Constitution and By-Laws.

Adopted at the Annual Meeting at Hillsboro, May 7, 1901.

CONSTITUTION.



ARTICLE I.

Name.—The name of this Association shall be “The Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman’s Auxiliary to the Board of Missions.”

ARTICLE II.

Object.—The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Southern Ohio, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Woman’s Auxiliary, viz., : Daily prayer for Missions, the study of Missions, and Systematic Giving for Missions.

ARTICLE III.

Membership.—The Church itself is the Missionary Society. Every baptized person is a member of that Society. All women, and all parish societies of women, in this diocese, willing to carry out the purpose of this Association, shall be considered members of it.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers.—The officers of this Association shall be the Bishop, a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Box Secretary, a Secretary of the “Junior” and “Baby” Branches, a Treasurer, and a Treasurer of the “United Offering.”

These officers shall also constitute the Executive Board of the Association.

ARTICLE V.

Duties.—**SEC. 1.** The Executive Board shall, subject to the Association, direct the active work of the Association, and have power to adopt by-laws for the Association.

SEC. 2. The Bishop, when present, shall preside at meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board.

SEC. 3. The President shall be elected at the Annual Meeting next before the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive full terms. She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan officers, except the Vice-Presidents, to serve for three years. She shall call meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, and shall, in the Bishop's absence, preside at them. She shall exercise a general supervision of the work and further it in every way by her interest and advice, and especially by an address at the Annual Meeting.

In case of a vacancy in the office of President, the Vice-President of the Deanery of which the previous incumbent was a resident shall perform the duties of the office until the next Annual Meeting, when a President shall be elected to serve for the unexpired term.

SEC. 4. Each Vice-President shall be elected immediately after the Annual Meeting, by the members of her own deanery, to serve three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive terms. Such an election shall be held, and a temporary vacancy in this office may be supplied, by a deanery meeting on call of the President. A Vice-President, with the approval of the President, may, in her own deanery, appoint any other deanery officers and prescribe their duties. She shall, in the absence of the Bishop and President, preside at all meetings in her own deanery. She shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing local organization and work in her own deanery.

SEC. 5. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Executive Board and of the Annual Meeting. She shall conduct all correspondence of the Association and of the Board, except as provided for in Sec. 6 of this Article. She shall also make an annual report of the work done from data furnished by the other officers.

SEC. 6. The Box Secretary shall receive and distribute all information relating to missionary boxes, and shall report annually to the Secretary the work done.

SEC. 7. The Secretary of the "Junior" and "Baby" Branches shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, promote each of these interests by local information, visitation and organization, and shall also report in full to the Annual Meeting.

SEC. 8. The Treasurer shall record, receive, disburse, and keep account of all money distributed, except that from the United Offering; and shall also make an annual report of the same.

SEC. 9. The Treasurer of the United Offering shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, promote this interest locally by

correspondence or visitation, and shall report annually the amount in hand, and forward the triennial offering.

ARTICLE VI.

Meetings.—SEC. 1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of this Association. Every parish branch may send three delegates, including any executive officer; and every mission branch one delegate.

SEC. 2. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five officers shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 3. Deanery meetings may be held on the call of the deanery officers.

ARTICLE VII.

Mode of Election.—SEC. 1. In the election of a President any delegate may nominate; all nominations must be written; all elections must be by ballot, and each Parish or Mission shall cast but one vote.

SEC. 2. Executive officers, unless delegates, shall neither nominate nor vote.

SEC. 3. Unless there be an election by a clear majority on the first ballot, the Chair shall declare the two names having the largest number of votes, and subsequent ballots shall be upon these two names until a majority vote is reached.

ARTICLE VIII.

