb some Calvaries? It is the sacrifice in our lives that proves us Christians. A Church in an ease-loving age forgets the sign it wears—the Cross. By what sacrifice does its members prove their discipleship? The Spirit of adventure depends on Sacrifice. When Christians become more careless about costs, more lavish in giving of self in worship, in prayer, in service, in tithes; the Spirit of venture will be unbound, and we shall do greater things for God.

It has been the glory of the Woman's Auxiliary, in the past to be to the whole Church as a city set on a hill. You, through your labors, your study and your prayers have been a living witness before the Church, to the Faith that inspires and to the sacrifice that wins for Christ. This is the equipment needed. Therefore go on in your work. God has greatly blessed you, and He will bless you through your faithful service.

Especially proud are we of our South Carolina Branch of the Auxiliary here represented. Not only have you done your share in carrying the witness of Christ to the ends of the earth but your great assistance in our benevolent institutions and in our missionary work in the Diocese is beyond praise. I thank you from the depths of my heart and pray God's richest blessings upon you in your deliberations in this Convention.

Noon-Day Meditation

Rev. Nathanael Peeples

In this Meditation Mr. Peeples brought out the very human character of St. Peter. How we can sympathize with the despairing

note in his remark to his companions, "I go fishing." After the terrible disappointments of the last week—back to his old life, with no object in it beyond procuring his daily bread. He brought out the various phases of his character, how that in naming him "Cephas—a stone," Christ had called him for what he certainly was not, but was capable of becoming. Now in this scene at the Sea of Tiberias, Christ puts him back in the old life in calling him "Simon, son of Jonas" (the fisher I used to know), Lovest thou me, more than these?" Peter answered showing that he was not able to ascend the heights of Love. "Yea, Lord, Thou knowest that I like you." Still with Christ's confidence in his capabilities, came the command, "Feed my lambs." The second time came the question, and again the answer showing that Peter had not yet grasped the significance of the emphasis on "Love." The command and the third question brought at last the answering spark in the heart of one full of doubt and despair, and Peter replied, "Yea, Lord, Thou knowest all things, thou knowest that though I cannot love you in the way you wish, I really more than like you." His vacillation and doubts overcome at last, and enabled him to become, "Cephas—a stone" one of the foundations of the Church; Christ Himself being the chief corner-stone.

Ways of Training the Church School Worker

Dr. Homer W. Starr

There is no more important work in the Parish, said Dr. Starr, than the education of its boys and girls, and oftentimes its adults too. The Woman's Auxiliary is giving Education, as it affects the children, some thought, as it for years has stressed that of its members. In the Church School, of great importance is its organization and administration, and one of the aids to this is a book on "Teacher and Pupil." The question comes up, why is it that in a great many instances the old Sunday School members turned out so well? Their teachers probably had no training at all. The same teacher may have had much better results with more training. If to their devotion and consecration, some training could have been added, what great things might have been accomplished?

How can we have trained teachers? It seems that each Rector has to produce them. The Institutes at Kanuga for teachers, is perhaps the best investment a Parish can make. There have been such Institutes held in Charleston, but the result was discouraging, as the older and experienced would come while those who

needed the training, the young, inexperienced ones, would stay away.

What can be done in your Parish? Perhaps a local training institute, but in many cases the Rector is not prepared for such a course. Now the Seminaries are stressing their preparation in this a great deal. Almost any public school teacher could give technical instruction in Teaching, and some principal of a high or graded school may be glad to lead a group of teachers. Another alternative is to have a class among the teachers themselves; appoint one as Chairman as you do your Study Classes, and let them lead in Organization, Curriculum and Teacher Training.

The Books suggested for aid in such a course are the following: "Church School Organization and Administration," by Leon M. Palmer. "Church School Ideals," (Morehouse Publishing Co.) "The New Religious Education," by Leon Palmer. "Creative Teaching," by John W. Suter, and "Training the Devotional Life," (Morehouse Publishing Co.) He also advised ordering from Dr. Tucker a copy of The Provincial Standard, in this Province.

The Church's Responsibility to Missions

Rev. W. C. Cravner

In speaking of this responsibility, Mr. Cravner said that, even now there are some intelligent Christians who are not wholly in accord with "foreign missions." But in this day of the elimination of time and space, they should realize that now there are no "foreign missions." So closely knit together are we, that often the Chinaman, African and Japanese are much nearer; touched in many ways by our civilization, is really more "within the bounds" than the man next door who disagrees with us on every subject. One may now say more fairly that they do not believe in the METHODS of foreign missions. Who really does? and much effort is being made to find more effective ones.

The Church's responsibility to Missions, is a mission to all mankind. For example it has a responsibility toward such college professors who depend for their satisfaction on humanism and teach it to their pupils. Through the years the Church throughout the world has been influenced by Greek philosophy; by the imperialism of Rome; by Orientalism, and also in cities of our own country, where various cults have found followers. Modern materialism has been influencing our religion. The Eastern habit of meditation has been adopted into our worship and become Christianized.

A few years ago the Church was working frantically for huge

sums of money to save the world by gigantic schemes. Now the trend is toward more willingness for self-sacrifice.

We have been influenced in every way by the kind of world in which we live, and on the other hand, Christianity has also exerted influence in all directions. It has influenced everything, hallowed everything, made life sacred everywhere. Though other influences have crept in, the Church has still the same transforming power in the world today. These days seem to be transition ones, like those after some of the great epochs of history. They are of vast importance, perhaps on the way to something greater than we have ever known. But it does not matter what kind of world it is, Christianity has still its hallowing influence.

We must never be carried to search for Truth. We must accept other sources of knowledge than religious ones. We must not fear skepticism, but have no right to become cynical. Many great scientists are reminding us of a great universe outside of our present knowledge, a realm containing human value, and needing religious intuition for its understanding, as well as scientific. Such men are never proud of loss of faith. The Church has a responsibility to develop scholars who can say to such men, 'We understand what you have been passing through in your thinking; but also we know in what we believe.'

The Church has a responsibility in giving. The Christian should be willing to give systematically and sacrificially. The responsibility of the Church's Mission is toward each individual, to touch each soul. Such was the example and teaching of our Lord. St. Paul in all his great work of organizing the churches, never forgot the individual.

Psychology has much to say about a center of reference. There is a change in the center of reference in a man when he turns to center his life in Christ. Is the center of reference of the Christian Church the ritual or what lies behind it? The Church's Mission is to make every man Christ-centered; then through the individual to make the gospel permeate all religions and cultures.

Quiet Hour

The Rev. Charles Jessup of Buffalo, N. Y.

In leading this Quiet Hour Dr. Jessup asked, should we have this hour during a busy Convention? and why is quietness of such value in our spiritual lives? The first thing of importance in any quiet time of Prayer and Meditation is that our bodies should be at ease

and we should be in some comfortable position, as little aware of our bodies as possible.

He then spoke of three phases of Quietness. 1st, the Value of Quietness; 2nd, the Purpose of Quietness, and 3rd, the Result of Quietness.

The Value of Quietness is very apparent to any student of the Bible. Our Lord spent forty days in the Wilderness (in quietness) in communion with God. St. Paul, the greatest of all missionaries, spent three years in Arabia, in Prayer and Meditation and planning future work. He spoke of many institutions having strict hours of silence, and suggest as a precept for young men, "He that cannot keep silent is not content with God." The voice of God speaks most often in silence. We are silent this morning, he said, listening for the voice of God. In times of silence we may, if we will, draw nearer to God. Our Lord and St. Paul are our examples.

The Purpose of Quietness is to draw near to Christ, the source of our strength. "In quiet and confidence shall be our strength." St. Catherine spent an hour a day in quiet meditation, when asked after many years what she found to meditate on, replied that she had not yet exhausted the first subject, "the Name of Jesus." Our Hymns are largely prayers. "Jesus, the very thought of Thee," a good example.

The result of Quietness. The result is strength, Spiritual strength. And the only way to learn this is to test it. "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." "As we are, we act." Sacramental Communion enables us to perform the task we have to do. He closed with the hymn, "Jesus, Name of Wondrous Love," and prayers for guidance in God's holy work.

Student Work in the University of Georgia

Miss Louise Starr

Although admitting that she was not at all averse to speaking in public, but that she was a little scared about speaking in her own "home town" and to her own people, Miss Starr spoke delightfully about her work among the students at the University of Georgia. She made the parents present realize what an important part of our church work this is, and wish that there could be such a worker in all of our Universities.

