Minutes of the Annual Meeting

OF THE

**Southern Virginia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the
Board of Missions, held Friday, May 28th, and
Saturday, May 29th, 1909.**

The seventeenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, met in St. Luke's Church, Norfolk, Virginia, on Friday, May 28, 1909, at 9:30 A. M. The Holy Communion was celebrated by Rev. D. W. Howard, rector, assisted by Rev. E. P. Miner.

At 10:30 A. M., the Business Session was called to order by Mrs. John D. Letcher, Diocesan President and Secretary, who read the minutes of the previous meeting; after which the roll was called, and delegates from forty-six branches responded.

A most interesting report of the work done by the Auxiliary during the past year, was made by Mrs. Letcher, which showed a decided increase of work done and of money given this year, over that of previous years. Her report closed with an earnest plea for a deeper knowledge of and interest in missions, on the part of the women of the Auxiliary, as the true foundation for future glorious building.

Mrs. John Lloyd followed with a report of the Junior Auxiliary, in which she told of the splendid things accomplished by these little workers of the Diocese; whilst Miss Mary Garrett's report of the Baby's Branch showed it to be in a flourishing condition and doing excellent work.

After the singing of Hymn 254, Dr. Arthur Lloyd, General Secretary of the Board of Missions, made a most inspiring and helpful address, in which he pointed out the breadth and scope of the Auxiliary workers field, and of the power that lay in their hands for the uplifting of mankind. To use and keep above the sordid, petty things of life, and to be the little leaven that leaveneth the whole lump, were the key-notes of

his address. He also paid a glowing tribute to the high-souled, self-sacrificing, courageous women missionaries, laboring so faithfully in our foreign fields. At 12 o'clock, Dr. Lloyd paused in his address, and, with all kneeling, offered the noon-day prayers for missions.

At the close of Dr. Lloyd's address, Mrs. Henry Castle read the report of The United Offering, which showed a decided decrease in the amounts given in the last two years. She made an earnest plea for a reawakened interest in this offering, and showed, both, what an important factor it was in the mission field, and what great harm this decrease, should it continue, would work. As the twenty-first anniversary of this offering was approaching, she urged all the Branches to plan and work together to celebrate "its coming of age," by an offering which would far surpass that of any former year.

Miss Dodson, principal of St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China, gave a delightful talk on her twenty-one years' work in China, and told of the great progress the mission there had made in its work among Chinese women. She asked for a contribution to her work, in raising \$15,000, with which to build a much needed addition to St. Mary's Hall. The sum of \$273.50 was pledged for this purpose by delegates present.

At 1 P. M., lunch was served in the Parish House, by the ladies of Christ, St. Paul's and St. Luke's Churches.

At 2 P. M., the meeting was reconvened, and Mrs. Wm. A. Anderson, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, read her report. She began by explaining the purpose and aim of the Club, and then told of its work during the past year.

Miss Cargetta L. Davis followed with an interesting talk on her work among the mountaineers in South-West Virginia. She asked for good, second-hand school books—readers, spellers, geographies, etc., for the poor children of her school.

Deaconess Martin then told of her work among the miners of South-West Virginia, at Keokee, and of the gratifying results of that mission; and spoke of the need of a larger build-

ing—which Archdeacon Lloyd estimates will cost from \$700 to \$1,000—to meet the necessities of their growing work.

Rev. C. W. Sydnor then told of his work in Tazewell county, and asked for aid in erecting a church at Graham, and in completing the education of a most promising and worthy young girl, of his parish. \$257.45 of the \$350 needed to commence the church building was pledged by the delegates present, and several personal pledges were made to the young woman's education.

The most important question before the meeting—"Shall the Auxiliary continue to meet, at the same time and place as the Diocesan Council"—then came up, and before the vote was taken, prayer for Divine guidance was offered by Rev. P. M. Boyden. The question having been thoroughly discussed, both pro and con, and all being ready for the question, a recorded vote was taken, which showed 34 Branches in favor thereof and 22 opposed. The President then announced that the annual meeting of the Auxiliary would continue to be held at the same time and place as the Diocesan Council.

On motion, it was ordered that hereafter a committee from the Auxiliary should confer and act with a committee from the Council to obtain the same reduction in railroad rates for both bodies.

