Crocker; Treasurer United Thank Offering—Mrs. Roger Woodhull; Secretary of Religious Education—Mrs. Fritz Lichtenberg; Custodian of the Book of Remembrance—Mrs. Edwin A. Hoey; and Mrs. O. E. Hillmer, assistant to Mrs. Rogan in the Cincinnati Convocation.

Seven Executive Board Meetings have been held since that time, and in addition to the regular Board Members attending, we have been glad to welcome Miss Hilda Shaul, as our Educational Adviser; Mrs. David Larcomb, National President of the Church Periodical Club; Mrs. Donald Stone, Diocesan President of Girl's Friendly Society; Miss Gwynedd Owen representing the Church Mission of Help and the Department of Social Service.

The Annual Meeting of 1938 was held at Christ Church, Dayton, May seventeenth and eighteenth. There were sixty-two Parishes represented with one hundred sixty-seven delegates and one hundred seventy-two visitors present. At this meeting your new President and the three Vice-Presidents were elected.

So far this year, six Convocation Meetings have been held, three in October in Cincinnati, Dayton and Columbus. In February a Convocation was held in Portsmouth to enable those people who could not attend in October to have a Convocation. Also Cincinnati held an evening Convocation and there was one held in Zanesville, March twentieth.

In November the following officers of the Auxiliary attended

the meeting of the Synod and Provincial Woman's Auxiliary at Flint, Michigan, Mrs. Hugh Bone, Mrs. Roger Woodhull, Mrs. Roger Rogan, Mrs. Fritz Lichtenberg, and Mrs. Harvey Kinnel.

In January, the Woman's Auxiliary brought Miss Margaret Montiero to the Diocese to speak on her work in China. She visited ten Parishes and also spoke to several Church School and Young People's and College groups, as well as to the Auxiliary branches during her twelve day visit. The Woman's Auxiliary also enjoyed meeting Miss Margaret Jefferson, who was in our Diocese in January in the interest of the Girl's Friendly Society, and have endeavored to co-operate with her and Mrs. Stone to the mutual interest of the Auxiliary and the Girl's Friendly Society.

All our Diocesan officers have visited Parishes and spoken on the different departments of their work. The President and other officers have co-operated with the Diocesan staff in attending meetings at Hillsboro and Xenia with the Forward Movement Mission.

Under a new Educational Secretary this year, and with the assistance of Miss Hilda Shaul, our Educational Adviser, the educational work has been particularly stressed. Several new study groups have been formed, and now we have fifty-eight educational Chairmen in the Parishes.

The Auxiliary has sent Bishop Hobson \$700.00 for his Discretionary Fund, and has sent missionary boxes to the following institutions:

From January, 1938, to January, 1939, our United Thank Offering amounted to \$12,035.93.

From the Memorial Scholarship fund, \$150.00 has been given to Miss Elizabeth Brerton, to complete the last quarter of her work at the New York School of Social Work.

Our President as a member of the Woman's Board of the Ohio Council of Churches, has acted as our representative at three meetings of the council this year and attended most of the sessions of the Ohio Conference of Church Women which was held in Columbus in February.

This brings to a conclusion the record of the year's work accomplished by your new Board members.

**PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS  
to the  
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY  
ST. LUKE'S CHURCH, MARIETTA**

May 22, 1939

This 63rd year of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese saw a new President and Executive Board taking office. As it may have been with our predecessors, I presume, we have felt our inexperience a handicap at times, but I hope that our enthusiasm and interest and real joy in our work has to some extent, at least, made up for that. I am expressing the conviction of our whole Board when I say we have gotten far more out of our work than we have given. There is always real joy in a task of that kind.

It was nine years ago that I first served on a Diocesan Board, and after that interval, in coming back again, I am most impressed with the change and the increase in the amount of the work being done—both on the Diocesan Board, and in our Parishes. I do not refer to an increase in a number of members or branches, but to the increased scope of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. Would that we could be sure that the influence of the Auxiliary has grown in the same proportion! But, it is natural and right that the scope of our work is greater—greater also is the detail of executing that work, and the expense, and time, and money necessary. We could not hope to go ahead if this were not so. The breadth of our knowledge in other matters is so much greater—knowledge of this world in which we live, of its joys and of its sorrows; knowledge of its beauties and of its catastrophes; knowledge of its geography and of its people; the known ease of travel and swiftness of transportation and communication. Of course, our religion must broaden to keep up with this!

Likewise, our Auxiliary must increase its work to serve its purpose today. All these things have combined to widen the field of church work. The Auxiliary woman of today must be alert and well informed enough to work in her Parish, to help in the Diocese, to understand the National Church's program, and to

have a knowledge of the great world events, past and present, in which that Church must function.

And so, our Educational Program is most important, and the one branch of Auxiliary work that has probably been improved and enlarged more than any other in recent years. Believing as we do today that practically every phase of education may have its religious significance or aspect, you can see that the fields of religious education are indeed broad. If we believe in the simple definition of religion: "That Religion is a Way of Life," we must be constantly studying to find what that way is, through all the complications and ramifications of life as it is lived today.

As you learned last fall at your Convocation meetings, your new Board began by stressing the importance of its educational work; by having you answer to roll call at those Convocation meetings to the question: "What are your educational plans for this year?" As our Educational Chairman and Adviser on Religious Education for the Diocese will follow soon with their reports, there is no need for me to go into detail of the splendid work done along these lines, nor of the other departments of our work, which will be reported to you from each officer in these two days.

