ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

We hereby present the 45th Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio.

During the past winter there have been four Executive Board meetings and four Convocation meetings, one in the Cincinnati Convocation, two in the Columbus, and one in the Dayton Convocation. An unusually good attendance marked all of the meetings.

In the Cincinnati Convocation the response to the new Supply work has been very good, and to the Emery Fund and the United Thank Offering generous. The Interparochial Auxiliary, which meets the first Friday evening of each month, is doing good work and filling a long-felt want. The Vice-President reports one disappointment, in finding that the educational work has been undertaken by the Church Service League. The Auxiliary should retain this essential work, and it is hoped that mission study classes may be started in the fall. No new branches have been developed in this Convocation.

In the Dayton Convocation a very interesting meeting was held in Dayton in the interest of the Emery Fund. All of the parishes of the city were represented and a spirit of co-operation shown which would be valuable to obtain throughout the Diocese. The Convocation meeting held at Urbana on October 27th was well attended. At this meeting Mrs. Clayton H. Randolph was elected Vice-President to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. George Ozias.

In the Columbus Convocation one meeting was held at St. James Church, Zanesville, on November 10th, and a second meeting was held at St. Paul's Church, Chillicothe, on November 12th. At both meetings the attendance was unusually good and much interest was shown in the work for the coming year. Three new branches have been formed in this Convocation, one at the Church of Our Saviour, Galena, one at St. John's, Cambridge, and recently a branch has been organized at All Saint's Mission for the Deaf, Columbus. At the first meeting of this, our newest branch, Mrs. Wells spoke, through an interpreter, to 45 women, all of whom took the United Thank Offering boxes, and each has promised to make one article for the Supply Department during the summer. The eight branches of the Auxiliary in Columbus all worked for one object, a hospital in Wusih, China. When the work was completed a corporate service was held to dedicate the box, Bishop Reese preached and the clergy of all the parishes had a part in the service. Such a corporate act makes us feel that we are not separate branches of the Auxiliary, but the Auxiliary working together for one great cause.

There are now in Southern Ohio 76 branches of the Auxiliary, 29 in the Cincinnati, 28 in the Columbus, and 19 in the Dayton Convocation.

The first report of the Church School Service League shows a decided gain in the value of the box work. In making the report the full value of the boxes cannot be given, as 14 schools which sent articles for the boxes have sent no report of the value of their work. 39 schools have worked for boxes this year with a reported value of \$635.71. Last year 15 branches of the Junior Auxiliary sent boxes valued at \$301.00. From this comparison it would seem that the new plan, in point of figures at least, has proven successful. Boxes have been sent this year to Bethany School for Girls at Cape Mount, Liberia; the Industrial School at Mayaguez, Porto Rico; and to St. Thomas' School, Point Hope, Alaska.

The report of the Box Secretary shows an interest and co-operation in the new plan which promises well for the future. The total value of work for the year is \$5292.96.

In submitting the report of the United Thank Offering the Treasurer wishes to urge upon the members of the Woman's Auxiliary the importance of getting a "Blue Box" into the hands of every woman in every parish, no matter to what organization she may belong. The spring offering for 1920, reported by the former Treasurer at the annual meeting in Columbus in May amounted to \$2837.34, the fall offering to \$2612.78, the interest on the spring offering amounted to \$46.88, making a total for the year of \$5497.00.

The Educational Secretary has received reports of only nine regular mission study classes held this winter in the Diocese. This is a very small number that can be explained in part by the fact that the Cincinnati Convocation tried out a new plan of educational work. In November, a two-day institute, or training school for speakers, was held at the Cathedral House, and special instruction was given on the various phases of Church work. Twenty-two of the women who attended the Institute enrolled in the "Speakers' Service Corps," thus signifying their willingness to speak on some phase of the Church's task wherever and whenever asked to do so. Only the parishes in Cincinnati can answer as to how far they have taken advantage of the "Speakers' Service Corps." Excellent as this plan is, it should in no way interfere with our usual mission study classes, and we hope that next year there will be the old interest and earnestness in studying the Church's Mission. The classes which were held this year show one excellent feature, the enrollment of many new people. One of the eight parishes which reported last year never having had a class, had one this Lent. Columbus had a very successful interparochial class, with representatives from five different parishes, and this was followed by two parish groups. Now is the time for us to be

making plans for more and better educational work next year, and an excellent opportunity for developing leadership presents itself in the Gambier Conference. As Auxiliary women we ought to be urging our parishes to send as many men and women as possible to receive the inspiration and practical suggestions to be gained at such a conference.