The annual election of officers being then in order, Mrs. Rd. McIwaine, of Christ Church Branch, Norfolk, Va., was called to the chair. The old officers were unanimously re-elected, as follows: President and Secretary, Mrs. John D. Letcher; Vice-President, Mrs. A. M. Randolph; Treasurer, Mrs. C. F. Burroughs; Assistant Secretary, Mrs. J. Newport Green; Custodian of United Offering, Mrs. H. N. Castle; President of Junior Branch, Mrs. John J. Lloyd; President of Baby's Branch, Miss Mary W. Garrett; Correspondent of Church Periodical Club, Mrs. Wm. A. Anderson.

On motion of Mrs. C. H. Hobart, a rising vote of thanks was tendered the ladies of Norfolk, for their gracious hospitality.

On Thursday afternoon a very helpful Quiet-Hour service was conducted by Dr. Arthur Lloyd, in St. Luke's Church.

There being no further business, Hymn 672 was sung and prayer was offered by Rev. James Owens, and the meeting adjourned, to meet next May in Lynchburg.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY.

In presenting the report of our Diocesan Auxiliary for the past year, nothing showing any great advance can be noted—only the steady keeping up of old pledges, and some new interest here and there in some cause that has been brought to our special notice. All this is good as far as it goes, but now in our 19th

year, as a Diocesan Auxiliary, should we not expect—nay, require—of ourselves, higher standards of work and achievement as the years go by. It was my privilege to attend last summer, as a delegate, the great Pan-Anglican Missionary Congress in London, and the impression that has most vividly remained in my mind has been the sense of the reality and great importance of mission work to the world's true advancement, that permeated those vast throngs that assembled daily, in eight different halls, simultaneously, during the ten days the Congress was in session. Missions, to these people, was what we were placed in this world for—not, as is often the case, something to fill up some spare moments when nothing of greater importance claims our attention. Never before has the world needed missionary work more, nor have more or greater opportunities opened to the Church. To conquer the world, in this generation for Christ, seems to need only the true enthusiasm and consecration of life and means of Christ's followers to His cause, and this means the consecration of your life and my life—the passing on from us to the one next to us, of this divine fire of consecrated purpose, which, as yet, may be but feebly burning in our souls.

Let us learn of the progress of the work and of its needs, and never fail, after having learned, to give God thanks for the one, and ask his help for the other—let us give as we are able, to the limit of our ability, and not offer God's cause, only what costs us nothing of effort to give. Let us not be content to stand still, but press on to enroll every woman in our congregations, in the ranks of our Auxiliary, and then work to make them active and interested members. It is pitiable to read, year after year, almost exactly the same number of members reported.

At the great Missionary Exhibition to be held this summer, in London, ten thousand (10,000) stewards for the various departments have been called for, and six thousand (6,000), have already volunteered. May our American Church catch something of enthusiasm like this.

Trusting that the coming year may show a large increase in our membership and a deeper and truer devotion to our Master's cause, I am,

Deaconess Martin, and Rev. Edmund Lee, of China, made addresses in Norfolk, and Deaconess Martin, Miss Boyd, of Japan, and Rev. Mr. Sowerby, a former missionary to China, spoke at Bedford City.

THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN
VIRGINIA BRANCH OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY TO
THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

May, 1908, and May, 1909.

The year has gone; we meet again to tell what has been accomplished for the spread of God's Kingdom by the young people of the Church:

In boxes, the young people have given \$687.75, besides the united box to the Indians, which was valued at \$332.68. In money the united offering was \$45.25.

The study of missions seems to have improved; and in many branches we find good work done by study classes.

We may hope for better things still; for more leaders themselves seem to be studying that they may teach the Juniors. The learning of Mission Fields, of course, gives help and enthusiasm to Parish Branches. In some branches, one Sunday in each month is set apart by the rector and teachers as Missionary Sunday; the regular lesson is shortened and the Sunday School is catechised on some Mission Field. This gives honor to the teaching and intelligence to the school. From such, we believe God will choose his messengers.

The United Box to the Indians, the sending of which has been the custom of the Southern Virginia Juniors for fourteen years, went this year to the Santee Agency, Nebraska. A little belated on account of railroad complications, the box was perhaps the best ever sent; and acceptable to the custodians of the many mission schools for the Indians of the Northwest.

The pledges have been quite cheerfully sent by nearly all branches. The scholarship in St. Mary's School at Shanghai, in the "Widely Loving Society," Osaka, Japan, in the school at Cape Palmas, Africa, and the Church Publishing Company, have all been promptly met.