Under a new arrangement this year, Mrs. O. C. Hilmer of Cincinnati, has been the very able assistant of Mrs. Roger Rogan as Vice President in charge of the Cincinnati Convocation. We have been glad to welcome Mrs. Hilmer to our Executive Board meetings, of which there have been seven, together with the presidents of the other cooperating agencies and our religious Educational Adviser, Miss Hilda Shaul. It has been so helpful having an assistant to the Vice President in the Cincinnati Convocation that it will, no doubt, be done before long in the Dayton and Columbus Convocations. The latter, because of its geographical area, is hard to reach, extending as it does from Delaware on the north, south to Portsmouth, and from Chillicothe on the west to Marietta east, and up and down the Ohio River. With this set-up in the Convocation, we would have something nearer approximating the Regional Directors of the Ohio Diocese north of us. They have eight Regional Directors there and find them none too many to cover the territory.

In the financial field, the response to the Bishop's Discretionary Fund was both spontaneous and gratifying.

Every Parish has paid its central expense pledge this year, and a few have been slightly increased. But, I am sorry to say we still have to curtail work which we feel should be done, because of lack of funds.

All Parishes received the call from the National Council, sent out in March, asking help to meet the threatened Missionary shortage. From every indication, you have responded generously to this, some taking on projects, some sending cash donations, some assisting their Vestries to contribute. As this help was sent direct to the National Council, as asked, we have no record of its total on our books. So, in order to know somewhere near what has been contributed from the Auxiliaries of the Diocese, we have added a question to the Annual Questionnaire. This has already been sent you. In it, we asked each branch to report what it has done about "This Call to Action" from our National Council. The result will then be published, along with your reports of other work, in the Year Book.

We have endeavored this year to cooperate with the work of the Wayside Cathedral by taking part, where we were asked, in meetings for the women in the Forward Movement Missions. It is hoped that as the Wayside Cathedral proceeds through rural areas, new opportunities and new places may be opened up for the work of the Auxiliary. No new branches have been added this year.

Our Executive Board has also endeavored to cooperate with our Diocesan Committee in their work for Refugees. The resolution on this subject sent out by the National Executive Board was incorporated in a letter and sent to all Parishes at Christmas time. For this meeting, we are glad to bring you Bishop Paul Jones, who speaks to us tomorrow morning on this very vital Refugee Problem.

Miss Matthews mentioned to you last year in her Annual Report, that a Committee of nine women were working with the General Convention Committee on the Marriage and Divorce Canon. This year, Questionnaires were sent to us by this Committee, covering the subject of Marriage and Divorce. These were distributed to twenty-three Parish groups of varying ages in our Diocese, to be studied and answered. More detailed report of this will probably be given you later. But, since one of the major objectives of the Forward Movement is creating a Christian home,

since the women of our church have been studying the educational courses on Family Life from as far back as the Denver Convention, and stressing the importance of Marriage as a *Career*, it is certainly possible that they may make a valuable contribution to this important question of Marriage and Divorce, and it is to be hoped that our women of Southern Ohio will do their share towards helping solve this vital Christian problem.

Each year, more of our women hold positions in the daytime, from which they cannot be spared to attend week-day church meetings. Encouragement of more evening branches and programs is desirable. Miss Matthews mentioned last year that our negro branches were weak because they consisted largely of professional and working women. I am sure that this is so in other places. We should form our programs for times and on subjects which will reach these women. Evening Convocation meetings may be undertaken for the Columbus and Dayton Convocation next year. So far, we have only held about one a year, and that always in Cincinnati.

Last month, our Diocesan Convention of Southern Ohio was held at Christ Church, Dayton. At that meeting, it was decided to hold the next meeting at Christ Church, Cincinnati on May 21, 1940. This change in the date of the Diocesan Convention from January to May causes us some concern, as, according to our Constitution, our Annual Meeting must be held in the spring, the time and place to be determined by the Executive Board. How to hold these two large meetings at the same season of the year, where we draw for attendance on so many of the same people, without one or the other suffering, is a problem for some joint planning before another year. But, I am sure, that with the cooperation of the Bishop, this can be worked out to the satisfaction of all concerned, and perhaps to the mutual benefit of both.

The outstanding encouraging event in a year of many discouragements in world events, is the fact that the great World Missionary Conference took place at Madras, India. We are indeed fortunate in Southern Ohio that we can hear first-hand of this from our own Bishop.

Peace has undoubtedly been the most universally longed-for blessing this past year by all Christian people. How to attain this peace is the problem of all of us. Bishop Hobson, in his

address to the Diocesan Convention last month, showed quite clearly that peace can come only through harmony, and that harmony must start with individuals. Just as the work of making a strong National Church starts in our Parishes, so, the task of making a great Christian world begins with ourselves. And these beginnings are still so imperfect!—in ourselves and in our Parishes, surely we have here both the incentive and the challenge to make them better. Through our Lord, the power is given us for this task, if we but accept it.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF SECRETARY OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

At the Convocation Meetings last Autumn your reports showed that you are planning your work well in advance, for which I am more than glad; for there is no better time than Spring to plan for next year, as in that way your leaders have ample time for unhurried preparation.