The end of the first year shows such a splendid interest and co-operation throughout the Diocese that we come to the work of the second year with renewed courage, trusting humbly that in some measure we may follow the traditions of the past of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio.

MINUTES OF THE FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING

The 45th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio was held in the Church of the Advent, Cincinnati, on May 11th and 12th, 1921. The meeting opened with a corporate communion at 10:45 A. M. About 350 were present at this service. Bishop Reese was the celebrant, assisted by the Rev. George C. Dunlop, rector of the Church of the Advent. Bishop Reese gave an address in which he gave us as our charter the "Comfortable Words" of the communion service. This is the method and motive of all missionary effort, and we can share in the church's mission in a spirit of thanksgiving and humility through work, study, giving and prayer. Power is given through the communion service, in the heart of which is found the charter of the Woman's Auxiliary,—"God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, to the end that all who believe in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

At the close of this service luncheon was served in the parish house.

The business session was called to order by the President, Mrs. Wells, at 1:45 P. M.

Mrs. Lee, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of the Advent, gave us a cordial greeting.

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on Credentials, which showed that 128 delegates representing 52 parishes had registered.

The annual report of the Secretary was read and approved.

Mrs. Hubbard, Diocesan Treasurer, then submitted her report, which in totals read as follows: Balance, \$826.18; Receipts, \$1595.14; Disbursements, \$1565.56; Balance December 31, 1920, \$855.76. This report was accepted on motion.

The report of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Van Keuren, shows a total of \$8676.91 on hand. Mrs. Van Keuren urged constant and systematic giving in a spirit of sacrifice if we are to reach our goal.

Mrs. Fullington gave a report of the work of the Supply Department, showing a value of \$5292.96. She also told of the work of the Seamen's Institute, and asked that we help meet their needs by working for them during the summer months.

Mrs. Wells then appointed two committees, one on Resolutions, the second on the Discretionary Fund. Mrs. Herron, Chairman; Miss Katherine Anderson, Miss Eshelby, and Mrs. Brown formed the Committee on Resolutions; Mrs. Stanley Matthews, Chairman; Mrs. Loose, Miss Lucy Matthews, Mrs. Monsarrat, and Miss Tuite constituting the committee on the disposal of the Discretionary Fund.

Mrs. Wells gave her annual address, giving us first of all a

greeting cabled from Singapore by Miss Elizabeth Matthews. Mrs. Wells urged support for the growing work of the Supply Department, and asked our help in the passage of the Sheppard-Towner Bill, and placed before us our responsibility in raising the moral standards of women today. A resolution was submitted to be acted upon at the next day's business session.

Mrs. McGregor, Educational Secretary, told of the value of the Church Conference and urged us to attend the Conference to be held at Gambier this summer, and Mrs. Fullington spoke a few words in behalf of the Racine Conference.

The Rev. Mr. Cowley Carroll of Hamilton spoke of the Nation Wide Campaign as fundamentally the unification of the whole work of the Church of God by which we may gain a vision of faith and service to meet the challenge of the needs of the world today.

Mrs. William Scarlett, Chairman of the Emery Fund, reported a total of \$1606.40 on hand. Encouraging reports give promise that Southern Ohio may contribute generously to this Thank Offering for the 50th Anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The afternoon meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Flinchbaugh.

In the evening at eight o'clock a reception was held at the Bishop's House.

On the second day, May 12th, the meeting was opened with a corporate communion at 7:30 A. M., the Rev. G. C. Dunlop, celebrant. Breakfast was served in the parish house to those who attended this service.

The business session opened at 9:45 with a report on the Constitution, given by Mrs. Reade. The amendments to the articles of the Constitution recommended by the committee were acted upon separately.

It was moved that Article 1 of the Constitution, as amended, be accepted. Motion carried.

A motion was made that Article 2, as amended, be accepted. Motion carried.

A motion was made that Article 3, as amended, be accepted. Motion carried.

A motion was made that Article 4, as amended, be accepted. Motion carried.

A motion was made that Section 3 of Article 5, as amended, be accepted. Motion carried.

Mrs. Wells then spoke of the value of the corporate communion service and urged that we, as an Auxiliary, use this service more often.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was then given by the Chairman, Mrs. Herron. These resolutions were acted upon separately. The adoption of Resolution 1 was moved. "That the Executive Board be instructed to act upon the reports of the Treasurer, the United Thank Offering Treasurer,

and the Supply Department Secretary immediately following the close of our fiscal year and publish a report of same along with the names of all Diocesan and Parish officers. Motion carried.

The adoption of Resolution 2 was moved, "That a cable be sent to Miss Matthews in acknowledgment of her greeting." This was amended to read, "That a letter, with reports, be sent to Miss Matthews." The motion, as amended, was carried.