The Theological Seminary Fund (it is with deep regret we record it), has had to be abandoned. But the good intentions and plans of God's children, though thwarted seemingly at times, are really never lost, for in place of this Fund was formed a memorial gift for Japan, to be handled by our "Gold Dollar Scholarship." Personal Missionary touches may have helped to form this; for letters of good will and gifts have come for this object until the amount justified the appointed gift. The "Gold Dollar Missionary" advises that cots for sick children in Doctor Teusler's Hospital, St. Luke's,

Tokyo, Japan, be the aim of this memorial gift. All who read of the suffering of little children—children often of neglect and sin—cannot fail to see a need for such. Let us hope that the child angel of the "Gold Dollar Scholarship" be ever over such lambs in this place of mercy and love. An increasing interest in the missionary work of our own Virginia mountains, is very evident. Miss Davis' work in Franklin county, under Mr. Roberts; that at Boydton, the Knob's Mission near Abingdon, Keokee, Big Stone Gap, etc., have testified generously to this assertion. The Juniors of Southern Virginia have had a share in the pledges of the United Branches of the Church. China was the field chosen by Southern Virginia—each Branch being allowed to choose its country and field. The name of each Diocesan Branch and its chosen field, has been placed on a chart in the Church Missions House in New York.

It is hoped that the summer months be not idle, and that earnest Juniors may form summer plans for "Birthday Parties," Missionary Games, Dialogues, etc.; bringing in the sheaves, on returning home in the fall.

Heavenly Father, we pray Thee to bless us and all members of the Junior Auxiliary, with wisdom, zeal, and constancy, in our work for Thee; Prosper the Missions of Thy Holy Church; and strengthen with Thy Holy Spirit all who are engaged in Missionary work; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY DAY.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, was held at St. Luke's church, Norfolk, Va., on May 29, 1909. The opening service was conducted by the rector, Rev. David W. Howard, who, in cordial greeting to the delegates and visitors, impressed upon those present the fact, that all baptized boys and girls are already members of the Junior Auxiliary, or great missionary body of the young people of the Church, whether they know it or do not acknowledge it. After a few words of thanks to the rector for his cheer and encouragement to the work, next came the calling of the roll. Mrs. Lloyd called for the reports of work done by the children of the Church this year. Nine delegates from as many branches came forward and read their reports—large boys and small, big girls and little, so sweet and businesslike, made an agreeable scene.

The returned missionary from Shanghai, China, the guest of the Woman's Auxiliary, was the gift to the Junior's as well, and Virginian, as she is, gave evidence of her interest and affection by the words spoken. Miss Steva Dodson, formerly of Wytheville, Virginia, seemed in her talk to be holding her Chinese charges in her arms, for the loving sympathy of their brethren of the fair skin. She gave the history of the Chinese child, supported by Southern Virginia Juniors in St. Mary's School, Shanghai, and also appealed to them, to help her with a little friendless waif she had just taken into the orphanage of the school at St. Mary's.

Mrs. Lloyd next introduced Miss Davis, our missionary to the mountain people of Franklin county, who thanked the children for their generous gifts at Christmas. The time was well filled up, and the only regret was, that only two hours and a half had been given. Deaconess Charlotte, our missionary in the Southwest, given by the United Offering of the Board of Missions to work under

the Bishops and Archdeacon, told of her work at Keokee, and thanked the young people for their help.

Curios from different countries were shown after the adjournment and refreshing ices served. A conference of Junior workers was held in the Church, from which ideas and suggestions were gotten.

The singing of the hymns was inspiring, and it is hoped that the next meeting in Lynchburg, will be attended with increased interest.

THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LITTLE
HELPERS' AUXILIARY OF THE BOARD OF MIS-
SIONS OF THE DIOCESE OF SOUTHERN
VIRGINIA.

When we take a retrospective view, we find the Little Helpers' Auxiliary has existed in Virginia for fourteen years. In this length of time, we might expect it would have attracted the attention of all parents and every Church and Parish, and that there would be no Church or Parish in which it did not exist. I wish to call attention to the great importance of early impressions and training of children, now acknowledged by all educated and thinking people. God's command is, "Bring up a child in the way it should go," and His promise is, "When he is old, he will not depart from it."