India seems to have caught the imagination of the Diocese as almost half of our branches gave at least one or two meetings to that subject. That in itself was a preparation for next year's missionary study which will be on "Christ and the World Community"—a study planned against the background of the meeting of the International Missionary Council at Madras last December.

The study of the Urban Church, while not as popular, was most successful wherever it was used.

Ninety-six (96) study books were sold, besides the usual pamphlets and prayer cards.

There are four (4) new educational secretaries this year. But there are still twenty (20) branches without this office and we feel that it is most important that each Auxiliary should have an educational secretary, as it is asking too much of a president to carry on the educational work along with her own work as president.

I have visited nine (9) parishes during the year and have sent five (5) communications by mail to parish educational secretaries, three of these being post cards carrying suggestions of books or magazine articles which I have found interesting and which I feel would be of help to others in our groups.

In reply to a request from Mrs. Robert Happ, Chairman of the Woman's Auxiliary Committee on Marriage and Divorce, questionnaires on this subject were sent to many parishes for discussion. These were to cover as wide a range as possible of age, interest—including both urban and rural groups. While the reports were not as many as we had hoped for, yet those that came in showed much thought and care.

I want to take this opportunity to acknowledge the debt of gratitude I owe to Miss Hilda Shaul for her constant help and encouragement throughout the year.

There are three recommendations I should like to offer to you:

First: In planning programmes each year, let us have one Woman's Auxiliary day. A day when we check up on ourselves to make sure that we all realize just what the Woman's Auxiliary really is, how far reaching it is, and what it stands for. For we must never forget and must see that all new women in the church know that we are in truth the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

Second: I am anxious that we encourage and develop among ourselves the habit of reading church magazines. How fine it would be if everyone of us would be a regular reader of at least one church magazine beside our Forward Day by Day. In no other way can we become the well informed church women we aspire to be.

Third: Let us try to plan our real study programmes so that when Lent comes we can devote ourselves to the cultivation of the things of the spirit. Lent should be the time for classes in personal religion, quiet days, corporate communions, services, reading and meditation. In the April copy of the Readers Digest we read that General Chiang Kai-Shek devotes a half hour each day to meditation and prayer. And as Father Souder said in a letter a short time ago "plenty of people with not a fraction of what the General has to think about say they are too busy to find time for prayer." If our study of India has taught us nothing more it has showed us that we can learn from these Indian women lessons of fortitude, patience and insight.

In closing I would quote from Basil Mathew's book, "The Church Takes Root in India," where he says:

"We do well to contemplate in our times of quietness the great gift that that united church in India will contribute both to the West and to the Far East. Her instinct for worship and her power of sustained meditation; the beauty of her exquisite craftsmanship, which reveals her patience and persistence; her gentle grace, her loving-kindness and courtesy, are only a few of those shining qualities that should lead the Western and Far Eastern world, now preoccupied with material externals and aggressive activity, to seek after those neglected fruits of the spirit which are central in the life and teaching of our Lord."

As I look back over the past year and a half, my first feeling is one of deep gratitude for the loyal support of the United Thank Offering Treasurers and for the friends I have made.

In the course of my visits and the contacts made, I have become convinced that the vital need in the work of the United Thank Offering is to educate the women of our Diocese to realize the spiritual significance of the use of the Blue Box.

I do want to mention the fact that two of the Parishes, St. Mary's at Waynesville, and St. Matthew's, Bond Hill, not only have every woman communicant giving to the United Thank Offering, but have secured women outside the Episcopal Church to use the Blue Box. Holy Trinity, Oxford; Grace Church, College Hill; St. Margaret's, Dayton; Christ Church, Ironton, and Trinity Missionary Guild, Norwood, also have every woman communicant giving. These are splendid records, but there are still about fifty percent of the women communicants of the

Diocese of Southern Ohio who evidently do not realize the privilege of being a part of the United Thank Offering. This is surely a challenge to all women in our Diocese to help in this educational work.

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## REPORT OF THE SUPPLY SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

DIOCESE OF SOUTHERN OHIO

Fall, 1938—Spring, 1939

*Madam President and Women of the Auxiliary:*

It is a great pleasure and a privilege to bring you my first year's report as your Supply Secretary.

It is said that the first year is always the hardest and perhaps that is true. All hard work has its compensations and that is certainly true of this office. I have been greatly impressed with the opportunity for service that this work offers every woman of the church.

I was rather overwhelmed when the allotments came from New York and I realized what was expected of the Auxiliary of Southern Ohio. With your fine cooperation and interest we have completed six personal boxes, six Christmas presents for our women missionaries and one for an Indian Catechist, six mission boxes and made 21,345 surgical dressings for one hospital. There has been one great disappointment and that is, your failure to complete the allotment of \$750 asked for the Church General Hospital at Wuchang, China. Money is to be sent this year in lieu of hospital supplies and to date we have only \$588.34 of the \$750 and part of that came from the offerings taken at the three convocations last fall.

Miss Margaret Monteiro of the Diocese of Nanking, China, came to Southern Ohio in January and told us much of the work in China and I had great hopes that you would see the need and recognize the sacrifices made and the hardships endured by our missionaries and joyfully make your contributions to this fund.

Last December the Auxiliaries of the Columbus convocation were invited to come to St. Paul's Parish House one afternoon to have a cup of tea and see a display of the articles that were sent

to Pine Ridge Mission, Pine Ridge, S. D. It was a thrilling sight and one that I wish all of you might have seen.

