## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friends:

The outstanding event of this year was the Triennial meeting held in Atlantic City, and your delegates sent to that meeting wish to express their sincere appreciation for the privilege which was theirs. We realize the difficulty of transmitting to those who were not present the inspiration of that gathering, and urge that you plan to be present at the Triennial in 1937, which will be held in Cincinnati, that you too may share in the inspiration and joy of the experience.

Building upon the topics studied at Denver, the general subject under consideration was, "If We Be His Disciples." Since it was the starting point of our work for the next three years, it is a guiding principle which we shall do well to keep ever before us, to direct us in every endeavor and project, as well as in every day life. It is not possible at this time to review the five addresses presented, namely: World Conditions, The Resources of the Church, Missions in this Age, Christian Citizenship, The Life of the Spirit, but they can be secured from the Church Missions House in New York, also the splendid meditations given by Miss Grace Lindley and the Meditations given in the groups, all in one volume.

If we are to be intelligent and useful members of the Woman's Auxiliary, we shall wish to be familiar with all of its departments. The report of Miss Rebekah Hibbard, tells in a very interesting manner what was done by the National Executive Board the past three years. Miss Lindley's report ties up what we have done with a vision for the future, stressing unity, not only in the Church, but in service to humanity. Co-operation particularly with the Department of Religious Education for the children and young people of the church.

Then our gifts through the United Thank Offering and the Supply Department. There is more urgent need for these than ever before. If it were possible to have every woman use a Blue Box conscientiously, it would not be necessary to recall any of our missionaries, but it would make possible sending many more trained workers into the field where there are countless opportunities for the Episcopal church.

Among the Resolutions passed was one relating to closer relation-

ship between Home Diocese and Missionaries and recommending "that the names of each missionary who has gone out from the diocese, together with that of her home parish and her address in the missionary district where she is serving, with her occupation and United Thank Offering designation, if that be the case, be printed in the Annual Report that women of the diocese may establish friendly relations with her." We have endeavored to comply with this Resolution and have given a page in the Year Book for such names and information. If any have been omitted, we shall appreciate such names being sent to the secretary.

The call to the Forward Movement which came from General Convention, is a great challenge, one which should call into action every member of the Episcopal Church.. Bishop Hobson is chairman of this Movement, on this committee with him are five Bishops, five Presbyters, and ten Laymen. It is the task of this committee to prepare and carry out definite plans for an organized effort to reinvigorate the life of the Church, and to rehabilitate its General Diocesan and Parochial work. This is a movement in which every one can share. To accomplish the desired end it calls for allegiance, as well as a united and sustained effort on the part of every church member that our church may go forward and meet adequately the tasks which confront it.

The Forward Movement Commission is publishing a Lenten Bible reading folder on the subject of Discipleship which they trust will be used in every family. It is only by rededicating ourselves to the teaching and following of Jesus Christ that we can hope to accomplish the goal set forth by the Forward Movement.

It is with sorrow that we record the passing of Miss Bertha Buvlinger, Custodian of the Book of Remembrance. At the time of compiling this Book, she served as a valued member of the committee. She had also served on the Diocesan Board at various times as Vice President of the Dayton Convocation, Secretary and Treasurer.

A devoted and faithful church woman, her rare qualities of mind and soul endeared her to all with whom she came in contact. We remember her before God with affection, gratitude and thanksgiving.

The reports of the departments are given in detail, may the work go forward with renewed zeal and devotion for the next triennium. If We Be His Disciples.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

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"But all blessings are in the way of him, who forgetful of self, tries to be helpful to the world, and who spends his life in loving deeds."

This might so fittingly be applied to the Women's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio, which has just passed through its fifty-eighth year.

The annual meeting was held in Christ Church, Dayton, May 22nd, and 23rd, 1934.

At this session Mrs. Baggott, Mrs. Worman, Miss Anderson, Miss Johnston and Miss Matthews were elected as our representatives to the Triennial meeting held in Atlantic City.