Her part of the student work is looking up and keeping in touch with all the Episcopal girls at the University, and also looking out

for those who seem to need some spiritual contact. Since this work started the enrollment has been doubled so that a worker's life is by no means an idle one. After meeting the girls comes the question of keeping them in touch with the Church. Religion goes on all the time, and though they are not interested in it, she finds them often most interested in "Prayer," "Life after Death" and "Right and Wrong" and she becomes the "go between" the girl and the minister. She is often asked astonishing questions. "Are you a minister?" "Do you teach?" and the astounding one, "Have you any children?" to which she answered, "Yes, forty-two." It is hard to meet the girls at first, and she calls on them, leaving cards, inviting them to "Come, let us worship together." Teas are another way of getting together. The Parish often gives a party where there are sometimes as many as eighty boys and as many girls. She has arranged so that a girl can sometimes spend the night with her. Anyone of us can remember the pleasure of that! In everything she tries to do what they do, plays with them as well as works with them. Has built up quite a Library for them. And she is always "at home" on Wednesday afternoon. Some church work is found that they particularly like. She has prepared some for Baptism and Confirmation, has a "Student group" and an Executive Committee, and an adult committee, each mother having the care of twelve or fifteen girls. Letter-writing is by no means the lightest part of her work, but the greatest part is after all just being like the girls themselves.

Discipleship

Mrs. Henry J. MacMillan

"This is a good time of year for a Convention, said Mrs. MacMillan. At the beginning of the year is the time to plan for new work and to check up on that done. After all, we have the same problems only under different conditions.

In 1930 Stanley Jones said, in his book, "Christ of Every Road" spoke of Christ being behind closed doors, and that we are "not using the spirit of power." There should be a committee to invigorate the Church Life. Dr. Jones said also, "We cannot go farther unless we go deeper." As Christ's disciples were "learners," as the word means, so must we all be learners. Discipleship is also a way of prayer, and we know so little of Prayer. We only know our petitions and perhaps a small part of praise. We are to have a school of "Meditation" which should be one of greatest benefit,

and we of the Auxiliary who know somewhat of this can be of great assistance in the starting.

Speaking of the "difficulties of Discipleship," she spoke of St. Matthew, who sat day by day "enmeshed in a system which was absolutely wrong," and saw the Gallean preaching and teaching. He overcame a great thing, a past, and followed Him. St. Thomas, the doubtful one, having overcome his obstacle, too, "followed Him." She spoke of the address of Dr. Frances Wei, who had grown into Christianity, how we too would share Christ's command. What is the great motive of the Woman's Auxiliary? It is an organization which gives us a chance to exercise our Discipleship.

Our U. T. O., which in a few places is only a collection, and so our members do not know the joy of the gift. Ours, to share with others as well as to enjoy ourselves. Our Finances should become more elevated, and consecration will make it all the easier.

Only by mutual sacrificial service will we be able to bring in the "Kingdom of God" and we must recognize "every individual as a Son of God." She closed with a quotation from Bishop Mikell, "Let us be close to Christ and forward with Him."

Reports

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Reverend Father in God, members of the Clergy, women of the Auxiliary, and visitors: It is a pleasure to greet you and to bid you welcome to this our 50th Annual Convention. May God's Holy Spirit guide our deliberations so that out of this convention may grow a deep feeling of our responsibility, and may each individual be fired with a new zeal to go forward with the work of our Lord on earth.

In reviewing the work of the past year, it seems that everything has run very smoothly, but this must not cause us to lose sight of the fact that there is always new work to be done. So let us be on the alert, ever pressing forward with zealous effort to do our part for His Kingdom.

My first official act as your president was holding a meeting of the newly elected Executive Board immediately after the convention at Prince George, Winyah, Georgetown. At this time the department chairmen were elected from the Board Members-at-Large.

The first two weeks after the convention were busy ones as I had the work of past Secretary as well as that of president on my hands. I got my material for the Year Book ready as rapidly as possible and met for a conference with the new recording secretary, who completed the necessary work of getting out the Year Book. A new feature of the Year Book was the list of Suggestions for Parish Leaders to be carried out month by month. This was the work of the Department of Religious Education and we hope it has proven beneficial to the parish presidents. I recommend that this be included in the Year Book for the next year.

I attended four district meetings in the Spring, at Hagood, Cheraw, Estill, and St. Stephens. At these I presented the matter of the special drive for subscriptions and advertisements for The Diocese. This was the project of the department of Publicity. The campaign was of much benefit to the paper financially, but did not reach the goal hoped for. We feel, however, that a fine start has been made, and bespeak a much greater support of this project in the coming year.

At the Spring district meetings the Presiding Bishop's Church-wide Endeavor was presented, as was also the matter of the deficit with the Whitsunday offering to be made for that purpose. A day of Intercession prior to Whitsunday was sponsored by the Woman's Auxiliary. As this was the last year of the Triennium, the U. T. O. was stressed at the Spring meetings and the custodians endeavored to give every woman an opportunity to share in this great offering and make it as large as possible before the presentation at Atlantic City.

During the year I have written many letters, and, with the aid of my efficient Corresponding Secretary, have sent a number of circular letters to the District Directors and the Executive Board members.

A strenuous effort was made to interest women in attending the Summer Conferences at Kanuga. The diocese was very well represented. I had the pleasure of being there for Auxiliary Day, at which time there was a meeting of one section of the Provincial Executive Board.

In September, it was my pleasure to visit the branch at Holy Cross, Stateburg, and make a talk; and also the embryo branch of young women of Holy Comforter, Sumter.

I wish to thank you for the great privilege that was mine in attending the Triennial Convention at Atlantic City, as one of your delegates. As your president, I had the joy of placing your United Thank Offering on the Golden Alms Basin. I feel, however, that

this should fall to the one who has worked for, and with, this fund during its accumulation—your United Thank Offering Custodian. It is my hope that this may be remedied before the next Triennial.

The deliberations of the Triennial will not be reported at this convention, having been so thoroughly covered at the Fall District meetings and also by Miss Anderson. The topics discussed will be used as a basis of study during the next three years. This Triennial was one of great inspiration and exhilaration and I was delighted that the diocese was so well represented by visitors, each of whom, I am sure, got a broader view of the work of the whole Church, and felt that her life was enriched by this great experience.

At Atlantic City I attended two meetings of the Provincial Executive Board, and also the Provincial meeting at which time the new president, Mrs. MacMillan, took office.

I attended three Fall District meetings, at McClellanville, Sumter, and Florence, and made a report on the Triennial Convention at two of these.

The Woman's Auxiliary cooperated with the Regional Conference Teams, sent out by the National Field Department, when these speakers visited four points in the diocese.

I was exceedingly sorry to receive in October the resignation of Mrs. Bruner as Supply Secretary. The Executive Board accepted it with great regret, and elected Mrs. C. S. Anderson to fill her place.

The Diocesan Executive Board held its regular meeting on November 9 and 10 with the Elizabeth Reynolds branch of Holy Comforter, Sumter, as hostesses. There were two business sessions and a Corporate Communion Service.

A general survey of the work, past and future, was made, and plans for this convention discussed, the arrangement of the program being left largely to the president. Certain recommendations from the Board will come up at this convention.

The Quiet Day of Prayer on November 12, was observed throughout the diocese. I am much pleased that this is to be continued.

I am very glad to report a new "B" Branch organized at the Church of the Advent, Marion, also the young women of Holy Comforter, Sumter, which becomes the "C" Branch in that parish.

Looking to the new year, I wish to recommend: 1, an earnest effort to interest the young women, the isolated women, and the uninterested women; 2, an eager support of the Church's Program and the Every Member Canvass; 3, holding an Institute for Training Church workers under the Department of Religious Education,

at least one in each district; 4. a never-ceasing effort to keep before the women the privilege of the United Thank Offering, that we may present, at its next Triennial an offering which represents truly the thankful hearts of all the women of our diocese; 5. an individual spiritual growth through prayer, meditation, Bible reading and study, and public worship.

ORANGEBURG DISTRICT

This District is composed of 8 Branches with a membership of 140, each working in all Departments. After lunch we had the pleasure of listening to Nurse Maud Callen, who spoke most feelingly of "my people" as she calls the colored people in and around Pineville, among whom she has been working for ten years.

The Fall meeting, also well attended, was held in Summerville. Bishop Thomas and all of the Clergy of the District were present. The Bishop spoke on the Missionary Attitude of the Christian toward the Church. Mrs. Skardon and Miss Cain gave splendid accounts of the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Atlantic City. The Offering at the two meetings was \$16.62.

I was installed as Director of the Florence District at the Annual Convention last January. I held the Spring and Fall District meetings, attended the Executive Board meeting in Sumter, and the Regional Conference in Florence.

At the Spring meeting held in Cheraw we had a good attendance. The Reverend Francis Craighill of Camden, spoke on the Sacrificial Offering. Mrs. Rembert, our Diocesan President, held a round table conference on Auxiliary work.

A very successful and well attended fall meeting was held at St. John's, Florence. We had reports from the Triennial by Mrs. Louis Simonds and Miss Carrington of Charleston. Another speaker was Miss Anderson, one of the Field workers of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Bishop, and Mrs. Rembert, our president, were also present. The meeting ended with excellent reports from all district chairmen.