Amendment.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates at any Annual Meeting, notice of such proposed amendment having been given at the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

1. The Annual Meeting shall be held on the day before and at the same place as the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

2. The Order of Business at any Annual Meeting shall be :

- (1) A service of Holy Communion.
- (2) Roll call.
- (3) The annual report of the Secretary.
- (4) Report of the Secretary of the "Junior" and "Baby" work.
- (5) The annual report of the Treasurer.
- (6) Report of the Treasurer of the "United Offering."
- (7) Report of the Correspondent C. P. C.
- (8) The President's address.
- (9) Pledges for new year.
- (10) New Business.
- (11) The election of President.
- (12) Minutes.

3. Parish election of delegates shall take place during the month preceding the Annual Meeting, and be immediately reported by the local Secretary to the Diocesan Secretary.

4. A Central Expense Fund of \$300 should be provided for printing, postage, stationery, and traveling expenses of officers and speakers. Towards this fund the Cincinnati Deanery is asked to contribute \$150, the Columbus Deanery \$90, and the Dayton Deanery \$60, according to an apportionment to be made by the several Vice-Presidents; this to be the first payment made to the Diocesan Treasurer.

5. Local receipts for the United Offering shall be remitted to its Treasurer in April and October, except triennially in September.

6. The accounts of the Treasurer and of the Treasurer of the United Offering shall be audited and certified in the printed annual report of the Association.

7. The annual report of the Diocesan correspondent of the Church Periodical Club may be printed in the annual report of this Association.

8. An Intelligence Committee of three persons, one for each department of missions—diocesan, domestic, and foreign—may be appointed by the Executive Board when necessary.

9. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at any regular meeting of the Executive Board.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

In presenting to you a summary of the work accomplished during the twenty-seventh year of the Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, our first word must be one of regret, at the loss by resignation of two of your diocesan officers, Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Anderton. The Auxiliary, particularly the Columbus Deanery, is to be most heartily congratulated on having at hand one who could so ably perform the duties of Vice-President, Mrs. A. N. Whiting. As yet Mrs. Anderton's successor has not been appointed, the President and Vice-Presidents performing the duties of Junior officer until this very difficult selection can be made.

From the whole diocese fifteen new branches are reported, of which ten belong to the Junior and Baby work. They are distributed as follows:

Seven in the Cincinnati Deanery—at St. Philip's, Cumminsville; at Holy Trinity, Madisonville; at the Church of the Resurrection, Fern Bank (Jrs.); at Holy Trinity, Hartwell (B. B.); at the Church of the Nativity, Price Hill (Jrs.); at St. John's Mission, Cincinnati (B. B.); and at the Church of the Epiphany, Cincinnati (B. B.)

Six in the Columbus Deanery—at St. John's, Columbus; at Trinity, Columbus; at Trinity, Columbus (B. B.); at Trinity, Bellaire; at Zion, Dresden (Jrs.); and at Trinity, Newark (B. B.)

Two in the Dayton Deanery—at St. Mary's, Waynesville (Jrs.); and at Trinity, Hamilton (St. Agnes Guild, Jrs.)

The unanimous opinion that the machinery of our organization moves with more smoothness than last year inspires the hope that it may some day move with perfect smoothness. We would reiterate the special points to be remembered:

Keep in touch with your Vice-President, especially by reporting to her as well as to the Diocesan Secretary your election of officers and any change of officers during the year.

Pay all moneys, except for the United Offering, to your Treasurer, Miss Sherlock, and pay these moneys promptly, according to the calendar at the back of the printed report.

Keep your Box-Secretary informed promptly and accurately of your box-work.

Making an advance of \$828.21 over last year's work.

Our greatest gain has been in the value of the box-work done, an advance of \$880.05. Our greatest loss has been in the offerings resulting from the Lenten Missionary meetings, which fell short of last year's by \$381. The greatest disappointment of the year has been the very meagre attendance at these meetings. We are glad to note a continued increase in the work of the Church Periodical Club, 5 more regular and 951 more odd magazines having been sent than last year.