With Miss Mary Johnston as a member of the National Executive Board and Miss Elizabeth Matthews acting most ably as the presiding officer over this notable group of women, we come to feel ourselves a part of the great world energy.

We mention with quite some pride the re-election of Miss Mary Johnston to the National Board, also the election of Miss Elizabeth Matthews as one of the four women members to the National Council. This is the first time women have been elected to the Council; we feel it should be recorded as a part of the history of the Diocese of Southern Ohio.

In the Cincinnati Convocation Mrs. Mark Mitchell held two important sessions, a president's meeting, January 16, at the Church of the Redeemer, at which Miss Matthews spoke in the interest of the United Thank Offering, and the Mid-Lent meeting, held on the evening of March 16, in Christ Church, with a play depicting the U. T. O. at work in its various fields of service. A former United Thank Offering worker spoke on the part the offering had held in her work among the Indians in N. Dakota. A new feature at this time was a book review given by the Rev. Frank Moore. It is hoped that a religious lending library and book stall can be established at the Tea Tray and Trifle Shop on the Boulevard.

In October Miss Matthews held an inspirational meeting at her home in Glendale, with every United Thank Offering Treasurer of the Convocation present.

The Church of The Epiphany, Walnut Hills, has been given up.

In the Columbus Convocation, Miss Kelton enlisted three speakers who were available at any time to help present the U. T. O. work.

An Officer's Conference was held at All Saints', Portsmouth, April 10th. Seventeen branches were represented by fifty-seven members. Besides the president, who spoke principally upon the work before

us for the rest of the year, Miss McCune spoke on Religious Education and Miss Matthews for the United Thank Offering.

In October letters were sent to all organized branches in the Convocation, and to seven small parishes where branches might be started, urging their attendance at the Regional meetings which Bishop Hobson had arranged.

With three meetings in the Convocation the total increase in numbers may prove the advantage of making the meetings more accessible.

All the parishes in Columbus united in a service of Corporate Communion on Thursday, October 11th, held concurrently and in spirit with the Thank Offering service in Atlantic City.

A memorable occasion in the Diocese was the social meeting held at St. John's Worthington, on November 14, in honor of the 150th Anniversary of the Consecration of Bishop Seabury. About 150 people were present to enjoy the hospitality and hear Miss Matthews give her account of the meetings at Atlantic City.

The Vice President of the Dayton Convocation, Mrs. Wylie Mitchell, sent letters telling the work of the Executive Board, and has visited parishes requesting her.

Five Regional meetings were held during October and November; in St. John's Cambridge; Trinity, Columbus; St. Andrews', Dayton; All Saints, Portsmouth; Calvary, Clifton.

The programs were composed of the reports from our delegates to the Triennial Convention and talks by Bishop Colmore, Porto Rico, who told of the opportunity for the church and its work in that island; Rev. Cyril Bently, representative for Negro schools and colleges; Miss Bussy, a former member of the National Executive Board, spoke of the women in our church and their part in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Over 500 women had the privilege of attending these several meetings.

The offerings, approximately \$77.00 were given to the Field Department for the expenses of the speakers.

It is with very deep feeling that we note the death of Miss Bertha Buvinger, the Custodian of the Book of Remembrance.

Miss Buvinger was secretary to the committee whose responsibility for this Book, at its inception, was to secure names and record forms. Always sincere in any churchly duty imposed on her, she was actively engaged in preparing her work as custodian when stricken.

To every one of us she was the pattern of the decided believer in the Lord Jesus Christ.

With the recommendation of Mrs. Baggott, Miss Kelton, and the approval of Bishop Hobson, the Board accepts Miss Ann Elizabeth Lucas, of Columbus, for the Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Miss Lucas succeeds Miss Emily Aldrich who has completed her course and is now Secretary of Religious Education for Diocese of Southern Ohio.

The Treasurer for the Memorial Scholarship Fund reports for the year 1934:

This report does not include \$909, contributed this year through Memorials to the Book of Remembrance, which amount will be turned over to the Trustees in January for its investment.

Our annual Discretionary Fund to Bishop Hobson has been completed.