The formation of a District Library was reported by the chairman of Religious Education. As this was one of the aims for the year I am most grateful to report it.

Our branches have reported sending donations to the Church Home in Charleston.

The report of the U. T. O. showed that the fall offering had in-

creased more than a hundred per cent making the total offering \$240.75.

I am glad to report the formation of a New Chapter, Section B, Advent, Marion, which is made up of the younger women of the Parish.

The work has been a great pleasure to me because of the fine cooperation I have received from the women with whom I have worked. Through their cooperation and with God's blessing may the work of the District accomplish better things this coming year.

GEOGETOWN DISTRICT

In January, 1934, the two Georgetown Branches entertained the Diocesan Convention.

The largest meeting ever held in the Georgetown District was held at All Saints Church, Waccamaw, in the spring with all branches represented. The Bishop was with us at this time and gave an enlightening talk on the budget and urged the Woman's Auxiliary to help with the Whitsunday Offering, which they agreed to do. The meeting ended with a delightful luncheon under the oaks at the old rectory.

Our fall meeting was held at McClellanville, where the branch of St. James' Church made us feel welcome and glad to be there. We had the pleasure of hearing our diocesan president, Mrs. Rembert, for the first time since her installation. She gave a most vivid description of the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary at the General Convention. Both of these meetings were helpful as well as being very enjoyable.

There has been a slight increase in membership in the six branches in this district during the past year, the total now being one hundred and one.

The five brancvhes report under the Supply Department having made 66 garments valued at \$39.50, and three joy boxes.

All branches sent clothing to the Church Home Orphanage, these being valued at \$52.25. Our branches really seem to enjoy doing this work for the Orphanage.

Five branches have paid their pledges to the Diocesan Treasurer and one branch has overpaid. The total sent in amounted to \$138.70. They have distributed literature and one branch sent 51 books to the Seamen's Home through the C. P. C. All report co-

operating with local agencies and with other church organizations.

Two branches have been doing inter-racial work and two rural work. St. Alban's, Kingstree, reports all eighteen members using the Churchman's Daily Bible Readings. Seven corporate Communions were reported by Chapter A, Prince George Church, Winyah, Georgetown. Four branches report participating in the World Day of Prayer: three in the Quiet Day on November 12, and two having a service of prayer for missions before Whitsunday.

The Publicity Department has not functioned as well as the other departments, but one branch secured six new subscriptions to The Diocese and \$15 in advertisements.

Four of our branches have held Lenten Study Classes, and the two branches of Prince George, Georgetown, invited the ladies of the Methodist Church to meet with them for their six Lenten Study Classes and many gladly accepted the invitation. The general attendance was excellent at these sessions. Only two report having Advent Study Classes, both using Mrs. Goodwin's outline, "The Victorious Life." All branches use the monthly programs published in The Diocese by Mrs. Prouty.

The United Thank Offering for the year was \$154.47, an increase of \$49.20 over the amount last year. St. James' Church, Santee, has reported under the Offering of Life Miss Maria Prentiss, who is now studying in New York.

There has been an increase of interest in the under-privileged, which seems to have resulted in more personal giving. The smallest branch, Prince Frederick's, Plantersville, having only seven members, as usual leads the district in doing for others. Two branches were given the privilege of clothing two families of children who had lost their mothers by death; in one of these families there was a three-weeks-old baby who was bountifully and daintily provided for: the amount necessary for this project was over subscribed. One branch reports cooperating with the parochial Christian Social Service Committee. We find the branches seem to like the new plan of giving to the Church Home.

Altogether the reports have been very gratifying.

I had the very great privilege of attending the first week of the General Convention in Atlantic City, and I feel that my life has been enriched by this wonderful experience.

In closing, I would like to thank the diocesan officers and the branches in our district for their help and cooperation. It is indeed a privilege to serve.

With the inspiration which we are sure to receive from these enthusiastic young women, we hope for great progress in Sumter District during the coming year.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

In reviewing the work of this department for the past year the Educational Secretary is glad to report progress along the lines of its objective. It has been the plan of this Committee to increase the number of program meetings of the Branches, to offer through The Diocese material and helpful suggestions for these programs, to encourage the formation of Advent and Lenten Study Classes, to distribute books and other educational material for the classes, to increase the interest in the attendance at the summer conference, to help in the formation of District Lending Libraries, and to inaugurate educational and religious work among the college students.

In 1934 the Committee continued its plan of publishing the educational programs in The Diocese. The Secretary prepared and published eleven articles and sent supplementary material and letters at various times to eighteen different Branches. A devotional program entitled "The Victorious Life" was prepared by Mrs. Conrad Goodwin and distributed to every Branch. An advance program for the whole year was published in the Year Book.

Sixty-seven Branches have reported 609 program meetings. This is an increase of 30 over last year's total of 579. There were 57 Lenten Study Classes, only an increase of one over last year, whose total was 56. The number of Advent Study Classes is this year set at 29. This is a decrease from last year when 34 classes were reported. But in several instances we noted on the charts that the various A, B. and C Branches had united to form one study class in their respective parishes, so that the smaller number of classes may not indicate a lessening of interest but an economy of time.

The sale of the Lenten Study Books was most gratifying. Altogether 105 copies were sold. This was an increase of 29 over last year's total of 76.

Hartsville, Florence District, reports work among the college girls, and while it was not included in the official form, the Secretary has heard of some work for college students in Charleston.

Orangeburg District reports 29 readers of books in the District Library.

At this time I wish to thank the Auxiliary for sending me to the Conference at Kanuga. It was an especially helpful and inspiring course, and I am grateful for the experience, the useful courses which I took, and the many contacts with outstanding leaders in our Church. I also wish to thank my Committee and all the members of the Auxiliary for their loyal co-operation and kindness to me

during the past three years and to say that I regard it as one of the great privileges of my life to have been able in a small way to have served the Auxiliary

REPORT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION FOR 1934

This Department is composed of six sub-departments, and I beg leave to make this report under these respective heads.

The Devotional Life

There were 78 Corporate Communions reported from the six Districts, with the average attendance varying from 2 to 25, and one branch reported an average attendance of 80%. The greatest number of Corporate Communions was reported by Section B of St. Luke's, Charleston, 9 and Chapter A of Prince George, Georgetown, reported 7.

Number of prayer groups, 17, with an average attendance varying from 6 to 10. There were no prayer groups reported from either Florence or Georgetown Districts, while St. Peter's, Charleston, led the list with 7, and an average attendance of 9. Reports of Prayer Partners include some names beside those sent out by Headquarters to be the District Prayer Partners. As I understand it, one purpose of having these Prayer Partners selected by Head-

quarters is to avoid overburdening with correspondence those missionaries who might be chosen by many branches. With the District Prayer Partner, the District Chairman of Missions and Church Extension is expected to be the one to correspond with the Prayer Partner, and to pass on to the Branches in the District the news which she receives. Please remember to pray for your District Prayer Partner at your monthly meetings, and at the District meetings, and I would also suggest that each District arrange to send their respective Prayer Partners a gift of money at Christmas as a token of their interest. Thirty-six were reported as using the Daily Bible Readings and 18 of these were from St. Albans, Kings-tree. The Bible Calendar for 1934-35, commencing with Advent, has been prepared by the Reverend D. A. McGregor, PhD., and can be obtained from the Morehouse Publishing Company for 8c each. If ordered by the hundred copies, perhaps less. The introduction "On Reading the Bible," is by the Reverend T. O. Wedel, PhD. Will not the Chairmen of Missions and Church Extension make an effort to enlist more users of this Calendar? Although there were none reported as using the Daily Bible Readings from Beaufort, the District Chairmen held a weekly prayer meeting service, and Bible study class at the homes of some poor people, which was well responded to, and she writes that both have become better Christians by this contact. The Auxiliary at Bluffton arranged for a Good Friday service, and the District Chairman wrote to the Branches of that District concerning a service on Good Friday. In reply, most of them wrote her that they would sound the Trumpet in their respective Parishes. Are there not branches in other Districts, where there is no resident minister, which can arrange for similar services of worship?

Beaufort District reported all Branches participating in observing the World Day of Prayer, The Quiet Day of Prayer in November, and the Day of Intercession for Missions. All of the Districts reported the observance of each of these Days of Prayer in some parts of the District. The Devotional Chairman, with the assistance of Mrs. Goodwin, Chairman of Devotional Life in the Charleston District, arranged for the Advent Study Class material, which was a beautiful study on the Victorious Life, arranged in four parts.