As is generally known, a special plea has been sent out from the Church Mission House for larger gifts to General Missions, \$1,016 being the apportionment of our diocesan branch. As our gifts to General Missions during the year have amounted to \$808.21, there seems every hope that we shall pay our full quota before next September.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Again my first word must be one of earnest congratulation to you upon the completion of your year's work; not only because the total result is larger than it was last year, but chiefly because much of the work has been carried on in the midst of discouragement and drawbacks. Take, for instance, the case of one Mission which two years ago had a Branch of 12 or 15 members; by death, removals, and other causes, this number was reduced last year to 2. One of these has since moved away, and the Mission has been closed; but the remaining one, nothing daunted, decided to do the best she could by herself, and before the year closed sent a generous contribution saved from her earnings, by which the Central Expense Fund, Diocesan Missions and United Offering were enriched; proving that, with her, Auxiliary work was no spasmodic effort, but a deep-seated principle in her heart. Should we all follow the example she so bravely set us, there would be neither paucity of numbers in our parish branches nor a depleted treasury in the Board of Missions. On every side we see evidences that our Parish Branches are more and more spiritualizing their work, putting it above a mere sewing society, attended for the sake of social enjoyment, and the splendid result of the box work of this last year proves that the more we know and pray the better and more numerous will be the material things sent to brighten the lives and ease the heavy burdens of our representatives in the field. The slight falling off in our money contributions has undoubtedly been due to the fact that last year unusual demands were made upon us; but does not the mere fact that those demands were so easily met, prove to us our ability to rise to larger and more generous giving? The Treasurer of the United Offering has told you of the rapid increase in that branch of our work, and of the splendid results she looks for at the Triennial Meeting in 1904. Our last year's gift of nearly \$500 towards the appropriation of the Board has this year grown to about \$800, but this still falls over \$200 short of our share of the \$100,000 asked for from the Woman's Auxiliary. Remembering always that we are Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, can we not unitedly undertake some work in which we can have a personal interest and still help the Board in its appropriations. If our Sister Diocese of Ohio can pay the entire salary of Dr.

Glenton in the Woman's Hospital in Shanghai, cannot we undertake part at least of the Rev. Wm Jenkin's salary in Alaska, and thus prove to him that we are not unmindful of the self-sacrificing work he is doing? We again urge renewal of all former pledges with the reduction of the \$1,600 Diocesan pledge to \$1,500. This is with the approval of our Bishop; the Diocese having come into possession of the bequest of the late Mr. Rufus King, by which the salary of the present Archdeacon and also that of an additional one are secured. Will you not make a greater effort to pay Diocesan and Scholarship pledges more promptly; the former quarterly whenever possible, and the latter in time to enable the Treasurer to forward them at Epiphany? We also urge more generous contributions towards the work in our new possessions. The splendid reports from all of them should incite us to greater effort and larger gifts that the Church may be enabled to take her stand, where she rightfully belongs, as the leader of the religious life of the world. Owing to the unavoidable resignation of our Junior and Baby Branch Secretary, that branch of our work has not developed as we hoped it would, although nine new societies with over 100 members prove that something has also been done in that line; the majority of these, however, being formed too recently to show any results for this year's report. Mrs. Anderton brought to her work a genuine love for it, and a consecrated spirit, which made her presence felt at all times; but continued ill health forced her to give it up, and it is with deep gratitude we acknowledge our indebtedness to her. Her successor has not yet been appointed. Now that these Branches are growing in numbers and becoming a more fully organized branch of our work, would it not be better for them to undertake some special work of their own instead of sharing in the pledges of the Woman's Auxiliary? For instance, the education of a child of one of our missionaries in Japan, the cost of which is \$50, and which would also assist the Board in its appropriations; or the support of a child in the Cuban Orphanage, which can be done for \$75. The cry from Cuba is one of the most pitiful and persistent that reaches our ears, and in the words of the Secretary of the American Church Missionary Society, "The American soldier has done a splendid duty in Cuba, the American citizen the same, and now let the American Churchman rise to the full measure of his responsibility, and having received political freedom, let him now give her the truth, which shall make her free indeed." It was with deep regret that we accepted the resignation of Mrs. John G.