The appeal for used clothing for Pine Ridge, St. Joseph's and Redeemer missions met with a fine response and a splendid assortment was sent to each mission.

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#### REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL ADVISER

Delivered at

THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION, MARIETTA  
May 22, 1939

The Woman's Auxiliary by virtue of its name—Auxiliary—is an organization which aids and helps other organizations. I am glad to be representing the Department of Christian Education and to report how greatly this Diocesan Auxiliary has aided the diocesan program of Christian Education. The Department carries on its work through five committees: Young People, Church School, Teacher Training, Adult Education and College Work. With the exception of the College Work Committee there have been exchanges in work with all the committees.

In regard to the Young People's Committee, tomorrow morning the offering of the Convention will be taken to help send a delegate to the World Conference of Christian Youth at Amster-

dam, Holland, July 24th to August 2nd. Although the Young Churchmen of the Diocese are contributing to this cause it would not have been possible to send a delegate without the contribution of the Woman's Auxiliary. The purpose of this Conference is to bring together Christian youth delegates from a great number of countries for the purpose of enlarging the understanding of the meaning of the Christian Church and its role in building a universal Christian community. It is also hoped that the training of such a leader as Miss Arda Stumpe, and other leading young people, will contribute to the Woman's Auxiliary of the future. Already one Young Churchmen group is contributing in such a homely way as sewing diapers for the Woman's Auxiliary supply work!

This organization is also acting as auxiliary to the Church School Committee. Without the stress on India and the City Church such interest in the Lenten Offering would not have been possible. It is good to have members of the Church, both old and young, studying like missionary subjects. Moreover, your generosity in bringing Miss Monteiro to the diocese and allowing her to speak to several Church School and Young People's groups has been appreciated.

In the field of Teacher Training a Columbus Teacher Training Institute was held on the same evening as the lectures on the City Church by the Rev. Joseph F. Fletcher, sponsored by the Church and the World Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary.

But it is in the field of Adult Education that there has been an even greater exchange. When the Council of Social Agencies called upon the Episcopal Church to sponsor an inter-racial dinner, it was to the Inter-racial Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary that we turned. The development of educational committees in place of only one educational secretary has reinforced the work of adult education. Such committees exist at Trinity Church, Columbus; Church of the Redeemer, Cincinnati; Church of our Saviour, Cincinnati, and All Saints', Pleasant Ridge, and doubtless in many other parishes. One parish at least has moved to make its educational committee an educational committee for the entire parish.

The emphasis on discussion groups throughout the diocese has also helped to encourage educational projects. One remembers the weeks of discussion on the refugees at Trinity Church, Lon-

don, and the study of the discussion method as a basis for democratic living at St. Luke's, Granville.

The Adult Education Committee of the Department has also aided the Woman's Auxiliary. Its "Speakers List" has been much used. The survey made by the Adult Education Committee has many facts of vital interest to Auxiliary members (for example, of thirty-five parishes reporting only two reported business groups, and ten young married people's groups). A recently prepared packet for young married people's groups is now available.

And so one sees constant interrelation of the Woman's Auxiliary and the diocesan Christian educational program.

And as to the future? First, may the Woman's Auxiliary also concern itself with the work of the College Committee; second, may it encourage more religious education committees for the entire parish, for if democracy is to be lived it must be practiced in the Church; third, may it continue to stress the religious life of families, for if democracy is to be lived it must be practiced in the home; fourth, may the Woman's Auxiliary have a continual awareness of the work of diocesan departments,—for example, refugees on the part of the Department of Social Relations and unchurched people on the part of the Department of Evangelism—for it is through this interrelatedness that we contribute more and more to the fellowship of the Church.

**MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-THIRD MEETING  
ST. LUKE'S CHURCH, MARIETTA, OHIO**

**May 22-23, 1939**

The sixty-third annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southern Ohio opened on Monday morning with a service of Holy Communion with Bishop Hobson as Celebrant, assisted by Rev. Lynny B. Wilson, Rev. Anson P. Stokes, Jr., and Rev. Robert Leake. The United Thank Offering for the Spring, 1939, was presented at this service with as many of the United Thank Offering treasurers as could be present making the offering. The sermon was preached by Rev. Anson P. Stokes, Jr., using the text Isaiah 54:2. "Stretch out thy cords, strengthen thy stays." Mr. Stokes emphasized "looking forward" and stressed the fact that we must have faith in the future.

Lunch was served at the Betsy Mills Club.

The Annual Meeting was opened at 2:00 o'clock by the president, Mrs. Hugh M. Bone, with a short prayer followed by a hymn, after which Mrs. Bone introduced Miss Harriet Follette, President of the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Luke's Church of Marietta, who extended a greeting of welcome to the meeting. The Roll was then called by the secretary by parishes. The secretary then read her annual report which on motion made by Mrs. Kinnel and seconded by Mrs. Trumble was accepted and ordered printed in the Year Book. The treasurer, Mrs. Harvey F. Kinnel, then read her report for the year, copies previously having been distributed to the meeting. Mrs. Jonas McCune moved and Mrs. Marcus Crocker seconded the motion that the report be accepted and be printed in the Year Book. The motion was carried.