Rural Work

Rural work was reported by all Districts, but only Beaufort reported all Branches as doing Rural work. This report included teaching in Mission School, Mission Sunday School, visits made, magazines and papers distributed, assisting Health Department,

helping mountain family, helping in Berkley county, 2 joy boxes, secondhand clothing and food given, Sunday School for poor, teaching in Vacation Bible School. This last might be an opportunity for more members of the Auxiliary to do mission work. Can we not look out for such an opportunity this year? There were only 2 new members reported for the Advancement Society, but let us hope this is not a full report. Are we failing to meet our responsibility in this matter, or do we not understand that it is an opportunity of service, to secure new members of this old missionary society, thus helping to finance the Rural work going on in Berkley County? Please let us remember that our Bishop asked our help two years ago, and we have not near reached the goal set us at 3% of the membership of each Parish, as members of the Advancement Society. Remember, too, that these members include men as well as women, and are not limited to the women of the Auxiliary. I hope a special effort will be made this year, to secure new members of the Advancement Society.

Inter-Racial

Inter-racial work is reported by all of the Districts, and includes help in Berkley County, books to Arch-deacon Baskerville, hymnals given to colored church, clothing and papers and magazines, food given, visits made, entire care taken of one colored family, medicine and special food given to the sick, wedding clothes supplied for a groom, funeral of a colored woman taken care of and flowers furnished to the church at the time of the Bishop's visitation. Section B of St. Paul's, Summerville, reports having their regular inter-racial worker. At some, if not all of the spring District meetings, the Society for the Prevention of Lynching was told of, and the women given an opportunity to sign the declaration and pledge.

Foreign Born

Work among the Foreign Born reported from the Florence and Charleston Districts include encouraging the Foreign Born to participate in church work, 5 trays sent to the Seamen's home and Dental work for Greek children.

Mill Work

Mill work reported by the Charleston District was done mostly at St. Andrew's Mission; Orangeburg District reported that Section A of the Church of the Redeemer at Orangeburg paid tuition at Business school for one girl, and gave magazines for school work. The Pinewood Branch in Sumter District reported for the Fall Dis-

trict meeting, having visited mill people and invited them to attend church. Can not more of us emulate the example of this small Branch?

Twenty-six names of isolated women were reported, and Mrs. Guerry, Chairman of this in the Charleston District, invited all of the isolated women listed in her District. I hope the various Branches in the Auxiliary will try to get in touch with their isolated women, and secure their interest and assistance by God's Grace.

This year, may there be a deepening of the Devotional Life, and an effort made to have more women participate in worship and study. And may we be inspired by the Holy Spirit to pray, and work and give for the Extension of God's Kingdom.

OFFERING OF LIFE

To many of you, the names and work of those from our Diocese who have made the Offering of Life, are very familiar; to others, new in the Auxiliary, they are just names, their work little known. For the sake of the latter, a brief resume follows of our very own representatives in the field at home and abroad who have gone forth in His name.

Mrs. Patrick Gilmore, with her two small children, has just left this past week after furlough at home. As Lila Stroman, she went from St. James, McClellanville in 1925 to teach in China, later marrying the General Treasurer of our Missions in Shanghai.

Our veteran though young missionary, Alice Gregg, plans to return on furlough this spring after six years away. There will be an individual loss to any who miss hearing personally her own story. Consider the size of China, and realize that she has been Secretary of Religious Education for the Episcopal Church for all of China, teaching, organizing, writing, translating, cooperating with other denominations, and being begged for by the Anglican Church as a loan for a year in recognition of her superior achievement! Miss Gregg will return by way of England in order to do some special speaking in training colleges and parishes.

Most of you have seen or heard of the golden Alms Basin presented by England to be used for the United Thank Offering at each General Convention. How many know that the Alms Basin used at the Communion Service this morning, together with a verse from the Bible, bears this inscription: "Presented by Alice Gregg, Diocese of Anking, China to the Woman's Auxiliary Diocese of South Carolina, 42nd Annual Convention, Charleston, S. C., January 4th, 1927?"

A new daughter was born in the past summer to the Jenkinses in the Philippines. The July Spirit of Missions carried a graphic account by Dr. Jenkins of the scope of his work, the new hospital half completed, of past gifts, the ever present needs, the joy of working in that field.

Caroline Gillespie is filling her first charge at Roseboro House, Edgemont, N. C. Her duties of teaching and carrying on the religious and social activities will be lightened by our interest and support.

Sarah Louise Starr will tell of her work at the University of Georgia as one of five Episcopal Student Workers among college girls in this country. We feel she is well equipped for this and follow her undertaking confidently.

Agnes Hickson and Maria Prentiss have repeatedly requested

that their appreciation be expressed to you for making it possible for them to serve as Summer Volunteers in Virginia Missions. Both are now at St. Faith's in New York preparing for vocations in some phase of Church work.

A few, by making the Offering of Life, give their whole time, thought, all, in our Master's service. The need is for more of us, particularly the younger ones, without necessarily going into a mission field, to feel the call to give more unreservedly, willingly, joyfully, of their youth, enthusiasm, and selves in all contacts at home, at work, at play, to the same great end.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

During the past year I have prepared material for twelve issues of The Diocese. This has included articles from the parish branches, reports from the triennial and diocesan conventions, reports of district meetings, articles from several of our departmental chairmen, and timely notices. There has been a marked decrease in the number of branches sending in reports, the 25 reports received being sent in by 9 branches.

Immediately upon publication I distributed 249 copies of the Year Book to our diocesan, district, and parish officers, to provincial and national officers, and to the clergy of the diocese; later through

orders and at the spring district meetings I sold 60 copies, a total of 309.

The major enterprise of the department this year has been the campaign for increasing the circulation of The Diocese and for securing additional advertisements for the paper. The goal set was 400 new subscribers and \$100 in new advertisement. Every branch was asked to make during the month of May a thorough canvass of its parish in order to solicit renewals and new subscriptions. In cases where the directions were followed there were excellent results. These cases were the exception rather than the rule, the large parishes on the whole being decidedly un-cooperative. We have therefore fallen far short of the mark, having secured only 83 new subscribers and \$54 in advertisements. In spite of this rather disappointing result, however, the editor feels that the campaign has been a real help for in addition to the wider circulation, the improved financial condition of the paper has enabled him to increase the size of the publication from eight to twelve pages. We may feel therefore that we have made a beginning and, if we put forth real effort, will attain our objectives.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

In submitting this report of the Department of Christian Social Service, it is rather difficult to sum up the acts of kindness and good deeds that have been done by the women, in the Church during the past year, because spiritual giving and doing can never be measured in terms of figures.

The happiest and most successful piece of work accomplished under this department the past year, was our giving, each month, groceries, vegetables and money, regularly, to the Diocesan Home for Ladies in Charleston. You will remember, last year our attention was brought to the Home, and each District was given two months to supply groceries. This plan worked fine only there was an over supply of some articles and not enough of others. So, at our last Executive Board meeting, at the convention at Georgetown, the Board adopted a resolution that we consider the Church Home again this year, but the list of groceries that was actually needed to run the Home on for the month, be divided among the Branches, and given each month throughout the year.

From this plan, the Home really has been, not only helped materially, but financially. Bishop Thomas says it has been a tremendous help to the Diocese. In one District, the women were so anxious to be 100 per cent in their giving to the Home, that they got together and gave what one inactive branch could not give.

All Branches are asked to continue giving their donations through February, when you will receive further directions from the Christian Social Service Committee.

The Beaufort District reports visits to hospitals, county homes, orphanages and jails, and 224 visits to individuals. Gifts of trays, clothes, flowers, medicines, magazines and layetes for infants were given. All branches have given money or groceries to the Diocesan Home. All Branches cooperate with other organizations, giving money or donations to aid in their work.

The reports from the Florence District include numerous visits to Hospitals, Orphanages and individuals. Many gifts of medicine, food, school lunches and books given to Industrial School for Christians, Garments to Church Home Orphanage—Christmas Boxes—for six weeks, dinners sent to sick and burial expense provided, amounting to \$50. Groceries sent to Diocesan Home.

The Sumter District reports visits to individuals and institutions, magazines, puzzles, etc., taken to jails, T. B. Camps, Alms House. Also clothes and fuel sent to needy families, besides regular visits made and flowers, trays, etc., taken to hospitals and individuals. All branches in this District sent their donations to

Diocesan Home all through the year. Also, all branches helped with the Orphanages, not only with the regular sewing under Supply Department, but by gifts of money, clothes, etc.

The Georgetown District reports numerous visits to hospitals, county homes, orphanages and jails and 254 visits to individuals. The two branches at Georgetown report splendid work, each having a parish social service committee, chapter A cooperating by giving money. Clothing to children and families and two layettes given. Both these branches with the branch at Plantersville gave donations of groceries to Diocesan Home. Plantersville supplied 25 dinners, 30 nourishments, 6 baskets of fruit, 12 quarts of milk, clothing and medicine to the needy.