The work of the Diocesan United Thank Offering Treasurer, Supply Secretary, Educational Secretary and the Treasurer, will be reported by those different officers.

We are most gratified to report that, the Diocese of Southern Ohio again maintains its fifth position in the amount of our United Thank Offering.

Our President, Mrs. Baggott has attended Conferences and visited parishes. She has stressed the value of the Auxiliary work to the church; the Discretionary Fund to Bishop Hobson, most essential in his work; the real need for loyal support to the Supply Department.

Unfinished business for 1934 is the recommendation, by Miss Elizabeth Matthews, that the first part of Article 5, Section 3 of the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

The President shall be elected at an Annual Meeting held at least one year after the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive full terms.

She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan officers, except the Vice Presidents, to serve for three years, but the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall not be appointed at the same time as the other officers but immediately at the close of the General Triennial Meeting, to serve through the Triennium.

The President shall also appoint a Custodian of the Book of Remembrance to serve for her term of office.

These changes to be acted upon at the next Annual meeting.

We now have seventy-two branches of the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Southern Ohio.

The Executive Board has held four meetings during the year 1934, a busy year, perhaps a hard one, but by overcoming many of the difficulties that beset us, and so conquering them, we have become strong.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL WORK FOR 1934

The year of the General Convention is always an unusually interesting one. A great fund of information is spread before the delegates and visitors, as well as the inspiration that is brought to them by the Bishops and Missionaries from all parts of the Home and Foreign Field. Realizing the great need for more missionary information, National Council sent out to each diocese, following the General Convention, a team of three speakers. It was the good fortune of Southern Ohio to have for its representatives Bishop Colomore of Porta Rica, the Reverend Cyril Bentley of the Church Institute for Negroes, and Miss Frances Bussey, a former member of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary. With this team of excellent speakers, your Board joined in holding five one day Convocation Meetings, during the last week of October, in various sections of the diocese; in Cambridge, Columbus, Dayton, Portsmouth and Cincinnati, and reported at these meetings the things of greatest interest to each department.

During the third week of November, three Educational Institutes were held in the diocese, meeting at St. Albans, Columbus, on November 20th, at Grace Church, Avondale, Cincinnati, on November 21st, and at Christ Church, Dayton, on November 22nd. At these meetings, the Educational Secretary discussed the material available in the Lending Library on the two study topics for the year, "Japan" and "Orientals in America" and Miss Etta McGrath, for fifteen years a missionary in Japan, talked very informally of that country, its customs and its people. Miss McGrath was a charming speaker, and left her hearers with a wider knowledge and a more sympathetic attitude toward a great nation that is struggling to adjust itself to modern civilization and to find its place in the world.

It is the privilege of the Educational Secretary to be a member, ex-officio, of the Department of Religious Education. That Department is recommending through The Messenger, a list of books of great general interest. In the December issue, eight books were reviewed, two on the life of Christ, two on the Bible, one on that great modern apostle in Japan, Kagawa, one on Christ and Human Suffering, by Stanley Jones, another on Religious Thought in Germany, and the last on Christianity and the Modern Chaos. These books may be secured from the Book Stall, at Headquarters, at 223 West Seventh Street, Cincinnati. It is hoped that all Auxiliary members will follow these reviews, and make use of the good reading suggested by them.

And finally—may each parish not forget the great educational and inspirational opportunities that are offered each year at the Summer Conference at Gambier. Those parishes that are sending representatives from Church School, Young Peoples Groups or from the Woman's Auxiliary, are reaping a rich harvest of new interest as a result. This year, may we not have as our goal, one representative, at least, from every parish in the diocese.

## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING FOR 1934

The Fifty-Eighth Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio was held in Christ Church, Dayton, Tuesday and Wednesday, May 22nd and 23rd, 1934.

The Rt. Rev. Henry Wise Hobson, D.D., was celebrant at the service of Holy Communion, held Tuesday at 11:00 o'clock, with Rev. Phil Porter, Rev. A. I. E. Boss, and Rev. Frederick Fisher assisting. 250 made their communions.