The adoption of Resolution 3 was moved, "That a telegram of greeting be sent to Mrs. Rochester." Motion carried.

The adoption of Resolution 4 was moved, "That the 45th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio go on record as endorsing the Sheppard-Towner bill." Motion carried.

The adoption of Resolution 5 was moved, "That we express our thanks to Bishop Reese for his inspiring message at our opening service, and to the Rector and people of the Church of the Advent for their generous hospitality to the President of the Parochial Branch of the Auxiliary for her cordial welcome, and for the delightful reception at the Bishop's House." This motion was carried by a rising vote.

The following resolution was then presented by Mrs. Herron: "As we are asked by the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council 'to take immediate action to help place the social side of our life on a saner basis,' and as this appeal to the women of the Church is 'sanctioned and earnestly endorsed' by the Presiding Bishop and Council, it is resolved that the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio shall take immediate action by formulating some definite plan to urge each Parish Branch to do its individual part in the concerted action asked of us." It was moved that this recommendation be accepted. Motion carried.

A supplemental report was given by the Treasurer, giving the financial report from January 1 to May 10, 1921. This shows \$595.00 in the Discretionary Fund, given by 18 branches. The report on the disposal of the Discretionary Fund was then given by Miss Lucy Matthews. It was recommended that \$300 be given to Bishop Reese for a scholarship to use in training women in the missionary work of the church, that \$250 be given to St. Luke's Hospital, Japan, and that \$45 be given to the Emery Fund.

This recommendation was amended to read, that \$250 be given to St. Luke's Hospital, Japan, and \$345 be given to Bishop Reese. The recommendation, as amended, was carried.

A report of the work of the Church Periodical Club was given by Miss Dodds, the Diocesan Secretary.

Mrs. Torrence told of St. Faith's House, Oxford, and of the influence it has proven to be in the college.

Miss Gregg, a United Thank Offering Missionary, who is supervisor of primary schools and kindergartens at Anking,

China, brought to us most tellingly a realization of our responsibility in bringing to the children of China the privileges and joys which Christianity alone can give. We must provide proper equipment for our schools and Miss Gregg said that without \$5000 to carry on her work she felt it would be almost useless for her to return to China. Miss Gregg's plea was so convincing that an offering for her work was taken. This offering amounted to \$179.25.

Noonday prayers were read by the Rector of the Parish, after which a picture of the Convention was taken.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House by the ladies of the parish.

The business session was resumed at 1:30 P. M.

Mrs. Hubbard announced the amount of the offerings taken at the two services to have been \$120.48.

A motion was made and carried that this offering be added to that given to Miss Gregg.

The minutes of the meeting were read by the Secretary and approved on motion.

Mrs. Hubbard announced that, through additions to the offering, the total for Miss Gregg amounted to \$350.

The business session of the meeting was then adjourned on motion.

The closing service was a Quiet Hour conducted by the Rev. Mr. Flinchbaugh.

CONSTITUTION AND BY - LAWS

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

Name.—The name of this Association shall be "The Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council."

ARTICLE II

Object.—The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Southern Ohio, by united and systematic effort the three great aims of the Church, namely: Missions, Religious Education, and Christian Social Service, in the five fields of service, namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World.

ARTICLE III

Membership.—Membership in this Association shall consist of those baptized women of the Diocese who agree to share in the work of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE IV

Officers.—The officers of this Association shall be the Bishop, a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Secretary of the Supply Department, a Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, and an Educational Secretary. These officers, with an appointee of the Church School Service League of the Diocese, shall constitute the Executive Board of the Association.

ARTICLE V

Duties.—Section 1. The Executive Board shall, subject to the Association, direct the active work of the Association, and have power to adopt by-laws for the Association.

Section 2. The Bishop, when present, may preside at meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The President shall be elected at the second Annual Meeting next after the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive full terms. She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan officers, except the Vice-Presidents, to serve for three years. She shall call meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, and shall, in the Bishop's absence, preside at them. She shall exercise a general supervision of the work and further it in every way by her interest and advice, and especially by an address at the Annual Meeting. In case of a vacancy in the office of President, such vacancy shall be filled until the next Annual Meeting, by appointment made by the Bishop and a committee of two selected by the Executive Board.

Section 4. Each Vice-President shall be elected as soon as possible after the Annual Meeting at which the President is elected by the members of her own Convocation, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive terms. An election, either for a full or unexpired term shall be held at a Convocation meeting called for the purpose by the retiring Vice-President or by the President. A Vice-President, with the approval of the President, may appoint any other Convocation officers in her own Convocation, and prescribe their duties. She shall preside at all meetings in her own Convocation. She shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing local organization and work in her own Convocation.