The Orangeburg District reports numerous visits to different institutions, besides a great many visits to individuals. Gifts of money, food and clothing, bedding and medicine given abundantly to poor in county and town. Chapter B, Orangeburg sends two outfits a year to a child at the orphanage, also Christmas boxes to five children. Summerville, Chapter A reports gifts of 109 garments, 16 pairs of shoes, fruits, flowers, medicine given needy. Shut-ins taken to ride several times, also books and magazines given to them. Chapter B reports eye glasses given a boy, and money given for school lunches and books. Pinopolis reports a supper served to the Seaman's Home and regular donations of groceries to Diocesan Home. One branch reports having a Christian Social Service Committee. All branches in this District give to the Diocesan Home.

The Charleston District reports 1,480 visits to hospitals, jails, orphanages and 548 visits to individuals. Nine branches cooperate with parish Social Service Committees and seventeen branches report giving donations to the Diocesan Home. This district, being the largest one in the Diocese, reports a splendid out-pouring of gifts of money, clothing of every description, food, and good deeds, too many to be mentioned.

For the betterment of the work in this department, I strongly urge more reading on this subject and especially recommend the book "Christianity at the Crossroads" by Percy Dearmer. Also, you may obtain from 281, 4th Ave., New York, booklets and pamphlets on different phases of Christian Social Service Work.

Let us remember that Jesus, Himself, came into this world "not to be ministered unto, but to minister," so we, as his disciples are to carry on the work He has given us to do.

ADVANCE WORK

Again there is little to report as to our Advance Work Project, there having been no concerted drive for funds during the past year. As was reported last January our pledge of \$3,000 for a rectory at Salome Field, Arizona, has been paid in full, the rectory built and in use.

The payment of \$100, which was placed on our 1934 budget for Advance Work, brings the amount given on our pledge of \$2,000 to help with the Church building at Holbrook, Arizona, up to \$481.89. This leaves a deficit still to be raised of \$1,518.11.

Let us not forget that, lacking the funds which we promised them, the congregation at Holbrook, in order to complete their Church building have gone into debt. And so this unpaid pledge of ours should rest heavily on our minds and hearts until every cent has been raised.

REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

Jan. 1, 1934, to Jan. 1, 1935

The work of the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese from year to year is naturally, or should be, systematized. The magazines and books promised should be regularly forwarded by the donors, with, a personal letter or word, at least once a year. The parish secretary should keep a record of all who contribute regularly and the number of miscellaneous magazines, books, scrapbooks, etc., sent to various institutions and individuals, and at the end of the

year fill out report blank sent her by the Diocesan Director, who from these reports sends the account of the work done in the Diocese to the executive secretary of the Church Periodical Club at the central office in New York. Unfortunately, these simple rules are not always carried out, and the following report does not cover all the work accomplished by the Church Periodical Club in the Diocese of South Carolina.

We have twenty-seven parish branches on our list; of these 14 have returned the filled out report.

With the exception of four branches, I know that all the others are carrying on the work of the Church Periodical Club in their parishes through the Woman's Auxiliary or other organizations.

Often books and magazines are sent to the Director to distribute; and it has been my privilege to pass on a valuable work of Dr. DuBose's to one of our young clergymen—a new novel for which there was a request to the Kuling School in China—one year of "Good Housekeeping" to Charleston County Library—several books of fiction to the Seamen's Home, as well as jigsaw puzzles and used packs of cards. Two or three parties sent me their old Christmas cards, which I took to two ladies at the Diocesan Home who made them over for distribution at the Roper Hospital and elsewhere. A collection of pictures for a scrapbook was added to those of social welfare workers for a poor child's Christmas. A yearly subscription to a magazine has been sent to an old lady near Pendleton for several years. A request for a Bible for the Church of the Ascension at Hagood was forwarded to Miss Mary E. Thomas, who has served as Executive Secretary of the Church Periodical Club for over twenty years; and she promptly sent a very good copy to that grateful congregation.

At the last annual convention of the Woman's Auxiliary in Georgetown I promised Miss Caroline Gillespie a subscription to a magazine for her work in the mountains. Last May the secretary of the Church Periodical Club of the Holy Cross, Stateburg, sent me a dollar which I immediately sent to Miss Gillespie; but have never heard from her. In the August copy of the Diocese, I asked that the other branches follow out this plan, which would mean so much to our mission worker in her lonely field. Six branches have sent the one dollar asked by your Director to assist with the expenses and special appeals of the Church Periodical Club in this diocese; and two parishes sent contributions of \$5.20 and \$1.25 respectively for the library of St. Paul's University, Tokyo.

In September last, I received through Miss Sallie Rembert of Sumter, whom we remember so pleasantly, an appeal from Okajima, librarian at St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan, for maga-

zines to be sent continuously; enclosing a list of twenty-six magazines from which to select. It was a great regret to me that I had no funds to send him a subscription, but wish someone could answer this urgent call.

It was a great disappointment to your Director not to attend the General Convention and the meetings of the Church Periodical Club which are held at that time. None of the parish secretaries were present, but Mrs. Albert Thomas, our Bishop's wife, kindly represented our diocese at some of the conferences.

In concluding this, my fifteenth annual report, I ask that all members and friends of the Church Periodical Club make the first Sunday in May each year, a day of remembrance; praying especially at the Holy Communion that the workers may have faith and perseverance, and the work be a means of bringing many into the Kingdom of God.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Believing as we do that our work for the World-wide Mission of the Church lies in following the departments of the National Council to which we are an Auxiliary body, we realize that the plans of each department must be carried out in the parishes to the very best of our ability.

There are some things which I would call to your attention for special emphasis:

1. Keep up an earnest effort to interest the young women, encouraging them to form chapters under their own leadership; the isolated women, keeping in touch with them and urging their attending district meetings; the uninterested women, inviting them for especially good programs and by personal evangelism.
2. Engender an eager support of the Every-Member-Canvass and the Church's Program.
3. Put forth a never-ceasing effort to keep before the women the privilege which is theirs to share in that great United Thank Offering, that we may present, at the next Triennial, an offering which truly represents the thankful hearts of all the women of our diocese.
4. Secure a copy of the Minutes of the Triennial Convention and make a study of the resolutions passed. The topics discussed will be made the basis of study during the next three years in the diocese.
5. Hold a Service of Installation of newly-elected parish officers each year. Where there are two or more branches in a parish all officers could be installed at one time. A leaflet with Service of Installation will be furnished by the president.
6. Encourage the reading of Church periodicals and books, especially some of the newer ones on Religious subjects. Suggestions: History of Religion by Gowan; An Outline of the Old Testament by Bishop Wilson; Portrait of a Carpenter by Winifred Kirkland; Let us Pray by Winifred Kirkland; The Secret of a Quiet Mind by Dr. Bunting. Buy a book and pass it on. Use the Lending Library at 281.
7. Hold an Institute for training Church Workers under the department of Religious Education—at least one in each district.

8. Co-operate with the Bishop in the "Forward Movement" which is to be presented in February. This is a plan for an organized effort to reinvigorate the life of the Church and to rehabilitate its General, Diocesan, and Parochial work.

9. For Spiritual Development, study the meaning of absolute dedication of the whole self to Christ and His Church, and the use of meditation and silence.

During this year 1935, let us work with enthusiasm and go forward with Bishop Remington's challenging words as our motto: "Plan to do more than you can do—and do it."

It is a vital force in the life of The Church, offering a program of daily service for the building up of the kingdom."

The spirit which we wish to cultivate, to nourish and feed through our organizations and Church Life in the District this year is the spirit which will bring about a real recovery and manifestation of Spiritual Resources. Mrs. James Roosevelt, the mother of the President is among those Church women who have expressed their belief that this is the world's great need. She says, "During the past year we have been greatly occupied with industrial, agricultural, and other forms of material recovery, but recovery of wealth and wages is not enough. There are spiritual ideals and moral values which are far more precious than gold. I rejoice most of all in the belief that we are on the eve of a great recovery of our moral and spiritual resources." None can hasten this recovery better than Churchwomen, who through religion in the home, daily prayer and Bible study, a regular attendance at Church Services, especially the Service of Holy Communion, and Love and Fellowship for others, build up the things of the spirit, deepening their own spiritual lives, and the lives of others. This is what we wish to keep before us in this District through the year, in all of our meetings and work.

Miss Winifred Kirkland, the author of The Great Conjecture; the Portrait of a Carpenter and other books expresses the power and influences which the development of a corporate Spiritual Life of Prayer would have upon the world. She says, "Might not we who trust God—and only God—bring to the vast problems of the present all the resources of our personal Prayer Life? In a great concerted uplifting of our hearts and our hopes to the highest for His aid, might not we women, who call ourselves Christ's, change the course of history today, even as John and Peter and Mary Magdalene, and all the others of those humble bands, changed the course of history 2,000 years ago? Prayer is Power. They used it. So may we." There are so many things of worth and promise which we have neglected, some small and some large, that we wish to discover anew in our work and life together this year.

Among the immediate aims we would have the various chapters in the District enlist the women of The Church who are not active in the work of the Auxiliary. Where attendance is impossible the interest and prayers may be secured, and information may be imparted to them about the Life and the Work of the Auxiliary. United Thank Offering Boxes might be placed in their homes, which once understood, offer an almost irresistible appeal.