Mitchell as Vice-President of the Columbus Deanery. Wise in counsel, deeply imbued with the true Missionary spirit, when her resignation became obligatory, we felt that a thick cloud had overshadowed us; and while it was with deep reluctance we let her depart from the Board, it was with confidence that we held out a welcoming hand to her successor, Mrs. A. N. Whiting, and now having the unwavering interest and assistance of both, feel ourselves rich indeed. In addition to the enlarged work of Juniors and Babies, 5 Branches of the Auxiliary have been either newly formed or revived; but we shall not rest content until every baptized woman in Southern Ohio has, at least, had the opportunity of doing her share of Auxiliary work. For in the words of the Rev. Dr. Lloyd, "The mission of the Woman's Auxiliary is to be the Interpreter of Christ to men." Now, we know that an interpreter is the transmitter of the mind of one to another, without which there would be neither sympathy nor understanding between them. So you see at once the lofty ideal set before us. As soldiers of Christ, made so at our baptism, we are to stand ready at all times to give prompt, unquestioning obedience to every order, and as servants of Christ we are to be ever watchful of the interests of our Master, serving Him with loyalty and devotion. As human friends unconsciously grow into the same mould of thought and mind, so are we to grow into the likeness of our Elder Brother, reflecting His life and character. And as that life, from beginning to end, was the expression of love for men, manifesting itself in every possible way and under all circumstances, from His sharing in the joy of the wedding feast at Cana until that awful moment on Calvary when He laid down His life for men, so are we, at all times and in all places, to reflect, be it never so dimly, that spirit of love and self-sacrifice which animated Him. The sphere of action of each one of us is more or less limited, and our gifts vary according to His bestowing; but, wherever there is the willing mind, there is always something to be given. With one, it may be time; with another, wealth; with this one, social influence; with that, the gift of sympathy, etc.; but He takes them all and uses them in his service for "the love's sake found therein." Such, my friends, being our glorious privilege to co-operate with Him, let us devote ourselves with renewed consecration to the service of One whose last act was the stretching out of His sacred arms to draw all men unto Him."

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB.

The Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club presents her annual report to be read before the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio. She finds, in looking over previous reports, that she has used the word *approximate* in regard to her figures quite frequently, and wishes there was another word that would stand for its meaning. She is obliged to repeat that her reports have never been perfectly accurate, as she has never been fully informed of the amount of work done, money contributed, or number of magazines and papers sent. She asks the librarians, who have given such enthusiastic and faithful service in the cause of the C. P. C., to remember that the annual report of the Correspondent must be compiled from reports received from them, and which will enable her to return complete figures.

It is encouraging to find that we have not fallen behind in the good work of the C. P. C., and, as stated, this report presents an *under* rather than an *over* estimate of what has been accomplished in the way of supplying reading to our clergy, institutions, and lonely neighborhoods. Let the Correspondent also suggest that the donors of magazines and papers can do much to cheer and encourage those to whom this reading is sent (perhaps a missionary in the far West, remote from cultivated companionship, or an educated woman who eagerly reads the books not otherwise obtainable, and then passes them on to others equally appreciative), by sending them a bright and cheery letter from time to time bidding them God speed. The Correspondent has received most interesting, sometimes pathetic, letters of acknowledgment from persons in widely separated parts of the country, all bearing testimony to the blessings conferred by the senders of good reading matter. The Rev. Mr. Jenkins, of Alaska, is most grateful for an abundant supply of reading, furnished chiefly by his friends in Southern Ohio, for his reading room

in Ketchikan. A young soldier in the Philippines writes how eagerly a box of magazines was welcomed by himself and his fellows, and so on. In closing, the Correspondent would recall to your minds the words of commendation of Mrs. Irwin in her report of 1902 in regard to the work of the C. P. C., in which she urges united interest and effort in its behalf.