Mrs. Bone then read her address. She mentioned the great increase in the scope of work being done by the Woman's Auxiliary since she was in Diocesan office nine years ago. In order to keep abreast of the times the women of the Auxiliary must keep alert and well informed in regard to the work in the parish, dioces, in the nation and the world. Following her address she introduced the past presidents of the Woman's Auxiliary who

were present, Miss Catherine Morrison, Miss Louise McCune, and Mrs. Allen McGregor.

Mrs. Marcus Crocker, our supply secretary, gave a report on the work done in the supply department for the past year. The total value of this work being \$4,792.57.

The president then announced the following committees:

Credentials—Chairman, Mrs. Charles G. Baird, St. Stephens, Columbus; Miss Anita Fenton, Grace-St. Lukes, Cincinnati; Mrs. Philip Brerton, St. Andrews, Dayton; Resolutions—Chairman, Mrs. Louise Sandoe, Christ Church, Xenia; Mrs. S. Outhwaite, Trinity Church, Columbus; Mrs. James Irwin, St. Paul's Church, Dayton; Guard of Honor for the Book of Remembrance—Mrs. Edwin A. Hoey, St. Paul's Church, Chillicothe; Mrs. Murdock Burton, Christ's Church, Glendale; Mrs. Ruben Perrin, Christ's Church, Glendale; Mrs. Dixon, St. James Church, Columbus; Mrs. Seldon Trumbull, St. Paul's, Columbus; Mrs. Henry B. Bohr, All Saint's, Portsmouth; Mrs. Alfred Burdoin, Christ's Church, Dayton.

Mrs. Bone introduced Father Edmund Souder of Grace-St. Luke's, Cincinnati, who told of his experiences at General Church Hospital, Wuchang, China.

Mrs. Lichtenberg, educational secretary, then gave a resume of the work accomplished by the Educational Department through the past year. She told us next year's study course would be "Christ and the World Community." At the close of her talk Mrs. Lichtenberg gave three recommendations to the Convention:

1. That we should have one Woman's Auxiliary day a year, to reconsider what the Woman's Auxiliary really stands for and what we are doing about it.
2. Encourage the development among ourselves of the reading of Church literature.
3. When planning Study Courses, plan to leave Lent free for spiritual help and study.

As our Educational Adviser to the Woman's Auxiliary, Miss Shaul then made her report. She also made four recommendations to the Convention. First, may the Woman's Auxiliary also concern itself with the work of the College Committee; second, may it encourage more religious education committees for the entire parish, for if democracy is to be lived, it must be practiced in the Church; third, may it continue to stress the religious life of families, for if democracy is to be lived, it must be practiced in

the home; fourth, may the Woman's Auxiliary have a continual awareness of the work of diocesan departments.

Bishop Hobson then addressed the convention. First, he expressed his deep appreciation to the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio for the money sent him for his Discretionary Fund. He also expressed thanks to the diocese for their response to the pledge for the National Church deficit. He said that if each person throughout the diocese would give one dollar for the Whitsunday offering, next Sunday morning, the pledge would be raised. He told that on June 4th the ground would be broken for a new Church for St. Matthew's, Bond Hill. He also told that four churches that previously had been closed: McArthur, Wilmington, Dresden, Nelsonville, and Logan are now opened. He said that for the first time in a good many years, St. Paul's Greenville, has a resident rector. He said that he felt a great deal of satisfaction in the spirit of Southern Ohio, always ready to "go out" to accomplish more and more, open up work, reach new fields. He suggested the re-division of the diocese, Columbus convocation being too far spread, that there should be more groups within the Columbus convocation. Bishop Hobson spoke of the unique situation as to the refugee problem in the world today; stating that there are sixty million refugees in a desperate need. He suggested that the Immigration Law of 1924 be brought up to date to enable us to bring in the 10,000 little children from Germany to America. He spoke of our shameful participation in the Far East situation by furnishing 50% of the income for war by buying Japanese products and by allowing them to purchase raw materials from us. He hoped that we would be able to change the attitudes to further the end of right in this situation.

At this point the meeting was recessed to enable the delegates and visitors to take a sightseeing trip through Marietta to be followed by a tea at the "Anchorage" with Mr. Edward McTaggart as the host.

Dinner was held at the Betsey Mills Club, after which the meeting adjourned to Andrews Hall where Bishop Hobson delivered his address on the Madras Conference. Pictures of the Madras Conference and also of the diocese of Dornekal were shown. It was evident by the enthusiasm shown that Bishop Hobson's address was the high-light of our day.

May 23rd.

An early service of Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 o'clock in St. Luke's Church with the Rt. Rev. Paul Jones as celebrant, assisted by Bishop Hobson, Rev. Smythe Lindsay, and Father Edmund Souder.

The annual meeting reconvened at 9:30 in the church and was called to order by the president, Mrs. Bone, with a prayer and by the singing of a hymn.

Minutes of the previous day were read by the secretary, corrected and accepted.

Mrs. Woodhull gave the report of the United Thank Offering for the Spring collection, this report is incomplete, but today stands:

Although this total is smaller than the total for our Fall Collection, it is slightly more than the collection of last Spring. The amount is higher but the number of givers is less. In the Spring of 1938, the total givers were 3,364, while this Spring (1939), the number so far is 3,242.