The work of the past year, the cooperation extended, the contacts made have been a source of gratification and joy. We look forward to a better year through our work together in His Name. Praying

God's blessing upon our work in the District and everywhere.

Departmental Work For 1935

WHY DEPARTMENTS

The question is often asked, "Why do we have Departments?"

The National Council of the Church has found it a better and more business-like way to carry on its work. Because we are an auxiliary to the National Council and because our work is similar to its work, we are similarly organized.

The six departments of the National Council are the Departments of Missions, Religious Education, Christian Social Service, Finance, Publicity and the Field Department.

Because, first, last, and all the time, the Woman's Auxiliary has helped in the Mission Field at home and abroad, we, too, have a Department of Missions. But people must be educated and trained, not only to be missionaries, but also to be intelligent "missionary-minded" church people and so we have a Department of Religious Education.

And then there are those right here in our midst, as well as in foreign and heathen lands, who are more unfortunate than ourselves. They may not be so much in need of Christian teaching but they do need a helping hand. Therefore, the Department of Christian Social Service.

Because none of this work can be done without funds we have a Department of Finance; and because the more people know about a thing the more they will do for it, there is a Department of Publicity.

The Field Department helps to keep all the others linked up with one another. Perhaps it sees that much of the literature gotten out by the Publicity Department for the other four Departments is distributed to every member of the Church. Or, at another time it may furnish speakers, or canvassers to assist the Finance Department in raising funds to carry on all the work.

But someone is sure to ask what happened to the boxes which the Woman's Auxiliary used to send to missionaries and their families, to mission schools and hospitals. The "Box Work" has not been forgotten or neglected. The Supply Department is one which the National Council does not claim but it is a very important Department of the Woman's Auxiliary. By means of the Supply Department the Box Work is carried on more efficiently than ever before in its history.

Speaking of the Finance Department brings up another business-like procedure—the Budget. Again we are following the lead of

the National Council in the adoption of a Budget. The Budget is made up by the Finance Committee and consists of an estimate of the amount of money needed to carry on our work for one year.

Try to get the uninterested women to attend the Lenten services and Study Class.

Try to make contacts with the Foreign-born, inviting them to Church services and the children to Church School.

Educational Program—Our Missionaries: Alice Gregg. If you have not done so, send to your Convocation Supply Secretary for your allotment of sewing.

Have a report on the rural work of your District. Plan for active work in this field.

Have Publicity Chairman tell briefly of The Diocese, how supported and edited, and why it should be taken by every Church family. Explain our Auxiliary page and how we can co-operate with the Publicity Department. (See Year Book).

Give notices and post bulletins on Summer Conferences

Plan well ahead for the Day of Intercession for Missions on the Wednesday before Whitsunday, urging more women to participate.

June

Inquire into the needs of your Church School and co-operate with your Rector and Superintendent by supplying teachers and by having your children prompt and regular in attendance.

Make lists (1) of all boys and girls of the Parish away at school, with their addresses; (2) of all Episcopal students at any boarding school or college within your parish.

October

Work for a good representation at Fall District meeting.

Arrange for your Orphanage work.

Have the President of your parish Y. P. S. L. visit you and tell of their activities. How can you help them?

Have a report on the Prayer Partner and arrange a contribution from the branch to the Christmas gift to be made to her from the District.

November

Educational Program—General Programme of the Church.

Have your Field Chairman offer to your Rector the services of the Auxiliary in preparation for the Every Member Canvass.

Make plans for your Advent Study Class and for the Quiet Day for Prayer, Armistice Day, November 11.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THOSE INTERESTED IN INTER-RACIAL CO-OPERATION

Mrs. C. P. McGowan, 5 St. Michael's Place, Charleston, Chairman;

Mrs. E. E. LaRoche, John's Island; Miss Annie Keels, Rembert; Mrs. William Cain, Pinopolis.

1. Form a group of white women who are willing to do Inter-racial thinking. Begin with a few, possibly only three, and invite others as they are found to be interested, not curious.
2. Get a book to read, either when the group meets, chapter by chapter, or by passing from member to member. T. J. Woofter's "Basis for Racial Adjustment," Ginn & Co., Atlanta, Ga., is a good, practical work, planned for use in colleges and schools.
3. When the group is sufficiently interested, invite the State Chairman to organize a group of colored women, after which the two groups may meet and work together for betterment of conditions in the community, along lines of schools, or housing, or recreation, justice in the courts, etc.
4. From the very beginning interest can be shown in personal ways; in helping the sick, etc. A Bible class was organized in Spartanburg by Mrs. W. P. Carr, and has grown amazingly, and accomplished much good.
5. Chairman of the State Inter-Racial Committee, Mrs. C. P. McGowan, 5 St. Michael's Place, Charleston, S. C., will be glad to co-operate with any interested group, either by correspondence, or by going to the community.

One of the most valuable lines of work is in sending negro workers, or those who wish to do Social Service work, to one of the summer schools. I have two workers who have had three terms each at the Presbyterian School in Columbia. These two girls have been sent with money appropriated by the Episcopal Auxiliaries in South Carolina. Each now has a certificate.

The Committee on the Offering of Life exists for the purpose of contacting missionaries at home and in the foreign fields; of keeping the women of the Church informed of our representatives on the Church's firing lines that they might establish personal, friendly relations with them; of supplying information and a helping hand to those interested in entering some activity of Church work—be it Summer Volunteering, Student Work, Christian Social Service, or some phase of Mission Work; and to encourage others in taking this step.

Instead of having a sub-chairman in each branch, it is the priv-

ilege and responsibility of the individual in every auxiliary to be on the watch for young people or others who are interested or thinking of one of the above as a temporary or life work, then reporting it to one of the Committee, who have been selected with the view to their accessibility to different sections of the Diocese.

THE UNITED THANK OFFERING

Let us concentrate this year on interesting more women in that ideal means of expressing their thankfulness to Our Heavenly Father for His many gifts, both large and small—the United Thank Offering! Many may know of the United Thank Offering without realizing its significance for them, personally. We want to create an atmosphere in which the Offering will be considered an expression of thankfulness rather than a collection of money.

In every Parish there are women to whom the United Thank Offering is very dear and to whom it means many possibilities for the growth of the Church and for the spread of Christ's Kingdom at home and abroad. The promotion of the United Thank Offering is the responsibility of such women. It is not possible for the Custodian and her committee to reach every woman in the Church. The responsibility must be divided between them and this group of interested women who should form a "Committee-at-Large." A Custodian can accomplish many things but without the aid of this

larger group, the best of plans will fail. A personal visit and heart to heart talk will often accomplish what can never be done by meetings, speeches or letters. There are many groups to be approached and each requires its own method. There are the easily interested and the completely disinterested groups, invalids, business women, rural women, women with young children and those too busy to attend meetings.

Both the Custodians and this "Committee-at-Large" should never forget that an intense interest in the Kingdom of God is a prerequisite for real interest in the United Thank Offering. Consequently, they must endeavor to deepen the spiritual life of the whole Parish. As an outgrowth of a deepened spiritual life, the stewardship of each individual's resources—time, effort, money—will be emphasized. On this foundation we can build the interest of the Parish as well as the individual in the United Thank Offering.

By building up interest and gaining new givers, we indirectly accomplish the other aim—the increasing of the amount of the Offering. With a larger Offering we can not only stand back of the workers now in the Mission Field who are supported by the United Thank Offering; but we can also go further afield and obey His last command, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

The Department of Publicity has no work of its own to promote and yet it is of great importance for it exists to help the other departments and to serve the church as a whole. It is indispensable as an inspirational and educational medium. The chairmen of Publicity—diocesan, district, and parish—should therefore be constantly on the alert to see that the department performs its important function. The following suggestions will be found helpful:

For Parish Chairmen:

1. Report meetings through local papers.
2. Report to Diocesan Publicity Chairman, items of interest for publication in The Diocese. Send in by the 15th of the month.
3. Increase subscriptions to The Diocese and The Spirit of Missions and to the other Church papers. Keep a list of the congregation and check those who are subscribers to them.

4. Keep accurate record of number of subscribers to the different periodicals.
5. Order leaflets from the Church Missions House for use by your department chairmen.
6. If you have a public library in your community, see that subscriptions to leading church papers are given to them. If individuals will not make these subscriptions, have the branch to do so, then those unable to subscribe can read them in the library. Their presence will help to make our Church known to others.
7. Clip items of interest from Church and secular periodicals and call attention to them at regular meetings of the Auxiliary.
8. Keep an accurate record of information that will be asked for on annual report so that the blanks may be filled in fully and correctly.

For District Chairmen:

1. Report any matters of general interest in your district.
2. Send in the report of your District meetings and copy of program as soon as possible. Stale news is no news.