Section 5. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Executive Board and of the Annual Meeting. She shall conduct all correspondence of the Association and of the Board, except as provided for in Section 6 of this article. She shall also make

an annual report of the work done from data furnished by the other officers.

Section 6. The Box Secretary shall receive and distribute all information relating to the missionary boxes, and shall report annually to the Secretary the work done.

Section 7. The Treasurer shall record, receive, disburse, and keep account of all money distributed, except that from the United Offering; and shall also make an annual report of the same.

Section 8. The Treasurer of the United Offering shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, promote this interest locally by correspondence or visitation, and shall report annually the amount in hand, and forward the Triennial offering.

Section 9. The duties of the Educational Secretary to be a general supervision of all Missionary Education work of the Diocese, carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VI

Meetings.—Section 1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of this Association, or there may be semi-Annual Meetings. Every parish branch may send three delegates, including an executive officer; and every mission branch one delegate, except in the election of a President, Executive Officers, when not delegates, may vote on all questions before the house.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five officers shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Convocation meetings may be held on the call of the Convocation Officers.

Section 4. Delegates to the Triennial shall be elected from the active membership of the Auxiliary, by a majority of the delegates of the Annual Meeting next before the Triennial Meeting. Nomination of delegates to the Triennial may be made by any delegate to the Annual Meeting, and must be sent in, in writing, not later than the morning session of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VII

Mode of Election.—Section 1. In the election of a President any delegate may nominate; all nominations must be written; all elections must be by ballot, and each Parish or Mission shall cast but one vote.

Section 2. Unless there be an election by a clear majority on the first ballot, the Chair shall declare the two names having the largest number of votes, and subsequent ballots shall be upon these two names until a majority vote is reached.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates at any Annual Meeting, notice of such proposed amendment having been given at the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS

The Executive Board shall determine the time of and place for the Annual Meeting.

1. The Order of Business at any Annual Meeting shall be:
 - (1) A Service of Holy Communion.
 - (2) Roll Call.
 - (3) The Annual Report of the Secretary.
 - (4) Annual Report of Treasurer.
 - (5) The President's Address.
 - (6) New Business.
 - (7) The Election of President.
 - (8) Minutes.
2. Parish election of delegates shall take place during the month preceding the Annual Meeting, and be immediately reported by the local Secretary to the Diocesan Secretary.
3. A Central Expense Fund shall be provided for printing, postage, stationery and traveling expenses of officers and speakers.
4. Local receipts for the United Thank Offering shall be remitted to its Treasurer in April and October except triennially in September.
5. The accounts of the Treasurer and of the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall be audited and certified in the printed annual report of the Association.
6. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at any regular meeting of the Executive Board.

FINANCIAL POLICY

I

1. The Auxiliary should be the Educational and Inspirational force in a Parish.
2. It should be the duty of the Auxiliary to educate its members, and through its members the parish, to believe that the Nation-wide Campaign Quota is the least amount each parish should give.

II

1. It shall be the duty of every branch to aid in raising the Nation-wide Campaign Quota of the parish.
 - (a) By urging an every-member canvass and assisting in carrying it out.
 - (b) By giving through the Duplex Envelopes, or in any other method in use in the parish.
 - (c) By giving when necessary as an organization.

III

1. The funds of each parochial branch shall be raised at the discretion of the branch.
2. The Diocesan Central Expense Fund shall be raised in the following manner:
 - (a) There shall be fourteen classes paying as follows:

A—\$75.00	H—\$20.00
B—\$60.00	I—\$15.00
C—\$50.00	K—\$10.00
D—\$40.00	L—\$ 7.50
E—\$35.00	M—\$ 5.00
F—\$30.00	N—\$ 3.00
G—\$25.00	O—\$ 1.00
 - (b) Each branch shall decide to which class it will belong.
 - (c) Each Parochial Treasurer shall yearly notify the Diocesan Treasurer to which class the branch belongs.
 - (d) The Central Expense shall be the first obligation of each branch, and shall be paid for the current year during the month of January.
 - (e) Payment of the Central Expense is necessary for membership in the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.
 - (f) Diocesan Dues to the National Organization shall be paid from the Central Expense.

IV

1. Specials assumed at the Annual Meeting are the responsibility of parochial branches.
2. After the Nation-wide Campaign Quota of the parish and the running expenses of a branch have been met, any surplus may be sent to the Diocesan Treasurer for the Discretionary Fund.
3. The Discretionary Fund shall be disposed of by vote at the Annual Meeting for objects, either Diocesan or General.

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