We meet many people in the world who say they feel no interest in missions; that missions do not appeal to them. Had they been carefully trained from the early dawn of consciousness, to pray for the extension of God's Kingdom, to think of God, the God who created them and from whom they receive all blessings in life, to live to Him and for Him, to work for Him, to give to Him; had they been early taught in this spirit, and early trained to value these things, they must, as they advance in life, realize their great importance to us, and to the world.

Early impressions grow with the growth, and strengthen with the strength. With parents rests the blessed privilege of training their children, of shaping and moulding their lives and characters; but on every parent rests the command, "Suffer the little ones to come unto Me," that is, train and lead these little ones committed to your trust along the paths of holiness; consecrate them early to My service. They must be among the laborers in My vineyard. The early training of little children means everything to them now, and in their future.

The future success of the Woman's Auxiliary must depend largely on the Juniors and Little Helpers of to-day. They ought to be transferred from rank to rank, trained, competent, and consecrated workers for the Master. The Woman's Auxiliary stands to-day as a reminder to us Christian people of Christ's command, "Go you into all the world and preach the Gospel unto all people." So if we are true, and acceptable laborers in His vineyard, we must bring with us zeal, and we must add to our zeal knowledge. We must have consecration, love, and the spirit of prayer, to come thoroughly furnished and equipped, and if we are going to learn life's lesson, it is far easier to learn it in our youth, before the days come when we shall say, I have no pleasure in these things. May God give His Holy Spirit to the parents, the officers and the little ones that the children of our land may grow up as the polished corners of the temple. May they love God, and be loved of Him.

I wish to express to my dear and faithful officers my heartfelt appreciation of their labor for God and His little ones.

The banner branch for the year is St. Paul's Branch, of Petersburg, under the leadership of Mrs. Horace L. Smith. Mrs. Asa Rogers, after years of faithful, successful, consecrated service, has resigned, leaving love and gratitude in our hearts. Mrs. Horace L. Smith leads the Banner Branch with wonderful success. This little band sends this year to Missions, \$46.50. May God accept it, and bless the gift and the givers to His service, and may He use it to bring souls to Himself.

The banner child this year is Randolph Harrison, of St. Paul's, Lynchburg. He has sent the largest offering ever made through our Little Helpers' Auxiliary by any one individual child, \$14.10, and this Lynchburg Branch, under the leadership of Mrs. R. E. Gish, sends this year, \$28.86, the second largest offering to Missions.

The largest branch this year is under the leadership of Miss Mary Roland. It is the Christ Church, Norfolk Branch, having fifty-five members, and has done splendid work.

St. Paul's, Norfolk, under Miss Nannie Smith, has sent to Missions the largest offering in its history. St. Luke's Auxiliary, Norfolk, is well organized in all departments, and the Little Helpers, under Mrs. Wilkinson's management, are doing fine work. St. John's, Roanoke, recently organized under Miss Emma Cottingham, is doing a wonderful work, has forty-five members, and sent \$20.00 to Missions.

I wish to call attention to the liberality of the children of three small branches. Mrs. Norval Lee has one child in her branch, at

Glade Spring, who sent one dollar. The six children in Miss Lovell's Branch, of St. Peter's, Norfolk, sent six dollars, and Mrs. H. H. Edmund's Branch of St. John's, Houston, of eight members, average over one dollar apiece. How encouraging it would be, and how it would swell our treasury and make the dry places rejoice, if our large branches responded in gifts as large as these.

I want to call the attention of all my officers to the memorial boxes, established only in five branches of the Little Helpers' Auxiliary. St. Thomas' Church Branch, Bedford county, under Miss Louisa Burks, sends this year from one memorial box, \$5.00. St. Thomas, Abingdon, under Mrs. Norval Lee, sends \$2.08 from memorial boxes. St. Paul's, Norfolk, sends a memorial offering. St. Stephen's Chapel, Port Norfolk, under Mrs. H. S. Etheridge, sends from her memorials \$2.10. Bruton Parish, Williamsburg, from her memorials, sends \$1.00. This added to the memorial of the founder of the Little Helpers' Auxiliary, is \$30.69 this year. If all the branches would remember when a little one is transplanted from the earthly home to the Paradise of God, that we may not think of his work as finished, but that parents and children can, by means of a memorial box, carry it on in the little one's name, for His sake, who "Gathers the lambs in His arms," they could thus keep fresh in the home a sacred memory, preserving hallowed associations, and strengthening the tie which binds the Church on earth to the Church triumphant above.