The promotion of The Diocese which was the outstanding project of this department during the past year is again to be considered our chief objective in 1935. Every branch is asked to have a canvass of its parish during the month of May so that every family in the diocese will be given an opportunity of subscribing to our diocesan paper. Remember that we have only gone a short way towards reaching our goal of 400 new subscribers and \$100 in new advertisement. With a well-planned, systematic campaign, there is no doubt of success.

Suggested Outline of Work

"In His Name," this Department offers to all Branches a suggested, practical outline for sewing or supply work.

1st. All Branches and Associate Members are eligible for this work.

2nd. The Supply funds, also the allotment of work, is apportioned to each of the Convocational Secretaries, according to the membership of the Convocation.

The Convocational Secretaries purchase all materials and distribute work to the Branches, at their request. Patterns, thread, etc., are supplied wherever needed. If not requested, they are not sent, because they have often been returned, in the past.

All finished work is returned to the Convocational Supply Headquarters at a time specified by the Secretary when she distributes the sewing.

N. B. Allotments for work are now sent out from Headquarters in New York in July, and all personal boxes for Missionaries and their families are completed by Christmas. Boxes for Institutions, for which sewing is done during Lent, must be completed and reports returned to the National Secretary by May 1st. Therefore, the Branch Supply Secretaries are urged to see that all sewing is completed and returned to the Convocational Secretaries before April 15th. By so doing, they will enable the Convocational Sec-

retaries to pack and ship the boxes to their proper destination and send in reports to the Diocesan Secretary, who, in turn, must report to the National Secretary by May 1st.

4th. Convocational Secretaries should correspond at once with the Missionaries for whom, or for whose Missions they are working, to let them know that their needs are being cared for.

Branches should hold a program meeting on the field to which they are sending their boxes. This will supply the direct personal touch that is so necessary to secure the intelligent interest of all women in the Auxiliary. Available information is being sent to each Branch for this purpose, and additional articles will be found in *The Spirit of Missions*, and other Church magazines.

5th. All personal boxes must be filled according to the furnished lists.

No secondhand clothing is allowed to be sent in the personal boxes.

6. Because of the great number of local calls for secondhand clothing at present, this is being distributed by the Christian Social Service Department in each Branch. Any secondhand clothing to be sent through the Supply Department should be sent direct to the Diocesan Supply Secretary—not the Convocational Secretary—to be used for Missions and Institutions at home and abroad. It should be clean and in good condition before it is shipped to Diocesan Headquarters in Sumter.

7. Branches will not receive credit through the Supply Department for any box work that has not been done at the request of the Supply Department.

8. The Church Home Orphanage at York is the mutual care of both Dioceses. Each Branch and individual member of the Auxiliary considers it a privilege to contribute to the comfort and happiness of these children.

Funds set aside in the budget of each branch for Orphanage work will go farther, and provide more clothing for the children, if used to buy material for sewing, wherever possible, than if used to purchase ready-made garments only. It is therefore suggested that the Branches do this sewing every fall, as the other Supply sewing is done during Lent. This spring, the amount of sewing is small

compared with other years, so perhaps the Branches can use some of their sewing time for Orphanage sewing also, in addition to the other, during the spring of 1935.

Allotments for Orphanage work are sent out by the Orphanage Supply Secretary, Miss Duvall, Cheraw, and should be reported to her.

9. Sewing done by the Branches and Associate Members will be credited as cash on the books of the Convocational Supply Secretaries. Illustration: If we spend two thousand dollars for materials, etc., and do five hundred dollars' worth of sewing, the Diocese will receive credit for having given two thousand five hundred dollars, through its supply department, for the Mission of the Church during the current year.

10. The National Supply Department has issued the following list of valuation for the garments, etc., that are placed in the boxes. By using this list as the standard value of the making of each article that is made for the boxes and adding to it the cost of the materials required, each Diocese will be enabled to report the value of its Supply Work on the same basis.

11. A Parish having on hand extra or partly-worn Altar linens, furnishings, vestments, etc., and willing to give them away, is asked to do so. But before sending to the Supply Secretary, who will place them where most needed, it is requested that they be cleaned and repaired.

The following are the measurements for the linen:

Altar Cloth—Varying sizes.

Corporal—22 inches by 24 in finished—hem $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

Purificators—11 inches by 11 inches, finished.

Covers for Credence Table—28 in. by 28 in. finished—hem $2\frac{1}{2}$ in.

Pall— $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. by $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. finished.

Fair Linen—Varying sizes.

Standard of Values

These figures are based on estimates received from the East, West, South and Middle West from which we have struck an average. They, plus the cost of material, will necessarily be higher than those for many garments now on the market which are made in large quantities in factories and in many instances in sweat shops.

ORPHANAGE SUPPLY WORK

The close of 1934 brought out the great increase in the number of garments needed by the Church Home Orphanage. With the decreased budget of the Diocese, the Home looks to the two South Carolina Dioceses for practically all the clothing for 120 children; therefore the suggestion has been made that each Branch of the Auxiliary make some provision in their budget for this cause. The Spring list will be sent the District Supply Secretaries the first of February and the Fall list about the 1st of October, which will allow six weeks in which to get the garments to the Home. This plan has been carried out so successfully in the past, that the same system will be used during the coming year, and it is hoped that our work will be carried forward with the same splendid enthusiasm. If the Branches will report the VALUE of the garments sent, when they report the number of garments sent to the Secretary, it will be a great help in making out the annual report.

For the one to Kanuga, each District Chairman is asked to suggest the name of some one who shows possibilities, and an interest in Missionary Work, the final choice to be made by the President. The one for Colored Worker will be used by the Bishop to send some capable and intelligent girl to a Training School where she may study such subjects as will make her a useful worker for the uplift of her own people.

ADVANCE WORK

When, in 1929, the Advance Work Program of the whole Church was launched by the National Council, the Diocese of South Carolina undertook a project of \$5,000 for forward work in Bishop Mitchell's Diocese of Arizona: \$3,000 for a rectory at Salome Field and \$2,000 to help finish the Church at Holbrook. This project was to be completed by Epiphany, 1931.

The rectory, built and paid for, has been occupied for over a year by the Rev. and Mrs. Edmund T. Simpson, missionaries in the Salome District. Mrs. Simpson, in a very appreciative letter last winter, told what a comfort and joy the new rectory is to them after having occupied for six years a small, poorly heated shack on the desert. The house, of mission type, is built of adobe bricks (made right in the yard by Mexicans), with stucco inside and out, thus insuring warmth in winter and coolness in summer. It has a sleeping porch over the bed rooms, a study, a large living room, and a garage attached with a large loom room at its rear, and even a real guest room. This has been furnished, a symphony in pink, by the Diocese of Maryland. Now when they return with the Bishop from long trips on cold rainy nights, they find a cozy home awaiting them with a blazing fire in the wide fire-place. This is constructed of native granite in a mosaic effect with specimens of various kinds of ore from nearby mines. "There is so much cheer in the living room," she says, "that the people love to come and see us nowadays."

In a recent letter she tells something of how the work goes on in the Salome District. They have now two deacons, with whose help she and Mr. Simpson take chare of eight mission stations scat-

tered over a large area. In spite of the many miles of desert roads to cover; lack of funds, and of buildings in which to hold services; the loss by cyclone and fire of two out of their three church halls; the suffering among the people from unemployment; these two elderly missionaries with their two assistants are struggling bravely against great odds to continue the services at all the stations, to carry God's message, and to minister to His needy children. And they are progressing, for in the last year they have started a new mission some miles away, in a thriving little community where at the Christmas celebration the entire community of over 200 were present. Under the leadership of the two deacons several new Sunday Schools have been organized and several troops of Boy Scouts formed. "Mr. Simpson has been appointed the Red Cross distributor of clothing for the entire county and, if you were to look in our garage, you would think we were running a dry goods shop," writes Mrs. Simpson.

The other work she tells about is the weaving done by the women of the Harqua Hala Industries, where beautiful bags of all types, and other articles, are made, on which are depicted the scenery of the surrounding desert and mountains; and the wood-craft carried on by the men. Exhibits of their handicraft are held at Phoenix and elsewhere, and some income is derived from the sale of the various articles.

The Church at Holbrook, which constitutes the other part of our project, has been at last completed and consecrated. (See Report of Advance Work in 1934 Year Book). Bishop Mitchell writes that, when this Church was being planned, a Canadian woman said very plaintively, "Let us have at least one beautiful thing made by man in Holbrook; and, if it can be to the glory of God, so much the better." "I think we have met the requirement," the Bishop adds. He goes on to tell us that in neither place is the work among Indians. At Salome it is among the desert people, small miners, small ranchers, but primarily among ex-soldiers, graduates of our veterans' hospitals, who have been told they must live in this wonderful climate, if they are to live at all, who have gone out on the desert and have established homesteads. Their condition right now in many cases is tragic, because so many of them have lost what little compensation they were receiving from Uncle Sam. You would probably be shocked to learn that they find young burros very good eating, and the County Agent has shown the women how to can the meat for the future.