At this service the Spring presentation of the U. T. C. was made which amounted to \$4,533.85.

We listened to the good counsel of our Bishop, Boyd Vincent, who spoke to us from the first Chapter of Second Timothy the first verse. His wisdom and human sympathies have helped us so often. His benign presence at this convention has been a blessing.

Luncheon was served at noon by the Westminster Presbyterian church women to 223 guests.

At two o'clock the business session was opened by Mrs. Baggott, with creed and prayers.

Mrs. Burdoine, as representative for Christ Church, welcomed those present to the convention. Mrs. Baggott responded.

The Secretary read the report of the Diocesan work for the past six months, following which the president appointed the following committees :

On Credentials: Mrs. Roger Woodhull, St. Paul's, Dayton; Mrs. Walter Tangeman, Redeemer, Hyde Park, Cincinnati; Mrs. A. E. Knight, St. James' Columbus.

On Resolutions: Miss Louise McCune, Trinity, Columbus; Mrs. Gilbert Symons, Holy Trinity, Madisonville, Cincinnati; Miss Laura McCracken, Epiphany, Urbana.

All resolutions to be reported in writing by noon on Wednesday.

### ON ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO THE TRIENNIAL

Chairman: Mrs. S. L. Moyer, Christ Church Cincinnati; Mrs. C. E. Morris, St. Paul's, Columbus; Mrs. Emery Ohler, Christ Church, Dayton.

Miss Elizabeth Matthews has again been nominated Presiding Officer of the Triennial.

It was moved by Mrs. Herron that this report be accepted and placed on file.

Mrs. Baggott in her annual address, called attention to the supreme value of the Auxiliary work to the Church.

She gave a brief history of the Auxiliary, spoke of the Gambier Summer Conference to be held June 25th-July 6th, of the Discretionary Fund to Bishop Hobson, a fund most essential in his work, of the real need for loyal support to the supply department.

198 responded to roll call.

It was our privilege at this time to listen to Miss Mabel Mansfield, Dant, Virginia, instructor in hand craft to the mountaineers. She gave an interesting account of the work and results obtained in these missions, with a most attractive exhibit from the different departments.

It was moved by Mrs. Mark Mitchell that we give the offering of Wednesday morning to Miss Mansfield. It was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Worman announced the amount of the spring U. T. O. and expressed her gratitude for the splendid results.

Miss Elizabeth Matthews then recommended that the first part of Article 5, section 3 of the constitution be changed to read as follows:

The President shall be elected at an Annual Meeting held at least one year after the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive full terms.

She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan officers, except the Vice Presidents, to serve for three years, but the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall not be appointed at the same time as the other officers but immediately at the close of the General Triennial Meeting, to serve through the Triennium.

"The president" shall also appoint a custodian of the Book of Remembrance to serve for their term of office.

These changes to be acted upon at the next Annual Meeting.

At the close of the afternoon session the gracious hospitality of the ladies from St. Paul's, St. Andrew's and Christ Church was enjoyed by the delegates and visitors in Christ Church Parish House.

The speaker for the evening was Rev. Percy Houghton, Field Secretary to the National Council. He spoke on Domestic Missions especially of the work among the Indians.

His words brought a broader vision to his listeners of what Christ meant when He commissioned us who had accepted Him, to go out into the world and teach His Name.

The program for Wednesday, May 23rd, began with a celebration of the Holy Communion. Bishop Hobson was assisted by Rev. J. J. Schaeffer, Rev. Herman Page, Rev. Phil Porter.

At this service Bishop Hobson read the 72 new names inscribed in the Book of Remembrance. 100 made their communions. The offering amounted to \$36.00.

Breakfast was served at the Van Cleve Hotel to those present at this service, followed at 9:15 by Officer's Conferences. The business session was resumed at 10:00 a. m. and opened by Mrs. Baggott with prayers.

The Chair appointed as tellers for the election: Mrs. Stanley Allen, Christ Church, Glendale; Mrs. Stine, St. Stephon's, Columbus; Mrs. Cloyd Smith, St. James, Piqua.