The reports of the co-operating agencies were then heard. Mrs. David Larcomb, the National President of the Church Periodical Club, spoke of the plans and hopes of this organization. Mrs. Larcomb said that she felt that her addressing the convention was a demonstration of the co-operation between the Woman's Auxiliary and the Church Periodical Club. She told us that the Church Periodical Club celebrated its fiftieth (50th) anniversary during the year of 1939. Mrs. Larcomb stated that during the year of 1939, there were 433 magazines forwarded by 300 people in Southern Ohio; 50,000 bulk magazines distributed to institutions; also that there were 4,000 unfilled requests for periodicals.

Because of illness, Mrs. Stone, Diocesan president of the Girl's Friendly Society, was unable to attend, so Mrs. Kinnel, Second Vice-President of the organization, read her report. Mrs. Stone expressed her thanks to Mrs. Bone, her Board and members of

the Auxiliary throughout the diocese for their splendid co-operation shown to the Girl's Friendly Society through the past year, especially in helping to raise their financial contribution to the national budget.

Mrs. Cooper Benedict gave the convention a brief history of the Church Mission of Help. She told that it was founded twenty-eight years ago in New York City. In 1919 the National Council was founded. Their work is chiefly with girls from the ages of sixteen to twenty-five. The organization is divided into three divisions: the first, four full-time workers with Miss Gwynedd Owen as the executive secretary; second, the board of directors consists of eighteen members; third, the parish representatives who interpret the work of the Church Mission of Help to their members.

Miss Amy Foote then spoke as a representative of the Eleanor Lodge in Cincinnati. She explained that the lodge is a home for business women, teachers, students, and nurses. It is under the management of a board of eighteen church women, half of these belong to the Girl's Friendly Society. Miss Foote made the following recommendations: The board of the Eleanor Lodge asks that hereafter it may be included in the recognized list of Diocesan activities in which the Woman's Auxiliary is interested, and also that it hereafter be represented and asked for a report at conventions and convocations of the Woman's Auxiliary of Southern Ohio.

Mrs. Sadie Hall requested permission to inform the convention as to the whereabouts of Miss Thelma Howard, who received the scholarship of the Book of Remembrance in 1937. Miss Howard has a position in a school for unmarried mothers in Washington. Mrs. Hall reported that she is so happy in her work and wished the Woman's Auxiliary to know how much she appreciated the opportunity given to her through the scholarship.

Mrs. Bone introduced Mrs. Ruth Mougey Worrel, the executive secretary of the Ohio Federation of Church Women. Mrs. Worrel told of attending church meetings of the women of different denominations and said she could see no difference in these groups. We are all talking about, and working for the same things, the only thing is, we don't seem to be able to work together to accomplish our mutual ends. She suggested that our

aim should be Christian Unity and United Christian Action, and she suggested the following things we could work for together:

1. Peace.
2. Institute on the Family.
3. Work among the migrants in Ohio—an inter-denominational project.
4. Where we can find our common ground—the way in which we can work together.

We then had the reports of the Standing Committees:

It was moved by Mrs. Seldon Trumbull, and seconded by Mrs. Woodruff to accept the report of the credentials committee. The motion carried.

Mrs. Edwin A. Hoey then made her report for the Memorial Scholarship Fund. Two scholarships have been awarded, the first, of \$150.00, to Miss Elizabeth Brerton; and the second \$800.00, to Miss Marion Duncan, to be paid over a period of time.

Miss Hilda Shaul reported for the Inter-Racial Committee. Miss Shaul told that the committee is sponsoring an inter-racial dinner.

On the Church and the World Committee, Mrs. Baird reported on the course given in Columbus by Dr. Fletcher, and the Quiet Day at St. James, Columbus, in April with Father Souder.

Miss Gifford from the Carbondale Community Center, then told the meeting a little about Carbondale. She invited the convention to visit her on their way home, and if not then sometime this summer. She said that the girls are eager for religious education. The boys have just organized a boy scout troop there. There are twenty-six of the women of the community organized in a health group. In the month of April, Miss Gifford said there were 1,589 people active in activities in Neighborhood House.

The Rt. Rev. Paul Jones then delivered to the convention a very illuminative address on the "Refugee Problem." Bishop Jones said that a Refugee Problem was not necessarily a new problem today, as history showed we had had refugees from war and religious persecution since the beginning of time. In the early days of our own country this was so; and such men as George Washington and Thomas Jefferson encouraged the emigration of "unfortunates of other countries" to America. Bishop Jones spoke of this as the "American Way" and cited the statue of liberty and its inscription as evidence. He reminded us that America has been made up of peoples of other nationalities. The only difference today being that under the present quota system, this is more selective, and those coming today are of a higher class than formerly.

He quoted statistics showing that the percentage of Jews in America and their influence in American business was greatly exaggerated, and figures show many more might be absorbed because of our vast unpopulated areas; if they were given a little help.

Ways in which we can help are: 1. To sign affidavits or use our influence to get others to sign allowing Jews to enter. 2. Contribute money to the diocesan or National Committee for Refugees. 3. Combat the spread of Anti-Semitism in America.

Following Bishop Jones' address, Mrs. Joseph Fletcher made a brief plea for the Spanish Refugee children.

Mrs. Bone then asked for a report of the Resolutions Committee.

Mrs. Louise H. Sandoe as chairman of this committee made the following report:

The committee on Resolutions recommends the following:

1. The following names compose the committee for approval of the minutes of the meeting of May 23rd: Miss Laura McCracken, Mrs. Edward Wagner, Mrs. Fritz Lichtenberg.