"Holbrook is a county seat, a small town in the midst of an enormous territory. There are a number of wholesale houses there, and some forty-seven different star routes go out from the post-

office. It is a jumping off place into the Mormon country from which, when we are up to it in man power and resources, we may be able to send out a missionary by having him in residence in Holbrook."

But let us remember that the people have gone into debt to finish the Holbrook Church because, of the \$2,000 we promised, only \$481.89 has so far been raised. So although there is to be no concerted effort this year to raise funds, for this work, we must realize that it remains an unfulfilled pledge and hence a sacred responsibility resting on each individual. I urge the women of the Auxiliary throughout the Diocese to take this project to heart, to work for special and personal contributions toward the fund and to remember it constantly in their prayers. Further, I suggest that each Branch have a Chairman of Advance Work to keep alive the interest of the members in this matter.

DIOCESAN COSTITUITION

(As amended in Convention January, 1935)

Article I—Name

The name of this Association shall be the South Carolina Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Article II—Object

The object of the Association shall be to carry out within the Diocese of South Carolina the three great aims of the Christian Church—Missions, and Church Extension, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service.

Article III—Membership

Section 1. The Bishop and Clergy of the Diocese shall be ex-officio members.

Sec. 2. The Association shall be composed of those women who, being by baptism members of the Church, are actively engaged in any department of her work.

Sec. 3. Women who are not yet baptized may be admitted to associate membership, and shall be known as "Auxiliary-Co-Workers."

Article IV—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a President, six District Directors, a Secretary, a Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, a Supply Secretary, and an United Thank Offering Custodian.

Article V—Organization

Section 1. This Association shall be organized along the lines of the National Council, and shall be authorized to establish the six Departments already provided for by that Council as well as to add new departments at its own direction.

Sec. 2. The executive Board shall be composed of a President, six District Directors, a Corresponding Secretary, who shall be appointed by the President; an Educational Secretary, the Secretary of Supplies, the Treasurer, and United Thank Offering Custodian, and six women, three from each Convocation, elected annually by the Diocesan Convention from the membership at large.

Sec. 3. The Board shall organize from within its membership the following departments, and shall determine the scope of the work of each Department:

1. A Department of Missions and Church Extension.
2. A Department of Religious Education.
3. A Department of Christian Social Service.
4. A Department of Finance.
5. A Department of Publicity.
6. A Field Department.
7. A Supply Department.
8. An Orphanage Supply Department.

The Board shall have the power to organize such sub-departments as the work may demand.

Sec. 4. Each Department shall have the power to appoint additional members of the Department, who shall have seats and votes in the Department.

Sec. 5. The President shall be ex-officio a member of each Department.

Section 6. The Executive Board may also enact all necessary By-Laws for its own government and the government of the several Departments as well as for the government of the South Carolina Branch, subject to the provisions of the National Council of the Church and of its National Auxiliary.

Article VI—Meetings

Section 1. The Diocesan Branch shall hold an Annual Convention, preferably in the month of January, alternately in each convection, exact date to be decided by Bishop and Executive Board.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held during the first week in November and immediately before and after the Annual Convention, as well as at such other times as the Executive Committee may deem necessary.

Sec. 3. Nine members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called at the discretion of the President or upon the request of five members of the Board.

Sec. 5. Five members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 6. District meetings shall be held twice a year, preferably in the Spring and Fall.

Article VII—Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Convention of the Diocesan Branch by vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been previously given to every Branch.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Elections

Section 1. All officers and Board members, except the District Directors, shall be elected at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 2. District Directors shall be elected by their respective Districts, at the Semi-annual meeting held in the Fall.

Sec. 3. Delegates to the Provincial Synod and Triennial Convention shall be elected at the Annual Diocesan Convention just preceding the respective meetings of those bodies.

Sec. 4. No officer nor Board Member at Large shall serve longer than three years consecutively in one office.

Sec. 5. Candidates for the offices shall be nominated by informal ballot, the two receiving the largest number of votes for any office being considered candidates therefor. Any candidates receiving a majority vote on the nomination ballot, on motion, shall be declared elected.

Sec. 6. Candidates for the six members at large shall also be nominated by informal ballot, the twelve receiving the largest number of votes being considered candidates therefor.

Sec. 7. A formal ballot shall then be cast and the candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared elected.

Sec. 8. Members of the Board shall remain in office until their successors are elected. The president shall have power to fill any vacancies that may occur. The Bishop shall appoint to fill a Presidential vacancy.

Sec. 9. The Educational Secretary shall be elected in January to take office the following September.

Sec. 10. A corresponding Secretary shall be appointed by the President.

Article II—Duties of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. The President shall preside at all Annual and Executive meetings and shall have power to appoint Convocational Supply Secretaries and Chairmen of Triennial Specials, and shall have the general supervision of the work throughout the Diocese.

Sec. 2. The District Directors, shall arrange for and preside over the District Meetings; shall appoint Department Chairmen for their Districts; shall endeavor to establish a Branch of the Auxiliary in every Parish and Mission, and shall have the general supervision of the work in their respective Districts; shall collect and tabulate annually the report of all the Branches in their Districts, and shall send detailed Department reports to each Diocesan Department Chairman one week previous to the Convention. The District Directors shall give full reports of the year's work at the Annual Convention.

Sec. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes for all Diocesan and Executive Board meetings; prepare the Year Book for publication, send out all Report Blanks and Convention Calls. The Corresponding Secretary shall carry on all necessary correspondence.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all money contributions, except the United Thank Offering, from the Parish Branches and forward them to their various destinations. She shall keep an accurate account of same, and closing her books on December 31st, make a report at the Annual Convention of all receipts and disbursements. She shall be Chairman of the Department of Finance.

Sec. 5. The Secretary of Supplies shall obtain allotments from the National Secretary of Supply and distribute same in proportion to the Convocations, and shall, from the budget apportionment, meet all expenses connected with this Department.

Sec. 6. The Educational Secretary shall be chairman of the Department of Religious Education and shall suggest topics and compile programs for the use of the Parish Branches.

She shall also arrange for Lenten Study Classes and lead Educational Conferences at District Meetings and at the Annual Convention,

Sec. 7. The purpose and claim of the United Thank Offering shall be brought before all the women of the Church by the United Thank Offering Custodian. She shall receive all offerings semi-annually.

The United Thank Offering Custodian shall be a member of a Committee on the Offering of Life.

Section 8. A Chairman of the Committee on the Offering of Life shall be appointed by the President, whose duties shall be to endeavor to arouse an intelligent interest in the Offering of Life and part or whole time volunteers. She shall also keep in personal touch with all missionaries who have gone out from our Diocese.

Sec. 9. Each Department Chairman shall make to the President annually, and at such other times and in such forms as she may require, a report of the work done under its direction.

Sec. 10. The Department of Missions and Church Extension, shall arrange, through its Devotional Chairmen for all Advent Study Classes.

Article III—Committees

Section 1. There shall be four Standing Committees: Executive Committee, Finance Committee, Program Committee, and Inter-Racial Committee.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Officers and Department Chairmen, and shall have the power to transact such business as may be necessary between meetings of the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. The Finance Committee shall consist of the Treasurer and two other members at large appointed by the President.

Sec. 4. The Program Committee shall consist of the Educational Secretary and two members at large appointed by the President.

Sec. 5. The Inter-Racial Committee shall consist of three or more members of the white Auxiliary appointed by the President and an equal number of members of the colored Auxiliary appointed by the President, which committee is to meet for conference purposes only at the call of either President subject to the approval of the Bishop.

Article IV—Fiscal Year and Diocesan Apportionment

Section 1. The fiscal years shall be from January 1 to January 1.

Sec. 2. The Diocesan support from each Branch shall be voluntary but based upon the suggestion from the Department of Finance

Sec. 3. Church women who are not connected with any Parish or Mission in the Diocese or in whose Parish or Mission there is no branch of the Auxiliary may become Auxiliary associates by contributing in any way to the work of the Auxiliary.

Article V—Representative Body of the Annual Convention

Section 1. Each Parish and Mission Branch of the Auxiliary shall be entitled to two votes, provided it sends two delegates. If there are two or more sections in the Parish or Mission Branch each shall send a delegate, one vote shall be cast by each delegate.

Sec. 2. The Clergy and members of the Board shall be entitled to vote.

Sec. 3. Visiting members of the Auxiliary shall be granted a voice but not a vote.

Article VI—Auditing Committee

Section 1. The books of Treasurer and the United Thank Offering Custodian shall be audited by the time of the Annual Convention.

Article VII—Amendment

The By-Laws may be amended at any Convention of the Diocesan Branch by a vote of the majority, due notice of the proposed amendment having been previously given to each branch.