A ballot was taken and while the tellers were out the meeting continued.

Mrs. Worman was asked to read the U. T. O. report. The Spring offering was \$4,533.86, with September 16th as the date for the Fall offering. There are 73 parishes and missions with 7,690 women members and approximately 2,516 giving to the U. T. O.

The total offering last Triennial was \$38,104.49 while we now have \$21,148.16 with the Fall Offering to be added to this.

Miss Anderson for the Educational Department announced the library was in almost constant demand and use and many letters received from the different branches, since the conference for Church women held in Christ Church, Cincinnati, last November.

Fall boxes totaling \$2,128.37 were sent out by Mrs. Flesh, our Supply Secretary.

Spring allotments are coming in which cannot as yet be estimated.

She has also made a plea for funds as we have given \$3,300 less in 1933 than in 1931.

Mrs. Mark Mitchell moved that the By-laws be suspended in view of this emergency and \$300 be given the supply department.

It was seconded by Miss Elizabeth Matthews and carried.

The following delegates were reported elected to the Triennial: Mrs. Baggott, Miss Matthews, Miss Johnston, Mrs. Worman and Miss Anderson.

Alternates: Mrs. Flesh, Miss Tuite, Miss Morrison, Mrs. Snediker, Mrs. Farber.

The Convention stood while the report of Miss Buvinger, on the Book of Remembrance was read by the Secretary.

The Book during this Convention has been most earnestly attended by Mrs. Grace Stivers Purvis, Miss Lucy Matthews and Miss Mary Van Loan, devoted and life-long friends of Miss Buvinger.

It was moved by Miss Colston, that the new names of those inscribed in the Book of Remembrance, be printed in the Church Messenger, it was seconded and carried.

Miss Mary Johnston, a member of the National Board, told most interestingly of the plans for the Triennial and the different subjects to be discussed as:

World Conditions Today, Missions in the New Era, The Resources of the Church, Christian Citizenship Today, The Life of the Spirit.

The general title for the Triennial will be: "If We Be His Disciples."

Bishop Hobson concluded the morning with a talk on the diocese. He said there are 43% of the communicants of the Church supporting the Church's Program. We must be interested in a greater responsibility of our Church to mankind. All life is built on progress and growth. 100% support of Church activities. To this mission may we try to be faithful. Noon-day prayers were conducted by Bishop Hobson.

At the afternoon session, it was moved by Mrs. Herron that the sermon by Bishop Vincent be printed. Seconded and carried.

Mrs. Wodhull brought in the following report for the Credentials Committee: 112 delegates and 135 visitors from 49 parishes. Cincinnati having 46 delegates, from 22 parishes; Columbus with 32 delegates from 12 parishes, and Dayton 34 delegates from 15 parishes.

Miss McCune as chairman presented the following resolutions and moved their acceptance, an exception was made for a separate motion concerning Bishop Hobson's Fund, it was moved and seconded that this fund be according to the Resolution of this Committee.

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#### RESOLUTIONS

*Resolved:* That in the death of Miss Buvinger, the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio has suffered a great loss. Miss Buvinger had served in various capacities on the Diocesan Board, was a member of the original committee on the Book of Remembrance, and at the time of her death was custodian of the Book. We remember, with thanksgiving, her life of self-forgetting service in the Church, and her willing acceptance of responsibility in the Auxiliary, and resolve that this resolution be spread upon the minutes and a copy be sent to her family.

*Resolved:* That this meeting express to our Bishop, to the rector of this parish, to the organist and to all the clergy who officiated at the services, their appreciation and thanks.

*Resolved:* That this meeting express to Bishop Vincent the sense of benediction which his presence brings to us—his words came to us with the authority of mature wisdom. His deep insight, the catholicity of his sympathy and authority, stir our very hearts. Thanks be to God for his noble life.

*Resolved:* That the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio in grateful appreciation of the leadership of Bishop Hobson, continue the Fund for his use. This Fund to be given in 1934 and 1935 and to be at least \$500 each year.