2. That the offering at the 7:30 o'clock Eucharistic service of May 23rd, amounting to \$56.12, be given to help send a delegate to the Amsterdam Youth Conference.

3. For the opening service of Holy Communion, May 22nd, the committee wishes to thank Bishop Hobson and the assisting clergy; also Rev. Anson P. Stokes, Jr., for his inspiring address.

4. The committee expresses its appreciation of the assistance of Rev. Smythe Lindsay and Mr. Charles Ayers of the Cathedral staff, in arranging the exhibits. It desires to thank Rev. E. L. Souder for his talk on the work of the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China.

5. The committee would thank Rev. L. B. Wilson, Jr., for the services in St. Luke's Church and the ladies of the Church for their generous hospitality; also the organist, Mrs. E. Leigh Smith, the Choir and the pages. It desires to thank Mr. Edward McTaggart of the Anchorage for the Tea given for the Auxiliary.

6. The committee endorses Mrs. Bone's recommendation that the assistants be appointed to serve under the vice-presidents of the Columbus and Dayton Convocations.

7. The committee wishes to extend its sympathy to Mrs. John Gallaher, of this Parish, because of her recent accident and to express its regret that she is unable to attend these meetings.

Mrs. Crocker moved that Mrs. Rogan be made chairman of a committee to contact parishes for contributions for Bond Hill. Miss Judith Colston seconded this motion. Carried.

A discussion was then held as to the advisability of changing the time of our annual meeting, possibly having it concurrently with the Diocesan Convention, or possibly the day before, or the day after. After some discussion, it was duly moved and seconded that the date of the annual meeting be decided by the Executive Board. Motion carried.

Mrs. Rogan moved and Mrs. Woodhull seconded a motion that in consideration of the recommendation made by Miss May Foote, that the report of the Eleanor Lodge be included in the report of the Girl's Friendly Society at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Mrs. Kimmel and seconded by Mrs. Crocker that the meeting send a message of sympathy to Mrs. Stone. Carried.

The suggestion was made that the delegates carry a message home to their rectors to the effect that if each member of the Parish contribute one dollar on Whitsunday, Southern Ohio's pledge to the National Church deficit would be raised.

Mrs. Woodhull asked that the United Thank Offering treasurers meet with her at the close of the meeting.

Mrs. Roger Rogan moved for adjournment following closing prayers by Bishop Hobson.

## FINANCIAL POLICY

### ARTICLE I

The Auxiliary by education and example shall be an inspirational force in the parish to establish a proper sense of Christian stewardship and to set a definite standard of giving.

We would stress that this should begin with the children in the home, and carry through the Church School and young people's organizations.

All financial efforts of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be consistent with the primary function of the Auxiliary, which is to support the whole program of the whole Church.

### ARTICLE II

The Woman's Auxiliary has a financial responsibility toward the Parish, the Community, the Diocese, the Nation, and the World.

While this responsibility differs in individual parishes, no one of the five fields may be neglected for vital growth and development in parochial life.

### ARTICLE III

It shall be the duty of every branch to aid in raising the parish pledge for the Church's program.

- (a) By urging a thorough every member canvass and helping with it.
- (b) By urging the adoption or retention of duplex envelopes, and by giving through this envelope system.
- (c) By giving as an organization when necessary.

### ARTICLE IV

Special appeals are legitimate if endorsed by diocesan authorities.

### ARTICLE V

Money-raising projects may be necessary and permissible, for their fellowship and for the development of leadership, as well as for financial gain, provided the methods used do not destroy values which the Church is trying to build up in the individual and the community.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

### Constitution

#### ARTICLE I

##### *Name*

The name of this Association shall be "The Southern Ohio Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America."

#### ARTICLE II

##### *Object*

The object of this Association shall be to carry out by united systematic effort in the Diocese of Southern Ohio, the three great aims of the Church, namely: Missions, Religious Education and Christian Social Service in the five fields, namely: Parish, Community, Diocese, Nation and World.

#### ARTICLE III

##### *Membership*

Membership in this Association shall consist of those baptized women of the Diocese who agree to share in the work of the Auxiliary.

#### ARTICLE IV

##### *Officers*

The officers of this Association shall be the Bishop ex-officio, a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Secretary of the Supply Department, a Treasurer, a Treasurer of the United Thank Offering, an Educational Secretary, and a Custodian of the Book of Remembrance. These officers with any member of the National Executive Board resident in the Diocese, shall constitute the Executive Board of the Association.

#### ARTICLE V

##### *Duties*

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall, subject to the Association, direct the active work of the Association and shall have power to adopt by-laws for the Association.

SECTION 2. The President shall be elected at the annual meeting held the spring after the General Triennial Meeting, to serve for three years, but shall not be eligible for two full consecutive

terms. She shall, with the Bishop's approval, appoint all other Diocesan (Auxiliary) officers, except the Vice-Presidents, to serve for three years, but the Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall not be appointed at the same time as the other officers, but immediately at the close of the General Triennial Meeting, to serve throughout the Triennium. The President shall call meetings of the Association and of the Executive Board, and shall preside at them. She shall exercise a general supervision over the work and shall further it in every way by her interest and advice. In the case of a vacancy in the office of President, such vacancy shall be filled until the next annual meeting by appointment made by the Bishop and a committee of two selected by the Executive Board.

SECTION 3. Each Vice-President shall be elected by the members of her Convocation to serve for three years, at the time of the annual meeting at which the President is elected, but shall not be eligible for two consecutive terms. A Vice-President, with the approval of the President, may appoint other convocational officers in her own Convocation, and prescribe their duties. She shall preside at all meetings in her own Convocation, she shall co-operate with the President in promoting local information and interest and in directing local organizations and work in her own Convocation.

SECTION 4. The Secretary shall keep the minutes of the Annual Meeting and of the Executive Board, and shall give notice of meetings. She shall conduct such correspondence of the American and the Executive Board as directed by the President. She shall also make an annual report to the Association from data furnished by the other officers and shall prepare and edit the year book.

SECTION 5. The Secretary of the Supply Department shall receive and distribute all information relating to the missionary boxes, and shall report annually to the Association.

SECTION 6. The Treasurer shall record, receive, disburse and keep account of all money distributed, except the United Thank Offering; and shall also make an annual report of the same.

SECTION 7. The Treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, promote this interest locally by correspondence and visitation. She shall report annually to the Association the amount on hand, and shall forward the same semi-annually to the treasurer of the National Council.

SECTION 8. The Educational Secretary shall have general supervision of all educational work carried on under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese.

SECTION 9. The Custodian of the Book of Remembrance shall, under the direction of the Executive Board, be responsible, for the care of the Book of Remembrance, and for the promotion of the Memorial Scholarship Fund.

## ARTICLE VI

### *Meetings*

SECTION 1. There shall be an annual meeting of this Association each spring. Every parish and mission branch may send three delegates in addition to any officer of the Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary. Except in the election of a President, members of the Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary may vote on all questions before the house.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall meet at least twice a year, five officers constituting a quorum.

SECTION 3. Convocational meetings shall be held on the call of the convocational officers.

SECTION 4. Delegates and alternates to the Triennial Meeting shall be elected by the active membership of the Auxiliary by a majority of the delegates to the annual meeting next before the Triennial. Nominations may be made by any delegate to the annual meeting.

SECTION 5. Delegates to the Provincial Synod shall be chosen by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE VII

### *Mode of Election*

SECTION 1. In the election of a president any delegate may nominate; all nominations must be written; all elections must be by ballot and each parish and mission shall cast but one vote.

SECTION 2. Unless there be an election by a majority on the first ballot, the chair shall announce the two names having the largest number of votes, and subsequent balloting shall be upon these two names until a majority vote is reached.

SECTION 3. Prior to the election of vice-presidents, a nominating committee in each Convocation shall be appointed by the vice-president at a meeting which shall precede the annual meeting. Such nominating committee shall select nominees to be presented for election at the Convocational meeting held in connection with or at the time of the annual meeting. Election shall be by ballot. Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote.

## ARTICLE VIII

### *Amendments*

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the whole number of delegates present at any annual meeting, notice of such proposed amendment having been given at the previous (annual) meeting.

## By-Laws

The Executive Board shall determine the time of and place for the annual meeting.

1. The Order of Business at any Annual Meeting shall be:

- (1) A Service of Holy Communion.
- (2) Roll Call.
- (3) The Annual Report of the Secretary.
- (4) Annual Report of Treasurer.
- (5) The President's Address.
- (6) New Business.
- (7) The Election of President.
- (8) Minutes.

2. Parish Election of delegates shall take place during the month preceding the annual meeting, and shall be immediately reported by the local secretary to the diocesan secretary.

3. A Central Expense Fund shall be provided for printing, postage, stationery, traveling expense of officers and speakers, necessary expenses of the Educational Department, and the shipping charges of the Supply Department; also for all expenses incurred in the care of the Book of Remembrance.

4. The Diocesan Central Expense Fund shall be raised in the following manner:

(a) There shall be fourteen classes paying as follows:

A—\$75.00	H—\$20.00
B— 60.00	I— 15.00
C— 50.00	K— 10.00
D— 40.00	L— 7.50
E— 35.00	M— 5.00
F— 30.00	N— 3.00
G— 25.00	O— 1.00

- (b) Each branch shall decide to which class it will belong.
- (c) Each parochial treasurer shall yearly notify the diocesan treasurer to which class the branch belongs.
- (d) The Central Expense shall be the first obligation of each branch, and shall be paid for the current year during the month of January.
- (e) Payment of the Central Expense is necessary for membership in the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.
- (f) Diocesan Dues to the national organization shall be paid from the Central Expense.

Specials assumed at the Annual Meeting are the responsibility of parochial branches.

5. New names may be inscribed in the Book of Remembrance every third year, the year of the General Convention; such names being those of women who have died within the Triennium and have been selected as worthy of a place in the Book of Remembrance by a parish committee, consisting of the heads of all women's organizations within the parish, acting with the rector.
6. When a name is presented for inscription in the Book of Remembrance, it shall be accompanied by some memorial gift made through or by the parish entering the name on its pages; such memorial gifts shall be added to the trust fund known as the Memorial Scholarship Fund.
7. The Book of Remembrance may be used at all Diocesan meetings, such as the annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, the annual service of the Girls' Friendly Society and the Diocesan Convention. The Book may not be shown at secular meetings or exhibited purely as a work of art.
8. Local receipts for the United Thank Offering shall be remitted to its treasurer in April and October except triennially in September.
9. The accounts of the treasurer and the treasurer of the United Thank Offering shall be audited and certified in the printed annual report of the Association.
10. These By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote at any regular meeting of the Executive Board.