*Resolved:* That this meeting express to the Rev. Percy Houghton, their thanks for the picture he gave us of the mission field—and the settling forth of our responsibility for carrying on the work of the Church.

*Resolved:* That a message of love and sympathy be sent to Mrs. Charles G. Reade.

*Resolved:* That a message of love and affection be sent to Mrs. Whiting.

The minutes of the meeting were then read by the Secretary and approved.

Bishop Hobson pronounced the benediction and the 58th meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio was adjourned.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

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### CONSTITUTION

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#### ARTICLE I

##### Name

The name of this Association shall be "The Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council."

#### ARTICLE II

##### Object

The object of this Association is to carry out in the Diocese of Southern Ohio, by united and systematic effort, the three great aims of the Church, namely: Missions, Religious Education and Christian Social service, in the five fields of service namely, Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World.

#### ARTICLE III

##### Membership

Membership in this Association shall consist of those baptized women of the Diocese who agree to share in the work of the Auxiliary.

#### ARTICLE IV

##### Officers

The officers of this Association shall be the Bishop, a President, three Vice Presidents, a Secretary, a Secretary of the Supply Department, a Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, and an Educational Secretary. These officers with an appointee of the Church School Service League of the Diocese, shall constitute the Executive Board of the Association.

#### ARTICLE V

##### Duties

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall, subject to the Association direct the active work of the Association, and have power to adopt by-laws for the Association.

SECTION 2 The Bishop, when present, may preside at meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board.

SECTION 3 The President shall be elected at an Annual Meeting held at least one year after the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive full terms. She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan officers, except the Vice Presidents, to serve for three years. She shall also appoint a Custodian of the Book of Remembrance, to serve for her term of office. She shall call meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, and shall, in the Bishop's absence, preside at them. She shall exercise a general supervision of the work and further it in every way by her interest and advice, and especially by an address at the Annual Meeting. In case of a vacancy in the office of President, such vacancy shall be filled until the next Annual Meeting, by appointment made by the Bishop and a committee of two selected by the Executive Board.

SECTION 4 Each Vice President shall be elected as soon as possible after the Annual Meeting at which the President is elected by the members of her own Convocation, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive terms. An election, either for a full or unexpired term, shall be held at a Convocation meeting called for the purpose by the retiring Vice Presidents or by the President. A Vice President, with the approval of the President, may appoint any other Convocation officers in her own Convocation and prescribe their duties. She shall preside at all meetings in her own Convocation. She shall co-operate with the President in promoting local intelligence and interest, and in directing local organization and work in her own Convocation.

SECTION 5 The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Executive Board and of the Annual Meeting. She shall conduct all correspondence of the Association and of the Board, except as provided for in Section 6 of this article. She shall also make an annual report of the work done from data furnished by the other officers.

SECTION 6. The Secretary of Supply Department shall receive and distribute all information relating to the missionary boxes, and shall report annually to the Secretary the work done.

SECTION 7. The Treasurer shall record, receive, disburse, and keep account of all money distributed, except that from the United Offering; and shall also make an annual report of the same.

SECTION 8 The Treasurer of the United Offering shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, promote this interest locally by correspondence or visitation, and shall report annually the amount on hand, and forward the Triennial offering.

SECTION 9. The duties of the Educational Secretary to be a general supervision of all Missionary Education work, of the Dicoese, carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SECTION 10 The Custodian of the Book of Remembrance shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, be responsible for the care of the Book of Remembrance. She shall not be a member of the Board, but shall meet with it upon request.

## ARTICLE VI

### Meetings

SECTION 1 There shall be an Annual Meeting of this Association, or there may be Semi-Annual Meetings. Every Parish branch may send three delegates, including an executive officer; and every Mission branch one delegate. Except in the election of a President, Executive Officers, when not delegatees may vote on all questions before the house.

SECTION 2 The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year. Five officers shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 3 Convocation meetings shall be held on the call of the Convocation Officers.

SECTION4 Delegates to the Triennial shall be elected from the active membership of the Auxiliary, by a majority of the delegates of the Annual Meeting next before the Triennial Meeting. Nomination of delegates to the Triennial may be made by any delegate to the Annual Meeting, and must be sent in, in writing, not later than the morning session of the Annual Meeting.

## ARTICLE VII

### Mode of Election

SECTION 1 In the election of President any delegates may nominate; all nominations must be written; all elections must be by ballot, and each Parish or Mission shall cast but one vote.

SECTION 2 Unless there be an election by a clear majority on the first ballot, the Chair shall declare the two names having the largest number of votes, and subsequent ballots shall be upon these two names until a majority vote is reached.

## ARTICLE VIII

### Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates at any Annual Meeting, notice of such proped amendment having been given at the previous meeting.

## BY-LAWS

The Executive Board shall determine the time of and place for the Annual Meeting.

1 The Order of Business at any Annual Meeting shall be:

- (1) A Service of Holy Communion.
- (2) Roll Call.
- (3) The Annual Report of the Secretary.
- (4) Annual Report of Treasurer.
- (5) The President's Address.
- (6) New Business.
- (7) The Election of President.
- (8) Minutes.

2 Parish election of delegates shall take place during the month preceding the Annual Meeting, and be immediately reported by the local Secretary to the Diocesan Secretary.

3 A Central Expense Fund shall be provided for printing, postage, stationery, traveling expense of officers and speakers, necessary expenses of the Educational Department, and the shipping charges of the Supply Department; also for all expenses incurred in the care of the Book of Remembrance.

4 New names may be inscribed in the Book of Remembrance every third year, the year of the General Convention; such names being those of women who have died within the Triennium and have been selected as worthy of a place in the Book of Remembrance by a Parish Committee, consisting of the heads of all women's organizations within the parish, acting with the Rector.

5 When a name is presented for inscription in the Book of Remembrance, it shall be accompanied by some Memorial Gift made through or by the parish entering the name on its pages; such memorial gifts shall be added to the Trust Fund known as the Memorial Scholarship Fund.

6 The Book of Remembrance may be used at all Diocesan meetings, such as the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Annual Service of the Girls' Friendly Society and the Diocesan Convention. The Book may not be shown at secular meetings or exhibited purely as a work of art.

7 Local receipts for the United Thank Offering shall be remitted to its Treasurer in April and October except triennially in September.

8 The accounts of the Treasurer and the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall be audited and certified in the printed annual report of the Association.

9 These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at any regular meeting of the Executive Board.

## FINANCIAL POLICY

### I

1. The Auxiliary should be the Educational and Inspirational force in a Parish.
2. It should be the duty of the Auxiliary to educate its members and through its members the parish, to believe that the Nation-Wide Campaign Quota is the least amount each parish should give.

### II

1. It shall be the duty of every branch to aid in raising the Nation-Wide Campaign Quota of the parish.
  - (a) By urging an every-member canvass and assisting in carrying it out.
  - (b) By giving through the Duplex Envelopes, or in any other method in use in the parish.
  - (c) By giving when necessary as an organization.

### III

1. The funds of each parochial branch shall be raised at the discretion of the branch.
2. Diocesan Central Expense Fund shall be raised in the following manner:
  - (a) There shall be fourteen classes paying as follows:

A — \$75.00	H — \$20.00
B — 60.00	I — 15.00
C — 50.00	K — 10.00
D — 40.00	L — 7.50
E — 35.00	M — 5.00
F — 30.00	N — 3.00
G — 25.00	O — 1.00
  - (b) Each branch shall decide to which class it will belong.
  - (c) Each Parochial Treasurer shall yearly notify the Diocesan Treasurer to which class the branch belongs.
  - (d) The Central Expense shall be the first obligation of each branch, and shall be paid for the current year during the month of January.
  - (e) Payment of the Central Expense is necessary for membership in the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.
  - (f) Diocesan Dues to the National Organization shall be paid from the Central Expense.

### IV

1. Specials assumed at the Annual Meeting are the responsibility of parochial branches.
